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

QUESTION XII.—What Ministers or Probationers have died since last Conference?

Christopher Abernethy William Laycock William Ready Semese Nau

Christopher Abernethy was born at Lerwick, in the Shetland Islands, on 6th June, 1845, and came to New Zealand when quite a young man. In 1879 he was accepted as a candidate for the Wesleyan Methodist ministry, and was immediately employed as a probationer. During an active ministry of forty years he laboured in many Circuits, leaving behind him in each one an enduring influence for good. In some of them many people were won for Christ and His Church. Nearly all his ministry was spent in wide country Circuits, necessitating much travel over very bad roads; but he did his work without murmuring, and never doubted that the appointments given to him were ordered of God. He endured "hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ." When he was sorely bereaved, there was no faltering of his faith in the wisdom and love of God. He won the respect, confidence and affection of his people, and of his brethren in the ministry, as few men have done. He was indeed "a brother beloved" by all who knew him. Having served God's purpose in his generation, he entered into rest on April 30th, 1927.

William Laycock .- The death of the Rev W. Laycock occurred at his home on the 13th November, 1927, at the age of sixty-nine years. He was born in England, and was converted in the Primitive Methodist Church, Shildon, in the County of Durham, of which he became a member. He arrived in New Zealand in 1878, and associated himself with the Primitive Methodist Church as a local preacher at Christchurch and Geraldine. Being convinced that he was called of God to the ministry, he entered the Three Kings College at his own expense. It was a trait of his character, throughout his ministry, that what was for God's service must be of the best. He entered the Primitive Methodist ministry in 1884, and gave forty-one years of faithful service. He was a faithful pastor and a good preacher. Up to the last his services were much sought for special occasions in his former Circuits. He was a lover of books. His business and organising ability was manifested by the erection of substantial buildings in several Circuits.

The love and confidence of his brethren placed him in the presidential chair. During his retirement he collected and organised for the South Island Orphanage. His physical powers gradually diminished, but up to within a few days of his death he was able to take part in public functions. The last call came suddenly, and he passed away to be with his Lord.

William Ready was born in London about sixty-eight years ago, and was left an orphan at the age of nine years. He was received into George Muller's famous Orphanage, Bristol, England, where he received his earliest education, and where he came under Christian influences. He was converted at the age of seventeen, and five years later he went to Southampton, where he heard the call to the ministry. He received training for two years at the Bible Christian College. After two years' service in England, he came to New Zealand in 1887, and laboured for three years in Canterbury. In 1890 he launched the Dunedin Central Mission, where he laboured for nine years with great devotion and ability. Afterwards he was appointed to some of the leading Circuits, where he left a deep and lasting impression. In 1912 he was elected President of the Conference, an office which he filled with distinction. He became a chaplain in 1917 on the hospital ship Maheno. At the Conference of 1926 he became a supernumerary, but still engaged in active supply work until the end. His was a strong and attractive personality, beloved by his brethren, ministerial and lay. He was the helper of the poor, and counsellor of the rich; the strong respected him, and the weak sought his friendship; the old regarded him with affection, the youths trusted him, and children were drawn to him as by a magnet. As a preacher, the Cross was his theme, and soul-winning was his constant aim. As a prophet, he denounced the evils of the times with a burning passion, and sought the amelioration of social conditions. As he had wished, his passing came suddenly on September 7th, 1927. The evening before he had conducted a mission service at Cuba Street Church, Palmerston North. After the service, he was suddenly taken ill, and in a few hours "was not, for God took him."

Semese Nau was a minister of the Wesleyan Church of Tonga, who spent several years on the mission field in the Solomon Islands, where he rendered faithful service. He was the hero of the attempt to establish Christian work on the islands of Ontong Java, when, owing to fierce opposition, he was compelled to live in an open boat for three months before the doors opened permitting him to enter and to carry the Gospel message to the heathen inhabitants. After some years spent on the mission, he returned to Tonga as a supernumerary minister of the New Zealand Church, where he spent his closing days before the call came to him to higher service on November 18th, 1927.

T. Jackson Wallis retires on superannuation after forty-three years of useful service in the ministry of our Church. Twelve of these were spent in mission work in Fiji, Mr Wallis in this way sustaining an inherited tradition from his honoured grandfather, the Rev James Wallis, who came out as a missionary to New Zealand in 1833. In New Zealand Mr Wallis laboured with acceptance in many of our representative Circuits. He has possessed the cordial esteem of his brethren, and, while shunning public office, has earned a good degree by a ministry marked by spiritual sympathy and intellectual freshness. The good wishes of the whole Church attend him as he retires from the active work.

Samuel H. D. Peryman entered the ministry in 1882, and for thirty-six years has rendered valuable service in many of our difficult Circuits. Owing to a serious breakdown in health, he now becomes a permanent supernumerary, and carries with him as he retires from the active ministry the love and sympathy of the whole Church. His unfailing courtesy, unquenchable optimism and unswerving loyalty to the great philanthropic and moral movement of the times, have secured for him a very wide circle of friends. Not only within the confines of his beloved Church, but among the members of other Churches with whom he was always ready to co-operate, and by whom he was held in great esteem. That he may be granted health equal to a quiet and restful eventide is the fervent prayer of all his brethren.

That on the recommendation of the Board of Examiners the Conference appoint each year an examiner for the Oral Examinations at the succeeding Conference, and that in the event of such examiner not being able to attend the Conference, a substitutebe appointed by the President, and that the expenses of such examiner in travelling to Conference be a charge upon the Contingent Fund.

QUESTION XXXI.—What is the Report of the General Statistical Secretary?

The summarised general returns reveal the following increases:—3 Preaching Places, 8 Schoolrooms, 2 Parsonages, 3 Home Missionaries, 1 Deaconess, 5 Class Leaders, 154 Senior Members, 1876 Infant Members, and 419 Communicants.

Decreases are reported as follows:—1 Church, 3 Local Preachers, 164 Members on Probation, 234 Junior Members, and 44 Attendants on Public Worship.

The decrease in Churches (one) is only apparent, as more than one Church was returned in error last year. As a matter of fact, there is an increase in the number of Churches during the year of three or four. In one case a Church is no longer returned, as it is much in need of repair! District Statistical Secretaries ought to adjust such detail matters as this. It is comparatively easy to do this at Synod; whereas in the case of the General Secretary it would mean correspondence, and there is scarcely time for this if the Report is to be in time for the Agenda.

It is gratifying to note the return of 8 more schoolrooms than last year. This shows that the importance of having suitable and separate accommodation for teaching is being given its proper value.

The Senior Membership of the Church is steadily increasing, and the increase is even more than that shown, as a wrong return of last year inflated the 1926 figures. The actual increase during the year This increase was spread over the whole Dominion, all Diswas 660. North Canterbury heads the tricts without exception sharing in it. list with 162, and South Canterbury is at the other end with an increase South Auckland (145) and Hawke's Bay-Manawatu (114) are also notable for increased membership. As in the previous year, the number of Communicants consistently mounts up. There is under this heading a substantial increase of 419 on last year's figures, which again showed an increase of 350 on the 1925 returns. Extra stress is evidently laid upon this Ordinance, and the increased number of Communicants ought to mean a deeply spiritual Church.

Infant Membership.—This return is at last taken seriously, and we have nearly 2,000 Infant Members in our Churches. If the parents of these have kept in touch with the Church, and our rules are observed re distribution of tickets, this movement ought to bear increasing fruit.

Junior Membership shows another decrease this year of 234. The decrease in 1926 was 159. This is a serious state of affairs, as the harvest here is plenteous; it but needs ministers and Sunday School workers to co-operate and secure a better as well as a larger Junior Membership. Auckland and South Auckland together show a decrease of nearly 200. South Canterbury is the only District with a large increase of 71.

Attendants in Public Worship.—The decrease of 44 is comparatively unimportant if we aimed at "holding our own," but we aim at advancing, and we have not done so. The decreases this year are largely in the northern part of the North Island. Auckland, South Auckland, and Taranaki-Wanganui show an aggregate decrease of 958; Hawke's Bay-Manawatu, Wellington, Nelson and North Canterbury give a total increase of 1,008; and South Canterbury and Otago-Southland receded The Auckland decreases are serious, as the increase of population here is very much greater than in the South. Particular attention needs to be given to our position in the North. In Auckland City and suburbs alone the decrease of attendants in Public Worship is reported One is tempted to ask if that is possible in one year, or if there is another explanation.

Sunday School Returns.—A general all-round increase is revealed here, with one exception—Junior Membership of the Church. There are 14 more schools, an increase of 63 teachers on the roll, and 134 average attendance. Scholars on the roll number 272 more than last year, but the average attendance is 983 greater. This surely shows in-

creased interest on the part of the scholars. Decreases are not usually welcomed, but it is good to see that scholars in the "teen" age who lapsed were 53 less than last year.

The Sunday School and Y.P. returns are very gratifying, and give cause for much thankfulness. It is no doubt due to the splendid lead of the General Secretary, backed up by the devoted work of our school staffs.

QUESTION XXXII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the Welfare of the Church?

THE WELFARE OF THE CHURCH COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1927

The Committee has duly met and considered various matters pertaining to the Spiritual Welfare of the Church, and places on record its gratitude to God for the evidence of His continued presence, as seen in the many and varied activities of the Church.

The several remits from the last Conference were duly discussed, and decisions arrived at concerning them. The Committee desires to report:—

- That letters were sent to 58 Ministers living in railway centres re the
 character of the literature offered for sale on the Railway Book
 Stalls. The replies showed that the character of the literature
 exhibited was such that no reasonable exception could be taken
 to it.
- 2. That inquiries have been made from the four city centres of the Dominion concerning the facilities offered to the Church regarding "Broadcasting," and the answers received show that the Methodist Church is given equal privileges with other Churches in this connection.
- 3 That an interview has been held with the Rev. A. J. Seamer respecting the relation of the Home Mission Board to the Welfare of the Church Committee, and an understanding as to their respective functions arrived at, viz., that we consider the functions of the Home Mission Board at present be to deal with the spiritual advance campaign and matters arising therefrom, and that those of the new Welfare of the Church Committee be to initiate new movements calculated to promote the Church's efficiency and progress. The Committee recommends:—

- 1. That where practicable the doors of our Churches be left open during the day for purposes of devotion, and that tables bearing Methodist literature be placed in the vestibules for the benefit of those visiting the Churches.
- 2. That in pursuance of the direction of last Conference the following be submitted as a constitution for Ladies' Guilds:—
 - (1) That in all Circuits and Home Mission Stations where they do not already exist, organisations known as Ladies' Guilds be constituted, and that the following be eligible for membership:
 —(1) Women members of the Church; (2) adherents who are sufficiently interested to assist in this work; and (3) honorary members. And that all such organisations as already exist be duly recognised.
 - (2) That the following office-bearers be elected:—(1) President, who shall be a member of the Methodist Church; (2) two Vice-Presidents; (3) a Treasurer; and (4) Secretary—all of whom, where practicable, shall be members of the Church.
 - (3) That the functions of the Guild be:—To promote the spiritual and social welfare of its members and of the Church generally; to assist the Circuit or Home Mission Station in the upkeep of the furnishing of the Parsonage; to help in Trust and Circuit enterprises and Missionary efforts.
 - (4) That each Guild be empowered to elect one member to the Leaders' and Quarterly Meetings, such representative to have been in continuous membership with the Church for twelve months.
- 3. That in view of the numerous doubtful worldly allurements surrounding the youth life of to-day, the Committee urges upon our Churches the wisdom of encouraging healthy and attractive activities for the full orbed development of the young people of our congregations and neighbourhoods. As a means towards this end, we recommend the institution and extension of Young People's Clubs to cater definitely for the physical, mental, social, and spiritual needs of young life.

The following are recommended as the Committee for 1928:—The Superintendents of the Dunedin and suburban Circuits, together with the following laymen:—Dr. Lyth, Messrs. Roseveare, S. G. Macfarlane, M.A.; W. H. Johnstone, J. M. Benton, E. Aslin, A. H. Reed; L. Mercier, J. Davidson, W. O. Brown, H. H. Johnson, G. A. Skene, and C. McLean, Rev. W. B. Scott, Convener, the General Statistical Secretary to be a corresponding member.

RESOLUTIONS.

Literature on Railway Book Stalls.

That the matter of the moral tone of certain literature be investigated by the Temperance and Public Morals Committee during the year.

Broadcasting.

That the question of the broadcasting of Church services be remitted to the Welfare of the Church Committee for investigation, and report to next Conference.

Parsonages.

That the Welfare of the Church Committee be instructed to collect and tabulate information which will lead to a better definition by next Conference of the term "Furnished Parsonages."

Visit of Rev. Tom Sykes.

That the matter of inviting the Rev. Tom Sykes to New Zealand be referred to the Home Mission Board for consideration, in consultation with the District H.M. Committee, with power to act.

Prayer Meetings.

That the attention of our Ministers and Local Preachers be drawn to the widespread neglect of the After-Church Prayer Meeting, and that we urge upon our Preachers and Office-Bearers the need for special effort at the Sunday evening service, particularly to secure definite decisions for Christ.

QUESTION XXXIII.—What are the Resolutions respecting our Sunday Schools and the Youth of the Church?

YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPARTMENT-REPORT, 1927.

REPORT FOR 1927.

Influence of Sunday Schools.

"If all the children attended Sunday School we could wipe out the Children's Courts." So said the Chief Probation Officer of Victoria. It is easy to belittle Sunday Schools; they undoubtedly suffer by comparison with State Schools in regard to equipment and educational method, but the sincerity, love, and devotion of Sunday School teachers is an asset of inestimable power to Church and State, and our Church will do well to set high value upon her opportunity with 30,000 children

attending our Schools.

General statistics have more value when considered by periods than by the span of one year only. The Census tables are not yet published, and it will be next year before we can state their significance in reference to our work. In the meantime we may note that the figures presented to last Conference, when compared with those of 1920, show in creases of 29 schools, 270 teachers, and 2952 scholars. Fifty per cent of this increase is in the Senior or Bible Class section. We are not "feeding" our schools in the infant division with the care that we ought. For instance, there is a decrease in the period of 1992 names on the Cradle Roll. The Bible Classes have increased by 1443. The Church used to lose about 75 per cent. of her children in adolescence. We estimate the loss now at 50 per cent. That is still very serious, but the tendency is in the right direction. In one particular local church an ideal has been reached, where the Sunday School Superintendent is able to say—"For five years past we have lost none of our young people; we can account for them all."

The Demand for Quality.

Gratified as we are by the good character and influence of our Sunday School workers, we cannot be complacent with the poor equipment provided by the Church and the ineffective method of so much teaching. Parsimony here is poor economy. Better Sunday School architecture is in evidence recently in several Auckland suburban buildings, also a few other instances, as in Christchurch and Invercargill. This Department has been able to help in several places by consultation respecting proposed buildings. The quality of the curriculum and lesson literature

for our teachers and scholars is better now than they have ever had, and we have been gratified with the testimony from educationists, who recognise that educational principles are being observed. The Standard Syllabus of the Bible Classes is an immense improvement upon the fragmentary Syllabus of a few years ago, when each Class compiled its own. Our Bible Class Camps organisation has attained a meritorious degree of efficiency. One School this year is pioneering with the introduction of a balopticon for pictorial teaching. We contemplate that it is only a matter of time when Radio will be requisitioned for Sunday School teaching to a multitude of children in country places. Meantime we are thankful for the good work of 27 teachers, who are teaching children in lonely settlements by means of correspondence.

The Problem of Leadership.

Mr. Hamilton Archibald declares—"There is no boy problem; there is no girl problem; there is a leadership problem."

The Church is intolerably slow to provide that leadership, which means that ulterior to the problem of leadership is the problem of awakening the Church to see that the chief way to build up the Christian Church and to establish the Kingdom of Christ must be the way of Religious Education, including Educational Evangelism. The question of methods in evangelism calls for review and serious thought. Traditional methods often grate upon the sensitive spiritual nature of youth. Whenever we lack a Christ-like reverence for human personality, made in the image of God, our very way of approach may drive away those whom we wish to draw. The quiet, unforced and natural appeal prevailing in the Bible Class Camps, and usually leading to confession at the Communion service, is worthy of study by the leaders of the Church.

Until a large staff is trained and employed for Religious Educational work the Church must expect to lose a large proportion of its constituency, and in that proportion which it does retain must expect much of spiritual deformity or deficiency. The objecting question—"How can the Church afford to pay for such a staff?" is to be met first of all by another question—"How can the Church afford to lose half her potential constituency and depend for her existence and mission upon the other half maimed or immature?"

Under present conditions something of what is possible is being attempted. We appreciate the increasing place given to this side of ministerial training in the Theological College. We value the action of last Conference in opening the door for candidates to be specially trained and designated for youth work. Over a thousand of our Sunday School teachers have been reached by Teacher-training Classes in the past four years. The Leadership-training scheme of the Bible Class Movement is now well inaugurated, with more than a hundred trainees applying themselves to Bible Study, Church History, Youth Psychology, and other subjects. The help which is given by several ministers and College tutors in this work is much appreciated by the students.

Sunday School Examination.

In this, our second year of conducting a Dominion-wide examination, there was an advance in "entrants" of nearly 50 per cent.; 679 children sat for examination, with excellent results. The winners of the Gold Medals are:

Senior Grade—James Beever, Wesley College, Paerata, 96 per cent. Intermediate—Joyce E. Brooks, Irwell, 100 per cent.

Junior-Margaret Lindsay, Cashmere, 100 per cent.

The Y.P. Manual.

The publication of this Manual has proved a boon to ministers, S.S. Officers, and B.C. Leaders, setting forth as it does the complete organisation of all Y.P. work in the Church, and based upon the relevent laws of the Church, all set out in order. "It is indispensable," says a minister; "I take it to every quarterly meeting and every teachers' meeting." Intimacy with this Manual will prevent much of the muddle and liability to friction which otherwise can so easily disturb local relationships in Young People's work.

N.Z. Council of Religious Education.

Our Board representatives have met several times during the year with the representatives of other Churches in this united Council. Since the meeting of the Church of England Bishops in August the representation of that Church, hitherto small and informal, has become complete and official, to the strengthening of the Council. Branches of the Council are being established in the larger centres. A Questionnaire has been carefully prepared and circulated for study of the principles of National Religious Education in preparation for a Conference on the subject to be held in 1929.

Finance and Literature.

The Balance-sheet herewith reveals a position slightly better than

Our schools were appealed to for a special collection of £70 for a Surf Boat for use on the West Coast of Bougainville. The response is an amount exceeding £80, and an increased missionary interest in the minds of the scholars.

We have made arrangements for our Literature Trading Branch for a new period, 1928-29. Our Honorary Manager, Mr. W. Chas. Francis, has rendered conspicuous service hitherto, and our literature interests will continue in his capable hands, with assistance provided.

Y.P. Office.

Committees appointed by Conference have met in Christchurch, Wellington, and Auckland. Temporary arrangements have been made regarding literature, etc.; certain questions have been submitted to the Bible Class Movements for their consideration, and the present position is set forth in recommendations subjoined.

Itinerary.

The General Secretary has this year visited 59 Circuits and 10 H.M. Stations. An all-lines ticket in the North Island has made it possible to suit dates better to local circumstances. There is a proposal to extend this to the South Island next year. Almost universally the ministers arrange the programme wisely, and hospitality abounds.

World's S.S. Convention.

This will meet at Los Angeles in July, 1928, and the Board is arranging for the General Secretary to attend. Dr. Poole, President of the World's S.S. Association, will visit New Zealand in June, 1928.

BIBLE CLASS MOVEMENTS.

REPORT FOR 1927.

The Y.W. and Y.M. Movements have been occupied in recent years with the work of extending and consolidating each its own organisation. It is now recognised that better provision must be made for common

interests, mutual service, and advance together. A Combined Convention last New Year was a new feature, and many possibilities of co-

operation were opened up.

Ten years ago three Methodist Camps were held. Five years ago there were 16; this year there have been 38, with a total of over 2000 campers. It is estimated that at least 90 per cent. of these attended Communion, confessing thereby their faith in Jesus Christ. Rich harvests are thus gathered for the Church.

There is growing discontent with the quality of

Church Socials.

A Committee representing both Movements has been set the serious task of investigation and counsel to raise the standard.

The Standard Syllabus this year has proved excellent; 3300 copies were sold. The text-book "Fulfilment" has been popular; 572 copies were imported and sold out in quick time. The Junior Classes' Syllabus is based on the Y.P. Text-Book of the Graded Lessons of Australia and N.Z., which serves us well. The B.C. magazine, "The Link," now

N.Z., which serves us well. The B.C. magazine, "The Link," now edited by Mr. C. R. Edmond, has paid its way this year.

The Bible Class Movement identifies itself with general Church interests, having representatives on various Boards, such as Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Y.P. Department, and N.Z. Alliance.

At the end of January the Second Conference of Secretaries of Christian Youth Movements in N.Z. will be held. It is mooted that the question will be raised of forming a New Zealand Christian Youth

Our hearts are glad to learn of the B.C. Movement getting hold in the State of Victoria. It was also inaugurated this year in South

Australia.

YOUNG WOMEN'S B.C. MOVEMENT.

(Extracts from Report.)

The Special "Majority Year" Programme" has been carried out. It is gratifying to report that the 3000 mark for membership has been exceeded. There are increases in each Grade—Senior, 122; Intermediate, 70; and Junior, 147. These increases have been made despite the exit of 486 members during the year. Some leave for reasons that are inevitable, but the preventable loss causes us deep concern. We have now 235 affiliated Classes, a net increase of 24. We know of 70 Classes still unaffiliated, and every endeavour is being made to extend the privileges of fellowship to these Classes. In Senior Bible Classes 88 per cent. are now Church members, but in Junior Classes only 36 per cent. We continue to urge for Preparation Classes and Reception Services. 156 members have become S.S. teachers, and 7 Maori Sunday Schools are carried on by B.C. members. 178 of our girls are occupied with Club Leadership or other forms of social service. Two new District Unions have been formed at Hawke's Bay and Southland.

Leadership Training.

Fourteen classes in Church History, Bible Study, and Psychology have been held, with a total membership of 217, and 22 have availed themselves of tuition by correspondence; 30 students have obtained examination passes.

Twenty-one Camps

Held this year revealed the value of decentralisation in larger aggregate attendance, spreading of responsibility, drawing out latent talent, and enlarging the horizon of vision for the 879 campers who attended. We shall always be grateful to the compilers of the Camp Study, "The Kingdom of God."

Finance.

The entire allocation of £530 (always budgeted for a year in advance) has been received from the District Unions by due date, and this year each Union, without exception, presented the class offerings at a Thanksgiving Service. It is obvious that very considerable development has been made in the spirit of giving. In addition to the Budget, our classes report £703 given to "Other Causes"—too long a list to enumerate here. Even then, what Bible Class members give as individuals to the Church is not included here.

World Fellowship

Is increasingly prominent in B.C. circles, and our Publicity Agent has done valuable work to deepen the sympathy of young New Zealanders toward other members of God's human family. Two of our Unions have affiliated with the National Council of Women. All our Unions now have representatives on the Women's Missionary Auxiliary,. Sister Nicholle continues her splendid work as our representative on the Maori field.

Our Travelling Secretary's

Contribution to the progress of our Movement cannot be overestimated.

Our History,

Published this year through the ability and devotion of our N.Z. President, Mrs. Harvey Cook, is a production of which any movement might justly feel proud. We commend it to leaders of the Church as well as to Bible Class members.

YOUNG MEN'S B.C. MOVEMENT. (Extracts from Report.)

Camps

A record number —16—with a record attendance—1210—has made this year a great one in our history. Our Travelling Organiser organised a Summer Camp, chiefly for High School boys, in the Bay of Plenty; and for young men in dairying districts he arranged two camps in the Auckland Province. The Camps Study, "Unto a Perfect Man," prepared by Rev. E. W. Hames, M.A., proved an excellent basis for circle study. Many campers returned to their homes and churches with a new allegiance to our Lord, and with an eager desire for His service.

Statistics

Will not be presented until after Synods, but in time for B.C. Convention at New Year. A copy will be forwarded to the Y.P. Board in due course. Our latest returns showed that 87 of our young men were local preachers, and 66 had during the year taken up the work of Sunday School teaching. It is well known that those in our ranks who hear the call to the Christian ministry are encouraged to offer.

Dr. E. G. Sayers,

Who went forth from our movement, and toward whose support we make an annual contribution of £200, visited our Classes in the main centres this year. He has now departed to the Solomon Islands, and the movement is more than ever solid for the maintenance of its missionary policy.

The Theological College Campaign is extended to 30th November. The sum will not be large, but it has enabled many to give in small amounts.

Church Membership

Was urged upon all Bible Classes in September. So that the opportunity should be used to the best advantage, we circularised both ministers and class leaders, urging them to consult and co-operate in the matter. From information to hand we believe most gratifying results have been achieved.

The Travelling Organiser,

Mr. Cyril Burton, has been doing excellent service again this year. Each year he is touching fresh areas and getting contact with places not previously visited.

Leadership Training

Is the key to efficiency and progress. An important advance has been made this year under the direction of Committee in Auckland.

Twenty-nine men have entered, and commenced the three years' course.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. The Conference expresses pleasure at the improvement in Circuit contributions, but regrets that there are a few important Circuits that are contributing not at all, or but a meagre amount.
- 2. That the main Sunday Schools of the Dominion be circularised, inviting from them an annual contribution—and that such may be deemed a part of the Circuit allocation.
- 3. That in reference to Bible Class organisation, the following shall be the law of the Church, and be inserted in the Law Book:—
 - The local B.C. Executive shall be regarded as a Sub-Committee of the Local Y.P. Committee to conduct the routine business affecting the Local Bible Classes. It shall consist of the Minister, the B.C. Leaders, the B.C. Secretaries, the Senior B.C. Representatives on the Local Y.P. Committee, the S.S. Superintendent and the S.S. Secretary, one of whom shall be appointed Convener by the Local Y.P. Committee at its Annual Meeting.

Duties:

- The arrangement of functions or activities in which the local Bible Classes combine.
- The grading of the Bible Classes and promotion of Bible Class members.
- Set in order the B.C. business for the Local Y.P. Committee, particularly Annual Reports and Balance-Sheets.
- That the request of the Bible Class movement for representation in Synods and Conference be considered by the Young People's Board, who shall report to the Synods of 1928.
- That the Conference urges upon Ministers and Leaders' Meetings, definite uniformity of action in an adequate recognition of the Infant Membership of the Church.
- 6. That a Membership Card be issued by the Conference, to combine Cradle Roll membership in the Sunday School and Infant membership in the Church, to be available for those Children who belong to both.

- 7. That whilst appreciating the increasing recognition of the value of Services of Reception into Church membership, Conference emphasises the necessity for (a) adequate training in preparation classes, and (b) regular recognition of membership in the succeeding years.
- 8. That the Young People's Board consider during the year a fourfold grading of Church membership, and report to the Synods.
- That the resolution of 1927 Conference concerning the need for the equipment and staffing of an office be affirmed, and the Conference authorises the Y.P. Board to consider the problem fully during 1928, with a view to a definite scheme being decided upon, if possible, at the following Conference.
- 10. That the Conference expresses its deep appreciation of the loyalty, zeal, and enterprise of the Youth of our Church, as disclosed by the Annual Reports of the Y.W. and Y.M.B.C. movements. The development of the Camps policy and the scheme for leadership training is particularly gratifying, and the Conference will continue to look to the movements for recruits for various forms of Christian service.
- 11. That the Conference congratulates Mr. Cyril Burton upon his recovery from the effects of his accident, and places on record its sense of the value of his work to the whole Church during his term of office as Travelling Organiser in the Y.M.B.C. movement.
- 12. That the Conference welcomes the appointment of Mr. W. E. Donnelly as Mr. Burton's successor, and wishes him the blessing of God in his responsible task.
- 13. That the third Sunday in May be observed as Young People's Day; that it be also recognised as a Day of Prayer for the B.C. move-ment. It is further recommended that the annual collection for the Y.P. Department be made on Young People's Day.
- 14. That the Conference expresses its confidence in the Y.P. Board, and in the General Secretary of the Y.P. Department.

Social and Recreational Life.

That for the guidance of our Young People in the matter of social and recreational life the Conference resolves to issue the following positive and constructive statement:

Conference appreciates the larger and truer conception of Christianity which relates it to the whole of life, and thus includes physical education, sports and amusements, and social relation-It is the task of our religion to cultivate body, mind and spirit in the interest of complete Christian personality.

The Conference approves of the action of the Y.W. and Y.M. Bible Class Movements in their appointment of a Committee to apply its attention to raising the standard of programmes at Church Socials, and trusts that steps will be taken to train a special leadership for social and recreational life.

3. In these days of the new freedom of youth and multiplied opportunithese days of the new freedom of youth and multiplied opportunities for pleasure, a great responsibility rests upon all who are associated with organisations for sport and amusement to use their influence to promote by these means a clean and healthy citizenship. We are concerned that there exists in the community a spirit of vulgarity and greed which is strongly organised to exploit the lower passions of human nature for monetary gain, with the result that multitudes of young people, innocent and unwary, become the victims of potent temptation almost before they have become aware of its presence and their peril. Against all such subtle and powerful perversions of true sport and recreation such subtle and powerful perversions of true sport and recreation our Church stands in uncompromising opposition.

4. Conference respects the rights of individual conscience in the matter of conduct. At the same time we stress the need to educate the Christian conscience. Every such right of conscience should be exercised by Christians as in presence of their Lord, weighing the effect upon their plans and purposes as professed servants of His. They should also act with a sense of social responsibility, considering the well being of others, especially those younger than them-

5. Conference recommends all Christian parents to encourage an open and frank relationship with their children in adolescent years concerning their social problems, that by reasonableness, sympathetic understanding and active participation they may win their con-fidence and help them to choose ever the way of the Christian

ideal.

- In each case the Chairman of the District shall be ex officio a member of the Committee.
- The Young Men's and Young Women's B.C. Unions in each District have power each to elect two representatives to act on the District Committee.
- The Young People's District representative to Synod is ex officio a member of the District Committee.
- That the following be appointed Y.P. representatives to Synods:—Auckland, C. H. Virtue: South Auckland, T. L. Hames; Taranaki-Wanganui, E. Dixon; Hawke's Bay-Manawatu, G. H. Stiles; Wellington, R. S. Maunder; Nelson, G. Knight; North Canterbury, J. H. Jones; South Canterbury, C. G. Vogeler; Otago-Southland, W. O. Brown.
- That in the event of the Synod Representative for Young People approved by the Conference being unable to attend the Synod, the Chairman of the District shall have power to appoint a substitute on the nomination of the District Committee.

QUESTION XXXIV.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference with regard to Temperance and Public Morals?

TEMPERANCE AND PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

N.Z. Alliance.

The Annual Meeting of the Alliance, held on June, granted direct representation on the Dominion Executive to churches that accord the Alliance sympathetic support. The Dominion Executive met August 12th, the Convener of this Committee representing the Metho-Owing to the financial problem confronting the Alliance, the programme of work throughout the Dominion has had to be somewhat curtailed. With the poll approaching, it is essential that this curtailment be made good by voluntary labour. To assist finance it was resolved to hold a Temperance Self-denial Week throughout the Dominion from October 30th to November 6th, and to seek the co-operation of all the Churches and Temperance Societies. With the approval of the Committee and of the President, a covering letter, signed by the President of the Conference, and the Convener of the Committee accompanied the circular letter issued by the Alliance to the Methodist Churches.

The Licensing Bill.

Although the Licensing Bill as adopted by the House of Representatives was killed through amendments adopted and insisted upon by the Legislative Council, the carrying of the three main issues by such a substantial vote in the Lower House represents a great moral victory. We strongly support the Alliance in pressing for the re-introduction of a favourable Licensing Bill next session.

1928 Poll.

The Committee recommends that Conference make provision for releasing a number of men for engagement with the N.Z. Alliance for two or three months prior to the Poll.

Picture Films and Posters.

The Committee expressed through the Press its appreciation of the favourable reply given by the late Hon. B. F. Bollard, Minister of Internal Affairs, to a Deputation from the Presbyterian Assembly urging the tightening up of the censorship of cinema films and posters. There are evidences, however, that films of a most undesirable quality are still passing the Censor.

Bible in Schools.

While the action of the House in defeating the Religious Exercises in Schools Bill is to be regretted, it is gratifying to note the recognition in the amendment carried of the value of Bible lessons in the State schools. We insist, however, in making the Bible an integral part of national education. We appreciate the splendid result of the Parents' Plebiscite, and also the support given by leading educationalists, including the Director of Education. We reaffirm our adherence to the principles embodied in the Bill, and pledge our support to the Bible in Schools League in pressing for its adoption.

Racing and Racecourse Gambling.

In co-operation with other Churches, strong protests from the Methodist Churches of the Wellington District were entered against the Gaming Amendment Bill introduced during the session, and we are gratified that the measure, which, by legalising the publication of betting odds, betting by telegraph from any part of the Dominion to any race meeting, and the operation of the "Double Tote," would have greatly increased the facilities for gambling, failed to reach the Statute Book. Any attempt to re-introduce it at any further date should be strenuously resisted by all our Churches,

Tin Hare Racing.

That believing wholesome recreation to have a high value for life and to be essential to the adequate development of young people, the Committee is impressed with the duty of guarding pastimes from the invasion of spurious sport and facilities for gambling; it therefore views with concern the efforts being made to introduce into the Dominion greyhound coursing with mechanical hares, and deprecates the part being taken in these efforts by some men in prominent public positions.

League of Nations.

Evidences of the growth of the League spirit are still encouraging, warranting a healthy optimism. It is cheering to note the recent utterance by Sir Austin Chamberlain: "Every time I visit Geneva my confidence in the League of Nations increases." We again commend the local unions to the support of our people, especially urging Churches and Church organisations to become full corporate members, and thus obtain a full supply of the literature published by the English League Union.

United Churches' Peace Manifesto.

The Committee expressed appreciation of the Manifesto issued by the Churches' United Peace Committee, setting forth the attitude of the united Churches against war, and hopes Conference will find opportunity of making pronouncement upon it.

RESOLUTIONS.

Bible in Schools.

That Ministers be urged to observe Sunday, May 6th, as Bible Sunday, and strongly to support the Bible in Schools League in the

services of that day.

2. That the members of our congregations be encouraged to assist in every way demonstrations of citizens and parents to be held in the month of May in the main centres of New Zealand, with the object of demanding from Parliament the passing of the Religious Exercises in Schools Bill.

Picture Films.

That in matters relating to Picture Films, the Temperance and Public Morals Committee associate with themselves the Rev. W. Walker as corresponding member.

Sunday Pictures.

That the matter of Sunday Pictures be investigated by the Committee during the year.

Sabbath Desecration.

That the Temperance and Public Morals Committee consider the following during the year, with power to act:—"That this Conference views with alarm the increase in Sabbath desecration, and respectfully urges the Government to bring pressure on the Railway Department to discontinue the running of excursion trains on Sundays.

Licensing Bill.

That the Methodist Church of New Zealand in Conference assembled representing 122,000 adherents, respectfully requests the Prime Minister to introduce a Licensing Act Amendment Bill, containing the three main issues of the Bill passed by the House of Representatives last session, viz.:—(1) Triennial Polls. (2) A Two-issue Ballot Paper. (3) Bare Majority Vote. The Conference urges that such a Bill be introduced into Parliament immediately after the debate on the Address in Reply, and during the early stages of the approaching session, to give every facility for its passage through both Houses. The Conference believes that such a Bill is strongly desired by a majority of the electors in New Zealand.

PROPOSED PEACE MANIFESTO FROM NORTH CANTER-BURY SYNOD.

That Conference be recommended to adopt the following resolutions:-

 That as the Methodist Church believes in the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of all Men, as taught by Jesus Christ, this Conference affirms its conviction that War is a violation of His Spirit and principles, and should not be countenanced by the Christian Church.

2. That Conference declares that in its judgment preparation for war does not prevent war, but frequently is a direct incentive to war, and the aim of the Church, and especially the Ministers, should be to promote the spirit of peace and goodwill, and the education of the people in the principles of international iustice as the true basis of peace, so that war shall become morally impossible, and disarmament and arbitration be regarded as the normal policy of the nations.

3. That Conference further declares its conviction that compulsory military training is contrary to the principles of the Covenant of the League of Nations, and therefore should not be continued in New Zealand, which is a party to the Covenant, and that until such training is abolished adequate protection be afforded to all bona fide conscientious objectors.

4. That Conference directs the Public Morals Committee to co-operate with the Churches' United Peace Committee and the League of Nations Union in their efforts to promote friendship and good understanding among the nations, and the general acceptance of the principle of settling all international disputes by arbitration.

CHURCHES' UNITED PEACE COMMITTEE MANIFESTO.

We, the members of a Peace Committee to which delegates have been appointed by the authorities of the following Churches of the Dominion, namely, the Church of England, the Presbyterian Church, the Roman Catholic Church, the Methodist Church, the Baptist Church, the Congregational Church, the Salvation Army, the Church of Christ, and the Society of Friends, being assured that war as a means of settling disputes between nations is utterly opposed to the mind of Christ, believe that the time has come for the Churches and all men of goodwill to take a definite stand against war, and so to use their influence with the people and Government of this Dominion that our country shall play its part in bringing about good and friendly relations amongst the nations.

With this end in view we are resolved to adhere to the following

platform :-

(1) Realising the evil nature of the usual causes, the conditions, and the results of war, we regard it as the most inadequate, disastrous and wrong method of attempting to settle international disputes, and urge all the people of the Churches, and all ministers and priests in particular, to an outspoken and uncompromising declaration that the war system and the Gospel of Christ are diametrically and irreconcilably opposed.
(2) While acknowledging with admiration the courage and self-

(2) While acknowledging with admiration the courage and self-sacrifice nobly displayed in past wars, we warn all against the tendency to extend to war itself the admiration which belongs only to such courage and self-sacrifice—qualities for which men can find ample scope under

conditions of peace.

(3) We believe that peace can be secured only as adequate machinery for the settlement of disputes is set up and made effective by the hearty support of the great nations, and we consider that the influence of the British Empire is of especial significance in this respect. We shall, therefore, co-operate with the League of Nations Union in urging that this Dominion give the fullest support to the work of the League of Nations.

(4) We shall also support every other effort which may be made for the promotion of mutual understanding and friendship among the nations and the removal of all actual and potential causes of dispute; and in particular we shall urge upon the whole community the duty of maintaining a spirit of calmness, reasonableness and conciliation in the face of any threatened international crisis, so that the attainment of a settlement may not be made more difficult by provocative words or acts

on the part of the Government, the Press or the people.

(5) In view of the intolerable burdens imposed on the nations by the maintenance of vast armies and navies, and especially of the fact, now generally recognised, that preparation for war inevitably leads to war, we shall urge upon the Government vigorous co-operation with all efforts for universal disarmament; and realising that the task is one of such extreme difficulty that it may well prove impracticable apart from the active sympathy and co-operation of the people, we shall appeal to the

Churches and all men of goodwill to be unceasing in their advocacy of disarmament and in the endeavour to quicken in the mind of the com-

munity a sense of the momentous urgency of this matter.

(6) We shall also explore the proposals being supported by the Federal Council of Christian Churches in America and the World Alliance for Promoting International Friendship through the Churches with reference to the outlawry of war by an international conference, treaty, court and code of law, and shall disseminate information about this scheme, with a view to linking up our efforts with those of kindred organisations overseas.

(7) Realising that in all the matters above referred to an educational campaign to inform public opinion is necessary, we shall endeavour to lead the Churches to regard it as a foremost duty to instruct the minds and consciences of their members, and of the people generally, not only as to the waste, the horror, the wickedness, the demoralisation,

and the sheer futility of war, but also as to the ways in which peace may be finally established amongst the nations of the earth.

In conclusion, being convinced that the gracious design of Almighty God in sending His Son Jesus Christ into the world was that His Kingdom might come, and all men dwell together as brethren, and believing that "not by might, nor by power, but by His Spirit," is this Kingdom being set up, we feel justified in calling on all Christian people to adhere to the principles of peace even at a risk of loss and humiliation, in the faith that by our living in the spirit of Christ that day will indeed be brought nearer when "nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more."

RESOLUTIONS.

1. That both the Peace Manifesto of the North Canterbury Synod and the Churches' United Peace Committee Manifesto be referred to the Quarterly Meetings and Synods for consideration, and report to next Conference.

2. That the Temperance and Public Morals Committee, together with the Christchurch Committee, arrange to bring this matter effectively before the Quarterly Meetings.

Military Training and Conscientious Objectors.

That the following resolution be referred to the Quarterly Meetings and Synods for consideration, and report to Conference:—"This Conference is strongly convinced that the laws relating to military training should make provision for exemption from training and service on the ground of individual religious conviction, apart from the tenets of any Church or Denomination to which such objector may belong. That Conference directs the Temperance and Public Morals Committee to take action in co-operation with other Churches to secure any necessary legislative amendments."

REPORT ON IMMIGRATION, 1927.

Owing to the restricted Immigration policy of the Government, which has been in force throughout the year, matters have been quiet in this department. The unemployment, which has been rife, has had the effect of almost completely discouraging the pursuance of any policy

of nomination.

While we have to some extent necessarily marked time, we have continued the useful work of welcoming and shepherding the immigrants who continue to arrive in the Dominion, though in greatly reduced numbers. Our thanks are due to the Methodist Brotherhood Overseas Bureau for advice forwarded of Methodist immigrants coming to the Dominion; to the Y.M.C.A., which renders good service to the Churches by the distribution on all incoming Home boats of letters of welcome and identification badges; and to those ministers and deaconesses who give their valuable time to the work of meeting the new arrivals and getting them into touch with our Church wherever they may be settling.

The latest advice concerning the policy of the Government is that the restrictions on immigration are to continue for the present, and in the meantime we must continue to serve the adherents of our Church who come to the Dominion seeking employment by using our resources to place them as speedily as possible. We are glad to say we have been able to absorb all those belonging to our denomination who have sought our help, and we know of no unemployed Methodist immigrants at the present time.

than the preceding year.

The exercise of greater care on the part of Trust Treasurers, and a fuller observance of our regulations by Superintendents of Circuits in filling in the property schedules would greatly lessen the task of the District Secretaries. In some cases incomplete schedules are returned, whilst balances brought forward from last year do not agree with the figures then reported. The same comment applies to amounts held for special purposes and to returns of mortgage debts. The figures in the Statement of Current Accounts showing loans repaid do not tally with the amount reported in the Statement of Debts as having been repaid during the year.

The total amount of Fire Insurances reported, namely £687,856 12s. shows that about a quarter of the Insurances are held outside the Connexional Office. There is room for improvement in this matter.

(1) It shall be lawful for a Trustee, unless expressly forbidden by the instrument (if any) expressly creating the Trust, to invest any Trust funds in his hands in manner following, that is to say:-

(a) In any of the stocks, funds, or other Government securities of New Zealand, or of the Commonwealth of Australia or any

State thereof, or of Fiji.

(b) On real securities in New Zealand.

(c) In the bonds, debentures, or other securities of any municipal Corporation or County Council, or Water Supply Board, or River Board or Road Board or Town Board or Electric Power Board in New Zealand having authority to borrow money.

(d) On deposit in any bank carrying on business in New Zealand under authority of any Act of the General Assembly, or in the Post Office Savings Bank established under "The Post and Telegraph Act, 1908," or in any savings bank constituted under "The Savings Bank Act, 1998."

For further particulars consult the "Trustee Act, 1908."

C.—REPORT OF CUSTODIAN OF DEEDS and AUTHORISED REPRESENTATIVE, 1927.

Full particulars of the registration and removal of names of Trustees were, as usual, sent to the various District Synods. Seven new Trusts have been registered, and alterations involving 375 names have been made in respect of 73 Trusts. All changes have been duly certified to the Superintendent Minister concerned.

Seven new Deeds have been received for custody. Certified Lists of Trustees have been supplied in 22 cases, apart from furnishing a large number of Certified Lists without charge to various District Land Registrars. The sum of £35 5s. received in registration fees has been paid to the Connexional Secretaryship Fund.

There are many Trusts on our Register that are not up-to-date. In some cases no change in the personnel has been made for a great many years. In a number of these cases Circuit Superintendents have been written to and urged to take up the matter, but the response has so far been disappointing.

From several District Land Registrars have come a number of requisitions for the surrender of Conveyances to be exchanged for new Certificates of Title under the Land Transfer (Compulsory Registration of Titles) Act, 1924. The new titles cannot be uplifted without payment of a fee of £1 5s. Many Superintendent Ministers have been asked to take the necessary action to enable us to secure the new titles, but only in three cases have the fees been forwarded. It is not desirable for these deeds to remain out of our custody, and those concerned are urged to facilitate the work of our office and of the Land Registration offices by paying the required fee upon request.

There is some negligence in the matter of forwarding the names of newly elected trustees for registration. It should be noted that when new trustees have been elected they have no legal status in a meeting of the Trustees until the names have been registered and the fact duly certified by the Authorised Representative.

REPORT OF CONNEXIONAL FIRE INSURANCE FUND, 1927.

The Board has pleasure in presenting to Conference its Annual Report, together with the Revenue Account and the Balance-sheet for the year ending 31st October, 1927.

The business of the Fire Insurance Department continues to grow, as will be seen by the fact that this year additional risks have been accepted to the amount of £26,310. These represent both new insurance and additional cover for properties previously insured with the Connexional Office. The risks we carried on 31st October totalled £513,006, distributed as follows:—

444 Churches.

128 Schools and Halls.

166 Parsonages.

130 Institutions, Dwellings, and other Risks.

In addition to the above, our Office has undertaken the insurance of the personal effects of 89 Ministers whose total cover amounts to £23,038. It has also arranged cover for £1,215 in connection with two mortgages held by the Fire Insurance Fund; and for a sum of £12,793 on account of sixteen clients of the Supernumerary Fund Board. Thus the Fund has arranged other insurances totalling £37,046, in addition to over half a million pounds on purely church property risks.

The matter of re-insurance has received careful attention, and some increases have been made in order further to safeguard the Fund Re-insurances of church property amount to £123,141.

It is gratifying to state that as the Connexional Fund was in these cases protected by re-insurances amounting to £835 the net loss to our Fund was only £72.

From the Fire Claims Trust Account a sum of £20 was paid to Normanby in connection with a loss sustained several years ago.

Grants Paid 1927.

In accordance with the resolutions adopted by last Conference, the Treasurers paid during the year to other Connexional objects grants totalling £700. The distribution was as follows:—Benevolent Branch Supernumerary Fund, £75; Church Sites Fund, £75; Foreign Mission Fund, £100; Home Mission Fund, £100; Deaconess House, £100; New Theological College Fund, £250.

Financial Statement.

The Revenue Account and Balance-sheet make interesting reading. The amount received as premiums on Church risks is £57 more than last year. The premiums on the insurance of the personal effects of ministers show an increase of over £14. One mortgage having been paid off, there is a decrease of interest on Mortgages, but an increase in Debenture investments of £2,237 during the year is reflected in an increase of interest from this source of about £148.

After providing for all working expenses, fire losses, re-insurances and Conference grants, there is a surplus on the year's working of $\pounds 2,152$ 17s. 3d. The assets of the Fund now amount to $\pounds 21,515$ 2s. 3d.

In view of less favourable conditions for re-insurances imposed by the Underwriters' Association, the Board does not consider it wise to recommend the distribution this year of more than £700, leaving £1,452 17s. 3d. to be added permanently to the Accumulated Fund.

METHODIST THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE.

A-PRINCIPAL'S REPORT, 1927.

- 1. The College opened on the third Monday in March, when the twenty-one men appointed by Conference were enrolled. Of these Mr. W. J. Court, owing to insufficient accommodation at the College, has resided at his home, but has attended all classes. Mr. R. H. Miles, having been granted a further year's rest by Conference, has not attended during the year. The arrangement initiated last year by which the students for the ministry of the Congregational Church receive tuition at our College has been continued, two students attending classes, and has worked satisfactorily.
- 2. While the men vary greatly in educational attainments and in capacity for systematic study, their devotion to work has been excellent, discipline has been loyally maintained, and sincerity and spiritual purpose have been evident in the whole life of the College. The residential Professor reports that, apart from slight ailments, the health of the students has been good.
- 3. At the close of last year the following awards were made: The "Edson" prize (Greek), the "Garland" prize (Theology, Bible Study, and Homiletics), and the Junior Elocution prize were all won by Mr. G. I. Laurenson. The second Greek prize was won by Mr. L. C. Horwood. Mr. C. O. Hailwood won the senior Elocution prize.
 - 4. The Course of Study for the year has been as follows:-
- (1) Systematic Theology.

- (2) Biblical Theology. (a) Old Testament. Weekly lectures by the Professor on The Nature and Attributes of God, The Development of Monotheism, Methods of Divine Revelation, the Covenant-relationship, Sacrifice, etc., etc. Textbook: Burney's Outlines of Old Testament Theology. (b) New Testament. The Theology of St. Paul. Textbook: G. B. Stevens "The Theology of the New Testament." (Part IV.) Weekly lectures by the Principal.
- (3) Biblical Introduction and Exegesis. (a) Old Testament. Weekly during first and second terms by the Professor on the Authorship, dates, composition, contents, literary style and interpretation of the Historical Books, and, for Exegesis, weekly lectures in the third term on the first five chapters of Genesis. (b) New Testament. Weekly lectures throughout the year by the Principal on St. Paul and his Age—the Times of the Apostle, his life, character, mind, and place in the world's life and thought. The Pauline Epistles, their occasion, authenticity, dates and contents. For Exegesis, weekly lectures throughout the year by the Principal covering a detailed study of Galatians and Second Timothy, with the general principles of Exegesis.

- (4) Homiletics. Two classes conducted by the Principal. (a) Senior. Practical and Pastoral Theology, with a study of Gillie's "The Minister in the Modern World." (b) Junior. A Course of Lectures on Sermon Preparation and Delivery, and on the conduct of Public Worship, with a study of Phillips Brooks' "Lectures on Preaching." (c) In addition to the above weekly criticism sermons have been preached, followed by discussion in class conducted by the Principal.
- (5) Methodist Law and Circuit Administration. A short course of instruction for third year men has been conducted by the Principal.
- (6) Greek. Senior. Two classes per week conducted by the Professor. Lectures on Syntax; reading of Matt. vi., I. John, Phil. ii., Rev. iii., Romans xi., Hebrews xii., also some papyrus remains and Lucian. Junior—Two classes per week conducted by Rev. W. T. Blight, B.A. Accidence and Syntax with translation of exercises. Textbook: "Initia Graeca." In addition to the above, two classes per week have been conducted by the Professor in Classical Greek for Matriculation and Junior Scholarship men.
- (7) Mental and Moral Philosophy. Weekly lectures by the Rev. A. B. Chappell, M.A. Brackenbury's "Primer of Psychology," has been used as a textbook. The aim of the tutor has been to prepare students for their own reading in after years, and to indicate how they may turn the study to good account in the work of the ministry. The textbook has been used as a point of departure, and the subject has been treated generally along the lines of a University course.
- (8) Comparative Religion. Fortnightly lectures by the Rev. A. B. Chappell, M.A. Textbook: Jevons' Cambridge Manual on the subject. Introductory lectures were also given to prepare for study of the set book. Discussions of Theosophy, Russellism, Eddyism, etc., have also been taken in class.
- (9) English. Weekly classes up to Matriculation standard. (1) In Grammar, Composition, etc. Junior and Senior Classes. Textbook, Nesfield's "Manual." (2) Literature. History of English literature from 1400 to 1740, with special study of Treble's "Extracts from English Prose," and portions of Stobart's "Shakespeare Epoch" and "Wordsworth Epoch."
- (10) Mathematics. Classes up to Matriculation standard have been conducted by Mr. C. R. Laws, M.Sc.
- (11) Elocution and Voice Production. A Course of Instruction has been given by Mr. T. Harris, professional elocutionist.
- N.B.—The Revs. A. B. Chappell, M.A., and W. T. Blight, B.A., have joined the College staff during the year and conducted classes as above, thus relieving the President of the Conference. Grateful acknowledgment is made of their most able and valued assistance.
- 5. The following are the particulars of University work done by students during the year:—

- Mr. N. R. Gutry, who passed for Matriculation last year, has attended University lectures in Education and Mental and Moral Philosophy. If successful in the Terms' examination he will proceed to the B.A. Pass in November.
- Mr. H. W. Hitchcock, who completed the Matriculation examination last year, has attended University lectures in History and Mental and Moral Philosophy. If successful in the terms examination he will proceed to the B.A. Pass in November.
- Messrs, H. Fallows, H. Noble, W. J. Court and J. W. Parker will sit for the Matriculation examination in December.
- 6. During the year the Rev. E. P. Blamires has delivered a course of three lectures on Young People's work and Sunday School organisation, and the senior students have visited certain graded schools in Auckland and handed in written reports to the Principal on their observations.
- 7. The students have rendered the usual considerable assistance in conducting services in the Auckland City, and in some adjacent country Circuits, for which in some cases financial acknowledgment has been made. They have also taken part in open air and city mission work as opportunity has offered, and in other ways they have been in touch with the broader religious life of our Church and of the city.
- 8. Dr. Ranston, as Residential Professor, has exercised a most efficient control over the residential affairs of the College, and has exerted a gracious influence in its inner life. And to Mrs. Ranston, who has been unremitting in her kindly attention to the welfare of the students, and has supervised the household arrangements with marked ability and economy the best thanks of the Church are due.
- 9. The Correspondence Classes, under the auspices of the College, have this year been under the direction of the Rev. W. G. Slade, M.A., who reports a roll of 24 students. Of these 18 entered in Theology, 18 in Bible Knowledge, 12 in English, 11 in Greek, 3 in Latin, 7 in Geography, 9 in History, 10 in Science, and 6 in Mathematics. The following have assisted Mr. Slade in giving tuition:—Revs. W. A. Burley, M.A., J. Richards, H. J. Odell, O. Burnet, G. E. Brown, E. W. Hames, M.A., L. A. Brooks and Mr. C. R. Laws, M.Sc. To Mr. Slade and his co-workers the College Council tenders its most hearty thanks.
- 10. The work of the Collegiate Church has been well maintained during the year. Most of the services have been conducted by the College staff and students. Messrs F. J. Handy and G. I. Laurenson have rendered excellent service as Student-Pastors. Particulars as to the reconstructed church will appear in the New College Report, and the financial contribution to the College funds from the Church will be indicated in the Treasurer's statement.

B.—REPORT OF COUNCIL.

1. Meetings and Organisation.

The affairs of the College, so the last Conference determined, should henceforth be managed by a Council, consisting of not more than 30 members, and meeting at least once a quarter. The personnel and officers of the Council were decided at the Conference.

The Council met for the first time on March 31st, 1927, and has met regularly since. While the New College is building it is necessary to meet more often than quarterly.

The Conference instructed the Council to set up, and appoint Chairmen for, various Committees, as well as a Board of Studies.

We have to report that the Board of Studies was appointed, with the Principal of the College as its Chairman. The Finance Committee has also been set up, and Mr. F. M. Winstone is its Chairman. The Council found, however, that it would be best to delay the appointment of the College and House Committee, and further, to ask the Plans Committee, a strong body, which has been at work since the New College Scheme has been under way, to act for the present year as the Property Committee.

The Committee of Discipline has also met, and has had before it only favourable reports as to the diligence, discipline, and progress of the students.

2. Personal.

The Council has been saddened in its first year by the passing of Mr. W. H. Worsley. Mr. Worsley was deeply interested in the work of the College, and his presence on the Council was greatly valued. The members expressed their deepest sympathy with Mrs. Worsley and the members of the family.

3. Gifts.

The Council has to acknowledge gifts of books to the College Library from Mr. A. Harding, Woodville; Mr. G. H. Bennett, Palmerston N.; Rev. S. Henderson, Te Aroha, and Rev. Dr. Pinfold, Wellington; also there was laid on the Foundation Stone of the New College a First Edition of the Methodist Hymn Book, donated by Mr. A. H. Reed, of Dunedin. For this thoughtful and distinctive gift the Council is most grateful.

4. College Bonds.

Two or three former students who have now left the work, have not so far honoured the Bonds into which they entered during their residence in College. This matter is being pursued by the Council.

5. Collegiate Church.

Conference placed the Collegiate Church and Sunday School under the sole control of the Council. During the year the Council has worked in complete agreement, as to the principle and details of the arrangement, with the Board of Management of the Church and the Teachers' Meeting of the Sunday School.

- 6. The Scheme for the Government of the Collegiate Church and its institutions as submitted by the College Council was unanimously approved by last Conference, and will be found in the Minutes of Conference, 1927, pp. 90-91. Attention is drawn to Resolution 1., p. 91, whereby the Scheme, in accordance with Section 247, par. 10, Methodist Law Book, is submitted to the Synods for confirmation. A Form of Resolution drawn up by the Committee appointed by Conference for this purpose will be sent to each District Chairman.
- 7. The Council has under consideration important matters relating to the staffing and management of the New College when opened and will report on these to Conference.

8. That this Council recommends the Conference to re-appoint Rev. Professor H. Ranston, M.A., Litt.D., as Residential Professor for another term of six years, or such portion of that time as may be found necessary.

11. That Dr. Ranston having intimated his desire to visit England, prior to assuming charge as Principal of the College, the Conference consents to such a visit, assured that it will be to the great advantage of the College, and requests the Council to make the necessary arrangements.

12. That as from 1931 there be two resident members of the Staff, the Principal and a Tutor, with such outside Lecturers as may be

found necessary.

13. That as the second house will not be required until 1931, an amount equal to the tender for such residence, plus the estimated cost of furnishing it, be invested as from April 1st, 1929, or as soon thereafter as possible, so much of the interest as may be required to be used to meet the Principal's house allowance.

- 14. That the Conference expresses its sincere sympathy with Mrs. Wagstaff, of Te Aroha, in her sad bereavement, and accords its appreciation of the generosity of the late Mr Wagstaff in leaving a legacy of £2000 to the Theological College.
- 15. That the Conference recommends the College Council to take steps to recover from ex-students of the College the amounts due by them to the College funds, in cases where no attempt has been made to fulfil their obligation.
- 16. That the matter of additional tuition in Elocution be remitted to the Board of Studies and Council for consideration.

GOVERNMENT OF COLLEGIATE CHURCH.

Further Details of Scheme for the Government of the Collegiate Church and its institutions and for its attachment to the Auckland East Circuit and the Constitutions and General Regulations of the Theological College and University Hostel, set forth on pages 90 to 96 inclusive of the Minutes of Conference, 1927.

1. Completed Form of Clause 1.

"That as from the 31st day of March, 1927, the work of the Collegiate Church and Sunday School shall be under the sole control of the Theological College Council, which Council shall have all the powers of a Circuit quarterly meeting in respect of matters provided by Paragraphs 27 and 24, 25, 26, 28, 29, 30, 31 and 32, Part I. Section II., under the heading, 'Special Circuit Meeting,' and (so far as applicable) by Paragraph 160, Sub-paragraphs (a) to (f) inclusive, Part IV., Section I., of the Book of Laws, under the heading of Local Offices and Courts-General."

2. Completed Form of Clause 4.

"That the Collegiate Church shall have its own Leaders' Meeting and other official meetings under the superintendence of the Principal of the College or his nominee, in whom (or his nominee) shall be vested all the powers which would otherwise be exerciseable by the Superintendent Minister of the Circuit in which such Church is situated in respect of matters provided in:—

- (a) "Paragraphs 17 to 32 inclusive of the Book of Laws, Part I... Section II., under the heading, 'Trial and Discipline of Members.'
- (b) "Paragraph 51, Book of Laws, Part II., Section I., under the heading of 'The Ministry.' By nomination through the Auckland East Circuit Quarterly Meeting.
- (c) "Paragraphs 174, 175 and 176, Part IV., Section VI., under the heading, 'Preachers' Meeting and Local Preachers.' Through the Auckland East Circuit Preachers' Meeting.
- (d) "Paragraph 101 (so far as applicable) of the Book of Laws.
 Part II., Section VIII., under the heading, 'Ministerial Duties
 Superintendent of Circuits.'
- (c) "Paragraph 112 (for the purpose of a Leaders' Meeting) of the Book of Laws, Part II., Section VIII. aforesaid.
- (f) "Paragraphs 190 and 191 of the Book of Laws. Part IV., Section VII., under the heading, 'Leaders and the Leaders' Meeting.'

3. Additional Clause No. 12, Page 91, and to be read with Clauses 3, 4, 5 and 6 and 18 of the Constitution and General Regulations.

The site for the College being Lots 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17 on plan deposited in the Land Registry Office at Auckland under Number 15537 of the Subdivision of part of Allotment 20, Section 3, Suburbs of Auckland, and being part of the land in Certificate of Title, Volume 317, Folio 145 of the Register Book of the Land Transfer Office at Auckland, being required by the provisions of Section 67 of The Reserve and Other Lands Disposal and Public Bodies Empowering Act, 1922, to be held under the provisions of the Model Deed, the Model Deed for the purposes of the Trust of the said site and in relation thereo, and for that purpose only be amended and varied as hereinafter set forth:—

- (a) By incorporating in Clause I. of the Model Deed and reading in conjunction therewith Clauses 1 and 2 of the Trust Deed set out on Pages 94, 95 and 96 of the Minutes of the Conference of 1927 (hereinafter termed "The Trust Deed").
- (b) By incorporating in Clause 8 of the Model Deed and reading in conjunction therewith Clause 4 of the Trust Deed.
- (c) By incorporating in Clause 29 of the Model Deed Clause 3 of the Trust Deed and reading the same in conjunction therewith.
- (d) By deleting Clauses 10, 11, 12, 14, 15, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 28, 30, 31, 32, 33, 36 and 37 of the Model Deed and substituting therefor Clauses 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 of the Constitution and General Regulations set forth on Page 92 of the Minutes of Conference, 1927, with the addition to Clause 7 of the proviso hereinafter added to Clause 7 by Paragraph 4 of these further details, and also Clause 10 of the said Trust Deed.
- (e) By substituting for the word "Trustees" wherever the same is used in the Model Deed, the words, "The Methodist Theological College Council."
- 4. Proviso to be added to Clause 7, Page 92— "Provided that in any case in which the College Council shall act as a Quarterly Meeting for the purposes and in the circumstances set forth in Clause 1, Page 90, the Principal shall be entitled to preside at such meeting during the consideration of business solely referable thereto."

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That the approval of the Conference of 1927 of the scheme for the control of the Collegiate Church and its relation to the Auckland East Circuit, and the constitution and general regulations of the Theological College and University Hostel set forth in pages 90-96 of Minutes of Conference, 1927, be confirmed, and that the further details submitted to the Synod, as per memorandum signed by the Rev. H. Ranston, M.A., Litt.D., President of the Conference, and chairman of the Theological College Council, be approved and adopted.
- That such alterations in the references to the paragraphs of the Book of Laws, in the further details of the scheme as may be necessary to make them conform to the new issue of the Book of Laws, be authorised.

D.—TRINITY COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY HOSTEL. INTERIM REPORT.

- 1. Since Conference good progress has been made with the erection of the New College. In May last the tender of Mr. C. W. Ravenhals of £34,160 for the erection of the College and two residences was accepted, and in June the Foundation Stone was laid by the Governor-General, Sir Charles Fergusson. An afternoon of radiant sunshine, the presence of His Excellency, together with the President, Vice-President, and Secretary of Conference and many representative citizens, and the attendance of a large and enthusiastic audience made the ceremony a most memorable one.
- 2. The dimensions and style of the building are now becoming apparent, and it is evident to all that an edifice worthy of our Dominion Methodism and an ornament to the City in which it stands will grace the old, historic site which has been so appropriately chosen for the College. The erection will be completed in ample time for the Opening Ceremony to take place at the Conference of 1929.
- 3. The removal and reconstruction of the Grafton Road Church and Schoolroom was a separate contract, and has involved a much greater expenditure than was anticipated. A very large portion of the woodwork of the church, which could not be seen till operations had begun, had to be renewed, and but a small amount of timber from the old school building was available for reconstruction work. Probably, when all expenses are met, including furnishings, £3000 will have been spent on this work. But the value of the premises in the practical training of the students completely justifies the expenditure.
- 4. The erection of the College is making heavy demands upon the financial resources of the Council, and it is most urgent that all available money should be collected and forwarded to the Treasurers. whole success of our great Scheme now depends upon the zealous prosecution of this task. So cordial was the reception accorded to the General Secretary during his canvass last year, and so deep and widespread the interest displayed in the College scheme, that the Treasurers feel assured that they will receive the most willing and thorough support of all ministers and local treasurers in this matter. It is especially desirable that the annual donations should be collected on the due dates, and that great care should be taken to ensure that the system of monthly collecting is working well. The Treasurers gratefully acknowledge all that has thus far been done, and they are forwarding to each Synod a Statement showing the amount originally promised, the amount thus far received, and the amount now overdue in the several Circuits.
- 5. A detailed Report covering the progress of the Scheme and including a full statement of finance will be presented to Conference.

Edson Trust.—That the Conference authorises the Methodist Theoloical College Council to promote a private Bill through the next session of Parliament to vary the trusts of the Deed of Trust of the Edson Trust Fund, dated the 28th May, 1918, in respect of the interest under the terms of such Deed of the Theological College, by authorising the application of the remaining portion of the Trust Fund in which the College is interested, and of the income thereof, in the following manner:—
 - Firstly, in appropriating and setting aside such portion of the remaining part of such Fund as the College Council shall deem desirable in providing for the future purchase of a new organ when the provision of the same shall be considered by the Council to be necessary, and, pending such purchase, in utilising such portions of the income from the investment as shall, in the opinion of the Council, be necessary or desirable for the upkeep, repair, and maintenance of the present organ, or in providing music, or in accumulating any unxpended portion as an accretion to capital.
 - Secondly, in applying the balance of the Fund and accumulated income in or towards the cost of erecting or furnishing the College Library, and of placing therein a suitable tablet to commemorate the gift of the late Mr. John Edson.

QUESTION XL.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Wesley Training College?

REPORT OF THE WESLEY TRAINING COLLEGE TRUST.

With thankfulness the Board reports another year of good work and progress. The various Committees have met regularly, and their reports submitted to the monthly meetings of the Board are business-like, and show a detailed care in administration.

Wesley College, Paerata.

The Rev. E. Drake, Chairman of College Committee. Wesley College is receiving recognition as one of the leading schools of the Dominion. A sound general education is given up to matriculation standard, while special emphasis is placed on practical and scientific agriculture in all its branches. Scientific instruction is given in a well-equipped laboratory, and the practical training is given on the

College Farm of 680 acres. The standard of education is steadily improving. Above all, the College aims at producing men of character, imbued with Christian ideals and a right understanding of civic responsibility.

Inspectors from the Education Department visit the College periodically, and their reports have been highly satisfactory. Twelve Maori boys are benefiting by the Government Scholarships granted annually. The Maori Purposes Board provide these boys with free tuition for three years, in addition to making an adequate clothing allowance for each boy. The ratio of one-third Maori pupils to two-thirds European continues to be highly satisfactory.

The Board invites the co-operation of the Methodist Home Mission Board, Native Ministers, teachers and others interested in obtaining approved Native pupils. 120 pupils are in residence in the College. Religious services and Bible Classes are conducted regularly by the Rev. F. T. Harris, College Chaplain and Superintendent Minister of the Pukekohe Circuit, and his influence in the College life has been most helpful. The Board is co-operating with the Board of the Methodist Children's Homes and Orphanages, and is prepared to extend further help to orphan boys of good character who have obtained their Proficiency. There is a need to provide children from our Auckland Orphan Homes with a secondary education such as is given at Wesley College, provided the boys prove themselves worthy. With a view to meeting this need, the Board has adopted the following Scholarship Proposals:—

"The Trustees of the Board of the Wesley Training College have pleasure in submitting for your information particulars in connection with special Scholarships which the Board has decided to establish at Wesley College, Paerata.

Recognising that some may desire to assist in the further development of Wesley College, Paerata, and at the same time to perpetuate the memory of some loved one, the Board will be pleased to award a number of annual Scholarships under the following conditions:—

A donation or bequest to the Trust of £1,000 will establish a Scholarship in perpetuity, which will be available to the following, or as may be directed by the donor:—

- To orphan or needy boys who are recommended as worthy by the Boards of Management of the Methodist Children's Homes and Orphanages of New Zealand.
- To the sons of parents resident in New Zealand whose circumstances would not permit them to pay ordinary fees for Wesley College.
- 3. To the sons of ordained Ministers, Home Missionaries and local preachers of the N.Z. Methodist Church.

Such a Scholarship would entitle the recipient to board and tuition as a pupil of Wesley College, and could be made available for three years or more if recommended by the Principal. Gifts or bequests of smaller amounts would enable the Board to award Scholarships which, while not securing free board and tuition, would materially assist boys whose parents could not afford to pay full fees.

If so desired, the founders of these Scholarships may select the name by which they wish the Scholarship to be known.

The trusts and purposes upon and for which the Board's lands and College are held are set out in the Methodist Charitable and Educational Trusts Act, 1911, and its amendments, and are for "the support and tokeep of an Institution or School for the maintenance and education of (a) Children and youth being descendants of the native or Maori race

of New Zealand; (b) Orphan or needy children and youth of any other race being British subjects, provided that the selection of applicants for admission to the said Institution, and the term during which they may enjoy the benefits thereof, shall be at the discretion of the Board; and provided also that moderate and reasonable fees may be charged and taken for maintenance and tuition in cases where there is ability on the part of parents or guardians to pay the same."

The curriculum of the College is on broad educational lines, and the

classes are suitably graded up to the Matriculation standard. tion, boys are given an industrial training in any one or more of the

following groups of subjects:-

Gardening, orchard-work, bee-keeping, and poultry management.
 Agriculture, dairying, and breeding and treatment of stock.

3. Technical and mechanical trades and crafts.

The religious education is such as is approved and directed by the

Methodist Conference of New Zealand.

The revenues derived from the Board's suburban lands are applied in terms of the Trust, in or towards the maintenance of the College at Paerata, which is conveniently situated 26 miles from Auckland. on a 700-acre block of land, and which has been developed into a magnificent model farm.

The Institution is not carried on for private pecuniary gain, but is maintained entirely for the benefit of the public. It is a general educational Institution, where the special subject agriculture is one of the branches of the general system of education carried on in the establishment, and the Trust is clearly inalienable.

The Trust is administered by a Board of 20 members, who are ap-

pointed by the N.Z. Methodist Conference, and whose services are entirely honorary. Many of its members have co sums to assist in the establishment of the College. Many of its members have contributed substantial

Statement as to the Trust.

The finances of the Board are such that for many years to come practically the whole of its resources will be required for the development of its suburban estates. The Board is therefore dependent on contributions in the form of gifts or bequests for the development of the College at Paerata until such time as further revenue is available.

It is interesting to note that so many of the best known Institutions in the British Empire have been established and developed through en-

dowments secured in the form of gifts and bequests.

It is the Board's wish to further extend its beneficial help to children who are passing through the various orphanages in the city, and the proposed Scholarship regulations have been adopted with a view to meet this need.

The above information is submitted to you in the hope that it may prove of interest to those who recognise the importance of a sound education based on Christian principles, and the need for further developing such Institutions in this young country.

Gifts and bequests made payable to the Board of the Wesley Training College Trust, Auckland, will receive public acknowledgment."

The general health at the College has been good. The Hospital erected during the year by Mrs. W. H. Smith in memory of her nephew, "Wm. Henry Caughey," has proved of great benefit in isolating cases of infectious sickness, thus preventing epidemics.

College Chapel.

Mrs. Smith has further shown her practical interest in the welfare of the young by offering to erect a College Chapel in permanent material to accommodate 250. This she is doing in memory of her husband, Wm. Henry Smith. The Board has gratefully accepted this munificent

gift, and rejoices that the name of Mr. Smith will be for all time associated with Wesley College. Plans are in course of preparation, and associated with Wesley College.

the building will be commenced early in 1928.

It has been found necessary to decline a large number of applicants for enrolment owing to lack of accommodation. From present indications the position will be the same next year, and plans have been prepared to provide what is needed, but lack of finance prevents further development at present. To accomplish what is needed at least £10,000 is required.

The loyal and efficient services of the Principal, Mr. R. C. Clark, M.A., Dip.Ed., and Mrs Clark are acknowledged and appreciated. The excellent services rendered by the Teaching Staff, the Matron, and others

at the College and Farm are also acknowledged.

Old Boys' Association.

An Association of Old Scholars has been formed. As the most important function of such an Association is to further the progress and interests of the College, the Board congratulates those instrumental in its formation.

The College Farm.

S. J. Ambury, Esq., Farm Supervisor. Area, 680 acres. are being used for grazing and cropping; approximately 80 acres are taken up by buildings, plantations, playing area. roads, gullies and land that cannot be cultivated.

Stock.

800 sheep besides lambs, 100 head of cattle, 6 farm horses, 30 grown The Farm is looking well, and continues to respond to regular treatment with suitable fertilisers. The area treated with modern methods of intensive cultivation has proved most valuable in the pracmethods of intensive cultivation has proved most valuable in the practical training of scholars. The lambing season has been a good one, and a satisfactory price is anticipated for wool. The season has been excellent for the production of dairy produce, which will largely offset the low prices which ruled during a considerable portion of the year. A pleasing feature of the Farm has been the gradual improvement in the quality of stock. The herd of pedigree Friesian cows is becoming well known among breeders, and is a credit to the Farm. A number of cows have been under official Milking Tests, and prizes for stock have been obtained during the year. The present outlook for farm produce is brighter than at this time last year, and an improvement in the financial result is confidently anticipated. financial result is confidently anticipated.

Properties.

Properties.

Mr. J. W. Shackelford, J.P., Chairman of Property Committee.

The Board's properties are in good condition, and are inspected frequently. The main subdivision of the Waikowhai Property is completed. A number of sections have been leased, and the property has been improved by the houses built. The sale of the Board's properties during the year has been disappointing. This is accounted for by the serious economic depression, which we believe is now behind us. The serious economic depression, which we believe is now behind us. lack of adequate transportation in the Roskill district has retarded the development of the Board's properties and the district as a whole. The Board is roading and developing its properties as expeditiously as the development and transportation services warrant. Nearly £10,000 has been spent on roading, developing and draining during the last three years. Two concrete roads have just been completed on the Mt. Albert Road Farm property.

Three Kings Property.

The northern frontage and the large number of sections on the western frontage are being offered for lease at an early date. the Three Kings property and the Grafton Road property are leased to

In connection with the subdivision of the Three Kings. good tenants. property, the Board has set aside, as a Public Reserve, the mountain known as the Big King, also a small bush area near Mt. Albert, One-Steps will be taken to give the necessary legal effect to hunga Road. this action, which has met with warm appreciation by the citizens of Auckland, particularly in view of the fact that the Big King is the only mountain in Auckland which has not been scarred by quarrying operations.

Finance.

Mr. Geo. Winstone, Jnr., Chairman of Finance Committee. report and balance-sheet for year ending 1927 will be submitted to Conference.

Gifts.

A sum of approximately £150 will be handed to the Trust at an early date by Major G. R. Hutchinson and Colonel C. T. Major, D.S.O., who are Trustees for the Maori Reinforcement Canteen and Comfort Fund. This Fund was established as the result of the public-spirited action of Major Hutchinson during the War, and will be known as the "Maori War Memorial Fund." The Annual Interest will be expended for the exclusive benefit of Maori boys at Wesley College. It is intended to provide a senior and junior agricultural prize, also a special prize for the best Maori pupil, character and qualities of leadership to be of primary consideration. The Board fully appreciates the sentiment attached to the Gift, and is grateful for this recognition of our

work for the Maori people.

During the year the Board has sustained a distinct loss in the passing of Mr. T. W. Jones. His loyal and efficient service to the passing of Mr. I. W. Jones. His loyal and efficient service to the Board, extending over many years, has been recorded. Mr. A. Trenwith has resigned from the Board owing to pressure of other activities. His faithful services are acknowledged. The Board recommends confirmation of the appointment to the Board of Mr. Wm. J. Holdsworth and Dr. H. Belshaw, M.A. (Cambridge), Professor of Economics, Auckland University. The services of all members of the Board are honorary. Members have attended regularly, and their good work is hereby acknowledged. The Chairmen of the various Committees have rendered praiseworthy services to this Trust and to Methodism. It is largely due to them that the Board has functioned efficiently and harmoniously.

Mr. Leonard Knight, F.P.A., the Managing Secretary, and the Board's Engineer, Mr. J. C. Simmonds, B.Sc., have rendered faithful and efficient service. Mr. Thos. B. Arthur is the Board's Agent and Valuer, and Messrs. Peak, Kirker & Newcomb are the Board's Solicitors.

WESLEY TRAINING COLLEGE TRUST REPORT FOR 1927.

The audited Balance Sheet for the year ending 31st December, 1927 shows a loss which is regrettable.

The loss on the Farm Working Account is £526 15s. 6d., compared. with £1,253 4s. 9d. the previous year. Stock has been taken on a conservative basis. The College exhibits of sheep, cattle and pigs were awarded prizes at the Auckland Provincial Show held last November. This should create an increment in value not disclosed in the stock.

valuation. The loss of £115 11s. 6d. on horses and cattle appears heavy, but is incidental to large farming operations. The cost of power £198 19s. 1d., an increase of £49 2s. 2d. The expenditure on seeds and manure is slightly lower. The gross profit on the Dairy is £1,068 19s. 0d., compared with £1,122 1s. 5d. for the year ended December, 1926; on sheep £1,457 7s. 4d., compared with £361 6s. 3d., which is accounted for by the substantial increase in the price of wool, and the good lambing season.

The loss on the College Account is £1,111 2s. 10d., a slight improvement only on the previous year. An additional £90 5s. 9d. has been written off for depreciation. The sums expended on provisions, fuel and light are substantially less than the previous year. Salaries at the College have increased by £616 13s. 6d. This is explained by the fact that the Board determined to have a first-class teaching staff and decided to offer salaries based on the Secondary School Teachers' Schedule. The items under the headings of Sports and Laboratories expenses, which amount this year to £158 15s. Id., will in future be met by a small levy on the pupils. The school fees received amounted to £4,799 5s. 8d., an increase of £643 12s. 2d. on the previous year.

Interest Account-

The total interest charges amount to £2,680 18s. 8d., an increase of £455 14s. This amount should be reduced in future as the Board has arranged a Long Term Mortgage for £20,000, with the Bank of New Zealand, for a period of twenty years at the rate of six per cent. per annum, thereby effecting a saving of one per cent. per annum or overdraft. The terms of the loan provide for the annual payment of interest and the repayment annually of a portion of the principal. The Deeds of the Grafton Road and the Paerata properties have been lodged as security.

Properties .-

The rents received amount to £4,023 18s. 5d., which is £44 0s. 11d. higher than the previous year. The money spent during the last three years in the formation of roads, drainage and other improvements to the properties, is mainly responsible for the Board's indebtedness to the Bank of New Zealand. Such expenditure was the outcome of a definite policy to develop the suburban properties. The sale of these properties during the year has been disappointing. This is accounted for by the serious economic depression experienced, and the inadequate passenger transport services in the Roskill and Mt. Eden districts. As a result of these conditions, sales have slumped and a number of sections sold have had to be given up by purchasers who have been unable to fulfil their obligations. The subdivision of land at Orakei and surrounding districts near the new railway outlet has depressed the property market in other suburbs. Provided the transport problem is satisfactorily settled, sales should be effected on the Three Kings, Waikowhai and Mount Albert Road properties, which should in the near future largely offset the high annual interest charges. The properties are in the hands of several Agents and no effort is being spared to effect sales. An auction of leases on the Waikowhai property will be held at an early date.

Balance Sheet-

Loans on Fixed Deposits amount to £17,160, an increase of £3,275. Practically all the sums under this heading are from Methodist Connexional Boards.

The live stock, produce and sundry stocks at Paerata amount to $\pounds 4,659$ 2s. 7d., an increase of $\pounds 475$ 14s. 2d. on the valuation of the previous year.

It is noteworthy that the Capital Account shows a substantial increase as a result of the gift of the Memorial Isolation Hospital and the profit on sales of the Mount Albert Road property.

It has been found difficult to keep down expenditure at the College

and on the Farm, as the requirements and improvements necessary in the establishment of a first-class institution are considerable.

A close inspection of the administration will reveal that full value has been obtained for the money expended. Nevertheless, it is unsatisfactory that annual expenditure should exceed income, and the Board will be asked to consider at its next monthly meeting certain proposals calculated to effect improvement in this direction.

SECONDARY EDUCATION.

Report.

The Committee set up by the Conference of 1927 to consider the question of secondary education for Methodist young people has met several times and studied the suggestion carefully. Every known source of information has been investigated. The educational and economic details have been critically examined.

The Committee is strongly of the opinion that something should be done, but feels that further investigation should be made. A difficulty is seen in the fact that the State makes wide provision for such instruction. Then the existence of good denominational schools to which some of our young people go is a factor to be reckoned with. Also, by reason of the geographical nature of the Dominion, such schools as we might establish would be regarded as too far away

for some scholars to attend.

Notwithstanding these difficulties, the Committee is convinced that something should be done. Letters have been sent to all Circuit Superintendents and to some Departmental Officers. With one or two exceptions the replies were favourable. Difficulties were pointed out, and they are indicated in the preceding paragraph. There is a general consensus of opinion that a Maori Girls' School should be instituted at the earliest possible opportunity. Then again schools in each Island for girls and boys respectively—one for each Island—are recommended.

The Committee feels that the matter should be taken up by the Conference in a practical way, and submits this report, recommending

that such action be taken.—A. ASHCROFT, Convener.

The Report was received and adopted.

QUESTION XLI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Connexional Funds?

1. SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

A.—REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGEMENT, 1927.

In presenting the Annual Report to the Conference, the Board desires to place on record its sense of loss through the death, during the year, of the Lay Treasurer, Mr. W. H. Seed, who, with singular devotion and high ability served the interests of the Supernumerary Fund. It presents to his widow and family very sincere sympathy in their sorrow and prays that Divine consolation may be their portion in their bereavement. The Board elected Mr. George Bowron as Lay Treasurer, and with the approval of the President, appointed Mr. H. P. Lawry, S.M., to fill the vacancy in its membership.

Annuitants, Etc.

During the year we have had reported to us and have recorded the death of three supernumerary ministers who were annuitants on the Fund, also of two wives of supernumerary ministers. Two of the deceased ministers leave widows as annuitants. The last Conference added two ministers to the list of Supernumeraries. There are now 31 Supernumeraries and 42 widows who are annuitants on the Fund,

whilst two orphan children are in receipt of benefits. Satisfactory medical certificates have been presented by three widowers in the active work upon notification of their intention to re-marry.

Finance.

The Revenue Account and Balance-sheet, du'y audited, are presented herewith. By direction of Conference the accounts were closed on 15th December, hence the period covered by the financial statements is only 50 weeks. The statements set forth the income and expenditure for the period named and also the character of the investments. It will be noted that the total income for the period was £11,790 13s. 8d., and the expenditure £7766 19s. 11d. A profit of £984 13s. 9d. resulted from the sale of Inscribed Stock and this sum has been added to the Investment Fluctuation Reserve Fund. A sum of £4023 13s. 9d. has been added to the Accumulated Funds. These now amount to £131,889 0s 7d, and with the Reserve Fund of £2476 8s 2d make a grand total of £134,365 8s. 9d. The sum of £273 8s. 4d. has been transferred from the Reserve Fund to meet a loss of that amount incurred in the sale of a property mortgaged to the Board.

Of the assets a sum of £102,100 is invested on mortgage, bearing interest at rates ranging from 5½ to 7 per cent.; £29,595 10s. is invested in Government and Local Body securities at interest varying from 4 per cent. to 6½ per cent. The debentures earning 4 per cent were taken over from Australia at the time of separation, and these will very shortly The interest earned for the period under review is £7707 9s. 8d., being an average of £6 0s 3d per cent on the mean funds for the period of 50 weeks or £6 4s 9d per cent per annum. Interest earned exceeded all payments for annuities and furniture grants. penses of management have been £308 8s. 11d. The total amount paid as annuities is £7168 17s. 1d., and as furniture grants £240. An amount totalling £11.860 10s. 10d. has been lodged with the Supernumerary Fund Board by the Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund, the Deaconess Retiring Fund, the Benevolent Fund, the Military Camps Fund, the Removal Expenses Fund, and the South Island Methodist Orphanage.

The Board recommends that in future the accounts be closed on 30th November of each year.

Bequest.

During the year the Board received advice that the late Mr. William Penrose, of Dunedin, had left a legacy to the Supernumerary Fund. The amount has since been ascertained to be £1643 8s. The Executors in the estate have already paid the sum of £643 8s. and the balance of £1000 is expected to be shortly available. This is the first legacy received by the Board, which greatly appreciates the kindly thought of the late Mr. Penrose for the ministers of the Church.

The Board recommends that Conference approve of placing £1200 of the bequest to the Investment Fluctuation Reserve Fund and the balance to the Benevolent Branch of the Supernumerary Fund.

Subscriptions in Arrears.

The personal subscriptions in arrears, and interest thereon, amounted to £662 13s. 6d. at the date of the balance. This amount included sums due in lieu of circuit levies by ministers who are resting. The following table shows the district distribution of the arrears:—

In addition to the foregoing the sum of £400 2s. 5d. is owing for the purchase of benefits and interest thereon. No circuit levies were unpaid at the close of the financial year.

VALUATION OF FUND AND INCREASE OF BENEFITS.

As reported to the Synods, attention has been given by the Board to the request of Conference for a new valuation of the Fund with a view to ascertaining whether it be possible to increase the annuities. The Board reports as follows:—

"That having given full consideration to the recommendation of Conference (Minutes 1927, p. 103, Resolution 5), the Board, in the light of Mr Muter's former reports on the balance-sheets up till December, 1923, and of the warnings he conveyed; in view also of the fact that the rate of interest earned is not likely to increase, and that the existing scale of benefits assumes that there will be no losses sustained by the Fund; and in view further, of the steady increase of benefits since the New Zealand Fund was separated from the Australasian Fund in 1912, the Board expresses its emphatic conviction that the time has not arrived to incur the expense of a new valuation of the Fund."

The foregoing resolution was adopted after consideration of the facts tabulated below:—

PROGRESSIVE BENEFITS.

1st Jan., 1912.-N.Z. Fund separated from Australasian Fund.

1st April, 1913.—Annuities increased by 15 per cent. Second wives admitted without extra payment.

31st Dec., 1917.—Valuation on 4 per cent basis showed deficiency of £4346.

1st April, 1920.—Further increase of Annuities 15 per cent, or 17½ per cent on original scale. £8,000 paid into the capital of the Fund. Ministers' Subscriptions and Circuit Levies increased.

31st Dec., 1920.—Valuation at 4 per cent showed deficiency of £21,746.

Valuation at 5 per cent showed surplus of £70.

1st April, 1920.—Bonus added to 1913 scale of 10 per cent. Total increase of Annuities over 1913 scale of 433 per cent. Furniture Grants increased £30 to £50, and £50 to £75.

Annuity 40 years, 1912 rate, £118 3s 10d; 1920 rate, £169 18s 0d. Annuity 44 years, 1912 rate, £144 10s 0d; 1920 rate, £207 14s 4d.

Extracts from Mr Muter's Valuation Report, dated Feb. 7th, 1924. Surplus on 5 per cent basis of valuation—£2,774.

"Five per cent interest is a high rate to assume, except for a limited period; and the surplus, £2,774, while quite satisfactory, is a small one, and demands for further increases based on its existence

should be firmly resisted by the Board.

"A high rate of interest is being earned, and the Fund is apparently very ably managed; but the results of this do not belong exclusively to the present Annuitants, but to all the members, and the surplus should be accumulated with the object of continuing the bonus indefinitely."

Mortgages.

The fall in the price of primary products experienced last year and the consequent reduction of land values, and the depression through which the country has been passing, have considerably reduced the value of some of the securities held by the Board. By judicious and careful handling the Fund has been safeguarded against any serious loss, but to provide against possible contingencies the Board recognises the necessity for building up the Reserve Fund as opportunity may permit. Close attention has been given to several cases that were giving concern to the Board, and our position has been strengthened by sanctioning the sale and transfer of several properties on satisfactory terms.

The Board has recognised the necessity for a modification of the rule relating to the amount of loan to be advanced so that arrangements may be made for a larger advance than our regulations now allow when mortgages are foreclosed.

The Board therefore asks the Conference to amend the law relating to "Limitations" concerning investments (as per Law Book, page 139, Rule 9 (b) by an addendum as follows:—N.B.—"Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the foregoing Regulation, when a property is sold as the result of a foreclosure of mortgage, the Board may arrange with the purchaser for a larger amount than three-fifths of the then current value to remain on mortgage, and to make the best arrangements possible in the circumstances."

Homes For Supernumerary Ministers.

The matter of propounding a scheme for providing homes for Supernumerary Ministers is dealt with in a separate report attached hereto.

Military Camps Fund.

In August last the Board received from Mr. C. M. Luke the credit balance in the Military Camps Fund to be administered as directed by Conference in the interests of ministers who may suffer disabilities as the result of their war services (Minutes, 1926, page 127). The amount received was £612 19s. 4d., to which is now added £11 0s. 8d. for interest since earned. As directed by Conference £75 was paid to Mr. W. A. Watson, leaving a sum of £549 in the Fund.

Consideration has been given to the case of the Rev. F. T. Read and the Board asks that this be favourably considered by a conjoint meeting of the Conference Military Committee and the Conference Super-

numerary Fund Committee.

Ministers Engaged in Military Service.

The question of making special provision for ministers and probationers who were engaged in military service is dealt with in a special report attached hereto.

Benevolent Fund.

Benevolent grants amounting to £189 have been made by the Board to nine different persons, chiefly widows in receipt of very small annuities. The income from this branch of the Fund is derived chiefly from interest on investments and deposits, a grant from the Fire Insurance Fund, and donations. The total assets of the Fund are £1133 14s. 1d.

Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund.

The position of this Fund is disclosed by the statement of Receipts and Expenditure and the Balance-sheet. The sum of £470 12s, has been paid to ten Home Missionaries, and one agent from the Foreign Mission field, who have retired from the work. An outstanding refund of £13 5s, due to the Home Mission Fund has also been paid.

During the year a statement has been sent to each Home Missionary showing the amount standing to his credit in the books of the Fund. Out of a reported surplus of £770 in the Fund a bonus of £9 per annum from 31st December, 1922, to 31st December, 1926, was placed to the credit of each Home Missionary who had, on the latter date, completed seven years of service. The total amount allocated as bonuses was £522, distributed as follows:—Thirteen men, £36 each; one man, £27; three men, £9 each.

The assets of the Fund have increased by £752 12s. 11d., and now stand at £5411 1s. 5d.

Deaconess Retiring Fund.

During the year retiring allowances amounting to £104 8s. 11d. have been paid to four deaconesses who have resigned from the work. Nine contributors to this Fund are in the Foreign Mission field, four in the Maori work, and six are attached to circuits and missions. The contribution made by and on behalf of Deaconesses in the Solomon Islands is £30 per annum in one case, and £40 per annum in eight cases. The contribution for Deaconesses working in our Maori and European circuits is only £10 per annum.

The cash statement shows an income of £1816 0s. 5d. The sum of £1708 8s. 5d. is invested with the Supernumerary Fund Board.

The Board has considered in co-operation with the Deaconess Committee, the question of making better provision for Deaconesses when they retire from the work.

New Offices.

Efforts have been made, but without success, to secure sufficient tenants to warrant the Board in proceeding with the erection of the proposed new Connexional Offices in Worcester Street. The house and garage on the property are still let. The Board has secured by deed a right-of-way ten feet wide running along the western boundary of the property.

2 That the Revenue Account and Balance-sheet of the Supernumerary Fund, the Cash Statement and Balance-sheet of the Benevolent Branch of the Fund, the Cash Statement and Balance-sheet of the Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund, and the Cash Statement and Balance-sheet of the Deaconess Retiring Fund and the Cash Statement of the Military Camps Fund be received, adopted and printed in the Minutes.

3. That the Conference tenders its sincere sympathy to the widow and family of the late Mr. W. H. Seed, and places on record its high appreciation of the services he rendered to the Supernumerary Fund with singular devotion and ability as a member

of the Board and as Lay Treasurer for many years.

4. That the Conference expresses appreciation of the generous bequest of the late Mr. William Penrose, of Dunedin, to the Supernumerary Fund, and tenders to Mrs. Penrose and her family its sympathy in their bereavement.

5. That the Conference approves of the proposal of the Board to place £1200 of the Penrose Bequest to the Investment Fluctuation Reserve Fund and the balance to the Benevolent Branch of the

Supernumerary Fund.

6. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Board of Management for its services during the past year, and that the following be the members for the ensuing year:—The Connexional Secretary, Revs. W. Baumber, J. Guy, S. Lawry, W. Greenslade, and Messrs. George Bowron (Treasurer), A. F. Drayton, A. Borrows, P. W. Sharpe, H. W. Heslop, H. P. Lawry, and the Rev. A. N. Scotter, B.A.

7. That the Board be authorised in future to close the accounts of the

Fund on November 30th in each year.

8. That the following Addendum be added to the law relating to "Limitations" concerning investments (as per Law Book, page 139, Rule 9 (b): "N.B.—Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the foregoing Regulation, when a property is sold as the result of a foreclosure of mortgage, the Board may arrange with the purchaser for a larger amount than three-fifths of the then current value to remain on mortgage, and to make the best arrangements possible in the circumstances."

9. That the Supernumerary Fund Board be empowered to erect the new Connexional Offices when it deems the time opportune, provided that the proposal for such erection be approved by a 75 per cent vote of the Board—the plans and specifications of the proposed building to be submitted to the Church Building and Loan

Fund for consideration.

10. The Conference places on record its appreciation of the long and faithful services rendered to the Church by Mr. J. C. Prudhoe, and directs that a letter conveying this appreciation be sent to Mrs. Prudhoe.

B.—SPECIAL REPORT.

ON HOMES FOR SUPERNUMERARY MINISTERS.

Earnest and sympathetic consideration has been given to the recommendation of the Taranaki-Wanganui Synod regarding the provision of homes for ministers on their Superannuation. It is fully recognised that changed economic conditions have rendered more acute the difficulties of providing for home acquirement by ministers upon relinquishing active service. The whole question has been viewed from various angles and the suitability of several schemes has been considered.

The Board recognises that many ministers find their resources well taxed in paying subscriptions to the Supernumerary Fund as well as in meeting life insurance premiums and other commitments. It feels that the success of any scheme for home acquirement for supernumeraries would depend upon the subsidising by the Church of the personal payments of ministers. An increase in Connexional levies upon the circuits is felt to be at present undesirable. Unless assistance can be secured from some other Connexional source it does not appear practicable to inaugurate any Home Acquirement Fund.

If the ministers would pay a small quarterly subscription of, say, \$1, and the Fire Insurance Board would subsidise such payment by a contribution of, say, 10s. per quarter for each minister subscribing to a Home Acquirement Fund, a sound scheme would be practicable.

The tables given below set forth clearly the amounts that would be produced by the quarterly investment of varying sums at the rate of 5 per cent. and 6 per cent. per annum, and the two examples given illustrate the prospective benefit that would accrue in the course of time

The above calculations are made on the assumption that payments would be made yearly in advance, but as the contributions are paid in quarterly instalments not in advance, the periods named in the tables above would be exceeded by several months. The results tabulated would, of course, be subject to some reasonable deduction to cover office working expenses.

The net results to be anticipated would probably be somewhere in the vicinity of an interest earning basis of five and one-half per cent. more or less. Obviously this depends entirely upon the rate of interest in the future, though at the present value of money the result would probably be very close to a six per cent. basis.

Subject to the above considerations the probable benefits accruing

will be made clear by the following examples:-

- 1. A minister having paid £4 per annum with a £2 subsidy from the Church, for 40 years and then becoming a permanent supernumerary would, on a 5 per cent. interest earning basis, be entitled to receive approximately £724, and on a 6 per cent. basis, £928. If he paid £6 per annum, plus the subsidy, he would receive approximately £966 on a 5 per cent. basis and £1238 on a 6 per cent. basis.
- 2. A minister dying after having paid £4 per annum, with a £2 subsidy from the Church, for say, 30 years, his legal representatives would be entitled to receive on a 5 per cent. basis approximately £398, and on a 6 per cent. basis £474, whilst if he paid £5 per annum, plus the subsidy, the amounts would be £465 or £553 according to the interest earning basis.

We therefore recommend:-

- 1. That a "Ministers' Home Acquirement Fund" be formed, to which ministers joining such Fund would pay a subscription of not less than £4 per annum on the understanding that the Fire Insurance Board agrees to make a contribution of £2 per annum for each subscribing member of the Fund.
- That if the scheme now suggested be approved by the Conference the following be the rules and regulations of the said Fund:—

Rules and Regulations.

- 1. The name of the Fund shall be "The Ministers' Home Acquirement Fund."
- 2. The chief object of the Fund shall be to assist in providing homes for ministers when they become permanent Supernumeraries.
- The Fund shall be managed by the Board of the Supernumerary Fund, subject to the direction of Conference.
- 4. The Treasurers of the Supernumerary Fund shall be the Treasurers of the Fund.
- 5. The Board shall keep the accounts, have them audited annually, and shall submit to each Conference a financial statement and report as to the position of the Fund.

6. The income of the Fund shall consist of:-

- (a) A subscription of not less than £4 per annum payable by each member of the Fund.
- (b) A contribution of £2 per annum for each member of the Fund from the Fire Insurance Fund.
- (c) Interest from the investment of the funds.

(d) Voluntary donations or bequests.

(e) Moneys derived from any other source,

- 7. Members of the Fund may contribute on a larger scale than £4 per annum and thereby secure a proportionately larger benefit, but such larger contribution shall not carry any increased subsidy.
- 8. Every probationer admitted into the Methodist Church of New Zealand after the date of the establishment of the Fund, shall as a con-

dition of admission, become a member of the Fund. Every Minister or probationer received prior to the said date may at his option become a member of the Fund. Any minister, who, after the said date may be received into full connexion withthe Methodist Church of New Zealand in the terms of paragraph 81 of the Law Book, or on transfer for another Conference, may at his option become a member of the Fund.

- 9. The personal subscriptions of members and the contributions of the Fire Insurance Fund shall be due in equal quarterly instalments on the last day of March, June, September and December of each year. Personal subscriptions shall be forwarded to the Treasurers direct by members of the Fund, and it shall not be obligatory upon the Treasurers to issue accounts for subscriptions falling due.
- 10. The interest upon payments to the Fund shall be calculated every year at the average rate realised on the investments of the Fund for that year, and shall be compounded yearly.
- The working expenses of the Fund shall be a charge upon its income.
- 12. Should the examination of the Fund from time to time disclose a surplus from forfeited benefits under Rule 22 below; or from sources indicated in Rule 6, clauses (d) and (e) then such surplus shall, after setting aside a Reserve Fund as the Board may deem desirable, be used to increase by bonus, pro rata, the amount standing to the credit of members of the Fund provided that only the interest derived from sources indicated in Rule 6, clauses (d) and (e) shall be available for bonus distribution.
- 13. The Board shall settle all claims in connection with the Fund, and in case of any dispute arising regarding any payment the decision of the Board shall be final.
- 14. A certificate shall be issued by the Treasurers of the Fund to each member showing the amount to his credit at the end of each third year after the end of the year in which the Fund was first instituted.
- 15. The Board shall hold a portion of the funds in liquid securities so as to have available sufficient to provide for all probable claims and shall invest any balance in securities of the same class and under the same conditions as are provided in respect of the Supernumerary Fund subject to the provisions laid down in Rule 17 below.
- 16. The Board shall have power to borrow from time to time any sum of money that may be required for the effective carrying on of the Fund, and to give security in the name of the Fund for the payment of principal and interest or other charges upon the Fund.
- 17. The Board shall have power to invest with any approved Permanent Building Societies any sum or sums belonging to this Fund, provided that not more than £5000 in the aggregate shall be invested with any one Building Society.
- 18. Any member of the Fund may obtain a loan, subject to the approval by the Board of the purpose to which the proposed loan is to be applied, at any time after he has completed ten years' contributions to the Fund, but such loan shall not exceed one-half of the amount standing to his credit in the books of the Fund. Interest on the amount so borrowed shall be paid half-yearly at the current bank-rate, and all personal contributions shall continue to be regularly paid on the due dates. In default of interest being promptly paid interest on arrears shall be charged at the rate of 7½ per cent.

- 19. A member of the Fund shall have the right, should he so desire, after having completed thirty-five years' service in the ministry, to receive the amount standing to his credit in the books of the Fund provided that the amount so received shall be applied for securing a home for his use upon becoming a permanent supernumerary.
- 20. If any member of the Fund is appointed to a Connexional Office, Institution or Department where a home is not provided by the Connexion he shall have the option of drawing the amount standing to his credit in the books of the Fund.
- 21. If a member of the Fund dies before becoming a permanent Supernumerary the amount standing to his credit in the books of the Fund shall be paid to his legal representatives.
- 22. Any member of the Fund ceasing to be a Minister or probationer of the Methodist Church of New Zealand for any reason other than ill-health shall be paid only the amount of his personal contributions with compound interest thereon, or otherwise in special cases as the Board may determine. In the event of retirement through ill-health the member shall be entitled to the full benefits of the fund.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That the Conference having sanctioned the appropriation by the Fire Insurance Board out of its profits of such sum not exceeding £250 per annum as may be required to make a contribution of £2 per annum for each subscribing member of a Ministers' Home Acquirement Fund, such appropriation to be for the next seven years commencing on April 1, 1928, a Ministers' Home Acquirement Fund be established as from the said date, to which Fund Ministers joining the same shall pay a subscription of not less than £4 per annum. It is understood that the Fire Insurance Board shall review the position prior to the expiration of the period named and shall report thereon to the Conference.
- That the Rules and Regulations of the Fund, as set forth in the Report, be adopted.
- 3. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Board and especially to its lay Treasurer, Mr. George Bowron, for the painstaking study given to the question of the Acquirement of Homes for Superannuating Ministers, and for evolving the scheme now adopted by the Conference.

C. SPECIAL REPORT

ON

MINISTERS AND PROBATIONERS WHO ENGAGED IN MILITARY SERVICE.

Ministers Suffering War Disabilities.

The Board has given full consideration to the recommendation of Conference concerning provision for ministers suffering from war disabilities. The Board has no accumulated capital from which it can make a grant to supplement the amount in the Military Camps Fund.

The Board asks attention for the following facts relating to minis-

ters and probationers who engaged in military service:-

- (1) In the year 1919 forms for medical Reports were sent to each Minister and Probationer who in any capacity had been engaged in military service. Not counting those who have since died or resigned from the ministry, sixteen reports were filled up by duly qualified medical men and returned to the Secretary of the Supernumerary Fund Board. These are filed in the office.
- (2) The medical Reports show that in the judgment of the medical men ten cases showed "no permanent disability." In six cases there was more or less disability which might affect the period of ministerial service. Three ministers and three Probationers did not return the medical forms, and it may be assumed that in these cases there was no serious disability.
- (3) To add in each case a year of annuity for each year of military service not exceeding three would require a total sum of £1747 11s 3d. The amount required for each individual, and for each class of individuals, is set out in the accompanying tables.
- (4) It may be assumed that in cases where 40 years' ministerial service is rendered, there is no disability for which it is necessary for this Board to make provision. The difference in the annuity for thirty-seven years and forty years' service is £22 9s.
- (5) It may be worth while to call to remembrance the fact that with the exception of those chaplains who were receiving salaries from their circuits as well as military pay, all Ministers and Probationers had their personal subscriptions as well as the Circuit Levy paid into the Fund during each year of service, and consequently there was no loss of status in their relation to this Fund.
- (6) In several cases a considerable period was spent in the Training Camps, where conditions were hardly likely to add materially to the risks of health. In addition to those named in the Tables, Revs. H. Daniel and R. B. Gosnell spent some time as Y.M.C.A. secretaries, but there is in their cases no medical report.

In the light of these facts the Board makes the following recommendations:-

- That the Conference affirm the principle that no exceptional provision be made:—
 - (a) For those ministers whose medical report in 1919 disclosed no permanent disability;

(b) Who failed to supply any medical report;

(c) Whose period of Ministerial Service covers forty years or more.

- 2. That the Conference authorise the Supernumerary Fund Board to transfer from the Military Camps Fund to the General Supernumerary Fund the sum of £481 14s 10d, that being the amount required to secure three years' additional annuity for the five ministers named in Table 1 as showing War disabilitites, and as not being disqualified under the preceding suggestion, and that in each case three years be added to their status in relation to the Supernumerary Fund.
- 3. That no additional annuity provided under number 2 shall operate so as to secure to anyone therein referred to any larger annuity than that named in the regular scale (including bonus) for a Minister of forty years' service.

N.B.—The adoption of these recommendations will leave a balance of £67 5s 2d in the Fund to meet special cases.

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These figures show a decrease of 12 on the previous year.

The number of births reported during 1927 has been in excess of those removed from the Fund owing to reaching the age limit, and we estimate that there are 226 claimants at present.

As directed by Conference, we have paid £100 to the estate of the late Rev. A. Reader.

The Circuit Levies for the year were £1998 9s 2d, and outgoings £1960 8s 6d, leaving a balance on the year's working of £38 0s 8d.

We are of opinion that payments will be in excess slightly of the Circuit Levies this year, but we suggest that the Levy be the same as last year—8½ per cent.—and the difference could be paid out of the credit balance of the Fund.

10. That the expenses of the Supply in the Blenheim Circuit for Rev. F. Bateup be paid according to the rule in the case of Disabled Ministers, half by the Contingent Fund and half by the Home Mission Fund, for such time as is necessary.

 That the Treasurers, the Rev. W. G. Slade, M.A., and Mr J. H. Blackwell, be thanked for their services and re-appointed.

4.—REMOVAL EXPENSES FUND REPORT FOR 1927.

The Committee work of this Fund for 1927 has been comparatively light, and it would have been much lighter still if those who are most concerned in its payments had given ordinary care and seen to it that Rule 10 was complied with, viz.:—"All accounts for removal expenses shall be submitted to the Treasurers with vouchers." Neglect of this Rule throws a deal of correspondence work upon the Treasurers, and they intimate their intention to be less lenient on this point in future.

This is the third year of the Fund's working. It was anticipated at the inception of the Fund that the first five years would be largely an experiment. It is, therefore, recommended that the levy again be 2 per cent. on stipends and £4 per annum on Departments for each Minister employed.

The year commenced with a credit balance of £1430 3s. 3d.; this now stands at £903 7s. 3d., with £416 13s. 11d. outstanding (this, of course, is a perfectly good account) at September 30th, 1927.

The money is held as follows:—£700 11s. 6d. on deposit with the Supernumerary Fund Board; £202 15s. 9d. at the Post Office Savings Bank; and a current account balance at the Bank of New Zealand.

The total cost of removals in 1927 was £850 3s. 11d. The sum of £234 17s. 11d. was advanced to Ministers removing, and the accommodation was much appreciated by those concerned.

The balance-sheet will be presented at Conference.

The Committee feels that too great a responsibility is thrown upon it for decision in the 1927 Conference Resolution No. 2 with regard to paying for the removal of motor cars, viz.—"Except in exceptional cases, to be determined by the Committee." The Committee recommends the deletion of this clause of the resolution, as in its judgment this is a matter for the Circuits concerned to deal with.

The question of sleeping berths, as referred back by Conference for reconsideration by your Committee, has been inquired into. The Committee again recommends that a Minister's wife and little children be granted the expense of a sleeper on the train when the removal necessitates the full journey being taken between Auckland and Wellington provinces.

The following are recommended as the 1928 Committee:-Revs. W. Greenslade, the Minister of Durham Street Church, A. Liversedge, H. L. Blamires, B. J. James, H. J. Odell.
Messrs. A. A. Sandford, M. Kershaw, Frank Thompson, W. Dobbs,

H. W. Heslop, and C. A. Newman. Treasurers—Rev. B. J. James and Mr. A. A. Sandford. Convener—Rev. B. J. James.

QUESTION XLII.-What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Foreign Missions?

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS-REPORT FOR 1927.

Semi-Jubilee.

The year 1927 is notable as the semi-jubilee year of the Mission in the Solomons. It has been commemorated by special services both in the Home Church and on the Mission Field. The Deputation from New Zealand to convey the greetings of the Church in the home-land to the Native Church consisted of the Rev. A. N. Scotter, B.A., Secretary of the Conference, and Mr. J. W. Court, Missionary Treasurer. Mr. and Mrs. N. J. Jenkins represented the Missionary Society of Australasia. The celebrations on the Mission Field were of a most successful character, reports of which have appeared in "The Methodist Times" and "The Open Door." The official report of the Deputation will be presented to Conference.

Dr. E. G. Sayers.

The outstanding event of the year has been the outgoing of our first doctor to the Mission Field. After a successful career at the London School of Tropical Medicine, Dr. Sayers returned to New Zealand, paid a flying visit to the chief centres in connection with the Young Men's Bible Class Movement, and then left with the Deputation for the Solomons. Reports already received describe the large numbers of natives who are flocking to the doctor for advice.

The erection of the Helene Goldie Hospital as a base of operations for Dr. Sayers must soon be undertaken. The sum of £1600 is in hand for this purpose, but at least £2500 will be required. A special appeal for the medical work must be made next year.

Dr. Clifford James.

Early in the year Dr. Clifford James left for England to enter the London School of Tropical Medicine. Dr. James has passed the School examination with distinction, and has gained the Diploma of Tropical Medicine. He is remaining for a period to gain further experience in England and in the East. On 'vis return to New Zealand next year he will visit the chief centres in the interests of the medical work of the Mission and later in the year will leave for the Mission Field.

Nurse Edna White.

Nurse Edna White, who was dedicated at the last Conference, left soon after for the Solomons, where she is already rendering much valued service.

Missionaries on Furlough.

The Rev. and Mrs. H. G. Brown are now on furlough in New Zealand on completion of their first term of service in the Solomons.. Mr. Brown is acting as Députation in the South Island, and will return to the field early in the New Year.

Sister Lina Jones is also on furlough after three and a half years of service at the head station at Roviana. Miss Jones has done excellent work in introducing modern kindergarten methods into the Mission schools. After the usual furlough she will return to her work at Roviana.

Death of Mrs. Chivers.

On April 8th Mrs. E. F. Chivers, the wife of our late engineer, passed away in the Solomons, as the result of an attack of black-water from which she was the first white worker to die on the field during the whole history of the Mission. Mrs. Chivers was greatly loved by the natives and the white workers, and her death on the eve of her return to New Zealand was particularly sad. Mr. Chivers, after several years of valuable service on the Mission Field, has returned to New Zealand and entered into business.

Rev. W. W. Avery and Deputation Work.

While many persons both ministerial and lay have rendered assistance in connection with Deputation work, special mention must be made of the work of the Rev. W. W. Avery. The Eltham Circuit very generously released Mr. Avery for a month for Deputation purposes, his Circuit work being taken by a student from the Theological College. Very favourable reports have been received from the Circuits visited by Mr. Avery, and the best thanks of the Missionary Society are tendered to him for valuable help given.

Deputation for 1928.

The Revs. A. A. Bensley and A. H. Cropp are due for furlough in 1928. Definite dates for their furloughs have not yet been arranged. but it is expected that Mr. Cropp will be the Deputation for the North Island where there has not been a Deputation from the Field for two years.

Native Boys and Wesley College, Paerata.

Early in the year Belshazzar Gina and Silesi Fotu, boys from the Solomons were received into Wesley College, Paerata. The education of these boys in New Zealand is regarded as an experiment and results will be carefully watched. Satisfactory reports have been received of their progress and conduct.

Publications.

The circulation of "The Open Door" and "The Lotu," is being well maintained. The quarterly issue of "The Open Door" is 5250 copies, and of "The Lotu" 6250. Considerable improvements have been effected in "The Lotu," the number of pages having been increased and a dash of colour introduced on the cover page. It is hoped that the improvements in the paper may lead to an enlarged circulation and its introduction into every Sunday School.

Moving Pictures.

The motion picture "The Transformed Isle" has been much in demand during the year. The new motion picture "Tonga To-day" has been exhibited in several places, but it has not been used sufficiently to make it remunerative. The Board will shortly be considering some method of making more constant use of these pictures.

Story of the Mission.

The story of the Solomon Islands Mission is being written by the Rev. J. F. Goldie. Progress is being made with the work, and it is hoped that the manuscript may be ready for submission to the publishers during the next year.

Special Gifts.

In addition to legacies, a special gift of 10 shares in the C.S.R. Co. has been received from an anonymous donor; the income from the shares to be devoted to the medical work. Another special gift of £100 has been received from a subscriber who wishes to remain anonymous. In this case the interest is to be returned annually as "In Memoriam, the late E. H. Penny, Blenheim." To all these donors the thanks of the Board of Missions are tendered.

Finance.

The amount received by the General Treasurers up to October 17th is £7547 10s. 10d. This is £500 more than was received at the same date last year, but remittances in 1926 were exceptionally late. The following special amounts have been received:—Grant from Waikawau Trust for electric light at Senga, £150; Anonymous gift of Farmers Trading Co. debentures, £100 (cashed by F.T. Co.), and the following legacies: the late R. W. Neal, Onehunga, £50; the late W. F. Cheverton, Timaru, £366 13s. 4d. (part payment); the late Rev. John Smith, Auckland, £10; the late Eliza Ward, Tai Tapu, £25; the late E. Holdgate, Timaru, £50.

Thanks.

The best thanks of the Board of Missions are tendered to all who have assisted our Missionary work either by monetary contributions or service rendered. Without the aid of a large body of voluntary workers in the Circuits, the work on the foreign field would soon come to a close. Special mention must be made of the splendid service rendered by the Women's Auxiliaries.

The General Treasurers, the Rev. G. T. Marshall and Mr. J. W. Court, have carried out their duties in their usual efficient manner.

THE TREASURERS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31st. 1927.

The Treasurers of the Methodist Foreign Missionary Society of New Zealand beg to present the following summary of the financial statements presented to the Annual Meeting of the Board.

The income of the General Fund from New Zealand contributions is £11,800 17s. 11d., being nearly £800 more than last year, but £1200 less than the amount asked for at the last annual meeting. The Sclomon Islands District was asked to contribute £4000, and has reported an income of £4519 7s. 11d., which is £240 more than was raised in 1926.

The expenditure in the Solomon Islands has increased from £14,985 in 1926 to £16,448 16s. in 1927. The expenditure in New Zealand has increased from £1911 to £2311 19s. 1d., the increase being due to the larger sum that has had to be paid for interest. The year's working shows an unfavourable balance of £2149 11s. 6d., and this, after credit has been taken for £408 17s. 9d. interest charged to Banga Plantation account but not collected. The deficiency on the general fund is now £3487 10s. 4d.

Legacies and contributions to special objects amount to £1831 7s. 4d. Particulars of these sums and of the funds to which they are allocated appear in the various statements presented to the Board and will be printed in the annual report.

The Banga Plantation account shows an increased income from sales of produce, the amount being £1241 18s. 9d. The deficiency on the year's working is £267 16s. 11d. Interest to the amount of £408 17s. 9d. has been added, bringing the total deficit to £8837 11s. 10d.

A new house has been built in Bilua at a cost of £964 0d. 9d. This includes installation of electric light, tanks, concrete drainage, etc. Of this amount £710 has been paid. The remainder may be demanded at any time.

The Balance Sheet shows the Capital Account to be overdrawn to the extent of £252 15s. 4d.

6. (a) The Conference having carefully and prayerfully considered the work and the financial position of the Missionary Society, rejoices in the reports from the Mission Field telling of spiritual blessings and advance, is deeply impressed with the urgent need of entering the many open doors, particularly in Bougainville, and while recognising the difficult state of its finances, is not prepared to recommend to the Church retrenchment and withdrawal of workers, but with a firm faith in God and confidence in the missionary spirit of the Church challenges the Church in New Zealand to face its responsibility for the evangelisation of the people of the Solomons, and by prayer, sacrifice and effort provide the necessary means for carrying the work to a triumphant conclusion.

The members of the Conference consecrate themselves afresh to the sacred task committed to them, assured that God is able to make all grace abound to those who faithfully obey and cour-

ageously serve.

(b) That a letter signed by the President of the Conference be sent to every Minister, Home Missionary, and Circuit Missionary Secretary calling their attention to the financial condition of the Missionary Society and urging that every possible effort be made to increase very considerably the missionary income this vear.

(c) That selected Ministers and Laymen be appointed by the District Missionary Committees to assist in deputation work and organising

in the Circuits.

(d) That in view of the rapidly growing need of our Solomon Islands Mission and the need for extensive and intensive work in that field the Conference directs that a special missionary effort be made throughout the Connexion in 1929 with a view to raising permanently the missionary spirit of the Church.

(e) That the Rev. J. F. Goldie be released from the Solomons for the greater part of the year to assist in this appeal.

(f) That the Board be instructed to give special attention to the arrangements for such special effort, and that a report be presented to the Synods setting forth its propaganda.

7. Helena Goldie Hospital-

(a) That the Helena Goldie Hospital be erected at Royiana on a site

to be selected by the Chairman and Dr. Savers.

(b) That the Chairman of the District, in consultation with Dr. Savers, present to the Board a comprehensive report on the proposal for the erection of the Helena Goldie Hospital, together with plans and specifications of the building; that after receiving a satisfactory report, plans, etc., the Board be authorised to proceed with the scheme.

(c) That the Medical Fund be called "The Medical Mission and Hospital Fund."

(d) That decision as to Dr. James' headquarters be deferred until he has been able to visit Choiseul and Bougainville, and in consultation with the Chairman and Dr. Sayers recommends to the Board, through the Synod, a medical policy for that portion of the Mission Field.

(e) That the Chairman be communicated with regarding the possibility of obtaining a subsidy for the medical work to be carried

on by Dr. James.

8. That the Mission Synod be directed to consider the question of constituting Bougainville and Buka a separate Circuit, and to recommend any adjustments in appointments involved.

 That a Conference Missionary Committee be appointed to sit during the sessions of the Conference, to consider—

(a) Missionary income from the Circuits.

(b) Circuits failing to forward missionary money promptly.

(c) Methods of organisation at the Home Base.

(d) Arrangements for deputation work.

The Committee to consist of Chairmen of Districts, District Secretaries, Members of Women's Auxiliaries who are members of the Conference and such others as may be appointed.

- 10. The Conference expresses its hearty appreciation of the valuable work of the Women's Missionary Union and the Women's Auxiliaries and thanks all who have assisted during the past year. It urges all Circuits to establish branches of the Auxiliary, and where this is not possible, to hold at least one meeting of women during the year in the interests of missions.
- 11. The Conference endorses the recommendations of the Women's Missionary Conference with regard to the establishment of a Girls' Training School in the Solomons as soon as financial provision can be made.
- 12. That during the year plans of the school be obtained together with the estimated cost of building, equipping and staffing the school.
- 13. The Conference thankfully acknowledges the valuable work already done in the translation of portions of the Scriptures and requests the Mission Synod to give careful consideration to the possibility of supplying the native church in the near future with further portions of the Scriptures in the native languages, and asks that a report on the whole question of the translation of the Scriptures be presented to the next annual meeting of the Board of Missions.
- 14. That our educational policy in the Solomons receive special consideration during the year. That steps be taken to collect information of the needs and conditions in the whole field and the work at present undertaken; and that missionary educational methods in other lands be studied; with a view to a clear policy in educational work.
- 15. That the question of guardianship of any orphan or other native child being vested, not in any individual worker of the Mission, but in the Mission authorities, be referred to the Mission Synod for consideration.
- 16. That the thanks of the Conference be tendered to the Rev. A. N. Scotter and Mr. J. W. Court for valuable services rendered as the special deputation to the Mission Field in connection with the semi-jubilee of the Mission.
- 17. That the following addition be made to Paragraph 7 (Furlough Regulations): That when deputation work is not undertaken (except for medical or other satisfactory reasons) furlough shall be three months.
- 18. That the question of making representations to the Australasian Commonwealth Government and the High Commissioner in Fiji with regard to Governmental responsibility for educational and medical work in the Solomons be given careful consideration by the Board during the year.

METHODIST WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION-REPORT FOR 1927.

There are 41 Auxiliaries affiliated with the Union. We are glad to report that during the year Dannevirke, Te Awamutu, and Fitzroy, New Plymouth, have linked up.

The membership stands at 2522, showing an increase of 151.

Extension Work.

An effort has been made to give effect to the resolution of last Conference. Several Churches have been approached with the hope of forming Auxiliaries, the only result being the three mentioned, who have affiliated. Woodville, Foxton, and Bunnythorpe have formed Branches, and work in conjunction with Palmerston North.

Box and Card Circle.

This work has gone steadily on. Miss Waddingham has placed 156 boxes and 73 cards. The income from this effort is £62 10s. 5d., a very gratifying result.

Literature Department.

Very fine work has been done through this Department. The Secretary has despatched 1037 Sisters' letters during the year. These letters are a source of inspiration, and to a very large extent supply material for Auxiliary meetings.

Box Department.

This Department is doing very valuable work. The packing of the boxes by the Depots is very gratifying, the contents of the boxes being much appreciated by the workers in the field. The value of the boxes despatched to the Solomons is £352 10s. 6d. Medicines also have been sent to the value of £100.

Parcels frequently go to Sister Elinor Dobby, which are of great value in her work. Parcels also go to Sister Netta Gittos and Mrs.

Wharehuia at Te Kuiti.

Missionary Sisters.

During the year Sisters Grace McDonald and Edna White have joined the staff of Sisters working in the Solomons, making a total of nine. Their devotion and splendid service is much appreciated.

Sister Elizabeth Common, who was on furlough during the year, has

returned to her work.

Sisters Elinor and Netta Gittos are doing excellent work as Maori Deaconesses, and are seeing very fine results to their labours, especially with the Maori women and children.

Miss Vivian Adkin is still receiving training at Deaconess House,

and hopes to leave for the Solomons early next year.

Finance.

The Treasurer shows the receipts for the last year as £2057 16s.

QUESTION XLIII.—What are the Resolutions of Conference on the Home Mission and Church Extension Fund?

HOME MISSION REPORT FOR 1927.

Under the blessing of Almighty God the work of the Department is being steadily consolidated and developed along the lines laid down by Conference.

The Standing and Special Committees have been enthusiastic and

diligent.

The Board has met quarterly to review the work of the Committees

and to consider their recommendations.

The attendance of members at all Committee meetings has been satisfactory. Deep interest has been manifested in all phases of the work which Conference entrusted to the Board.

The General Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent have had many interviews with District Chairmen, and have also held conferences with the District H.M. Committees and Executives. They have visited numerous Circuits and Stations where difficult problems in Circuit organisation, etc., existed, and have, in consultation with the Chairman concerned, helped forward their solution. They have also given special emphasis to the Inspirational and Educational side of Deputation work.

Staff.

Our H.M. Staff was considerably strengthened at the beginning of the Connexional year. Later in the year three single H.M. Probationers retired, and two candidates were received on probation. have also been two changes in our "supplies." With these exceptions the Conference appointments have been observed. There are no important vacancies at present, but there will be an urgent need for at least twelve additional single agents early in the New Year. District Synods are requested to take up this matter seriously. believe that we have the young men we need in our N.Z. Church, and that they would offer for the work if they received sufficient encouragement from the local ministers and officials. There are also in our Sunday Schools many promising lads who should be encouraged to exercise their spiritual gifts and to look forward to taking up the work in future years.

Spiritual Advance.

The Spiritual Advance Committee's report, as adopted by the

Board, is as follows:-

The Spiritual Advance Committee happily and eagerly took up the responsibilities entrusted to it. We are confident that the work of the Committee is being definitely used by the Holy Spirit to awaken and intensify among our members a sense of the need of greater spiritual vitality in the Church.

While no special Evangelist has been employed during the year, evangelistic missions have been held in very many places strengthening Christians, and winning numbers of others, especially young people, to God. It was while assisting in one such mission that our veteran brother, Rev. Wm. Ready, was called to the higher service of the Lord Whom he had served so long and faithfully. We tender our sincere

sympathy to the widow and family.

Early in the year the Conference resolutions on Spiritual Advance were collated, and forwarded to Superintendents of Circuits. We submit that a more general adoption of these important resolutions is essential to the highest interests of a Spiritual Church, and of the

Kingdom of God.

The Committee gratefully testifies that indisputable evidence exists of stimulus received by numbers of our people through the study of the campaign pamphlets issued during the year. Urgent requests for additional supplies encourage the belief that permanent good is being accomplished. The Committee tenders its best thanks to the

writers of the pamphlets.

The preparation of a suitable booklet for candidates for membership in our Church has been given serious consideration by the Committee. Among other publications, Milne's "Meaning of Membership in Methodism," and Blamires' "Shall I Join the Church," were examined. They were both regarded as so admirably covering the position, that the Committee, in cordially recommending them, does not contemplate issuing another booklet on the subject while these are available.

The publication of a series of tracts for general distribution, to combat the influence of some present-day errors in religious teaching, and to help mould the thinking of those contains the Church on spiritual

matters, has engaged the attention of the Committee. While realising the service such a tract campaign could accomplish, the Committee has not at present sufficient data to proceed with the publication of such a series. The matter is, however, receiving further consideration.

Much thought has been given to the Programme of Spiritual Advance for 1928. The Committee realises that the Spiritual Advance activities of the past few years are of permanent spiritual value to our Church and people. We affectionately urge upon ministers and people whole-hearted acceptance of the lines of action already determined, but at the same time strongly advocate a further definite step in Spiritual Advance during 1928, by well-organised deputational visits of Ministers and Laymen, to every church and important preaching place in all our Circuits and Home Mission Stations.

We recommend:-

- (a) That where practicable each District H.M. Committee Executive or May Synod shall appoint, as soon as possible after Conference, small Deputations, consisting of Ministers and Laymen, who shall specially aim at the deepening of the spiritual life of the Church, and at decisions for Christ. It should be the aim of each Synod to draw as many Ministers and Laymen as possible into this Deputation work.
- (b) That an itinerary be drawn up in each District covering most suitable periods of the year, allotting meetings and speakers. In each case it is advisable that the Deputation be composed of speakers outside the bounds of the Circuit or Circuits to be visited.
- (c) That, as the whole aim of the visit of the Deputation is spiritual stimulus, it should be preceded by a period of prayerful preparation on the part of the members of the Deputation and the people to be visited.
- (d) It is suggested that such subjects as the undermentioned should form a basis for the addresses and appeals of the Deputations:—
 "Spiritual Fellowship." "The Importance of Church Membership,"
 "Attendance at Fellowship Meetings, at Prayer Meetings, and at the Observance of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper," "Decision for Christ," "Individual Work," "Work for Young People," "The Training of Local Preachers." Processions of Witness where possible, and Covenant Services could be held on Sundays. The signing of Dedication Cards could be encouraged at places visited during the week.
- (e) That each District make its own financial arrangements to meet the expenses incurred.
- (f) That the Home Mission and Contingent Funds each make a grant up to £50 to the Spiritual Advance Committee.

Maori Work.

This is dealt with in a separate Report.

Literature and Colporteur.

The Literature and Colporteur work is progressing satisfactorily and will be systematically developed as finance permits.

Distribution and sales direct from the office are increasing.

The Van is still carrying out its Mission and forms a suitable base for two colporteurs.

The Colporteurs' itinerary for this year touches most of the Morth Island Districts. Independent reports from the Districts already show that good inspirational and propaganda work is being accomplished, while, of course, the educational value of the Literature being distributed is incalculable.

Finance.

The year has been a difficult one for our Treasurers. In 1926, the commercial depression not only depleted our income, but also increased the demands made upon our Fund. A strenuous effort has been made this year to bring the income up to the necessary level. Many Circuits are joyfully making great sacrifices for the H.M. Fund, but, unfortunately, some Circuits still seem to treat the appeal merely as an unwelcome Conference imposition.

RESOLUTIONS.

- That the request of the Rev. E. T. Olds to be allowed to return to Circuit work this year be granted, and that we express appreciation of his devoted and highly successful services during his term of three years as Assistant Superintendent of the Home Mission Department.
- That the office of Assistant Superintendent be left vacant for one year, and that the Home Mission Board be instructed to recommend through the Synods a suitable appointment to the next Conference.
- That suitable arranagements be made for expert office assistance, and that £250 be placed on the estimates for this purpose.
- 4. That the Conference expresses its appreciation of the splendid results achieved in connection with the 1927 Home Mission appeal. It recognises the effective work done by the Deputations, and the generous response of our people throughout the Dominion. It desires to thank especially those of the Maori members of the Deputation who at considerable sacrifice freely gave their services. The Conference also tenders its thanks to our people who extended hospitality to the travelling parties.
- 5. That in view of the fact that the present financial depression throughout the Dominion is causing heavy demands to be made upon the H.M. Fund by struggling Circuits and H.M. Stations, and that no Maori deputation party will be available this year, every Circuit and Home Mission Station be requested to make at the earliest possible date, in consultation with the District H.M. Committees, complete detail arrangements within the Circuit, to ensure the raising of the H.M. estimate.
- 6. That a circular be sent to all ministers and Circuit officials, calling attention to the fact that the figures placed in the estimates of H.M. Income represent the minimum amount that should be raised by each Circuit, and that if these amounts be not forth-coming, embarrassment must unavoidably result, and the future development of our Church be jeopardised.

- 7. That in all cases where a financially dependent Circuit or Home Mission Station contemplates a large increase in Circuit expenditure (such as is involved in the purchase of a car or any other new method of working), the Quarterly Meeting concerned shall, before committing itself to such proposal secure through the Chairman of the District, the sanction of the District H.M. Committee.
- That no unmarried probationer be appointed to a Circuit that has a furnished parsonage, until the financial aspect of the matter has been reported on by the H.M. Board, or the Conference H.M. Committee.
- 9. That the codified statement of the rules and regulations governing the appointment and work of Home Missionaries as published by the Home Mission Department be approved, with the exception that the words in clause 16 "except in special cases" shall be deleted.
- That the H.M. Board confer with the District Committees in Wellington, Christchurch and Dunedin re the establishment of Methodist Hostels for students and others.
- 11. That the Home Mission and Foreign Mission Boards confer during the year on the issue of Collecting Books and Missionary Boxes, which should serve the two funds.
- 12. Amendments to the Book of Laws.—That the word "standard" be substituted for the word "minimum" in clause 23, page 127, of the new Book of Laws.
 - That clause 22, page 127, be referred to the Home Mission Board for consideration and report to Synods and Conference.

Literature and Colporteur.

That the Conference express its gratification at the measure of success already achieved in the Literature and Colporteur work. It endorses the policy of steady development which is being pursued by the Board. It trusts that our members and well-wishers will heartily support this important branch of our work, so that it may become more and more effective year by year.

SPIRITUAL ADVANCE.

General Resolutions.

- That all ministers, officials, and other church workers be strongly urged to concentrate, with careful thought, prayer, and enthusiasm, their best efforts upon the vital spiritual work of the Church.
- That all ministers and workers in our churches be urged to give themselves to Personal Evangelism, as the most effective method of bringing home to the people the claims of Jesus Christ.
- 3. That we pledge ourselves to do something definite along the lines of personal advocacy for the Saviour during the next twelve months.
- 4. That more definite and frequent appeals for immediate decisions, and for reconsecrations, be made in the ordinary services.
- That greater emphasis be placed upon the spiritual value of the Communion and Covenant Services.

6. That Church Membership Preparatory Classes be given a prominent place in the yearly programme of each church, and that public reception services be held at least once a year.

That the Conference expresses its high appreciation of the efficient services rendered by both the General Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent, and that they be heartily thanked.

That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the General Treasurer, Rev. G. Bond, for his invaluable services, and that he

be reappointed.

That Mr J. Veale be reappointed Lay Treasurer.

That Mr. W. Ambury be heartily thanked for his services as acting Lay Treasurer and Book Steward, and that he be reappointed acting Lay Treasurer during Mr. Veale's absence.
That the Rev. W. T. Blight, B.A., be thanked for his efficient services

as corresponding secretary.

That the Revs. W. B. Scott and H. Ryan be cordially thanked for their very valuable services as Editors of the Home Mission and Spiritual Advance columns in the "Methodist Times."

INVESTMENTS TRUST BOARD RESOLUTIONS.

- 4. That the following persons be appointed as Members of the said Board, and, as such, authorised to be incorporated under the name of "The Methodist Home Mission and Church Extension Investment Funds Board":-George Otto Blakey, Walter Ambury. Walter Samuel Stone and Edgar Osmond Chivers.
- 5. That the present Trustees of the Investment Funds and Securities of the Home Mission and Church Extension be requested to transfer to the Board all investments and property now held in their names.

QUESTION XLIV.-What is the State of the Maori Work, and What can be done to Promote its Interests?

HOME MISSION BOARD'S REPORT ON MAORI WORK.

There arises every day fresh evidence of the fact that our work and prayers of faith are not in vain; for God is steadily leading our Maori people upward towards higher ideals and better modes of life. While from some standpoints, no doubt, our progress is pathetically slow, yet those who have the true perspective are praising God for the undoubted advances that are being made in most of our Mission Districts.

Maori Workers' Conference,

During the last week in September a Conference was held in our Auckland Central Mission Buildings. With one exception all our The Senior Superintendent, Rev. R. T. Haddon, Agents were present. presided.

A list of very searching questions as to the Message and Mission of our Church, and how these can best be given and carried out, had been carefully prepared, and this formed the basis of serious and earnest Our present general policy was unanimously approved and some new methods of work were inaugurated. It is safe to say that every member went away with clearer conception of, and greater confidence in, our Methodist principles and objectives.

In connection with the Maori Conference a very successful Demonstration was held in the Auckland City Town Hall. Great interest was manifested. Special seating arrangements were made, and over 3000 people were present. The function was unique and effective.

Deaconess Work.

Deaconess work is undoubtedly one of the most important branches of our Mission operations. No words of ours could do justice to the fine work of this sub-department. Our Deaconesses are deserving of our highest appreciation and thanks. The Young Women's B.C. Union continues to support one Deaconess, the Women's Missionary Auxiliary supports two and is ready to support a third. The Sunday Schools have been requested to support at least one Deaconess. Could not

other institutions or individuals also assist in the same way? We need a staff of at least fifteen Deaconesses if our historic Mission Districts are to be worked effectively. The prestige of our Mission gives exceptional opportunities to our workers in this Department to mould the lives of the children of the remnant of the Maori race.

King Country Hospital.

This institution still continues to meet a real need, and its influence is felt over a large area. But finance has been more difficult this year. The Matron desires to thank the kind friends who have sent gifts of various kinds.

Education.

The splendid type of education given to our lads at Wesley College is becoming more generally appreciated by our Maori people. The policy of the College Board is now completely in harmony with our policy in the Maori Mission Field. There is every prospect that the work of the College will assume increasing importance in our Mission activities.

Students for Native Ministry.

Two promising young men are being trained with a view to their becoming candidates for the Ministry.

Students for Deaconess Work.

The two European Students designated for Maori Work are continuing their special course of training in Christchurch under the guidance of the Deaconess Committee. Two Maori Students have been recommended for a three years' course of special training in Deaconess House.

Maori Girls' School Fund.

Some £3522 is held now in trust by the Treasurers of the H.M. Department. This money is interest bearing. Subscriptions continue to come to hand from time to time. The Women's Missionary Auxiliary has been, and is, the main support of this Fund. It is hoped that the way will soon be clear for a special appeal to be launched for the purpose of suplementing the fund sufficiently to enable a new educational scheme to be adopted in the interests of our Maori girls.

Literature and Colporteur Work.

A further revised edition of 2000 copies of our Maori Service Book has been published. It includes not only the form of prayer, special prayers, and an excellent selection of hymns, but also a very comprehensive catechism. This new book is undoubtedly the best of its type that has yet been produced.

Through pressure of other work and lack of finance it has not been possible this year to develop the general literature work amongst our Maori people as much as we desired to do, but special attention will be given to this phase of the work in 1928.

The King Country and the Drink Traffic.

The drink traffic is the arch-enemy of the Maori race. We are still watching closely the efforts being made by interested Europeans to open up the King Country to the Drink Traffic. The fact that the present law does not completely prohibit is used as a lever for the introduction of license. Yet no argument could be more absurd, for we find that there is more illegal sale of liquor in most other Maori

Districts than in the King Country. All our workers agree that the legalised traffic increases the demand for liquor to such an extent that, in addition to all the misery caused by the great quantities of drink supplied legally by the hotels, there is also more illegal sale of liquor to the Maori people in license than in no-license areas. Hence for practical, as well as sentimental, reasons, we stand by the chiefs of the King Country in their solemn demand that the Government keep inviolate the ancient sacred prohibition pact.

Finance.

The Maori Mission has had, since the amalgamation of the Maori and Home Mission Funds, and always must have, the first call on our H.M. Funds. This financial burden on our Church is a very heavy one, but it is unavoidable if we would be true to our historic obligations. We are convinced that the expenditure is more than justified, and that no other Church or organisation is securing equal results for the money The only unsatisfactory feature is the failure of our tribes to render much systematic financial support to the H.M. Fund. of their contributions are swallowed up in local working expenses. This difficult problem is, however, economic rather than religious. other Maori Missions and social organisations, indeed, all Maori organisations whatsoever, find this problem almost insoluble. Our workers faced the question splendidly at their recent conference, and all readily undertook to do their utmost to improve the position. We are satisfied that all that can be done without injury to greater issues will be done in this matter.

Co-operation.

It would be well to restate in this report what we have so often stated hitherto. The Maori Mission must of necessity be carried financially by the whole Church until, in co-operation and fellowship with the local pakeha Circuits, our Maori members and officials learn more of life's possibilities and responsibilities. Our Maori members must not only be shown the path, but someone must walk with them The only practical way to stabilise our work and secure satisfactory results, with less expenditure, in any district, is to develop the fullest possible co-operation between the European and Maori work, however uncongenial this may be locally to either pakeha or Maori or Apart from such co-operation we must struggle on as at present, winning a good measure of success, socially and spiritually, but carrying an almost dead financial weight. However, we rejoice in the fact that, in spite of all difficulties and a good deal of passive resistance in certain quarters, the spirit and practice of co-operation, so absolutely vital to real and permanent success, are steadily developing and extending. There is moreover at stake in this matter a fundamental principle. Religion should be a unifying factor; not, as it too often has been, a devisive one. While every other educative influence is drawing Maori and Pakeha into closer fellowship and common citizenship, the Church must not allow herself to become the tool of any reactionary party by setting Maori and Pakeha interests over against Methodism at least has not so learned Christ. give ourselves with ever increasing earnestness and zeal to the realisation of this ideal.

School for Maori Girls.

That the Home Mission Board confer with the Women's Missionary Union and the Young Women's Bible Class Union, with a view to investigating the possibility of establishing at an early date a School of Domestic Science and Hygiene for Maori Girls.

QUESTION XLV.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting City Missions?

AUCKLAND METHODIST CENTRAL MISSION.

At the recommendation of the Commission appointed by the last Synod, received and endorsed by the H.M. Board, Conference constituted the France St., East St., and Airedale St. properties a Home Mission Station.

The Missioner was appointed as from the first of January, to reorganise the city mission work of our Church.

It is with deep gratitude to God that we present the following report of this work:—

The Board of Management was called together early in the year under the Chairmanship of Rev. L. Dalby, and officers were appointed and plans formed for the commencing of the work.

The headquarters at Airedale St. were completely renovated, and a fresh start made, the opening services being taken by Rev. W. Walker and Rev. E. T. Cox. Since then steady advance has been made in all departments, more especially in the social sphere, where we are immediately brought face to face with the tragic circumstance of hundreds of the city poor. It has been our joy to be able to take our full share in the relief of this kind. Police Court and Prison work have also been undertaken and carried out with considerable success.

Another notable feature of our social work is the Free Community Picture Entertainments. Specially selected programmes are screened every Thursday, and thus hundreds of the city's poor children, with their parents, are enabled to share this form of entertainment.

The Sunday School and the Band of Hope have been re-organised and are in a flourishing condition. Young Men's and Young Women's Clubs are under the direction of capable leaders. It is our great privilege to have part in guiding the lives of scores of young people.

Deaconesses.

Owing to the generosity of the Pitt St. Trust we were able to obtain the services of Sister Olive, who came to us with a wide experience in this class of work, and words cannot adequately express the great amount of good work she has been able to do. In one department alone she is the leader of a Women's Meeting which already has a membership of nearly fifty.

Finance.

We acknowledge with thankfulness the help given to us in this direction by so many Auckland Methodists. Especially are we indebted to the Pitt St. Trustees who donated £100 towards furnishing the Parsonage, besides paying the stipend of the Sister for six months. The East St. Trustees also advanced us £125, which with a grant of £50 from the Home Mission Department has considerably relieved the financial position. The major part of our total debt (£417) is in the trust account, and we are looking forward, with faith and confidence in the future, to being enabled to carry on the good work commenced.

As we work solely among people who are almost unable to support themselves we must depend on the generosity of those outside.

In all the avenues of our work there is remarkable scope for development, and we face the future with the promise that His word cannot return unto Him void.

DUNEDIN CENTRAL MISSION.

It is with gratitude to God for His continual goodness that we present this report to Conference. The Mission continues to fulfil its purpose in the spiritual and social life of the city.

Throughout the year all its activities have been maintained at full strength. It has to be confessed that the inauguration of Sunday evening band concerts, the growing tendency of the week-end habit, the running of Sunday excursions by train and 'bus, all tend to make the work of the Mission more difficult.

These features, new in Dunedin, have necessitated the putting forth of greater effort on the part of the Superintendent and officials. We realise that the Sunday evening service has from the incention of

We realise that the Sunday evening service has from the inception of the Mission, been the most important feature of its activities. We are anxious to do all in our power to maintain, and if possible to

advance it.

The services throughout the year have been well attended and great It is with joy we report considerable good has been accomplished. advancement on Young People's work. The Sunday School has witnessed a marked increase in the number of scholars, and several

new Young People's Societies have been commenced.

We are fully alive to the fact that the Mission, to justify its existence, must be much more than a preaching station, it must fulfil its obligation as a centre of social and philanthropic activity. For this purpose the Mission during the year has received its share of the public charities of the city, and this amount has been supplemented by the gifts of sympathisers, as well as by monies raised by the Mission. During the year we have expended the sum of £135 in relieving cases

of distress and of need. During the winter season we were in daily touch with those who required sympathy and practical help. It was a constant joy to be in a position to meet these cases. We also raised the sum of £30 for relief of unemployment in Dunedin and at Kaitangata.

Deaconess Work.

We realise that in Sister Hazel we have a Deaconess who is eminently fitted for her work, and that through her activities the Methodist Church takes its rightful place in the social work of the city. It is impossible to tabulate this work, but in the course of the year scores of cases of real need are ministered unto, and numberless lives

are touched to finer issues.

The advertisement in the Press urging lonely girls, and women in need of help and advice, to wait upon Sister Hazel in her room is taken advantage of by large numbers. The Business Girls' Luncheon Club, and Rest Room, meet a felt need in the city; the Public Hospital and Benevolent Home are regularly visited; the Bible Class This work counts for good and Girls' Clubs are well maintained. not only in the Mission, but also in the life of the city.

Finance.

We are thankful to be able to report that by dint of special efforts, an appeal to the business men of the city, the "sinking fund" which has now been established, and particularly the generous gift of Miss Boot, of £250, the Trustees have been enabled for the fourth year in succession to pay the sum of £1000 off the mortgage debt, which now stands at £7000. We are indeed grateful for the splendid help given by Miss Boot. For three years in succession she has donated £250, which has made it possible for us to tackle the huge debt. Miss Boot has written expressing her deep regret that she is no longer in a posihas written expressing her deep regret that she is no longer in a posi-tion to help next year. We trust that sympathisers throughout the Methodist Church will help us in our effort to again pay off £1000 by the 30th September.

Rev. W. Ready.

It is with exceeding regret we record the death of Rev. W. Ready, the founder, and for nine years the able Superintendent of the Mission. It was in April, 1890, that Rev and Mrs. Ready arrived in Dunedin. They had It was a formidable task to which they were appointed. no church to come to, no parsonage, and no organisation. resources were £45 and an indomitable faith in God. I Their sole Looking back it is almost incredible that in a little over three years from the inception of the Mission, the Garrison Hall, with seating accommodation for nearly 2000 was engaged and regularly crowded. An appropriate Memorial Service, officially attended by His Worship the Mayor was held on the Sunday evening following Mr. Ready's decease. On the occasion of the visit of the President (Dr. H. Ranston), on 6th December, a beautiful memorial tablet to his memory was unveiled, and a suitable tribute to his work delivered. Throughout the year the Superintendent has had the wholehearted and loyal support of all the officials and appropriate for which he expresses his deep captitude. and members, for which he expresses his deep gratitude.

The Mission is in good heart, and we face the future with confidence.

QUESTION XLVI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference with Regard to the Training of Deaconesses?

METHODIST DEACONESS INSTITUTE.

REPORT FOR 1927.

We have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1927, as it very definitely marks a forward movement in the development of this important Department of our Church work.

At last Conference (1927) Sisters Edna White, Alice Howell, Grace Macdonald, and Norah Mills were dedicated. Sister Alice Howell was already serving under the Home Mission Board; Sister Norah Mills had served one year in Wellington South Circuit; and Sister Grace Macdonald in addition to her Deaconess House training, had completed two years' hospital training. She, with Sister Edna White, has since entered upon Foreign Mission work in the Solomon Islands under the F.M. Board.

Sister Margaret Jeffrays, having completed two years in Deaconess House, was at the beginning of the year appointed to the Pitt Street Church, Auckland. Arrangements are being made for her dedication at the forthcoming Conference.

At present there are in training six Deaconess students—Miss Barnett, Miss Hayman, Miss Adkin, Miss Snowden, Miss Hobbs, and Miss Foster. Of these, Miss Barnett and Miss Hayman finish their Deaconess House course at the end of this year. Unfortunately, for family reasons, Miss Barnett must for a time return to her home, but it is expected that she will take up Deaconess work later. Miss Hayman is entering St. Helen's Hospital, Christchurch, for two years' hospital training. Of the others, Miss Adkin and Miss Hobbs already are Certificated Midwifery Nurses.

Next year it is expected that four new students will enter the House, including two young Maori women recommended by the Home Mission Board. All the students have passed satisfactorily the usual term examinations.

The work of the House as a Training Institute has been conducted in a most pleasing and highly efficient manner under the Superintendent, Mrs. W. J. Williams; the Revs. W. A. Hay, A. Liversedge, S. Werren, L. B. Neale, W. H. Speer, and H. A. Sharp, Lecturers; and Sister Winifred, Lecturess in Nursing.

Sister Winifred recently accepted a part-time appointment in the St. Albans Circuit, and it is hoped that a full-time appointment will eventuate.

There have been 15 Teachers' Training College students and 6 Deaconess students in residence during the year, and the fact that this large family has occupied Deaconess House in the happiest conditions speaks volumes for the tactful and able management of the Superintendent, and the Hon. Chaplain, the Rev. W. J. Williams. To these, with the Rev. Lecturers, Sister Winifred, and Messrs. Bowron, Odell, Salter, Lamb, and Wilson, the ladies of the House Committee, the sincere thanks of the Committee are due, and are here tendered.

During the year the extensions forecast in last Report have been effected at a cost, with consequent furnishings, of £2350. The work has been faithfully carried out under the supervision of Mr. G. T. Lucas, architect, to whom the Committee's thanks are due for his kindly interest and his many professional services.

The new portion was opened with a largely-attended function on 28th May last, many of those present expressing surprise and pleasure at the extent, completeness, and comfort of the House generally.

In the Deaconess Institute the Church possesses a property which has now cost well over £7000. It occupies a very valuable and pleasing position overlooking Latimer Square. It contains 21 bedrooms, dining-room, Committee-room, Superintendent's office-study, and every modern convenience. There are outbuildings, in which goods are received for distribution in connection with the Social Service, of which Deaconess House is the centre. Accommodation is also provided for the reception and packing of goods for the Solomon Islands in connection with the work of the Women's Auxiliary of Home and Foreign Missions. The present debt on the property is £2000.

The House is being used by a number of local Bible Classes for meetings, conferences, etc., and the Young Women's Bible Class Movement for New Zealand is occupying Deaconess House and holding its Annual Conference therein in January of next year. It will readily be recognised that the House is fulfilling in a marked degree exactly those functions for which it was instituted.

During the year, as opportunity offered, the General Secretary for Foreign Missions, Rev. W. A. Sinclair, and the General Superintendent of Home Mission Department, the Rev. A. J. Seamer, met the Committee, and helpful discussions as to procedure in the case of workers nominated by the Boards represented ensued, and a satisfactory working method adopted. Also a Joint Committee authorised by Conference met to consider matters pertaining to the retiring allowances of Deaconesses.

Formal application is again made for the usual Conference Grants as follows:—Home Mission Board, £75; Foreign Mission Board, £75; Contingent Fund, £75; and Connexional Insurance Fund, £100.

Thanks are due to the associate members and other friends, who have shown continued interest in the Institute, for financial and other help rendered.

The following are nominated as the Committee for 1928:—The Chairman of the District, the Connexional Secretary, the Rev. M. A. R. Pratt, Rev. S. Lawry, Superintendent, Ministers of the Christchurch Circuit, together with the Ministers appointed to New Brighton, Linwood, Edgeware Road, and Lyttelton; Messrs. L. M. Isitt, M.L.C., G. Bowron, A. Borrows, W. H. Heslop, J. E. Purchase, and C. A. Newman; Sister Mabel Morley; Mesdames Bowron, Salter, Lamb, Odell, Wilson, and Sandford.

Following are recommendations to Synod and Conference, forwarded by the Deaconess Committee:—

That it be a recommendation to the Home Mission Board that their appeal for support include Deaconess work, with a view to assisting by a Grant such Churches as would possibly employ a Deaconess if so assisted.

That, so far as is practicable, the Methodist Orphanages be staffed by trained Deaconesses; and

That candidates for Deaconess work be given to understand that such work is to be regarded as one phase of their service.

Deaconess Regulations.

No. 13 to be amended to read as follows:-

The appointment of a Deaconess shall be made by the Committee, after consultation with the Circuit or Institution concerned.

All appointments shall be reported to Conference. When the Conference has sanctioned the appointment of a Deaconess to a Circuit or Institution, the obligation to provide for continued employment of a Deaconess shall be recognised from year to year, unless a request to be relieved of such obligation shall be forwarded to the Committee by the September Quarterly Meeting, or in the case of an Institution by the equivalent Committee Meeting. The request must be approved by the Synod of the District concerned and the recommendation adopted by Conference.

No Circuit or Institution shall dispense with the services of a Deaconess during the currency of a yearly appointment, but the Committee may make the necessary adjustments during the year,

with the consent of the Circuits or Committees affected.

(Conference Resolution No. 4, Page 103 of Conference Minutes.)

Following are the recommendations of a Joint Committee set up by direction of Conference to consider the best means of making better provision for Deaconesses when they retire from their work:—

- That with a view to increasing Deaconesses' retiring allowance, the Synod of 1927 be requested to recommend to Conference that contributions made to the retiring fund by the Home Mission Board be the same as that of Deaconesses themselves, viz., £4 per annum instead of £2 per annum, and that provision be made in the estimates accordingly.
- That with a view to increasing the capital account of the Deaconess Retiring Fund by £2000, the interest of which should be devoted to improving Deaconesses' retiring allowance, it be a recommen dation that Synod be asked to request next Conference (1928) to authorise an Appeal during 1929 with the object of raising £5000 (Five Thousand Pounds), to be divided between the capital account of the Deaconess Retiring Fund and the liquidation of the debt on Deaconess House property.

When the Conference has sanctioned the appointment of a Deaconess to a Circuit or Institution, the obligation to provide continued employment of a Deaconess shall be recognised from year to year, unless a request to be relieved of such obligation shall be forwarded to the Committee by the September Quarterly Meeting, or, in the case of an Institution, by the equivalent Committee Meeting. The request must be considered by the Synod of the District and by the Conference.

(3) No Circuit or Institution shall dispense with the services of a Deaconess during the currency of a yearly appointment, but the Committee may make the necessary adjustments during the year, with the consent of the Circuits or Com-

mittee concerned.

6. Deaconesses' Retiring Allowances.

- (1) That, with a view to increasing the Deaconess Retiring Allowances, the contributions made to the Retiring Fund by the Home Mission Board be the same as that of the Deaconesses themselves, viz., £4 per annum, instead of £2 per annum.
- (2) That, with a view to increasing the Capital Account of the Deaconess Retiring Fund by £2000, the interest of which shall be devoted to improving Deaconesses' Retiring Allowances, the Conference authorises that an appeal be made during 1931 with the object of raising £4000, to be divided between the Capital Account of the Deaconesses' Retiring Fund and the liquidation of the debt on Deaconess House Property, donors having the right to allocate their gifts.

QUESTION XLVI!.—What are the Resolutions of Conference regarding Connexional Orphanages?

A .- AUCKLAND CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE-MOUNT ALBERT AND EPSOM.

The year has been marked by much activity and progress.

In November, 1926, a most successful spectacular demonstration was held in the Concert Chamber of the Auckland Town Hall, when over 100 children, trained by Mrs. Armitage and Mrs. Everiss, acquitted themselves splendidly in a varied programme of action songs and tableaux, and a moving address was given by the late Rev. W. Ready. The financial result was over £50.

Extension of Building.

At Wesley Home, Mt. Albert, in place of an old barn destroyed by fire, we have erected a new Playroom for boys, a milking shed, and a coal and wood shed; also a new wing to the main building, providing Hostel accommodation for elder girls who are going to work, but still make their home with us. The cubicles are greatly prized, and good marks are obtained for cleanliness and tidiness.

We hope that before Conference meets some suitable Hostel may. be secured for our elder boys, five of whom will soon probably be taking situations in, or near, Auckland and have no other home.

At Epsom, in addition to improvements to the Laundry and Playroom, we have provided an office for the Matron, an extension of the boys' dormitory by a balcony enclosure, also an additional Fire-escape and sundry accessories.

Our Roll number at the end of the year, viz., September 30th, was 73 at Mt. Albert (in Wesley and Epworth), and 40 at Epsom, a total of 113, with vacancies for about 11 more.

The health, conduct and progress of the children with few excep-The children take great interest in Church and tions has been good. Sunday School, and over a dozen of the elder ones have taken their stand for Jesus Christ.

The reports from the Headmasters of Gladstone School, Mt. Albert, and Mt. Roskill, Epsom, are highly gratifying.

At the S.S. Union Annual Examinations, out of 49 entrants from Mt. Albert, all passed but 2, and 11 gained prizes. At Epsom, where the

majority are very young, out of 16, 11 passed and one gained a prize.

Successful Missionary Sales were held at Mt. Albert and Epsom, raising £50 and £17 respectively as well as fostering the Missionary

spirit.

The Board gratefully acknowledges the loyal co-operation of the Ladies' Committee who undertake full responsibility for the clothing, and also generously provide a Christmas Festival and gifts year by year.

Further bequests have been received as follows:—Estate of R. W. Neal, £50; Sir Henry Brett, £400; J. H. Townsend (reported last year and now paid), £100. Notice has also been given of the following legacies to mature at a future date, viz.:—£200 (approx.), Mrs. W. Hansen, Auckland; £150, S. T. Cox, Opunake; £100, John Gibson, New Plymouth.

The Board gratefully acknowledges these tokens of goodwill; and also the faithful services of our collectors, the Misses Ethel Mason and E. M. Stables, and the generous help represented by General Donations, Xmas offerings from Churches and Sunday Schools, Annual Subscriptions, and many gifts and kindnesses too numerous to mention.

By the fatal accident which resulted in the death of Mr. Wagstaff, of Waihou, we have lost a devoted friend and a most successful collector, who last year collected over £50 apart from the Xmas collections. Who will take up his work and emulate his zeal?

finances would be greatly assisted and stabilised by the vigorous working of a system of Annual Subscriptions in every Circuit.

During the year we have reduced our capital debt by £2000; and by means of a long-dated mortgage from the B.N.Z., repayable in 20 years, we have paid the balance of £3103, owing to the Mt. Eden Land Co. for the Epsom property. Our capital debt, however, it still over £7000; and the size of our family has increased, so we still look confidently to the sustained generosity of our people.

To facilitate legal procedure relating to bequests, transfers, etc., a small Trust Board (Incorporated), has been appointed.

In conclusion the Board expresses its grateful appreciation of the devoted services of Mrs. Armitage and Mrs. Everiss and their loyal staffs, the various sub-committees, to Mr. Walter Ambury for constant voluntary service, to our Medical Advisers, Drs. B .- METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME, MASTERTON.

We are thankful to God for the blessings which have rested upon our work of caring for the children during the past year. Also for many things which have not happened. Seventy-six boys and girls have been admitted to the Home since it was opened and no serious accident has befallen any of them. More than half the number has gone to homes or occupations satisfactory to the Management Committee.

During the year four boys and two girls have become employed in occupations in which they are giving satisfaction. Five other boys have gone to suitable homes. The time when the boys and girls leave the Home is a most important moment, and we have considerable difficulty in finding them suitable employment. Several children have been admitted during the year, and at the time this report is being written several applications are under consideration.

We have been deeply and painfully impressed by the number of applications on behalf of families deserted by their fathers. Last year there was an increase of several hundreds of such cases dealt with in the Magistrates' Courts of the Dominion. We are of the opinion that such fathers should be compelled to work either for the State or under supervision and their wages used for the support of their families. This would be helpful, just, and would probably act as a deterrent. Dr. Prior has continued his work as honorary medical attendant, and has been most attentive in his oversight of the health of all the residents in the Home. We sincerely thank him for his work.

The general health of the children has been good, and their success at the day school has been encouraging. The public hall was crowded at the annual concert, and £27 was taken for admission. Each year a Scripture Examination is held and the questions are based upon the teaching received in the Home. Prizes are given from the proceeds of an invested gift which was presented for this purpose. The boys and girls acquitted themselves well at the recent examination.

Miss Allan, who was appointed Matron a year ago, had previously been on the staff of several Children's Homes, and she has ably filled her present position and given entire satisfaction. Miss Webb, who was appointed first assistant, has also given every satisfaction in the position. The members of the Ladies' Committee, Grounds Committee and General Committee have rendered good service during the year. The members of the Committee are drawn from one Circuit, and are comparatively few in number, but each individual takes a deep interest in the Home and its affairs.

The income for the year has failed to meet the payments by £451. The reasons for this decrease are found in the action of the last Conference which protested against the Committee receiving help from the McCarthy Trust, hence no application for a grant was made this year. No special bequests have been received, though we have been notified of several having been made. An increase in the number of annual subscribers is greatly needed, and we appeal to each Circuit to appoint live agents to advocate the claims of the Home. The Christmas collections amounted to £311 in 1926, and £314 in 1925. We express our thanks to the many friends who have sent gifts of clothing and food.

The Dominion will reap the benefit of the work done in the Home in producing Christian citizens with the highest ideals.

C .- THE SOUTH ISLAND ORPHANAGE.

It is with a feeling of devout thankfulness to God that the Board presents its Annual Report.

A review of the year's work affords reason for encouragement. Mr. and Mrs. Haynes are continuing to give entire satisfaction, and are supported by a loyal and efficient staff of helpers.

The Board has under its care 63 children. Of these, 54 are in our own Home, and nine are domiciled in the Presbyterian Boys' Home. Five of these are at the Presbyterian Hostel for working boys, and pay the major portion of their board.

The health of the children has been good, although some have received Hospital treatment. These have fully recovered, and are enjoying good health.

Several of the elder boys and girls have been received into Church membership, and are taking a lively interest in Church and Bible Class work.

In connection with the Sunday School Examination, 26 entered and 24 secured passes.

Encouraging reports have been received from the State School, and the Headmaster has written expressing appreciation of the conduct of the children. Good reports have come to hand regarding the seven girls and boys who are attending the Technical School. Most of these will be placed in situations early next year.

The matter of erecting the Boys' Home on the newly-acquired site has been carefully considered by a Special Committee. Sketch plans have been prepared, but it was deemed almost impossible to proceed with the erection, as the amount involved would absorb all our invested capital. It was also felt that to meet the extra cost an additional income of 50 per cent. would be necessary. At present the ordinary income falls seriously short of meeting the ordinary expenditure. In fact it requires all the interest from the Endowment Fund to meet the Board's ordinary expenditure. For those reasons the matter of building the Boys' Home has been deferred until more prosperous times.

The Rev. W. Laycock continues to be successful in his work as Field Organiser, and the Board is now beginning to reap the results of his organisation in the Circuits.

The Board expresses its thanks to Dr. A. J. Orchard for his gratuitous services. It also thanks the many friends who have forwarded gifts of food and clothing.

Last year's Christmas Appeal met with a generous response, and as a result the Board has purchased a wireless receiving set, which is much appreciated by the children and members of the staff. To all donors the Board expresses its sincere thanks.

REPORT OF MILITARY COMMITTEE, 1927.

The Treasurer of the Military Camps Fund (Mr. C. M. Luke) reports that the funds to the credit of the Committee have been duly transferred to the Supernumerary Fund Treasurers, in accordance with the Conference resolution.

The Conference also recommended that the sum of £100 be granted from the Home Mission and Contingent Funds towards the expenses of the Y.M.C.A. work in the Territorial Camps of the Dominion. This amount has been received and gratefully acknowledged by the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. We are pleased to note that of the sum of £157 9s. 0d. received by the Y.M.C.A. Council from the Churches, £103 13s. 0d. came from the Methodist Church.

In this connection we note that of the 90 Camps served by the Y.M.C.A., an Association Secretary was in charge of the work in 84 Camps, while limited equipment was supplied to the remaining 6 Camps. The total expenditure for eleven months of the year amounted to £2,442 19s. 6d., and receipts to £2,147 16s. 5d., leaving a debit balance of £295 3s. 1d. We place these facts and figures on record in recognition of the fine work being done by the Y.M.C.A., and also that the Conference may know our subsidy is well bestowed. The fact that the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. has given a seat on its Military Committee to a representative of the Methodist Church is a further guarantee that the money will be wisely expended.

Our thanks are again due to our Naval and Military Chaplains—to the latter more particularly—for splendid service rendered. While the organisation of the Northern Military Command—where there is a shortage of Methodist Chaplains on the Active List—leaves something to be desired, the work of our Chaplains in the various Territorial Camps has been altogether satisfactory. At an early date it is proposed to hold a Conference in Wellington of representatives of the Chaplain Advisory Committees of the Dominion, with a view to securing the highest efficiency in Chaplaincy affairs. We have already recommended the wiping out of the Regimental District system as it applies to Chaplains, and to this the Department has agreed.

We regret that our efforts to secure the transfer of the Rev. E. S. Emmitt, M.C., to the N.Z. Forces failed owing to his having passed the age limit. His years of service, unfortunately, did not entitle him to promotion to the Third Class. We recommend the Conference Military Committee to prepare a list of suitable men among our younger ministers for appointment as Chaplains when vacancies arise in the various Commands owing to the retirement of senior men.

1.—NEW ZEALAND METHODIST LOCAL PREACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

ANNUAL REPORT.

We record first our sincere congratulations to our Wellington brethren on their success in establishing a strong Branch of the Association in the Empire City. In the hands of such capable and experienced Officers as our honoured brethren, H. P. Mourant, President; J. R. Burley, Hon. Secretary; and A. H. Brooks, Treasurer, the success of the Branch is well assured. Our prayers and best wishes go out for them and with them in their holy enterprise. Any information that may be of service to them will be willingly and promptly furnished by the Executive.

The keynote of this Association from its inception has been to encourage and stimulate our young men who possess gifts, grace and piety, who have heard the call of God to become preachers of the Word of Life. And with that call comes the necessity for thorough equipment. They must need to read and study suitable literature. This we are prepared to furnish at 33 and 1-3 per cent. below the published price. We can supply to young preachers who are on trial a special set of six booksfor 8s. 6d., post free, the published price of which is 17s. 6d.

The work of the pulpit to-day has no doubt to be done under new conditions, and requires different qualities in order to ensure success. It has to deal not only with opinions and tendencies that are characteristic of the times, but what is of equal importance, with an entirely changed condition of general intelligence. It has to compete with new and formidable rivals, with newspapers, with magazines, with reviews, with well-filled bookshelves of printed sermons by the ablest modern divines; so that the preacher's task to-day calls for constant, taxing, tireless, nerve-exhausting effect. Many of these rivals are not slow to criticise, and who, if they cannot overthrow its power, can at least make its retention more difficult. It is idle, therefore, or worse than idle, to ignore changes in the conditions of the world in which the

preacher (and especially the Local preacher) has to work. It is, therefore, of the first importance that our young men who have felt the Divine call should be furnished with an adequate equipment for this work. Where there is a true and earnest zeal for God there will surely be a diligent and conscientious devotion to all such studies as may serve to give effect to that zeal. The charge to give attendance to reading is as truly and imperatively a Divine injunction as is the charge to "watch and pray." We, therefore, respectfully suggest that in Circuits, singly or in groups, there should be formed some suitable Theological class where our young men could be trained and made "Vessels unto honour, meet for the Master's use, prepared unto every good work."

We purpose to get into communication with the Chairmen of Districts as soon as possible after the Synods, with a view to having this matter brought under the personal notice of Superintendents of Circuits.

We congratulate the Rev. E. P. Blamires and his co-workers in the Young People's Department. We are deeply interested in the good work that is being done by them, and we are looking with prayerful anxiety to them to supply our pulpit with God-made, God-sent preachers

II. WORLD CONFERENCE ON FAITH AND ORDER.

(See Minutes 1927; Page 147.)

The World Conference on Faith and Order met at Lausanne, Switzerland, from August 3—21, when 425 representatives of Christian faiths from 70 nation-wide autonomous Churches having a constituency of 275,000,000 adherents deliberated in the attempt to restore the unity of Christendom. The Church of Rome was the only Christian denomination that did not participate in the Congress.

Our New Zealand Church last year appointed the Rev. Dr. Pinfold and Mr. J. B. Veale as its representatives. Dr. Pinfold, unfortunately, had to return to New Zealand prior to the World Conference, and at the date of this report I have had no word as to whether Mr. Veale was

at Lausanne.

The Conference, which is the first conclave on an ecumenical scale since the early Councils of the Christian Church, arrived at a spirit of accord that must profoundly affect the future course of Christendom. No attempt was made to crystallise the sentiments of the gathering into definite credal pronouncements or to define the conditions of future reunion. Its object was to register the apparent level of fundamental agreements within the Conference and the grave points of disagreements remaining; also to suggest certain lines of thought which may in future tend to a fuller measure of agreement.

After full discussion, reports were adopted, either unanimously or

"The question of "The Unity of Christendom in relation to existing Churches" was remitted to a Continuation Committee for consideration and report.

The Conference was the starting-point for a long and difficult journey to the goal of Christian re-union. If full advantage is to be taken of the progress registered at Lausanne, the spirit and method of the World Conference must be repeated in each main ecclesiastical assembly as well as in each separate congregation.

I recommend the re-appointment of our Commission to receive any further communications from the Continuation Committee.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT BY DR. PINFOLD.

I wish to tender my thanks to the Conference for appointing me as its Representative to the 1927 "World Conference on Faith and Order." Just before I was to start from London a cable came informing me of the tragic death of my wife; so instead of going to Lausanne as arranged, I returned to New Zealand. It was a great disappointment to me not to have the opportunity of doing my best to worthily represent my Church. I have kept in touch with the Corresponding Secretary of the Conference; also with some who were present. My conclusion is that while it was a great and important gathering, even historic, and while it resulted in the formation and development of friendships that will assist in the fostering of the Spirit of Union among the Churches, yet it did not accomplish all the good its promoters The Conference did much in showing that the hoped to achieve. agreements among the Churches were many more than was generally imagined; while, among the matters in which difference of opinion was expressed, Conferences for mutual interchange of thought would lead to splendid results. One thing will probably need to be watched. Some enthusiasts are working to bring about the union of all Christendom under one head, and it is not difficult to see that their eyes are turned towards Rome to find that head. It may be that this fact has helped in producing the recent Papal encyclical, in which the Pope affirms "that Church unity is obtainable only by the return of dissidents to the Roman Catholic Church." Even Bishop Gore-who was a member of the Lausanne Conference-and Dean Inge now point out

the futility of the hope of ultimate reunion with the great Western Church. The latter suggests an exchange of pulpits with the Free Churches freely, and intercommunion at special times. I wish to thank the Rev. M. A. Rugby Pratt for the proupt way in which be sent on to the Lausanne Conference Secretary the names of your Representatives. I again thank the brethren for their appointment.

That except where otherwise provided for by regulation the District Synod, when nominating Connexional Committees or Boards of Management located within its bounds, shall nominate for appointment by the Conference one of those named to be the Chairman of such Committee or Board, or if the nomination shall be found for any reason to be impracticable, the Conference shall nominate and appoint a Chairman. The appointed Chairman, together with the Secretary, shall sign the Report and be responsible for its presentation to Conference. Should a vacancy in any such Chairmanship occur during the year, the Committee or Board shall appoint one of its members to be acting Chairman until the ensuing Conference.

RESOLUTION.

That the above proposal be remitted to the Synods for consideration.

Good Friday.

That Good Friday should be regarded as a sacred day and that wherever possible an Inspirational Rally should be held in one of the larger centres, in which smaller Circuits should be invited to co-operate.

Church Services.

That Conference requests Ministers, Local Preachers and Leaders' Meetings to take such steps as will secure a more general and worthy participation in those portions of the service in which the congregation is expected to take an audible part, especially in the Lord's Prayer, and the concluding "Amen"; also in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, and other occasions when provision is made for responses.

Legal Adviser.

That Mr. J. A. Flesher, O.B.E., be cordially thanked for his generous services as Legal Adviser to the President, and that he be reappointed.

President's Committee of Advice.

That the following be the President's Advisory Committee:—Revs. Principal Laws, B.A., D.D., E. Drake, W. A. Sinclair, A. J. Seamer, A. Ashcroft, and the Secretary of the Conference, the Vice-President, Messrs. J. A. Flesher and A. Peak.

Reports for Synods.

That Reports for Synods be in the hands of Chairmen not later than October 31st, such Reports must reach the Secretary of Conference not later than October 18, 1928.

QUESTION LV .- When and Where shall the next Conference be held?

On Thursday, February 21st, 1929, in the Pitt Street Church, Auckland.
