

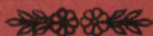

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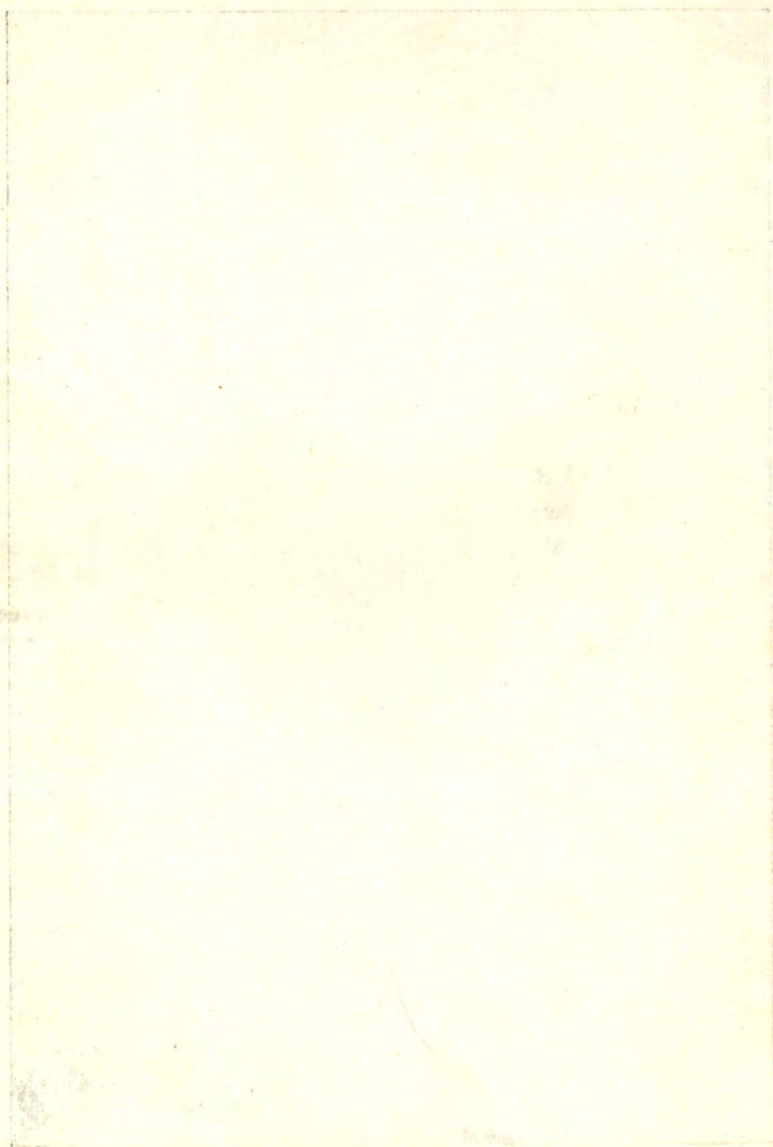
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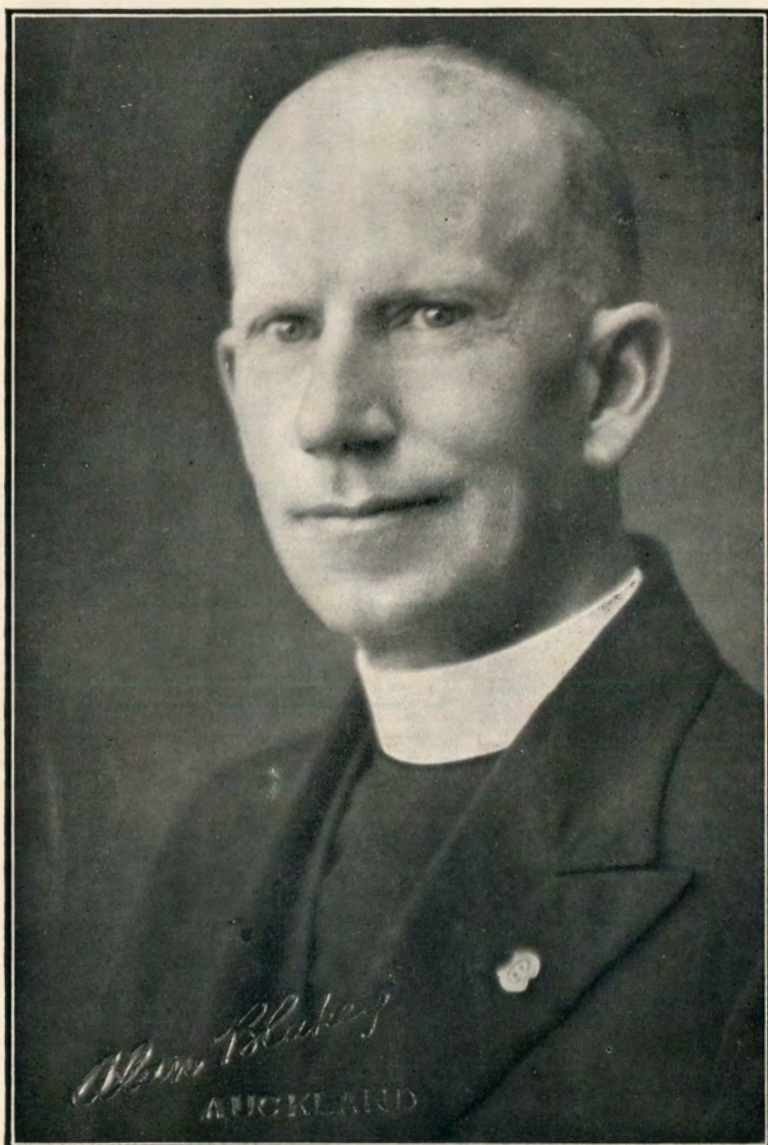

HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

Organised Methodism in Australasia, as a part of the Foreign Missions under the direction of the British Conference, dates from the appointment of the Rev. Samuel Leigh to New South Wales in 1815.—(Mins. Brit. Conf., 1814).

"The Missions in Australia, Van Diemen's Land, the Friendly Islands and Feejee" were constituted by the British Conference of 1854 "a distinct Connexion, to be denominated 'The Australasian Wesleyan-Methodist Connexion,' with an Annual Conference, affiliated to the Parent English Conference."—(Mins. Brit. Conf., 1854).

First Australasian Conference was held in Sydney in the year 1855.

A Scheme of Annual and General Conferences was determined by the Australasian Conference of 1873.

THE FIRST NEW ZEALAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church was held in 1874.

THE TWENTY-FOURTH NEW ZEALAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church, which was also the First United Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, the United Methodist Free Churches, and the Bible Christian Church in New Zealand, was held in 1897.

THE FIRST ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of the Methodist Church of Australasia in New Zealand was held in 1903.

THE FIRST CONFERENCE

of the Methodist Church of New Zealand was held in 1913, separation from the General Conference of Australasia having become operative on January 1st of that year by declaration of the President of the General Conference.

THE FIRST CONFERENCE

of the Methodist Church of New Zealand (United) was held in 1913.

Union between the Methodist Church of New Zealand and the Primitive Methodist Church in New Zealand having taken effect on February 6th, 1913.

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The Annual Conference of the Methodist Church of New Zealand assembled in the Durham Street Methodist Church, Christchurch, on Thursday, 13th February, 1936, and concluded on 21st February, 1936.

The Session was opened by the Rev. Jonathan H. Haslam, Retiring President, after which the Rev. E. Percy Blamires was inducted to the Presidency.

Mr. Richard Hampton was elected Vice-President, and was welcomed to that office by Mr. W. Chas. Francis, retiring Vice-President.

The Secretary-Elect, the Rev. W. A. Burley, M.A., was introduced, and took up his duties.

Charles E. Ward was the son of the Rev. Robert Ward, the pioneer missionary of the Primitive Methodist Church, who arrived in New Zealand in 1844. Charles was born in New Plymouth, where his father was stationed in 1846, and was educated at Wesley College, Auckland, under the Rev. John Fletcher. In due course he returned to New Plymouth, and entered the Primitive Methodist Ministry in 1870, serving the Church for six years in New South Wales. The Ward family gave three sons to the Ministry, Frederick, Josiah, and Charles. Eventually Frederick entered journalism, and later became Editor of the Sydney Daily Telegraph. Returning to New Zealand Charles, with his brothers, John and Frederick, was engaged in the Maori War, serving with the Taranaki Bush Rangers under Major (later Sir Harry) Atkinson, who offered him a commission. Taking up the work of the Ministry again, the brothers, Charles and Josiah put in a hard day's work until "the Stars appeared," and their works do follow them.

On three occasions he was President of the Primitive Methodist Conference, and was a member of the Union Committee, but it was in his Circuits that his best work was done. He was a diligent and painstaking pastor, watching over his people with a godly jealousy, and offering much shrewd advice concerning life's duties and responsibilities. He had a Statesman's grasp of church and national problems, and was keenly interested in all that made for the development of the best life in the Dominion. He was a notable and original preacher, evincing a depth and accuracy of knowledge which was amazing when we consider his public activities. He was an ardent Temperance Reformer and never wearied of the battle for sobriety and purity. For some years he was the Editor of the N.Z. Primitive Methodist, and wielded a facile pen, informed by a wide acquaintance with English literature and directed by his knowledge of men.

Though Mr. Ward superannuated in 1910 he continued in active service until 1930, and was able in "age and feebleness extreme" to attend worship every Sunday until a fortnight before the end. He was exalted to the higher service on August 24th, last. He was a chivalrous friend with a great passion for righteousness, and a great love for his Church. The Dominion is richer for his life and work, and his example and influence will continue to inspire all who knew him.

Thomas G. Carr.—In the passing of the Rev. T. G. Carr on August 2nd last, at 89 years of age, New Zealand Methodism has parted with one of her most venerated ministers. Born in Nottinghamshire in 1846 and converted early in life he was accepted for the Wesleyan Methodist ministry in England in 1869. After three years at Richmond College, where among his fellow students were Revs. W. J. Williams, F. W. Isitt and J. J. Lewis who came to New Zealand a year or two before him, he arrived in New Zealand in 1873 together with the Rev. George Bond, and was appointed to Whangaroa. Here he commenced that fruitful ministry which he exercised in almost every District in New Zealand, covering a period of 44 years.

Of deep spirituality and fervent zeal, he was greatly used of God in conversions and the edification of his people. With unflagging zeal, he built or renovated churches, improved parsonages, opened preaching places, and in every place deepened spiritual life. In all his circuits he had the loyal co-operation of his devoted wife, who pre-deceased him by ten years. His home life was beautiful and his children rise up and call him blessed. As Supernumerary he gave valuable service for nine years as Hospital Chaplain in Auckland, besides maintaining the cause at Parnell for seven years. Unobtrusive and gracious, possessing a cheerful spirit and a rich vein of humour, Bro. Carr held a high place in the love and esteem of his brethren and of all who knew him.

John D. Jory.—At the advanced age of 89, John D. Jory passed peacefully home to God on 18th June, 1935. Born in Cornwall in 1846, Mr. Jory emigrated in early manhood to Australia where he was accepted for the ministry, receiving his training at Newington College. After eleven years effective missionary service in Fiji, he spent a year in England, and was then transferred to New Zealand in 1885. In this country he was a faithful and devoted minister for 27 years. Of a gentle and gracious disposition and a man of deep sympathy his ministry was deeply spiritual and earnest and to many he was a Son of Consolation. In all his work at home and abroad he had the co-operation of his gifted wife, and to their New Zealand ministry they brought an unflinching zeal for the work overseas. They also gave inspiring leadership to the cause of Temperance and Prohibition. Through all his ministry and in the years of his retirement, Brother Jory lived in the love and esteem of his people and his brethren in the ministry, endearing himself to all by his high Christian character, gentleness and brotherly love.

James Cocker.—James Cocker was born at Calver, near Sheffield, England, on June 14, 1862. Accepted as a Candidate for the Primitive Methodist Ministry after a year spent as a Probationer he entered Hartley College for training. Through the influence of his life-long friend John Dawson, he came to New Zealand in 1890, and ministered with great acceptance in a number of outstanding Circuits. Shortly after the opening of the Masterton Children's Home, he became Secretary-Manager, a post which he held with increasing efficiency until his death in March of last year. Few ministers have been better known or more highly esteemed for his own or his work's sake. He was a remarkable man in every way. As a preacher, he was warm-hearted and evangelical and had a wonderful gift for word-painting. His children's addresses were models of their kind, and many of them appeared in book form. As a pastor he excelled, and as a social reformer he had much to do with creating No-License sentiment in New Zealand. Mr. Cocker's literary gifts were early recognised by his Church, and for 8 years he was Editor of the "Primitive Methodist," and after Union co-editor of the "N.Z. Methodist Times," and for a short period also of the "Vanguard." He

collaborated with Mr. J. Malton Murray in issuing "Prohibition in New Zealand," and his latest book "Stephen Arkwright's Adventures" appeared in print just after his death. He was President of the Primitive Methodist Conference in 1900. In his passing, the Methodist Church loses one of its most faithful and efficient ministers, and the cause of moral reform one of its ablest champions. A capable leader, a loyal friend, a faithful servant of Jesus Christ, he rests from his labours and his works do follow him.

William Bramwell Scott.—William Bramwell Scott was born at Thames, New Zealand on October 21, 1873. After a period of effective Home Mission service he entered the full ministry in 1907. His career in Circuit work has been marked by energy, ability, devotion and success. He passed away in the full activity of a successful ministry, after a few days illness. He was a lover of clean sport, a keen student of Biblical history and the history of New Zealand. He kept closely in touch with public affairs. With a good journalistic capacity, he was an excellent Conference Reporter, and convener of important Committees. He used his ability effectively against the Liquor Traffic. He was respected for the honesty and fearlessness of his convictions and his genuine friendliness. He was a faithful preacher and Gospel witness, and the Radio public liked him for the freshness of his message. He loved Nature, was an authority on Horticulture, and beautified every Parsonage he occupied. As a Chaplain to the Forces during two years of the war he was much esteemed by officers and men. He had the welfare of Returned Soldiers at heart, both as an earnest personal champion and as Chairman of the Assistance Board of the R.S.A. The President of the R.S.A. said of him "He carried out his duties with a rare understanding of the soldier and his problems." "Padre" Scott loved peace and hated war, but his eyes were not closed to the dangers that beset our Empire, and he championed the necessity for military training. His colleagues will miss his vigour, his wise guidance, and his very charming personality. He was a good servant of the Church of Jesus Christ and his works do follow him.

Edward Drake.—The retirement of the Rev. Edward Drake will remove from the active ranks of the Methodist ministry one of its outstanding figures who live in the love and esteem of the whole Church. Mr. Drake was born at Newcastle-under-Lyme in Staffordshire and early yielded to the call of Jesus Christ at the Higherland Primitive Methodist Church with which his parents and family were closely associated. At the age of sixteen he left home for the city of Lincoln where he was authorised to accompany a local preacher and to assist in the services. On becoming an accredited local preacher he moved to Southampton and later to Horncastle in Lincolnshire where his preaching gifts found full exercise. At the age of twenty he entered the Evangelist's Home at Birmingham conducted by the Rev. J. Odell. Here training and evangelistic work were united. Later at Ramsgate he did purely ministerial work. Here he was recommended for the full ministry and being accepted by his Conference was sent out to New Zealand. Arriving in September, 1893, he served for several months in Auckland and early in the following year he became the first minister in the Cheviot District which had just been opened for settlement. Here he taught school, did ministerial work and pursued probationary studies. In 1895 he became the colleague of the Rev. James Guy in Wellington. Two years later he was ordained and appointed to Dunedin. Later he spent five years at Thames. In 1904 he was elected President of the Primitive Methodist Conference and was stationed at Wanganui where he spent six fruitful years. Mr. Drake was a member of the Methodist Union Committee and the impress of his influence is stamped upon the Basis of Union. Upon the consummation of Methodist Union, Mr. Drake at once took high rank in the United Church where his abilities found wide scope for their exercise first as assistant secretary and in 1916 as secretary of the Conference, an office he continued to fill until his elevation to the Presidency in 1920. He has been Chairman of the Otago, Wellington and Auckland Districts, in all of which his administration has been marked by insight and wisdom. Of broad social sympathies, he has been President of the Social Service Union, a member of the Christchurch Social Council of Churches, a leader in the cause of Prohibition and a worker in every cause of moral and social reform. He represents his Church on the Broadcasting Committee and is President of the Christchurch Ministers' Association. Few men have served on more Connexional Committees than he. He has been Chairman of the Home and Foreign Mission Boards, of the Wesley Training College Board and of the South Island Orphanage Board, and at present is Chairman of the Supernumerary Fund Board and of the Connexional Fire Insurance Board. He is Treasurer of the Removal Expenses Fund and of Deaconess Institution and a valued member of the Committees of the Loan Fund and "Methodist Times." Connexional work has never been done at the expense of his Circuits. His Circuit work has ever been marked by zealous industry, judgment and courtesy. Loyal to ideals and clear in his convictions his preaching has been fruitful in conversions, in building up the Church and in inspiring others to take up manifold Christian ministries. He has a genius for holding the loyalty of his people and in thirty-seven years has served in only six circuits. Rich in experience and wise in counsel Mr. Drake relinquishes his relationship to the active ranks of the ministry well equipped to continue those connexional activities in which he has

served the Church with rare distinction and unsparing devotion. We pray that his future years may be rich in splendour and fruitful in satisfactions.

Harold E. Bellhouse.—With the retirement of the Rev. H. E. Bellhouse as permanent Supernumerary a distinguished ministry in our New Zealand Church concludes its active service. Mr. Bellhouse was born near Leeds, England, in 1869 and came to New Zealand with his parents twelve years later. His youth was spent in the Auckland Province and city. He began to preach in 1886 and in 1891 was nominated as a Candidate for the Ministry by the Rev. E. Best, then Superintendent of the Pitt Street Circuit. He spent two and a half years at Wesley College Three Kings, and was called out in September, 1893 to establish the new Circuit at Stratford. In 1896 he acted as supply for the Rev. J. J. Lewis during his visit to England. He received ordination in 1898 and was appointed as the first married minister to the Levin-Otaki Circuit. In many important Circuits he served a lengthened term, his concluding ministry at Dunedin extending over eleven years. He was elected to the Presidency of the Conference in 1918 taking office in the following year. He rendered conspicuous service as secretary of the Board of Examiners for thirteen years and his gifts of administration found a sphere of exercise as Chairman of the Otago District for eleven years. Mr. Bellhouse has excelled throughout his long ministry in every department of Circuit work. He has stood in the front rank of the preachers, not only of his own Church, but of the Dominion, he has shown himself a diligent and sympathetic pastor, and in every circuit the details of administration have been faithfully attended to. A man of studious habits, of wide reading, of independent thought, his ministry has been educational and inspiring to young and old alike and will long be remembered in our New Zealand Church. The Conference rejoices to hear of the work Mr. Bellhouse is still doing as supply in the Christchurch (Woolston) Circuit and trusts that he may long be spared to serve the Church in such ways as opportunity and health may permit.

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John Common.—John Common was born at Enfield near Oamaru in 1880, in a christian atmosphere which gave more than one member of the family to the Church, for while his sister gave years of valiant service to the pioneer work of Christ in the Solomon Islands, her brother gave his life to the work of winning New Zealand for the Gospel. After several years as a Local Preacher he was appointed to the Murchison H.M. Station in August, 1912. After a term here and at Havelock, he volunteered for service in the Medical Corps at the Great War. Returning to H.M. work in 1921 he has laboured in several Home Mission Stations with great acceptance.

His kindly and sympathetic disposition has made him an acceptable pastor, especially when sorrow has overtaken the people, while as a preacher he was faithful to the Gospel, his message always tending to the instruction and edification of the hearers. Recently his health has been indifferent, and he feels that he must relinquish the work which he loves. He retires with the good will of his brethren, the affection of his people, and the united prayers of the church for a useful and happy future.

A. L. Witheford.—In acceding to the request for retirement of Mr. A. L. Witheford, we desire to place on record our appreciation of his faithful service to the Church over a period of 18 years. Entering the active work as a Home Missionary in 1917, he was appointed to Cromwell, and served subsequently in a number of Home Mission Stations. As a builder he has been pleased to turn his technical knowledge to practical account in the interests of the various Stations where he has laboured, and many alterations and additions to Churches and other buildings pay silent tribute to his work. As a spiritual builder he has left enduring monuments to his Master in changed lives and strengthened characters. He retires from the work with the love and esteem of his brethren following him into his new sphere.

REPORT FOR 1935

The general position as revealed by the Statistical Returns is far from encouraging. It is to be hoped that careful consideration will be given to the report which unfortunately presents decreases indicating a retreat along many lines of church life.

General Returns.

The following table shows the trend of work over a period of five years. Junior and Infant Membership are dealt with under the heading of Youth Work.

It must be kept in mind that these years represent the depression period. While Ministers and Probationers have increased by 10, we must place against this increase a slightly increased number of Supernumeraries and Ministers without Pastoral Charge. The Local Preachers have increased by 39 but Home Missionaries have decreased by 12. Class Leaders have almost doubled. The Membership shows an increase of 758 over the period and Communicants an increase of 1097. Over against these increases must be placed the decrease of 13 Preaching Places, a return calling for attention.

For the first time in the period under review we report a decrease in Membership and Communicants. The large increase in Members on Probation reported last year naturally led to the hope for an increase in members this year. The total decrease of 269 Members was unexpected. The decrease of 17 Class Leaders is probably due to the resolution of last Conference: Minutes, page 46, resolution 4. One District recommends that a still clearer definition of the term Class Leader is required.

Figures do not necessarily indicate the real life of the church. In some Circuits there has been a thorough purging of rolls. This may be the beginning of a higher standard of membership resulting in a deeper realisation of the responsibilities involved. If so, then would it not be worth while following Wesley's policy in expecting that high standard. If our membership does not signify a vital spiritual life, then would it not be better to seek returns which more truly indicate the true position.

Youth Returns.

In preparing these it has been found necessary to revise some of the totals returned during the past two or three years.

Bible Classes.

The importance of our B.C. work has been appreciated for many years, being regarded as the recruiting ground for our Church Membership. During the developing years the Movements showed steady progress. Two years ago a decrease was recorded. Last year partly retrieved the loss. This year a decrease of 403 members is reported. The following table shows the position of both class membership and B.C. members who are also church members.

In considering Church Membership it must be remembered that a percentage of Junior B.C. members will be returned as Junior Church Members, of whom we have returned 7700. It is, of course, impossible to estimate how many are returned as such but it will be safe to state that 75% of B.C. members are also either Senior or Junior Church Members. Because of this, the decrease of 403 members on our B.C. Rolls is a serious matter and should receive the sympathetic consideration of the Circuit Courts.

Primary, Junior and Intermediate Scholars.

For a third year in succession a decrease is reported in these columns. The position is tabled below, showing increases and decreases over the period of five years.

Particularly significant is the decrease recorded in the Cradle Roll and Primary figures. It is an accepted fact that the growth of the Sunday cheap excursions together with the advent of the motor car have seriously interfered with the religious education of our children. One other factor, however, must be taken into consideration. For many years the birth rate in New Zealand has been steadily declining. The children entering our Primary Departments in 1935 would probably be born in 1932. The fall in the birthrate that year was a fraction under 8%: the decrease in our Primary attendance this year is approximately 5%. Statistics show that in 50 years the New Zealand birthrate declined 54%. In other words, if the birthrate recorded in 1883 had been maintained in 1933, instead of 24,334 births being registered, there would have been 53,200 children born in our country. This heavy loss in child life is doubtless responsible for a percentage of the losses recorded in our Youth Work in recent years. This, however, does not warrant any satisfaction with the position as shown above, especially when it is remembered there are thousands of children still untouched by the Sunday Schools of our Dominion. One other fact is worth noting. The percentage of deaths rises abruptly between the ages of from 5 to 10 years.

In three years we have lost 1993 scholars, including B.C. members, from our rolls. The figures are:—

The totals printed in the minutes of last year should have been as shown above. The Youth Department is facing the position but if our Youth work is to develop as we believe it should, every Circuit must be prepared to give it the most important place in the programme for this year.

Junior and Infant Church Membership.

It is impossible to present satisfactory returns under this heading. For instance; in the Youth Returns a decrease of 331 Junior members is reported. Under the same heading the General Returns report a decrease of 221. The Youth Department returns 6581 Junior Church Members; the General Returns report 7700 Junior Members. Does the difference represent children and young people not in touch with either Sunday School or Bible Class life? The same discrepancies are to be found in the returns of Infant members: the General Returns report over 1000 more Infant members than are reported by the Youth Department. The reason for this might well be investigated by the Department.

For many years Infant Membership Returns have shown an increase. Last year the Junior membership registered a decrease: this year both Junior and Infant membership report decreases; Junior, 221; Infant, 80. With decreasing Youth returns this is to be expected. In Junior membership the largest decreases are, Wellington 132, and South Canterbury 156. Both these Districts, with South Auckland, return the largest decreases in Infant membership.

Youth Societies.

The scope of these activities is so wide and the nature of the activities so varied and change so frequently that without detailed particulars it is impossible to give anything like a satisfactory report.

Schools, Teachers, Officers and B.C. Leaders.

Taking again the five years period the returns show that, though a decrease of 15 schools is reported this year, we have to-day 30 more schools than in 1931. This is the first year in this period that a decrease has been recorded. South Auckland returns 9 less schools and Taranaki-Wanganui 6. Auckland and Hawke's Bay-Manawatu alone report increases, a total of 5.

The following gives a summary of the Staffs of our Youth Work.

Many B.C. Members are also S.S. Teachers whose Church membership will be returned both as Teachers and as B.C. members.

Closely associated with the School Staff is the problem of the 13 to 15 years old scholar. The British Methodist Sunday School Department, who returned at the last Conference a roll loss of nearly 63,000, a decrease nearly 2% greater than we return this year, reports that their greatest problem is the 11 to 14 years old scholar. Our Junior B.C. work was organised to prevent

this leakage and has done so to some extent. When, in 1923, this column was first included in the Youth Returns, the figures showed that 295 scholars within this period had ceased to attend. This year, following several years when the number was larger, 593 scholars are reported under this head. This is an increase of 100% in 13 years.

Maori Work.

A review of the Maori Work is both interesting and encouraging. The following figures give the progress during the past five years.

From the above it will be seen that over the period there has been an increase of 5 Preaching Places, of 12 Home Missionaries against which is a decrease of 2 Ministers; an increase of 3 Deaconesses, of 92 Local Preachers and of 139 Members.

The increases recorded this year are encouraging. They are: 3 Preaching Places, 3 Home Missionaries, 1 Deaconess, 95 Local Preachers, and 57 Members. The increase in Membership has been in the Waikato and the King Country.

In order to make a full report on the Maori Work I recommend that the Maori Statistics presented to Synod be also sent direct to the General Secretary.

Recorded losses in our European membership are a cause of deep concern. While refusing to be unduly cast down by these losses we yet feel that

they constitute a grave challenge to our Church, a call for solemn heart-searching, deepened penitence, intensified prayer, and renewed dedication. In this spirit, the Lord being our helper, we resolve to recover lost ground and occupy fresh territory for God and His Kingdom.

QUESTION XXXIII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the Welfare of the Church?

WELFARE OF THE CHURCH COMMITTEE.

Report for 1935.

During the year the Committee has given consideration to the proposed "combined educative policy," referred to it by Conference. (see Minutes, 1935, p. 49). While recognising that the proposed policy would have an educative and stimulative value, it was considered inadvisable to launch it at the present time. The Committee was led to this conclusion by two considerations:—

- (a) The need of attacking more urgent and fundamental problems facing the Church;
- (b) The impracticability, in view of the absence of the necessary co-operative machinery and the present diversity of opinion on the topics mentioned, of securing the desired joint testimony.

We therefore recommend that in view of more urgent fundamental problems and the impracticability of securing a joint testimony, no immediate action in respect of the "combined educative policy" (see Minutes 1935, p. 49) be taken.

Educative Policy.

The Committee recommends the following proposals:—

1. That the scope of the work of the "Welfare of the Church Committee," be defined as **dominantly educational**.
2. That the modern tendency to abandon the New Testament method of building up the Kingdom of God, by the conversion of individuals, in favour of political and economic expedients be strongly resisted.
3. That efforts be made to combine in one effective system, the three dominant aspects of New Testament religion, viz:—
 - (i) The **Ethical Aspect** with its strong emphasis on the absolute in conduct.
 - (ii) The **Gospel Aspect** with its stress on the Grace of God.
 - (iii) The **Healing Aspect** with its emphasis on certain mental and physical states as hindering the work of Grace.
4.
 - (a) To emphasise the characteristic New Testament view that conversion is the process whereby men receive the power to live according to the standards of the Sermon on the Mount.
 - (b) To give prominence to our Lord's solemn warnings that without this type of righteousness man shall "in no case" qualify for entry into the Kingdom.
 - (c) To overthrow weak views of the saving work of our Lord which limiting or tending to limit its efficacy to the forgiveness of sinful acts open the way to a selfish attempt at appropriation through fear.
 - (d) To seek from modern knowledge about human nature, an understanding of those selfish motivations which issue not only in warped religious lives but also in sicknesses of mind and body.

5. That psychological findings, arising from modern investigations into the problems of neurotic personality be related to the work of the ministry and together with necessary practical safeguards, be made available to ministers by means of

- (a) Lectures delivered at Conference 1937. or
- (b) Lectures at May Synods or
- (c) Literature published by the Conference.

B.—N.Z. METHODIST LOCAL PREACHERS' ASSOCIATION

Annual Report, 1936.

The attendance at our Executive meetings has been very encouraging : a full muster of members has been the invariable rule.

Obituary.

We regret to record the death of Bro. J. R. Burley of Wellington who for many years was a valued official of our Association and who rendered loyal and devoted service to our Church. Other members of our Association have passed within the veil during the year : to the relatives and friends of all these deceased brethren we extend our deepest sympathy.

Local Preachers' Sunday.

At last Conference the Dominion Executive was requested to recommend to the Conference of 1936 a permanent date on which Local Preachers' Sunday is to be observed. All the branches were consulted ; Auckland,

Taranaki and Otago-Southland approve the second Sunday in April each year. South Auckland Branch suggests the third Sunday in May and North Canterbury Branch hopes that the matter will be reviewed at a later date. Of the Synods five were in favour of the second Sunday in April: South Auckland Synod suggested 3rd Sunday in May; Hawke's Bay-Manawatu favour second Sunday in April "where practicable" and North Canterbury the same date "where possible." Wellington Synod does not seem to have discussed this matter. The Dominion Executive after further consideration unanimously passed the following resolution:—"That we re-affirm our resolution that the second Sunday in April be observed as Local Preachers' Sunday and that Circuits or Churches which find this date inconvenient should observe some other Sunday." We accordingly submit this date to Conference with the above proviso.

Book Scheme.

Eleven book orders have been received and supplied during the year: we hope greater advantage will be taken of this excellent scheme during the next 12 months.

Long Service Certificates.

During the year five Long Service Certificates were presented.

"Local" Preacher or "Lay" Preacher.

The replies received from the Branches would seem to indicate that there is little or no enthusiasm at present for any change of name. The Executive therefore recommends that the traditional name be retained.

Benevolent Fund Rules.

A draft of these was submitted to the branches for their consideration: one or two minor amendments were suggested and the Executive has embodied the suggestions in the final draft of Rules.

Whittome's Efficiency Course.

Since last Conference 18 copies of this excellent book have been presented to those who have been publicly received as fully-accredited Local Preachers. We are glad to record that two ladies, viz.—Miss E. Taylor of Woolston Circuit, Christchurch, and Miss E. Avery of Blenheim were among those who were thus publicly received as members of our Association. We would emphasise the fact that unless this book is presented to those who are being received at the public reception service by one of our members that it defeats, to some extent, the object of our Association in making the presentation.

Public Reception Services.

We would again call the attention of the Ministers of our Church to Conference Resolutions regarding the public reception of Local Preachers at one of the Sunday Services and we would request that the form of service provided by Conference should not be abbreviated and that a Local Preacher be invited to welcome the brother or sister who is being received into our ranks, and to present the copy of Whittome's Efficiency Course on behalf of our Association.

Periodical Communications.

Last year 740 members of our Association received from the Executive two communications containing five pages of helpful reading, comprising resumes of addresses, outlines of sermons, etc: letters of appreciation expressing the help derived from these communications have been received. Our Annual Meeting will consider the extension of this privilege to Maori Home Missionaries and Local Preachers.

Trinity College Proposals re training of Local Preachers.

Branches have been consulted and Ministers have been requested to recommend this scheme to likely young men who are in a position to take advantage of it. We have also brought this matter before every member of our Association. It is hoped that in the near future some scheme will be evolved which will enable Local Preachers in each District to become members of a Correspondence Class or Group under the Tutorship of some minister residing in their District.

Fraternal Greetings.

In connection with the Centenary Celebrations of the Victorian Church last year, Sept. 30th was designated as "Local Preachers' Day" and a tea and public meeting were arranged. The Queen of Tonga conveyed a greeting from the Local Preachers of Tonga and the greetings of our Association were also read at this evening meeting.

Bi-Centenary Celebrations.

We suggest that the Special Conference Committee set up to consider proposals for the fitting celebration of the Bi-Centenary of the Birth of Methodism be requested to take into its consideration the advisability of arranging a "Local Preachers' Day or Function"; in connection with the celebrations.

C.—METHODIST MEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

Fourth Annual Report.

Since last Conference four new branches have been started : 15 branches have ceased to meet. There are now 51 branches of the Fellowship, nearly all are functioning well but some are commendably active.

Branch Activities.

Some groups meet weekly with splendid attendances : others fortnightly or monthly. In many of the branches the younger members of the church are vitally and actively interested in the movement : men outside the church are attracted to our meetings and in some instances are linking up with the Church : branch members are finding new avenues of service.

Branch Officials.

Experience has taught us that the successful working of the branches depends to a great extent upon the right kind of leadership : where wise and enthusiastic leadership is given success invariably results : care therefore should be exercised in the appointment of the President and Secretary of each branch and in cases where these officials are doing good work an effort should be made to retain their services for two years at least or even for three years : the progress of some of the branches has been retarded by an annual change of officials.

Men's Sundays.

In many districts Men's Sundays have become a recognised institution ; on these occasions our Men occupy the Choir seats and lead the singing : take part in the services and usually at the evening service take over every part of the service including the sermon. These special services are greatly enjoyed by the congregations : special singing by the Men's Choirs and by Quartette Parties, Solos, Duets, etc., and the added interest resulting from so many taking part in each service all conspire to make the services memorable and rich in spiritual blessing to the members of the congregation. We commend this innovation to all branches and suggest that two Sundays each year be set apart for these special services.

Male Voice Choirs, Etc.

Quartette and double quartette parties and Men's Choirs connected with the branches are rendering invaluable service not only in their own meetings but also in Church Services and at special functions : in Branches where these combinations of male singers do not exist an effort should be made to start same.

Our Official Hymn.

At last Conference it was decided to adopt hymn No. 585 in the new Methodist Hymn Book as the official hymn of the Fellowship Movement : many branches have adopted this hymn and we commend it to all the branches.

District Committees.

Our Movement is still in its infancy and will need to be carefully fostered and nurtured : we trust the District Committees will resolutely set themselves to do everything possible to consolidate the branches which have been formed and to make an earnest endeavour to establish new branches.

Synod Resolutions.

All the Synods adopted the Interim Report and District Committees were appointed in all Synods with the exception of Wellington and Otago-Southland. The Committee for the latter District will be nominated at Conference.

The North Canterbury Synod passed the following Resolution: "This Synod rejoices in that the Fellowship is gathering together the men of the Church, creating more interest in, and service for, the Kingdom of God and commends the objects of this Fellowship to the ministers and men of all our Churches."

Ministers have also written advising that the men connected with their Churches and Circuits have, since linking up with the Movement, become quickened in spiritual life and as a consequence have become keener and more zealous Church workers.

Not only in the ordinary routine of Church work is a keener interest exhibited but new avenues of service have been exploited.

We again appeal to the ministers and laymen to do everything possible to build up the Movement where Branches exist and to inaugurate new branches wherever possible.

The Methodist Social Service Association, representing the three Orphanages, the Prison Chaplaincy, Hospital Chaplaincy, Maori work in the city, suburbs, and country areas, the benevolent work at Pitt Street and other churches, should make its appeal not only to Methodism, but also to the general public, as magnificent humanitarian service.

QUESTION XXXIV.—What are the Resolutions respecting our Sunday Schools and the Youth of the Church?

YOUTH DEPARTMENT'S REPORT FOR 1935.

1. The Call to Unity.

God is one, and only as His Church dwells in true fellowship with Him, can she express to the world, the Unity which is God's gift to Her, and which the world is so desperately needing.

This central truth has increasingly become both the background and purpose of our thinking and action as the Youth Department of our Church. There are practical aspects of this vision of Unity which we desire to emphasise.

(a) **Local Youth Committees:** The foundations of our visible Church are laid not so much in our Conference, or Youth Conventions, as in the high quality of Christian life within the local Churches.

It is in the Christ-centred fellowship of the Local Youth Committee, that the Sunday School teachers and Bible Class Leaders can come together in study and prayer, as well as for frank and healthy discussion. Thus they may become a team under a Captain, sure of their direction and plan of campaign, and through common sharing of experiences, needs and ideas, become one body equipped for the tasks of the Kingdom. The whole plan of local administration is a matter for common sense arrangement to meet local needs for the highest good of all. There are numerous instances of cordial relationships and progressive work issuing from the Local Youth Committee.

(b) **District Youth Committee.**—A healthy national consciousness is based first on local loyalties and then on district loyalties. In one or two districts there are signs of this development. In several, however, one serious weakness amongst teachers and leaders is the parochial outlook, and an unreadiness to give district leadership.

Greater progress will come when our Church as well as our Youth Leaders realise the importance of District unity in policy and planning. We cannot hope to build our ideal of unity until there is a rich and vigorous district consciousness sufficiently creative to work out its own programme.

(c) **Youth Board and National Councils.**—Under the present order, our national youth bodies are centred in one place. For this reason there are certain inevitable difficulties in contact with districts and in mutual understanding. The work of such bodies demands experience, imagination, and a vital corporate fellowship in order to (a) visualise the needs in the local Churches throughout the Dominion; (b) stimulate district activity and bring to each unit a knowledge of the whole; (c) work together in national co-operation; (d) challenge the Church with the claims of youth in terms of present need and thought. The location of national committees in other centres is a healthy sign. Within these bodies there is a growing realisation of corporate tasks and responsibility, too big for any one section, but within the scope of the larger unity.

2. Thinking God's Thoughts After Him.

Youth as well as Age is bewildered and is looking with hopeful eyes for the signposts of its future. Therefore we beseech the Church to declare with the faith and passion of the prophets, the work of God in the terms of to-day's thought, with fearless application to life—personal, social, international. The paganism of to-day must first be out-thought and then out-lived—and the challenge comes to the whole Church, but especially to its youth.

3. Action.

One of the vivid impressions left by Dr. Kagawa is that of the Christian life in **action**. The Youth Board has, during the year, sought to prepare for such action along three principal lines :—

(a) **Evangelism** : Following the healthy discussion of last Conference this issue has been further reviewed. The approach for our time is through teaching, study and fellowship, where in a natural and healthy way Christ and His Kingdom begin to be accepted with the mind as well as with the heart. This is the fundamental purpose of the regular Bible Class meeting, and is accentuated in Easter Camps and Leadership Schools.

The Evangelism of the Youth of to-day largely depends on

- (1) The living witness of individual Christians.
- (2) A Class leadership that is truly God-conscious.
- (3) A Church dwelling in Unity and proclaiming and living God's truth with fearlessness and urgency.

(b) **Peace** : Because we believe the way of peace to be inherent in God's will and purpose and because of the persistent questioning of youth the Board has given prolonged consideration to this question, with the result that separate recommendations are submitted through the Public Questions Committee to the end that our Youth may be helped to face the implication of the Gospel as they see it. It is fully realised how dependent the whole issue is on the individual's experience of the peace and love of God, in Christ.

(c) **Leadership** : The Youth life of our Church has been blessed with an able and devoted leadership in the field. We now realise that the needs of our work are such as to require special training, as well as personal qualities. In addition to a true discipleship, requirements such as the following should be met :

- (1) A training in the knowledge of the Bible.
- (2) Skill in the art of teaching and leading.
- (3) A theoretical and practical training in psychology, from childhood to adult life.

The Board is satisfied that in a teaching ministry, especially for childhood and youth, women have a special gift, and that the Church must take hold of this great potential service.

4. Future Policy.

In December, 1934, the Board issued a Policy Report outlining a method for bringing about a decentralisation of its work into districts, and where full time District Youth Directors would be appointed to work for the three sections involved, *i.e.*—Y.W. and Y.M.B.C. and S.S.

This matter is still under consideration by District Youth Committees and Unions and will be reported to the Conference in due course before any action is taken. The widespread study of the report shows, in many parts a growing appreciation of the principle, and we are dependent on an enlightened leadership within each district to bring the matter to a successful issue.

5. N.Z. Council of Religious Education.

The Council continues to help in the extension of Bible teaching in State Schools. It is estimated that 35,000 of the children have in these lessons their only opportunity to learn of Jesus Christ. The Council desires to make it widely known that State teachers who are disposed to help in

this work are not precluded by any regulation. Also that the B. and F. Bible Society can supply copies of the New Testament at threepence each. In Auckland the Training College students attend the Bible lessons in the Normal School for observation. A new Bible Syllabus is under consideration. A Vacation School of Religious Study is planned to be held in Christchurch, May 18-23, 1936.

SUNDAY SCHOOL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

6. The Sunday School Executive Council has continued throughout the year to devote itself to the strengthening of our Dominion Sunday School work. Members of the Council are appreciative of the privilege and responsibility that is theirs in giving the Dominion Leadership to a section of the Christian work that occupies such a strategic position. The Council also recognises that any measure of success that has been attained has been largely due to the consecrated service of Sunday School workers in towns and country places throughout the Dominion.

7. Literature.

That the Graded Lessons of Australia and New Zealand are much appreciated in their new form is shown by a notable increase in the already large circulation and by the following statement in a letter to the Council from a S.S. Superintendent:—

"I would like to take this opportunity of saying how fine the lessons are prepared in the "Teacher" for the benefit of S.S. Teachers. It has become an easy matter to work up one's lessons now. I for one appreciate what is done to help us make the Bible Stories as interesting and instructive as they can be."

The Y.P. Director, Rev. E. P. Blamires, represented the Council at the triennial meeting of the Graded Lessons Committee which adopted a number of improvements for the 1936-38 series recommended by our Schools. A report of the Committee's work appeared in the "Methodist Times."

8. Correspondence Sunday Schools.

Under the enthusiastic superintendency of Mrs. H. M. P. Berry, this section of our work has made remarkable progress. At the present time there are 31 teachers and 80 scholars on the roll. Letters are frequently received by teachers from parents expressing gratitude and appreciation for the interest taken in their children.

9. Maori Sunday Schools.

The Council has pressed forward with its scheme for assisting the work of the Deaconesses among the Maori children and has been successful in arranging for 16 Maori Sunday Schools to be "adopted" by 16 of our Pakeha Schools. That this work is really effective and appreciated by these Deaconesses is proved by the many letters of appreciation received. This one is typical:—

"Please convey to your Executive the thanks and gratitude of my Sunday School teachers and myself for the valuable assistance and interest shown by you in securing the co-operation of other Pakeha Schools. The scheme is invaluable and I feel that perhaps at last we have a way of creating a further interest and the true fellowship that should exist between Maori and Pakeha."

10. Teacher Training.

The Council is gratified to be able to report that definite progress has been made in launching an improved Teacher Training Scheme for Sunday School Teachers. There is now a Combined Committee in Christchurch

called the "**Leader and Teacher Training Committee**" on which there are three representatives of the Sunday School Executive Council. It is now possible for S.S. Teachers to take up this scheme, thus enabling them to gain further knowledge of the task that they have accepted in the Master's Name, and also an enrichment of their own spiritual life and growth.

11. Examinations.

It is the policy of the Council to urge Schools to use the Examinations provided by the various Sunday School Unions rather than conduct a Dominion Examination. The Council is endeavouring to arrange for the setting of a Uniform series of questions for use by the Unions conducting Examinations.

12. Temperance.

With the approach of the Prohibition Poll, interest in Temperance has been quickened. The great need amongst our Youth of to-day is for enlightened educational work. The Council has drawn the attention of Superintendents to the need to include effective study on this question in their year's programme.

The Alliance in Australia and New Zealand has adopted a proposal of the Lessons Committee, that Temperance Sunday be observed on the first Sunday in September.

13. Finance.

Our appeal for finance is made only once a year and the progressive development of our Sunday School work depends upon the response to this appeal. **Local Youth Secretaries hold the key position**—Where the financial appeal is organised through the Church, Bible Class and Sunday School by the Local Youth Secretary in co-operation with the Minister, success is assured. Many Circuits still fail to carry out their obligations to the Department notwithstanding the recommendations of Conference. The enthusiasm of the Circuits who stand by their obligations is a source of inspiration to the Council and our gratitude for their response is recorded. Without their regular support our work would have to cease. It is hoped that the defaulting circuits will be stirred to similar enthusiastic support.

14. Y.P. Director.

The Y.P. Director, Rev. E. P. Blamires, still brings to his task that freshness and vision that have always been characteristic of his work; his devotion and enthusiasm remain unabated. His intensive itinerating has been wonderfully valuable to our Sunday Schools in particular and Youth work generally. His work cannot be tabulated with justice; it is no exaggeration to say that wherever he visits workers are heartened, problems straightened out, and an impetus given to the youth work in that locality.

15. General.

The following matters are also receiving the attention of the Council :—

- (a) We regret that it has not been possible to make any progress with the idea of having a Committee on Social Programmes for children. Negotiations are under way with the Bible Class Combined Committee with a view to co-operating with their Committee on the matter.
- (b) The Bible Class Movements again showed their desire to co-operate with the Council by making provision for S.S. Teachers' sections in their Easter Camps and Summer Schools.
- (c) The change to a morning session for Sunday Schools has been justified in some instances but not in all. Wherever a transfer is contemplated the procedure is most important and the Council is prepared to offer suggestions on request.

Y.W.B.C. MOVEMENT.

16. The Movement.

The projection of Social questions into the conscious thought of our Young Women's classes is undoubtedly of major importance in the developmental work of the year. The Movement has been slow to take hold of Social issues, and even now has only just begun a creative study of the tremendous forces which are moulding the thought of youth. The challenge of world forces in a materialistic age is being realised, and a quiet waiting upon God, to know His will and feel His power, has marked all considerations. The immediate task of the future is to see what should be women's contribution to these questions.

17. N.Z. Executive Council.

Members of the N.Z. Executive Council are wholeheartedly with the Youth Board and the Y.M. Movement in an endeavour to bring before its membership the urgency for clear thinking on the Peace and War question.

Arising from Church Conference and Youth Board discussions, important deliberations have found a place in Council meetings on the subject of Evangelism and Public Questions. These will be continued at the Fellowship Conference where there will be Dominion representation.

18. Membership.

Statistics reveal that in (320) affiliated classes there is a total membership of (3000). An awareness of the possibilities of extension is shown in the contact made by local Unions with (160) known unaffiliated classes.

These figures are in a measure satisfactory. The knowledge of vast numbers of young people in Professional, Commercial and Industrial life, as yet untouched by Christian Youth organisations, guards against an easy satisfaction of work accomplished. These unexplored avenues for extension present a wide field of investigation.

19. Easter Camps.

As a result of reports received from the 24 camps held during Easter, 1935, the whole purpose of Easter Camps came under review. Examination of the policy will be continued at the forthcoming Fellowship Conference.

A more vivid appreciation of the Christian Way of Love, was experienced by 1060 campers throughout the Dominion in a study of "The Gift." The revelation of the height, depth and breadth of the love of God, culminating in the glory of the gift of Jesus Christ made its appeal and many and varied were the expressions of consecration in the camps.

20. Missionary.

The main Missionary activity of the Movement continues in the support of its own Missionary Sisters on the Home and Overseas Fields. Sister Nicholls has been an excellent representative among the Maori people for 13 years, while Sister Ada Lee is proving a worthy successor to Sister Ruth Grant.

The Church Missionary Debt Reduction Fund Appeal has been sympathetically received by Unions and Classes, engendering a wider sympathy for the Mission Field in general.

To meet the expense of the lining of the verandah of the Sisters' Home at Rotorua was the privilege of the Movement.

21. Travelling Secretary.

The Church will join with the Movement in regret at Miss Dora Sheat's retirement from office in January, 1936. Her sense of the stewardship of life has made her gift to the young womanhood of the Church essentially a creative gift. To tabulate the extent of such giving is impossible; the building will continue and the lives of many members will grow more surely into God-centred lives because of her leadership. We commend to our Church with equal confidence the appointment of Miss Anne Firth as successor in this office.

22. Finance.

Many contributory factors seem to make the raising of the Movement finance more difficult with succeeding years, yet the standard of giving built into the Movement life over a long period of time carries its high idealism into the present. The Thankofferings for this year will about equal those of last year.

23. Annual Convention.

The substituting of a bi-ennial Convention (with a Fellowship Conference on alternate years) for an Annual Convention is of importance. Freed from administrative detail the Fellowship Conference will be of inestimable value, with time for a deeper searching into the creative force which is the up-stream of the Movement activity.

24. South Canterbury Union.

The formation this year of the South Canterbury Union is a natural mark of development of the Movement. With the growth of Bible Class life and interest in every district there arises periodically the need for establishing new centres of Executive responsibility. The acceptance of office by a company of Timaru members was marked by a week-end of Dedication at which the Movement President and the Travelling Secretary were present.

Y.M.B.C. MOVEMENT.

25. The Movement.

The work of the Movement has proceeded steadily throughout the year, without any events of a spectacular nature. There is evidence of the Holy Spirit's action upon the lives of the youth of our Church, and we pray that as a Movement we may keep the channels clear. To a very large extent our membership comprises those who have "grown up" in the Church or with definitely Christian home influences. It is a matter for regret that our impact upon the national life is not more immediately productive of members from "outside." We believe, however, that while there will always be urgent need for improvement, the impact made by consecrated members of the B.C. Movements is of very great value. For our own members the regular devotional exploration of Christian truth and of its implications for current life, individually and corporately, with its complement of rich fellowship and social and recreational activities, continue to justify the work of the Movement.

26. Membership.

Statistics compiled for last Convention disclosed fairly substantial increases, 284 affiliated classes containing a total of 3015 members with an average attendance of 2179. In addition the Movement is in close touch with many unaffiliated and some interdenominational classes.

27. Finance.

The provision of the funds required for Movement enterprises is no easy matter, but it is undertaken with patience and enthusiasm and a genuine spirit of thanksgiving is largely present. We are continuing the method of raising all our finance by voluntary thankofferings and the indications are that the results for this year will be better than last.

28. Travelling Secretary.

With enthusiasm last year we announced that Cyril Burton had been re-engaged for this position and a new era had begun with special Leadership Tutorial work. Early this year, however, Cyril accepted a call to possibly greater service with the Government's Child Welfare Department. After a short delay, Stan. G. Brooker, a candidate for the ministry, was appointed to fill the vacancy along special lines of work. Valuable contacts continue to be made and much inspiration and help are rendered through this important office.

29. Easter Camps.

1185 Campers in 15 camps shared recreation, inspiration and study of "Real Life" especially written by Cyril Burton. Fewer campers were present, but all camps reported splendid times. Rev. E. P. Blamires' booklet "This New Way of Life" is still widely used following decisions made at Camps. These camps continue to provide an unparalleled opportunity for wise well-balanced evangelism, and each year hundreds of boys come very naturally to the occasion of their first confession of Christ. Many camps send lists of names to the ministers, but as all who attend camp are confronted with the claim of Christ upon their lives, we suggest that ministers and leaders follow-up in every case without exception. When ministers can themselves attend camp it is much appreciated.

30. Missionary.

Careful consideration of our finances caused a slight reduction in the amount voted towards Overseas Missions, but there was no slackening of interest. Unions have been asked to encourage in members an individual interest in Missionary work. This was further emphasised by a special letter from Rev. A. H. Scrivin sent to every class. We are pleased that one of our members is fully qualified for medical work and is at the disposal of the Mission Board when the medical mission can be re-established.

31. Prohibition.

After earnest thought a manifesto urging support of the N.Z. Alliance at the approaching poll has been issued to all classes. At the same time consideration was given to the wider issues of the Liquor issue, particularly as to whether Prohibition would solve the deep-seated social needs that largely cause indulgence in liquor, and a recognition of the urgent necessity for meeting such needs. The matter will be pursued further.

32. Peace.

In view of their tremendous importance to young men of Bible Class age, the issues of war and peace and the trends of world affairs have been prominently before us. We arranged a well-attended deputation to the Minister for Defence in February and explained our attitude concerning this matter and also made some practical suggestions for furthering Peace.

33. Other Public Questions.

Unemployment is a matter of deep concern to such a Movement as ours. The formation of an Unemployment Research Association has been watched with interest and we have endeavoured through our Unions to collect information about Relief Camps for the Association. Further, we have recommended that each Union establish an employment bureau to assist in the placing of unemployed members. We shall be grateful for the co-operation of ministers and others in this proposal.

Another new organisation has also aroused our interest, the Friends of Reunion, based on a similar body which has existed in Britain and elsewhere for several years. Very fine and extensive interdenominational co-operation has for long been an outstanding feature of N.Z. Christian Youth Movements and the formation of such an unofficial body to aid the Study of the differences and similarities of the branches of the Christian Church and the exploration of ways to unity, merit our keen support.

34. General.

Our last Convention regarded it as a privilege that the President of Conference was able to live with us for the two main days of business. It is our hope that this will be repeated. A new annual competition for the Movement Elocution Cup was inaugurated at the Convention, Mr. D. R. Wills being the winner with a speech on "Improving the Physical Side of our Movement Programme." The competition provides for speeches on some aspect of Movement life and work and Ministers are excluded.

It was with great gladness that we learned of the launching of the Methodist B.C. Movement of Fiji. Largely the work of Bill Donnelly, a former Travelling Secretary of our Movement, it is a notable achievement for the Kingdom.

The little accomplished in comparison with what always remains to be done makes us crave forgiveness of our Father for our many weaknesses and calls us to constant renewal of consecration and endeavour.

CO-OPERATIVE ENTERPRISES OF THE B.C. MOVEMENTS.

35. Co-operative Enterprises of the B.C. Movement during the year have covered:—

Leaders' Schools : Four Summer Schools were held in January and four Winter Schools in May-June.

These Schools drew over 300 B.C. Leaders and prospective Leaders from all parts into fellowship and group study of the theme "Love, the Way of Life."

The fact that the number of Schools is increasing each year is a sufficient warrant of their effectiveness in advancing the general leadership of both Movements. Five Summer Schools are already planned for the coming year.

Sunday School teachers' groups are an established feature at Summer Schools.

Owing to the increasing pressure upon the Movements' joint Co-operative Committee in Wellington of the organisation of these Schools, an important development this year has been the establishment in Auckland of a National Leadership Schools Committee. This is already in full operation and will in future completely control the organisation of Summer and Winter Schools.

Movements' Day of Prayer : and **District Combined B.C. Executives' Studies** were prepared and distributed throughout the Dominion.

B.C. Syllabus : Senior, Junior and Preparatory Studies were again prepared and printed by an interdenominational Committee and these were generally adopted and used by classes throughout both the Movements. A carefully selected sequence of Studies has been outlined in each relating to leading characters in the Old Testament and studies in St. John's Gospel, the general Theme being "The Great Decision."

Leadership Training of the Movements, controlled by the joint Dominion Committee in Christchurch has been extended to incorporate a Sunday School Teacher Training Course. Our correspondence course continues to lead the way in training workers.

B.C. "Link" : continues as the valuable official organ of the Movements and the Youth Column of the "Methodist Times" well serves the Church.

Social Standards Committee : in Palmerston North handles hundreds of requests yearly for suggestions for Church and B.C. Social functions and the preparation is undertaken of programmes for general and special uses.

A movie news and criticism column now appears in the Social Standards section of the "B.C. Link."

B.C. Trading Department handles the growing business, organisation and routine relating to publications, B.C. Badges, books, etc., that are handled annually by the Movements.

CONCLUSION.

36. The Board desires to express its appreciation to thousands of devoted S.S. workers and B.C. Leaders throughout the Dominion for their loyal service and increasing support; also to the many hosts and hostesses who have so graciously received the Y.P. Director and B.C. Travelling Secretaries. This report of the Youth Board and its three Executive Councils is submitted and signed on their behalf by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board.

RESOLUTIONS.

1. That the Reports of the Youth Board, the S.S. Executive Council, and the B.C. Movements be received and adopted.
2. That the Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance Sheet of the Youth Board; S.S. Executive Council; Y.M.B.C.; and Y.W.B.C. be received and adopted.
3. That the Local and District Youth Committees give consideration to the question of the Youth Board's Decentralization Policy through the year, a report to be given by the Youth Board through the Synods.

QUESTION XXXV.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference in regard to Public Questions?

REPORT OF PUBLIC QUESTIONS COMMITTEE.

Soon after Conference the Convener of this Committee (Rev. W. Bramwell Scott) died. The Committee thus suffered an irreparable loss. At its first meeting on 28th May, 1935, high tribute was paid to Mr. Scott's worth and work, and a suitable record placed on the Minutes.

The Wellington District Executive elected the Rev. Percy Paris as Convener of this Committee, which has met regularly and done a great deal of research, study and work. Only one of the eight District Committees sent in a report, and that arrived too late. It will be considered along with reports from Synods.

The questions of Sunday Observance, Public Wrestling Displays, Penal Reform, Cinema Pictures and Posters and Free Speech have been included in those studied by three sub-committees with co-opted members; but upon these questions no statements, as yet, are made.

The following findings by the Committee are respectfully submitted to the Synods and Conference:—

Temperance.

Synods are asked to—

- (a) Reaffirm the Church's conviction that the Liquor Traffic is a cause of moral waste, domestic misery, and industrial disturbance.
- (b) Request that Local Youth Committees in each church be asked to take steps towards instituting a system of education in Sunday Schools and Bible Classes on the evil effects of alcohol as a beverage; and where no temperance society, such as the Band of Hope, exists, an effort be made to establish one.
- (c) Express appreciation of the work of the N.Z. Alliance, and urge our people to assist in organising forces for the coming Licensing Poll.

NOTE.—Every minister and home missionary has been urged to give service, and more than a hundred have replied intimating that they are already actively engaged. Several are chairmen, secretaries, or local organisers for the N.Z. Alliance. The Y.W. and Y.M.B.C. Executives have passed resolutions urging the leaders of classes to encourage our young people to assist in local campaigns.

Bible in Schools.

Synods are asked to—

- (a) Place on record their hearty appreciation of the efforts of the Bible in Schools League; and reaffirm their allegiance to the League's policy, and commend it to the prayerful and active support of our congregations.
- (b) Urge the Government to facilitate the passing of the Enabling Bill.
- (c) Earnestly request all our ministers, home missionaries and deaconesses to take full advantage of the present facilities offered under the method known as the Nelson System.

Gambling.

In view of the widespread and increasing prevalence of the gambling and betting mania, and the insidious evils attendant upon such, Synods counsel the people of our Church to abstain from participation in any form of gambling, and to do all in their power to lessen its sway in the community. We further urge that instruction in the evils of gambling be given by youth workers of the Church.

Communism.

As a Christian Church we cannot accept the philosophy of Materialistic Communism, nor can we associate ourselves with any organisation advocating methods that conflict with the teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Marriage, Divorce and Birth Control.

Before dealing with matters of Divorce and Birth Control as specific questions, this Committee desires that the following should be placed on record as :—

A STATEMENT ON CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE.

Three special propositions may be advanced respecting marriage from the Christian point of view.

1. Love is the only justification for marriage. Apart from the motive of love there is no reasonable prospect of happiness in the married state. For a variety of other reasons marriage is often entered into, and no doubt in some cases real love eventuates. Such cases, however, must be few, and any reason other than love constitutes a perilous beginning for so intimate a relation as marriage. Nothing but love will enable a man and a woman to live together happily in the face of the constant pressure of life's difficulties and provocations to annoyance and irritability; and nothing but love can make the intimacies of marriage beautiful and harmonious.

"Love suffereth long, and is kind; love envieth not; love vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not its own, is not provoked, taketh not account of evil; rejoiceth not in unrighteousness, but rejoiceth with the truth; beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things. Love never faileth."

A tie that signifies "the mystical union that is between Christ and His Church" should be a holy tie, and only love can make it that.

2. Christian marriage is monogamous and indissoluble. That is to say unless both the man and the woman sincerely intend to forsake all other and keep only unto each other so long as they both shall live their mental attitude towards marriage is not right from the Christian point of view. The self-giving on the part of each party must be without reservations. This means that the marriage tie cannot be severed, whatever the reason, without sin. This is the Christian view. Marriage is for life.

When, however, a marriage has been broken in fact, and all moral reality has gone out of the union, should society insist on keeping two people bound in a legal contract? To answer such a question one must weigh the consequences to society of Easy Divorce on the one hand, and the suffering imposed on men, women and children should divorce not be obtainable. We favour the view that there should be a way out when the conditions of union have become intolerable.

3. Christian marriage presupposes the family. An unwillingness to have children for selfish reasons defeats the purpose of marriage. In the words of the Marriage Service :—

"Marriage is not by any to be enterprised, or taken in hand unadvisedly, lightly, or wantonly, but reverently, discreetly, soberly, and in the fear of God; duly considering the causes for which Matrimony was ordained.

It was ordained for the establishment of the home, for the well-being of the family, and also for the mutual society, help and comfort, that the one ought to have of the other, both in prosperity and adversity; and it has been consecrated by the faithful keeping of good men and good women in every generation."

While it must be conceded that there are cases in which the decision to have no children can be approved ; it is still true that "Children are the natural and beautiful result of the ultimate expression of love between married persons." Happily the instinct for children is strong in the great majority of the race.

With the coming of children there should come a recognition of responsibility for their training. Only in responsible parenthood is the full development of men and women reached. It will be admitted as the dictate of common sense that a married couple should not have more children than they can support healthily and educate worthily.

To these three fundamental propositions concerning Christian marriage may be added the following observations.

There is room for education on the subject of marriage if the Church has the courage to undertake it. Young people should be taught that mere physical attraction is no safe basis for marriage. A marriage based on physical attraction only, or even, predominantly, is likely to prove disappointing, if not disastrous. With physical attraction there must be discovered some affinity of nature, some mental and moral sympathy. Physical attraction is a fleeting thing ; affinity is something that endures. In the wise words of Dr. A. H. Gray :—

"It must be possible for the two to become friends as well as lovers, **for a true friendship is really the backbone of every happy marriage.** It is very difficult to persuade young people of the truth of this, but to believe it is to escape a vast deal of unhappiness. Marriage cannot be all love making. It is a partnership in all the activities that make up life, and the two who carry it on *must* be congenial companions if they are to be happy."

Further, for a happy marriage the practice of trust, patience, forbearance, and unselfishness on both sides is absolutely and constantly necessary ; and for such virtues nothing short of the grace of God will avail.

DIVORCE.

(Minutes of Conference, p. 69, par. 7).

The finding of the Committee is as follows :—That a minister may remarry a divorced person or divorced persons if :

- (a) he is satisfied after consultation with both parties to the proposed marriage that in entering into the same, they have a sincere and honest purpose and attitude of mind which is in conformity with the Church's view of what marriage should mean and stand for ; and
- (b) neither party to the proposed marriage has to the knowledge of the minister been guilty of any gross sexual offence whether in connection with the divorce or otherwise.

BIRTH CONTROL.

(Minutes of Conference, p. 69, par. 8).

This Committee makes the following pronouncement on this question :—

Man's advancing knowledge of science and truth, as shown in his control over nature, is of increasing value to the masses of the people and is part of God's revelation. All knowledge may be abused but only Truth can make us free. In Christian marriage, we believe that two people are joined together in the whole of their natures, and that sex expression has a value in developing fellowship at least equal to a racial purpose. With the increasing standards of health, and through changed Social and economic conditions, a controlled birth-rate would serve the interests of society.

It is therefore evident that birth control, used with the best and fullest knowledge of the day, can and should, amongst Christian people exercising a spirit of mutual love and discipline, be a means not only to a richer happiness to the partners in marriage, but also to a loftier standard in each succeeding generation.

It is recommended that ministers and responsible leaders of Youth equip themselves to give adequate spiritual, mental and physical guidance required by those preparing for and entering into marriage.

UNEMPLOYMENT.

Principles : As a Church we believe that :—

- (1) God is the Father of all men, that He is the Provider of Nature's resources and that man's powers of control over nature are a trust from God.
- (2) Man has been placed in this world to **live** and that work is secondary to living.
- (3) All men and women have, within certain age limits, a duty to serve society, and corresponding rights that society provide for them for the whole of life, on the basis of what society is able to provide.
- (4) The discoveries of science and the perfecting of machinery have made it unnecessary for all employable persons to work for as many years of life, or hours per day, as is done at present.
- (5) That rationalisation of production and distribution must be planned.
(a) for efficient service to the community.
(b) for the well being of those employed.
- (6) That man's rights to the "abundant life" must be made paramount to the interests of property or material things.

Application :

(a) **IMMEDIATE :** That—

- (1) All employment or services that are money-earning be legally prohibited to men of 65 years and to women of 60 years of age, and over.
- (2) That men of 60 years of age and women of 55 years of age who have become unemployable become eligible for a pension.
- (3) That the minimum school leaving age be raised to 16.
- (4) Normal remunerative employment be limited to five days per week and eight hours per day.
- (5) A national scheme for Housing be carried out.
- (6) Distribution of the normal requirements of food and clothing be rationalised under semi-state Boards.
- (7) Free meals be provided for school children if desired.
- (8) All "relief" work be abolished.

(b) **PERMANENT :** That

- (1) A national Board be established to issue financial credit and control the monetary system for the true welfare of the people.
- (2) Adequate means of exchange be provided to distribute the goods and services produced by the people, plus national superannuation and unemployment payments.
- (3) A national housing Board be established to plan and control all housing.

- (4) The annual income of the nation be progressively adjusted by direct taxation until all have a reasonable standard of living.
- (5) Training centres for employment be provided for people for all ages by the Education Department.

Peace Resolutions.

The Committee recommends—That the 14 resolutions on Peace of last Conference (Minutes pages 70-71) be reaffirmed and understood in the light of the following statement:—

That the Conference does not commit itself to the support of War under the League of Nations in any specific case; neither does it accept the absolute pacifist position.

PERCY PARIS, Convener.

RESOLUTIONS.

1. That the Report be received.
2. **Sabbath Observance.**—Conference views with deep concern the increasing tendency to make Sunday a day of sport, picnicing and general distraction and in view of the irreparable loss to individual and nation involved in this secularization urges all thoughtful people to do all in their power to maintain the restful and sacred nature of the day.
3. **Temperance.**
 - (a) Conference reaffirms its conviction that the Liquor Traffic is a prolific cause of moral waste, domestic misery and industrial disturbance.
 - (b) Conference urges Local Youth Committees to take steps towards instituting a system of education in Sunday Schools and Bible Classes on the evil effects of alcohol as a beverage, and where no Temperance Society exists (such as the Band of Hope) efforts be made to establish such.
4. **Bible in Schools.**
 - (a) Conference expresses its hearty appreciation of the work of the Bible in Schools League; reaffirms its allegiance to the League's Policy and commends it to the prayerful and active support of our congregations.
 - (b) Conference urges the Government to facilitate the enactment of the Enabling Bill. If this be not done the League is encouraged to press for a Referendum.
 - (c) That the attention of Conference representatives be drawn to the fact that school teachers and other men and women of approved qualification are eligible to take Scripture lessons under the Nelson System. Attention is also drawn to the observance of daily devotional exercises of five minutes duration under the Canterbury and Wanganui Education Boards by personal arrangements with local School Committees.
 - (d) Conference expresses appreciation of the services of the Rev. E. O. Blamires as organising Secretary of the League and commends him to the support of our people.
 - (e) That the following represent our Church on the Bible in Schools Council:—Wellington—Revs. P. R. Paris and W. G. Slade; Christchurch—Revs. W. Grigg and W. A. Burley.

5. Gambling.

- (a) In view of the widespread and increasing prevalence of the gambling and betting mania and the insidious evils attendant upon such, Conference counsels the people of our Church to abstain from participation in any form of gambling, and to do all in their power to lessen its sway in the community. We further urge that instruction in the evils of gambling be given by Youth workers of the Church.
- (b) Conference urges our people to discourage the use of guessing Competitions in connection with Church activities.
- (c) In view of the tendency to centralize racing permits and thus increase the number of days of racing in the larger centres, Conference urges that the facilities for racing permits should be reduced rather than increased.

6. Communism.

That this matter be referred to the Auckland Public Questions Sub-Committee, findings to be forwarded to the Public Questions Committee.

7. Marriage, Divorce and Birth Control.

That a special Committee be set up to consider these matters, findings to be reported to the Synods. That the Committee be located in Auckland with corresponding members (with power to add) personnel to be:—Dr. C. H. Laws, Dr. H. Ranston, Revs. E. D. Patchett, W. T. Blight, E. S. Emmitt, E. T. Olds, J. H. Haslam; Drs. Caughey, Lange, Sayers; Messrs. R. C. Clark, J. Stanton, E. H. Burton, W. S. Mackay, H. R. French; Mesdames Pacey and T. E. Taylor. (Convener, Rev. E. S. Emmitt).

8. Peace.

Recognising the responsibility which rests upon the Churches to work for a world-order based on righteousness, abiding goodwill and peace, this Conference declares:—

- (1) War is contrary to the spirit and purpose of Jesus Christ as revealed in His teaching concerning the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of man, which is the Divine ideal for human society; and God's Kingdom can only be realised in a world-embracing brotherhood of mankind based on righteousness, love and peace.
- (2) The Christian Church accepts as an integral part of her redemptive mission the duty to promote peace and prevent war.
- (3) We rejoice that the best elements in the nations are moving towards the acceptance of this ideal. The Covenant of the League of Nations is a great undertaking for the maintenance of peace by reason and justice. By the more explicit Pact of Paris, 62 nations have condemned recourse to war for the solution of international Controversies and renounce it as an instrument of national policy in their relations with one another, and agree that the solution of disputes or conflicts which may arise among them shall never be sought except by pacific means.
- (4) We believe that war is a crime against humanity and must be utterly repudiated as a method of settling international disputes, and we pledge our support of every endeavour to make these pacts and pledges effective.
- (5) We declare our resolve to refuse to support any Government which refuses to submit a cause of dispute with another Government to an appropriate international tribunal for peaceful settlement.

- (6) To this end we urge, as a necessity, that every individual in our Church should consider his or her attitude to this all-important question of peace, especially as there is still a possibility of war. Should this come we realize the grave decision that will be demanded of us. There are those who are sincere lovers of their country whose inward conviction and loyalty to Christ will compel them to apply the Christian affirmation by refusal to bear arms, in any circumstance, while others will feel the Christian necessity of giving effect to obligations, commitments and loyalties of a national and international character. Therefore we uphold liberty of conscience in whichever direction loyalty to inward conviction may carry them.
- (7) Meanwhile we press for world-wide reduction of armaments, limitation and the control of their manufacture and sale. Special attention should be devoted to uncovering particular causes of war, among which may be enumerated the following :—discontent due to oppression of minorities, arbitrary boundaries, inequitable treaties, unfair economic rivalries and conditions involved in the fight for export markets and animosities due to religion.
- To this end and that our people may be adequately instructed, we urge inward and corporate membership in the League of Nations Union.
- (8) Finally, we declare that we will readily co-operate with other Christian Communions in the pursuit of those necessities, believing that unless the spirit of war is removed, that spirit will kill any civilisation.
- We recommend that communications be opened up with other Churches in order to secure common action.
- (9) As a practical gesture of our belief that war is contrary to the Spirit of Jesus Christ, we urge the Government to replace the system of Cadet Military Training by a Citizenship Training System which, while retaining many valuable features of the present system, such as physical training, discipline, and social companionship, will be completely separated from the present War System and will be in harmony with Christian ideals.
- (10) That in any schools under the authority of the Church, the Citizen Training System should be recommended to the controlling body of the School.
- (11) That we desire to make it known to the people of our Church that parents may, if so desirous, obtain exemption of their sons from cadet service in the schools.
- (12) This Conference demands that members of the Methodist Church, who for conscientious reasons refuse to carry arms or participate in war, should have their religious principles honoured.
- PEACE COVENANT.**—An amended and modified form of the Peace Covenant contained in the Report was presented to the Conference but was not approved.

9. Unemployment.

- (a) That the section "Principles" 1-6 be adopted.
- (b) **APPLICATION.**—That in view of the changes in administration and policy in connection with unemployment, this Conference re-affirms the resolutions of last Conference on this question, but refers back to the Public Questions Committee for further consideration its recommendations under "Application" both "Immediate" and "Permanent."

10. That a Conference Public Questions Committee, separate from the Church Welfare Committee, be set up at future Conferences.
11. That the Public Questions Committee's Report be sent direct through Synods to Conference.

8. General.

The financial returns give evidence of an improving economic condition. The aggregate receipts show an increase of £5,392/11/6 over the previous year. The debit balances reported are £183/13/11 less than a year ago. The aggregate expenditure of the trusts is £6,324 more than last year. A total sum of £8,697/17/10 has been paid in reduction of loans against £6,991/4/7 the previous year. The credit balances held by trusts are £426 17/5 more than a year ago. The amounts held in trust for special purposes aggregate £21,789. This is £1,542 less than last year because of the fulfilment of the purposes for which some moneys were held. The insurance cover against fire loss again shows a substantial increase.

Circuit Superintendents and home missionaries in some cases give considerable trouble to the District Secretaries by carelessness in compiling and copying their schedules. Inexperienced trust treasurers may possibly be excused for submitting financial statements that do not balance, but

ministers and auditors should not sign such documents or allow them to go forward uncorrected. In most Districts the Property Secretaries complain that returns are sent in even as late as the Synod despite the fact that they are always in the hands of Superintendent ministers for distribution to trust officers in the first week of September.

- N.B.—The following is an extract from the Trustee Act 1908, No. 200, Section 95 :—
- (1) It shall be lawful for a Trustee, unless expressly forbidden by the instrument, (if any) expressly creating the Trust, to invest any Trust Funds in his hands in manner following, that is to say :—
 - (a) In any of the stock, funds or other Government Securities of New Zealand, or of the Commonwealth of Australia, or any State thereof.
 - (b) On real securities in New Zealand.
 - (c) In the bonds, debentures, or other securities of any municipal Corporation or County Council, or Water Supply Board, or River Board or Road Board or Town Board or Electric Power Board in New Zealand having authority to borrow money.
 - (d) On deposit in any bank carrying on business in New Zealand under authority of any Act of General Assembly, or in the Post Office Savings Bank established under "The Post and Telegraph Act, 1908," or in any savings bank constituted under "The Savings Bank Act, 1908."

For further particulars consult the "Trustee Act, 1908."

B.—CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND.

Report for 1935.

An upward trend has been manifest during the financial year which ended on 30th September. The amount received in repayment of loans was £2,769 13s. 3d., which is £685 3s. 9d. above the figure of the previous year. The capital of the fund has been increased to £21,425 by a transfer of £16 7s. 1d. from the Office Expenses Account. The amount of loans current at the end of the financial year was £20,630 4s. 11d.

Grants totalling £225 have been made from the Sites Fund as follows :—Kawhia £100, Campbell's Bay £100, Raupo (Ruawai) £25. The grants exceeded the current revenue by £64 13s. 0d. The revenue of the Sites Fund is at present derived largely from the interest on the investment of a sum of £1000 of moneys held in trust by the Treasurers of the Loan Fund. As the capital sum may be called up at any time continued income from this source is uncertain leaving the Sites Fund dependent mainly on the annual grants from the Fire Insurance Board and the Home Mission Board.

During the year loans have been fully repaid by the following trusts :—Epsom, Walmsley Road, Pakiri, Waitakaruru, Te Hapara, Picton (No. 1), Shirley, Opawa, Sumner, Beckenham (special), Riccarton, Riccarton Village, Lyttelton and Ashburton. The obligations having been met in respect of sections at Matiere, Ngaturi and Kokatahi, these properties have been transferred from the Loan Fund trustees to local trustees.

The following trusts have re-arranged the terms of their loans :—Paparua, Maeroa, Putaruru, Ngatea, Opunake, Taihape, Waipukurau, Hataitai, Lower Hutt, Cashmere, Repton Street Parsonage, Edgeware Road, Bryndwr and Mornington.

New loans have been advanced as follows :—Mount Roskill £500, Kawhia £600, Broadwood £60, Taihape £450, Waipukurau £170, Belvedere £35, Havelock £190, Bryndwr £150, Kaiapoi £300, Nightcaps £25. The following promised loans are now available :—Richmond Avenue £55, Fencourt £50, Helensville £25, Dundas Street (Dunedin) £550, Riverton £30, Ohai £20. Other loans have been promised aggregating £4770 and these will be advanced as funds become available.

The largest proportions of arrears are in the Auckland, South Auckland and Otago-Southland Districts. In the Auckland District attention is being given to the cases of Devonport and Vauxhall. The position of Otahuhu and of Mangere East needs attention. In South Auckland Te Puke appears to have drifted into a difficult position. Opotiki, Whakatane and Taneatua

also call for special attention. The cases of Gisborne and Wairoa require consideration. Miramar, Johnsonville and Eketahuna present difficulties of a minor order which should be dealt with. Caversham and St. Clair present difficult problems. Gore has drifted into a bad position in recent years and Nightcaps has completely failed to fulfil its undertaking. It might be possible to deal with the trust difficulties of circuits like Otahuhu, Te Puke, Opotiki, Whakatane, Caversham and St. Clair by a conjoint arrangement between the trustees, the Home Mission Board and the Loan Fund Committee, along the lines that have proved so satisfactory in places like Wanganui East and Taumarunui. A strong circuit life cannot be developed while the people are overburdened with trust liabilities.

Liabilities to the Loan Fund have been created by the purchase of sites in the South Auckland District at Kakahi in 1908 (£54 17s. 2d.) and at Kerepehi in 1925 (£106 8s. 5d.). In the Taranaki-Wanganui District a parsonage site at Rangataua was acquired in 1910 (£51 2s. 5d.). As rates are being paid on these properties some action should be taken regarding them.

In the Blenheim circuit a site was acquired at Flaxbourne (Ward) in 1906 on which there remains an unpaid balance of £23 13s. 0d. due to the Loan Fund. A section at Seddon was leased in 1910. The Committee suggests that these properties be now taken over by the Blenheim trust.

3.—THE JAMES AND MARTHA TROUSON BENEVOLENT FUND TRUST BOARD.

Report for Year Ending 31st December, 1935.

The Board has met regularly for the discharge of its business during the year, and has given careful attention to every application for assistance that has come before it. The Statement of Income and Expenditure presented herewith shows that, during the year ended 31st December, 1935, the sum of £430 17s. 8d. has been distributed to beneficiaries, thus with current expenses, absorbing the whole of the revenue for the year and reducing the credit balance at the Bank from £46 8s. 10d. to £27 6s. 5d.

During the year the Board has made a careful re-investigation of each case upon its books and has been compelled to make considerable reductions in many of its grants so as to bring its expenditure within the revenue available for distribution.

Report for Conference, 1936.

In submitting our report upon the work of the Board during the past year, we open by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many mercies bestowed on us and the work we have in hand. The children's Home at Masterton continues to flourish, and we are deeply indebted to the local committee, and the matron (Miss Allan) for their splendid and self sacrificing efforts. A great loss was sustained during the year, by the death of Rev. James Cocker, for so many years the untiring Secretary-Manager of the Home. Only those who came in contact with his work could realise all that the Home meant to him and so appreciate his ceaseless interest and care expended in it, the staff, and the children. In his successor—Mr. A. E. Bate, we all feel we have the right man, and that he will worthily uphold the traditions and aspirations of those connected with this important work. The Board has again found it necessary to augment the finances of the Home by £400, but we are hoping that with the return of "better times," the call upon this Board in that way will be lessened, and our people come to realise their responsibilities towards this splendid work which is being carried on for them. Donations have been made by the Board to the fund towards maintaining two deaconesses engaged in the Maori work in the Taranaki District, also to the work amongst the Maori boys at Wesley College, Auckland.

The important work of roading and access at the Board's property in Kelburn, Wellington, has been completed, and streets formally taken over by the City Council. A very great improvement is manifest. The large payment for the work will not appear in this year's accounts, as the figures have not been finalised. The Board have much pleasure in sending a unanimous recommendation to the Conference for the re-appointment of Rev. P. R. Paris as Chairman of the Board, and the committee at Masterton as now constituted. Balance sheets for the Board and the Masterton Home will be sent on separately.

6.—MARTIN BROTHERS' MEMORIAL REST HOME.

Conference learns with pleasure of the gift of a Home and Property in Auckland for the special purposes of a Rest Home for the aged people of our Church, to be known as "The Martin Brothers' Memorial Rest Home." In accepting the same it expresses its thanks to Mr. James Martin for this gift which makes possible a social service in Auckland that is greatly needed.

That permission be given for the setting up of the necessary Trust Board with the following members :—Revs. E. D. Patchett, Dr. C. H. Laws, T. A. Joughin and F. J. Parker, Messrs. Alan White, Stuart Caughey, Clem. C. Scott and W. J. Court, and that this Board be incorporated under the Religious Charitable and Educational Trusts Act, 1908.

DEED OF TRUST.

It being the wish of the donor, Mr. James Martin, permission is desired from the Conference of the Methodist Church of New Zealand to incorporate (under The Religious Charitable and Educational Trusts Act, 1908, and its amendments) The Martin Brothers' Memorial Rest Home Trust Board.

The Trusts upon which the property is held are :—

1. THE name is The Martin Brothers' Memorial Rest Home Trust Board.
2. THE object of the Trust is to provide a Rest Home for aged people who are members or adherents of the Methodist Church of New Zealand, whether married, widowed, or single, male or female, including retired Ministers of the Methodist Church and their wives and widows.
3. THE Trustees shall be residents of the City of Auckland or its environs and shall be members of the Methodist Church of New Zealand. Any vacancies occurring on the Trust Board shall be filled by the Conference on the nomination of the remaining Trustees.
4. EXCEPT where inconsistent the terms of "The Model Deed" and the powers of Trustees thereunder shall be implied herein.
5. THE Conference of the Methodist Church of New Zealand upon the resolution of the Trust Board shall have power at any time and from time to time to vary or modify the object and conditions of the Trust in such manner as the Conference shall deem expedient.
6. THE Trust Board shall present a statement of Receipts and Expenditure each year to the Conference.
7. THE decision as to who shall enter the Rest Home shall be entirely at the discretion of the Board whose decision shall be final and the question of the amount (if any) of a contribution by those in the Home shall be entirely at the discretion of the Board.
8. THE Trustees shall have power to canvas for funds for the purposes of the Board and if at any time in the opinion of the Board sufficient funds are not available the Trust property may be let or leased from time to time.

QUESTION XXXVIII.—What is the Report on Connexional Fire Insurance ?

REPORT OF THE BOARD, 1935.

The financial year of the Connexional Fire Insurance Department ended on 31st October, 1935, and the audited statements of accounts are furnished herewith. The income from all sources amounted to £4,010 12s. 1d., including a sum of £117 17s. 9d. received as premiums consequent upon the conversion of local body debentures. This amount together with the annual appropriation of £100 has been placed to the credit of the Investment Contingency Reserve Account. A sum of £1000 has, in accordance with regular practice been added to the Fire Loss Reserve Account. After thus strengthen-

ing the reserves, meeting all working expenses, and re-insurance charges and settling fire claims there remains a divisible surplus of £1,181 ls. 2d. which is £49 14s. 7d. more than was available for this purpose last year. In view of the statutory reduction of interest on debentures and on mortgage investments the result of the year's operations is very gratifying.

The Board recommends that the available surplus be distributed in grants to the following Connexional Funds and Institutions:—

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The Conference of 1933 requested the Fire Insurance Board to give special consideration to the needs of Wesley Training College which had sought assistance for a period of three years to help it through a time of financial stress. This year a deposit of £150 free of interest has been lodged with the College Board and Conference is now asked to convert the deposit into a grant as set forth in the list recommended above. This grant makes up an aggregate contribution of £500 for the three year period.

During the year claims for loss have been settled as follow :—

Richmond Avenue, £3 5s. 0d., Waiuku garage (plate glass) £18 18s. 0d. Onepoto Hall £2 6s. 6d., Masterton Children's Home £159 12s. 5d., Deaconess House £3. The losses aggregated £187 1s. 11d., but as £184 15s. 5d. was covered by re-insurances the actual loss to our own Fund was only £2 6s. 6d.

There has been a further substantial increase of business during the year and through the interest of the Rev. L. B. Neale, all the properties of the Dunedin Central Mission have been placed with our office. Persistent efforts are being made to get all our properties insured with the Connexion. In most cases where properties are mortgaged we can make arrangements to meet the requirements of mortgagees, banks and State Departments.

New risks accepted during the year total £36,845. Some trusts have voluntarily reduced their insurances and several have been asked to reduce their cover to the true insurable value of their properties. The Fund now carries 939 risks on church properties made up of 426 churches, 205 schools, halls, etc., 168 parsonages and 140 sundry risks including colleges, orphanages, etc. These risks are covered for a total of £712,075 of which a large proportion is re-insured.

The Fire Insurance Department has also arranged but does not itself carry risks for earthquakes, loss of rent, plate glass, employers' liability, and burglary. The insurance of the personal property of ministers and the insurance of properties mortgaged to the Fire Insurance Board and the

Supernumerary Fund Board has also been arranged. Church and other insurances in which the Board is interested now total £811,935.

QUESTION XXXIX.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Connexional Secretaryship ?

REPORT OF COMMITTEE 1935.

The work of the Connexional Office has been conducted by the Connexional Secretary and his staff with the efficiency that has now become generally recognised. The activities are dealt with in part in the reports submitted to Conference by the chief departments administered in the office. The cost of administration has been kept within the appropriations. The amounts requested for the ensuing year are the same as for last year, namely :

QUESTION XL.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Trinity Theological College and Hostel?

TRINITY THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE.

A.—PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

(1). The College was re-opened on Monday, March 11th. Seventeen men have been in residence, together with one student for the Congregational ministry. Seven were freshmen. Mr. B. M. Tasker, B.A., was elected Senior Student and has proved himself very energetic. On the whole there have been devotion and good fellowship on the part of the men. Health has been generally satisfactory.

(2). There has been an increase in the number of Hostel residents, and we hope to have the College full next year.

(3). Messrs. Beckingsale, Hopper, Johansen, Tasker, and Willoughby have completed three years of training, and are due to leave College this year. It is worth serious consideration whether we should not follow the lead of the British Conference and lengthen the period of training to four years. The needs of the work seem to demand either this or more serious attention to study during the probationary period.

(4). The Rev. W. T. Blight, B.A., B.D., is an excellent colleague. Grateful tribute must be paid to him and Mrs. Blight, M.A. for very careful administration, entailing much work and anxiety, of the domestic side of the College arrangements. As usual the Rev. Dr. Laws has rendered further fine services to the institution. To all three thanks are richly due. We are fortunate in having Mr. Dennis Johns, M.A., as tutor in Elocution and Public speaking.

(5). Mr. M. Winiata (Maori Student on the President's List of Reserve) has resided in the College, taking advantage of his Government University Scholarship. He has received instruction in Preaching and Homiletics, also attending the University.

(6). **The Tutorial Work** has been as follows:—

- (a) The Principal has twice a week each taught Senior classes in New Testament Greek, and also Classical Greek. Once a week each classes have been held in N.T. Teaching (The Synoptic Gospels), N.T. Introduction (Synoptic Gospels, the Method and the Originality of our Lord's teaching), N.T. Exegesis (Mark), O.T. Teaching (Development in the whole Book), and Christian Ethics.

During the year the Principal also held a discussion class on religious problems. At the University five classes per week on the Hebrew Old Testament were conducted. Four of the students are our own men, and another is a candidate.

- (b) Mr. Blight has twice a week each taught classes in Systematic Theology (Person and Work of Christ), and Junior Greek. Once a week each classes have been held in O.T. Introduction and Exegesis (The Historical Books and early Chapters of Genesis), Pastoral Theology (General, also Study of Sunday School Methods and Organisation based on Hayes "The Child in the Midst"). Pedagogy (with one term's work on Child Psychology), English Grammar and Composition.

Both Principal and Tutor have also set each term papers on Old and New Testament Knowledge. Both share in the conduct of services at the Collegiate Church and in the City and Suburban Churches. Mr. Blight continues to give Scripture teaching to Standard 6 at the Normal School, Mount Eden. As these classes are also attended by students from the Teachers' Training College, work is being done which will prove most fruitful.

- (c) Dr. Laws has heard all the students preach, also conducting the weekly Sermon criticism class. Also once a week he has lectured on Homiletics, and once a fortnight on English Literature.
- (d) Individual and collective instruction in Voice Production and Public speaking has been given weekly by Mr. D. Johns, M.A. The Rev. E. P. Blamires has delivered three lectures on Sunday School and Young Peoples' work. For these thanks are due.

(7). In **Practical Work** the students have been very active. Messrs. Norwell and Williams have been Student-Pastors at the Collegiate Church. Boys' Brigade work has been led by Mr. Francis. More than the usual number of services have been conducted by the men, eliciting many appreciative comments. Students have visited for experience Sunday Schools in the City and suburbs. A notable feature has been the regular open-air meetings held in front of Pitt Street Church. Good crowds have gathered, and question time has been an excellent opportunity for solid work. Almost all attended the Bible class camps at Easter, and many men have spent their vacations in supply work. Much help has been rendered at the Saturday night men's meeting at the Airedale St. Mission. The Student Christian Movement has felt the impact of Trinity students' influence.

(8). At the **University College** Student Tasker, B.A., has attended lectures in Economic History and Education (M.A.), Hopper in History II, and Hebrew I, Willoughby in Education II. and Hebrew I, Mayson in Philosophy I., Greek I., and Preliminary Hebrew, and Francis in Preliminary Hebrew (having obtained terms previously in Education and Philosophy I.). If the terms' examinations are passed they will proceed to the Degree examinations in November.

(9). In the correspondence classes for candidates and others there have been eighteen entrants. Mr. Blight, who is in charge of this work, will present a report direct to the Examination Committee.

(10). Once again the Staff calls the attention of the Synods and Conference to the necessity of care in the selection of the students sent to us. More than ever these critical days demand ministers of undoubted mental and spiritual qualities. Grace and personality are essential, with the ability to speak effectively when trained. More thorough investigation of the qualification of Candidates would add considerably to our effectiveness.

B.—REPORT OF COLLEGE COUNCIL.

The Council has continued to give careful and thorough consideration to every aspect of the College work. Through its Standing Committees every detail has been kept under review, with the constant aim of maintaining the efficiency of the College, while carefully guarding its financial position. The year has called for no new departure in any direction; but the Council is pleased to be able to report on the entirely satisfactory working of the College and Hostel throughout the year.

The Students.

The progress of the Students in their studies, and reports of the way in which they commend themselves to the various congregations by their preaching and other work, have come before the Council from time to time. Gratification has been expressed at the reports of appreciation that have been received, and it has been made evident that the Students seek to maintain a high standard of Christian life and devotion. The Council urges that Synods and the Conference enquire more thoroughly into the qualifications of Candidates before passing them on to the College. The Board of Studies is again sending on to Conference its Resolutions of last year concerning the Testing of Candidates for the Ministry.

The Hostel.

This year the number of Hostel Residents reached twenty-two, being seven more than last year, and the largest number since the opening of the Hostel. This has meant a considerable increase in responsibility and work on the domestic side; but, under the skilful management and direct supervision of Mr. and Mrs. Blight the House and Service expenses have shown only a very small increase, and such increase as there has been is almost completely explained by the rise in the price of certain commodities. The Council has expressed its great appreciation of the fine service rendered to the College by Mrs. Blight in this connection. With about forty men in residence the task of the domestic staff is no light one, and it is a tribute to wise management that the internal machinery has worked so smoothly throughout the year. It is probable that the Hostel will be full to capacity next year.

Finance.

The financial position of the College is clearly outlined in the Treasurer's Report and Statements. The Council once again expresses its sense of indebtedness and gratitude to the various Trusts that have rendered such generous and essential help during the year. Without this assistance the difficulties would have been almost insuperable. Special thanks are tendered to the Prince Albert College Board; the Connexional Fire Insurance Board; and the Wesley Church, Taranaki St. Trustees. While the outlook for the future is decidedly hopeful, the Council is compelled to seek this special consideration again this year. In view of the vital importance of the work

of the College for the future strength of the Church, the Council confidently trusts that wherever there is power to give assistance it will be generously bestowed.

Instructor in Elocution.

A vacancy in the teaching staff occurred at the end of last year, through the death of Mr. T. Harris, Visiting Lecturer in Elocution. The Council was fortunate in securing the services of Mr. W. Dennis Johns, M.A., who was appointed to the position thus rendered vacant.

Training College Proposal.

The proposal to establish a Training School for Christian Workers other than accepted ministerial students has been kept before the Council during the year; but the number and nature of the replies to the enquiries sent out did not warrant any great advance being made. It is therefore suggested that enquiries be continued for another year.

C.—TREASURER'S REPORT.

Year Ended October 31st, 1935.

In presenting to Conference the Annual Accounts of the Methodist Trinity College, it is gratifying to direct attention to a lowering of the budgeted deficiency of £490 as at March 31st, 1936, to a revised estimate of £281.

This satisfactory position has been attained chiefly by a £200 increase in Hostel Fees on account of more men being in residence at the College than was expected earlier in the year.

The Budget recommended to Conference for the year ended March 31st, 1937, has been compiled with due cognizance of the Hostel income probably reaching again this high level. It will therefore be seen that in budgeting for a deficit of £471, we can not expect a repetition of the past two years when circumstances were such that we received a greater income than we budgeted for.

Notwithstanding the increased Hostel receipts, the bringing forward of an estimated deficiency of £281 and the increase in the item House and Service of £150—through the increase in household prices and a larger number of residents to be catered for than estimated in our last Budget—necessitates an increased budget total over last year of £258.

It will readily be seen that increased income, which at present is not forthcoming, must be found, otherwise the deficit of £471 as shown in the budget must materialize.

For the careful and efficient oversight of House expenditure and the wise management of the domestic functioning of the College, we give thanks and appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Blight.

We again thank the Prince Albert College Trust Board and the Connexional Fire Insurance Board, for their special financial assistance. We also place on record our grateful thanks for the receipt of £50 bequeathed to the College by the late Mrs. S. Gorman.

Site Acquisition Fund: Under the arrangement whereby the Bank Interest on the Site Acquisition Fund Overdraft is met each year out of the College Budget and through the receipt of £150 from promises, the Overdraft has been reduced from £4,691 1s. 3d., as at November 1st, 1934 to £4,541 18s. 6d. as at October 31st, 1935.

Organ Fund.—By the addition of dividends and Bank interest, this fund now shows in the books at £330 9s. 8d.

QUESTION XLI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Wesley Training College?

REPORT TO CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEY TRAINING COLLEGE TRUST BOARD FOR THE YEAR ENDED THE 31st DECEMBER, 1935.

The financial result of the year's activities is a loss of £559 18s. 7d. Although this represents an improvement of £362 16s. 2d. in comparison with the loss of £922 14s. 9d. shown in 1934, the Board is not satisfied at its inability to more nearly balance its accounts.

Comparative departmental results for the last two years disclose the following variations :—

Contributions from Methodist Trusts amounted to £475, as compared with £900 and £500 during 1933 and 1934 respectively. In 1933, when as a result of the Board's appeal for financial assistance, Connexional Funds responded most generously, it was anticipated that the grants would continue for several years until the depression had passed. In considering the losses for 1934 and 1935 the reduction in the amount of such contributions must be allowed for.

It will be seen that substantial economies have been effected in General Expenses and Interest, while Rents have increased, reflecting improving conditions in and around Auckland. The reduction in General Expenses has been mainly brought about by the placing, for Rating purposes, of the Board's Suburban Properties which are used for farming purposes, on the Urban Farm List. The decision of the Assessment Court to which the Board applied and before which it appeared, has resulted in very considerable savings in the payment of Rates.

It is pleasing to report a reduction in the amount of College Loss, but the Farm profits show a considerable reduction as compared with 1933 and 1934. The Board has referred the Farm accounts to a special Committee for exhaustive enquiry and consideration, and it is hoped thereby to obtain a clear view of the prospects for the future.

The Board has continued its policy of improvement to the suburban properties throughout the year.

Until December from 70 to 80 relief workers were employed on these properties under capable supervision carrying out developmental and maintenance work of various kinds. In December the number of men was reduced to 12, who are maintaining the properties in an efficient state.

During the year the Board has felled a number of old Pine trees, and disposed of the timber and firewood. It has also sold a quantity of surface stone. The total net sales under this heading amount to £114 2s. 0d.

The Board reports with pleasure the first sale of a suburban section for some years, a section on the Mount Albert Estate having been disposed of recently for £165.

A dividend of £30 on the Shares bequeathed to the Board by the late Mr. George Winstone was received during the year.

The Board regrets to have to record the resignations during the year of Messrs. George Winstone and J. W. Shackelford, who have been members of the Board for many years and have both given it yeoman service.

The Principal's report on the College and Farm is attached.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT TO CONFERENCE, 1936.

Once again we have to report a year of steady progress. Roll numbers have varied very little from those of the previous year, but what variation there has been has assumed a definite upward character. This improvement, together with the higher agricultural prices now prevailing gives reason to expect a more favourable financial position next year. It has been necessary to refuse several promising Maori lads, owing to our difficulties in finance, and the proportion of Maori to European boys has slightly decreased.

A large number of boys have benefitted by the Bursaries and Scholarships made possible from the grants received from several Methodist Trust funds and a very valuable service has been rendered to deserving lads, and at the same time to the College, by this assistance.

There have been few staff changes. Mr. O. E. Burton who resigned to enter the Ministry, was replaced by Mr. A. G. Blamires, and following on the removal of Rev. J. H. Bailey from Pukekohe, the Rev. H. H. Jeffreys has undertaken the duties of Chaplain.

We have again been fortunate in avoiding almost completely any sickness or accident and there has been an absence of even the milder infectious diseases.

I am pleased to report that during the year, all the boys presented for the Higher Leaving Certificate were successful, and similar pleasing results were obtained in the Matriculation examination. Of 12 boys officially presented for the Intermediate Examination, 10 were successful.

The School has been visited by Inspectors of the Education department, who have expressed themselves as being well satisfied with the standard of work done and the facilities offered.

My Board still feels that the proportion of Methodist boys to those of other denominations enrolled last year is too low, and would appeal to members of Synods to stress the importance of a school of this character to the Connexion as a whole. A church school to be really strong must have not only fine buildings and grounds and an adequate staff, but must also have the support and practical sympathy of ministers and laymen.

During the year, the Board, having in mind the resolutions of last Conference on the question of Peace and War, decided to sever its connection with the Defence system of military training, and to establish a system of Citizenship training, which would be more in harmony with the mind of the Church and yet would be no less valuable than the Defence system in training useful citizens of the Dominion. The scheme, which is followed on one

afternoon per month, consists of Mass drill and training in the handling of groups of men; one half-hour for training in Life Saving methods, one half-hour's training in First Aid, and a final half-hour devoted to a talk and discussion of Current International events, particularly the League of Nations. All these subjects are taken by trained instructors, and the definite aim is to avoid propaganda, and simply to present the Christian ethics of Citizenship and to lead boys to think for themselves in these important matters. The scheme has met with the hearty co-operation of the staff and the boys and has, I think, been a definite contribution to educational methods in this sphere.

FARM REPORT.

Once again we can report definite growth and development. The number of cows milked has been slightly less, due to culling and sale of several in-calf heifers, but despite the reduced numbers and a particularly dry autumn, the production has been well maintained. The average yield of the three herds milked, which comprise approximately 90 Friesian and 60 Jersey cows, has been close on 300 lbs of butterfat. We have had 4 Friesian heifers under C.O.R. test, and while their production was seriously affected by the bad season, the four heifers will average over 450 lbs. as two year olds.

For some years past the farm has been seriously handicapped by the inadequate facilities for handling calves, but this season the Farm Staff, assisted by the Cadets, have erected an up-to-date calf house, which makes it possible to rear the calves under clean and dry conditions.

During the year we have carried about 250 stud pigs of different ages and have experienced a very good market for stud boars and sows. A further three farrowing houses were erected by College labour during the winter.

No branch of the College farm has been so active as the poultry department. An electric Incubator, with a capacity of 3000 eggs was installed in the autumn and has been inadequate to meet the demand for chickens and ducklings and for custom hatching. It was also found necessary to erect a large brooder to handle about 3000 chickens up to six weeks, and a fowl house for subsequent holding. The apiary has experienced difficult conditions. The output of Honey was only about one quarter that of the previous year and in many cases colonies were considerably weakened by the dry autumn. We have at present about 220 colonies.

We have thus further reduced the number of Flock Sheep carried partly with a view to encouraging a larger number of pedigree in-calf heifers and yearling bulls, the market for which seems to be improving. More particularly we have had to make room for an increased number of stud ewes, and this year we have wintered 250 stud Southdown ewes, 30 stud Ryeland ewes, 90 hogget stud rams, 15 mature stud rams, 110 hogget stud ewes, and 150 flock ewes. The lambing both in stud and flock sheep has been slightly over 100%. About 9 farm horses are carried, 5 of which are mares and most of which are in foal to a Clydesdale stallion raised at the College.

The season, climatically, has been a very bad one and has definitely affected the returns from the pig, poultry and bee departments. This, together with depressed conditions, has compelled the Farm Committee to bend every effort to making the farm as revenue-producing as possible. This, with the low prices ruling, has not been easy, but the development along many branches has, I believe, been very profitable and has had the additional advantage of giving the students an intimate knowledge of many phases of farm life conducted under practical conditions. There is, I believe, no farm school in the Dominion which offers better facilities for agricultural training than does our College. Nor should it be forgotten that while practical education is a definite part of the school curriculum, the academic side is kept well in the front, while permeating the whole is the emphasis placed in character training and Christian ideals.

QUESTION XLII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Connexional Funds?

1.—SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

In presenting its report for the year ended 30th November, 1935, the Board places on record its sense of great loss by the death of its honoured Lay Treasurer, Mr. George Bowron who for many years served the Fund with conspicuous ability and zealous care. His keen insight, his forward look and his knowledge of finance were simply invaluable and his loss will long be felt. Mr. G. S. Salter has been appointed to fill the vacancy and has been elected as Lay Treasurer. The removal of Mr. H. P. Lawry, S.M. to Wellington caused another vacancy on the Board which has been filled by the appointment of Mr. S. H. Maddren. To Mr. Lawry the Board was often indebted for advice on legal matters affecting investments and the general interests of the Fund. Mr. H. Chapman has been absent in England for a considerable portion of the year but will shortly return to the Dominion.

Annuityants.

The last Conference added five permanent supernumeraries to the list of beneficiaries and continued one temporary supernumerary in that relationship. Death has claimed four supernumerary ministers and one married minister who was in active work. Four widows of former ministers and the wife of a supernumerary minister have also died. The second wives of two ministers in the active work have been placed on the Fund. There are at present 34 supernumeraries and 48 widows in receipt of annuities besides three orphan children of deceased parents. The number of ministers at present contributing to the Fund is 163. Since 1st April the new scale of benefits has been operating. A sum of £8,939 11s. 6d. has been paid in annuities and furniture grants. This is the largest annual payment yet made from the Fund.

Finance.

The Revenue Account and Balance Sheet duly audited disclose the financial position. Administrative expenses continue to be very low. The Investment Fluctuation and Doubtful Debts Reserve now stands at £4,064 14/8. A sum of £102 14s. 6d. was added during the year but the Reserve was drawn upon to the extent of £768 7s. 8d. through the loss of interest on a property abandoned to the Board. This property has been sold to a satisfactory buyer without loss of capital. Another property has recently been abandoned to the Board and a working manager put in charge to develop its resources until a satisfactory sale can be effected. The three mortgagors whose stock accounts are being financed by the Board are securing very gratifying results which entirely justify the policy adopted.

The Allied Funds administered by the Board have increased to £24,394 14s. 2d. Deposits lodged by various Connexional Funds, Institutions and Boards of Trustees, as well as by personal depositors amount to £17,732 11/11 which is £2,567 14s. 0d. less than last year. The Board is paying off personal deposits as moneys become available.

The combined assets of the Supernumerary Fund and Allied Funds include a sum of £52,482 15s. 7d. invested in city freehold properties ; £26,750 invested in local body securities and £102,135 11s. 1d. invested on first mortgage security. The valuable property owned by the Board in Worcester Street is at present largely non-productive and efforts are being made to realize on this asset.

Earnings.

The decline in the earning power of money still continues and the full effect of recent legislation is now being felt. Revenue from debentures and mortgage investments is £431 less than last year. The revenue from Epworth Chambers shows a net increase of £197 18s. 0d. and further improvement is anticipated. An additional sum of £500 has been placed to the Depreciation Reserve Account which now stands at £1,350. The net earnings of this investment cannot be regarded as satisfactory but the whole position affecting this property was set forth in the report to the Conference of 1934.

After allowing for the amounts placed to the Reserve Accounts the net earnings of the Fund have been £5,837 11s. 3d. Calculated on the Actuarial formula the average interest earning rate has been £4 0s. 3d. per cent. Calculated on the accountancy practice of taking the average amount of capital month by month the earnings show a return of £3 13s. 1d. per cent. Omitting office expenses from the calculation the average interest earned was £3 19s. 2d. per cent.

Annual Audit.

The auditors, Messrs. H. R. Best and Co. and Messrs. E. R. Caygill and Co. in reporting upon the annual audit of the accounts of the Fund write as follows :—

- (1). "We have again had the pleasure of carrying out the Audit of the Supernumerary Fund and Allied Funds and are of the opinion that your office is to be congratulated on the general high standard of efficiency evidenced in the handling of the accounts.
- (2). "Considering the large amount of Capital moneys included in the Fund, we think too that those interested in the Fund should appreciate the splendid manner in which the Assets of the Trust have been handled to come through the recent depression, with such few inroads on Capital and Income. We doubt whether any other fund in the Dominion of like dimensions has a record to compare favourably with the Supernumerary Fund of the Methodist Church.

- (3). "We feel, however, that we should point out that in our opinion the Reserve that has been created for Investment Fluctuation and Doubtful Debts is likely to be largely drawn upon in connection with a few of the more doubtful farm securities. Whilst the position has been carefully and apparently very successfully nursed in the cases requiring special attention, it would appear that unless a recovery is staged by the Mortgagors concerned to an extent that does not look likely at the present, some losses will be sustained in the way of cancellation of interest and possibly minor capital amounts that will necessitate drawing upon the Reserve to meet future charges of this nature that may be experienced.
- (4). "The practice of charging to weak mortgagor accounts full interest for the year at a time when they are very unlikely to be able to meet full charges for the period, has the effect of showing slightly more revenue for the year than is likely to be collected. Whilst the Reserve is large enough (and it would appear to be adequate on present day conditions) the matter is not of much moment except that we feel the situation should be understood by the Members of your Board, as we believe it is."

The Board greatly appreciates the work and the comments of the auditors and in relation to paragraphs (3) and (4) points out that in its special report to the Conference of 1934 it stated that ultimate losses on mortgage investments were not likely to exceed the amount provided in its reserves for that purpose. In common with every responsible body controlling investments the Board, right through the years of economic crisis, has had to be guided by the principle that its major responsibility was to safeguard the capital sums invested rather than to grasp at the collection of the maximum amount of interest from mortgagors who were kept on the land by Courts and Commissions under conditions which provided first for their living expenses and second for the upkeep of the property and the maintenance of its productive capacity. This policy operated for the safety of the capital sums invested rather than for the earning of full interest. The Board has continued to pursue the policy of strengthening its reserves to a reasonable extent while recognising that lean years are not the time for making additions to reserves beyond the necessities of the position. If, as the Board pointed out two years ago, the present reserves "are largely utilized in fulfilling the purpose for which they were provided they will be restored as wisdom and necessity may require and as circumstances allow."

The Board holds that the Investment Fluctuation Reserves are still adequate to meet prospective losses of both interest and capital. While the practice has been followed of debiting full interest to all mortgagor accounts the Reserves have not been drawn upon for any concessions in interest charges made to weak mortgagors. All such concessions have been deducted from current income and each year has been made to bear its own share of revenue losses. This practice is virtually equivalent to making additional reserve provision and drawing upon it each year to the extent of such special provision.

Subscriptions in Arrears.

On 30th November personal subscriptions of ministers in arrears with interest thereon amounted to £1,075 4s. 7d. an increase of £39 5s. 11d. over the previous year. This amount is due by 41 ministers. There is also a sum of £100 due for the purchase of benefits. A feature affecting the arrears that is to be regretted is the fact that sixteen probationers owe £212 5s. 2d. on this account. Our laws provide that no probationer may be received into full connexion and ordained whose liabilities to this fund have not been completely met. In recent years several probationers have borrowed money in order to secure full status with the Conference. Subsequent experience has shown that in some cases of this nature loans have not been repaid nor

have current subscriptions been met as they fall due. The Board recognises the economic difficulties most probationers have experienced in recent years but some have not shown a proper capacity for managing their own finances. Membership in the Home Acquirement Fund is a condition now attaching to acceptance for the ministry. There is the same default in relation to this Fund. It may be necessary for the church to assist probationers to meet these connexional liabilities but under no circumstances can the Board agree to existing regulations being relaxed. The following table shows the District distribution of arrears of personal subscriptions only.

Benevolent Branch of Fund.

This fund continues to give assistance to the widows of ministers and to supernumerary ministers in necessitous circumstances. The Revenue Account and Balance Sheet show the position of the Fund. Advice has been received that the late Mr. J. J. B. Veale has bequeathed £50 to this Fund.

Home Acquirement Fund.

This useful fund is steadily growing and the amount now held in the personal accounts of contributors is £7,814 7s. 0d. The personal payments of members have been supplemented by subsidies from the Fire Insurance Fund amounting to £399. Retiring ministers have withdrawn £621 19s. 8d. from the Fund.

Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund.

The financial statements clearly set forth the position of this Fund. Retiring allowances aggregating £1,236 13s. 9d. have been paid to those completing their service or otherwise withdrawing from the Fund. The personal accounts of contributors now amount to £8,798 12s. 10d.

Deaconess Retiring Fund.

During the year the sum of £100 11s. 0d. was paid out for retiring allowances. The personal credits of contributors now aggregate £4,473/16/7.

Home Acquirement Fund.

That the following be added to Regulation 19 of the Home Acquirement Fund (Supplement to Law Book, page 36) :—

"The Board may at its discretion extend this privilege to ministers seeking temporary superannuation."

SPECIAL REPORTS.

As directed by the Conference the Supernumerary Fund Board has considered two matters referred to it (as per Minutes of Conference, 1935, Resolution 8 and 9, page 107), and now presents its report thereon :—

A.—RETIREMENT ON 40 YEAR BASIS.

The Board in consultation with the Actuary has carefully considered "the advisability of adopting a regulation that, after 40 years' service, ministers cease to make further payments to the Fund and that upon retirement after service for a period exceeding 40 years, they receive the same benefit as if they had served only 40 years."

The Conference has already decided against a proposal to allow ministers to retire after 40 years' service independently of their state of health. At present under Regulation 36 (Law Book, page 144) Ministers are permitted to retire :—

1. After having acquired 44 years' standing in the ministry independently of age or of health condition.
2. At the age of 65 provided that their standing in the ministry is not less than 40 years.
3. Upon attaining the age of 70 years.
4. At any age subject to the necessary proof of ill-health.

The present proposal is not that ministers should be compulsorily retired after 40 years' service, but that there be no further personal payments to the Supernumerary Fund by, and no increase in annuities from the Fund for any period of active service in excess of 40 years. This proposal is virtually to amend the concluding part of Regulation 14 (Law Book, page 140) so as to make it read :—

"Any minister who has been 40 years in the ministry, and continues in full work, and has paid all subscriptions due for that period shall be exempt from further payment and shall not receive any annuity greater than if he had served only 40 years."

The Board and its Actuary point out that the scale of annuities was especially framed to reward long service and that the proposed change interferes very materially with the whole design of the scheme by reducing very substantially the maximum retiring allowance. For ministers the maximum annuity of £197 12s. 11d. at present in force would be reduced to £163 14s. 0d. and for widows the maximum would be reduced from £114/9/8 to £96/2/10. Such reductions, of course, could not apply to 9 of the present supernumerary ministers; to 12 widows of ministers whose service exceeded the 40 year period or to any ministers now in the active work who have served more than 40 years.

If adopted the proposal would mean that every minister who in future, served over forty years and the widow of every such minister, would for the whole of their future lives suffer every year the serious reductions on the present scale of benefits set forth below.

The Board feels strongly that such prospective beneficiaries would, under the suggested amendment to the Regulations, be called upon, every year that they lived, to make an unreasonably large sacrifice. In its judgment and in the judgment of the Actuary it is far better in the interests of those for whom the fund was established to adhere to the present rule.

B.—MINISTERS AND WORKERS' COMPENSATION ACT.

The Board has carefully considered the matter of "the liability of circuits in regard to their ministers and their paid church officials under the Workers' Compensation Act."

The matter as it relates to ministers and home missionaries was the subject of a ruling by the President of the Conference in 1928. He ruled in accordance with the opinion of his Legal Adviser, the late Mr. J. A. Flesher which is as follows:—

"As to the liability for the Insurance of ministers and home missionaries, which I presume means the liability of Circuits for accidents to ministers or home missionaries, I have given the matter careful consideration and have come to the conclusion that as Ministers and Home Missionaries are not "Workers" within the meaning of the Workers' Compensation Act, 1908, Circuits are not liable to pay compensation in respect of accidents sustained by Ministers or Home Missionaries.

"By that Act a Worker means 'any person who has entered into or works under a contract of service with an employer whether by way of manual labour, clerical work or otherwise, and whether remunerated by wages, salary, or otherwise, but does not include any person employed otherwise than by way of manual labour whose remuneration exceeds £260 per annum."

"In order to entitle a person who meets with an accident arising out of and in the course of his employment, to compensation he must be a 'Worker,' i.e.—a person between whom and the employer there exists the relationship of Master and Servant and whose average weekly wages do not exceed £5. This relationship is created by contract and involves the exercise of control or the right to exercise control by the employer over the workers and the right to direct him how to do his work.

"These conditions clearly do not hold in respect of Ministers or Home Missionaries working in Circuits. There is no contract of service existing between the Minister or Missionary and any persons. Our whole Church system rests on a voluntary basis and depends upon the loyalty of its members for the carrying on of its work and the support of its ministers and other workers.

"An exception may arise in the case of a Home Missionary engaged, controlled, directed and paid by the Home Mission Committee in respect of an accident sustained by the Missionary performing the duties laid down in the terms of his engagement, but this would depend entirely upon the terms of the engagement."

The Board has sought also the opinion of its legal adviser, Mr. H. de R. Flesher, M.A., LL.B. It has had the benefit of the advice of its Lay Treasurer, Mr. G. S. Salter (Solicitor) and of the present legal adviser to the President, Mr. Joseph Stanton, LL.B. All agree with the opinion of the late Mr. J. A. Flesher that circuits are under no liability for their ministers under the Workers' Compensation Act.

They hold that for any liability to exist, ministers must come within the definition of a worker under the Act as set forth above. The remuneration of £260 per annum given by Mr. Flesher in 1928 is now increased to £400 per annum. A minister is therefore not within the Act if his remuneration,

including, of course, rent, use of furniture and all other benefits exceeds £400 a year, nor is he within the Act unless there is a specific contract of service.

The legal gentlemen consulted cite cases determined by the Courts in which the vital distinction is noted between "a contract of service" and "a contract for services."

Lord Justice Fletcher Moulton is quoted as saying :—

"The greater the amount of direct control exercised over the person rendering the services by the person contracting for them, the stronger the grounds for holding it to be a contract of service, and similarly, the greater the degree of independence of such control, the greater the probability that the services rendered are of the nature of professional services, and that the contract is not one of service."

The question of Employment of Ministers has already been dealt with in England in connection with ministers of the United Methodist Church and Probationers of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in relation to the National Insurance Act, 1911 (Imperial). Schedule I, Part I of that Act provided that "employment" within the meaning of the Act included :—

(a) "Employment in the United Kingdom under *any contract of service* or apprenticeship, written or oral, whether expressed or implied and whether the employed person is paid by the employer or some other person."

Mr. Justice Joyce "held that if the Ministers concerned were employed at all, it would be very difficult to find out who were their employers. He said his attention had been called to cases in which the difference between "contract of service" and "contract for services" had been considered, and in face of those cases and of the judicial observations to be found therein his Lordship was of opinion that it was absolutely impossible for anyone to argue seriously that either of those classes of persons was under a contract of service."

In view of all the facts we think that any claim by a Minister or Probationer under the Workers' Compensation Act must fail on the ground that there is no contract of service, and the Board submits that home missionaries are in the same position.

In the case of circuits having a definite contract of service with paid church officials such as organists, and caretakers, trustees are liable and in a number of cases they have arranged cover under the Workers' Compensation Act through the Connexional Office.

It should be stated that the Board arranges insurance against accident and sickness for such ministers and home missionaries as desire this service. Particulars are to be found in the Minutes of Conference, 1934, page 107.

2.—METHODIST GENERAL PURPOSES TRUST BOARD (Inc).

The Board has continued to administer a number of trusts of varied nature committed to its care. During the year it accepted from the trustee in the estate of the late Mr. Alexander Binnie a transfer of his trust in the administration of a sum of £200 the net income from which is to be devoted to the stipend fund of the Sumner Methodist Church.

The Trustees of the estate of the late Mr. Sampson Uren also desired to retire from their trust and transferred the administration of the same to the General Purposes Trust Board. In this trust a sum of £1000 is held in the interests of the South Island Methodist Orphanage; £500 in the interests of the Foreign Mission Fund and £500 in the interests of the Home Mission Fund. The testator expresses a wish, but not so as to bind or fetter the beneficiary bodies, that the capital sums shall be kept intact as long as possible and that the income only be used. Our Board as trustee is empowered to postpone for as long as it, in its uncontrolled discretion shall think fit, the sale, calling in and conversion of any part of the invested funds. The bequests were subject to a life interest by the widow who has recently died.

It is gratifying to note that increasing use is being made of the facilities we offer for holding and administering any real or personal property for special purposes or trusts in connection with our Church, as well as for any trust body, or other organisation or department connected with the Church.

The financial statement of the Board accompanies this report.

Some Districts are still in arrears for 1934 and short in their payments for the March and June quarters of 1935, the amount outstanding at September 30th being £114 6s. 5d.

The Committee recommends that the levy for 1936 be 2%.

FOREIGN MISSION DEPARTMENT.

Annual Report.

As through all the years, God has again made bare His arm and we render our thanks and praise to Him for definite progress through another difficult year. Important above all else is the fact that men are being saved and added to the Church. The full membership in the Solomon Islands District now stands at 6,065—an increase of 234 for the year. No less than 1,625 additional adherents are reported, bringing the total to 15,001. 17 new Churches and 5 additional preaching places testify to the evangelising zeal of our Teachers. In 185 day schools—an increase of 13 for the year—3,773 scholars are taught not only to read and write, etc., but also to know and love Him who said "Suffer the children to come unto me."

These are inspiring facts and figures indicating something of the greatness of the Work to which we, as a Church, are called. A Work so great and urgent as to constitute a first claim upon our thought, substance, and prayer. Fuller reference to the Work and the workers is made in the appended report on the General Secretary's visit to the Field.

Special thanks are due to the Rev. W. A. Sinclair and the Office Staff who so ably maintained the work at the Head Office during the General Secretary's absence; also to the District and Circuit Secretaries who have rendered devoted service.

We are devoutly grateful for the splendid contribution of £1623 from the Native Church. As in New Zealand, the economic conditions have improved somewhat in the Solomons and our native people gladly responded by an increase in their giving of £497. This from a people none of whom has enjoyed the Gospel for more than 34 years and some of whom have heard the name of Jesus for the first time within the last few years.

Some Circuits in New Zealand have also shown an upward tendency but, unfortunately, in the majority of cases, the tendency has been the other way and we have to report a decrease of £445 (approx.) in the New Zealand contributions to the General Fund. Wellington alone reports an increase as a District, all other Districts showing a decrease on last year's giving.

We cannot urge too strongly and earnestly how imperative it is to increase the General Income, if the Work is to be maintained and the Doctor sent back to the Field. Nor can we emphasise too much how easily this can be accomplished if every member of the Church is faithfully and personally confronted with his or her responsibility to this great work. As we remarked last year, an additional half-penny per week from each member would solve our problem. Is it too much to ask for an extra half-penny per week for the sake of Him who died for us ?

Staff Changes.

The only addition to the European Staff this year has been the Rev. A. W. E. Silvester, who has been appointed to take charge of the Vella Lavella Circuit.

The Rev. D. C. Alley has been nominated by the Board for appointment to the Solomon Islands District in 1936.

Nurse Vera Cannon, after acting in an honorary capacity, has been appointed to the regular Staff and is now stationed at Roviana.

Nurse Edna White has been reappointed to the Helena Goldie Hospital Bilua.

Rev. A. A. Bensley, after 12 years of faithful and successful service on the Mission Field, returned to the Home Work.

Dr. Sayers also, after rendering very outstanding medical service, returned to New Zealand and has commenced the practice of his profession in Auckland and is there giving excellent service by his advocacy of the claims of the medical work, and with much willingness has addressed many meetings in the interests of Missions. He has been appointed a member of the Board of Missions. Mrs. Sayers also is assisting by addressing meetings of the Women's Auxiliaries.

Furloughs.

The Rev. J. R. Metcalfe has been on furlough during this year and rendered excellent service in deputation work. He has now returned to his duties as Superintendent of Choiseul Circuit.

Sister Lina Jones has also been on furlough in the Dominion. After completing a deputation tour especially in connection with the work of the Women's Auxiliaries, Sister Lina will return to the Mission Field to continue her very valuable educational work at the Head Station.

General Secretary's Visit to the Mission Field.

The General Secretary has spent a considerable portion of this year in a visit to the Mission Field. The Mission Board and the Conference realised the necessity for such a visit in the interests of the work generally. It is a matter of extreme importance that the General Secretary should be thoroughly acquainted with the Field, the workers, the native people, the problems and the difficulties that confront the Missionaries and, after consultation with them, bring recommendations to the Board of Missions. After completing a deputation tour especially in connection with the work of the Women's Auxiliaries, Sister Lina will return to the Mission Field to continue her very valuable educational work at the Head Station.

M.W.M.U.

Once again we accord our sincere thanks and appreciation to the elect ladies of the M.W.M.U., not only for their splendid financial assistance, but also for their fine idealism and the spiritual challenge of this devoted service. The Dominion President (Mrs. W. H. Duke) and her Dunedin Executive are maintaining the high traditions of their predecessors, and the various Auxiliaries throughout the country are as keen and determined as ever that this great work to which they have set their hand shall go on. The workers on the Field gather constant inspiration and courage from the steadfast sympathy and support of the M.W.M.U.

Bible Class Unions.

Having seen a good deal during the year of the splendid work of Sister Ada Lee and the Rev. Harry Joyce, our first thought is to ask the Young Women's and Young Men's Bible Class Unions for an extra £100 per annum for the high privilege of being so intimately associated with these fine missionaries. We would, however, assure the Unions of our sincere appreciation of the great help they are rendering the Overseas Cause by their prayers, service, and financial support. We look to the Bible Classes up and down the land to ardently foster the missionary spirit and ensure the upbuilding of a movement that seeks the "Utmost for the Highest" in the Solomons as in New Zealand.

Teachers' Supporters.

A very happy way of consecrating service and substance to the spread of the Gospel in the Solomons is by supporting a native agent on the Field, and we congratulate, and are grateful to, the friends, Sunday Schools, Endeavour Societies, and other Institutions that have adopted this method of very materially helping to make known the name and love of Jesus. We trust that many others will be eager to share such privilege of being closely associated with individual workers on the Field.

The Rev. V. Le C. Binet, of Glen Eden, Auckland, has undertaken the oversight and correspondence in connection with this Department and the best thanks of the Board are due to him.

Publicity Work.

In addition to the deputation work of Missionaries from overseas, most valuable assistance has been rendered by the Revs. A. A. Bensley, T. Dent, V. Le C. Binet, F. H. Hayman, W. W. Avery, W. J. Enticott, Mr. W. C. Francis (Vice-President), Miss May Barnett and Mrs. Eaton (nee Lilian Berry).

Special thanks are due to the following Circuits for liberating their Ministers for deputation work, viz.—Avonsdale, Thames, Hamilton, Morrinsville and Roslyn.

Publications.

The circulation of "The Open Door" shows a decrease of 130, the quarterly issue being 5050 copies. A special appeal was made during the year to Sunday Schools in the interests of "The Lotu" and this has resulted in an increase of 169 in the circulation of the paper. The number now issued quarterly is 6800. The Editorship of "The Lotu" has been in the capable hands of the Rev. E. P. Blamires. The columns of "The Methodist Times" have been freely used to give information about our missionary work.

Banga Plantation Debentures.

During the year Banga Plantation Debentures to the amount of £750 have been paid off. The remaining holders of debentures, with one exception, have agreed to renew the debentures at a reduced rate of interest when they mature next year.

Special Gifts.

Outstanding among special gifts this year is that from Mr. Gorman, of Nelson, and the late Mrs. Gorman. This gift, amounting to £3,000, is specially earmarked by the donors for Medical purposes, only the income from it to be available for expenditure. It is hoped that this splendid example may inspire others who have the means to do something generous towards placing the Medical Work on a firm foundation. The gift will be known as the "Samuel and Clara Matilda Gorman Medical Bequest." Other gifts, amounting to £221, have been received "to help to send the doctor back."

Debt Reduction Appeal.

Generous contributions for Debt Reduction have continued to come in through the year. The Fund now stands at £4,971. This includes £100 from the Rev. J. F. Goldie, who has promised an additional £100 when the total reaches £5,000. The response to the Special Appeal has helped to lift the Board from the critical position and we return heartfelt thanks to God and all contributors. The actual amount received in 1935 was £1,364 10/11 all of which has been definitely applied to debt reduction.

Information has been received of a legacy of £100 in the estate of the late J. B. Veale, of Auckland.

The late Mr. White (M.B.E.) of Blenheim has left £150, to be paid in three annual instalments of £50 each.

Change of Name.

During the year the Board of Missions recommended that a change be made in the name of the Missionary Society, and that "Overseas" be substituted for "Foreign" the name of the Society henceforth to be known as "The Methodist Overseas Missionary Society of New Zealand."

Synods, the M.W.M.U., and the Bible Class Unions approved the change of name.

Legal difficulties have arisen; however. There is no provision in the Act under which the Investment Board is registered for a change of name and the recommendation of the Annual Meeting of the Board is that action be deferred.

Medical Policy.

After full and heart-searching discussion regarding our medical policy, it was clear to the Board of Missions that it could do no other than fully re-establish the Medical Unit at the earliest possible moment and it was resolved "That it be the Board's objective to re-establish the Medical Unit in 1938." A brilliant young Methodist doctor, devoted to the cause of Missions, will be available at that time and equipped with New Zealand and English experience and a course in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene. We are confident we shall have the whole Church behind us in this matter and that the people of the Solomons will once again receive the medical attention of which they stand in urgent need.

The reappointment of Nurse Edna White at the Annual Meeting is the Board's first step in the carrying out of its medical policy and all New Zealand will rejoice with us that this highly capable, devoted, and experienced worker, who knows the language and people of both Roviana and Vella Lavella, has offered for a further term of service. We are deeply indebted to Nurse White's parents—Mr. and Mrs. T. R. White of Pakuranga—for agreeing, at considerable sacrifice, to their daughter once again responding gladly to the missionary call.

METHODIST FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF NEW ZEALAND.

The Treasurers' Report for the Year Ended 31st December, 1935.

The returns for the year ended December 31st, 1935, show an income in New Zealand of £10,313 14s. 3d. Of this amount £1,364 10s. 11d. was contributed for Debt Reduction. Ordinary income amounted to £8,949/3/4 as compared with £9,425 11s. 3d. for the previous year. Circuits contributed £444 15s. 10d. less than in the previous year. The Women's Missionary Union and the Young Women's Bible Class Union gave £1,323/10/- which is an increase of £81 2s. 6d. for the year. The Young Men's Bible Class Movement contributed £191 19s. 6d.

The Solomon Islands income amounts to £1,685 which is an increase of £337 17s. 6d. as compared with the previous year. The previous year Government grants and subsidies amounted to £220 8s. 0d. and as there were no Government grants in 1935 the actual increase in Island income is £558 5s. 6d. This splendid increase in the offerings of the Church in the Islands has been made possible by the improved price of copra.

The expenditure for the year is £8,739 3s. 4d. in the Solomon Islands, being £597 3s. 7d. less than the previous year and £160 16s. 8d. less than the allocation made to the Mission District.

The expenditure at the Home Base has been £1,855 7s. 6d., being £1,253 11s. 7d. for the Mission Office expenses, £449 1s. 0d. for interest on bank overdraft and loans, compared with £614 16s. 0d. in 1934 and £152 14s. 11d. sundry payments.

The overdraft at the Bank has been considerably reduced during the year and now stands at £3,843, compared with £5,309 at the same time last year.

Legacy money and other gifts have been received to the amount of £327 12s. 2d. Of this sum £223 7s. 2d. was from legacies. This has been placed to the credit of the Equipment Fund. The Medical Fund has had £3,128 10s. 0d. added to it this year. Of this amount £3,000 comes from the splendid gift of Mr. Samuel Gorman and from the estate of his late wife.

The total deficiency at the end of the year was £10,039 3s. 10d., compared with £11,443 7s. 3d. at the close of the year 1934, a reduction of £1,404 3s. 5d. Of this amount £1,364 10s. 11d. came from the Debt Reduction Fund and £39 12s. 6d. from the General Fund. This shows that the whole of the money contributed for Debt Reduction went to debt reduction, while the amount of £39 12s. 6d. represents a surplus on the year's working.

The circulation of "The Open Door" shows a decrease of 130, there being a quarterly issue of 5,050 copies. The quarterly issue of "The Lotu" amounts to 6860, being an increase of 169. The columns of "The Methodist Times" have also been employed to give publicity to our Missionary work.

"WHITE UNTO HARVEST."

General Secretary's Report on his visit to the Solomon Islands District, 1935.

For journeying mercies and abundant health during 5½ months of constant travel, we give to God our humble and grateful thanks.

We gratefully acknowledge also the courtesy and kindness extended to us in Australia by the Overseas Mission Offices in Sydney, Melbourne, and Brisbane, and to the President of the N.S.W. Conference (Rev. M. K. Gilmour) who not only entertained us during our stay in Sydney, but also placed the President's Room and all its facilities at our disposal.

Sailing from Sydney on July 13th, we reached Gizo on July 29th, and received a very warm welcome from the Chairman of the District. From then on until we sailed from Rabaul on November 14th, with the exception of the 5 weeks we were in Southern Bougainville, Mr. Goldie accompanied us in all our travels. Our generous and gracious host at Kokeqolo and during journeyings oft in his beloved "Tandanya," he was a constant source of information and inspiration to us. It was a privilege to see something of the profound and beneficent influence he exercises over chiefs and people and of their great love for and confidence in him. For his hospitality, unflinching kindness and courtesy, and for the inspiration of his friendship and his work, we are deeply grateful.

To all the other brethren and their wives, and the Sisters who so graciously entertained us in their various Circuits, we extend sincere thanks. They could not have been more kind and considerate, and it was a great privilege to be with them in their homes and Circuits and see something of the splendid service they are rendering the Society and the Kingdom of God.

Staff.

As a Society, we have every reason to be abundantly grateful to God for the men and women He has called to His service in the Solomons and our impression is that each worker is equally grateful for the opportunity and privilege of service. As long as the Staff is human, there are certain to be minor differences, but it augurs well for the future of the Work that regarding the things that really count—major matters of policy and all vital interests of the Kingdom—there is among our men and women a real spirit of unity.

Our visit has impressed us more than ever with a sense of gratitude to God for the wisdom, statesmanship, courage, and devotion of the Chairman of the District. None of us can fully realise all he has meant, and still means, to the Solomons. It is hard, too, to realise that there is only one man in the active Ministry of our Conference who is his senior. In spite of a long ministry under very difficult conditions, he retains the ardour and vigour of youth and we are glad in the expectation that he will be spared to lead our work on the Field for yet many years. He has our love and utmost confidence and, in spite of occasional disagreements on minor matters, we believe this to be true also of every member of the Staff.

That there is much more work to be done than the present Staff can compass there can be no shadow of doubt. Extension—for which, particularly on Bougainville and Buka, the time is fully ripe—demands more workers. Even to develop adequately the work we already have in hand, the present Staff is insufficient. Pioneering work involves much travelling on the part of the Missionary and even in well established Circuits the man in charge must pay frequent visits to his numerous stations to encourage and direct the native teachers. This travelling involves absence from the Circuit or section training institution which militates against the training and development of students for the native ministry which, in turn, hinders the supply of workers at a critical period. The re-appointment of a third man to the Bougainville-Buka Circuit is an urgent necessity. Messrs. Cropp and Joyce are men of exceptional strength and devotion, and have been remarkably successful both in pioneering and consolidation work, but they are being overtaxed as also are their wives. They have great plans for extension among people who eagerly await the Gospel as soon as men and money are available.

The work among the women, girls, and babies of Southern Bougainville—to say nothing of the loneliness of the Missionary's wife who seldom, if ever, sees another white woman—demands the appointment of a Sister to Tonu as soon as possible.

Medical Work.

Our Medical Work has been sorely stricken by the withdrawal of the doctor and his nursing staff, but is still a vitally important branch of our organisation.

Mrs. Leadley and Nurse Cannon are doing excellent work at Roviana, assisted by a competent staff of native medical assistants and nurses. The building used as a Hospital was not erected for this purpose but has been adapted and serves fairly well. It is of European material with a central ward capable of accommodating 6 cots, and a wide verandah various parts of which are used as out-patients' department, dispensary, etc.

The Maternity ward is an adjacent native building which is shortly to be renewed.

Since the withdrawal of the doctor and staff from Bilua, the medical work at Roviana has increased considerably.

Maternity and Child Welfare Work.

In addition to the work being carried out at Roviana, splendid service is being rendered by Sister Ethel McMillan at Bambatana, on the Island of Choiseul, Sister Elizabeth Common at Skotolan, on the Island of Buka, and Mrs. A. H. Voyce at Tonu, in Southern Bougainville, particularly as regards Maternity and Child Welfare Work. Each of these workers has a Maternity ward and facilities—not always adequate—for the care of orphans and other babies.

Native girls assist in this highly important work and thus acquire valuable training.

There are excellent native hospitals at Patutiva, Bambatana, Tonu, Tiop and Skotolan, all under the care of native medical assistants trained by our doctors and nurses, and in several other places very good medical work is being done by the Missionaries and their wives and native medical assistants or teachers. Native medical assistants are also bravely carrying on, as far as they are able, at the "Helena Goldie Hospital," Bilua, and in the care of the Leper Settlement.

To see the work and its possibilities is to realise the urgency of the complete re-establishment of our medical unit. The valuable work the native medical assistants are doing is possible only because of the training they have received and it is imperative that the source of such an essential service be not allowed to dry up. But this will surely happen if we are forced to continue long without the doctor, who is able, not only to train more native assistants and nurses, but also to give refresher courses to those already at work. We have an excellent and well-equipped hospital at Bilua, and also a new house for the medical superintendent, and what is more, a brilliant and devoted young doctor eager to take up the work. It is unthinkable that the Church, by inadequate support, should long delay the appointment.

Educational Work.

Considering the fact that even in the oldest part of the District the people have had a written language for not more than 30 years, the educational standard reached, particularly at Roviana, is of a high order. Not only is this true of our District and, to a lesser degree, our Circuit Institutions, but also of the most of the village schools, in the British Solomons. Throughout New Georgia and Vella Lavella, and, to a lesser extent, Choiseul, it is unusual to find a native—apart from the very old and very young—who cannot read and write. On Bougainville and Buka most of the village schools have been established from a few weeks to a few years only, but even there excellent progress is being made.

We examined scores of village schools throughout the District and were profoundly impressed with the effectiveness of the work achieved in most of them. We also had the privilege of seeing the students of the various circuit and section training institutions at work both in and out of school and noted not only the excellent work the white brethren are doing, but also the outstanding capacity of many of the native tutors. Many of the tutors and catechists, in addition to the native probationers, show real power and initiative that augur well for the future leadership of the Native Church.

In a recent report on Education in the British Solomons, the Resident Commissioner made the following remarks, which constitute a striking testimony both to the educational policy of our Mission and the thoroughness with which it has been carried out by Mr. Goldie and his European and Native colleagues :—

"It should here be said to the credit of the Methodist Mission that the native clerks at present in Government service have been trained, without exception, under Mr. Goldie's care."

"It was generally conceded that the native teachers of the Methodist Mission were probably in advance of the rest of the Group."

The "Alma Mater" of practically all the Western Solomon Islanders who, as preachers, teachers and Government servants, are making such a large contribution to the well-being of their people is our District Training College at Kokeqolo. From the early days of the Mission the Chairman has been convinced of the importance of a well educated as well as a saved and sanctified native ministry and people. He has been ably supported by his European and Native colleagues with the result that, to-day, we have a College of which we have every right to be proud. I have seen other native institutions that can boast better buildings and equipment but none that is doing more effective work.

Some of the graduates of this college have done splendid work in the pioneering field of Bougainville and Buka, acting as catechists of various sections. Many more are ready and eager to go to this newer and needy work but the Government of the Mandated Territory of New Guinea has refused to let these highly qualified and devoted teachers enter that Territory of which Bougainville and Buka form a part. The objection is based upon the, to us, inadequate reason that trouble has been caused by certain Solomon Islanders, principally Malaita men. It seems unreasonable and illogical to exclude christian teachers, who are both wanted and needed by the people, because trouble has been caused by an entirely different type. The Government is also anxious that we should repatriate the Solomon Islands teachers now in the Territory and has refused to give permission to those who have gone to the British Solomons on furlough to return.

The Chairman and I journeyed to Rabaul to interview His Honour the Administrator, but unfortunately he was away and did not return until the night before my boat sailed for Sydney. He graciously gave us an hour of a very busy morning during which the above and other matters were discussed. He was adamant regarding the transfer of British Solomon Islands teachers to Bougainville and Buka, but promised to consider the question of permitting Bougainville and Buka students to go to Roviana for training. The Chairman remained in Rabaul for a further interview at which His Honour gave consent for Bougainville and Buka students, to the number of thirty, to proceed to Kokeqolo for training. We are grateful for this concession which will greatly facilitate our work and equally grateful to the Chairman for his able advocacy of our case.

In order to partially meet the difficult situation that had arisen, the Synod recommended the establishment of a Training Institution at Tiop and the transfer of the Rev. A. H. Joyce to take charge of that work, while also supervising the work of Southern Bougainville until the new man has

become familiar with it. It is probable, however, that the ability to transfer Bougainville-Buka students to Kokeqolo will save us the expense of establishing a large institution at Tiop.

Technical Training.

Closing down the saw-mill and the cessation of building repairs, etc., for financial reasons, have interfered with our important technical work. In Joni we have a devoted and capable craftsman. He has a number of students under his care and these, directed by the Chairman, are doing very good service as ship-wrights and carpenters. They have recently reconditioned the *Ilahe* and installed in her the engine they had removed from the old *Hilda*, thus giving to Choiseul a very serviceable boat. This class of work is not only valuable training for the Technical Students but saves the Society a considerable sum of money.

It is important that, in the near future, the Technical Work and Saw Mill be again in full swing and making their considerable contribution to the development of the race.

Central Training School for Girls.

Viewing conditions on the Field and discussing the matter at length with the Chairman and other workers have convinced us more than ever of the need for a Central Training School for Girls. Many of our Teachers are unmarried—and gravely handicapped in their work in consequence—because of the lack of suitably trained girls. An educated christian girl, trained in simple methods of hygiene, maternity and child-welfare work, teaching and christian leadership, can, as a Teacher's wife, exercise a profound influence upon the women and girls of the village and definitely hasten the coming of the Kingdom of God.

Our idea had been that such a School could be maintained at the District Institution, thus solving some of the problems of supervision, staff, and consequent cost of maintenance. The Chairman, however, is of the opinion that it should be a separate institution. This would mean not only the initial cost of such a venture but also a fairly considerable annual expenditure for additional staff. We hope, through the year, to secure from the Chairman an estimate of both initial cost and annual expenditure.

At Bambatana, Tonu, and Skotolan very good work is being done in the training of girls and quite a number of teachers are happier and more effective in their work because they have as wives girls trained in these circuit institutions. The good work thus done serves to emphasise the possibilities of a well staffed and equipped central school.

PROPERTIES

Houses.

The Sisters' House at Bilua is old and in poor condition and will need to be extensively repaired or rebuilt in the near future.

The house at present occupied by the Tutor at Kokeqolo is also old, but still comfortable.

Apart from the above, all our European house and college property is in good order, except for the lack of paint for the purchase of which money has not been available.

At Patutiva, Tonu, Tiop and Skotolan, mission houses are of the semi-native type—roomy, comfortable and well built. The native roofs and walls of these buildings need repairing from time to time but this is not very expensive. It is inadvisable to consider replacing these houses by costly structures of European materials until the permanence of site has been finally decided.

Boats.

In spite of her 23 years, the District auxiliary ketch *Tandanya* is in good seaworthy condition—a state of affairs for which the best thanks of the Society are due to the Chairman and his splendid crew who give devoted and capable care to this their “Sweetheart of the Sea.”

The *Bilua* (Vella Lavella auxiliary cutter) is out of commission at present owing to the need of somewhat extensive engine repairs and general overhaul, but is a very serviceable craft.

The *Saga* (Bougainville-Buka auxiliary cutter) is a smart little vessel which, in spite of many years of service, is kept in excellent trim by Mr. Cropp's able and devoted care.

The *Ilahe* (Choiseul auxiliary cutter) has just been reconditioned at our Roviana Technical School and the engine from the *Hilda* installed, and should render the Choiseul Circuit excellent service for years to come.

The *Te Karere* is a beautiful launch but—like a number of other beautiful things—expensive to run. She is laid up and the Board has already consented to her sale.

The *Wanganui* (Roviana launch) continues to render excellent service in and around the Roviana Lagoon and is in good order.

Several smaller boats—whaleboats, etc.—are in commission and in fair order.

The *Hilda*, *Smokebox*, and the *Tiop* whaleboat are laid up and unlikely to be of any further service.

Insurance.

All our permanent house and church property is insured against fire with the Connexional Office. The insurance of our boats, however, is not on such a satisfactory basis. We pay nearly £200 per annum to a company for policies that cover total loss only and through the years have paid for our boats several times over. The Chairman of the District and I discussed this matter and our recommendation is that the Board establish a fund to cover damage and loss of its boats, paying £250 per annum into the fund until it totals £1,000, retaining the present cover in the meantime. That when the fund has reached £1,000 the premiums at present paid to the Company be paid into our own fund. That the Insurance Fund be kept in a separate account not available for other purposes, but at the same time offsetting overdraft charges. That when the Fund has reached what is deemed a safe amount the premium be reduced and the money saved to the General Fund.

Saw-Mill and Boat Shed.

These buildings with their plant, timber, etc., are in excellent order and it is sincerely to be hoped that, in the very near future, may again be a hive of industry. Some of the logs awaiting milling have been affected by climate and weather and their value written down.

A first-class copra store on concrete piles has recently been erected by the Technical Department on the Roviana wharf and is a great credit to all concerned.

Plantations.

It was a pleasure to see the excellent order of our plantations at Kokeqolo, Bilua and Skotolan. The latter is both small and new and will not be in full bearing for some time, but Kokeqolo and particularly Bilua seem to bear above the average, and, with the economies that hard times have forced upon us, should prove a valuable source of revenue to the Society.

Banga, owing to the abnormally low price of copra, has not been worked to any extent for more than a year and, in consequence, is somewhat overgrown. A few weeks' work, however, when operations are resumed, will restore this valuable property to good order. The Chairman is wise above many in these matters and we may confidently rely upon his judgment.

The areas planted on these various properties, all in full bearing with the exception of Skotolan, are:—

Conclusion.

That a wonderful work of God has been wrought in the Western Solomons is beyond dispute. Every activity has had, and still retains, as its central purpose the winning of the people for Jesus Christ and revealing to them His way of life and service. Darkness has been made light before them, and these erstwhile treacherous fighters, head-hunters, and cannibals have found, and rejoice in, the way of peace. Nothing on the Field impressed and moved us as much as the Class Fellowship Meetings of which we attended a large number. Here with real conviction, and often deep emotion, men and women testified to the transforming power of God's grace in their lives and of their devotion to Him who has so wonderfully led them into the way of life and love. It is wonderful in our eyes and, as a Church, we should thank God for the privilege of being associated with such a triumphant task.

The Statistical Returns, as reported to the recent Synod, give some idea of what has been accomplished in 33 years among a savage and primitive people.

Some time ago a Government official was discussing with some Roviana people their relationship to the Methodist Mission. The reply was "We are the Methodist Mission." This is a good illustration of the remarkable way in which the life of these people has been changed. The whole community is the Church and all the affairs of its life have to fall into line with this fact. The chiefs lead their people both by precept and example in the things of the Spirit and we listened to many of these chiefs telling with deep emotion of how the coming of the Gospel had made all things new for them. In the Menakasapa Church, New Georgia, this transformation is depicted by the broken and discarded weapons of war placed at the foot of the Cross. At Senga, on the Island of Choiseul, in a very dramatic way, the people staged a sham attack on the village depicting scenes of carnage that were common less than 20 years ago. This was followed by a Class meeting in which chiefs and people thanked God for the Gospel—His Word that had changed strife to peace.

Inscribed above the pulpit in another New Georgia Church in a village called Hobart, are the following words:—"Come on Hobart! Let us all shelter beneath the Cross of the Lord Jesus Christ which is for the blotting out of our sins, and for the salvation of men who seek God by faith and in truth. 'For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish but have everlasting life.'—John 3:16."

These are all indicative of the change that has been wrought by the message we have been called to proclaim. Similar triumphs of the Cross await us on Bougainville and Buka, where the Field is white unto harvest, and the whole Church in the Solomons has to be yet further built up and established. This is the great and glorious task of New Zealand Methodism, which will be accomplished as we yield ourselves fully to the spirit of prayer and sacrifice. May we be found faithful.

We thank them for the way they are supporting the Board in its efforts to reduce the debt and keep the expenditure as low as possible in order that the retrenched workers may be replaced.

We record our thanks also for the generous and enthusiastic way in which they received, entertained, and inspired the General Secretary on his recent visit to the Field.

We rejoice in the success that attended the Chairman's interviews with the Administrator of the Mandated Territory of New Guinea regarding Educational and other matters, and thank him most sincerely for this further evidence of his wise statesmanship.

We are humbly grateful to God for the definite growth of the Kingdom in the Western Solomons during the year and pray that the workers may receive constant grace, strength and wisdom to continue in the great work to which God has called them.

4. Appreciation of His Honour the Administrator of the Mandated Territory of New Guinea.

That the Chairman of the Solomon Islands District be asked to convey to His Honour the Administrator of the Mandated Territory of New Guinea the respectful and sincere thanks of the Board of Missions and the Conference for his permission to our Society to transfer students from Bougainville and Buka for college training at Roviana. The Conference is convinced that such a wise move must eventuate in the all round advancement of the people of Bougainville and Buka, and trusts that the day is not far distant when a fuller intercourse between the best elements of the two Territories will be possible.

9. Thanks—To M.W.M.U.

Conference is deeply conscious of the rich and consecrated service rendered by the Methodist Women's Missionary Union, and places on record its sincere thanks and appreciation. By deep spiritual influence, close co-operation in the practical affairs of the Society, regular contact with workers on the Field, and generous financial support, the M.W.M.U. has played a large part in the success that has attended the work in the Solomons during 1935.

The guarantee of £1,200 for the year greatly helped the Board in framing an aggressive policy and although it has not an actual guarantee for 1936 the Board is confident in the assurance that this amount will be forthcoming if at all possible, and is adventuring still further in its great objective of winning the Western Solomons for Jesus Christ.

10. Thanks to Y.M. and Y.W.B.C. Movement.

That the sincere thanks of the Conference be extended to the Young Men's and Young Women's Bible Class Movement for their sympathy and practical help through the past year. By supporting the Rev. A. H. Voyce and Sister Ada Lee, both of whom are rendering splendid service, the Bible Classes are playing an important part in the development of the Church's Missionary Enterprise.

Conference also seeks its closer co-operation and help that the work to which we have been called in the Western Solomons may be accomplished.

11. Medical Bequest—Name.

That the bequest be known as "The Samuel and Clara Matilda Gorman Medical Bequest."

12. Thanks.

That the sincere thanks of the Conference be extended to Mr. S. Gorman for the splendid sum of £3,000 given by him on behalf of the late Mrs. Gorman and himself for medical work in our Solomon Islands District. We thank God for the missionary zeal and love that have inspired this gift. It will be greatly blessed to thousands of sufferers, who, through its ministry of healing, will be led to a fuller knowledge of the Great Healer Himself.

The Conference prays that this generous bequest may inspire others to loyally support the Board of Missions in its effort to restore and maintain the Medical Unit in the Solomons.

HOME MISSION AND CHURCH EXTENSION DEPARTMENT.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1935.

The Christian Church in any age is never functioning normally unless it is fulfilling its Divine Commission to "tell out" the message it has first of all received. Within New Zealand, our Department has been entrusted by the Church with the initiating and maintaining of many activities for the fulfilling of that commission. Through another difficult year the activities of the Department both at Headquarters and in the wider field have been steadily maintained, and we give thanks to God for the measure of success that has been recorded. To hold our ground when everything is being severely tested is an accomplishment, and to advance is a greater cause for thanksgiving, and in both of these aspects we can record a degree of encouragement. Life goes on, and the need for Christian ministrations increases rather than decreases with the difficulties of the days, so that we renew our certainty to-day of the necessity and fruitfulness of our task.

The Home Mission Board and Standing Committees.

As occasion has demanded, the Board and Committees have met to carry through the policy of the Conference. The work of the Department has thus proceeded smoothly, and the wider field of operations has been steadily reviewed. When the need has arisen, crises in various stations have been dealt with according to the means at the disposal of the Board.

Board Secretary.

After four years as Secretary, Rev. J. H. Allen severed his connection with the Board at last Conference. We record our appreciation of his valued services both as secretary and Board member for a number of years.

Our Staff.

We must record again our deep appreciation of the manner in which our workers in the field are confronting their problems. Some of the agents have greater gifts than others, but almost without exception, their devotion to their Master is being revealed in steady service.

Deputation Work.

This year the bulk of the Deputation work has been carried through by Ministers and Home Missionaries, working principally in their own Synod Districts. The work in most instances has been done with a high degree of efficiency, but in few instances has the financial result been adequate for our needs. It is evident that even with the most efficient and faithful service of such deputations, we have not yet evolved a satisfactory alternative to the Maori Choir for making a popular appeal to those people who are on the fringe of Church life. Much thought and prayer must be given to this problem, but it all points to the necessity of building up our list of annual subscribers who, after all, form the back-bone of our Fund. The Board expresses its deep sense of appreciation of the services rendered by the voluntary deputations this year.

General Superintendent.

For several months during the year Rev. A. J. Seamer visited Australia, first in connection with the Melbourne Centenary Celebrations, and later conducting a tour with the Waiaata Maori Choir. This Choir has done valued work in conducting services and meetings, proceeds of which were devoted

in some instances to Foreign Missions, Australian Home and City Missions, and also to our New Zealand Home and Maori Mission Funds. This tour will prove of great value to our workers who have shared the experiences of the tour.

Assistant Superintendent.

During the year, the Assistant Superintendent has conducted a share of the Deputation work in various Districts, but has given the bulk of his time to conducting inspirational Missions, and round-table conferences with officials of Circuits and Home Mission Stations in a number of Districts. Visits have also been made to several Home Mission Stations for special consultation on local problems.

Preaching Places.

In times of financial stress, some Circuits and Home Mission Stations are tempted to withdraw from some outposts, on the ground of the cost of travelling and the possibility of centralising the same groups in a main Church. We would urge a warning that these cases should not be decided on a basis of financial returns. We are a Missionary Church, and must go to those who need us most. If another larger opportunity is being neglected by continuing some small outpost, that is a different matter, but we feel that if a place is closed in favour of a larger one as a Sunday appointment, every effort should be put forward to continue the smaller place as a week-night appointment. Experience shows that usually in a process of "centralisation," the total number who gather at the centre are not as great as the aggregate of the smaller groups. Too much centralising will mean the closing of a unique field for the training of new preachers and workers, and Methodism is at its best when it is creating new workers with a sense of Missionary responsibility.

Spiritual Advance.

From last Conference a call went forth to give Evangelism a place of first importance in the programme of the Church's activity, and detailed suggestions were added for work among our own people and among those outside the Church. The Committee, early in the connexional year, sent out a circular to all ministers drawing their attention to these proposals, and adding a further practical recommendation relating to a series of special evangelistic services for the Sundays of July and August where mid-week meetings were impracticable. In response to our request, a little information has been sent directly to the Committee about evangelistic efforts throughout the Dominion: and to judge from this, and from reports appearing in "The Methodist Times," and from our local observations, a great deal of rewarding enterprise has followed the suggestions which the Committee made. We have heard with pleasure of ministers who have begun their work in new circuits with successful evangelistic efforts; in this way utilising the freshness of their appeal and setting a high standard for their subsequent work. Best of all there is a new interest in Bible Class circles. From the Central Executive of the Young Men's Union in Wellington, and from the Auckland Unions, both Young Women's and Young Men's, circulars have gone forth emphasising the need of Evangelistic Effort. Throughout Auckland, and in other centres, fellowship groups have been formed primarily to deepen the personal religious life of our young people. Reference should be made to several Missions conducted during the year in important Circuits by the Assistant Superintendent of the Board. Early in the year this Committee agreed to purchase hymn books for these missions, and to help in other ways. Mr. Laurenson reports that, while there are some of our people who absented themselves from Evangelistic services, congregations grew steadily at each Mission, and that much gain accrued to the Churches visited. The Com-

mittee also notes with pleasure the rapid growth of the attendances at the Open Air Services conducted in front of the Pitt Street Church, Auckland, on Friday evenings. These meetings are conducted by Rev. E. T. Olds and the Students of Trinity College, and attract very large crowds. Much good work has been accomplished. It is understood that similar open air work is being conducted in other centres. During the year two outstanding Christian Leaders have visited the Dominion. Both have stressed the necessity of Evangelism. Dr. Kagawa's programme of world co-operation is built up on a foundation of Personal Evangelism: while Dr. Maltby emphasised a religion, not of effort, but of Grace.

The Committee is more than ever assured of the vital importance of its work for the Church and the Kingdom.

Recommendations.

The Committee wishes once more to emphasise the necessity of sounding the evangelistic note throughout our witness, both in the pulpit and by our people. A serious spirit is abroad. Many of the old battles for freedom may have to be fought again. The call for men who enjoy the freedom wherewith Christ makes us free is clamant. When Christian workers are evangelistic, pleading with men until they bring them to personal decision, the nation will not lack free-men. We urge all our people to seek to recapture the simple faith, the joyful assurance, and the spiritual power which marked our fathers' witness.

We recommend:—

- (1) That the Spiritual Advance Programme as outlined for this year in the Minutes of Conference, 1935, pages 124 and 125, be reaffirmed as the Programme for 1936.
- (2) That where it is not possible to arrange for mid-week Evangelistic services, the Sunday evening services during the month of July or August or both be used. That various units of the life of the Church be responsible for the careful arranging of one service each and for taking a distinctive part in it. That Prayer Meetings to follow be held, prayer leaders being arranged beforehand, if thought advisable.
- (3) That Ministers be urged to send to the Spiritual Advance Committee any information which might secure more helpful results in future evangelistic work.
- (4) That in Circuits where no change of Minister is taking place, the March Quarterly Meetings make preliminary arrangements for special evangelistic efforts during the winter months: and that in other Circuits an early meeting of Circuit Officials be called for the same purpose.

Maori Work.

As usual a separate report on the Maori work will be submitted.

Literature and Colporteur.

Owing to the financial position, it has not been possible to have the Van on the road this year, and the Society's usefulness, particularly in outlying districts, has been somewhat curtailed in consequence. Nevertheless it is felt that good service has been rendered in a variety of ways. Through the co-operation of a number of Ministers and Home Missionaries, who have acted as voluntary agents, considerable quantities of good books have been distributed in country areas. The Bible Class Movements, by means of bookstalls at their Easter Camps and at Summer and Winter Schools, have helped us to introduce useful literature to large numbers of young people.

The Sunday Schools of our Church are coming to us increasingly for reward books, and numerous letters are received expressing great satisfaction at the type of book supplied. We are meeting a steady demand, especially by the youth of the church, right throughout the Dominion, for books of devotion, biography, and practical Christianity. This is among the most pleasing features of our work. On the financial side, we are pleased to state that we closed the year on July 31st with a credit balance of £91 4s. 0d. Our pleasure at this position, however, is more than offset by the fact that we cannot at present see our way to bringing the Van into operation again. We are confident that the distribution of helpful literature is an important function of the Church, and we look forward to the day when the Van will once more be on the road, and our Colporteurs visiting the homes of the people. We tender our thanks to all who have assisted during the year in the sale and distribution of literature, and to Messrs. J. L. Crawford and A. Turner who have acted as honorary Auditors.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT.

Special Appeal, 1936.

Conference of 1935 decided that the year 1936 be observed as a year of special appeal for reduction of the Overdraft on the Home Mission Fund. (See Minutes of Conference, 1935, page 125, (Finance), and resolution 19 and 20 on page 126). There is an urgent need to put the income for the Home Mission Fund from ordinary sources on a much better footing. With things as they are, only absolutely urgent matters can be supported out of current income. Some of the workers who are doing the heaviest jobs are receiving the least adequate assistance from our Fund. The steady income from ordinary sources must improve, before anything like adequate assistance can be given to the general work. Still less can we at present use the Fund for urgent extension work, or as an equalisation fund for stipends, to anything like the degree that we desire.

For current work, the Fund has been used wisely at the cost of a gravely increased overdraft, but the time has come for this to cease. We desire now to get rid of this dead-weight of debt so as to clear the way for advancement in the field.

The Board is compelled to ask the Church :—

1. To maintain essential work with a minimum of support from the Home Mission Fund during 1936,
2. to see that this year, all possible sources of income be explored for increasing and steadying the regular giving of the people, and
3. to put all possible weight into the special debt reduction appeal during the coming year.

To assist in these matters we request :—

- (a) the appointment of a very strong District Home Mission Committee and Secretary in every District.
- (b) the appointment also of a carefully selected small sub-committee of the above, to work as a group in correspondence with the Executive of the Home Mission Board.

RESOLUTIONS.

Recognising that the time has arrived for a more aggressive programme of Home Mission Financial and General organisation, Conference calls upon our people to give every possible support to this year's appeal for the Home Mission Fund, which is the only Connexional Fund that can be used for the assistance of the Circuit Fund in extension work and the consolidation of existing work within the Circuits.

PROPOSED METHODS.

That the H.M. Department be directed to take immediate steps to organise an effective appeal throughout the Dominion on the following lines :—

1. That a chain of enthusiastic H.M. Demonstrations be held reaching as far as is practicable every preaching place in the District. (It might be advisable in certain districts to start two chains at the same moment).
2. That a team of influential persons, ministerial and laymen and women, be selected and appointed to work under a strong leader and deputy leader and complete the work in each Circuit. That either the same leader or deputy with the same or re-organised team, go to the next Circuit. New leaders and recruits to take up the work as others, because of distance or other duties, drop out.
3. That the first Demonstration in every Circuit be a Central Rally, and that the team then split up and, under influential local escort, accompanied where possible by the usual collector also, call on likely subscribers, including others than Methodists, and to attend day and evening Demonstrations in the other preaching places.
4. That each Circuit be requested by the District Committee to appoint a strong Committee to carry out all local preparations and ensure enthusiastic interest in and support of these Demonstrations and the canvass throughout the Circuit. That each Circuit Committee take

whatever steps are necessary to create as deep an interest in this effort as if it were for local funds. In this appeal for the Central Fund of our Church, there is infinitely more at stake than our people realise.

5. That Sunday Schools, Bible Classes, Ladies' Guilds, Women's Missionary Auxiliaries, Leaders' and Local Preachers' Meetings, and all other Societies throughout the Circuits be approached seeking their enthusiastic co-operation. (This will entail preliminary educational effort).
6. That the H.M. Board approach the Trust Boards throughout the Dominion seeking their utmost support in this special Debt Reduction appeal, and pointing out the exceptional claims of the H.M. Fund upon such Trusts.
7. That the H.M. Board provide special collecting cards.
8. That emphasis be placed on the wide range of essential activities supported by the Fund and the main effort be directed to the amount and number of annual subscribers so as to secure continuous yearly support at a worthy level. At the same time an effective appeal be made for any additional subscriptions that might be secured without weakening the amount for the overdraft reduction.
9. The Conference urgently requests Circuit Ministers and Officials to give right of way to the special H.M. Deputations and Collectors, and render them every possible assistance and encouragement to cover effectively the whole of the Circuit area during their visit, in harmony with the above resolutions.
10. The Conference calls upon the Quarterly Meeting of each and every Circuit and Home Mission Station and the members of each Church Trust to consider whether, by any internal financial sacrifice, without unduly jeopardising local efficiency, a special grant might be made to assist to reduce the Home Mission Fund Debit which has been created by the giving of essential assistance to Circuits, H.M. Stations and Trusts that, during the depression years have been struggling for their very existence but which in future days will in their turn, themselves, contribute worthily to Mission and General Funds.
11. That in connection with the Appeal a week of Prayer and Self-denial be held, commencing with the 2nd Sunday in May in North Auckland and the South Island, and the 2nd Sunday in October in the rest of the North Island, and that suitable literature and envelopes be prepared by the Home Mission Department.

Abridged Report for 1934-35.

In October, 1935, we held the 21st Annual Conference of our Union. Starting with 13 affiliated Auxiliaries we now have 57. While our Union works to raise money for women's work in the Solomon Islands and New Zealand, we do not lose sight of the spiritual benefit gained by belonging to such an organisation. The membership stands at 2,843 an increase of 163 on the previous year. At present we are supporting in the Solomon Islands, Sisters Ethel McMillan, Elizabeth Common, Lina Jones, and Nurse Vera Cannon; and in the Home Field, Sisters Eleanor Dobby, Olive Bott, Atawhai Wilcox and Airini Hobbs. Also Sister Netta Gittos who is still in charge at Kurahuna Maori Girls School at Auckland, where good work continues to be done. The girls are willing to learn and are a particularly fine and intelligent type.

Our income for the year was £2,582 6s. 3d. Since the formation of the Union over £34,000 has been raised for work among women. This includes £778 19s. 6d. given for Debt Reduction. During the year £159 was given to the Medical Fund which is divided among the Sisters and Missionaries in the Solomons to obtain medicine needed for their work.

Our members as usual have generously supplied gifts for the boxes for the Solomon Islands Sisters, and many parcels of clothing have been sent to the Sisters working among the Maori people.

We thank God for His goodness and with His guidance look forward with confidence to the future.

QUESTION XLV.—What is the State of the Maori Work, and What can be done to Promote its Interests?

MAORI MISSION REPORT.

A delightful thing in Maori life is the fact that all true Maori leaders, and artists, and craftsmen of the old school always acknowledge the **Great Unseen** before they commence any task. It should not therefore be difficult, if they are guided aright, to get the younger children, as they adopt Christian civilization more fully, to look distinctly for the guidance of the Holy Spirit in all their undertakings. Yet our Maori people are scattered over such a large area that we are still finding it almost impossible, with our limited Funds, to organise adequately the necessary oversight and guidance. We sometimes almost despair of securing satisfactory results from our skeleton organisation, yet such wonderful influence is wielded by our devoted Maori Ministers and Deaconesses that definite progress is undoubtedly being made year by year, proving indisputably the Presence and Operation of the Holy Spirit in all our Mission organisations and activities.

The Waikato—King Country.

A few years ago the Waikato and King Country were probably our most difficult fields. To-day a great light is shining on these people, and although the shadows are still deep, a tremendous transformation is taking place. At every turn the people are crying out for help and guidance in spiritual and moral questions, as well as in matters affecting their advancement in civilized modes of life.

The progress at the present time is probably as rapid as is safe, but is likely to be somewhat misdirected if we cannot supply sufficient guidance to out-general the manoeuvres of those who are false leaders. We therefore return thanks to Almighty God for the wonderful support our Church has given us in the carrying on of this work, both with finance and agents. A tribute is due to many of the European Circuits who gladly encourage their workers to reach out a helping hand to the less advanced race within, or adjacent to, their boundary. In no other district do we get quite such effective help from European and voluntary workers as we do in the Waikato and King Country.

North Auckland.

Although there are now probably at least 15,000 people in North Auckland classed as Maoris, yet there are comparatively few full-blood Maoris amongst them. We find there in dealing with these people, quite a different problem in many respects from the problems with which we are confronted in the heart of the North Island. Here, as elsewhere, we are greatly dependent upon our honorary Home Missionaries who receive no stipend whatever, but to whom a grant of a few pounds is made to supplement what the people can raise towards the cost of travelling, etc. Very useful work is being done by these agents, and by the local preachers, under the guidance of the Superintendent Minister. We question whether any greater or more consistent self-sacrifice is made by any workers in any area whatsoever than that made by some of these men when on their preaching tours. We are glad to be able to report that in general there is less drinking amongst the North Auckland Maoris than there was a few years ago, although they are still tremendously handicapped by the open bars and sly grogging that is all too prevalent in portions of that area. Here, as elsewhere, our Deaconesses are still moving as ministering angels amongst the people. We are greatly indebted to the Women's Missionary Union not only for their continued support of the Senior Deaconess of the Hokianga area, but also for their splendid move in offering support for the Assistant Deaconess who is making steady progress amid difficult conditions.

We are praying that God will open the hearts of some of our well-to-do people so that they will make substantial gifts to provide suitable means of transport for our Deaconesses in this and other areas. In these days of comparatively good roads, and with hundreds of miles of district to cover, we should not require any of these devoted ladies to work their districts on horse-back or cycle, although, of course, horses and cycles are needed at times in certain portions of their wide districts, but these should be used as supplementary to the chief means of travel.

The time has arrived when the Conference should seek to discover some means of putting effectively into activity its long accepted policy of full co-operation between the Northern English and Maori Circuits. This would mean, of course, the creation of a large Circuit, and the appointment of some minister, European or Maori, with wide sympathies and good organising gifts, for a long term as Superintendent. To appoint men, however suitable, for short terms to such work would be courting failure.

South Island.

The conditions in the South Island prevent us from making much progress unless we were prepared to go not only to the expense of providing the stipend for a South Island Agent, but also to make provision for the Agent's travelling, which would require a larger amount than the stipend. At present the condition of the Home Mission Fund prevents us from making this outlay, although there would be wonderful fruit in the years to come if a suitable Deaconess could be appointed to, and adequately maintained in this work. Her task would chiefly be that of a liaison officer between the Maoris and the European Circuits. In the meantime we are still keeping a measure of touch with the more important places by sending an agent from the North Island twice a year to visit and hold services with the people, and to advise with the minister of the adjacent European Circuit.

Taranaki-Wanganui.

This is also a large Circuit; in fact, it embraces all the Taranaki-Wanganui Church District. The Senior Maori Superintendent has his home in this area, but, as a matter of fact, is travelling through the other districts nearly all his time, for his services are greatly in demand as the chief Pastor of the

Maori branch of our Church. This means that the Circuit is worked by the Maori Superintendent minister, assisted by a fine staff of honorary Home Missionaries, each of whom receives a travelling allowance according to the necessities of his work. One of these agents, however, prefers to meet his own expenses as his contribution to the Church Funds. Other leaders, at various times, call their people together for special religious services. This means considerable expense which they bear uncomplainingly, in fact, we find that they sometimes run heavily into debt to do honour to the Church, and this, of course, we cannot countenance.

One of these Deaconesses has provided a baby car at her own expense, and consequently has been able to do about three times as much effective work as when the greater part of her time and energy had to be expended in pushing a cycle. The Maori health problem is very pronounced in this district, but fortunately the Health Department seems to be taking more interest in this matter than hitherto. Unlike Waikato, which so far has refused to accept the few thousands per year offered by the Government as compensation for lands which the Royal Commission stated should not have been confiscated after the Maori Wars, the majority of the Taranaki Maori leaders agreed to accept the financial settlement offered them by Parliament, and they have been drawing and expending their quota. There moneys are handled by a Trust Board which, of course, cannot be said to have a free hand. It is questionable whether the Taranaki Maoris are really receiving much benefit, for the majority of the money is being spent on the provision of what in certain other areas has been provided from other funds on which the Taranakis have an equal claim. It seems an iniquitous thing that the Trust Board receiving these moneys as "in lieu" of the return of land, should be encouraged, if not asked, to spend it on such things as the provision of nursing services for their people, while better nursing service is provided for other Maori tribes out of General Funds. It would seem that the first claim on these Compensation Funds should be the placing of landless Taranaki Maoris on suitable holdings so that they would be encouraged to become hard working citizens as their fellow Maori landholders are for the most part.

In conclusion, we would like to express our thanks to Almighty God for the great sacrifices that our European and Maori supporters are making, and for the work of the agents who are so freely offering themselves on the altar of service in a work that is never spectacular, but which is absolutely essential to the future welfare of the Kingdom of Christ in this Dominion.

During the year the sum of £112 10s. 0d. interest on the above capital, was transferred direct from the Wesley College Board to the Treasurer of the Kurahuna Maori Girls' School Committee in accordance with the resolution of Conference, 1931.

RESOLUTIONS.

1. That the Report be received and adopted.
2. That the Treasurers Statement of the Maori Girls' School Fund be received and adopted.
3. That Conference express its pleasure at the success of the Maori Choir in its mission of witness in Australia under Revs. A. J. Seamer and R. T. Haddon.
4. That the Rev. R. T. Haddon be granted leave of absence for the year 1937 at half pay with a view to travelling abroad.
5. The Conference learns with regret, that certain European residents in the King Country have petitioned the Government to take a plebiscite among the King Country residents on the question of granting licenses in that area for the sale of alcoholic liquor. This Conference desires to call the attention of the Government to the fact that this is not a matter for local decision, but that it is a question of National Honour in relation to a sacred pact between the two races when the King Country was opened to Europeans. We would direct the attention of the Government to the official records relating to the pact made on that occasion.
6. Whereas in the opinion of this Conference a grave injustice has been done to certain Maori tribes, owing to monies granted to them in compensation for excessive confiscation of lands, being partly used for purposes which in the case of other tribes is being met by the Government from the Consolidated Funds, and to which they are rightly chargeable,
And Whereas the Conference considers that despite the genuine attempt of the past Government, more should be done to place landless Maoris on the land, more particularly in the case of the Taranaki, Waikato and North Auckland Natives,
And Whereas the Conference believe that inadequate provisions at present exist, especially among the poorer tribes, for promising Maori girls and boys to equip themselves as teachers and leaders of their people, especially in regard to secondary and post-secondary education.
Therefore we express to the Minister of Native Affairs our whole-hearted support to any measures he may introduce which promise to meet the above difficulties, and our co-operation with him in all matters tending to promote the welfare of the Native Race.
7. That the first claims on Compensation Funds should be the placing of landless Maoris in suitable holdings, the provision of suitable education for the Maoris and particularly the guidance and development of their leaders in these and other matters relevant to their needs.

QUESTION XLVI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting City Missions?

A.—AUCKLAND SOCIAL SERVICE MISSION.

REPORT 1935.

With gratefulness to our Heavenly Father, we present our Annual Report on the evangelistic, educational, and social service activities of the Mission. The inclusion of the Franklin Road Church in the Mission Circuit has considerably extended our usefulness in the Freeman's Bay district. We are happy to report that during the last twelve months, progress has characterised every department of our activities. A good deal of time and thought has been given to consolidating the work. Personal interviews, both at the Mission centre, and at the Gaol; visitation; youth work; and the investigation and relief of widespread distress has made heavy demands on the strength and experience of the Missioner and Deaconess. We express our very real thanks to a loyal and efficient staff of voluntary workers. By our joint

efforts, we have been able to establish a very definite contact with the outsider. Bold things have been done, though no spectacular methods have been adopted. Slowly but surely, the influence of the Mission is making a vital impact upon the city's life. We desire to record our gratitude to Miss Elsie Booth for her splendid assistance in the Social Service Department during the last two winters.

Evangelistic.

A special Evangelistic Mission during August was the means of winning over thirty-one in allegiance to our Lord and Master, beside the spiritual stimulus to our own life. We have to report an increase of 26 in our central senior membership roll. The converts of the special Mission remain on probation. Sunday evening services are increasingly well attended, and the weekly fellowship well maintained. We express our thanks to the Organists, conductor and choir of 28 voices.

Youth.

Strong Guide and Brownie packs have been formed during the year. The Scouts and Cubs recently celebrated one year of pack life. The two Sunday Schools, Young Men's and Young Women's Adventure Groups, Sunbeams, Young Worshipers' League, and Young Men's and Young Women's Clubs are alive to the need and development of our young life.

Health Camp and Rest Home.

Last Christmas, we were able to send 40 children and 20 mothers into Camp at Ostend. During the year, the Trustees have purchased 7 acres at Campbell's Bay, as a permanent camp site, for the small sum of £120. The fathers of the children who received such benefit from Ostend have fenced the property and done a good deal of clearing, as a token of their gratitude. On June 3rd, an outbuilding worth £150 was erected by skilled voluntary labour, 500 trees were planted, and a large amount of scrub cutting and clearing accomplished. A bore has been sunk for a water supply, and over 2½ acres have been ploughed and grassed in preparation for playing grounds. The work to date has been done free of debt.

The Trustees desire to thank an anonymous donor for the gift of 3½ acres and a cottage at Henderson, towards the scheme. The proceeds from the sale, plus the money in hand, will total £525. The Committee has agreed to go ahead with the erection of the main building when £1,000 is in hand. The site is one particularly suited for our purpose, well elevated, and commanding a magnificent view of the Rangitoto Channel. The scheme, completed, will involve the sum of £3,000. The Government Health Department has given its approval of the scheme.

Deaconess Work.

Sister Rita Snowden has done magnificent work during the year. With this year, Sister will complete her fifth year of service in the city. It is well-nigh impossible for one Deaconess to meet all the demands made of a trained woman in our city. We urgently need the services of a Junior Deaconess, to meet the claims of our ever-expanding field of service. We hope that some sympathetic person, realising the need among the women and children, will provide the necessary means.

Medical, Dental, Optical, Legal.

We express thanks to Drs. W. H. Pettit, and J. Cole, J. Caughey and E. G. Sayers, the St. John Ambulance Brigade, Mr. H. D. Crump, Mr. C. H. Martyn, and our Honorary Solicitors, for their professional services.

Social Service Department.

It is hardly possible to put into words the varied nature of the services rendered. Over £1,200 per year is handled for the Pensions Dept. on behalf of returned soldiers, besides helping older people in pension matters, directing and advising in domestic and business affairs, securing birth certificates from many parts of the world, co-operating with the police, and relieving distress.

In cash and goods received, the Mission has been able to materially assist those in need to the extent of £1,030. Over 130 families received hampers, valued at 10/- each last Christmas, while over 50 others were helped with lesser amounts. Once more this year, the Mayor's Metropolitan Relief Committee has been a means of lightening our burden. We desire to thank His Worship for his admirable work in this direction. Your Missioner has served on the Mayor's Relief Committee, the committee co-ordinating the work of all the social workers in the city, and the Community Singing Committee.

Social Service Association.

The Association has been meeting at regular intervals, and the inaugural Demonstration will be held in the Concert Chamber of the Town Hall on November 19th as the official opening of Synod. We feel sure that the Methodist Social Service Association will be a great help to us in the future.

Prison Work.

By personal interviews, and evangelistic services, good results have been achieved. Through constant communication with the Comptroller General of Prisons, and the Prisons Board, a number of men have been transferred to country camps. Your Missioner has served on the executive of the Discharged Prisoners' Aid Society. Thanks are due to the Prison Officials for their unfailing courtesy, and also to the Church choirs, students, and Mission friends, who have assisted with the services.

Down and Out Work.

These Saturday evangelistic services are well attended. One can hear a pin drop, as between 80-100 men listen to the Gospel. A number of changed lives has been the result. Over 4,000 free meals have been served to these men on Saturday evenings. The help of the Methodist Young Women's and Young Men's Bible Classes, the Bible Training Institute, and many individuals, has been very greatly appreciated.

Maori Work.

We have to report an average attendance of between 25 and 30 Maoris attending the Maori Service held in the Mission Hall on Sunday mornings. A very effectual field of service opens up to us in this direction. We warmly commend Sister Ivy Jones' work.

Franklin Road Branch.

We welcome Rev. and Mrs. Hopper and the Franklin Road folk into our Circuit. Through the voluntary services of Miss Booth, we are able to report very encouraging work among the children. The Young Worshipers' League has an average attendance of 41. The Sunday School is being re-organised and slowly built up. We have wide opportunity, and a tremendous responsibility in this thickly populated area.

Thrift Club.

We have been pleased to welcome Mrs. Orr into our midst. Taking charge of the newly formed Thrift Club, she has enrolled over 40 members during the year. It is a policy of the Mission to "help people to help themselves."

Re-Building Fund.

Though the claims of this fund have not been pushed, we are glad to report that many are considering this important matter, and we are hoping that provision will be made in further donations and bequests. We should be able to erect a Central Mission building worthy of our task within the next few years. Our present building is over 86 years old.

General.

The present policy of building up step by step, and consolidating the work, ought to commend itself to all concerned. No other department of the Church is so economically maintained. The Mission ministers to thousands of people in the largest city of the Dominion. We express our grateful thanks to the East Street Trustees, and to the individuals and organisations that have so willingly assisted us. Miss Leonie Williams has made a valuable contribution in secretarial work.

We are sure that those who are charitably minded will remember the magnificent work of the Methodist Social Service Mission.

B.—DUNEDIN METHODIST CENTRAL MISSION.

Annual Report, 1935.

Motivated to rise above the ethics of self-preservation to some kind of public-mindedness the Mission has concluded another year of humanitarian and spiritual work. There has been an endeavour towards balanced development contemporary with social and spiritual needs. The Mission is regarded as the servant of the community and the centre of the social service of Otago Methodism. Recognising that the soul is in most cases accessible through the body, its leaders have coveted every form of ministering to life. During the year huge enterprises have been undertaken with very scant resources. To attempt beneficent work in a time of financial strain is exceedingly difficult but the work has unabatingly continued.

It is difficult to attempt a summary of the work. Every day has opened up possibilities of religious contact by removing practical inconveniences and disabilities of life. Hours have been spent in personal talks and rewarding companionship with unprivileged and lonely people seeking un-

derstanding and sympathy; undernourished children and short-rationed families have received material assistance, work found for unemployed; tuitional classes and recreational clubs have afforded opportunities for self-realisation and expression. The correspondence has been terrific—over 12,000 letters having been despatched from the office. Details calling for personal supervision have daily multiplied.

Youth Work.

(a) **BIBLE CLASSES:** Eight-six young people of senior, intermediate and junior age are graded into Bible Classes under capable leaders, and assemble on Sunday afternoons.

(b) **SUNDAY SCHOOL:** The Sunday School is divided into primary, junior and senior sections and has a membership of 131. Although departmentalised, a fine sense of harmony imbues the whole movement. A Youth Council combines interest and oversight of all the youth activities of the Mission and is held monthly.

(c) **LEAGUE OF YOUNG METHODISTS:** The L.Y.M.'s. meet weekly and engage in work of a practical nature to meet their daily needs. They take a definite interest in Home and Overseas Missions. Saleable articles are made and the proceeds devoted to the Solomon Islands work.

Brownies.

The Brownie Pack on Saturday afternoons provides opportunities for fun and practical training in service. Each year provides both joy and heartache as the little people so happy and responsive wave a farewell to their leaders and juniors, and pass out to the wider interests and greater opportunities of the Guide Movement. Yet these experiences enrich life and awaken the ceaseless stream of younger children to their possibilities. The whole system of programme work is progressive, thus there is ever something new which holds the interest and stimulates ambition.

Girl Guides.

Two companies of Girl Guides have grown from the small beginnings of three years ago. 55 Girls from 11 to 16 years meet weekly under the leadership of five assistants—enthusiastic understanding and dependable young women all of whom are members of the Mission. The spirit of self-help, efficient service to others, and all phases of their team and individual development are indeed encouraging.

Girls Club.

The Intermediate Bible Class Girls Club meets on Tuesday evenings in the Parlour. Apart from fellowship and devotion, the practical objective is to develop in the members an individual desire to create something useful and beautiful and do it well. An outstanding observation among these girls of 15 to 17 has been their inability to knit, use a sewing machine, etc. or to have any apparent desire to beautify their own homes, or make their own needs from the point of view of thrift. The attendance has been maintained, and very presentable work in basket-making and the working of supper cloths from heavy flour bag fabric has been finished, paid for, and taken home with pride. Attention is now being focussed on machining, knitting and utilising old felt hats, carpet cuttings, etc.

Boys' Brigade.

The Mission is doing everything practicable to cater for the needs of boys and young men and to this end has recently formed a Boys' Brigade with an encouraging membership.

Men's Brotherhood.

Every Thursday night in the Mission Parlour over 100 men anxious to find some economic principle for international relations, other than international capitalism as at present constructed and to find solutions of life under the regime of capitalistic industrialism, meet to exchange views and quest for truth and brotherhood. The discussions at these meetings reveal some of the urges and ideas residual in the average man, and the fact that atheists, communists, psychologists, socialists and enthusiasts for the new economics, unite to share intelligently the tasks devolving upon men of ideas, has proved to be one of the finest innovations of the Mission. The result of past discussions has been to reveal one major trend in life—restlessness with present conditions and the desire for realism and friendship in a day of veneer and disharmony. The class led by the Superintendent of the Mission has achieved wonderful spiritual results.

The Women's Guilds.

The Guild led by Sister Hazel has an average attendance of eighty, and has made growing contribution to the life of the Mission. It is community-centric and extends its services into all branches of the Mission's work. The Guild led by Sister Lenna is an endeavour to help others to help themselves—really a rendezvous for all desirous of gaining a working knowledge of sewing, homecraft and individual escape from environment.

Children's Health Camp and Home (Company Bay).

This is one of the recent big ventures of the Mission and begins a policy of institutional development. It is anticipated that over 100 little folk annually will enjoy the health-provoking facilities of the Home and its surroundings particularly unprivileged and undernourished children. The property of seven acres faces Company Bay. In the early Spring over 500 trees, 200 shrubs and 100 roses were planted to provide shelter and beauty. A large playground is part of the general scheme. The main building nearing completion, faces the harbour and is replete with sunporches, dormitories, staff-rooms, isolation rooms, library and sitting-rooms. The sleeping quarters are separate from the cooking and dining wing to ensure maximum comfort and quiet. The buildings are of concrete, brick, tiles, and copper so as to minimise after costs. A sanitation system has been made possible by the generosity of Mr. Wilson, owner of the adjoining property in allowing the Mission Trustees the rights to a water spring on his property. The spring will provide an adequate supply of water for all purposes. We desire to record Mr. Wilson's valuable contribution to the movement. A bequest in the form of a cottage came from the estate of the late Mr. Burns. It was intended to use this cottage for the caretaker, but it was destroyed by fire in August. The grounds, buildings and equipment will involve an expenditure of approximately £8,000. It is hoped to open the buildings free of cost.

The Eventide Homes for Aged and Indigent People.

The Dunedin Methodist Central Mission Board of Trustees has inaugurated a fund for the purchase of a site and the building of twenty four-roomed brick bungalow homes at an approximate cost of £500 each. The entire scheme will involve an expenditure of £15,000. It is known that very many aged people are living alone in conditions unconducive to happiness and comfort and on a meagre income which precludes independence, and that many of them are separated after years of comradeship and forced to live apart in institutions. There will be a separate home for single men and one for single women, under the control of qualified nurses and deaconesses. The old couples will live in their own little homes and when necessary receive material comforts. There will be a hospital ward and dispensary.

Plans of these homes are now available and legal firms have been notified of the scheme. Very many people have already interested themselves in this institutional development. A master baker in Dunedin has shown his practical support and encouragement by lodging with his Banker a cheque for £500 which will be made available immediately nineteen other citizens follow his lead. The banker has officially communicated with the Superintendent of the Mission on behalf of his client. Following the lead another young business man has instructed his solicitors to inform the Central Mission Trustees that he has made provision for an Eventide Home, and any residue, after the building of such a cottage, is to be used for the progress of the Eventide Homes Settlement. Sundry donations to date almost provide for a third cottage, the amount banked being £321. The whole scheme will materialise as soon as funds are available. The Board of Trustees commends the movement to all generously-minded citizens.

The Radio Church of the Helping Hand.

The Superintendent of the Mission broadcasts a devotional service daily from 4ZM Dunedin. The services are of a free and easy character designed to help all classes of the community. Those who are able to do so take a Radio Collection Box into their home and make a weekly contribution to the social work as organised by the Mission. The membership is rapidly growing and at present stands at 3,400. The income for the first twelve months £1,250—was devoted to the Health Camp, Eventide Homes, relief of distress and the provision of comforts for the sick, aged and needy. Should these daily broadcasts discontinue on account of the B stations finding it impossible to continue, the Radio Church will continue its activities by means of correspondence. To meet an urgent need it has been decided to appoint a Deaconess with nursing certificates specially to minister to the sick and aged.

The Jubilee of the Mission and the Centenary of Otago Methodism.

The jubilee of the Mission synchronises with the centenary of Otago Methodism in 1940. It is proposed to commemorate the occasion by the erection of a building on the Stuart Street site. At present the whole of the Mission work is being carried on under almost impossible conditions. The buildings are ill-proportioned and unsatisfactory arrangements obtain for Sunday School, Bible Classes, clubs and social service work. It is proposed to erect a modern building suitable for all requirements. The building will include a chapel, assembly halls, rooms for conferential work and receiving and distributing depots. It is hoped that this centenary movement will receive the official sanction of the Church Courts and the support of the Church throughout the whole of Otago.

The Social Service Department.

During the year this Department purchased clothing, footwear, food and fuel costing £1,000; 800 parcels costing from 10/- to 12/- each were distributed to necessitous families, employment found for many and life for hundreds of people brightened. During the mid-winter months 1,100 families weekly received assistance, partly owing to the distribution of meat made available by the Government and the Mayor's Relief Committee; a Wood Department operates to distribute firing to needy families—particularly old people. The expenditure on all branches controlled by this Department has exceeded £4,500. The year has closed with a debit of £380.

Paris Home.

During the year this Home was sold and the proceeds banked towards the Eventide Homes Fund.

Finance and Property Matters.

The exterior of the property is in fairly good repair, but urgent repairs and renovations will need to be undertaken to modernise the interior of the main building. During the year the exterior of the Octagon Hall has been plastered and repairs effected. To cope with developing work two motor garages have been erected. It has been the aim of the Trustees to reduce the mortgage annually by £1,000 and on the 30th September £1,000 was paid off the existing mortgage which now stands at £19,500. The assets, including the property purchased three years ago, are estimated at £30,000. A sinking fund will need to be created at the earliest possible opportunity. The £1,000 paid off the debt this year calls for more than passing comment as it marks the total extinction of the debt on the Octagon Hall erected during the superintendency of the late Rev. W. Slade. Although still held as security to the Bank it is a matter for both interest and thanksgiving that the venture undertaken by Mr. Slade has been justified. We are pleased to report that during the year all Insurances have been placed with the Connexion.

Appreciation of the Staff.

The Mission has created a great deal of work in the city during the last few years, and by this means has relieved the economic position of very many families. It is not generally known that there is a working staff of 45 men and women regularly employed. Some give their services voluntarily while others receive a Government Subsidy and are under the authority of the Government Unemployed Board. To all who have assisted the work we extend our heartiest appreciation.

QUESTION XLVII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference with regard to the training of Deaconesses?

REPORT FOR 1935.

Before commencing the report on the work of the year reference should be made to certain matters of importance to the Institution. It is with very sincere regret that the Committee records the passing of one who had been associated with the Deaconess Institution since its inception and who had throughout its history taken a very keen interest in its activities. The Committee desires to place on record its high appreciation of the very valuable services rendered by Mr. George Bowron and its grateful recognition of the fact that the Institution in a very large measure owed its existence to his enthusiastic and generous support. No one realized more fully the value of trained deaconesses in the work of the church and no one rendered more devoted service in the critical years when the House was being established than he did. His death has deprived the Committee of a wise counsellor and a generous supporter.

At the beginning of the year the new Lady Superintendent entered upon her duties. Miss Greig brought with her a wide experience in hostel management and has carried out her duties with a fine appreciation of the responsibilities devolving upon the head of such an institution. Owing to the fact that the whole work of training is under review her appointment was made for one year.

No new trainees were admitted at the beginning of the year. It was considered unwise to train more deaconesses until there were more definite prospects of their being employed in some branch of church work.

Students in Training.

The following students are in training this year to complete their preparation for church work.

Miss Edith Kathleen Beer.

Miss Margaret Joy Kippenberger.

Miss Irene Maude Hitchcock.

Miss Heeni Te Teira.

Of those who completed training last year one (Miss Constance Osborne) has entered the Public Hospital for nursing experience and two (Miss Davidson and Miss Eileen Taylor) are still waiting employment.

Training.

Although the numbers are few the full course of lectures has been given and the Committee is again indebted to the clerical and lay lecturers who have so willingly undertaken this work. Their reports on the students' work indicate that good work has been done and the marks gained by the trainees at the half-yearly examination show that they have made very satisfactory progress.

Miss E. Chaplin, B.A., who has been lecturer in English for several years, retired at the end of last year and the Committee was fortunate in securing as her successor Miss Cruickshank, M.A., late Principal of Wanganui Girls' College.

The practical work carried out in various institutions in the city and in circuits under the guidance of the ministers in charge has been very faithfully discharged and eulogistic references have been made on the earnestness, devotion and success of the efforts of the trainees.

Dedication Service.

Sister Marama Muriwai having completed twelve months in active work was received as a fully accredited member of the Deaconess Order at the dedication service held on the first Sunday afternoon after the opening of last Conference.

Deaconess House.

The average number in residence during the year is 20. These include University and Training College students whose homes are in other parts of the Dominion. Many people have taken advantage of the comforts of the House and have remained for a few days while visiting Christchurch.

A very pleasing feature is the increasing popularity of Deaconess House as a rallying centre for women workers. Several societies meet there regularly so that the House is becoming a Methodist landmark—a centre of useful service.

Reports of Deaconesses and Superintendents.

While the immediate problem is the training of new deaconesses, the real concern of the Committee is the success of the Deaconesses in the field. Consequently the annual reports from these Deaconesses and their Superintendents are received each year with much interest and are critically scrutinised. The judgment of the minister in charge is particularly helpful and the Committee is grateful to all who have so freely and candidly reported on the work accomplished.

It is pleasing to note that in all cases favourable reports have been received and that on the whole excellent work is being done. There is obviously no lack of opportunity in both city and country circuits for deaconesses to undertake work that is very definitely worth while, providing that satisfactory financial arrangements can be made.

The reports of the Deaconesses indicate that they are all very happily employed in spite of many difficulties. A cheery optimism is the prevailing note. They make light of the hardships and though the work in some cases is very heavy and spread somewhat thinly on account of the large areas to be covered good progress has been made. There is no doubt that the church is receiving a rich return for the money spent in their training. It is a matter of sincere regret that a way has not yet been found by which the field can be more fully exploited. Perhaps the Commission now sitting will find a solution of this problem.

Finance.

The financial year ends on 31st December and a full statement will be presented to the Conference. The Committee asks for the following grants for next Connexional year: Connexional Fire Insurance Fund, £125; Contingent Fund, £75; Home Mission Fund, £75; Foreign Mission Fund, £50.

Mr. C. A. Newman.

During the year Mr. C. A. Newman, who has been a member of the Committee for many years and for long held the combined offices of Secretary and Treasurer and more recently the office of Treasurer, found it necessary to relinquish this office. Vitally interested in the work of the Institution, he has rendered devoted and conspicuously able and successful service. We rejoice that we shall continue to enjoy the benefit of his counsel and co-operation as a member of the Committee. The Rev. Edward Drake has been appointed Treasurer.

Committee.

REPORT OF DEACONESS INSTITUTION COMMISSION.

The special Commission set up by the Conference to consider and to report on the Deaconess Institution and the training of women for Christian Service has given careful attention to the whole question and has conferred with the corresponding members in the various centres. It now submits its report as follows:—

1. The General Question of the Ministry of Trained Women in the Church.

There is general agreement that trained women are needed for the service of the Church and that we cannot contemplate any retrograde step involving the relinquishment of such work as is being done through Deaconess Institution. We are of the opinion that far greater use can be made of the gifts of women in all departments of Church work. The State is employing women in many spheres of social service that were once the virtual monopoly of the Church, but the spheres of service for trained Christian women are constantly increasing. Changed conditions appear to rule out the likelihood of a widespread demand for circuit deaconesses if the cost of maintenance must be borne wholly or mainly by the circuit itself. The ministry of trained women is greatly needed for specific work in certain areas of the cities where local resources are inadequate to provide maintenance. In such cases, in our judgment, their support should be a charge upon the Home Mission Fund. Workers so employed should be under the direction of and work in co-operation with a minister in full connexion. We are satisfied that a progressive policy along such lines would result in a larger demand for the services of trained women workers.

2. The conditions governing the employment of qualified trainees, including the assurance of continued engagement.

The position of Deaconesses has been somewhat improved by the adoption of recent legislation providing that no circuit or committee shall dispense with the services of a Deaconess except on the recommendation of the District Synod and with the consent of the Conference after consideration by the Conference Committee on Circuits. A Deaconess appointment is now definitely a Conference appointment, as are the appointments of Ministers and Home Missionaries.

It is generally agreed that no guarantee of continuous employment should be given to all who take the course at the Institution. The Church cannot accept responsibility for women workers who may fail either in training or in the field. The record of each should be reviewed year by year and unsuitable workers be given notice to seek other avenues of service. All appointments should be annual and periodical transfers to other spheres should be provided for.

It is suggested, subject to Paragraphs 211 and 212, Law Book, page 59, that the Home Mission Board and the Conference Committee on Circuits should consider the possible amalgamation of contiguous circuits and home mission stations to be staffed by two or more ministers with a trained Deaconess who would displace the untrained home missionary. In this connection it should be noted that a home missionary or a probationer regularly conducting public worship largely raises the cost of his maintenance, whereas the work of Deaconesses, even though they do full preaching work, involves expenditure for social service, youth work or religious educational activities.

No openings have yet occurred for three students who have taken the full course at Deaconess Institution. One Maori and one European trained at Deaconess House are at present taking a full nursing course at Christchurch Public Hospital.

3. The Possibility of the Home Mission Department Financing Women Workers and the Implications of such a Policy.

It is obvious that the crux of the problem is finance. A high type of candidate for training and service can be secured if conditions of employment are more assured. Women are available and spheres are open but the financial inability of the circuits prevents advance. We are satisfied that, with suitable and adequate grants from the Home Mission Fund more trained women could be employed by our circuits, missions and departments. The Home Mission Department should be asked to consider the matter of finance. Circuits, missions and institutions applying for assistance in supporting a Deaconess would need to comply with the usual conditions governing home mission grants and to state what proportion, if any, of the salary of a worker they would guarantee to raise by special local efforts.

4. The Type of Trainee, and the Qualifications for Admission, Including the Entrance Examination for European, Maori and Special Students.

Candidates should be accepted with extreme care. They should have all-round qualifications, possess strong personality, a ready adaptability, initiative, resource in meeting emergency demands, and ability to work in a team. Apart from educational attainment, good moral character and vital religious experience, a certificate of sound physical health is essential. For entrance a satisfactory pass is now required in examinations in English, Systematic Theology, Old and New Testament knowledge and acquaintance with Methodist Church history.

The course of studies for accepted candidates now comprises regular lectures by qualified tutors in Old and New Testaments, Systematic Theology, Church History, Homiletics and Sermon Construction, Elocution and Voice Production, The Art of Teaching, English Language and Literature, Psychology, Nursing, including Home Nursing, Hygiene, and the St. John Ambulance Course. No fees whatever are paid to any member of the tutorial staff.

Each student is attached to a Christchurch circuit, for practical training in visiting, Relief Depot Work, Mothers' Meetings, Sunday School teaching and Bible Class work. Practical work is also undertaken in the Out-Patients' Department of the Public Hospital, the District Nursing Association, the Essex Maternity Home, the Plunket Society, the St. John Ambulance Association, the Bible-in-Schools Lessons, the Christchurch Free Kindergarten and club work amongst Guides, Brownies, Cubs and Rangers. There are also weekly Bible Class Study Circles which afford opportunity for fellowship and for corporate prayer.

After completing the course in Deaconess House, arrangements are made in some cases for trainees to take the complete nursing course at the Public Hospital, the midwifery course at St. Helen's Hospital and the full course for Plunket Nurses.

5. Specialised Courses for Solomon Island Workers ; Maori Mission Workers ; Circuit, Departmental and Institutional Work ; Youth Department and Religious Education.

There is practical unanimity that a general course of training, as outlined above, should continue to be followed, together with special courses, as are now arranged, for trainees designated for specific work.

Stress is laid upon the present regulation for a specialised short course for all women workers accepted for service in the Solomon Islands. The course for each such worker should be arranged by the Committee after consultation with the Foreign Mission Board and with representatives of the Methodist Women's Missionary Union, which undertakes responsibility for the support of these overseas women workers. There is general agreement that although some of these workers possess high qualifications in chosen professions all would benefit by a term in Deaconess Institution.

For the Maori Mission nursing training is necessary as well as a thorough grounding in the general subjects of the curriculum. For social service work in the cities nursing training is also essential. Special supplementary lectures and practical work can always be arranged for trainees designated for specific service. Special courses could also be arranged for trainees selected for service with the Youth Department or in the sphere of Religious Education.

It is suggested that provision be made for the training of suitable women for institutional work in Orphanages, Health Camps and Eventide Homes and also for the training of voluntary and honorary workers in the main subjects of the curriculum as well as in homecraft, club-work, etc. Such work could be undertaken by the Institution without difficulty, but the special students would require to pay fees to cover maintenance and incidental expenditure.

6. Sources of Additional Financial Support for Deaconess Institution.

The mortgage debt on Deaconess Institution has now been reduced to £1600. In addition to interest charges there are recurring expenses for rates, insurance, telephone, repairs and household replacements. The four trainees now in residence complete their training this year. No new trainees were accepted in 1935. Those sent in for special training for Mission or other departments will as usual, be gladly received.

Building repairs and renewals are urgently necessary and grants will be required as usual from the Connexional Fire Insurance Fund, the Contingent Fund and both the Home and Foreign Mission Departments.

We are of opinion that as soon as practicable the Connexional appeal sanctioned by Conference should be undertaken with a view to paying off the balance of the mortgage debt on the Institution, putting the property in good repair and strengthening the Deaconess Retiring Fund. In connection with this appeal it might be well to consider the formation of a special branch of the Home Mission Fund for the support of Deaconess Work. The number of annual subscribers and the number of Associate Members, each of whom pays one guinea a year, both need to be increased. Where Connexional Social Service Funds are established grants should be made for Deaconess work and our people should be encouraged to remember the Institution when making their wills.

The present Deaconess Institution is the recognised headquarters of a large volume of women's work. As a centre of training and of service for women it fulfils many useful Connexional functions. Hundreds of Methodist women cross its threshold every year. It meets the needs of the Women's Missionary Union in its District Conventions, is a centre for Bible Class Executives and Committees, for Leadership Training Classes and for the Evening Missionary Auxiliary Circle. It provides a home under good conditions for University and Training College Students and others.

We recommend the reappointment of the Commission to explore the question further and to consider especially the conditions of entry and the whole curriculum of study. We hope that a satisfactory reorganisation scheme will be devised and put into operation at the earliest possible moment.

2. That the thanks of the Conference be extended to the Secretary and Treasurer of Deaconess Institution, to the visiting Tutors, to the House staff and to the Committee of Management for their efficient services.

8. Recognising that the fuller employment of trained deaconesses depends upon open doors for their service and that the entering of open doors must depend mainly upon support from the Home Mission Fund, Conference requests the Home Mission Board.
 - (1) To consider sympathetically the subsidising of Missions and Circuits at present employing a deaconess so that a probationer deaconess may also be employed for extension work.
 - (2) In conjunction with the Secretary of the Conference to approach suitable circuits or groups of circuits with a view to the employment of deaconesses by the Home Mission Department in such areas as may be found practicable.
9. That the report of the Deaconess Institution Commission be received and adopted and the Commission re-appointed.
10. That the Conference of 1937 be recommended to favourably consider the amalgamation of, and the fixing of a suitable year for the appeals previously authorised for the Deaconess Institution and the Wellington Charitable and Educational Endowments Trust Boards scheme for the establishment of a Maori Girls' School of Domestic Science and hygiene. That the Boards concerned be requested to confer on the matter during the year re a suitable date and basis for the joint appeal and report to the next Conference.

**A.—THE AUCKLAND CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE.
MT. ALBERT AND EPSOM.**

Report for 1935.

In reviewing the work of another year we have much cause for gratitude, making mention of the loving kindness of our Lord experienced in many ways.

The health, progress and, with few exceptions the conduct of the children has been good. Removals and admissions have balanced each other so that our present roll number is ninety, as last year, viz. :—

Included in the Wesley Home returns are two boys and one girl who have been employed in the country and now have obtained situations in Auckland.

The three matrons, viz. :—Mrs. Wild and the Misses Coatman and Spooner continue to render devoted service, while the influence of Mr. Wild on the elder boys at Mt. Albert is proving in every way most helpful.

Changes of Secretary.

After ten years of faithful service as Secretary and Manager, the Rev S. Griffith, feeling that the time had come when he should seek relief from the strain the office involved, retired on June 30th last. All concerned in the administration of our Orphanages feel a very real debt of gratitude to Mr. Griffith for the able and gracious manner in which he has carried out the duties of his office, and for very much beyond these, which in the goodness of his heart he has so willingly done. His successor, the present secretary, though coming with some years of experience in connection with the South Island Orphanage, finds it no easy matter to take up the work done by Mr. Griffith, but is happy and fortunate in having his kindly counsel and help.

Finance.

The administration of the Board's finances makes increasing demands on the time and energies of the Rev. George Frost, Clerical Treasurer, whose competence and diligence are proving a valuable asset to our Board.

During the year the Bank of New Zealand allowed us to pay off the balance of the long-dated mortgage on the Epsom Home property, viz., £2,706/13/4; the necessary sum being secured by the sale of Govt. inscribed stock, the lifting of a fixed deposit of £434, and an overdraft on current account. The following have been received and added to the capital account, viz. :—Estate of the late Mrs. Gilmore, £1,000; "Anon," gift £426/16/6; and on account Sara Andrew Estate, £40.

Maintenance fees are slightly higher than for last year, and would have been larger still but for the default made by parents through neglect or misfortune.

Acknowledgements.

The Board gratefully acknowledge the valuable services rendered by the Ladies' Committee, the Selection Committee and the Trust Board (Inc.), also by Drs. Harold Pettit, and Cyril Griffin, Hon. Physicians, by our City and Country Collectors, and many other kind friends; also the generous aid of subscribers and donors of provisions and goods from circuits throughout the Auckland and South Auckland districts.

Money Boxes.

The Board has secured a supply of suitable money-boxes, and will be glad to place them for effective use in the homes of our people.

B.—MASTERTON METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME.

Report for 1935.

In common with many other institutions of a similar nature the Masterton Methodist Children's Home records a slight drop in statistics for the year ending 30th September, 1935, compared with other years. Explanations for this can be made, but these would only burden the report, and will not be given here.

Statistics.

At the commencement of the year there were thirty-one children in the Home, twenty-seven of whom returned after the Christmas holidays and to these were added five other children who were admitted during the year. Of the children who left the Home during the Christmas holidays, three were to new homes provided by the parents concerned, whilst the other one was placed out at service. No children have left the Home since January, consequently our numbers at 30th September, 1935 were thirty-two. In addition three Masterton Children were temporarily in the "Home" owing to their own home being completely burned down.

Staff and Committee.

The staff of the Home at the commencement of the year comprised Miss Allan, Matron; Miss Cameron, Assistant; Miss Mygind, Junior Assistant; Miss Henderson (partial) cook, and the Rev. J. Cocker, Secretary-Manager.

During the year the Home suffered its most serious loss since its opening in the death of its Secretary-Manager, Rev. J. Cocker.

Words are quite inadequate to give expression to the seriousness of the loss of one whose own sterling character has been for years imprinted on everything and everyone connected with the Masterton Methodist Children's Home. He will ever be remembered as the Children's Friend.

The vacant office was filled in April by the appointment of Mr. A. E. Bate.

During the year too, Miss Cameron tendered her resignation as a member of the staff, but owing to the small numbers then in the Home, no new appointment was made.

At the Annual meeting of the Committee in December, the same officers were elected for 1935. Mr. J. H. Handyside, continues as Chairman, and the Rev. G. F. Stockwell as Chaplain.

Children.

Within the Home itself all has worked well. The health of the Children has been splendid—thanks in a great measure to the watchful care of the Home's friend—Dr. N. H. Prior. The Scripture Examinations were conducted as usual and the results were entirely satisfactory.

The usual Christmas function took place in December, following similar lines to those of previous years.

Two of our boys and two of our girls have been attending Secondary School and the reports of all are very satisfactory.

Building and Grounds.

The Buildings and Grounds have received every attention. The gardens in which the Matron takes special pride are splendidly kept. The Buildings Committee has had a busy year. First there was the big October storm of 1934 which caused some damage to the roof; then there followed a fire in the laundry necessitating the reconstruction of the drying apparatus and the reconditioning of the interior and roof. All these requirements were effectively attended to.

Gifts.

The Home has been the recipient of two very fine gifts during the year. One was an enlargement of a photograph of the late Mr. Cocker—donated by three Masterton Friends and the other was the gift of a chiming clock for the Hall—the donor being our old friend Mr. B. J. Lynneberg of Ngaio. To these friends we record our deep appreciation of their very fine gifts.

Bequests.

The Home Funds have benefited and will benefit by several bequests throughout the year. Half of the Gordon bequest of £100 was received and £126 16s. 2d. of the John Gray bequest. Other bequests include £250 provided for in the will of the late John Wakeman; £50 from the late Mrs. Nairn and £500 under the will of the late Mr. J. Henson.

In concluding we would express our gratitude to our Heavenly Father, whose hand has undoubtedly been on the Home for good and whose wisdom has directed its affairs, through the human instruments whose privilege it has been to serve on the Home Committee and staff throughout the year.

C.—SOUTH ISLAND ORPHANAGE AND CHILDREN'S HOME.

REPORT FOR 1935.

With gratitude to our Heavenly Father we are pleased to report a year of interest and activity. Our large family is now comfortably settled in the New Home, which, with its surroundings is a delight to all. With the new home the work of the Orphanage has been greatly facilitated. A large number of visitors have inspected the home, and without exception have commented favourably upon the Home and its work.

We are looking forward to the coming Conference when visiting Representatives of the Church will have an opportunity of seeing our beautiful new premises. But our chief joy is that the children committed to our care are being housed and trained under ideal conditions. We have at present 58 children in residence. During the year 11 have left and 9 have been admitted. The health of the children has been excellent.

A few changes have been made in the Staff, but substantially the personnel remains the same as last year. Mr. and Mrs. Haynes continue as Master and Matron and give ungrudgingly of their best. Under the efficient care of the Manager and Matron and their staff the health and discipline of the home has been well maintained. The religious influence and atmosphere can be estimated in some slight measure from the fact that in the recent Scripture Examinations the children acquitted themselves remarkably well, and obtained a number of First and Second Class prizes, there was only one failure to get pass marks. The children's general education gives cause for gratification. Satisfactory reports have been furnished by the teachers of the District school concerning the progress made. The reports of those attending High schools have been decidedly good, in every case special mention has been made of excellent conduct. The children take an active interest in Band of Hope work and have occasionally supplied the whole evening programme.

By permission of the Christchurch City Council the Annual Street Appeal was made in August. Valuable assistance was given through the Radio Concert broadcast from 3YA. The total amount raised for the combined Orphanages (Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist) amounted to £1,244/7/10 of which our share was £349/19/10.

We have to acknowledge that it was with some misgiving that we entered upon the new Era of our work inaugurated by the opening of the new home. It is one thing to launch out in a forward scheme and another to find the needed funds for maintenance.

In the building and equipment of the New Home the Board expended all its endowment moneys; that, being the purpose for which capital sums were held in trust. In past days we were able to draw upon the interest earnings for maintenance purposes to supplement shortages in revenue. With our reserves expended we anticipated a time of financial stringency until further bequests strengthened the position. We are happy to report that we have paid our way with a little over, despite the increased expenditure incidental to our occupying roomier premises. It is the policy of the Board to build up an Endowment Fund to provide against inevitable fluctuations in income. We appeal to our people to bear our needs in mind when making their wills.

The Board sincerely regrets the loss through removal of Rev. A. Hopper, his faithful and efficient services for six years as Secretary have left an abiding mark upon the Home. During the difficult time of planning, building, and removal from the old home he proved himself a wise administrator, as well as a willing worker.

Our heaviest loss during the year has been the passing of our esteemed Treasurer in the person of Mr. George Bowron. Mr. Bowron was a member of the first Committee appointed by the Conference in 1912 to formulate proposals for a South Island Orphanage. He took a leading part in establishing the first home in 1914. Since 1916 he has filled the position of honorary Treasurer, a post he held until his death on April 14th. The opening of the New Home at Papanui on November 9th, 1934, marked the consummation of one of his dearest hopes, and the fulfilment of many of his prayers. The years of devoted service he rendered to the Orphanage renders the whole Church under a deep obligation of gratitude. The New Home stands as a monument to his devotion and faith.

We have found a worthy successor in the person of Mr. M. Kershaw, who continues to give able and willing service as Treasurer, also as Convener of Property Committee.

The thanks of the Board are expressed to Dr. Orchard and Mr. G. Sevicke Jones for their gratuitous services so freely given. Also to members of the Board, especially to the Ladies House Committee whose constant oversight of the Home has been especially valuable.

We record our grateful appreciation of the service rendered by the Manager and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Haynes, and their efficient, capable staff. Our grateful thanks are tendered to all who have forwarded gifts and contributions during the year, and especially to the Circuits maintaining regular efforts in support of the Home. It is essential that we increase the amount of support received from our Methodist people and to this end we ask Circuit Superintendants and office-bearers of South Island Circuits to assist by the appointment of a suitable agent to represent the Orphanage in every Circuit. A special Orphanage Supplement of the "Methodist Times" will be published on December 7th, and December 15 has been appointed as the day for Orphanage Collections.

The financial Statement and Balance Sheet, will as usual, be presented to Conference.

We conclude by recording our grateful thanks to "The God who answers by Orphanages," for the opportunity to serve His little ones, and the success that has attended our labours.

QUESTION XLIX.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Connexional Literature?

"METHODIST TIMES" AND LITERATURE COMMITTEE.

Report for 1935.

During the year the Committee suffered a severe loss by the death of Mr. George Bowron whose interest in our Connexional journal, as in all departments of the Church, was both an example and an inspiration.

Sustained efforts have been made throughout the year to secure additional subscribers and close contact has been maintained with the ministers and all circuit agents. To these agents we are greatly indebted for their zeal and fidelity. The enrolment of 166 new subscribers during the year was more than offset by a loss of 292 former subscribers. Our great need is to secure at least one thousand additional subscribers. These can be gained if in every circuit a determined effort is made to induce our people to take the paper. Its merits are widely acknowledged and it is hoped that with returning prosperity the number of readers may multiply. A paper like this in the homes of our people must benefit not only the individuals who read it, but, by increasing pride in our church and loyalty to its work, must also benefit every local and Connexional cause.

The financial position of the paper still gives the Committee grave concern. In 1934 there was a net loss of £249 19s. 9d. including £88 0s. 7d. the cost of the special campaign for new subscribers. This year there has been a net loss of £107 5s. 3d. which has been drawn from reserves. The smaller loss is largely explained by a reduction of £19 6s. 0d. in production costs and of £7 15s. 7d. in office expenses as well as by an increase of £24 11s. 2d. in receipts from subscriptions and of £13 4s. 2d. in revenue from advertisements.

At the Conference of 1932 the "Methodist Times" Committee agreed as an emergency measure to forego temporarily the payment from the Contingent Fund of the half-share of the Editors' honoraria and the incidental editorial expenses. This payment had been made as a time-honoured recognition of the valuable Connexional service rendered by the official organ of the Church. In the judgment of the Committee the time has come to rescind the emergency regulation. It is felt that the paper is of such vital importance to the Church that it should be subsidised until returning prosperity puts it again on a self-supporting basis. The Committee notes with pleasure that the Connexional Fire Insurance Board proposes to appropriate a sum of £35 in acknowledgment of the value of the paper and of the service it is rendering.

The Committee nominates the Rev. C. H. Laws, B.A., D.D., for re-appointment as Editor, and with his consent nominates the Rev. T. J. Wallis as his associate. It places on record its appreciation of the ability with which they and their helpers serve the Church and the high interests of the Kingdom of God through the pages of the paper.

A meeting was held on February 19th, 1936, when the various chaplains presented their reports.

Our Church has been represented in the Annual Camps both in the North and the South Islands when the spiritual and social needs of the Officers and men have been attended to.

Our Chaplains have assisted in the Y.M.C.A. Institutes, and in some cases have taken charge of these Departments.

In most cases morning prayers have been held daily ; parade and other services have been held on Sunday, in which every facility has been given by the Military Authorities.

Military Camps afford our chaplains splendid opportunities for getting into personal touch with our young men who have testified to the spiritual help received.

In some cases the Officers commanding have given the Chaplains every opportunity for Study Circles and Bible Classes.

We regret to report the death of one of our most efficient and devoted chaplains, Rev. W. B. Scott, who was highly esteemed by officers and men.

QUESTION LII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference on matters Previously Remitted to Synods or Committees for Report?

CHURCH MEMBERSHIP COMMISSION REPORT.

This Commission was set up by Conference in 1931, and this final report is chiefly a review for emphasis and a co-ordination for convenience of reference.

1. Leaders' Meetings.

These have responsibility to share with the minister the pastoral care of our Church members. If Leaders' Meetings are neglected, Church Membership loses value and church discipline suffers, with disastrous effects through the whole range of church life and work. The facts of the situation revealed in answers to this Commission from 93 Circuits, were very disturbing. (See Report in Minutes 1933, page 155). The law requires that Leaders' Meetings be held quarterly, and they need to be held to consider the facts reported.

But everything depends upon the spirit in which they meet. Their meeting should be the central fellowship of the church, solemnly dedicated to the shepherding of the flock with loving vigilance. The Church Members' Roll is no mere statistical record, but a register of names every one of which represents a redeemed life committed to our care.

2. Members' Meetings.

An Annual Meeting of Church members for official purposes is not enough. The quarterly meeting of members, as per Law Book, page 51, had not been observed, and the Commission prepared a helpful agenda which was adopted by the Conference of 1933 (Minutes, page 154). Reference thereto will show that reality can be given to the Members' meeting in this way, and the practical co-operation of members can be secured in enterprises inaugurated by the official courts of the church.

HOLY COMMUNION: The Conference of 1933 recommended that in addition to the customary after-church observances, services be held specifically for Holy Communion, and that there be some variation in the hours and methods of conducting the same.

ADHERENTS' ROLL: Several Quarterly Meetings made suggestions about an Adherents' Roll. Of course this should be regarded as a necessity in every church and for every minister, but the attitude of our Commission has been that it should not in any way be confused with Church Membership.

3. Grading.

The grading of young people in Church Membership has been regarded as a question calling for considerable enquiry and guidance by experience. At present no change has been recommended, but a thorough working of the present three-fold grading, whereby Infant members pass on to Junior Membership, and at not later than 16 years of age are urged to take upon themselves the obligations of Senior Membership.

The Commission recommends all ministers and leaders to study afresh the regulations of the church regarding children's membership and the advance from one grade to another. Automatic transfer is nowhere recommended.

In many instances the religious experience of early adolescence gives particular significance to an initiation ceremony at that time.

4. Preparation Classes.

These for Juniors and Seniors should always be held for at least six weeks prior to reception (Minutes 1932, page 60).

A brief GUIDE for the conduct of Preparation Classes was prepared by the Commission with the approval of Conference, and is available at the Youth Office in Wellington. The booklet "Shall I Join the Church?" by the Rev. E. P. Blamires, is also obtainable at the Youth Office. It is useful for distribution to candidates.

A summary of the RULES of the Church for the guidance of members was prepared, and was adopted by Conference (Minutes 1935, page 151). They have been printed and circulated, and copies are still available from the Secretary of Conference. The question whether this summary should supersede Section 3, pages 9 and 10 in the Book of Laws was referred to the Committee on Law Book Revision.

The Membership Commission, however, desires to reaffirm its conviction that this Summary of Rules above referred to should not be allowed to supersede Section III, pages 9 and 10 of the Law Book.

5. Membership Rolls.

The Commission still feels that the vital need of our Church is an efficient purging of Membership Rolls, and to this end we recommend the adoption of paragraph (3) in the recommendations submitted to the Conference of 1934, which reads as follows:—"That members needlessly absent from church for six months be exhorted and earnestly reminded of their privileges and responsibilities. If at the end of the next six months they still continue the same non-attendance without a satisfactory reason, their names then to be removed from the Membership roll."

6. Recognition Services.

Recognition services, adapted to the age of candidates, should be held in every case where there are new members to be received. (Minutes 1932, page 60). There is an order for this service in the book of Sacramental and Other Services.

7. Nurture.

Leaders' Meetings and Youth organisations are urged to take effective steps, following a Recognition Service to nurture the spiritual life of young members. Every effort should be made to shepherd them in groups which will develop their devotional life and open avenues of service. It is of the utmost importance that when the solemn vows of full Church Membership are made in early adolescence, training in their fulfilment should continue, and should be specially impressed at the time when the right to vote (at 18 years) in members' meetings is conferred.

8. Brief Statement of the Faith.

This one matter which was remitted to the Commission remains undone. We tried in many directions to get contributions, but met with reluctance to comply, except in a few instances. Not really satisfied with any copy sent in, we confess the task is unfulfilled. It raises the question whether our thinking is sufficiently clear on the essentials of our message. Other churches than our own are devoting their attention to the same matter. It surely would be a wholesome exercise for every minister to produce a clear and concise statement of his own faith. Perhaps creed-making is something each man can best do for himself.

BI-CENTENARY OF METHODISM

1738-1939

Report of Special Committee.

The Special Conference Committee met in Christchurch on November 14th, and carefully considered proposals for the fitting celebration of the Bi-Centenary of the Birth of Methodism. The suggestions of the corresponding members of the Committee were also given full consideration.

The following programme is submitted for the consideration of the Conference.

- (1) The Bi-Centenary Commemoration to commence at the 1938 Wellington Conference; (in May, 1738 Wesley's heart was strangely warmed), and conclude at the 1939 Dunedin Conference; (in May, 1739 the foundation stone of the first Methodist Church was laid at Bristol).
- (2) (a) A Bi-Centenary Inspirational Gathering to be held at the 1938 Conference, to take the form of an Evening Demonstration. If possible, an overseas visitor from Australia or Gt. Britain to be the principal speaker.
(b) Preceded by a Conference Luncheon at noon, probably on the same day.
(c) The Conversation on the Work of God to be designed to emphasise the religion of Personal Experience, with time for personal testimony.
(d) Intercession for an outpouring of the Spirit to mark the special early morning prayer meetings of the Conference.
- (3) Sunday, May 24th, to be observed in every Methodist Church and circuit in the Dominion and suitable Commemorative Services held. Where possible, Combined Rallies to be held in the afternoon, especially in the larger cities and towns. An order of service to be issued by the Conference.
- (4) The month of May to be set apart for intercession and prayer for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit, coupled with Evangelistic aggressiveness. Congregations are urged to go into the open air in an effort to reach the masses. The Sunday Services particularly to be marked by sane but special evangelistic enterprise.
- (5) Ministers to meet in May Synod, when, with renewed consecration, the ministry will seek to re-capture the fervour of early Methodism and re-study the secret of its power.
- (6) The Conference of 1939 in Dunedin to mark the completion of the year of celebration; the "Conversation" to be devoted to reports of the year's progress, and a great evening Thanksgiving and Praise Demonstration to be held.

Nota Bene :

- (1) The Committee recommends the Conference to make early preparation to prepare and import suitable literature touching on the genius of Methodism for special circulation during the Bi-Centenary year.
- (2) That the celebrations extend to the Solomon Island's Mission Field and include also our Maori People.
- (3) That special attention be given to the Youth of the Church, that Bible Classes and Sunday Schools be requested to fully co-operate in the effort to make the commemoration year a return to the first principles of Methodism.

- (4) That the co-operation of our Home Mission and Youth Boards, the Bible Class Executives, the Women's Missionary Union, the Local Preachers' Association and the Men's Fellowship be specially requested.
- (5) That instead of setting up a monetary target to commemorate two centuries of Church Life, we humbly and prayerfully resolve to win many souls to the Kingdom and the Church throughout the year of 1938.

 - (b.) The President of Conference together with his Committee of Advice who shall be empowered to grant, or to withhold permission until the ensuing Conference. For this purpose the Chairman of District in which the applicant is appointed shall be a member of the President's Committee of Advice.
- (3). In the event of either or both these authorities withholding consent, and the Minister or Probationer deciding to go forward with his nomination, he shall be required to tender his resignation as a Minister of the Church.
- (4). In all cases it shall be the duty of the President's Committee of Advice to refer the matter to the Committee of Complaints and Appeals, or such Committee as Conference may appoint, which shall make its recommendations to the Conference for final decision.

LAW BOOK REVISION COMMITTEE'S REPORT, 1935.

Only preparatory work has been done in revision of the Book of Laws. The convener has received from the Australasian Revision Committee a copy of the New Law Book of that Church. Rev. W. H. Jones in sending a copy said "The small Committee revising the Laws here met together on many nights and put quiet and earnest thought into the work." Such consultation seems not only desirable but absolutely necessary. The Convener has been isolated during the past year from the rest of the Committee, a position which will in all probability be remedied during the coming year.

We recommend that the order of reference be as last year (Minutes 1935, page 153) and that the Committee be reappointed.

PRESIDENTIAL RULING.

Question Submitted.

What is the position from the point of view of our regulations in the event of the minister appointed to a Circuit dying between the Conference and the ensuing 31st March?

Ruling.

All Conference appointments of Ministers to Circuits are for one year ending 31st March. The year ends on that date for every minister and a distinctly new year begins for every minister on 1st April whether the minister be continuing in his Circuit or going to a new Circuit. In the event of the minister so appointed dying between the Conference and the 31st March the President has the power to make a new appointment and to claim the Parsonage for the use of the new appointee. Any variation of this in the interests of the widow and family of the deceased or in the interests of the Connexion generally must be regarded as an act of grace and not of right, and without prejudice to any future case that may arise.

Conference confirmed the Ruling.

QUESTION LVI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference on Other Questions?

WORLD CONFERENCE ON FAITH AND ORDER.

Communications have been received by members of the Conference Committee from the General Secretary, Rev. Canon Hodgson, Cheyney Court, Winchester, England.

Fifty-eight Churches (denominations) have so far appointed 250 delegates to the World Conference to meet in August, 1937. This may be held in England instead of at Lusanne as formerly proposed. Commissions of Church leaders are busy preparing data.

In England a new organisation, known as "Friends of Reunion," has been formed. It undertakes to carry the news of the Faith and Order Movement throughout the British Isles. A branch has come into being in Wellington as the result of meetings called by the Student Christian Movement.

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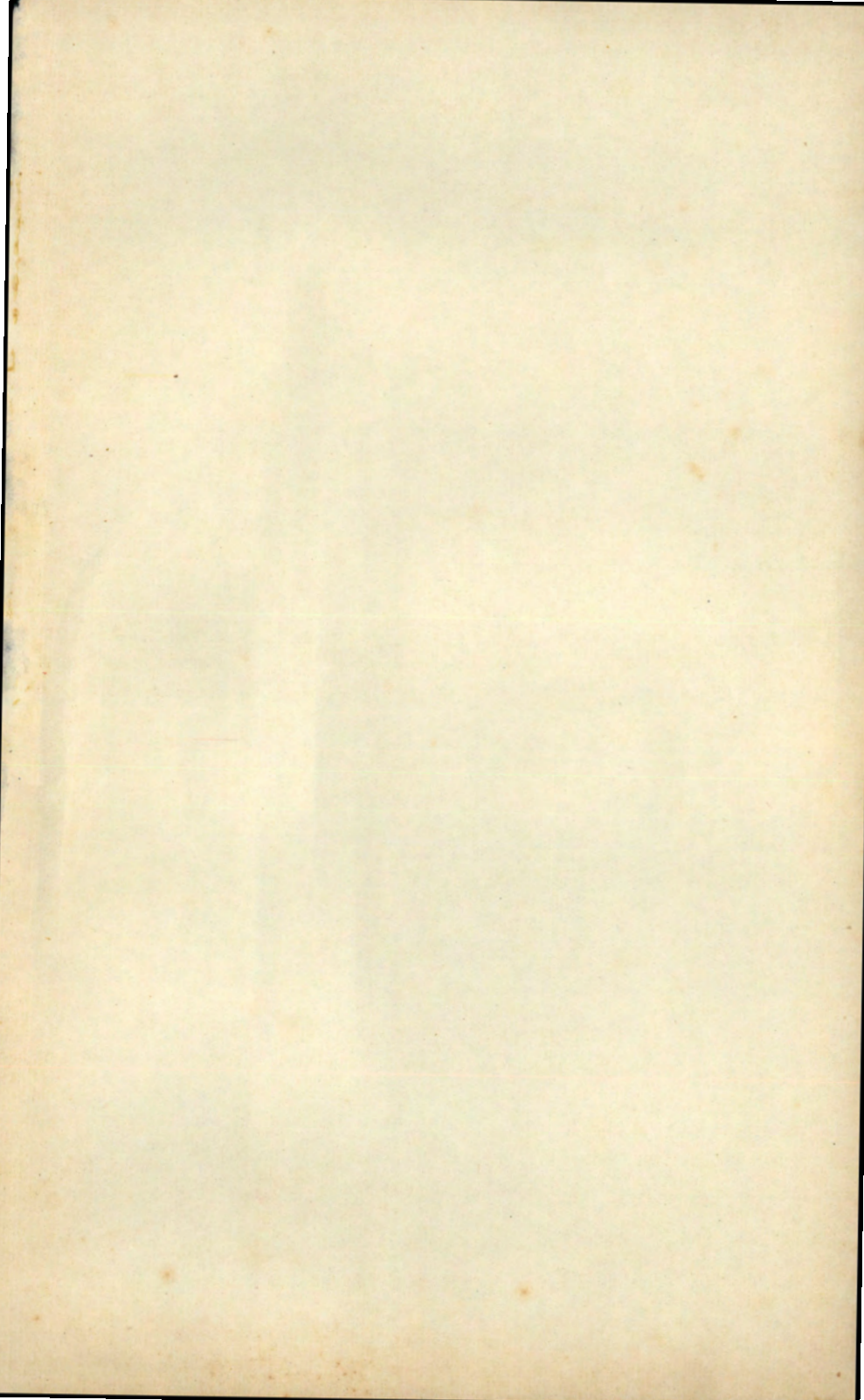
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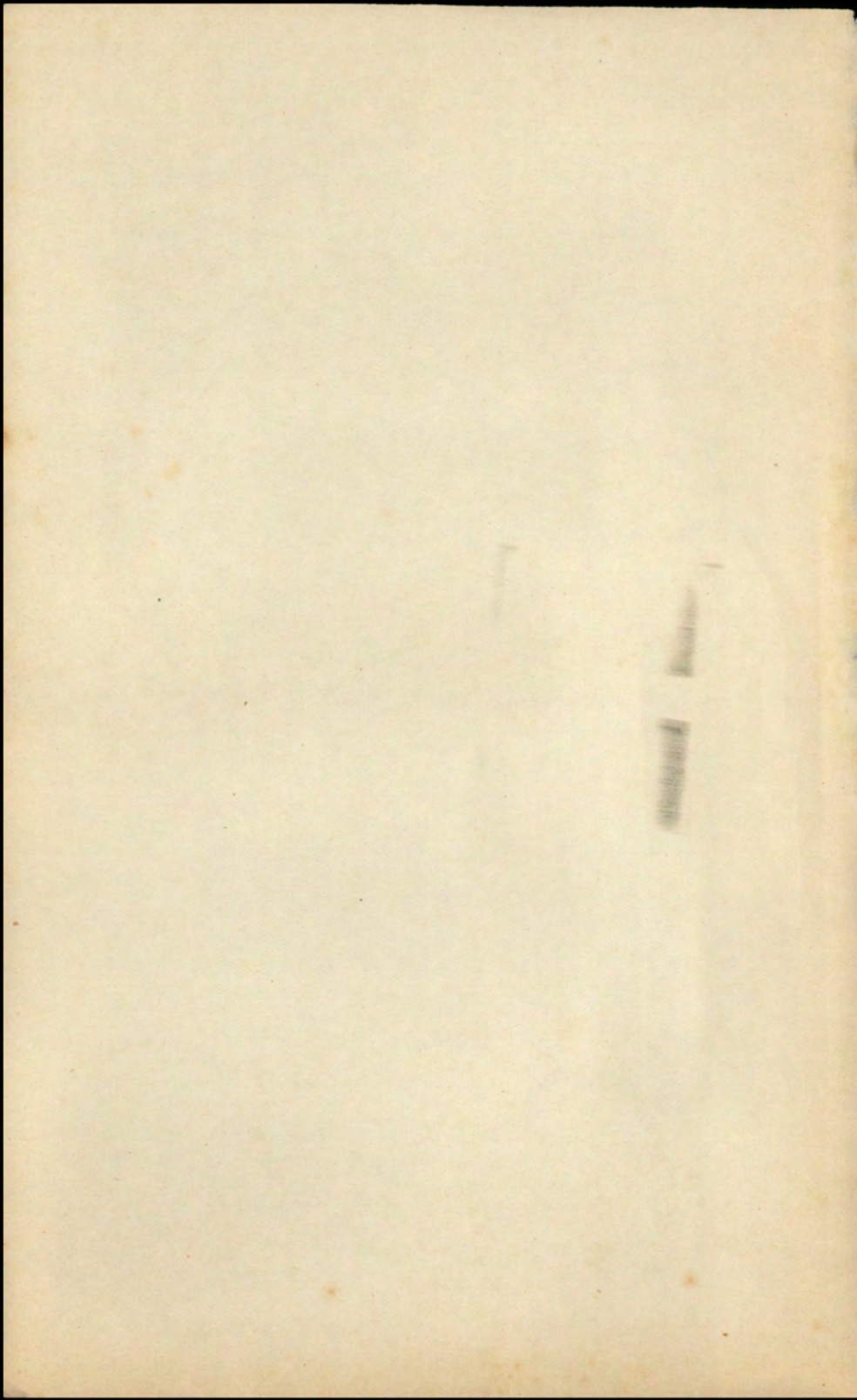
