Dear friends,

It is a strange new world we find ourselves in!

To gather or not to gather seems to be at the forefront of everyone's minds, and as I write this, I am aware of more and more folk who are taking a cautious approach and staying away from other people as practicable.

Well, since I wrote this, the decision has been made for us.

The Methodist Church is now advising that Methodist services of worship should be suspended immediately.

Therefore, beginning tomorrow 22 March, there will be no church services until further notice.

We will endeavour to keep everyone connected via phone and email, and continue to produce our regular bulletins which we hope will help to do that. The latest advice (Friday 20th) is that smaller gatherings are still permitted, but increased physical space between us is encouraged. We will review our position as new guidelines become available, but in the meantime, please look out for one another. "Loving your neighbour as yourself in this moment also means doing what you personally can to protect not just yourself but your neighbours. It is time for all of us... to look after each other and not just ourselves."

There are lighter moments among the uncertainty however – trying to come up with new ways of greeting one another without physical contact has resulted in many laughs. Holding a conversation while keeping a distance is also proving challenging, especially for those of us who are a little hard of hearing. Maybe it is time to brush up on our sign language skills?

I leave you with these words of wisdom from a clergy colleague:

"While lots of things are being cancelled because of corona virus, love isn't one of those. Let's not close our hearts off, let's not allow our hearts to become infected with fear."

A message from Rev Susan Thompson (edited and abridged)

Grace and peace to you all from the Waikato-Waiariki Methodist Synod.

One of the important learnings from the Christchurch earthquakes of 2010-2011 was that a church is more than a building or a Sunday worship service. A church is its people and we can be church wherever we are and whether we are gathered or scattered. Think about ways you can continue to be church within your community if you can no longer gather as you are used to doing.

Anglican Archbishops have suggested that people light a candle in their homes at 7pm on every Sunday that worship services are suspended as a sign of hope. This could be a time to pray for our families, our neighbours, our country and our world. Seek out ways of being beacons of light and a non-anxious presence in our communities.

Our youth are often reminding us that "He waka eke noa: we are all in this together". In all that we do may we remember that we need each other. May we love and serve in the spirit of our God.
