Minute Book : Children's Home House Committee

April 1965 - April 1968.

The usual monthly meeting was held at the Home on Wednesday April 14, those present being Nesdunes Bell, Blight, Corbett, Garforth, Hodder, Matthews (presiding) Melhuish, Newton & Scott.

Apologies were received from Miss Horrell and Mrs. Black.

Mrs. Matthews convened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Mrs. Hodder thanked the members for the beautiful flowers taken to her in hospital by the President; and thanked Mrs. Melhuish for so competently acting as Secretary.

Mrs. Newton reported that the Street Day Appeal catering had gone off very well. As Mr. Beardsley had made a very generous donation of cake, it was not necessary to use all of the £5 given by the Board. It was resolved to hold over the remainder - £3.6.0 - in the Home's safe, for use on the same day next year.

An order has been placed for jugs and

basins, but they have not yet come to hand.
The china ordered has arrived.

Mrs. Hood has taken over the Kindy on
one morning a week.

Matron's Report: we have 52 children, all in
reasonably good health.

Staff: Miss Betty Loomis has settled in well
with staff and children. Mrs. Hood has
taken over cleaning in the Middle Block,
and Mrs. Glenroy has taken over the laun-
dry in place of Mrs. Penrose, who has a
part-time position at St. Winifred's.

All Harvests, 25 in all, have been stored,
used, or preserved, including almost a
ton of tomatoes. The Deep Freeze is nearly
full of cauliflowers, beans, carrots and
corn.

Mr. Scott has taken the Middle Block
family, Sister Rona and [REDACTED]
for a trip to Arthur's Pass, leaving Friday
afternoon and returning Saturday evening;
also Miss Hore and her family, Miss Kerr
and her family + Miss Roud's family,
leaving only Miss Bay's family to have

their trip. This was in place of a picnic, fin-
anced by Masonic Charities.

Mr. and Mrs. Scott visited Ashburton twice
first to attend services at Wakanui and
Baring Sq. and receive their harvests, and
again to receive gifts of jam from children
of Baring Sq. Sunday School. At two of
these services Mr. Scott was asked to speak
to the children, and also took an even-
ing Service at Sydenham. Mr. Scott and
one of the boys helped on the day of the
Street Appeal, and most of the staff
manned collecting posts.

Staff and children enjoyed the Church
picnic at Spencer Park in March.

Mr. Scott has spoken to the Heathcote
Ladies' Fellowship on the Home, and Sister
Rona to the Weedons Fellowship. Ballet
recommenced this month.

Visits: 45 ladies from Shirley Evening Fellowship
enjoyed seeing over the Home, and mending
and marking clothing. Oxford ladies also
visited, having lunch on the lawn
before going on to Deaconess House.

Sister Lona was one of the speakers at the Inter-Church School, speaking on the New Testament.

This has been a busy month but well worth while.

Slides: Staff are making new up to date slides of the work of the Home, suitable for taking out to ladies' groups. It is hoped to show these at the June meeting of the Ladies' House Committee.

Welfare visitors were pleased with the Home, but wanted to see all iron beds replaced by wooden ones, and still think the bedrooms should be carpeted.

X It was decided to recommend to the next meeting of the Board that all remaining iron beds be replaced by wooden ones, and furnished with rubber mattesses.

It was moved by Mrs. Corbett and seconded by Mrs. Melhuish that we retain our polished floors and warm mats, as being much more hygienic for younger children such as ours.

Mrs. Scott was authorised to obtain new bedspreads and curtains as needed.

Gifts were many and varied: scrapbooks, comics, assorted clothing, groceries, fruit, honey, jam, eggs, tripe, pickled pork and mince, as well as honest produce. Total cash value was £4. 16. 10.

The Benediction was pronounced and a delicious afternoon tea served by Mrs. Scott.

The usual monthly meeting was held at the Home on Wed. May 12, those present being Mesdames Corbett, Garforth, Hodder, Matthews, [presiding] Melhuish, Newton and Scott.

Apologies were received from Miss Horrell and Mesdames Bell, Black and Blight.

Mrs. Matthews convened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Matron's report: All children are away on holiday but 60 have been in residence during the month, including 5 [redacted] children whose parents are unfit to look after them, and [redacted] 3 & 4, and [redacted] 2 and 4, whose father is an old boy of the Home. These four were temporary, on account of illness of their mothers.

[redacted] K. turned to their parents, also the [redacted] boys whose parents are re-united.

This leaves our family at 51 with 14 in foster homes.

[redacted] and [redacted] who were in foster homes and are now working, but remain in their foster homes, come in frequently and are both doing well.

Health: There were 6 more measles cases with a little ear trouble, but all cleared up before the holidays.

Holidays: Homes were offered freely in spite of 9 extra children to place during the last two weeks. Grateful thanks goes to many kind folk in our own and sister churches.

Several new groups of the Women's Fellowship have sponsored children for Outings Day and holiday weekends.

Alterations: Carpenters are making very slow work of our extra staff room, and it will probably be some weeks yet before Miss Loomis can shift into her new room.

Following a visit from one of our ladies' groups, we received a call from their minister, followed by an arranged visit by the Executive of a Charitable Organisation who suggested spending a large sum of money on improvements to the Home. Mr. Scott has

had discussions with them, which should result in several amenities being provided which will improve the working and comfort of our Home for both Staff and Children.

Staff: All are well but weary after a busy term and most will be able to have a few days away. Mr. Scott is in Auckland and Sister Rona air Deaconess Convocation, and five staff are leaving for their homes.

During the next 3 months we have two Girl Guides doing 2 hours voluntary work per week for their Queen's Award, and a Varsity Student is coming to work voluntarily for the next two weeks.

Several letters from Miss Henry describing her travels have been enjoyed by all.

Mr. Scott has taken two services this month, and Sister Rona spoke during the morning service broadcast from Durham St. Church on Mother's Day, on the angle of children who do not have a mother's care. She is also Transport Officer for Deaconesses arriving by air for the

Convocation.

Roasting tins are needed and some discussion took place on these, as Mrs. Scott said that one of stainless steel in use for only two years had become pitted — the manufacturers said because of salt baked in it. It was decided that Mr. Scott should make enquiries about heavy tin ones and get them as required.

x It was moved by Mrs. Corbett and seconded by Mrs. Garfish that a firescreen should be obtained to fit right over the fireplace in the Reception Room.

Gifts this month included 3 lots of Easter eggs, turkeys and ducks, fruit and jam, apples, books, toys and clothing which included scarves made by Mrs. Barker of the Blind Institute. Total cash value was £23.9.0.

Mrs. Matthews pronounced the Benediction and a delightful afternoon tea was served by Mrs. Scott.

The monthly meeting was held at the Home on Wednesday June 9, those present being Miss Horrell and Mesdames Bell, Black,

Blight, Corbett, Garfath, Hodder, Matthews (presiding) McHuish, Newton, and Scott.

Mrs. Matthews opened the meeting with readings and prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. Mrs. Scott said the firescreen was being made and would be ready soon.

A letter was received from the Board stating that it was resolved at their last meeting that:

(a) the floor of the new bedroom for a staff member be treated with cork tiling or whatever was necessary and carpeted wall to wall.

(b) that not less than 3 staff bedrooms be carpeted annually until all are done (wall to wall)

They ask that our Committee see about implementing this.

They also agree that all old beds, 16 in

number, be replaced with wooden ones, and that rubber mattresses be obtained for all beds - 32 required.

This means that 18 wooden beds will be in stock, enough for 12 for each of the four families, nothing further to be done to centre block beds in the meantime, as the whole question of a receiving centre needs consideration.

A detailed report had been received from the Child Welfare Division making some rather outspoken comments on the state of the Home in comparison with others in Christchurch. The committee is to inspect the building, and take necessary action in the various matters which are our responsibility, or make further representations to the next Board meeting.

As a start, it was decided to obtain a supply of travelling bath mats for all bathrooms.

Matron's Report: Everyone is settled down after school holidays, and all but nine were offered hospitality in Queen's Birthday week.

The term began with 35 children, the following being returned to parents: 5 [redacted] children, on Doctor's recommendation, but not with our approval as the mother is still having daily treatment. Mr. Glen has this family in his care. Three [redacted] children; the 3 temporary children; the 4 [redacted] children, the father taking the 2 boys & the mother [redacted]. She has a flat in Chel and hopes to obtain part-time work. [redacted] has been fostered to her holiday parents who have known the family for about 5 yrs.

Admissions: [redacted] whose parents are separated; a temporary family of 3 whose mother was having a 4th child, and 3 [redacted] children. 10. [redacted] 9 and [redacted] 6, whose mother is in hospital for an operation for a few weeks. Present roll number 43.

The three [redacted] children have been put in Miss Bay's family as they seem to be fairly permanent. This matter has

been referred to Mr. Maurice McGregor, now attached to the Princess Margaret Psychiatric Clinic, to see what he can ascertain regarding the mother's health and the future of the children.

Health: All children and staff are well.

Alterations: The carpenters have now finished in the new staff room, and Mr. Scott is busy painting, ready for flooring and furniture to be installed.

The chaplain and secretary of the Board visited the staff and explained about the proposed improvements to staff rooms.

Mr. and Mrs. Scott spent a morning in town recently trying to locate necessary kitchen equipment. Stainless steel jugs in a large size were not procurable, but 3 large and 2 medium enamel ones were bought. Also 3 deep aluminum basins. The spark guard will cost £2.10-0 which seems very reasonable in comparison with shop ones. Heavy based roasting dishes have been ordered to our requirements, of black sheet metal with welded joins.

Visits: Wrecks ladies' Fellowship saw over the Home and brought a gift parcel of sweets for each family unit. Sister Rona Spottie to this group some time ago.

Miss Val. Warren who lived in during the holidays doing voluntary work was a great asset; very grateful for the opportunity her studentship gives her to obtain the education and position she hopes for.

Mr. Scott has taken two services this month.

Still needed are two dozen butter dishes and 100 jam dishes, a pair of kitchen scissors; blankets are needed, pricedor Miller's fork - 7-6^{pr} the large single size. Mrs. Scott was authorised to get 10 or 12 pairs as needed.

The hall carpet needs turning and lightening, and a new under felt; it was decided to do this as soon as possible.

Gifts this month included clothing books, toys and comics received anonym-

ously, jigsaw puzzles, a bassinet, cot, dolls and clothes for the baby room, and two dolls and wardrobe. Jam and eggs totalled £12.0.0.

Mrs. Scott then served a delightful afternoon tea, after which the committee split into two halves and were shown over the Home by Mr. and Mrs. Scott with special attention to items mentioned in the Welfare Division's report.

The usual monthly meeting was held at the Home on wed. July 14, those present being Messdames Bell, Black, Blight, Corbett, Grafton, Hodder, Matthews (presiding) Melhuish, Newton and Scott and Miss Horrell.

Mrs. Matthews convened the meeting with prayer. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

The firescreen had arrived and looked very good. Samples of gayleen and Knightsbridge

carpets were shown for staff room floors, and it was decided to recommend the latter to the Board.

✓ Twelve pairs of blankets had been obtained from Miller's, and they were of good size and better quality than those previously bought.

The purchase of a bed and dressing-table for the new staff room was authorised.

The small washing machine has worn out and is not worth repairing, but a good reconditioned one can be obtained from Hays. This was approved.

The new beds are now in use, but it was not possible to obtain a Government subsidy for them. Lockers now could do with revarnishing.

Mrs. Matthews reported on a visit paid to the Boys' Home in Stannmore Rd. and to the new Family Home in Flockay Ave. conducted by the Welfare Division. The party led by Mr. Lyons included Board representatives, House Committee represent-

atives, Mr. & Mrs. Scott and Sister Rona. Ideas for reorganisation of dormitory accommodation were especially interesting, but an older age group is catered for than at our Home.

As the Finance Committee of the Board is to meet on July 20, considerable discussion took place on various matters affecting the Home, and the Secretary was asked to write to the Board giving our recommendations as follows:

- ✓ 1) Knightsbridge carpet for staff rooms.
- ✓ 2) Bathrooms to be reorganised as necessary - Showers to have hot water connected or be removed.
- ✓ 3) A more satisfactory first aid area should be set aside.
- ✓ 4) A letter from Miss Jean Hay to the Board tells of lack of equipment and gives a list of necessary items for the Kindergarten. Miss Sandford looks after 15 preschool children of varying ages and needs equipment to keep them happily and constructively employed. Miss Hay has already provided a good deal of apparatus herself. It was

- recommended that she be allowed to purchase what she thinks necessary.
- * 5) we consider it would be more satisfactory to provide only 3 family units and a receiving centre. This would enable rearrangement of rooms to give central storage area for all clothing under charge of one person.
 - In the Receiving Centre, as there is at present only one room giving dormitory accommodation, with others using one end of the dining room, it is necessary that the dining room should be divided in some way to separate the living area from the sleeping area.
 - * Family rooms should be made more homelike, divided into eating and recreation areas, with formica tables and some cosy floor covering and seating.
 - * This brings up the question of heating in the blocks, which is inadequate. Wiring should be examined throughout

and extra points installed where necessary for heating and cleaning.

Malvois Report: Since last month permanent admissions have been 3 [redacted] children.

[redacted], whose father has gone to Australia, and 4 [redacted] children.

5, whose mother has left home. Also admitted were 2 [redacted] children, both of whose parents were ill, and 3 [redacted] children whose mother was in Hospital, but both these families plus the 3 [redacted] children have now returned home. [redacted] has returned from his foster home, as his foster parents felt he was unhappy and lonely. The Welfare Dept. have asked us to have

[redacted] again as they cannot find a foster home who can manage him. Thus our family numbers 52. Two foster children have come to us through Lifeline [redacted]. 11 mths. and [redacted]

10 days, making 17 foster children. All are doing well.

Health All children are well, with only one case

of measles during the month.

Outings: with Heaton and Wainui in schools coinciding with their half term holiday, most family mothers took their families to a Film Matinee, with a fish and chip Tea and Ice cream to follow. All much enjoyed.

Staff: All are working well, and cooperating in ideas or pointing out defects in their "flats" which could be improved. A good number are still attending the series of lectures arranged by the Social Service Council covering the care of all ages in Institutions and the effect this kind of life has on staff and inmates. Some of these have proved very worthwhile.

All staff are well except Miss Rose, who is to go into hospital at the end of the month, and Sister Rona.

We have had a visit from two classes of Rugby St. Sunday School to see over the Home and meet children and mothers.

Sister Rona has spoken on the Home to Durham St. Womans Fellowship, and Mr. Scott spent Sunday 27th June in the Oxford Circuit but owing to weather conditions did not complete the evening at Oxford. He has also preached at Kaiapoi and Woolston.

Butter dishes and Kitchen scissors have been bought, as well as blankets, firescreen and roasting dishes.

The purchase of two dozen towelling bath mats was authorised, and also a steam iron and heat controlled iron for use in the laundry.

Mrs. Melhuish reported giving a talk on the Home to Revivale Girl Guides with good results.

Gifts this month included apples, baked beans & spaghetti, peanut butter, groceries, sweets, clothing, rubber clips for pillows, books, crayons, wool, furniture etc. Cash value was £12.18.0.

Mrs. Scott served a delicious afternoon tea and the meeting closed with the Benediction.

The usual monthly meeting was held at the Home on Wed. Aug. 11, those present being Miss Horrell and Mesdames Bell, Black, Blight, Corbett, Garfath, Hodder, Matthews (presiding) Newton and Scott. An apology was received from Mrs. Melhuish.

Mrs. Matthews convened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Four staffrooms had been fitted with "Knightsbridge carpet" and look very well.

Mrs. Matthews took flowers to Miss Horrell in Hospital, and a letter of thanks was received.

A card was sent to Mr. Horrell to congratulate him on his 99th birthday and a reply received from Miss Alice Horrell.

A letter of sympathy in her illness was sent to Sister Rona.. and a reply received.

Large bathmats in corded cotton had

been bought for the children's bathrooms at 6/- each, and smaller ones in towelling for the staff at 9/11 each.

A steam iron and a heat-controlled iron have still to come from Hays Ltd.

Matron's Report:

Family numbers remain the same.

[REDACTED] of Miss Horrell's family, have returned to their parents in Dunedin.

[REDACTED] came for 10 days while their mother had a new baby, and we now have [REDACTED] until the holidays.

They are the youngest of 5 boys, whose father is blind and whose mother badly needs a holiday. Neighbours are caring for the school age children. This family came to us through the Kaiapoi church. [REDACTED]

who was in a foster home has now returned to his mother. This makes 16 in foster homes and 18 girls and 33 boys resident in The Home.

Health: There has been a continuous run of 'flu' showing in repeated spells of high temperature, sore throats and infected ears, but we hope all are on the mend now.

We are pleased to report that our negotiations with the Welfare Dept. re [REDACTED] a state ward who has been in our care for 2 yrs. have been successful and he has now been able to return to his parents, who have been helped by us to secure a State house and set up their home again. They are all so happy to be together again.

Visits: St. Stephen's Fellowship came and did an evening's sewing for us, and the Oxford Tree Baptist Sunday School Group entertained our children with songs, stories and music. Some of our older ones gave items in return. Mr. Harrow has been active over the past month inspecting the building thoroughly inside and out. Members of the Welfare Dept. from Wellington and Christ Church, members of our Board and House Committee also looked over the home on Wed. July 31, and the Welfare Committee was more favourable than the report indicated.

A very enjoyable evening was held on Tuesday Aug. 10 to entertain friends of

[REDACTED] and his fiancee at a kitchen evening. [REDACTED] is an old boy of the Home who has lived in the Papamui district since leaving school.

Staff: Sister Ronas' health is improving slowly; she contracted shingles after the hepatitis. Miss Hore has had her operation and is now out of hospital but not improving as fast as she would like. Our cleaning lady Mrs. Merrin has had to leave owing to her son's illness. Mrs. Prentice has come to our aid until the holidays.

Purchases: Three more mattresses arrived, and arrangements have been made to turn the hall carpet.

Miss Hay has received money from the Board to buy kindergarten equipment. Mrs. Read has been helping while Miss Sandford has been taking care of Miss Hore's family.

Some discussion took place on the provision of uniform for the staff, but no decision was arrived at.

Papamui Rotary Club has decided to pro-

vide a paddling pool for the children, and has also cut our boundary trees.

- x It was decided to recommend to the Board that another live-in staff member be taken on, to help in the middle block with cleaning, looking after clothing, weekend washing etc., and to be trained in all branches of the work to act as reliever when necessary. To accommodate her we ask that the ~~girls'~~ block washroom be changed into a bedroom as has been done with Miss Horrell's room. We ask for this to be done immediately.

Fifteen holiday homes are still wanted for children 5 yrs old and under.

Gifts this month included jam and eggs to the value of £11-2-0, as well as red material, toilet bags, used clothing and facecloths and soap.

Mrs. Matthews closed the meeting with the Benediction, and Mrs. Scott served a bountiful afternoon tea.

The usual monthly meeting was held at the Home on Wed. Sept. 8, those present being Mesdames Black, Blight (presiding) Hodder, Garforth, Melhuish, Newton and Scott.

Apologies were received from Mesdames Bell, Corbett & Matthews and Miss Horrell.

The meeting was opened with Silent prayer followed by the Lord's Prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Letters of sympathy had been written to Miss Horrell in Princess Margaret Hospital and to Mr. Scott in Burwood Hospital.

A letter was received from Mrs. Miller Head asking us to provide and serve lunch for about 12 and afternoon tea for about 30 counters at St. Paul's, Cashel St. on House to House Appeal Day, Oct. 2. We decided to do this, details to be arranged later when Mrs. Matthews returns; we propose to buy cakes and savouries and make sandwiches and plain foods.

Native's Report: Children have all returned and settled down well after the holidays, and a

number have been asked back for the Christmas vacation. Helpfulness and good manners have been commented upon.

Roll: Our family numbers 49 in the Home and 20 in foster homes, all of whom are well.

[REDACTED] returned to their

parents at the beginning of the holidays.

Staff: Our staff continues to be depleted by sickness, and we have difficulty in finding temporary or permanent staff members.

Sister Rona's health is improving and Mr. Scott has almost recovered from his operation. Miss Hale is improving slowly, but will be another month or six weeks before being fully restored to health. Miss Loomis who entered hospital at the beginning of the holidays for a few days is still there, but we hope will be able to resume her duties in about a week. We are expecting to welcome Miss Maureen Frazer to the new position in the Middle Block commencing on Monday. She is a school friend of Miss Bay and Miss Sandford. We tried to fill Miss Loomis' position for a month but the woman stayed only

3 days, so we are trying to carry on meantime. **Entertainment:** Children and staff were again entertained by the Operatic Society to their annual production "The Mikado," which was enjoyed by all. We also had an invitation to the Gang Show, but as it was in the holidays we were unable to accept. However, most of the children were able to see the presentation and also visit the Industries' Fair.

Miss Henry has returned to work after her trip overseas: she enjoyed her tour very much but is glad to be back in N.Z. and to return to her job. Mrs. Rhodes has resumed the cleaning position, and we are very grateful to Mrs. Prentice for helping us out, which she is willing to do again should we need her.

Sister Rona has spoken to the Bindur fellowship about the Home, and shown slides, and is doing the same at Beckenham. We have four bookings for visits to the Home this month.

Mr. Scott has taken two services, but has had to cancel some until his leg is stronger.

There are two gifts of eggs coming up, of which Horrelville is again first.

Eleven more rubber mattresses have come to hand during the holidays, completing Miss Roud's and Miss Kerr's bedrooms.

The two irons have come and are very useful.

The Board agreed to a live-in staff member for the middle block, and to converting a washroom to a bedroom, but this has never yet been started.

The Kindergarten room now has a Formica table and small stacking chairs - a gift - our Wendy house is half-finished.

Gifts this month included books, toys, sweets, clothing, feeders and faccietts, spongebags and handkerchiefs, three cases of grapefruit, and eggs valued at £1-10-0

Mrs. Blight was thanked for taking the chair, and pronounced the Benediction. Mrs. Scott served a delicious afternoon tea and was thanked for it.

The usual monthly meeting was held at the Home on Wed. Oct. 13, those present being Miss Horrell, and Mesdames Black, Blight, Corbett Hodder, Melhuish, Newton and Scott. In the unavoidable absence of Mrs. Matthews, Mrs. Blight took the chair.

Apologies were received from Mrs. Bell, Mrs. Garfath and Mrs. Matthews.

Mrs. Blight opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

The Secretary was asked to write a letter of cheer to Mrs. Garfath, who has a broken arm.

A letter of thanks was received from Mrs. Miller Head thanking our members for preparing and serving lunch and afternoon tea to counters on the House to House Appeal day, Oct. 2. Mrs. Bell, Mrs. Matthews, Mrs. Melhuish and Mrs. Newton also helped count the money on that day. The sum of £4.700 had been received to date. The sum of £1.6.0 was spent from the £3.6.0 we had in hand

leaving a balance of £2-0-0.

Mation's report: Children still number 49, but there have been several changes during the month.

[REDACTED] children have been able to return home as their parents are re-united. Three [REDACTED] children and two wee Maori children named [REDACTED] have come and gone. We now have [REDACTED] a difficult welfare case of 12 yrs. whose mother and stepfather cannot cope with her. Also 3 yr old twin girls, not toilet-trained, with an unmarried mother ^{who has} and de facto husband with children of a previous marriage.

Health: All children are well but staff health is still uncertain. Miss Hore is improving more rapidly now; Miss Loons is still under medical care but able to work; our cook has been sick for two weeks, and has to have a week's holiday on doctor's orders.

All staff have done splendid service over the last 4 months while there has been so much sickness; staff have offered to forfeit their double days off. Miss Loons, Miss Fraser and Miss Sandford have willingly accepted

re-direction to other work. Mrs. Rhodes has left, and is replaced by Mrs. Clancy. We hope to have everyone back in her own position by the end of the month.

Entertainment and Education: A number of staff have attended further lectures under the Canterbury Social Service Council, and also one by Dr. Redd, of Victoria University on "Some Social problems in N.Z. today" held as part of the Social Service Training Scheme at Templeton Farm.

The staff and others interested also listened to a tape recording illustrated with slides on Methodist Children's Homes in England.

Children and staff enjoyed "Iolanthe" by the West Chch High School Drama Club, and a production by the Chch Ballet Society in the Civic Theatre. The cubs have had a hike, and the girls have been to visit Mrs. Retallick and see her collection of 118 dolls.

Visits: During September St. David's ladies came to do an evening's sewing which was much appreciated. The Woodend-Tefton-Waikuku Fellowship came to morning tea, a talk about

our work and an inspection of the Home. Papamoa Fellowship had booked in for an evening sewing but cancelled their effort. The cytis concluded their evening "Nutrition Fishing" with supper and a talk on the Home and its work, about 45 young people attending.

During this evening Sister Rona visited one of the other places of call to speak on Deaconess work. 35 members of Willowby Fellowship came for morning tea and a tour of the Family Units.

From the Social Service Training Scheme at Templeton we have been allocated two members, Capt. Jean Matheson of The Grange Salvation Army Girls' Home in Auckland, catering for 26 girls from 5 to 15 yrs. and Mr. Jack Drake of Levin Training School. These two folk come each Tuesday from 10-8 pm. and have been attached to a Family Unit to observe, assist and do a case study of a child in connection with their S. Service Course.

Mr. Scott was invited as speaker to the next evening of Waihoui Home and Family

west, and has also taken two services.

Six more rubber mattresses have arrived. Miss Jean Hay showed members the new equipment bought for the Kindergarten room, and described activities which could be carried on with it. Some activities such as painting and hammering are still not undertaken because we have only one supervisor for all children. Miss Hay was thanked for coming along to show us the room, and for taking such an active interest in our children.

After this, Rev. H. C. Matthews and Mr. Sellers, the Board's architect, brought along plans of the new children's family home to be built at Somerfield, and invited comments and suggestions. These were forthcoming fairly freely, and dealt with by Mr. Sellers, some being noted for future reference. All agreed that it was a good plan for its purpose, and should house a family of children very comfortably. It has yet to go before the Board, the Welfare Division, the Health Dept. and the Church

Building and loan fund.

Mrs. Scott then served a bountiful afternoon tea, and the business continued afterwards.

The purchase of $1\frac{1}{2}$ doz. modysed aluminium pie dishes was authorised as they become available.

- X It was decided to recommend to the Board that another electric polisher be bought, as the two now in use are not proving adequate to the amount of polishing required.

As our next regular meeting day comes at Conference time, it was decided to hold it on Tuesday, Nov. 30, this being the last meeting of the year.

Matrons Report: Our family continues to show an increase. [REDACTED] whose mother is ill; [REDACTED] whose mother has been committed to Mental Hospital; [REDACTED] for a week while his mother has her seventh child; [REDACTED] for 3 weeks while his mother was in Princess Margaret Hospital; and [REDACTED] a very retarded 10 yr. old, whose foster mother has returned to the Pacific Islands. Her own mother is married in

America and making plans to have the child. This brings our family to 54. During the month we also cared for the [REDACTED] while their mother produced a baby brother. They were delighted to be back with us.

Foster children now total 21, as we have just placed two children of a deaf mother, whose husband is in prison. These are two little boys. [REDACTED] 2½ + 4 yrs.

Mrs. Scott collected an 10-day old baby, [REDACTED] from Bethany a few weeks ago, child of an unmarried mother. The young couple are now married and settled in a home, with the wee boy.

All children are in excellent health, and staff are well and looking forward to the holidays.

Entertainments and Visits: Some of our intermediate aged boys were entertained to a hike & a trip to Hyttelton by members of the Y.M.C.A. and their families. Children and staff enjoyed the annual Magician's Show. Mr & Mrs. Scott took 5 children to Ashburton on the last Sunday in October to receive their gift of eggs, having dinner with the Ashburton folk and morning tea with Miss Dred and Mr. Williams. Older children shared in the Bishopdale Firework Display. While younger ones had a bonfire and Guy Fawkes at the Home.

Anuri Motors made their car park available for the children to watch Hay's Procession; this was much appreciated as the children had an uninterrupted view. The Heaton Music and Phys. Ed. evenings, in which two girls took part, were much enjoyed.

Mr. Scott has taken 5 services. Holiday homes have come in well, and about 17 too many for the girls we have to place. Owing to the younger ages of

the children, we are arranging for some staff or older person to travel with them to Livercar-gill and Blenheim.

Thanks were expressed to many kind folk who had remembered us in various ways throughout the year, and to the members of our Committee.

Our Christmas Party was a great success. On Dec. 2 we entertained Social Services & Combined Appeals Board to morning tea, helped by House Committee members. Mr. Woodfield received the cheque on behalf of our Board. On the previous morning, twelve Senior Guides came to polish, clean windows and furniture; their efforts were much appreciated.

On Sun. afternoon, Dec. 5, the Langton Men's Fellowship brought their wives and families to have afternoon tea on the lawn and explore the Home.

A number of Kindergarten Trainees from various kindergartens took nearly all our pre-schoolers to various break-ups, much to their delight.

Staff All staff are working happily and in reasonable health. Two members have had a few days in bed with bronchitis, under Doctor's orders, but are now improved. Miss Joons has returned to duty in better health and able to cope with her new family very well. Miss Doreen Bunn of Yaldhurst has joined the staff as trainee and fits in well. She was an office

worker before coming to us.

Clubs etc. We have 3 boys at Scouts, 4 at Cubs, two joining the younger Y.T. group and 1 has joined St. Johns. Two girls one at Brigade and 4 at Cadets. Mrs. Fowler has started the Gym class again and Miss Fraser is holding an Art group for boys. Mr. Williner has 4 music pupils.

Picnics, outings etc. The Church and Sunday School picnic to South Brighton was enjoyed by all our children and a number of our parents.

The formica tables are in use and were examined by members. They are light, and are inclined to part company, causing some breakages of dishes, but the children will soon become accustomed to them. There are 12 chairs to match for each unit, but no long seats have been bought.

Mrs. Scott has been advised to ask Anderson and Smith of Disraeli St. for a price for renovating easy chairs and couches.

The kitchen tables have been renovated not entirely satisfactorily, but will do temporarily.

Mrs. Newton reported on the catering for the Street Appeal. and she and her helpers

were thanked. Four teatowels and 1/2 dozen tea spoons were bought for the occasion and will be used again when necessary.

Matron's Report: The three [redacted] children have returned to their parent's. Admissions have been: [redacted] special class [redacted] 5 to 10 yrs.

While their mother is having psychiatric treatment at Princess Margaret Clinic [redacted]

[redacted] while their mother is our Hamner; these children are aged 3½ to 12 yrs, and there is a 13 yr old at home, and two babies fostered:

[redacted] 8 + 13 yrs whose mother is dead: [redacted] is fostered in a teenage foster home, and has settled well. Our family now numbers 43 with 16 in foster homes. All foster home children are doing well: [redacted] has returned to his father.

Health: Children are all well, only a few having had the "tummy" germs [redacted] arm is, out of plaster and doing well.

Staff: All are well, though Miss Hamish has a

sore arm through falling downstairs. We have at last found a cook, Miss Heather Baird, who has a flat in Sale St.

Visits: Mr. & Mrs. Scott, again visited the Ashburton area, taking part in the Methven and Baring Square Services; four older children accompanied them, and a fair supply of harvest produce was brought back. There have been 23 harvests this year, 3 down on last year, but the season is a poor one and our pantry shelves and vegetable house are not very well stocked.

Mr. Vorgr. in charge of Methodist Social Services in Adelaide was able to pay a short visit to the Home on March 16.

Two groups, from Kaiapoi and Durban St. fellowships, spent an interesting time seeing and hearing about our Home and brought us sweets, biscuits and clothing.

The staff had a small supper party with interesting slides, to farewell Mrs. Fowler, who has been cook for 2½ yrs. We hope she is now happily settled in Gore.

Scouts and Cubs took part in the Rally to meet the Chief Scout, and our Cadets shared in the Divisional Church Parade as did our Life Boys. A number of staff attended the Easter Service at Wainui School. All children except temporary ones and Graeme, who was just out of hospital, enjoyed being invited away for Easter.

[REDACTED] is no longer in our care: the Child Welfare have taken charge of her, but are faring no better than we did.

Mrs. Scott has taken twice services.

Smocks are to be bought for our new cook.

In view of the shortage of fruit & vegetables, Mrs. Matthews will ask at the District Council for fruit for preserving, and meanwhile Mrs. Scott was advised to buy some.

Holiday homes for children 9-12 yrs are still wanted for next month.

Mrs. Scott was authorised to look

into the purchase of a large steamer for puddings, and also to have a demonstration of a carpet shampooer.

Gifts this month included harvest produce, jam, eggs, wheat, flour, and groceries. The cash value was £89.18-3.

Mrs. Matthews pronounced the Benediction, and Mrs. Scott served a welcome afternoon tea.

Apologies were received from Mrs Black & Mrs. Newton. A letter of sympathy is to be sent to Mrs. Newton who has lost her leg.

Mrs. Matthews opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Four pairs of football boots had been sent in, and a large quantity of apples and tomatoes and 40lb. of peaches in response to an article in the Papamui "Herald" sent in by Mr. Matthews.

A good quantity of coal hangers has also been sent in, and will probably be covered by interested women's groups.

A steamer has not yet been procured, and will probably need to be made. No carpet chamboyer of the right size has yet been available for trial.

Matron's report: All children are away on holiday, and all but two of the staff are having a week's holiday.

Our family numbers remain the same, none of the sick mothers having improved sufficiently to have their children back.

All children are well, two with flu being well enough to go on holiday. Staff have been worse affected with 'flu' type colds, but we hope the holiday break may help.

[REDACTED] one of the foster babies has returned to his mother, and [REDACTED] has stayed in his Easter holiday home as a foster child.

Another visit has been paid to Ashburton with four of the younger children, when gifts of jam were received from the Sunday School pupils.

Plumbers are repairing the water pipe from the main supply tank which has been

leaking for sometime, rather a slow and difficult job.

On Wed. evening, April 12, Mr. & Mrs. Scott and Sister Rona met with Board members at the Home to discuss the alterations to the building in preparation for Mr. Sellars to draw suitable plans to incorporate necessary requirements for better living & working conditions for children and staff.

A visit from Tai Lai-pu girl guides, after the Rally to welcome Lady Baden-Powell, was enjoyed by the children. They were interested in seeing over the Home, brought jigsaws, puzzles, scrap books and toys they had made, one for each child, played games with the children, and then had picnic lunch on the lawn before going to the Airport to farewell their visitors.

The Cubs of the District have come on two Saturdays to rake and stack leaves, as their part in the District Good Turn Day.

Sister Rona spoke on the Home to Linwood

S.A. ladies, and Mister Scott has taken three services.

Mr. Scott and [redacted] are making clothes racks, and Miss Heung and Miss Anderson will do up the boys' clothing after the holidays.

X Anderson and Smith of Israeli St. came and looked over all the suites and arm-chairs, and found 10 chairs and 7 suites worth remodelling, at a cost of £7 per chair and £40 per suite. We resolved to recommend to the Board that this be proceeded with.

Two staff mattresses will need replacing at a later date, as one member has her own mattress and one has a kapokone. Otherwise there are 9 rubber mattresses and wooden beds per family.

Miss Horne needs new bedspread and curtains. This was authorised for purchase.

Gifts included fruit, clothing, toys, books, jam, cabbages, cakes, handkerchiefs & paintings. Cash value £4.8.0.

The usual monthly meeting was held at the Home on Wed. June 14, those present being Miss Horrell and Mrs. Dames Bell, Black, Blight, Corbett, Garforth, Hodder, Matthews (presiding) McInish, Newton and Scott.

Mrs. Matthews opened proceedings with a reading and prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Mrs. Matthews reported that our request to have suites and chairs recovered by Anderson and Smith had been approved by the Board; Mrs. Newton was asked to choose coverings that would go with the tables and chairs already bought for the Family Homes.

Miss Horrell's bedspread and curtains however been renewed yet as she has been ill with influenza.

The steamer has been ordered but has not yet been sent out.

Matron's report: All family homes are full except Miss Leons', with ten children each, and the middle block is overflowing with 14 boys,

and more applications coming in almost daily. Seven children of the [redacted] family have been admitted through the Welfare Dept., and will be here for at least three months. [redacted]

[redacted] are in the middle Block, and Miss Kerr has [redacted] and [redacted], while the parents have the two youngest.

Three [redacted] children have been admitted, [redacted], 8+9 yrs. who have been with us twice previously, and [redacted] 5, as their mother has been admitted to Mental Hospital permanently, but is allowed home for weekends and to see the children. We also have for a week or ten days the four children from one of our foster homes while the mother is in hospital. This is one of our foster homes who have adopted two of these children and hope to adopt the other two when one or other of the parents can be traced to sign the papers.

During the month we have also cared for [redacted] whose mother has been a short term patient in Sunnyside.

[REDACTED] "sister, has also returned to her mother, it is hoped for good. The six [REDACTED] children were also able to return home after the holidays. This makes the family units as follows: Miss Kerr 10, Miss Jade 10, Miss Hore 10, Miss Loomis 7, and Middle Block 14.

We have fostered [REDACTED] 15 month old child of a deserted wife, while the mother works to earn some money, we hope to set up home again; this child could possibly be for adoption as the mother is very young, though fond of the child. Another of our foster babies whom the foster parents have had since 10 days old, has been able to be adopted by them. This brings children in foster homes to 7 girls and 8 boys.

Health: All children are well and school reports reasonably good. One small boy has had an infected knee but is better now. Five more staff have had influenza, including Mr. Scott.

District Cuts still arrive in troops

each Saturday to clear up the leaves. This has been a worthwhile effort, and the boys seem to have enjoyed their service.

All children had good holidays, as did most of the staff, and our thanks are due to all the good folk who opened their homes.

We have had a visit from the Child Welfare and Health Depts. Miss Greenwood and Mr. Wilson, and Dr. Harrison being the visitors. They seemed reasonably satisfied with the Home, and seemed happy with our improvements. Forty ladies from Fishburn Fellowship had morning tea and saw over the Home.

Sister Rona has spoken on the Home to the Opawa Fellowship, and to St. John's Church Bryndwr at their Home Mission Service. Mr. Scott has taken two services.

The purchase of six dozen pillow cases was authorised.

Gifts for the month included books, clothing, lost property from Glumwood & Wainui schools, offcuts of material, handkerchiefs, coat-hangers, biscuits, pavlova cakes, jam

and eggs, of cash value \$19.8.0 (\$38.80).

Mrs. Matthews reported that the Barnington Home was not likely to open until August.

She pronounced the Benediction, and Mrs. Scott served a delightful afternoon tea.

Matthew's report: with one or two small changes, our numbers remain much the same. All family units remain the same, with some changes in the Middle Block. Their mother has been receiving treatment, and was to go to Hammer, but she refused to go, and demanded the children back again. The boys were disappointed as their holidays on a farm had been planned, but the mother would not accept the advice of the Health Dept. or the Mental Hospital, much less ours, so the children returned to her. We also have two [redacted] children from Australia [redacted] while their mother works and makes up her mind when she is returning to Australia.

This makes our family 144, with 16 in foster homes.

Health: While we have had some cases of flu,

most have now recovered, and we have fared better than most.

Holidays: We require only one holiday home, but could use two tenancies, one for a girl & boy who have been living with their father for sometime.

High School entries for

[REDACTED]

at Papamui, Linwood and Riccarton respectively, have all been accepted. We expect these three boys to be living with their parents next year.

We have, as usual, had difficulty in replacing our cook, Miss Baird, who has had to return to her home in Wellington where her 16 yr. old sister is seriously ill. We have taken on a Mrs. Withington, a part Indian lady, who can cook very nicely, but is having difficulty in sorting out the right quantities for the families, also in using the Aga stoves, as she has been used to all-electric kitchens. Most of the applicants were much too senior for this position.

We were entertained to a film showing one Saturday morning, much to the children's delight. This was arranged and shown by the husband of an old girl of the Home.

The Finance and Buildings Committee met w/ the Home recently to have a further look at the Architect's plan for the alterations, and several more suitable arrangements were approved for the Architect's perusal.

Half the suites and chairs are in the upholsterer's hands, and will be finished next week, when the other half will be collected. We have been given a further large suite which has been placed in the dining-room, Miss Eade being given the smaller one, which is a better fit for her small sitting-room, and the extra chairs give her more accommodation for 10 growing children.

We arranged a social evening last Friday for the older children, in honour of [REDACTED] 21st birthday, as he has been very good to the Home, helping with

transport and repairs on various occasions and as his parents have never had anything to do with him over the yrs. he was in the Home or since he started work and the Am't he boards with has been in Hospital. A good time was had by all although it had been kept as a surprise and [redacted] was most embarrassed. The children and staff all made a small donation and gave him a toilet holdall.

Mr. Scott has taken services at Belfast & South Brighton, and Sister Rona a talk and slides on the Home at Rugby Sr. Sunday School.

Suitable table cloths have been bought all at sale price.

New lounge curtains have been bought for Mrs. Scott's flat, and were inspected by members.

The Pushomatic cleaner has arrived in time for the spring cleaning, and is proving good. Three new squeegee mops have also been bought.

A special holiday home is needed for a boy of 7 who needs special attention from childless folk or those with an older family, as he is maladjusted to his own or younger age groups.

A surplus bean-slicer is to go to the Barnington Sr. Home.

Gifts included clothing, coat hangers & socks, a Chesterfield suite, magazines & eggs and jam. cash value £23. 10.

Health All children and staff are well. Miss [REDACTED] has been accepted for Kindergarten Training College, and will leave at the end of the year. She is quiet, but can cope with any situation and is popular with staff and children.

The secretary was asked to write her a letter of appreciation.

She is to be replaced by Miss Lynley Smith of Burnham, another Christian girl who has been running the Kindergarten S.S. there of 40 small children.

We received a visit from Mr & Mrs. Pomeroy of Reefton who brought Mr & Mrs. Stace to meet the Chaplain and Secretary, and see over the House. They are interested in working with children in the near future.

Some girls from Bridgewater S.S. came one Sunday afternoon to play with 14 of our small children.

A group from St David's Fellowship spent an evening helping alter and mark holi-day clothes, for which we were very grateful.

The Central Mission planted some of the back land with potatoes, but unfortunately worked with tractors and machinery on a Sunday, which set a bad example to our children.

The children enjoyed being entertained by the Magicians.

G.L.B. girls spent an evening making sweets for their stall at Northlands and some children attended a rehearsal of the Gang Show. All our Waimairi children except two took part in their Music Evening, and the "Pirates of Penzance" by the Operatic Society was enjoyed by all.

Mrs. & Mrs. Scott took 4 children to Hoburton to collect eggs, but as it was a stormy day, & just after a holiday weekend, the number of eggs was smaller than usual. Willowby and Section also sent eggs.

Our end-of-year Parents' Evening was held last Wednesday, with families, Kindergarten & individual items of entertainment, ending with some slides of the children's activities.

Scouts and Cubs took part in the sale of bootlaces, & intermediate children of the S.S. enjoyed their Barbecue. Our swimming pool is open, and all enjoy it when the weather is suitable.

We have received a good number of holiday offers, many from round Ch.Ch. but still need 7 or 8 boys' holidays, from 6 to 13 yrs. For the first time our Holiday letter has brought little response, most offers being from old friends or those who asked before the letter went out.

Mr. Scott took six services during the conference period.

The Committee was thanked for their co-operation and interest, and received Christmas wishes from children & staff.

Mrs. Aldous has replaced Mrs. Clancy as cleaning lady.

Mr. Lyons of the Welfare Dept. visited Balmington St. and was very pleased with it.

The local minister will act as chaplain but will need to be officially appointed.

It was decided that Mrs. Overton become a House Committee member, and that we meet once in three months at Balmington St., starting with the March meeting, Mrs. Overton to be asked for a monthly report.

New towels are needed for our staff, so Mrs. Scott was authorised to obtain 1 pr. of large towels and 1 pr. of medium size for each staff member.

Gifts for the past month included eggs, books, clothing, toys, lamb and two cartons of bread rolls, cash value \$51.50.

- x Considerable discussion then took place on the Missions' proposal to set up a communal laundry with commercial equipment in our Home, to serve us, the Old People's Home, Rehwa Hostel, Wesley Lodge & Hospital, & perhaps Deaconess House. We were unanimously opposed to this, and the Secretary was asked to write to the Board immediately, stating our views, for urgent consideration.

Our objections are:

- (a) traffic would be considerably increased with danger to small children.
- (b) noise would create a nuisance in a home of this kind.
- (c) dirty and contaminated linen

would be coming in continually.

- (d) the laundry would be run under different staffing conditions and awards from our Home, which would create difficulties.
- (e) Toilet and cloak room facilities would have to be considerably increased. At present the middle block has only one toilet, and 1 wash basin to serve 11 children, sometimes more, and Sister Rena's bathroom has to be used for them.

Mrs. Blight suggested that some women should be on the committee for discussing the laundry.

Mrs. Matthews pronounced the Benediction, and Mrs. Scott served afternoon tea.

Apologies were received from Mrs. Newton & Miss Horrell.

Mrs. Matthews opened the meeting with a reading and prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

No official chaplain is appointed to the Barrington St. Home, as it is regarded as just a family home, and the minister of the local church has it in pastoral care.

Mrs. Corbett and Mrs. Hodder attended the cheque distribution on ~~December~~^{Nov. 30}, as well as Mrs. Matthews, Mrs. Newton and Mrs. Scott, and were interested to see the Anglican Church House.

No action is being taken at present on the communal laundry. When on holiday Mr. & Mrs. Matthews saw over a communal laundry at the Peacehaven Home, managed for the Presbyterian Church by two sisters

and seemingly very successful.

Correspondence. A letter of thanks for her Christmas gift was received from Mrs. Overton, and a letter of apology for absence from Mrs. Newton, per medium of Mrs. Black.

Mission's Report. All children had happy holidays only two small boys coming home too soon.

Our family is not as large as before Christ-mas, which fortunately leaves staff more time to prepare vegetables for deep freezing. So far handled have been 160 lbs. beans, 40 lbs. cauliflower, 30 doz. eggs for deep freeze, and preserved 35 qts tomatoes, 37 of plums and 47 of rhubarb.

From foster homes. [REDACTED] whose mother has obtained a house-keeping position; the [REDACTED] a temporary arrangement for two short terms while the mother was in hospital, and [REDACTED] returned to her mother. Admitted to Papamai. Three [REDACTED] children

[REDACTED] as their mother is a long term patient in Hospital with T.B. of kidneys; she has already been in for 8 months, & the children have been in the Houndsburg Home.

To Bannington St: 3 [REDACTED] children [REDACTED] nearly 5, whose mother is a mental patient and

father deserted. These children have been in Cholmondeley Home for the past two years & have come to us through the Child Welfare who have made them State Wards.

To the Reception Centre: [REDACTED], whose mother is a mental patient; [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] and [REDACTED], brothers of [REDACTED] who are in Miss Ken's family. There are 3 smaller at home.

We have a total of 58 children from 18 weeks to 15 years.

Health of both children and staff is excellent, but there have been a few with tummy flu. Holidays everyone enjoyed good holidays, and many have been asked back either for May or next Christmas.

Alterations: After being without a bench and usable sink for all the holidays, we now have a sterilizing sink, but the back of the bench is not finished, and the baskets are the wrong size. Plumbers & electricians both query the sense of putting in a sterilizing sink when the water in our hot taps is hot enough.

Christmas gatherings etc. Displays, Concerts, breakup parties of the following groups were attended by children and family mothers or staff available:

Sr John Ambulance, Scouts and Cubs, G.L.B. and Cadets, Heaven Concerts, Waimairi Folk Dancing, Kindergarten S.S., also Waimairi Christmas Service, Scout Christmas Service & B.C. Tea to welcome this year's B.C. members.

The following groups arranged Christmas visits with tableaux and gifts or parties:

Captain and crew of S.S. Maori with harbour trips; St. Nicholas Cubs & scouts, & Taipau Girl Guides; Lions Club, Carols & soft drinks; Mr. Whippy with icecreams for everyone.

Our own Christmas Tea held on Friday, 15th December, was a happy occasion with goodies & gifts for everyone. Final function for the year was a Carol Service held on Monday evening, 18th Dec.

The Staff thanks the Board & House Committee for Christmas gifts.

Mr. & Mrs Scott and Sister Rona attended the morning tea arranged by the Anglican Social Service for the presentation of cheques

from the Children's Homes Appeal.

Owing to the mid-week school breakup it was impossible to have a Staff Evening Out for Christmas, but they had a Supper party and saw some slides one evening.

Mr. Scott took 7 services over the holiday period.

Many Christmas presents and monetary gifts for Christmas cheer were received from various places. As there were five families, of 20 children, who had no gifts from parents or relatives, family mothers were given cash to shop for these children.

Family Home: Mrs. Overton reports that all children are well after good holidays. [redacted] had an attack of tonsilitis while on holiday but recovered well.

[redacted] almost 12 [redacted] 10 returned to their parents, and the new family being only 4, 6, & 7, makes the children in this family all under 8. The 3 [redacted] children have run wild and have no table manners or idea of obedience. [redacted] received gifts of frocks & cardigans while on holiday,

School reports were good, with especially good remarks about attitudes to work.

At this stage Sister Rona gave a short talk on her recent trip to Australia and children's homes which she had visited. Each state has a group of homes in one block, but this does not seem satisfactory, & the move is towards scattered homes more like our Barrington St. one. The use of foster homes is not extensive, and the Child Welfare work not so effective as it is here.

House Committees do work similar to ours. Each state holds a fair or something similar to raise money for its homes.

The Street Appeal is to be held on March 8; Mrs. Newton will be assisted at Trinity Church Schoolroom by Mrs. Corbett, Mrs. Matthews and Mrs. Garfath in the morning, Mrs. Black & Mrs. Nelson in the afternoon.

Towels for staff have not yet been bought, but some have been found still in stock.

A large strainer is needed, £16 for a stainless steel one, and the large mixer

bowl can be recocoted.

For Barrington St. are needed:

Two yellow 1-pint jugs.

Two pairs of salad servers.

Four pie-plates if they can be obtained.

1 dozen plain serviettes.

2 lycra shower curtains.

Mrs Overton was authorised to buy these.

It was decided to ask the Board to buy new carpet for the Reception Room and have the chairs renovated.

Mrs. Matthews reported that a social hour had been held after church at Papamui in December to honour the home staff.

Gifts included jam, eggs & fruit of value £26.25, as well as clothing, toys, books, a trike, dolls' clothes, and Christmas gifts in money & in kind too numerous to mention, showing a wide & gratifying interest in the work of our Home.

Mrs. Matthews pronounced the Benediction & Mrs Scott served a much-appreciated afternoon tea.

reasons: [redacted] has been under Psychological Services, but is not too bad.

Miss Kerr has taken the [redacted] children making her family 10, Miss Leems has [redacted] making 8, Miss Hore 9, Miss Eade 8 but with more coming up. The Receiving Home has the [redacted] making 9.

All seem to be doing well at school, and several bigger boys are keen cricketers, playing for school teams. It was a highlight to be able to play against St Joseph's boys for a shield donated by the Captain and Crew of S.S. Maori, especially as our team won by a small margin. The shield will hang in our hall when it is engraved.

Health: We have had 4 cases of measles & 3 of tonsilitis this month. [redacted]

[redacted] one attending Speech Clinic.

Mr. & Mrs. Scott took 4 older children to Ashburton last Sunday for Harvest Festival. Mr. Scott led morning service at Rakaia, & then harvests were collected from Allenton, Rethven & Wakanui, with evening service

at Baring Square, packing in their gifts afterwards. The weekly total of 18 harvests was a record, and they were stored and preserved by Mr. Scott, Sister Rona and staff.

Mr. Scott and one of the boys assisted with the Combined Homes' Appeal, and Mr. Scott was out on Monday collecting suburban boxes.

All enjoyed the Church Picnic to Spencer Park in February on a beautiful day.

One of our Scouts attended the camp for Founders weekend, and the cubs went to the afternoon service. Two girls took part in a Ballet Recital in the Civic Theatre their costumes being made at the Home.

Visits: The Board was entertained at the Annual meeting; also Mr. Goodall of the Anglican Social Services, inspecting our Home set-up; Sister Rona spoke to the Redcliffs Evening Fellowship and the Summer Fellowship, and Mr. Scott has taken 4 services.

Highlight of the month was the occasion of the wedding of one of our old girls.

[redacted], in the Papamoa Church, with the reception at the Home. Sister Rona helped

organize this. and many Papamui folk who knew [redacted] assisted with donations of food and help. Mr. Scott gave away the bride

Our potato masher has been returned looking like new, and the cost only \$1.75.

Mrs. Overton's report: Harvest produce was received from St. John's, St. Marks, and Templeton Knights.

Two children had gained awards at the school swimming sports.

[redacted] had a bad bruise on his cheek which needed an X-ray.

All children had enjoyed an outing to Motu Karara after church one Sunday.

Mrs. Barr had left and her place was taken by Miss Henry.

An interdenominational Younglives Group at Redcliffs had helped with jam and bottling, and made jerseys.

Mrs. Overton had spoken to a women's fellowship together with Sister Rosa.

An egg-slicer is to be bought, and linings for cupboards are to be chosen by Mrs. Nelson, Mrs. Overton & Mrs. Wilson.

Foster Homes: One of our foster boys [redacted]
has been able to return to his mother: she secured
a suitable housekeeping position this year, also
looking after two children & has saved enough
money to pay up her commitments, & the Welfare
Dept. have agreed to [redacted] returning to her. He
is a fine little boy. All other foster children are
doing well.

Everyone enjoyed our picnic held at the

& games were happy features of the day, in which
the Family Home joined. As there were sufficient
gifts in hand to pay for food etc. the Staff also
enjoyed a day of no work. Children in the

The Family Home came over one evening and were fitted up with winter clothing.

Twenty members of Shirley Fellowship came to see over the Home & do mending.

Miss Gilmour of the Government Planning Dept. met with the Board's Executive and discussed recommendations regarding kitchen alterations & replacements.

Sister Rona spoke at the Women's Fellowship Country Rally. Mr. Scott has taken 3 services.

Sister Rona's talk has been much praised by women who heard her at the Country Rally.

Family Home: Everything has been going well, though the [redacted] children are still stubborn & lazy but improving slowly.

Some cases of peaches were bought & bottled. A report from the special Board meeting last month stated that the proposal for a combined laundry within our Home is not to be proceeded with, as it is far too expensive.

Also beyond our means is the proposed scheme of alterations to our Home drawn up by Mr. Sellers, but a modified scheme of

very essential repairs & replacements is to be proceeded with. A committee has been appointed to enquire into these essentials, and is to include one member of the Home Committee.

X Mrs. Corbett was appointed to this task.

X Discussion then took place among members as to means of improving the situation in the reception centre in the middle block, possibly by using the cottage recently bought by the Board on land adjacent to the Home. Though not in very good order, it could perhaps serve as a home for the Radcliffe nation temporarily; or as a hostel for past boys who have nowhere else to go when out of work or unable to get suitable board. These boys do not really fit in with the age groups within the Home itself; or it would make a kindergarten centre, thus freeing the room already in use for this purpose.

Gifts included jam, eggs, foodstuffs, fruit & good clothing to the value of £39.03.

Our next meeting will be at the Home on Thurs. The Benediction brought the meeting to a close.
