WILLIAM CANNELL.

went to New Plymouth as Supply for the Rev. J. H. Fletcher in the year 1860, and entered the ranks of the Ministry in the following year. From that time to the present he has been constantly engaged in arduous and faithful Circuit work. In 1865 he was sent to do pioneer work on the West Coast of the South Island, and there bore a chief part in the founding of the Greymouth and Hokitika Circuits. During the thirty-nine years of his ministry he has served the Church in all the districts of the Colony. His great modesty and his preference for country circuits led to his life being spent mainly in wide circuits, in which he has done a maximum of travelling. Self-seeking has been utterly foreign to his character, which is distinguished for generosity and simplicity. His ministrations were ever with great acceptance and profit to his hearers, and he now retires into well-earned rest with the love and esteem of all his brethren and of the Church as a whole.

WILLIAM ROWSE died suddenly at his home in Greytown in July last, in the 64th year of his age, ceasing at once to work and live. He was a native of Cornwall, and was converted at the age of 14, joining the Church of which his parents were members. At the age of 20 he became a Local Preacher, and three years later was received as a candidate into our Ministry. After spending a year in the English work, in company with three other young ministers, he came to New Zealand in 1858. His first two years in our colonial work were spent in Canterbury, as colleague to the Rev. J. Aldred. Manukau, then part of the Auckland Circuit, was his next location, where he completed his probation, married, and with his young wife was appointed to Waimea, in the Hokianga district, where for 15 years he ministered to the Native race with earnestness and considerable success. He had the pleasure of seeing much moral and spiritual improvement in the Maori people under his charge. In 1878, he returned to European work, and laboured successfully in the Circuits of Richmond, Marton, Rangiora, Waimate, Masterton, and Greytown. At this latter place he became Supernumerary six years ago, through failing health; since which time, however, he did not cease to do valuable work as a preacher of the Gospel. Our late brother was held in very high esteem both by Maories and Europeans, for his blameless character and his great amiability. He was essentially a good man and a faithful preacher of the Gospel.

William Worker

WILLIAM WORKER passed peacefully away to his eternal rest on February 2nd, 1900, at the age of 83. Thirty-seven years of his long life were spent in this Colony. He entered the Ministry in England in 1841, and laboured with much acceptance in several circuits. Owing to failing health he was compelled to retire from the active work of the Ministry. He came with his family to New Zealand in 1863, and settled in Albertland, Kaipara. He had full share of the hardships and perils incidental to the early stages of settlement in a new country. By his unfailing courtesy and kindness he gained the cordial esteem of the entire community. As a preacher, he ministered unwearying to their spiritual needs, often travelling long distances on foot to keep his appointments. His genial disposition secured for him a welcome everywhere to the homes of the people. He had a wellstored mind, and found pleasure in imparting information that might be helpful to others. In 1877 he entered on the active work in connection with the New Zealand Conference, and laboured successfully in the Christchurch (Durham Street), Leeston, Sandon, and Rangitikei Circuits. His ministry in all these Circuits bore gracious fruit, and lives in the grateful memory of the people.

His closing years were spent in his home at Wellsford, in the Mahurangi Circuit. He retained to the last the keen intellectual vigour that had marked his whole life. He was an ardent student of Nature, and no reverses ever served to check his cheerful optimism. He was a lover of all good things and of all good men, and rejoiced to live in a world ruled over by Omnipotent Love. He had lived all his days in the company of beautiful conceptions of what God had prepared for them that love Him, and so death was gratefully welcomed at last as God's signal that mortality was to be swallowed of life.

2. That in addition to the subjects required by the General Conference for Probationers' Examination, a course of study in Latin be also prepared, and that the Conference will attach "Special Honour" marks to those who take this examination. That the following be the course of study in this subject:--IST YEAR: Cæsar, De Bello Gallico, Book V. 2ND YEAR: Virgil, Æneid, Book II. 3RD YEAR: Cicero, De Amicitia. 4TH YEAR: Horace, Odes, Book I., and Cicero, De Senectute.

3. That the laws of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church be taken by Probationers in conjunction with Gregory's History and Polity of Methodism.

4. That each examiner prepare a written report on the several papers committed to his care, and transmit such report to the Secretary, the Rev. G. T. Marshall, not later than 15th January.

5. That the Secretary of the Board of Examiners prepare a general report for the ensuing Conference.

6. That the Probationers be required to communicate with their respective Examiners not later than the first week in May, stating what subjects they propose to take for examination.

7. That the Probationers meet for examination immediately prior to the sitting of the District Synod, and at the place where the District Synod is held; and that the examination be conducted under a supervisor appointed by the Chairman.

8. That the persons appointed to hear Probationers', Students', and Candidates' trial sermons affix marks to the reports before submitting them to the District Synod. The numerals 1 to 6 are used: 6 to represent the maximum.

9. That the Secretary of the Board of Examiners assess and mark the Probationers' book lists, using the numerals 1 to 6: 6 to represent the maximum.

10. That the Chairman of each District Synod be required to forward to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners a signed official report of the trial sermon of each Probationer, Candidate, or Student examined in his district, together with the book list of each Probationer and the finding of the District Synod thereon.

11. That the questions for Probationers be so arranged as to require a general acquaintance with all the work prescribed in the Syllabus in any given subject, together with a particular knowledge of such portions as the examiners may deem of greatest importance.

12. That each Probationer, immediately upon the completion of the examination, send to the Secretary of the Board a list of the subjects he has taken.

13. That Probationers be reminded that the Greek Testament is a compulsory subject through the whole of the course for all those who have passed through the College. With regard to any others, special provision shall be made for their examination up to their third year.

14. That each Probationer shall be examined orally in the District Synod in some book selected by the Chairman from his book list. Such book lists to be sent to the Chairman a fortnight before such Synod.

15. That three hours be allowed for each examination paper.

16. That the written examination of candidates for the Ministry be taken during the last week in October, so that the results of the examination may be known at the District Synods, the Chairman to arrange for supervision.

17. That Probationers' and Students' papers be sent to Chairmen of Districts not later than 1st November, and the Candidates' papers not later than 20th October.

18. That the marks obtained by Probationers, Students, and Candidates be printed on a separate slip for the use of the Conference.

19. That the list of marks gained by Probationers in the various subjects of the Conference curriculum be inserted in the Conference Journal from year to year.

20. That it be a standing order that arrangements be made that Candidates for ordination preach either during the session of Conference or prior thereto.

21. That a certificate of matriculation, together with a list of subjects in which the Candidate has passed, exempt a Candidate from passing the General Knowledge Examination.

22. That the curriculum and list of books recommended by the General Conference be printed in the Minutes of Conference each year.

EXPLANATORY REMARKS.

1. The Conference requires every Probationer who is acquainted with Greek or Hebrew to take the Greek or Hebrew subjects specified in the list of subjects for his year. Every Probationer who has been a student in the Theological Institution shall be examined in these Greek or Hebrew subjects, unless the tutors under whom he studied, having taken into consideration his attainments on leaving the Institution, are of opinion that these examinations cannot reasonably be required in his case. Any Annual Conference may direct that Greek be a compulsory subject.

2. Annual Conferences shall have power to make exceptions in the above course of study in favour of Probationers who have matriculated, and are pursuing a University course.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

To the Members and Adherents of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in New Zealand.

DEAR BRETHREN,-

Being met in our Annual Conference, we send you greetings in the name of the Lord. We are glad to report a year's progress, having added to our members since last Conference 311 members, so that we now report our full membership to be 12,185, with 421 on trial and 1,303 communicants.

The Conference has observed with pain and misgiving the dearth of Class-Leaders throughout the Colony. Whatever may be said of the Class Meeting as a test of membership, there is no doubt concerning its necessity for the development of the true genius of Methodism. Our Church, like the Apostolic Church, was cradled in an outward visible form of the Communion of Saints. For a century and a-half the most striking and robust Christianity which we as a people have contributed to the world's history and prosperity has been developed in the Class Meeting, which has never been superseded by a "more excellent way" of Christian Fellowship. But it is now languishing from the sole cause of the dearth of capable leaders. We bring this weakness before your notice. There is another weakness which will seriously hamper us in the present year's operations, and that is the small number of men who are offering for the work of the ministry. We ordained for the European work this year four probationers, and received eight candidates; and for this splendid contingent we are thankful; but we have been compelled to turn a deaf ear to Circuits urgently demanding more men. The office of a Methodist minister is not a lucrative one; but in its heritage of a glorious and apostolic ancestry, and in its wealth of influence and opportunities of doing good, it ought to allure more sons from Methodist homes than at present come forward.

It is our painful duty to record the removal by death of two from our ranks—William Worker and William Rowse. Both had retired from "active work" some years ago, but neither remained inactive in the vineyard of the Master. Their obituaries are recorded on another page. Our Church Property Reports reveal a year of activity. During the year new purchases and erections have been made, particularly in the Auckland, Wanganui, and Otago Districts, of a total value of £7,558.

The total value of our Connexional properties is £282,199, on which there is a debt of £40,000. Seeing that this is but 14 per cent. of the whole, it cannot be called a heavy debt. Still, it will be an immense relief if we can begin the New Year with our properties entirely unencumbered. We are confident you will agree with us in this, and in the great effort that will this year be put forth, make the Century Commemoration Fund a glorious success. You will see by reference to the Conference decisions on this movement that there are some modifications of the basis of the Fund, the most important being the liberty of the subscriber to allocate his subscription, and the inclusion of new enterprises.

Whilst the outlook in the commercial affairs of the Colony is so bright and promising, the horizon of the Empire has been darkened by the war cloud. It is satisfactory to note the cordial and ready response that has been given by the Colony, both in men and money, to the call for assistance made by the Mother Country. We rejoice in the inseparable unity of our Empire. That unity cannot now be called a sentiment: it is a fact. We thank God that our prestige has not been lowered before the world, and the lustre of the British arms has not been dimmed. Our prayer is that God will bring the Nation safely through, and that the old flag may float victoriously and peacefully over South Africa.

Our Mission Funds—both Home and Foreign—have received careful consideration at the hands of Conference. We recognise the cordial and consistent support which has been given for so many years to the former branch of our work. The position of our Church in many Circuits is largely due under God to the help received by grants from the Home Mission Fund in past years. Recognising their obligations on account of benefits received, these are now contributing to this Fund to assist new and weaker Circuits in supplying the ordinances of religion to those in need. Special attention requires to be directed to the populations in newly settled country districts, and suburban areas in the vicinity of our chief cities and rapidly growing provincial towns.

We need also to adapt our methods to the changing circumstances of our social and religious life. The necessity of appointing lay agents and deaconesses to labour in connection with many of our city, suburban and town congregations is becoming more apparent.

Our Foreign Missions present many hopeful features. In the older fields there is evidence that the labour of past years is about to yield a richer and more abundant harvest. In Fiji, the development of special educational work amongst the girls and young women is watched with interest: whilst the presence of 10,000 Coolie immigrants excites the most serious concern, at the same time affording an opportunity of service quite unique.

In the later Missions of New Britain and New Guinea, the fields are already white unto harvest. The recent appeal for help from the New Britain Synod is one of the most pathetic in the annals of our Missionary history, and will doubtless have its due effect upon the colonial churches. God has in wonderful fashion answered the prayer of His people, that these tribes may be made accessible to the sound of the Gospel, and many are pleading for teachers and missionaries to be sent. In New Guinea, the Mission Board maintains a vigorous policy, and enters every open door. Only one thing limits our success, *i.e.*, the financial support.

The results of the year's work reveal the need of a new-born evangelism—not necessarily by new agents, but that every minister and Church worker should be baptised of the Spirit for this work. With renewed zeal, and increased effort, we should soon find the comparatively slow growth of the past transformed into the rapid expansion of every department of our work. We gladly recognise the self-denying labours of our local preachers who, in years past, have done grand work for God and His Church, and they are not yet weary in well doing.

Our Sunday School Teachers claim a place in your prayers and sympathy, and we recognise their useful work. In this branch of service we require more than ever the zealous and willing services of our people.

During the year the Colony has passed through the throes of a General Election. Because of the growing political influence of the working classes, which form so large a proportion of our congregations, many of our Church officers and members have taken a prominent part in the general political contest. Whilst every true Methodist should seek to fulfil his duty in the affairs of the State, we would affectionately remind you that Methodism has no party politics. Whatever our personal and individual views on political questions, we believe they do not affect our cordial and hearty co-operation in all matters tending to promote the interests of our Church.

The people of this Colony have again cast their votes for or against the liquor traffic. Whilst the goal of Prohibition has not yet been reached except in one honourable instance, viz., the Clutha electorate, it is matter for thankfulness that the vote for No License has been increased by more than 23,000 votes, or equal to 40 per cent. Whilst the vote for License showed an increase of less than 5,000. Increased attention needs to be given to our Bands of Hope, as also to Temperance work amongst adult persons, with a view to educate public opinion on this great question.

Other evils are affecting our social and religious life to an increasing extent. Amongst these gambling and impurity stand prominently forward. To check and ultimately remove these demands watchfulness and persistent effort. The Gospel of Christ is the chief regenerating power to destroy the works of the devil. We exhort you with all earnestness to wage a holy war against these things, which are so destructive to the better life of the community.

The Conference desires to call special attention to the ease with which many make the Sabbath a day of pleasure and visitation, as also the occasion for show and parade on the least possible excuse. By such means the quiet and rest of the Lord's Day is disturbed, and the opportunity for engaging in the exercises of public worship and other religious duties seriously interfered with. To such a course of conduct there can be but one result—a declining spirituality and loss of moral fibre.

We enter upon another year's work with a keen sense that, apart from the Holy Spirit's influence and power, we have no strength for God's work. Our prayer is that all our Churches may be enriched with such a baptism of holy power that the work of God may prosper still more abundantly.

GENERAL REPORT ON CHURCH PROPERTY

FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30TH, 1899.

The following is a brief abstract of the Report presented to the Conference :---

Returns show a distinct improvement and a large amount of the Schedules fulfil all necessary conditions, but in two cases it is recommended that all the Trust Books and Documents be forwarded to the District Secretaries to ascertain the exact position.

The expenditure of $\pm 7,558$ on new erections and improvements is somewhat larger than usual, but the building enterprise has been almost entirely confined to three districts. The number of incomplete titles is steadily decreasing, but a few still call for attention. A considerable number of buildings are still reported as uninsured, for which there is no excuse. The amount of debt remaining on the new erections is 50 per cent, which is larger than usual. Part of it is expended by the Loan Fund giving special permission in one or two cases, but in some others all rules have evidently been ignored. The nett increase of capital value of Church Property for the year is $\pm 4,100$. On the current account the total income is $\pm 1,100$ in advance of the previous year, but such expenditure is about the same, the balances remaining practically as they were last year. The sum contributed by Trust Boards to the Circuit Fund ± 93 ought to be carefully noted by the Conference.

Of the total debts on mortgage, $\pm 30,361$, it may be noted that $\pm 23,265$ is owing by nine Circuits, and of this amount $\pm 18,060$ by four Circuits, only, *i.e.*, four Circuits are responsible for nearly 60 per cent. of the debts on mortgages. Eight Circuits and seven Home Mission Stations have no property debts. Fourteen Circuits which have debts have not availed themselves of the Loan Fund. In the Wanganui District every Circuit and Home Mission Station is indebted to that Fund, and in that and the Nelson District there are only three Circuits with debts on mortgage. The full report was supplied by the Custodian of Deeds. It is found that a large number of appointments of additional Trustees have not been reported by Superintendents on their Schedules for entry in the District Secretary's books. As this practice now serves no useful purpose, it is recommended that it be at once discontinued. It is also recommended that a small Committee be appointed to consider whether any further alterations should be made in the form of the Schedules.

- 8. That the Regulation which required that the new Trustees should be reported to the District Secretaries of Church Property be rescinded, as these are required to be sent to the Authorised Representative for entry in the Church Register, and copies of that Register are legal evidence.
- That the Revs. W. Morley, W. Lee, Messrs. J. C. Stephens and G. J. Smith be a committeee to consider and report on any necessary or desirable alterations of the form of the present A and B Schedules.

CHURCH PROPERTY REGULATIONS.

 Superintendents are directed that in case of properties held under the Land Transfer Act, Trustees must sign a Declaration of Trust, which is to be forwarded to the Custodian of Deeds; and that in the case of properties not held under the Land Transfer Act, Trustees must sign the Deed of Conveyance. In the case of appointment of new Trustees, no further declaration of Trust is required, but they must sign the form of Appointment of New Trustees. Such form to be forwarded to the Authorised Representative.

N.B.—Forms for Declaration of Trust, and also for appointing new Trustees, and printed copies of the New Model Deed, may be obtained from the Authorised Representative.

2. Copies of the Model Deed have been deposited in the various Land Registry Offices for the Colony, in order that reference may be made thereto, as provided in the form. The numbers given to the Deeds so deposited are as under:—

That in order to secure accuracy in the returns the District Secretary be empowered to compare the figures supplied to him on the A and B annual returns, with the entries in the Circuit Schedule Books, Superintendents being directed to produce their Schedule Books at the Financial District Synod for this purpose.
- 5. That the question of completing Titles where necessary be referred to the General Secretary of Church Properties in conjunction with the Superintendent of the Circuit concerned.
- 6. The sanction of the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee. shall be obtained for all purchases, sales, and for leases of Church property over 7 years, and for all erections, enlargements, or structural alterations of buildings, and that Committee is empowered and directed to require that plans and specifications of all buildings and alterations be furnished before the work is begun, and that no building be erected until a proper Title to the land has been secured.

The Church Building and Loan Fund Committee shall supply to the Financial District Synods the replies to Questions 2, 3 and 4, respecting Church property, and also report any cases where the Regulations have not been observed. The same Committee shall supply to the Conference the replies to Question 7, as to (a) sales sanctioned, (b) proposed erections sanctioned, (c) new erections and purchases, also reporting any cases where the Regulations have not been observed. In the case of sales, the written consent of the Committee shall be supplied to the President of the Conference.

7. That the General Secretary or District Secretaries of Church Properties be directed by the Conference to communicate with the respective Superintendents of Circuits where discrepancies occur, with a view to explanation and adjustment.

REPORT OF CUSTODIAN OF DEEDS.

In accordance with the instructions of the Conference I forwarded to each District Synod a full list of the deeds received and withdrawn, so far as the properties in that district were concerned, for the year ending 31st October, 1899. To render that report complete, I embodied therein a list of all deeds and documents relating to properties received by the Loan Fund Treasurers during the same period, and a list of those registered by the Authorised Representative. Attention was also called to the cases in which Deeds or other Documents relating to property were still needed. Copies of these reports as directed are now placed on the secretary's desk.

A brief summary of the same shows that deeds of thirteen properties were received by the Custodian, viz., Waikiekie Church, Mareretu Church, Kimbolton Parsonage, Waitara Parsonage, Marton Parsonage, Eketahuna Parsonage Site, Levin Church, Foxhill Church, Havelock Church Site, St. Alban's Church (New Deed), Mornington, Invercargill, and Kaitangata Churches, also three Declarations of Trust, and 16 Certificates of appointment of new and additional Trustees. Some of these deeds had been missing for years, and were only obtained as the result of much correspondence. New Plymouth Circuit endowment Deeds, the deed of a small strip at Sydenham, and that of the Gore Church were withdrawn. Twenty-eight Deeds or Documents were received by the Treasurers of the Church Building Fund during the year in connection with loans granted, and 58 appointments of Trustees registered, all of which were reported. Deeds are still needed or are incomplete in about 59 cases. There are also a few properties where the number of trustees is below the legal limit.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. Wm. Morley, D.D., for his services during the past year, and that he be re-appointed.

REPORT OF AUTHORISED REPRESENTATIVE.

During the year ending 31st December, 1899, twenty-five Trusts have been placed upon the Church Register. Some of these were properties held for many years past, but the registration of which had been neglected. Forty-five Registrations of the Appointments of New and Additional Trustees to various Properties were also registered. Some of these did not reach the Representative until an altogether unreasonable time after the Legal Meetings were held, and there is reason to believe that in a few cases persons acted as Trustees before they were legally appointed. It is of great importance that all fresh appointments be promptly registered.

The Fees received during the year amounted to ± 30 l4s. This, added to the balance of 15s. ld., brought forward, has met the cost for stationery, stamps, and printing, etc., ± 5 3s. lld.; paid the balance for cost of safe for Connexional deeds, ± 14 l4s. lod.; and, after handing ± 10 to the Contingent Fund Treasurers, leaves a credit balance of ± 1 l0s. 4d.

CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND REPORT.

Nine meetings of the Committee have been held during the year, at each of which an Agenda paper containing numerous items has required and received careful and prolonged attention.

The Cash Profit and Loss and Capital Accounts of the General Fund, and the Special Branch, together with the Lists of Loans now current, which are submitted, give an outline of the business transacted. In the General Fund eight Loans have been closed by payment of the final Instalments, 24 Loans have been granted, and 99 are now current. In the Special Branch two Loans have been closed by payment, three new ones granted, and 24 are still in operation. It will be noted that during the past year Loans have been granted amounting to nearly £700 more than the Instalments repaid. The capital of the Special Branch has been increased by a further payment of £50 from the Jubilee Fund.

The year has been one of considerable activity. Plans and specifications have been approved for the erection of churches at Aparima, Kaihu, Dannevirke, Belleknowes, Mount Eden, Havelock, Tataraimaka, Wai-iti, Taikorea, and Waikuku; of Parsonages at Kimbolton, Feilding, Hamilton, Nelson, Mount Albert, Coromandel, and Oxford; of Church Enlargements at Cuba Street (Palmerston), Sheffield, Green Meadows; of Sunday-schools at Kingsland, Papanui, Blenheim, Woolston; and for the erection of class-rooms or vestries at Waihi, Ormondville, Ballance, Darfield, and Midhirst. To the larger number of these, loans have been granted or promised. Efforts for the liquidation or reduction of debt have been made at Whangarei, Reefton, and Warkworth, where also Loans have been granted. The sums raised locally on account of these enterprises amount to £4,200 or more.

In the following cases reported to the Committee the Connexional Rules have not been observed:—Helping Hand Mission, Auckland, purchase of a house; Cargill Road, Dunedin, Parsonage site; the erection of Hamilton Parsonage and Arrowtown Church; and the enlargement of Cuba Street Church, Palmerston North.

Through the operation of the Special Branch Church sites have been acquired at Waituna West, Dannevirke, Belleknowes, and Seddon Township. A Parsonage site at Inglewood has also been purchased.

The sale of a small strip of land at Ormondville has been sanctioned, and the lease of Church Section at Papakura, and that of the Church and Site at Warkworth conditionally. An application for lease of a mission property for 40 years was declined.

In addition to the ordinary business, considerable time, thought, and correspondence have been given to three or four cases of Church Property, the condition of which was somewhat intricate, and where counsel was sought by the trustees.

The Committee is glad to report that Kaitangata, Levin Church, Tinwald, Kingsland, and Oamaru have paid instalments of their Loans in advance, thus making it possible for help to be given earlier in other cases. The arrears owing on Loans are large, totalling over £800. The Committee regretfully records its conviction that in some of these places no reasonable effort has been made by the Trustees to pay the same. A special report of the most flagrant cases is submitted.

Receipts on account of the Levy for Working Expenses are slightly larger than last year. As shown in the account, some arrears have also been paid, but there is still a long list of places from which no contributions have come. A copy of these is submitted.

The Committee has to report that by a clause inserted by the Government in the "Land for Special Settlement Act" it is now possible to obtain the freehold of Church sites in these places. A report of needed alterations in the Rules and Regulations respecting Church Property and of this Fund as directed by Conference is submitted. Nn action as to the securing of the freehold of Church sites in mining Districts has yet been found possible.

Report on Church Property.—The General Secretary reports that the Schedules from Otago, Wellington, and Canterbury have not been received to date, hence no report.

The Committee recommends the re-appointment of the Secretary.

The Secretary presented from the Committee a detailed Report of special cases and those heavily in arrears by Palmerston North (Cuba Street), Gisborne, Marton, Palmerston North (Broad Street), Arrowtown, Invercargill Parsonage, Hastings, Stratford, Ngaruawahia, Gore Parsonage, Korori, Riverton, and Hokitika, and it was resolved,

5. That the attention of the Superintendent of the Palmerston North Circuit be directed to the grave irregularities in the case of the Cuba Street enlargement, and that in the other special cases the Trustees be requested to carry out their agreement with the Loan Fund, and pay the arrears due at the earliest possible date.

REGULATIONS.

1. That the Conference directs the Superintendents of Circuits to see that whenever application is made to the Church Building and Loan Fund the financial position and prospects of the Trust be stated with perfect accuracy, and to see to it that communications from the Loan Fund Committee receive prompt and proper attention.

2. That a list of delinquent Trusts be posted up during the Conference, and that the Corresponding Secretary communicate with those Superintendents that are absent from the Conference.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND.

I .-- Sources of the Fund.

- 1. The amount obtained in connection with the special effort for this purpose authorised by the Conference of 1882.
- 2. Donations, bequests, grants from Trustees, etc.
- That Superintendents of Circuits are instructed to collect a levy from each Trust in proportion to the number of the congregation, thus:—

4. Such payments to be made to the Treasurer of the Church Building and Loan Fund not later than 30th September in each year.

II. OBJECTS OF THE FUND.

- 1. To render assistance in the purchase of sites, and in the erection of substantial churches in places where they are needed.
- 2. To aid in providing parsonages in all the Circuits in the colony.
- 3. To assist in the removal of debts on Church property.

III.—COMMITTEE.

The Committee of the Fund shall consist of four ministers, and four laymen, to be appointed annually by the Conference, upon the nomination of the District Synod where the previous year's Committee was located.

IV .- DUTIES OF THE COMMITTEE.

- 1. To meet at least twice a year.
- 2. To receive applications for, and determine upon the amounts of, loans, and the times of payment.
- 3. To approve of the plans and specifications of all proposed erections, enlargements and purchases; to recommend sales of Wesleyan Trust properties, and afford advice to Trustees in difficult cases.
- 4. To receive the Annual Report from General Secretary of Church Property and to report to District Synods.
- 5. To see that proper Deeds be obtained from all Trusts as soon as possible, and to provide for their safe custody.
- 6. To take such steps as may be necessary to secure the Connexion against permanent debt.

7. To transact generally all the business entrusted to it by the Conference, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations relating to the Church property, and to present an Annual Report to the Conference.

V.-CONDITIONS OF LOANS.

- 1. No application will be entertained by the Committee until it has been approved by the Quarterly Meeting.
- 2. In making applications for a loan, the questions contained in the printed form must be answered.
- 3. The Connexional collections, as appointed by the Conference, shall be duly made.
- 4. A reasonable system of seat-rents shall be maintained in the Churches.
- 5. All applicants shall agree to devote a portion of the income from their Trust property (so far as circumstances will justify) to the funds of the Circuit Quarterly Meeting, or the funds of our general institutions.
- 6. Satisfactory security shall be given by Trustees and other responsible persons for the repayment of the loans, and on the terms and at the times agreed upon with the Committee.
- Satisfactory assurance shall be given that the land on which it is proposed to build has been legally secured for the intended object.
- 8. All Trusts shall provide a suitable set of Cash and Minute Books.
- Each Trust shall, in accordance with the Model Deed, hold a special meeting for the audit of accounts; Minutes of such meeting to be taken and preserved.
- 10. Each Trust receiving a loan for liquidation of debt shall raise a sum at least equal to such loan before they shall be entitled to claim it from the Committee. In case of erection, the Connexional rule that two-thirds shall be raised by the local Trust shall be complied with before a loan for the remainder, or any part thereof, shall be granted.
- 11. All loans to be repaid in quarterly or half-yearly instalments, as may be agreed upon.
- 12. Every Trust receiving aid from this fund shall make and carry out arrangements for the extinction of its debt within a period not exceeding ten years.
- 13. When loans are granted, Deeds of the property shall be lodged with the Treasurers of the Fund.

Form of a Bequest to the Building and Loan Fund,

I give unto the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the New Zealand Wesleyan Methodist Church Building and Loan Fund the sum of pounds sterling, to be paid out of my personal estate, in aid of the said Fund, now administered under the direction of the New Zealand Conference, and for which the receipt of such Treasurer or Treasurers shall be a sufficient discharge.

Question IX.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Various Connexional Funds?

ANSWER :-

I.—THE CHILDREN'S FUND.

For Balance Sheet see Appendix C.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That the Balance Sheet now presented be adopted and printed in the Minutes.
- 2. That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. W. C. Oliver and Mr. J. H. Helliwell for their services as Treasurers of the Fund during the past year, and that the Rev. W. C. Oliver and Mr. J. H. Helliwell be appointed Treasurers for 1900.
- 3. That the payments on account of the Children's Fund be £8 10s. for each child per year, as per General Conference Regulations.
- 4. That the Three Kings Institution and the Connexional Secretary's Committee be assessed in the interests of the Children's and Contingent Funds on the basis of Circuits.
- 5. That the Assessment for the ensuing year be 15 per cent.
- 6. That in all returns from Maori Mission and Connexional Offices the amount of Connexional Funds chargeable to such Maori Mission and Connexional Offices be added for the purpose of taxation.

II.-SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

For Balance Sheet see Appendix B.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That the Balance Sheet now read be adopted.
- 2. That the thanks of the Conference be given to the Rev. H. R. Dewsbury and Mr. T. Buddle for their services as Treasurers during the past year, and that they be re-appointed.
- 3. That the Conference expresses its regret that the Report and Balance Sheet of the General Treasurer was not received in time for the copies to be placed in the hands of members of the Conference.
- 4. That the President of the Conference be requested to write a letter to the Ministers in arrears to the Supernumerary Fund, and urge them, for their own sake, and that of their families, to pay the said arrears at the earliest opportunity.

PLAMPIN BEQUEST FUND.

- 1. Rev. H. Bull, Treasurer, presented the Report and Balance Sheet, which were adopted.
- The credit balance at the Conference of 1899 was £14 19s. 10d. During the year £45 4s. 11d. has been received.
- 3. The sum of £45 was voted to needy cases.
- 4. Authority was given to the Treasurer to pay £10 during the year, should occasion require, to a needy case.

III.-THE CONTINGENT FUND.

For Balance Sheet see Appendix J.

- 1. That the Balance Sheet be adopted.
- 2. That the thanks of the Conference be given to Rev. W. Baumber and Mr. W. Harris for their services as Treasurers of the Fund during the past year, and that Rev. W. Baumber and Mr. W. Harris be appointed Treasurers for 1900.
- 3. That in every Circuit where a Home Missionary is employed under the charge of the Circuit Quarterly Meeting, the expenditure on behalf of the Home Missionary be deducted from the taxable amount.
- 4. That Conference direct that a supply of suitable certificates of baptism be procured, the charge to be met by the Contingent Fund.
- 5. That £10 be given to the Editor of *The Advocate* for contingent expenses.
- 6. That special cases of ministerial affliction, when such claims are not paid by the Quarterly Meetings, be recognised as having a claim upon the Contingent Fund.
- That the levy for the present year be 3½ per cent. upon the current income of the Circuit, as reported to the Treasurers, and printed in the Minutes.
- 8. That the term "Circuit Income," so far as this Fund is concerned, be understood to include all moneys received by the Circuit Stewards, inclusive of Home Mission Grants, and disbursed by them for the payment of Ministers' stipends, furnishing all Ministers' houses, cost of removals, ordinary Connexional charges, and the other usual expenditure of the Quarterly Meeting.
- 9. The following are the ordinary charges on this Fund, as sanctioned by Conference:--
 - Expenses of Chairman, Representatives, Secretary of Conference, and the General Secretary of Church Property travelling to Conference, steamer fares, with official charges, and incidental expenses.
 - (2) Travelling expenses to General Conference.
 - (3) Postage, etc., for President and Secretary (£5 each).
 - (4) Probationers travelling to Conference for ordination when directed by District Synods.
 - (5) Printing Minutes of Conference and Society tickets.
 - (6) Ministers travelling to District Synod.
 - (7) Chairmen's Postage (£2 each).
 - (8) District Synod stationery.
 - (9) Chairmen travelling in Districts.
 - (10) Expenses of District Secretaries of Church Property travelling to District Synods.
 - (11) Amount required for Supernumerary Fund for Ministers coming from England.
 - (12) To furnish half the cost of supplies for deceased and disabled Ministers.
 - (13) Travelling expenses to Conference, Editor of The Advocate.

- 10. That the Treasurers be authorised to consider certain claims in connection with Hamilton, Mornington, and Gore, and if satisfied to pay the amounts claimed.
- 11. That the Treasurers be authorised to pay the sum of £1 ls. on account of candidates' examination expenses.
- 12. That the recommendation of the Canterbury District Synod be remitted to the District Synods of 1900 and the next Conference for further consideration.
 - The term "Circuit Expenditure," so far as these Funds are concerned, shall be understood to include all payments made by the Circuit Stewards for Ministers' stipends, ordinary Connexional charges, and the other usual expenditure of the Quarterly Meeting.

IV.—CENTURY COMMEMORATION FUND.

REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee has held fourteen meetings during the year, at each of which earnest and careful attention has been given to all matters relating to the work and progress of the Fund. Immediately after Conference, in conjunction with the District Committees, full arrangements were made for carrying out Conference resolutions with regard to the delivery of lectures and the holding of meetings throughout the colony. Circuit and Church Registers were supplied to all circuits, and Guinea Collecting Cards provided for the use of Sunday-schools. A leaflet, giving full information concerning the objects of the Fund and the best methods of working, was, at the Committee's request, prepared by the General Secretary, and upwards of 30,000 sent to the various circuits for distribution.

By arrangements with the Editor and Publishers a Century number of *The Advocate* was issued, and throughout the year the pages of the Connexional organ have frequently been made use of in order to keep the Fund before our people.

The General Secretary, the Rev. C. H. Garland, whose advocacy of the Fund has been most able and enthusiastic, has already visited about fifty circuits. In keeping with the resolutions of Conference, he has everywhere given prominence to the spiritual significance of the movement, and has earnestly sought to secure definite spiritual results. He has also held successful conventions in several of the centres.

The President of the Conference and the Rev. Dr. Morley, by special help given, have both rendered great service to the Fund.

The Committee regrets that in so many circuits little or no preparation was made for the visit of the General Secretary. In several cases no committees had been appointed, and no attempt made to compile the rolls or to awaken interest by means of special efforts. Under these circumstances it is not to be wondered at that many of the meetings have been lacking both in numbers and enthusiasm.

The Committee is far from satisfied with the financial results of the year's work, and is convinced that these would have been very much larger if in every circuit the directions of Conference had been loyally carried out. Some few circuits have done really well, but in the majority of cases no real effort seems to have been made to secure success.

Lists have been received to date from sixty-three circuits, containing promises to the amount of £11,478 13s. 8d. Five other circuits have forwarded, without any lists, the sum of £266. These sums, however, cannot represent the whole amount promised. Thirty-two Circuits and Home Mission stations have as yet failed to furnish any lists, although in some cases meetings are known to have been held and promises made months since, and on this account the Committee finds it impossible to make a complete statement.

The amounts promised in the various districts, according to lists furnished, are as follows:—Auckland, $\pm 2,709$ 8s. 7d.; Wanganui, ± 539 12s. 1d.; Wellington, $\pm 1,446$ 2s.; Nelson, ± 399 15s. 9d.; Canterbury, $\pm 4,528$ 14s. 9d.; Otago, $\pm 2,121$ 0s. 6d.; of these amounts there has already been paid to the General Treasurers the sum of $\pm 2,589$ 17s. 1d.

The Committee does not believe that these figures in any way represent the interest of our people in this Fund, but is confident that they point to the almost complete lack of organisation in many of the Circuits. In those Circuits in which the organisation has been most complete, the success has been most encouraging, and in all cases the success has been in proportion to the thoroughness of the work done. No ability and no enthusiasm on the part of the General Secretary can make up for the lack of thorough work by the local committees, and the Committee recommends Conference to take the necessary steps to ensure that its directions with regard to organisation and canvassing are complied with.

The Committee is still confident that the $\pounds 60,000$ can be raised, and trusts that by the blessing of God upon our Church during this last year of the Century, there will be such a fulness of consecration on the part of our people as will make this effort not only a success but also a delight.

1. The above Report of the General Committee was read and adopted.

2. The Balance Sheet (see Appendix L.) was also read and adopted.

3. On the recommendation of a large and representative Committee, consisting of the General Committee and the District Committees, the basis of the Fund was reconsidered, with a view of modifying the objects of the Fund and granting liberty of allocation to the donors. The following is the revised basis:—

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That Resolution VIII. p. 67 (Minutes of Conference, 1899), be rescinded.
- 2. That it shall be optional to subscribers to allocate their subscriptions to any or all of the objects of the Fund, local or general, and in such proportions as they please. Subscriptions not thus allocated, and subscriptions in excess of any particular Trust to which they have been promised, shall be allocated to the objects of the Fund by the Conference.
- 3. That the objects of the Fund be :---
 - Liquidation of all Trust Debts, as scheduled in the Report of the Secretary of Church Property, 30th September, 1898. such debts to include—

(a) Loans on Mortgage.

- (b) Loans from the Church Building and Loan Fund (including arrears to the 30th September, 1898).
- (c) Debits on Current Account.

The amount owing to the Loan Fund, however, shall be reckoned less the instalments due for the years 1899 and 1900.

- (a) New enterprises, not included in the above-mentioned Schedule, but which have received the sanction of the present Conference; (b) New enterprises, which shall have received the sanction of the Church Building and Loan Fund not later than 30th September, 1900.
- 3. The liquidation of the debt on Prince Albert College.
- 4. Renewal of Three Kings College Building.
- 5. Special Grants towards building parsonages in Circuits and Home Mission Stations where needed, in addition to help from Loan Fund.
- 6. Home Mission Fund-
 - (a) Special Grants for three years.
 - (b) For investment. Interest to be used yearly.
- 7. City Missions-To aid in securing suitable premises.
- 8. Nucleus of a Fund to aid necessitous local preachers.
- 9. Foreign Mission Fund-Towards liquidation of debt.

10. Insurance Fund-Contribution towards capital.

- 11. The Advocate-Towards maintenance and improvement.
- 12. Children's Home and Orphanage.
- 4. That a Circular be issued to those who have already subscribed, explaining the alteration in the basis of the Fund, and indicating that they have now the option of allocating their gifts.
- 5. That all subscriptions be paid to the General Treasurers, and that the working expenses of the Fund be deducted from the sum total of subscriptions.
- 6. That the General Treasurers be empowered to make payments of moneys to objects for which such moneys have been subscribed, on receiving applications from persons duly authorised to receive the same, providing the said General Treasurers are satisfied that such objects will be faithfully carried out and the moneys duly applied thereto.
- 7. That June 3rd—Whit Sunday—be celebrated in all our Churches as Century Fund Sunday, when special sermons shall be preached, and a united effort put forth to obtain for our Church an abundant outpouring of the Holy Spirit.
- 8. That as early as possible a Special Meeting be held in each Church, for the purpose of signing the Historic Roll, and further advocating the claims of the Fund."
- 9. That Circuit Committees be instructed to meet regularly, and to make a thorough canvass of all the members and adherents who have not yet subscribed.
- 10. That arrangements be made in each Circuit for the more effective working of our Sunday-schools in the interests of the Fund.
- 11. That the following gentlemen, with the General Secretary of the Fund, constitute the General Committee:—Revs. J. Orchard (Ex-President of the Conference, W. Morley, D.D., Wm. Baumber, Wm. Lee, Hy. Bull, C. H. Laws, B.A., and Messrs.

G. H. Blackwell, Wm. Harris, J. C. Prudhoe, G. J. Smith, G. Bowron, Wm. Ballantyne, J. T. Smith, C. W. Turner, C. E. Salter, A. C. Reed, A. K. England, and J. L. Scott.

- 12. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. C. H. Garland for his valuable work as General Secretary, and that he be re-appointed.
- That the thanks of the Conference be given to the Treasurers, the Rev. H. Bull and Mr. G. H. Blackwell, and that they be reappointed.
- 14. That a list of Church Trust properties, with the debts in connection therewith, be prepared and printed in the minutes of the Conference.

 - (b) Number of those who have promised to subscribe or collect or on behalf of whom promises have been made.
 - (c) The amount promised by each congregation in the Circuit.
 - And Superintendents are requested to forward such information not later than 31st October, 1900.

CONNEXIONAL SECRETARY COMMITTEE'S REPORT, 1899.

The duties of this office have been conducted upon the lines laid down by the Conference.

During the year the work in connection with the Fire Insurance and Authorised Representative office has considerably increased the labours of the Secretary.

The Committee wishes again to place on record its testimony to the large amount of work done and the diligent way in which all the duties of the office have been discharged.

Your Committee recommends the re-appointment of Dr. Morley as Connexional Secretary, and that the appropriation for the necessary financial provision be the same as last year, viz., Home Mission, $\pounds 140$; Contingent Fund, $\pounds 175$; and Church Building and Loan Fund, $\pounds 175$.

During the past year a typist has been employed to assist Dr. Morley. The Committee recommend that this be continued, and that for the future they be authorised to expend a sum not exceeding £40 for such assistance, and to charge the amount to Fire Insurance and Authorased Representative Funds.

The balance-sheet for the past year is attached.

- 2. The Rev. Dr. Morley was very heartily thanked for his valuable services during the past year as Connexional Secretary, and he was re-appointed for the ensuing year.
- 3. That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to Mr. W. Harris, for his services as Treasurer during the past year, and that he be re-appointed.
- 4. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Committee for their services during the past year, and that the following be the Committee for the ensuing year:-The

Superintendents of Christchurch, Durham Street, Christchurch South, Christchurch, St. Albans, Lyttelton, and Kaiapoi Circuits, with Messrs. W. Harris, G. H. Blackwell, J. C. Prudhoe, J. T. Smith, G. Bowron, H. Buttle, and the Connexional Secretary.

- For duties of Connexional Secretary (See Minutes of Conference, 1897, p. 40).
- 6. That the following appropriations be made in order to secure the necessary financial provision for the office:—Home Mission Fund, £140; Contingent Fund, £175; Church Building and Loan Fund, £175.

Question XII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference Respecting the Home Mission Fund ?

ANSWER :---

The Report of the Home Mission Executive for 1899, the Balance Sheet for 1899, and the Estimates of Income and Expediture for 1900, were presented by the General Treasurers. See Appendix D. (1).

- 1. That the Balance Sheet for the past year and the estimates of Income and Expenditure for 1900 be adopted, and printed in the Minutes.
- 2. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. W. J. Williams and Mr. F. L. Prime for their services as General and Financial Secretaries, and also as Treasurers of the Fund for the past year, and that they be re-appointed.
- That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. Dr.
 Morley, Corresponding Secretary, for his able and efficient work in connection with this Fund, and that he be re-appointed.
 - 4. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Executive Committee for their services during the past year; and that the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee for 1900,
 - the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee for 1900, viz., the General and Financial Secretaries, the Rev. Dr. Morley, Corresponding Secretary, the Ministers of the Auckland and Manukau Circuits, with Messrs. J. L. Wilson, T. Buddle, T. McMaster, F. A. White, G. A. Buttle, P. H. Mason, T. Allen, S. J. Ambury, A. C. Caughey, S. Parker, J. Heron, W. S. Allen, M.A., C. C. Fleming, W. Gunson, and J. E. Wheeler.
 - 5. In adopting the Balance Sheet, the Conference expresses its gratification at the spirit of liberality manifested by the Churches in the contributions to this important Fund.
 - 6. That, while recognising the need of additional workers in the Maori Mission, and being desirous to aid in providing the same, the proposals of the Committee involve an immediate and prospective increase in the expenditure which is not likely to be met by an equal addition to the income. The Conference, therefore, recommends that the proposals be modified so that, while the strengthening and better organising of the work is secured, the total expenditure may not be larger than

what the New Zealand Church may reasonably be expected to devote to this branch of the Home Mission work.

- 7. That the Home Mission Executive be requested to issue the Annual Reports as soon as possible after the close of Conference.
- 5. Conference recommends to every Circuit Auxiliary to this Fund the system of appointing a sufficient number of Collectors, to whom collecting-books shall be supplied, and who shall wait on subscribers weekly or monthly to receive their contributions. Also, that a system of juvenile collectors be established, and that the Ministers of Circuits watch the interests of this Fund, particularly in the Sabbath Schools.
- 9. That no grant be made from the Home Mission Fund to any Circuit where Church Anniversary Services have not been held.
- 10. That the Rules and Regulations of the Fund as amended be affirmed. See Minutes, 1897, pp. 41-44.
- 11. That the Deputations for 1900 be left to local arrangements. Chairmen of Districts are required to prepare and publish a Plan of the Deputation Work in *the Advocate* not later than August.
- 12. That the Conference recognises the necessity of more heartily supporting the Home Mission Fund, and that an effort be made in all our Circuits to increase the number of annual subscribers, and by efforts through the Sunday Schools, the Blake System, and our Endeavour Societies, and in other ways through the year, rather than sy a spasmodic effort during the two months of the year, to deepen the interest in this Fund.
- 13. That a copy of the Report be furnished to every subscriber of five shillings and over.
- 14. That efforts be made to have the income collected continuously, and remitted immediately throughout the year instead of at its close.
- 15. That the Regulation regarding the employment of Home Missionaries, and the sanctioning of new Home Mission Stations be amended, so that instead of leaving these cases to the individual judgment of Chairmen of Districts, all such cases be submitted to the Executive Committee of Home Missions, and this Committee shall determine the expediency or otherwise of occupying such stations, and consider the credentials of any candidates for the work of Home Missionary, and decide as to their employment.
- 16. That each Home Mission Station be under the supervision of the Superintendent of the nearest Circuit whenever so directed by Conference.
- 17. That before any new Station is opened or Home Missionary placed in charge of such Station, steps be taken to ascertain what sum is available for paying ins stipend.
- 18. That the Home Mission Executive issue suitable cards, by which adults may solicit subscriptions to the Fund.
- 19. That with a view to overtake the needs of new districts constantly being opened up, in making the ordinary grants to Circuits, the precedent of the English Conference be followed,

and that they be made on a sliding scale, diminishing from year to year, such intimation being printed with the grant.

- 20. That the General Treasurers shall publish in *The Advocate*, at least once a quarter, the amounts received by them from the several Circuit Treasurers up to date, in order that it may be seen whether the remittances have been promptly made; also that extracts from the reports of the agents be occasionally made through the paper.
- 21. That in our Home Mission operations in the principal cities, particular attention be given to the various philanthropic agencies, especially to the establishment of a Connexional Orphanage, when practicable.
- 22. That in our large town and city congregations the employment of Deaconesses be encouraged.
- 23. That as soon as practicable, Ministers or Probationers be appointed to Home Mission Stations.
- 24. That a retiring allowance of £30 be made to Mr. J. Rapley, Home Missionary.
- 25. That the Home Mission Executive be strongly recommended to make an additional grant to the Tauranga Circuit of £20 for house rent.

NEW REGULATION.

That no responsibility with respect to deficiencies of stipend can be recognised by the Committee.

Question XIII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Foreign Missions?

ANSWER :--

For Balance Sheet see Appendix E.

A Statement of Income for 1899 and an Abstract of Minutes of the Board of Missions were presented.

- 1. The Conference directs that in each Circuit and Home Mission Station sermons be preached on one Sunday in each year in all our Churches, and collections made at such services in aid of Foreign Missions; also, that public meetings for the advocacy of Foreign Missions be held in each Church, at which collections shall be made for the Fund; also, that wherever practicable subscriptions be solicited.
- 2. That the question of the New Zealand Church supporting a sionary Sister be commended to the Ladies' Auxiliary in Auckland.
- 3. That the Foreign Mission Sunday be the first Sunday in August, and that meetings held during that week shall bear relation to Foreign Mission work.
- 4. That at each District Synod the question be asked: "Have the amounts collected for the Foreign Missions been duly remitted to the General Treasurers?"

- 5. That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. C. Griffin and Mr. C. Hicks for their efficient work as Secretaries during the past year, and that they be re-appointed Secretaries to watch over the interests of Foreign Missions in New Zealand.
- 6. This Conference has heard with great concern of the heavy debt now owing by the Foreign Mission Society, and which, so seriously hampers its operations. The Synod strongly urges upon the Members and Adherents of the Church the necessity of providing an enlarged income, so that the present openings for extension may be taken advantage of, and the existing Stations may be more efficiently manned.
- 7. That a Deputation from the Foreign Mission Field be sent, if practicable, every year, and that the Rev. B. Danks, Organising Secretary, visit as a Deputation to the North Island as early as possible this year.
- 8. That a clear statement of the present state of the Fund be inserted in *The Advocate* by our Foreign Mission Secretaries, shewing the present heavy debt, and the urgent opening that at present we are unable to enter, and that Superintendents be requested to bring the matter forcibly before all our congregations during the year; also, that reprints of the article be sent in circular form to every Circuit.
- 9. That with a view to promote the systematic support of Foreign Missions, our people be requested more generally to adopt the collection cards and mercy boxes already provided by the Mission House.
- 10. The Conference notes with deep regret the recent death of the Rev. W. Lindsay, late Chairman of the Fiji District, and desires to place on record its appreciation of his long and faithful services; also, that a letter of sympathy be sent to his widow and family.

Question XIV.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Jubilee Thanksgiving Fund ?

ANSWER :--

JUBILEE THANKSGIVING FUND.

The Committee has the honour to report the receipt of $\pounds 12$ 10s. 6d. on account of Subscriptions, and $\pounds 40$, part payment of Loans. The Contingent Fund Loan is to be repaid on the rising of this Conference.

A further sum of £50 has been paid to the Capital Account of Church Building and Loan Fund.

The total receipts of the Fund to date are $\pm 9,138$ 17s. 4d., of which $\pm 3,443$ 18s. 6d., in accordance with the wishes of the donors, were paid towards the reduction of church debts; $\pm 3,350$ has been added to the Capital of the Loan Fund; $\pm 1,034$ voted to the Home Mission Fund; and a special contribution of ± 25 forwarded to the Foreign Mission. As the movement was started and subscriptions obtained during a time of commercial depression, the Committee is of the opinion that the above result is very gratifying.

It is now recommended that the amount to the credit of the Committee be paid to the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee, who shall be directed and authorised to receive any further amounts payable, and to appropriate the same to the objects contemplated by the Jubilee Fund, and that the Treasurers of the Loan Fund keep a separate account of the same, until it is finally closed. Also that the present Jubilee Fund Committee be dissolved.

ANSWER :-

Reports of the Treasurer and Principal were presented by the Rev. J. H. Simmonds.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That the Report be adopted.
 - 2. That the Minister appointed to the pastoral oversight of the students be known as Governor of the Theological and Training Institution.
 - 3. That the theological training of the students be provided for by the appointment of Ministers as Lecturers, each Lecturer to receive an honorarium of not more than £15 per annum.

4. That three Lecturers be appointed as follows:-

- (1) Systematic Theology-Rev. W. J. Williams.
- (2) Ecclesiastical History and Methodist Polity—Rev. H. R. Dewsbury.
- (3) Homiletics and Bible Exegesis-Rev. J. H. Simmonds.

- 5. That the Principal of Wesley College, Three Kings, be appointed to the Governorship of the Theological Institution, and be empowered to arrange the students' preaching services.
- 6. That the Ministers of the Auckland and Manukau Circuits be a Committee of Discipline for the Theological Institution, the Governor, Convener.
- 7. That all students be expected to contribute towards their cost of College training, provided each case be considered and dealt with upon its own merits, and provided further that in cases where students are unable to contribute during their College course, they be not expected to do so during their probation.
- 8. That all agreements with students and candidates for repaying the cost of their training in the event of their retiring from the Ministry of the Church within a period of ten years from the time of their being received into the Ministry be drawn up in legal form and kept in the custody of the Governor, who shall be responsible for the signing of the same by each candidate received.
- 9. That the Treasurer be authorised to pay the fees for Theological students attending University College Lectures.
- 10. That the students be allowed to remain for a period of not less than three years at the College, unless called out in case of necessity by the President.
- 11. That each of the Theological students at Prince Albert College preach a trial sermon before one of the Ministers of the Auckland (Pitt Street, North Shore, and Grafton Road) and Manukau Circuits, prior to the holding of the Auckland District Synod, and that a written report of each sermon be presented to the said District Synod. The Chairman of the District to notify the students respecting the time and place.
- 12. That arrangements be made so that the students, in addition to trial sermon provided for, shall preach at least once a year, before each of the Superintendent Ministers of the Auckland City and Suburban Circuits.
- 13. That the students be permitted, subject to the approval of the Committee of Discipline, to substitute Maori for one of the other subjects of study.
- 14. That the Chairman of the District furnish the Secretary of the Probationers' Examining Committee with the complete results of the Students' Examinations, including examiners' reports and marks gained, as soon as possible after the holding of such examinations.
- 15. That a copy of the Annual Report of the Theological Institution for the year ending October 31st be furnished by the Governor to each Chairman of District in time to lay before his Synod.
- 16. That the Students' Examination take place during the second week in December.
- 17. That quarterage be allowed to each student at the rate of £2 per quarter.
- 18. That a separate account be presented showing the Income and Expenditure in connection with the Theological Institution.
- 19. That Mr. G. A. Buttle be the Treasurer of the Theological Institution.

That the thanks of Conference be presented to the Committee for their services during the past year, and that the following be the Committee for 1900, viz:—The Ministers for the Auckland and Manukau Circuits, with Messrs. J. Heron, F. L. Prime, J. Edson, J. L. Wilson, R. Hobbs, T. Buddle, T. McMaster, G. Winstone, S. J. Ambury, P. H. Mason, A. C. Caughey, F. A. White.
- 4. That it is desirable that the system of Industrial Training be continued.
- 5. That the school curriculum be arranged for instruction up to the Matriculation Grade.

II.-PRINCE ALBERT COLLEGE.

The Balance Sheet and Report of Head Master and also the Report of the Board of Governors were submitted to the Conference.

- 1. That the Report and Balance Sheet be received and adopted.
- 2. That the hearty thanks of the Conference be given to the Board of Governors for the successful administration of the affairs of the College during the year.
- 3. That the Conference learns with much satisfaction of the continued success of the Prince Albert College, and warmly commends the Institution to the hearty support of parents and guardians desiring to secure for their children a high-class education on a sound, moral, and religious basis.
- 4. The Conference having, from the initiation of the Century Commemoration Fund, included the relief of the Prince Albert College from debt, among the objects sought to be attained, thereby still commends its claims to the members and adherents of the Church throughout the Colony. In promoting a High School Education under the auspices of the Church, the New

Zealand Conference is following the example of England and the older Colonies, where such Institutions nave already proved largely helpful. The benefits to be gained thereby will become more apparent every year, and if from Prince Albert College there goes forth year by year a band of young men and maidens, intellectually equipped and morally fitted for the battle of life, the Church, as well as the community, will be a gainer. The Conference, therefore, recommends speakers at Century Fund meetings to urge its needs, and trusts that there will be a generous recognition of them.

 That, in accordance with the rule relating to the government of the College, the following be the members of the Board of Governors, appointed by the Conference:—Revs. W. J. Williams, J. H. Simmonds, C. E. Beecroft, and Messrs. T. Buddle, W. S. Allen, M.A., and S. J. Ambury.

SUNDAY SCHOOL UNION.

Report of Central Committee was presented to Conference.

- 1. That the Report of the Central Committee be adopted.
- 2. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. T. E. Thomas, M.A., General Secretary of Sunday Schools, and Secretary to the Central Committee, for his services during the past year, and that he be re-appointed.
- 3. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the members of the Central Committee of the Sunday School Union for their valuable services rendered during the year.
- 4. That the Statistical Secretaries forward their reports with regard to Sunday School matter, immediately after the several District Synods, to the General Secretary, who shall prepare statistics and a Sunday School Report of the whole Colony, to be laid before the Annual Conference.
- That the following inquiries be made, and returns obtained from every Circuit by the Statistical Secretaries:—(1) Number of Schools; (2) Number of Scholars; (3) Average attendance; (4) Number of Teachers; (5) Average attendance; (6) Number of Teachers Church Members; (7) Number of Scholars Church Members; (8) Number of Scholars Catechumens; (9) Number of Volumes in the Library; (10) Number of Schools using Conference Catechisms or Tablets; (11) Number of Schools which belong to the Connexional S.S. Union; (12) Income and Expenditure.
- 6. The Conference affectionately urges upon parents the importance of daily and systematic reading of the Holy Scriptures in their homes, and suggests to the Superintendents and Teachers of our Sunday Schools the importance of encouraging their

scholars to commit to memory regularly portions of God's Holy Word.

- 7. That the following be the Central Committee for 1900:—The Rev. Dr. Morley, the Superintendents of the Christchurch Circuits, Mrs. Lockwood, Miss Kitchingman, and Messrs. Prudhoe, Howard, Flesher, Bowen, A'Court, Hulbert, and the President and Secretary of the North Canterbury Branch, together with the General Secretary of the S.S. Union.
- 8. That the curriculum for Teachers' Examination, 1900, be :--
 - Grade I.—The Book of Exodus (Facts and History), The Gospel of St. Mark (Cambridge Smaller Bible), Dr. Beet's "Firm Foundation of the Christian Faith."
 - Grade II.—Dr. Morrison's "The Sunday School Teacher's Handbook," The Acts of the Apostles ("A Key to the Acts of the Apostles," by Canon Norris), Rev. C. A. Row's "A Manual of Christian Evidences."
- 9. That the Scholars' Examination be the International Lessons (afternoon) for the months of May, June, July, and August, and the Catechism Questions on the Tablets for the same period, and that the date of the examination be the second Friday in September.
- 10. The Conference regrets to observe that in a large number of our schools neither the Conference Catechisms nor the Tablets are used. It calls the attention of our Ministers and of the Teachers' Meetings to this matter, and recommends the adoption of the International Lessons and Tablets.
- 11. Recognising the importance of the work that is being carried on by our Sunday School Union, the Conference urges upon the attention of all our Sunday Schools the importance of being connected with it, and of securing thereby the valuable aid in Bible instruction that is rendered by the system of Teachers' and Scholars' Examinations. The Conference asks our Ministers to bring the matter forward from time to time in the Teachers' Meetings of their several Circuits.
 - 12. The Conference fixes the third Sunday in October, to be called "The Young People's Sunday," upon which, throughout our Circuits, special services shall be held for the young, with a view of leading them to decision for Christ.
 - 13. Profoundly impressed with the desirability of gaining our Sunday Scholars for Christ and His Church, the Conference affectionately directs the attention of the Teachers' and Leaders' Meetings to the provision whereby the boys and girls of our Church, who have intelligently accepted Christ, may be reckoned as Junior Members, and advises the formation, wherever practicable, of Junior Society Classes.
- 14. That the Sunday School accounts be audited annually.

Question XIX.-What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the "Advocate"?

The Report of the Committee was presented to the Conference by the Rev. T. F. Jones.

RESOLUTIONS.

 - 7. That the Publishers be asked to have *The Advocate* on sale at other places in the centres of population than are now provided in order to promote the sale of the paper.

- 1. That the Report be received and adopted.
- 2. That the Conference expresses its satisfaction at the practical way in which this new undertaking has been supported by the Church Trusts throughout the Colony, and expresses the hope that such support will become general.
- 3. That the thanks of the Conference be accorded to the Committee for the work done in connection with the initiation of the movement, and that the following be appointed as the Committee for the ensuing year:--Revs. Dr. Morley, W. Lee, H. Bull, with Messrs. W. Harris, G. J. Smith, J. C. Prudhoe, J. Jackson, and J. A. Flesher.
- 4. That the special thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. Dr. Morley for his services in connection with this Fund during the year.

The Wesleyan Methodist Church in New Zealand Connexional Fire Insurance Fund.

OBJECTS, RULES, AND REGULATIONS.

I.-NAME OF THE FUND.

1. The name of the Fund shall be "The Wesleyan Methodist Church in New Zealand Connexional Fire Insurance Fund."

II.—SOURCES OF THE FUND.

2. That the Fund shall consist of :--

- (a) Donations, bequests, and grants to the Committee, the Conference or the Connexion, for the purposes of the Fund.
- (b) The amounts received from Trustees of properties held in trust for, or in connection with, the said Church, by virtue of levies made by Committee of the Fund, pursuant to the power in that behalf hereinafter contained.
- (c) All other moneys accruing to the Fund, or the Committee thereof, in connection therewith, whether from investments or otherwise.

3. In the meantime, and until the Fund shall amount to $\pm 6,000$, the Committee may obtain from Adherents of the Church guarantees to provide such sum or sums as may be required in or towards making up or providing the amount from time to time required to make good any loss or damage by fire as stated in the Objects of the Fund, and may from time to time make arrangements with the Committee of the Church Building and Loan Fund for the loan of amounts required as aforesaid, the total amount owing to such last mentioned Committee at any one time not to exceed $\pm 2,000$.

The conditions of such guarantees, including those guarantees already obtained, and the practice in connection therewith, shall be as follows:—

- (a) In the event of a loss, the Committee shall first resort to the Fire Insurance Fund.
- (b) If such loss shall exhaust the Fire Insurance Fund the guarantors (including in this term the Committee of the Church Building and Loan Fund) shall contribute the amount required over and above the amount of such Fund for the time being pro rata according to the respective amounts guaranteed by them.
- (c) The amounts so contributed by the guarantors shall be repaid *pro rata* according to the amounts so contributed out of the first moneys thereafter accruing to, or forming part of the Fund, after deducting working and other expenses.
- (d) The liability of the guarantors shall not exceed the difference between the amounts for the time being contributed by them respectively as aforesaid, and for the time being not repaid and the amount guaranteed by them respectively, and shall absolutely cease when the amount of the Fund, after repaying all advances by guarantors, shall have reached £6,000.

III.—OBJECTS OF THE FUND.

The objects of the Fund shall be :--

4. The rebuilding, repairing, and replacing of churches and other places of religious worship, dwelling-houses, vestry-rooms, schoolrooms, and other buildings on Church lands, and the furniture and other appurtenances belonging to, or used in connection with the said building, in case of any loss or damage happening by fire thereto, or to any part of the same respectively.

5. The application or payment, from time to time, as the Conference of the said Church may direct (on the recommendation of the Committee of the Insurance Fund), or as may be provided for by the Rules for the time being of the Fund, of any of the moneys, for the time being, of the Fund, for or towards any object or purposes whatsoever, other than those hereinbefore mentioned, or to any other fund or funds, trust, or trusts, of any kind established, or to be established, by the said Conference.

IV.-COMMITTEE.

6. The Fund shall be managed and controlled by a Committee consisting of three ministers and five laymen, to be appointed annually by the said Conference, four to form a quorum.

7. The Committee shall appoint a Chairman, who shall have a deliberative as well as a casting vote, and shall hold office for twelve calendar months, or for such other shorter period as the Committee shall by resolution declare.

8. The Committee shall, and may, from time to time, appoint and remove such officers, clerks, and servants as shall be necessary or expedient in or incidental to the management and administration of the Fund, including a Secretary and Treasurer, and fix their remuneration.

9. The Committee shall, and may, levy upon and from the Trustees of all properties held in trust for, or in connection with, the said Church, such annual sums, as in the opinion of the Committee, shall be sufficient to form or constitute the said Fund, and the sums so levied shall be paid by the said Trustees to the Committee accordingly, provided that if, and so long as, any such property shall be insured against loss or damage by fire to the satisfaction of the said Conference, the Trustees thereof shall not be liable to pay any such sum.

10. The amount levied upon and from Trustees, as aforesaid, shall be fixed and determined with reference to the nature and value of the property liable to damage by fire, vested in such Trustees, and the material of which the same shall be constructed according as the same shall be more or less liable to destruction or damage by fire, and such other circumstances in connection therewith as the Committee shall think fit, and the decision of the Committee in reference thereto shall be final and conclusive.

11. In addition to the powers hereinbefore vested in the Committee it shall have power:---

(a) To effect an insurance of the whole or any part of the said Trust property with any public company to such extent, and in such manner and form as the Committee shall think fit, and to pay the premiums therefor out of the said Fund. (b) To borrow and re-borrow from time to time, any sum of money, upon such terms as to interest thereon, and otherwise, as the Committee shall think fit, and to give security in the name of the Committee, or the name of the Conference, or otherwise, and to give security for the principal and interest moneys by mortgage of, or lien, or charge upon the Fund.

V.-LOSSES.

12. In the event of destruction or damage by fire happening to any Trust property, the Trustees whereof shall not be exempt from levy by virtue of Rule 10, the Committee shall in the case of total destruction pay to the Trustees the value of such property according to the assessment thereof made by the Committee, pursuant to Rules 9 and 10, or in case of partial damage, such amount as shall be proportionate to the extent of the damage to be determined by the Committee.

13. The amount so paid by the Committee shall be forthwith expended in rebuilding or reinstating the property destroyed or damaged by fire, and in the case of buildings upon the same or any other site, and in order to ensure compliance with this rule the Committee shall have power to pay the amount referred to in Clause 13 by such instalments and in such manner as they shall think fit, or to withhold payment until the rule is complied with, provided that the Committee may agree to modifications of this rule to meet individual cases.

14. Every such destruction or damage as aforesaid shall be reported by the Trustees to the Committee within fourteen days after the happening thereof, and the Trustees shall also transmit to the Committee with such notice full particulars of the property destroyed.

VI.-GENERAL.

15. The Trustees of all such property as aforesaid shall furnish to the Committee full particulars of the same, and of all alterations thereof and additions thereto, and shall from time to time give notice to the Committee of any matter or thing which may increase the risk of the destruction of such property by fire.

16. In the event of any insurance being effected under Rule 12 (a) in the name of any individual body of Trustees, they shall pay all moneys received by them by virtue of such insurance to the Committee.

17. If any Trustees shall fail to observe or comply with any of these Rules or Regulations, the Committee may refuse to pay to such Trustees any amount of the said Fund for the purpose of making good any property vested in such Trustees which may have been destroyed or damaged by fire.

18. An appeal shall lie from the Committee to the Conference in respect of any decision of the Committee, pursuant to the powers hereby conferred upon them, such appeal to be referred for determination to a Special Committee to be appointed by the said Conference on the second day of each annual meeting thereof.

19. The Committee shall, from time to time, by the direction of the Conference, apply or grant any sum or sums at the credit of the Fund towards any other trust or fund established in, or to be established by the Conference in accordance with Methodist Laws, or for any other purpose which shall be in accordance with any of the objects of the Fund.

- 2. To consider further necessary extensions and make recommendations as to the same, together with any necessary amalgamations of existing Circuits or alterations of boundaries, the suggestions and recommendations to be made to the Quarterly Meetings and Synods concerned, and a full report to the next Conference.
- 3. That the following be the Committees :---

CHRISTCHURCH CENTRAL MISSION.

That in view of the exigencies of the Station Sheet, and of the immaturity of the proposal, the question of the Christchurch Central Mission be referred back to the local authorities for further consideration; and that the proposal of March 12th, to establish such Mission, be rescinded.

PITT AND VINCENT STREET PROPERTIES.

TARARUA RELIEF FUND-AUSTRALIAN PORTION.

The Trustees reported the receipt for the year of £72, interest from the Investment.

It was resolved,-

- 1. That the Trustees be empowered to pay to the beneficiaries the said sum of $\pounds 72$ in the proportion of two-thirds and one-third as hitherto.

The Conference having been reminded of the death of Dwight Lyman Moody during the past year, desires to place on record its appreciation of his noble life of self-sacrifice, and of the signal way in which God blessed his evangelistic efforts to the salvation of souls. It recognises the great loss that the Christian Church universal has sustained, and prays that the Great Head of the Church will sanctify this dispensation of His Providence to all workers in the Christian vineyard.

VISIT OF REV. H. PRICE HUGHES, M.A.

- 1. That the Conference has heard with great pleasure that there is a prospect of securing a visit of the Rev. H. Price Hughes, M.A., as a Deputation from the British Conference to Australasia, expresses its pleasure thereat; and agrees to cooperate with the other Colonial Conferences in securing such a visit.
- 2. That the Conference recommends that the Central Committee for carrying out the arrangements be located in Melbourne, and suggests that the visit take place immediately after the British Conference of 1900, and that the visit extend over six months, that being the shortest time in which it can be satisfactorily carried out.
- 3. That the following Committee be appointed to co-operate with those in other Colonies, and to take any steps necessary to carry it out: The President of the Conference, Rev. W. Morley, D.D., Messrs. G. H. Blackwell, and S. Coverdale. Dr. Morley, Convener.

REV. DAVID O'DONNELL.

That this Conference records its gratitude to the Head of the Church for His blessing on the special services conducted by the Rev. D. O'Donnell during the past year, and prays that increasing power may attend his labours in the future.

THE CLASS MEETING.

The Conference re-affirms its conviction as to the great value and importance of the Class Meeting as a chief means of Christian fellowship and nurture, and advocates the more frequent appointment of suitable and earnest members to the sacred office of Class Leader.

PATRIOTISM.

The Conference rejoices in the patriotic feeling that has been expressed by New Zealand in connection with the war in South Africa, at the heroism shown by her contingents, and the liberal response of the Colony to the appeal for funds, and especially to that on behalf of those suffering from the struggle. It affirms its belief that Great Britain had no alternative but to draw the sword on behalf of our oppressed fellow-subjects in the Transvaal, as well as to maintain the rights of the Crown, and while praying that the complete and decisive victory of our forces may soon end the bloodshed, is thankful that the evil has been so far over-ruled for good in the intense loyalty to the throne, and the closer union of all parts of the Empire.

BIBLE IN SCHOOLS.

The Conference expresses its gratitude to God for the increased earnestness and vigour with which the various Churches of New Zealand are pressing upon the Government the claims of the Bible to a place in the day-school teaching of the Colony, and sees in such united action the earnest of success. It further urges upon all the members and adherents of the Wesleyan Methodist Church to do their utmost to secure such an amendment of the Education Act as shall provide for the daily opening of the schools with the reading of the Word of God under the supervision of the teachers, and with the Lord's Prayer, along with a Conscience Clause.

GAMBLING.

That in view of the great and growing evil of Gambling all our people be urged to discountenance the practice by every means in their power, and that the Government be requested to introduce a Bill making the Totalisator illegal, and that all our Ministers be directed to preach on the subject of Gambling on one Sunday of each year.

LAY REPRESENTATION ON COMMITTEES.

That in connection with all standing Connexional Committees it be a regulation of Conference making it obligatory that not less that one of the lay members retire annually from each Committee, having less than eight lay members and not less than two from each Committee having eight or more lay members, the retiring member or members to be ineligible for re-election for at least one year.

NOTES OF REMOVAL.

That Conference direct the preparation of printed forms for notes of removal, a book of such forms to be sent to each Superintendent.

SANITARY CONDITION OF PARSONAGES.

- Circuit Stewards are recommended to have an inspection of every parsonage by an independent sanitary expert at every change of Minister, and to hand a certificate of good sanitary condition of the house to the incoming Minister.
- 2. That District Synods shall enquire whether, in all cases of change of Ministers, the recommendation of the Conference that a certificate of the good sanitary condition of the Ministers' houses should be handed to incoming Ministers has been carried out.

MEDICAL BOARD.

Drs. Parkes and McDowell, of Auckland, are appointed a Medical Board, in accordance with General Conference Regulations.

CONNEXIONAL LEGACIES AND ENDOWMENTS.

That the Treasurers or Trustees of all Legacies and Endowments, held for or on behalf of the Church, lay upon the Table of the Conference on the first day of the Session of 1900 a Statement of the Investments or Properties then held on behalf of the said Trusts, and that this be reported to the Conference, and that, in future Conferences, on the first day of each Session, a Statement be furnished, showing any change in such investments, and that an entry of such properties or investments, or the changes, be made yearly in the journal.

SACRAMENT AT CONFERENCE.

That arrangements be made at the next Conference for the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper to the representatives, such service to be held on the second day of the Session.

AGENDA BOOK.

- That with a view to placing necessary information before members of future Conferences, and saving time when in Session, it is desirable that an Agenda Book be prepared, to contain Balance Sheets of Connexional Properties, of Connexional Conference Funds, and Reports of the same; also Tables of Statistics, Reports of Special Committees, and such other items as may be necessary to facilitate the business of the Conference.
- 2. That the following Committee be appointed to prepare and issue the Agenda Book, and supply the same to the Members of the Conference at 2s. each:—The Secretary of the Conference and Mr. C. W. Benbow.

ELECTION OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEES.

That the President and Secretary of the Conference, with two Ministers and two Laymen, to be appointed by the President, such Ministers and Laymen being members of the next Conference, be a Committee to nominate the several members of the Conference Committees, and to make the necessary arrangements for holding meetings of the same prior to the assembling of the Conference.

CONFERENCE MEETINGS.

That it be a recommendation to next Conference Arrangements Committee that at least three nights be left free from evening meetings or entertainments, so that the work of the Conference may be expedited.

APPOINTMENT OF HOME MISSIONARIES.

- 1. That in the interim of Conferences the calling into the work and appointment of Home Missionaries be subject to the approval of the President.
- 2. To clear the way for a consistent Rule with regard to the employment of Home Missionaries, it is recommended that Rule 16, sub-section 1, Resulution 15 of Conference, 1898 (Minutes, p. 47), and Resolution of Conference, 1899 (Minutes, p. 77), be rescinded. It is further recommended that the following be adopted as a Rule:—" When Local Preachers are paid by this Fund, or by Circuits or Home Mission Stations, they shall be known as Home Missionaries. No Circuit or Home Mission Station shall employ any additional paid agent during the interval of Conferences without the approval of the Chairman

of the District within which such Circuit or Home Mission Station is situated, and the Executive Committee; and no new Home Mission Station shall be constituted during the interval of Conferences without their approval. This Committee shall also consider the credentials of all applicants for Home Mission work, and decide as to their employment."






