#### II.—REGULATIONS.

1 The time allowed for each Examination Paper shall be three hours.

2 The questions for Probationers shall be so arranged as to require a general acquaintance with all the work prescribed in the Syllabus in any given subject, together with a particular knowledge of such portions as the Examiners may deem of greatest importance.

3 Probationers must themselves communicate with their respective examiners not later than the first week in May, stating the subjects in which they are preparing to be examined, and seeking any needed

direction in their work.

4 Immediately after the September Quarterly Meetings, each Chairman shall report to the Examiners for Candidates the names and scholastic status of all Candidates recommended in his District.

5 Examiners shall send to the Chairmen of Districts in closed envelopes, copies of Probationers' and Candidates' Examination Papers, as

notified, not later than November 1st.

6 Each Chairman is required to make arrangements for securing the strict supervision of all Examinations to be held in his District, and to transmit the answers to questions to the respective Examiners.

7 The Probationers' and Candidates' Examinations shall be held in each District immediately prior to the sitting of the Synod, the Students" Examinations at the same time as the other Examinations in the Auckland District.

8 Each Examiner shall, not later than January 15th, send a written report on the several papers committed to his care to the Secretary of the

9 The Secretary shall then prepare a General Report for the ensuing Conference.

10 That part of the Secretary's Report which consists of a tabular statement of the marks gained in the several subjects by Probationers, Students, and Candidates, shall be printed on a separate paper for the use of the Conference, and shall afterwards be entered and preserved in the Conference Journal.

11 The persons appointed to hear Probationers', Students', and Candidates' Trial Sermons shall affix marks to their reports before submitting them to the Synod, using the numerals 1 to 6; 6 to represent the

12 The Chairman of each District shall forward to the Secretary of the Board a signed official report of the Trial Sermon of each Probationer, Student, or Candidate examined in his District, together with the Book List of each Probationer and Candidate and the finding of

the Synod thereon.

13 The Secretary of the Board shall assess and mark the Probationers' Book List, using the numerals 1 to 6; 6 to represent the maximum. The Book List must not include books taken for examination, and must be classified as follows:—1, Theology; 2, Science and Philosophy; 3, History and Biography; 4, Poetry; 5, Miscellaneous.

14 Probationers are reminded that the Greek Testament is a compulsory

subject through the whole course for all those who have passed through With regard to any others, special provision shall be made for their examination in Greek up to their third year. This elementary Greek does not exempt from taking the New Testament in English, but it will count as one of the six subjects required to be taken.

15 Each Probationer shall, at least a forthight before the meeting of Synod, forward to the Chairman a list of the books he has read during the year. From this list the Chairman will select one in which the Probationer shall be examined orally in the Synod.

16 The report of Probationers' Examinations to be presented to Conference shall include, in the case of the Fourth Year Probationers, a

summary of the results obtained in the four yearly examinations.

17 The Candidates on the Presidents' List of Reserve shall present Book Lists to, and preach trial sermons before, their respective Synods, the Synods reporting to the Conference as in the case of Probationers or Students.

18 Any Probationer who gains an average of 80 per cent. of marks in six or more subjects will be mentioned in the Minutes of Conference as

having passed with Honours.

19 That these Regulations supersede and set aside regulations previously in

force, but not mentioned herein.

N.B.—Probationers are advised not to aim at making long Book Lists, but to be sure that the books they read are by the best authors in each department, and that they are read with care and thoroughness. Some of them should be selected from the list on pages 16, 17, and 18.

N.B.—It was resolved that this Conference rescind the President's ruling, given at last Conference, on the meaning of the word "compulsory," as used in connection with Probationers' Examinations, and directs Probationers that, while subjects 1 to 5 are compulsory in the sense that they must be taken, so long as they pass in any five out of the six subjects taken by them, they will pass the examination.

#### EXPLANATORY REMARKS.

1 The Conference requiries every Probationer who is acquainted with Greek or Hebrew to take the Greek or Hebrew subjects specified in the list of subjects for his year. Every Probationer who has been a student in the Theological Institution shall be examined in these Greek or Hebrew subjects, unless the tutors under whom he studied, having

taken into consideration his attainments on leaving the Institution, are of opinion that these examinations cannot reasonably be required in his case. Any Annual Conference may direct that Greek be a compulsory subject.

2 Annual Conferences shall have power to make exceptions in the above course of study in favour of Probationers who have matriculated and are pursuing a University course.

3 In addition to the Subjects required as above by the General Conference there shall be a course in Latin, special credit to be given to those probationers who gain above 70 per cent. of marks in this subject. The Books set for 1903 are as follows:—

1st year: Cæsar De Bello Gallico, Book V. 2nd year: Virgil, Æneid, Book II. 3rd year: Cicero, De Amicitia. 4th year: Horace, Odes, Book I.

4 Section A must be taken in all cases. All Candidates who have not matriculated must also take English, Geography, History, Science, and Arithmetic. Undergraduates and Graduates of a Chartered University will be excused from taking any part of Sections B and C.

5 The Syllabus and Regulations for Candidates as above shall be printed from year to year in the Minutes of Conference.

N.B.—It is the duty of each Superintendent Minister to see that al intending Candidates in his Circuit are made aware of the foregoing Regulations and duly prepared for the Examination. In the case of Candidates who are not Graduates or Undergraduates of a University, the preparation should commence at least two years before the date of intended presentation at the Synod.



### Pastoral Address.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN NEW ZEALAND.

DEAR BRETHREN.

In the order of God's providence we are permitted once more to assemble in our Annual Conference, our ranks unbroken by death. With glad and thankful hearts we send you our accustomed pastoral greeting.

We feel assured you will join us in rendering praise to Almighty God for the measure of success which has attended our efforts in His service during the connexional year now closing. It is with deep thankfulness that we record a substantial increase both of members and adherents of our Church, and there are besides many indications of progress, the measure and value of which cannot be tabulated.

The closing year will long be memorable on account of the gracious spiritual influences accompanying the Torrey-Alexander and the Speech and Song Missions, also Missions conducted by Dr. Grattan Guinness, the Rev. J. Lyall and others. For those who have been led into the Kingdom of God's dear Son, also for those who have been quickened and brought nearer to God by these Missions, we would render unfeigned thanks.

While, however, we are grateful to God for the success with which He has crowned these special services, we would affectionately warn you against the danger of looking to special effort alone for the upbuilding of the Church of God. If the same faith, prayer and effort were exercised in connection with our usual services that are exercised in connection with these special services, we should have a perennial blessing, and—as in the Apostolic times—the Lord would "add to His Church daily such as were being saved." We would therefore earnestly and affectionately urge upon you the duty of devout and regular attendance at the House of God, and that not only on the Lord's day, but also at the week-night services. "Do not forsake the assembling of yourselves together as the manner of some is"; but let your

appreciation of the means of grace be manifest to all, ever bearing in mind the chief objects of attendance at God's House, viz.: -1st., That you may worship God; 2nd., That, by His blessing, you may be made the channels of His grace to others; and 3rd., That you may receive the help you need to enable you to do His will on earth as it is done in heaven. Never forget that the influence of each service upon others will be affected by your presence or absence, as the case may be—for the presence of every sincere worshipper helps to create a spiritual atmosphere congenial to the work of the Holy Spirit—and, therefore, if you needlessly absent yourselves from the means of grace, your so doing may lead to the loss of immortal souls, a responsibility awful in the extreme. Let the dominating desire of your heart be to give rather than to get, to help rather than to be helped, and if so "the beauty of the Lord our God will be upon you, and the pleasure of the Lord will prosper in your hands."

The Sunday School department of our work gives evidence of increasing efficiency, and the Connexional Union is doing excellent work. We are sorry, however, to have to report a decrease in the numbers of both scholars and teachers during the past year, and we would embrace this opportunity of soliciting your heartiest co-operation with the earnest and self-denying men and women who are engaged in this most hopeful and promising field.

Our hearts have been greatly gladdened by the splendid No-license vote cast on the 25th of November last; and our ardent hope is that the Liquor traffic, which has proved such a hindrance to Christ's Kingdom, may ere long be abolished. We heartily congratulate Ashburton, Port Chalmers, and Mataura on their victory at the recent poll. In the overthrow of this "abomination of desolation" in these electorates much has been done to prepare the way of the Lord. We also rejoice with the nine electorates that carried Reduction, and we earnestly hope and predict that they and others will, at the next poll, follow the example of the four electorates that have voted the traffic out. We bless God for your whole-souled co-operation in this struggle in the past, and we confidently depend upon your ungrudging aid in the In the midst of our rejoicings over past success let us not forget that much of that success is owing to the faithful and patient work accomplished in years gone by in our Bands of Hope and Temperance organisations, and let us be more diligent than ever in the instruction of both young and old in the nature and effects of that desolating curse of the race-alcohol.

We are thankful to God that the conscience of the community is awaking to the curse of the totalisator. Recognising, as we do, that every form of gambling is a contravention of the law of God, that covetousness prompts each gambling transaction, and that the gambler is nothing less than a thief and a robber, we confidently appeal for your hearty assistance in our efforts to have the shameful statute repealed which legalises this selfish and degrading vice.

For over a quarter of a century the Bible has been excluded from our public schools, and the baneful effects of this unwarrantable exclusion are only too obvious. We are delighted that a well-organised and strenuous effort is being put forth to compel the Legislature to submit this most important matter to a referendum of the people, and we are not without hope that in the near future suitable portions of the Scripture will be taught in all our schools. We feel assured that we may depend on your assistance to this end.

We rejoice in the growth of a spirit of Christian brotherhood and large-hearted Catholicity as evinced by a growing desire on the part of all the Evangelical Churches for co-opera-It has long been recognised that tion in the Master's work. considerable economy of both men and means might be effected by the organic union of some of the existing denominations. The Presbyterian Church of New Zealand—the second largest denomination in this land—has covered herself with honour by taking the lead in this direction. Whether the Churches approached are ripe for union or not time will tell, but we hopefully look forward to a combination which will bring into existence a grand Evangelical Church, whose vast influence will be felt for good on the moral, social, and political life of We believe that the Spirit that prompts this desire for union is the Spirit of Christ, and if this be so all difficulties in the way of such union must sooner or later be overcome.

Your hearts and ours have been delighted at God's answer to our fervent prayers for the cessation of hostilities in South Africa, where we trust a permanent peace has been established on a solid foundation. New Zealand has won for herself a proud position in the history of the late war. Our gallant troops have won undying distinction in their brave defence of the flag, safety, and honour of our Empire. But while we rejoice at their noble heroism, our hearts go out in deepest sympathy to the homes that have been darkened by the loss of the valiant lads who laid down their lives for their country. While fully recognising the necessity and

justice of this war, we long and earnestly pray for the time when "wars shall cease unto the ends of the earth."

The coronation of our noble King Edward VII. was a time of great jubilation throughout the Empire. In this joy we gladly shared. And our earnest prayer is that King Edward may be upheld and guided by the Spirit of God; that the grace, wisdom, and strength needed for the discharge of the onerous duties of his exalted position may be given him, and that his reign may prove conducive to the material, moral, and social advancement of his subjects.

And, now, brethren, we commend you to God and to the Word of His Grace. "Be sober, be vigilant," remembering that "your adversary the Devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about seeking whom he may devour." Be not led away from your allegiance to Christ by the tendencies of this pleasure-loving age. Resist all encroachments on the sanctity of the Lord's Day. Repair the altar of God wherever it has been broken down, and pray without ceasing both for yourselves and us.

And may the God of Peace that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus Christ, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to Whom be glory for ever and ever.—Amen.

This is to take effect when a Home Missionary is available.

#### CANTERBURY DISTRICT.

1 It was resolved to remit the questions affecting the boundaries of the Papanui, Springston, Kaiapoi, Rangiora, Oxford, and Amberley Circuits to a united meeting of the members of the quarterly meetings of the above-named Circuits, the said meeting to be held prior to the next September quarterly meetings, the Chairman of the District to preside, and the Superintendent of the Kaiapoi Circuit to be the convener.

# GENERAL REPORT OF CHURCH PROPERTY FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30TH, 1902.

The current accounts of several Circuits reveal a number of minor inaccuracies. These more particularly concern transactions with credit or debit balances brought or carried forward. At the same time the substantial correctness of the accounts is of an assured character, and enables us to form a reliable judgment upon the financial condition of the Church as it relates to Trust affairs for the past year.

There is a slight falling off in the income from seat rents for the year, but increases from Trust collections, Church anniversaries, and donations amount to over £375. Income from other sources, how-

ever, not reckoning loans, swells this sum into an increase of more than £3,300 on current Trust income as compared with last year. Loans, over and above those current in 1901, have been during the year obtained chiefly from the Church Building and Loan Fund, amounting to £2,598, raising the total income of the year for Trust purposes to £30,054.

The current expenditure indicates considerable activity throughout the colony in the matter of alterations and improvements effected, chiefly on Churches and Parsonages, during the year. The sum expended for these purposes amounts to £7,779, being an increase of £3,380 over that expended in 1901.

One noteworthy matter revealed by the Balance Sheets is the fact that the amount paid by the Trustees for interest on loans is less as compared with 1901 by more than £220. Debts to the Church Building and Loan Fund have increased during the year, and now stand at about £10,000. But, happily, debts upon other securities show a net decrease of over £4,400. It is true that in two districts increases are shown: Nelson, £80, and Wanganui, £1,088; but in the other four districts there are decreases as follows: Otago, £457; Wellington, £871; Auckland, £1,659; and Canterbury, £2,626. The total debt on securities is now £25,660, a moderate sum indeed upon Church, School, and Parsonage buildings, valued at £246,940, to which has to be added sites at a reported original cost of £53,084.

Altogether, the current Trust finances of the Church are, as shown by these returns, in a sound and encouraging condition, and should exert, a stimulating influence in connection with our future work.

In the case of appointment of new Trustees, no further declaration of Trust is required, but they must sign the form of Appointment of New Trustees. Such form to be forwarded to the Authorised Representative.
- N.B.—Forms for Declaration of Trust, and also for appointing new Trustees, and printed copies of the New Model Deed, may be obtained from the Authorised Representative.

- 2 That, in accordance with the provisions of "The Wesleyan Methodist Church Property Trust Act, 1887," the Rev. Henry Bull be appointed Authorised Representative for the year 1903-4.
- 3 That the Authorised Representative enter on the Church Register all new Trusts and such alterations in Trusts as are certified by Circuit Superintendents, and that he report thereon to the Conference.
- 4 That the Authorised Representative be appointed to correspond with the Government on all questions of Church Property or Titles.
- 5 That it be an instruction to the Authorised Representative not to enter in the Register the names of new Trustees until the fees be paid.

#### CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND.

For Cash Account, List of Loans, &c., see Appendix A, pp. ii-xi.

Report of Committee.

- 1 Eleven ordinary meetings have been held during the year—two special meetings, and one special sub-committee meeting. The average attendance at the ordinary meetings has been about seven and one half out of a possible nine. The full membership of the Committee is ten, but the Rev. J. A. Luxford has been absent the greater part of the year in South Africa with the Colonial troops. The Secretary, Rev. W. Baumber, and Mr. Harris, have been present at every meeting, Rev. W. G. Parsonson at ten, Rev. W. Lee and Mr. Flesher at nine, Messrs. Turner and Martin at eight, and Mr. Blackwell at seven meetings.
- 2 Seventeen new loans from the General Fund have been granted during the year, and nine from the Special Branch, representing a total sum of £2,555.
- 3 During the year twenty-two loans have been closed by final payments, viz., Blenheim Church, Patea Church, Ngaruawahia Church No. 1, Balclutha Parsonage, Feilding Church, Newtown Church No. 1, Paraparaumu Church, Newtown Church No. 2, Belmont Church, Rangiora Church, Kilbirnie Church, Newtown Church No. 3, Onehunga School, Mangatainoka Church, Mount Albert Sunday School, Levin Parsonage, Henderson Church, Reefton Church, Aparima Church, Sheffield Church, Ballance Church, and Pohangina site.

- 4. The following Trusts have discharged their obligations in a shorter time than the specified period for which the loans were granted:—Newtown, Rangiora, Onehunga, Levin Parsonage, Henderson, Reefton, Aparima, and Prebbleton. Payments in advance have been made by Kingsland, St. Albans, Waikuku and Okato.
- 5 There are now current in connection with the General Fund, 97 loans, and 36 in connection with the Special Branch. Some of these date back as early as 1891 and 1892.
- 6 The Committee regrets to report that the amount of overdue instalments, although some £35 less than last year, is still unreasonably large. The amount at present is £730 17s. 9d., being £642 19s. 7d. on the General and £87 18s. 2d. on the Special Branch of the Fund. Considerably more than half of this sum represents the overdue instalments of some half a dozen trusts. The Committee would point out that the effect of having so large a sum in arrears is to hinder much progressive work from being undertaken, and but for these arrears applications for aid could have been more extensively complied with.
- 7 The report of last year with regard to contributions from trusts may be again repeated. The co-operation of Superintendents of Circuits and Treasurers of Trusts is earnestly invited in giving effect to the resolution of the Conference on this subject, so that the working expenses may be met without encroaching upon the capital of the fund.
- S The following undertakings have been approved by the Committee during the year, viz., the erection of new parsonages at Papanui and Woolston and enlargement of the parsonage at Cambridge; parsonage improvements at Whangarei and Levin; the removal of the St. Albans parsonage to another part of the property, where it has undergone complete renovation; erection of new churches at Ngaruawahia and Drummond; enlargement of churches at Midhirst, Stratford, and Roxburgh; additions and improvements to the churches at Waitara, Palmerston North (Cuba Street), Longburn, Petone. Oamaru and Karori; the erection of new Sunday schools at Taihape, St. Albans and East Belt; also enlargement of the present school at Woolston and additional class-rooms at the Hutt; purchase of church sites at Eltham, Drummond and Brightwater; also purchase of parsonage site at Woolston, and sanction given to the erection of a Sisters' Home in connection with the Dunedin Central Mission.
- 9 Sanction has been given by the Committee to the following sales of Church Property:—Church and site at Aramoho, old Sunday school site at St. Albans, the Mill Road section at Waimate, the church and site at Waipori, and the Parsonage property at Gore, providing a more suitable residence be secured.
- 10 Extended leases have been sanctioned of ninety acres of Kaeo mission property for ten years, of 308 acres of the Aotea educational reserve for twenty-one years, of 125 ft. of the Hamilton church land for twenty-one years, and of six acres of the Paparoa Glebe estate for twenty-one years under the Glasgow Lease system. A sale of leases of part of the Grey Institute Mission Trust, New Plymouth, for which the permission of the Conference was obtained last year, has taken place. It is understood that a special report will be made to the Conference on this subject by the Trustees, who will also report that a certificate of title under the Lands Transfer Act has been issued in respect of this property.
- 11 In accordance with the direction of the last Conference, the committee gave favourable consideration to the condition of the Kamo

Trust, with a view of affording special relief. The Trustees reported to the Committee on April 7th that in addition to the mortgage of £100, the unpaid interest amounted to £7 10s., and that there was also due to the Treasurer the sum of £10 10s. It was resolved to grant a loan of £110 for ten years repayable by quarterly instalments of £2 15s., that should any grant as expected be forthcoming from the Century Fund the repayments be proportionately reduced, and that the Committee take a transfer of the mortgage. The Committee regrets that the Trustees absolutely refused to accept these conditions. In the meantime the treasurers of the fund took over a transfer of the property and effected an insurance upon the church building. The Committee has been unable to arrange satisfactory terms with the Trustees of the property, and no payments have been received in reduction of the liabilities of the Trust during the year. Under these circumstances the Committee requests the Conference to take this case into its consideration and to issue directions accordingly.

12 The Committee, with deep regret, reports the death of Mr. N. Martin, which took place on January 10th. Mr. Martin was appointed a member of the committee by the last Conference, and during the year has rendered most valuable service. The Committee recommends that the vacancy thus created be filled up by the appointment of Mr. R. W. England.

13 The sum of £1,912 3s. 1d. has been received as loan instalments from trusts, and £383 10s. 3d. through the Century Fund, making total repayments during the year of £2,295 13s. 4d.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND.

#### I .- Sources of the Fund.

- 1 The amount obtained in connection with the special effort for this purpose authorised by the Conference of 1882, and the amount received in connection with the Jubilee Fund of 1891.
- 2 Donations, bequests, grants from Trustees, etc.
- 3 That the Superintendent Minister be instructed to urge Trustees to contribute to the Fund in proportion to the number of the congregation—

4 Such contributions to be made to the Treasurer of the Church Building and Loan Fund not later than 31st October in each year.

#### II .- OBJECTS OF THE FUND.

- 1 To render assistance in the purchase of sites, and in the erection of substantial churches in places where they are needed.
- 2 To aid in providing parsonages in all the Circuits in the colony.
- 3 To assist in the removal of debts on Church property.

#### III.—COMMITTEE.

The Committee of the Fund shall consist of five ministers, and five laymen, to be appointed annually by the Conference; the District Synod where the previous year's Committee was located to nominate a Committee.

#### IV .- DUTIES OF THE COMMITTEE.

- 1 To meet at least once a quarter.
- 2 To receive applications for, and determine upon the amounts of loans, and the times of repayments.
- 3 To approve of the plans and specifications of all proposed erections, enlargements, and purchases; to sanction sales of Wesleyan Trust properties, and afford advice to Trustees in difficult cases.
- 4 To receive the Annual Report from General Secretary of Church Property and to report to District Synods.
- 5 To see that proper Deeds be obtained from all Trusts as soon as possible, and to provide for their safe custody.
- 6 To take such steps as may be necessary to secure the Connexion against permanent debt.
- 7 To transact generally all the business entrusted to it by the Conference, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations relating to the Church property, and to present an Annual Report to the Conference.

#### V .- CONDITIONS OF LOANS.

1 No application will be entertained by the Committee until it has been approved by the Quarterly Meeting.

- 2 In making applications for a loan, the questions contained in the printed form must be answered.
- 3 The Connexional collections, as appointed by the Conference, shall be duly made.
- 4 A reasonable system of seat-rents shall be maintained in the Churches.
- 5 All applicants shall agree to devote a portion of the income from their Trust property (as far as circumstances will justify) to the funds of the Circuit Quarterly Meeting, or the funds of our general institutions.
- 6 Satisfactory security shall be given by Trustees and other responsible persons for the repayment of the loans, and on the terms and at the times agreed upon with the Committee.
- 7 Satisfactory assurance shall be given that the land on which it is proposed to build has been legally secured for the intended object.
- 8 All Trusts shall provide a suitable set of Cash and Minute Books.
- 9 Each Trust shall, in accordance with the Model Deed, hold a special meeting for the audit of accounts; Minutes of such meeting to be taken and preserved.
- 10 Each Trust receiving a loan for liquidation of debt shall raise a sum as least equal to such loan before they shall be entitled to claim it from the Committee. In case of erection, the Connexional rule that two-thirds shall be raised by the local Trust shall be complied with before a loan for the remainder, or any part thereof, shall be granted.
- 11 All loans to be repaid in quarterly or half-yearly instalments, as may be agreed upon.
- 12 Every Trust receiving aid from this fund shall make and carry out arrangements for the extinction of its debt within a period not exceeding ten years.
- 13 When loans are granted, Deeds of property shall be lodged with the Treasurers of the fund.

## FORM OF A BEQUEST TO THE BUILDING AND LOAN FUND.

I give unto the Treasurer or Treasurers for the time being of the New Zealand Methodist Church Building and Loan Fund the sum of pounds sterling, to be paid out of my personal estate, in aid of the said Fund, now administered under the direction of the New Zealand Conference, and for which the receipt of such Treasurer or Treasurers shall be a sufficient discharge.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

1 During the year applications for thirty-six Trusts in various parts of the Colony have been received and approved. Also from nine

Trusts applications for the acceptance of additional risks, consequent upon improvements and enlargements effected in the several properties concerned, have been likewise received and approved. The net increase in the value of new business undertaken during the past year amounts to £7.635. The total amount covered by the Connexional Fund has now reached the sum of £91,175. Careful attention is given by the Committee to the matter of re-insurances. These continue to be satisfactorily effected with the New Zealand Company.

- 2 In addition to the losses reported last year, but included in this year's Balance Sheet, of £31 at Ross and £5 at Rongotea, a loss of £21 2s. resulting from an incipient fire at the Ashburton Parsonage has to be reported. The shingled roof, in which the chimney sparks ignited, has, however, now given place to a substantial iron covering. Slight damage by fire at the Willowby Parsonage has been met by an outlay of £7. Half the amount of loss in each of the last two cases has been borne by the New Zealand Company.
- 3 The Committee desires to express its thanks to the Superintendents and Trustees of the various Church Properties for their interest shown in the prosperity of this Connexional institution, and begs to invite such a hearty measure of co-operation in the future as shall in the course of time secure to the Church itself the advantage derivable from the management and control of this department of its affairs.

- 4 That the Principal of Wesley College, Three Kings, be appointed to the Governorship of the Theological Institution, and be empowered to arrange the Student's Preaching Services.
- 5 That the Ministers of the Auckland and Manukau Circuits be a Committee of Discipline for the Theological Institution, and that meetings of the Committee be held in the months of June and October, in addition to any that may be specially summoned at other times, the Governor convener.
- 6 That all Students be expected to contribute towards their cost of College Training, provided each case be considered and dealt with upon its own merits, and provided further that in cases where Students are unable to contribute during their College Course they be not expected to do so during their probation.
- 7 That all agreements with Students and Candidates for repaying the cost of their training in the event of their retiring from the Ministry of the Church within a period of ten years from the time of their being received into the Ministry be drawn up in legal form and kept in the custody of the Governor, who shall be responsible for the signing of the same by each Candidate received.
- 8 That the Treasurer be authorised to pay the fees for Theological Students attending University College Lectures.
- 9 That the Students be allowed to remain for a period of not less than three years at the College, unless called out in cases of necessity by the President.
- 10 That a copy of the Annual Report of the Theological Institution for the year ending October 31st be furnished by the Governor to each Chairman of District in time to lay before his Synod.
- 11 That quarterage be allowed to each Student at the rate of  $\pounds 2$  per quarter.

H. Garland, J. J. Lewis, J. G. Chapman, W. Ready, and Messrs. T. Allen, A. C. Caughey, T. Buddle, G. A. Buttle, with the Revs. P. W. Fairclough, D. McNicoll, S. J. Gibson, and Mr T. E. Corkill as Corresponding Members; Rev. W. Ready, Convener.
- 8 The following was adopted by the Conference of 1902, and is now in operation:—

#### I .- FURNITURE GRANTS.

That Furniture Grants be reduced to £25 for Ministers of over fifteen years' standing, and to £17 10s for Ministers of between eight and fifteen years' standing.

#### II .- MINISTERS' SUBSCRIPTIONS AND CIRCUIT LEVIES.

That the sum of £3 per annum additional for each Minister be contributed to the Fund in equal parts by Ministers and Circuits—i.e., Ministers' subscriptions to be increased from £7 7s to £8 17s per annum. Circuit levies to be increased from £10 to £11 10s per annum. That the increased payments be in the case of Circuit levies, for and after the year 1902, and in the case of Ministers who pay in advance, for and after the year 1903.

#### III .- REDUCTION OF ANNUITIES.

That until the next General Conference there shall be a reduction in the annuities of supernumeraries and widows of twenty (20) per cent. on the present scale of allowances (Scale C), such reduction taking effect from and after June 30, 1902.

#### PLAMPIN BEQUEST FUND.

Rev. H. Bull, Treasurer, presented the Report and Balance Sheet, which showed:—Interest on Investments for 1902, £45.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

- 1 That the Report and Balance Sheet be adopted.
- 2 That the sum of £45 be devoted to four needy cases,
- 3 That the Rev. H. R. Dewsbury be appointed agent in Wanganui to forward all moneys arising from interest on the investment to the Rev. H. Bull.
- 4 That the following Trustees be appointed: Rev. H. Bull, and Messrs. W. Harris, W. G. Bassett, John Stevenson, and F. M. Spurdle.

#### II. THE CHILDREN'S FUND.

(For Balance Sheet, see Appendix G, page xxvii.)

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1 That the Balance Sheet now presented be adopted and printed in the Minutes.
- 2 That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. W. C. Oliver and Mr J. H. Helliwell for their services as Treasurers of the Fund during the past year, and that they be re-appointed.
- 3 That the payments on account of the Children's Fund be £8 10s for each child per year, as per General Conference Regulations.
- 4 That the Three Kings Institution and the Connexional Secretary's Committee be assessed in the interests of the Children's and Contingent Funds on the basis of Circuits.
- 5 That the Assessment for the ensuing year be 15 per cent.
- 6 That the levies for the Children's Fund and Contingent Fund shall be made upon the current "expenditure" of the Circuit, such expenditure to be reported to the Treasurers, and to be printed in the Minutes.
- 7 That the term "Circuit Expenditure" shall, as far as these funds are concerned, be understood to be the amounts of Ministers' Stipend and Connexional Charges due for the year.
  - N.B.—It shall be understood to exclude all payments made or amounts due for house rent for Ministers, furnishing Ministers' houses, and costs of removal of Ministers, and all other items of Circuit expenditure.
- 8 That for the purposes of the Children's Fund there shall be deducted from the expenditure so ascertained the sum of £120 for each Married Minister and £80 for each Single Minister in the Circuit, and the levy shall be made on the net amount.
- 9 That in future the Balance Sheet of the Children's Fund be duly audited
- 10 That all matters in dispute regarding this Fund be referred to the Treasurers for settlement.

#### III. THE CONTINGENT FUND.

(For Balance Sheet and Table of Circuit Levies, see Appendix G, pp. xxviii.-xxxv.)

- 1 That the Balance Sheet be adopted.
- 2 That the thanks of the Conference be given to the Rev. W. Baumber and Mr W. Harris for their services as Treasurers of the Fund during the past year, and that they be re-appointed.
- 3 That in every Circuit where a Home Missionary is employed under the charge of the Circuit Quarterly Meeting, the expenditure on behalf of the Home Missionary be deducted from the taxable amount.
- 4 That the necessary amount be given to the Editor of "The Outlook" for contingent expenses.
- 5 That special cases of ministerial affliction, when such claims are not paid by the Quarterly Meetings, be recognised as having a claim upon the Contingent Fund.
- 6 That the levy for the present year be 4 per cent. upon the current expenditure of the Circuit, as reported to the Treasurers, and printed in the Minutes.
- 7 The following are the ordinary charges on this Fund, as sanctioned by Conference:
  - a Expenses of Chairman, Representatives, Secretary of Conference, General Secretary of Church Property, and Methodist Editor of "The Outlook," travelling to Conference, steamer fares, with official charges, and incidental expenses.
  - b Travelling expenses to General Conference.
  - c Postage, &c., for President and Secretary (£5 each).
  - d Probationers travelling to Conference for ordination when directed by District Synods.
  - e Printing Minutes of Conference and Society tickets.
  - f Ministers travelling to District Synod.
  - g Chairmen's Postage (£2 each).
  - h District Synod stationery.
  - j Chairmen travelling in Districts.
  - k Expenses of District Secretaries of Church Property travelling to District Synods.
  - l Amount required for Supplementary Fund for Ministers coming from England.
  - m To furnish half the cost of supplies for deceased and disabled Ministers.
- 8 That a copy of the Minutes be supplied gratis to every Minister and Home Missionary, to the Lay Treasurers of Connexional Funds, and to each Lay Representative attending Conference.
- 9 That any cases of over-taxation be referred to the Treasurers of the Fund.
- 10 That Maori Ministers be requested to attend the Meeting of the Home Mission Committee prior to the Synod, to present a report of their work thereto, and that they be excused from attending the Synod.

That £15 be voted from this Fund towards a compassionate allowance of £30 to the Rev W. G. Thomas.

#### IV.—CENTURY COMMEMORATION FUND.

For Balance Sheet, see Appendix G., p. xxx.

#### REPORT OF CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee regrets that so little interest has been manifested n this Fund during the past year.

The amount received during the year from Circuits on account of subscriptions has been £1,237 7s 10d, and the amount paid by the Treasurers to Church Trusts has been £2,982. A sum of £50 has also been paid to the Home Mission Fund.

The total amount of unpaid promises on Feb. 1st was £2,805 9s 2d.

The Committee believes that of this amount, reported as unpaid, a considerable sum has been paid to the local treasurers without having been forwarded to the General Treasurers, and recommends Conference to direct Superintendents to forward a list of all subscriptions thus paid.

The Committee further recommends that, owing to the difficulty of securing signatures, the Conference give authority to local Committees to enter the names of subscribers on the Historic Roll.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

- 1 That the Report and Balance sheet be received and adopted.
- 2 That the best thanks of the Conference be tendered to the Rev. W. Baumber, Secretary, and to the Rev. W. Lee and Mr G. H. Blackwell, Treasurers, for their faithful services during the year, and that they be re-appointed.
- 3 That the cordial thanks of the Conference be tendered to the Central Committee for their services, and that the following be the Committee for 1903:—The President, Rev. H. Bull, the Superintendents of the first three Christchurch Circuits, with Messrs W. Harris, G. H. Blackwell, J. T. Smith, and A. K. England.
- 4 That the Committee be empowered to settle all disputes with regard to allocations, and to deal with all unallocated amounts.
- 5 That a list of Circuit promises be forwarded to each Superintendent, with the direction that the lists be returned to the Treasurers not later than September 30th next, with an explanation of every promise unredeemed, and that the Committee then send a circular to those persons concerning whom no satisfactory explanation is given.

## QUESTION XII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Foreign Missions?

Answer-

(For Balance Sheet, see Appendix H., pp. xxxvi., xxxvii.)

The Foreign Mission Secretary reported that the Rev. J. W. Collier had been designated for deputation work in New Zealand during the months of April and May. A plan of work was submitted and approved by the Conference.

A Statement of Income for 1902, and an Abstract of Minutes of the Board of Missions were presented by the Rev J. N. Buttle.

- 1 That the Statement of Income be received and adopted.
- 2 That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. J. N. Buttle and Mr C. Hicks for their efficient work as Secretaries.
- 3 The Conference expresses appreciation of the very helpful services of the Rev. W. Slade as deputation.
- 4 The Conference directs that in each Circuit and Home Mission Station sermons be preached on one Sunday in each year in all our churches, and collections made at such services, in aid of Foreign Missions; also, that public meetings for the advocacy of Foreign Missions be held in each church, at which collections shall be made for the Fund; also, that wherever practicable subscriptions be solicited.
- 5 That each District be recommended to form a Ladies' Foreign Mission Auxiliary with the object of supporting a Missionary Sister.
- 6 That the Foreign Mission Sunday be the first Sunday in August, and that meetings held during that week bear relation to Foreign Mission Work.
- 7 That at each District Synod the question be asked: "Have the amounts collected for Foreign Missions been duly remitted to the Conference Treasurers?"
- 8 That with a view to promote the systematic support of Foreign Missions, our people be requested more generally to adopt the Collecting Cards and Mercy Boxes provided by the Mission House.
- 9 That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the anonymous donor of £50 in Cargill Road Circuit.
- 10 That the attention of the officials in Sunday Schools, where nothing has been done in the interests of the Fund, be drawn to the claims of Foreign Missions, with a view to institute efforts in aid of the same.
- 11 That the Mission Office be asked to forward a new set of Missionary Lantern Slides, if possible of the Solomon Islands.
- 12 That the Foreign Mission Secretary and a layman be appointed Treasurers.
- 13 That a Report and Balance Sheet be prepared and presented to the Conference.
- 14 That the Foreign Mission Secretary's travelling expenses to Conference be paid out of the Missionary Income.
- 15 That in connection with the New Zealand Auxiliary of the Foreign Missionary Society an Executive Committee be appointed, to have charge of all the business of the Auxiliary, the Conference Foreign Mission Secretary to be convener.
- 16 That all income, together with lists of contributors, be forwarded to the Foreign Mission Secretary not later than December 31st in each year, and that all moneys received after that date be carried forward into the following year.

- 17 That the Rev. J. N. Buttle be appointed Foreign Mission Secretary.
- 18 That the Rev. J. N. Buttle and Mr. W. Ambury be the Conference Treasurers of this Fund.
- 19 That the following Committee be appointed:—The Superintendents of the New Plymouth and Waitara Circuits; the Rev. W. Cannell, and Messrs. Whittaker, Neal, S. B. White, F. Okey, W. Hooker, W. A. Collis, W. Ambury, G. Pearce, J. C. Peach, with power to add; the Rev. W. Slade and Mr. C. Hicks to be corresponding members.
- 20 That the Executive Committee, in conjunction with Superintendents of Circuits, arrange a plan of deputations to cover the whole of the Colony.
- 21 That Circuit Superintendents be requested to call the attention of congregations to our Mission literature, with a view to secure a wider circulation.
- 22 The Conference again commits the Foreign Mission enterprise of the Church to the prayerful consideration of its members. From many lands voices call for help; most of New Guinea is still without the Gospel; in those fields we have entered there is great need of extension; and from distant India our brethren repeat the old invitation, "Come over and help us" to save these millions of mankind. Without a large augmentation of means these cries must be disregarded. The Conference therefore urges on all the members of the Church the needs of the millions who, whilst we are satisfied with every good thing, look up and are not fed.

## QUESTION XIII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Home Mission and Church Extension Fund?

#### Answer-

The Report of the Home Mission Executive and Balance Sheet for 1902, and also the Estimates of Income and Expenditure for 1903, were presented by the General Treasurers.

- 1 That the Balance Sheet for the past year, and the Estimates of Income and expenditure for 1903 be adopted and printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix J, pp. xxxviii-xli.)
- 2 That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. J. J. Lewis and Mr F. L. Prime for their services as General and Financial Secretaries, and also as Treasurers of the Fund for the past year, and that they be re-appointed to these offices for 1903.
- 3 That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Executive Committee for their services during the past year; and that the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee for 1903:—viz., the General and Financial Secretaries, the Rev. H. Bull (Corresponding Secretary), the Ministers of the Auckland and Manukau Circuits, with Messrs T. Buddle, P. H. Masor, T. Allen, S. J. Ambury, A. C. Caughey, S. Parker, J. Heron, W. S. Allen, M.A., J. Edson, J. E. Wheeler, R. Hobbs, J. W. Shackelford, T. McMaster, T. Montgomery, T. W. Jones, P. Crowe and J. Burton.

- 4 That in adopting the Balance Sheet, the Conference expresses its gratification at the spirit of liberality manifested by the Churches in the contributions to this important Fund.
- 5 That the Home Mission Executive be requested to issue the Annual Reports as soon as possible after the close of Conference.
- 6 That the Conference recognises the necessity of more heartily supporting the Home Mission Fund, and that an effort be made in all our Circuits to increase the number of annual subscribers, and by efforts through the Sunday School, the Blake System, and our Endeavour Societies, and in other ways through the year, rather than by a spasmodic effort during two months of the year, to deepen the interest in this Fund.
- 7 That no grant be made from the Home Mission Fund to any Circuit where Church Anniversary Services have not been held.
- 8 That a copy of the Report be furnished to every subscriber of five shillings and over.
- 9 That each Home Mission Station be under the supervision of the Superintendent of the nearest Circuit whenever so directed by Conference.
- 10 That before any new Station is opened or Home Missionary placed in charge of such Station, steps be taken to ascertain what sum is available for paying his stipend.
- 11 That with a view to overtaking the needs of new districts constantly being opened up, in making the ordinary grants to Circuits, the precedent of the English Conference be followed, and that the grants be made on a sliding scale, diminishing from year to year, such intimation being printed in the Minutes.
- 12 That the General Treasurers publish in the "Outlook," at least once a quarter, the amounts received by them from the several Circuit Treasurers up to date, in order that it may be seen whether the remittances have been promptly made; also that extracts from the reports of the agents be occasionally made through the paper.
- 13 That in our Home Mission operations in the principal cities, particular attention be given to the various philanthropic agencies, especially to the establishment of a Connexional Orphanage, when practicable.
- 14 That in our large town and city congregations the employment of Deaconesses be encouraged.
- 15 That as soon as practicable, Ministers or Probationers be appointed to Home Mission Stations.
- 16 That the deputation arrangements of Auckland, Wanganui, Nelson, and Canterbury Districts be made by the Chairmen of the respective Districts, in conjunction with Superintendents of Circuits; that Wellington District be, if possible, visited by a Native minister as a deputation; and that the Rev. H. Bull be the deputation for the Otago District.
- 17 That the Home Mission Executive be left free to exercise their judgment as to the general fitness of applicants for Home Mission work, without being necessarily bound to select men who will regard Home Mission work as a stepping-stone to the Ministry.
- 18 That the matter of formulating a plan which shall ensure a retiring allowance for men who have served the Church as Home Missionaries be again referred to the Executive Committee for their consideration and report.

- 19 That, where possible, Laymen associated with Ministers in Home Mission Deputation Work.
- 20 That in considering the Home Mission grants the Conference begin with the District in which the Conference for the time being sits.
- 21 Conference calls the attention of Christian Endeavour Societies to the urgent claims of the Home Mission and Church Extension Fund, and appeals to them for financial help in the evangelisation of New Zealand. (See Resolution 6.)
- 22 The Conference directs the Chairmen of Districts to enforce the rule which requires every Home Missionary to furnish a report in duplicate half-yearly to the Executive Committee through the Chairman of the District.
- 23 That £15 be voted from this Fund towards a compassionate allowance of £30 to the Rev. G. W. Thomas.
- 24 That the Rules and Regulations of the Fund as found in Minutes of Conference, 1897, pp. 41-44, and in the Home Mission Report, 1902, pp. 4, 5, 6, be re-affirmed.

#### Answer-

For Summary of Returns, see Appendix L, p. l.

The Annual Sunday School Report was presented by the General Secretary, Rev. C. H. Laws, B.A.

- 1 That the Report and Balance Sheet of the Central Committee and the General Report on Sunday Schools be received and adopted.
- 2 That the thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. C. H. Laws, B.A., General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Secretary to the Central Committee, for his services during the past year, and that he be re-appointed.
- 3 That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the members of the Central Committee of the Sunday School Union for their valuable services rendered during the year; and that the following be the Committee for 1903: The Rev. H. Bull, the Superintendents of the Christchurch (Durham Street), Christchurch (South), Christchurch (St. Albans), and Lyttelton Circuits, together with Rev. R. J. Murray, Mrs Lockwood, Misses Chaplin and Kitchingman, Messrs. W. H. Bowen, H. A'Court, J. A. Flesher, C. S. Howard, S. Hulbert, J. C. Prudhoe, F. Thompson, J. Lomas, the President and Secretary of the North Canterbury Branch, and the General Secretary of the S.S. Union.
- 4 That the Statistical Secretaries forward their returns, together with a report on the state of the schools within their respective Districts, immediately after the Synods, to the General Secretary, who shall prepare statistics and a Sunday School Report of the whole Colony, to be laid before the Annual Conference.
- 5 That the following inquiries be made, and returns obtained from every Circuit, by the Statistical Secretaries:—1 Number of Schools; 2 Number of Scholars; 3 Average Attendance; 4 Number of Teachers; 5 Average Attendance; 6 Number of Teachers Church Members; 7 Number of Scholars Church Members; 8 Number of Scholars Junior Members; 9 Number of Volumes in Library; 10 Number of Schools using Conference Catechisms or Tablets; 11 Number of Schools which belong to the Connexional S.S. Union; 12 Approximate Number of Methodist Children attending undenominational Sunday Schools.
- 6 That the Curriculum for Teachers' Examination, 1903, be :-
  - Grade I.: The Book of Exodus (Facts and History); The Gospel of St. Mark (Cambridge Smaller Bible); Dr. Beet's "Firm Foundation of the Christian Faith."
  - Grade II.: Dr. Morrison's "The Sunday School Teacher's Handbook;" The Gospel of St. John (Smaller Cambridge Bible for Schools); Rev. C. A. Row's "A Manual of Christian Evidences."
- 7 Teachers shall be allowed to take up one or more books at a time, and two Examinations shall be held during the year, in May and October.
- 8 That the Scholars' Examinations be the International Lessons (afternoon) for the months of May, June, July, and August, and the Catechism

- Question on the Tablets for the same period, and that the date of the Examinations be the second Friday in September.
- 9 Recognising the importance of the work that is being carried on by our Sunday School Union, the Conference urges upon the attention of all our Sunday Schools the importance of being connected with it, and of securing thereby the valuable aid in Bible instruction that is rendered by the system of Teachers' and Scholars' Examinations. The Conference asks our Ministers to bring the matter forward from time to time in the Teachers' Meetings of their several Circuits.
- 10 The Conference regrets to observe that in a large number of our Schools neither the Conference Catechisms nor the Tablets are used. It calls the attention of our Ministers and of the Teachers' Meetings to this matter, and recommends the adoption of the International Lessons and Tablets.
- 11 The Conference affectionately urges upon parents the importance of daily and systematic reading of the Holy Scriptures in their homes, and suggests to the Superintendents and Teachers of our Sunday Schools the importance of encouraging their scholars to commit to memory regularly portions of God's Holy Word.
- 12 The Conference directs all our preachers to earnestly and affectionately exhort parents to bring their children to the regular Church services.
- 13 Profoundly impressed with the desirability of gaining our Sunday scholars for Christ and His Church, the Conference affectionately directs the attention of the Teachers' and Leaders' Meetings to the provision whereby the boys and girls of our Church, who have intelligently accepted Christ, may be reckoned as Junior Members, and advises the formation, wherever practicable, of Junior Society Classes.
- 14 The Conference recommends that in the Country Circuits, where ordinary Sunday Schools cannot be conducted, cottage Sunday Schools be established, with a view to the religious instruction of Methodist children, such schools to be returned as Methodist Sunday Schools.
- 15 The Conference fixes the third Sunday in October as "The Young People's Sunday," upon which, throughout our Circuits, special services shall be held for the young, with a view to leading them to decision for Christ.
- 16 That the Sunday School accounts be audited annually.

## QUESTION XVI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Temperance?

Answer-

For Summary of Returns, see Appendix M, p. li.

General Report was presented by Rev. T. G. Brooke.

- 1 That the Report be received and adopted.
- 2 That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. T. G. Brooke for his services as Temperance Secretary, and that the Rev. W. A. Sinclair be appointed.

- 3 That a Temperance Meeting be held at least quarterly in each church and preaching place wherever practicable.
- 4 That Conference directs that on the last Sunday in November sermons be preached in all our churches on the subject of Temperance.
- 5 That all Superintendents of Circuits be required to furnish returns to District Secretaries under the following heads:—Number of Connexional Bands of Hope and members of same, and number of Sunday School Scholars who are members of non-Connexional Bands of Hope.
- 6 That the whole question of the effect of liquor on the Maoris and on the Natives of the Cook Islands be referred to the Committee on Temperance and Public Morals.
- 7 That our Sunday School officials be urged to make pledge-signing a part of their regular school work.
- 8 That a Committee on Temperance and Public Morals be appointed, whose duty it shall be to watch all movements affecting questions of public morality, to consider the Temperance Returns, and all Resolutions passed by District Synods relating to Temperance, Sabbath Observance, Gambling, etc., and present a Report with Recommendations to Conference. The Secretaries of District Synods shall forward all such Returns and Resolutions to this Committee not later than December 15th in each year. The following is the Committee for 1903: The Superintendents of the Dunedin and Port Chalmers Circuits, with Messrs. E. Aslin, E. Rosevear, A. King, J. P. Simon, C. Duke, Dr. DeLautour; Rev. W. A. ## QUESTION XVII.—What is the Resolution of the Conference on the Work of God?

Answer-

The work of God in its several aspects having been reviewed by this Conference, we desire to place on record our profound gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the measure of success that has attended the labours of the past year, as indicated in the tabulated returns, and also for spiritual progress, which cannot be set down in We rejoice that the year has been marked by a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit in many of our Circuits. The Missions conducted in a number of our Churches by Sister Elinor and her companion, Miss Layton, were, with the Divine blessing, the means of a gracious ingathering to the Kingdom of Jesus Christ, while the visit of the Rev. Dr. Torrey and Mr Alexander to our shores resulted in far-reaching and beneficent influences to our own and other Churches. We bless God for the quickened conscience of our people on moral and social questions, which, we believe, contributed in no small degree towards the heavy vote cast for "No License" at the recent poll, and we earnestly pray that under the influence and guidance of the Holy Ghost we may as a Church deal a yet mightier blow at those social evils that so seriously hinder the establishment of the Redeemer's Kingdom in our land. Encouraged by the past, and relying on the fulfilment of the promises of God in the future, we solemnly dedicate ourselves afresh to Him, resolving in His strength to be more faithful in the great service unto which we have been called.

- 2 That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. T. G.

- 3 That the Committee consist of Revs. P. W. Fairclough, J. Ward, T. G. Brooke and W. A. Sinclair, Messrs E. Rosevear, J. C. Stephens, J. B. Shacklock, and W. C. Allnutt.

The Committee to report each year to the Conference.

- 4 That the "Outlook" Committee be authorised to make the best possible arrangements with the Publishing Committee of the Presbyterian Church for continuing the publication of the paper on similar lines to those laid down in the contract which will expire in February next.
- 5 That an honorarium of £25 be voted to the Editor from the Contingent Fund.
- 6 That the Committee and Editor be elected at the Conference.
- 7 That Superintendents be directed to urge the claims of the "Outlook" in their pastoral visitations and in other ways.

## QUESTION XIX.—What are the Resolutions of this Conference on Matters Previously Remitted to District Synods or Other Committees for Reports?

#### I.-ELECTION OF PRESIDENT AND SECRETARY.

The Report recommended the Conference to elect the President and Secretary for the ensuing Conference.

After consideration, the recommendation was negatived, and the Committee thanked and discharged.

#### II.-MINISTERS' REMOVAL EXPENSES.

A lengthy Report was presented, recommending that such expenses be made a charge on the Contingent Fund.

After discussion, it was resolved that the Report be not adopted.

The Committee was thanked and discharged.

### III.—ALTERATION IN THE NAME OF THE CHURCH.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

1 In accordance with the direction of the last Conference (Minutes, 1902, p. 70), the Committee has taken steps successfully to obtain legislative sanction to the change of the name of the Church from "The

Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church" to that of "The Methodist Church of Australasia in New Zealand." At the request of the Committee, Mr. J. C. Stephens drafted the Bill, of which, in the absence of the Right Hon. R. J. Seddon in England, Sir Joseph Ward took charge and kindly treated it as a public measure.

Resolved that the Act be printed in the Minutes of Conference.

The following is a copy thereof:

An Acr to give statutory sanction to the change of the name of the Wesleyan Church in New Zealand.

Whereas the United Methodist Free Churches of Australia and New Zealand, the Bible Christian Churches of Australia and New Zealand and the Primitive Methodist Church of Australia have entered into an organic union with the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church (including therein the Wesleyan Methodist Church in New Zealand). And it has been agreed that the name of such Church shall be changed to "The Methodist Church of Australasia." And whereas it is expedient to grant statutory sanction to the change of name of the New Zealand branch of the said United Church.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:

Short 1 The short title of this Act is "The Methodist Church Title. of Australasia in New Zealand Act, 1902."

Change 2 From and after the passing of this Act the name of the of Name. New Zealand branch of the said United Church shall be "The Methodist Church of Australasia in New Zealand."

2 The Committee recommends that the thanks of the Conference be presented to Mr. J. C. Stephens for drafting the Bill. Also to the Right Hon. the Premier and Sir Joseph Ward for their acceptable services in connection with the passing of the Act as a public measure through the General Assembly of New Zealand.

#### RESOLUTION.

That the Report of the Committee be adopted, and that the Solicitors' account (£3 10s. 3d.) be paid by the Contingent Fund.

#### IV.-NEW HYMN BOOK.

Report of Committee was adopted, and the Committee thanked and discharged.

#### V .- WORK OF LAYMEN IN THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

The Report of the Committee was presented.

- 1 That the Report be received.
- 2 That this Conference endorse the principle embodied in the recommendation of the Committee, viz., that the questions on Ministerial character and efficiency be considered in Ministerial Conference, and that all other questions be considered in Conference of the whole.
- 3 That the Committee be re-appointed, and directed to state the principle, in the form of a recommendation to the General Conference. (For Committee, see Minutes, 1902, p. 69.)

4 That the alternative suggestions re the election of Lay Members of the Standing Committee, with any other suggestions bearing on the matter, be remitted to the above Committee for consideration, a report to be presented to the next Conference through the Synods.

### VII.-LOCAL PREACHERS' EXAMINATIONS.

The Committee's Report was received, and the following Resolutions were adopted:—

- 1 That there be written as well as oral examinations before Local Preachers be received on full plan.
- 2 That Banks' "Manual of Christian Doctrine" (latest edition) and Catechism II. be the text books for such examinations.
- 3 That Local Preachers be encouraged to pass examinations for three successive years, and that suitable certificates be awarded; the examination to be held during the June quarter.
- 4 That any candidate who cannot shew evidence that he has passed an examination equivalent to the Sixth Standard be requested to pass a written examination in English.
- 5 That the Local Preachers' Meeting appoint its own examiner for the written examination of a candidate prior to his reception on full plan, and that the Committee for the examination of candidates for the Ministry be directed to prepare the papers for the examinations recommended in Section 3.
- 6 That Training Classes and Libraries for Local Preachers be established wherever practicable.
- 7 That Local Preachers who have become fully accredited be recognised as such at a public service.

During the year we have received the following:-

1 A pamphlet entitled "The Early History of Missions in Otago," by the Rev. P. W. Fairclough. Attached to the work are a number of newspaper articles and letters from the Public Press of Dunedin and Christchurch. Mr Fairclough's researches embrace a wide extent of early Colonial literature. A long biographical list indicates the extensive character of the sources of information from which he has drawn, and upon which his conclusions respecting the pioneer position of the Wesleyan Methodist Church with regard to Missionary operations among the Maoris of Otago are based.

- 2 Copious extracts from the Journal of the late Rev. James Watkin, by Mr J. E. Watkin, of Sydney. These deal with the late Mr Watkin's Missionary labours among the Maoris of Otago during the four years, 1840-44.
- 3 Copy of Blue Book containing "Report of House of Commons Select Committee on New Zealand," 1840, presented by Mr Hanson Turton, District Land Registrar, Dunedin.

We recommend, that the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. P. W. Fairclough for his historical researches, and to the donors for their valuable gifts.

### NAVAL AND MILITARY AFFAIRS.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The Committee begs to report that the offer of the last Conference to set apart one of its Ministers as Chaplain, should a Tenth Contingent be sent to South Africa, was accepted by the Defence Minister, and on the nomination of the Committee the Rev. J. A. Luxford, with the sanction of the President, was appointed to the position.

The Lyttelton Circuit having consented to release Mr. Luxford, the President sent Mr. Tylee as supply, the Committee undertaking to provide the cost, in addition to meeting other expenses.

Owing to the declaration of peace, the Chaplain returned to his Circuit within six months.

The total expenditure has been £82 17s. 6d. This has been met by collections and subscriptions, the latter including a special subscription of £20 by the Chaplain.

The Committee desires to express its entire satisfaction with the Chaplain's work, and believes that no better appointment could have been made. He did excellent service, both on shipboard and in hospital, and won for himself the respect and esteem of officers and men. The special thanks of the Conference are due to him for the work done.

- "The Committee rejoices that the lives of our brethren have been preserved amidst the perils and hardships of war, and recognises in their services, as well as in the godly lives and devotion of many of our Methodist soldiers, abundant evidence of the value of the Army and Navy work of our Church, and an additional incentive to its more complete and careful organisation.
- "It was resolved to send a copy of this Resolution to the representatives of our Methodist Church in Canada, Australasia, and South Africa. In doing this the Committee also resolved to express its gratification at the establishment of Army and Navy Committees in all branches of the Methodist Church."

That the hearty thanks of the Conference be accorded to the Secretary, the Rev. S. Lawry, for the courteous, diligent and able manner in which he has fulfilled his duties during the year.

#### ORDINATION CHARGE.

That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to the Ex-President, the Rev. D. J. Murray, for his able and helpful charge delivered to the newly-ordained Ministers at this Conference, and that he be requested to allow the same to be printed in the "Outlook."

#### FOREIGN LITERARY DEGREES.

That this Conference can recognise only such Foreign Literary Degrees as can also be held as Ad Eundem Degrees in connection with the New Zealand University.

#### APPOINTMENT OF ROMAN CATHOLIC GOVERNOR TO FIJI.

The Conference recommends the Board of Missions to communicate to the British Government its strong sense of the unsuitability of the appointment of a Roman Catholic Governor to Fiji, in view of the recent conversion of the Natives from savagery by Protestant Missionaries, and of the fact that the presence of a Roman Catholic Governor is an encouragement to the French Priests to increase their mischievous attempts to disturb the religion of the people, 90 per cent. of whom are attached to the Protestant faith.

#### REV. F. W. MACDONALD'S VISIT.

The Conference has learned with great pleasure of the expected visit to New Zealand of the Rev. F. W. Macdonald in connection with the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society. The Conference takes advantage of the present opportunity to extend very hearty greetings to Mr Macdonald on the occasion of his visit to this Colony, and also to assure him of the warm welcome with which his ministrations, in furtherance of the aims of the Bible Society, will be received.

#### REV. J. BERRY.

That this Conference hears with regret of the break-down in the health of the Rev. J. Berry, and extends to him its hearty sympathy in his illness, and prays for his speedy recovery and restoration to the active work of the Ministry.

#### THE LATE REV. H. P. HUGHES.

The Conference expresses its deep sense of the loss sustained by the Christian Church through the death of the Rev. Hugh Price Hughes.

As an earnest evangelist owned of God in the conversion of many souls, an ecclesiastical leader whose wide outlook and stimulating counsel resulted in a new life and fuller adaptation to modern needs in Methodism, as head of the London West End Mission and an eloquent advocate of the re-union of Christendom, Mr Hughes rendered invaluable service not only to his own Church, but to the whole world. The Conference thanks God for such a man, sympathises with Mrs Hughes and her family as well as with the English Conference under their heavy bereavement, and prays that the mantle of our departed brother may rest upon all our ministers, and that his example may lead the entire Church to fuller consecration to God and more fruitful labour for the good of humanity.

#### THE EDUCATION ACT.

- 1 That this Conference expresses its deep regret that the Education Bill has passed through the British Parliament, and its entire sympathy with the Nonconformists in the Home Country who feel called upon in the interests of religious liberty to offer passive resistance to the operations of this unjust measure.
- 2 That a copy of the above resolution be sent to the "British Weekly," the "Methodist Times," and to Dr. John Clifford, the President of the Conference, and Mr R. W. Perks, M.P.

#### THE LATE DR. PARKER.

The Conference begs respectfully to offer to the Union of the Congregational Church of England its deep sympathy in the great loss it has sustained in the death of the late Dr. Parker. It rejoices in the record of his noble life and work, and prays that the Divine blessing may continue to rest on the great Church of which he was so distinguished a Minister.

#### SUNDAY TRAINS.

That this Conference views with deep regret the manifest disposition of the Minister of Railways to run Sunday passenger trains during the Christmas and New Year holidays, and expresses the opinion that the running of such trains is inimical to the truest interest of this Colony, and an unwarranted trespass of the Railway employees' day of rest.

#### MAORI WORK.

That the following question be placed in the Order of Business for the District Synods:—"What is the state of the Maori work in the District?"

#### BI-CENTENARY OF WESLEY'S BIRTH.

That, as the bi-centenary of the birth of the Founder of Methodism will take place on June 17th, 1903, Superintendents of Circuits be requested to initiate measures to fittingly commemorate the event.

#### OPIUM TRADE WITH CHINA.

This Conference joins its voice with that of British Christendom generally in protesting against the national iniquity of the Indian Government growing opium for export to China for the sake of revenue, and that notwithstanding the repeated but futile protests of China against its introduction; and we urge the British Government to bring to an end this disgraceful policy. And that the foregoing be forwarded to His Majesty King Edward through His Excellency the Governor;

the Prime Minister of England; the London "Times" and "Daily News," and our own leading Methodist organs.

#### RETIREMENT OF LAY MEMBERS OF CONNEXIONAL COMMITTEES.

- 1 That in connection with all standing Connexional Committees, except the Building and Loan Fund Committee, it be a regulation of Conference making it obligatory that no less than one of the lay members retire annually from each Committee having less than eight lay members, and not less than two from each Committee having eight or more lay members, the retiring member or members to be ineligible for re-election for at least one year; and that in connection with the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee the retirement take place every second year.
- 2 That those members, outside the officers, who have been longest on the Committee shall be the first to retire.

#### CONFERENCE QUORUM.

That the next Conference be recommended at its first session to fix a quorum.

#### METHODIST COUNCILS.

That Conference recommends that Methodist Councils be established in the principal cities and suburbs thereof, with a view to taking up new causes, and otherwise for the extension of Methodism.

That Drs. Parkes and McDowell, of Auckland, be thanked for past services as a Medical Board and re-appointed in accordance with General Conference Regulations.

Drayton, with the Secretary of the Conference, consider during the year the increasing cost of the Agenda, with a view to some substantial reduction therein, the report to be submitted to the ensuing Conference.

#### NOMINATION OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEES.

That the President and Secretary of the Conference, with two Ministers and two Laymen to be appointed by the President (such Ministers and Laymen being Members of the next Conference), be a Committee to nominate the several members of the Conference Committee.

#### MINISTERIAL COMMITTEE.

That a Committee, consisting of all the Ministers who shall have intimated their intention of attending the next Conference, meet for two days before the date fixed for the first meeting of the Stationing Committee, and consider all possible Ministerial business, and report to

Conference in Ministerial session, the President to be responsible for convening the Committee.

#### GAMBLING.

That the Conference, recognising the evil of legalised and other gambling in the Colony, expresses its deliberate opinion that the totalisator ought to be abolished, and urges our Ministers and people to do their utmost to secure this reform. Also, that sermons and addresses on the subject of gambling be given on every suitable opportunity. This matter is remitted to the Committee on Temperance and Public Morals.

#### SISTERS OF THE PEOPLE.

That the Conference rejoices to hear that several "Sisters of the People" are employed in the various Circuits, and are being supported by local contributors.

#### DUNEDIN CENTRAL MISSION.

That the following be a Committee to consider the advisability of securing a suitable site for the erection of a large public hall for the Dunedin Central Mission:—The Superintendents of the Dunedin Circuits, with Messrs. E. Rosevear, J. B. Shacklock, J. Sparrow, C. Payne, E. Aslin, W. C. Allnutt, J. C. Stephens, C. Duke, J. C. Liggins, S. C. Phillips, A. King, W. R. Cole, J. F. Arnold, M.H.R., and H. D. Bedford, M.H.R.

#### CONFERENCE COMMITTEES.

- That the following Committees shall be appointed on the second day of the Representative Sessions of Conference, and a time fixed when they shall sit, and during that time no session of Conference shall be held:—
  - A Committee on Circuits.—To this Committee shall be remitted all Synod recommendations relating to Questions I. to IV. of Representative Conference business. The findings of Committee A shall be reported to Committee D, when help is required from the Home Mission Fund.
  - B Committee on Connexional Funds and Balance Sheets.—This Committee shall consider all recommendations relating to the following Funds: (1) Children's Fund; (2) Supernumerary Fund; (3) Contingent Fund; also those relating to Mission, Educational, and General Connexional Trust Properties; they shall also examine all Balance Sheets presented to Conference to see that they are in proper form, and duly audited.
  - c Committee on Foreign Missions.—This Committee shall consider all business relating to Foreign Missions, and especially enquire if Conference Rules are observed with regard to raising and remitting Foreign Mission moneys.
  - D Home Mission Committee.—This Committee shall consider all Reports, the Balance Sheet, and Recommendations relating to the Home Mission Fund, as per Rule 20.
  - E Committee on Institutions, &c.—This Committee shall consider all Reports and Synod Recommendations relating to the Theological Institution, Three Kings Institution, Prince Albert College, Sunday Schools, the "Outlook," and all Synod Recommendations not remitted to any other Committee.

#### CIRCUIT SCHEDULE BOOKS.

Resolved that the Rule that requires the production and examination of the Circuit Schedule Books at the Synod be rescinded.

#### ATTENDANCE AT COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

That the Resolution requiring attendance at Committee Meetings to be tabulated be rescinded.

#### AUDITING OF CIRCUIT ACCOUNTS.

That the Rule requiring Circuit accounts to be audited be rescinded.

#### STATIONING, AND H.M. GRANTS.

That, in considering the Station Sheet and Home Mission Grants, the Conference begin with the District in which the Conference for the time being sits.

#### LOCAL PREACHERS FROM OTHER CIRCUITS.

President's ruling on the following question :-

"Is a Local Preachers' meeting bound to accept all who present credentials from other Circuits?"

Though there is no definite law on the question, yet it is in accordance with the law of usage for a Local Preachers' meeting to receive a duly accredited Local Preacher from another Circuit, and this seems to be in harmony with the general spirit of our laws.



# REPORT OF THE GENERAL TREASURERS OF THE SUPERNUMERARY MINISTERS' AND MINISTERS' WIDOWS' FUND

For the Year ending 31st December, 1902.

As required by Rule 9 of the Fund, the Treasurers present to the Victoria and Tasmania Conference the following Report for the year ending 31st December, 1902:—

The books and accounts have been duly audited, and the Abstract of Receipts and Expenditure, Revenue Account, and Balance-sheet, signed by the Auditors, are appended.

It will be noted that there has been received during the year £6016 14s. 10d. for purchase of benefits, from Ministers who have come into the Church, and joined the Fund, through the operation of Methodist Union. In some cases these Ministers had agreed to purchase benefits under Rev. J. Cope's tables. Those agreements have been cancelled, and new ones entered into in accordance with the tables prepared by the Actuary, and published in the Special Committee's Report. By far the larger amount, however, represents agreements made during the present year. This has entailed an extensive correspon-Eighty-nine agreements have been signed and returned to the office, and the remainder will be completed as soon as possible. Meantime, it should be noted that the amount thus paid is simply provision for liabilities which have been incurred.

The sum received for Circuit Levies is in excess of the average; and had the direction of the General Conference, which requires these to be remitted quarterly, been carried out in all the Districts, the amount would have been still larger. The Conference Treasurers have been commendably prompt, but from some of the districts the amounts have not been forwarded at the due dates. Chairmen of Districts and Financial Secretaries will see that any delay means a loss to the Fund.

The £3606 16s. 2d. from the English Annuitant Societies is not the ordinary yearly payment, but includes arrears, which are only now brought to account.

Formal possession has, during the year, been taken of a number of properties which for some time past had been practically in the hands of the Treasurers. The number of such properties has therefore been increased. Some of them, including two on which the largest advances had been made, it has been deemed wise to sell. incurred was, in most instances, in excess of that allowed for in the Reserve Account, but in one a considerable amount was realised beyond that to which it had been written down. The management of these properties entails constant watchfulness, and considerable anxiety and The heavy outlay during the past year has been chiefly for sewerage and removal of buildings, and will be reproductive. It is the intention of the Board of Treasurers to review the present condition and value of all the properties now in possession during the coming year, and to report fully thereon prior to the General Conference. The Treasurers are of opinion that it will be wise to realise the properties held as favourable opportunities occur.

During the past year the properties in New South Wales on which loans have been granted have, with two exceptions, been inspected by Committees of the Board, and a renewed inspection of the bulk of those in Victoria has also been made. Notes of the condition and value have been preserved for reference, and such inspections will be repeated from time to time. The inspection of the remainder of the Victorian properties is also being carried out.

It has been the aim of the Board to keep the current credit balance at the lowest figure consistent with effective working, and the fact that it was so large at the end of the year is because it was necessary to provide for large loans which had been promised during January.

The work of the year has been onerous. Board meetings have been held every fortnight, and meetings of Committees in the alternate weeks. Besides attending the meetings, the members of the Board devote considerable time and attention to the inspection of properties offered as securities.

A plan for dealing with the long-pending account with the Connexional Buildings Trust, Melbourne, has been agreed upon, and a considerable sum paid on account. Since the Balance-sheet was closed the amount due from the General Conference for the Book of Laws, and interest on the same, has been received.

As shown by the accounts, the net result of the year is that £20,642 6s. 5d. have been added to the assets. It is necessary to emphasise the statement that this is not a piling-up of capital, but only the absolutely necessary provision to meet obligations actually incurred on behalf of those who are members of the Fund.

The approximate amount of Circuit levies due as up to 30th September last, and including arrears, was £2357. This should have been sent to the General Treasurers before the balance-sheet was closed.

The number of Annuitants on the 31st December, 1902 was: Supernumeraries, 69; Widows, 85.

The Treasurers record with regret that Mr. E. Whitehead, who has occupied a seat at the Board for eight years, and rendered signal service, has been compelled to retire on account of ill health. The Rev. J. A. Marsland, who was only appointed at the Brisbane General Conference, has also been obliged to retire for the same reason. To fill these vacancies, Mr. Geo. Sweet, F.G.S., and the Rev. J. G. Wheen, have been elected.
