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

HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

Organised Methodism in Australasia, as a part of the Foreign Missions under the direction of the British Conference, dates from the appointment of the Rev. Samuel Leigh to New South Wales in 1815.—(Mins. Brit. Conf., 1814).

"The Missions in Australia, Van Diemen's Land, the Friendly Islands and Feejee" were constituted by the British Conference of 1854 "a distinct Connexion, to be denominated 'The Australasian Wesleyan-Methodist Connexion,' with an Annual Conference, affiliated to the Parent English Conference."—(Mins. Brit. Conf., 1854).

First Australasian Conference was held in Sydney in the year 1855.

A Scheme of Annual and General Conferences was determined by the Australasian Conference of 1873.

THE FIRST NEW ZEALAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church was held in 1874.

THE TWENTY-FOURTH NEW ZEALAND ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of the Australasian Wesleyan Methodist Church, which was also the First United Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, the United Methodist Free Churches, and the Bible Christian Church in New Zealand, was held in 1897.

THE FIRST ANNUAL CONFERENCE

of the Methodist Church of Australasia in New Zealand was held in 1903.

THE FIRST CONFERENCE

of the Methodist Church of New Zealand was held in 1913, separation from the General Conference of Australasia having become operative on January 1st of that year by declaration of the President of the General Conference.

THE FIRST CONFERENCE

of the Methodist Church of New Zealand (United) was held in 1913.

Union between the Methodist Church of New Zealand and the Primitive Methodist Church in New Zealand having taken effect on February 6th, 1913.

ALFRED PETERS.

ALFRED PETERS was born in Truro, Cornwall, on the 26th of February, 1850. His lot was cast in a Christian home, and at an early age he was converted. This great experience changed his whole outlook on life. While doing manual work he seized such opportunities of study as were afforded him, and became a fully-accredited local preacher. He continued his studies and later came to New Zealand. Not long after his arrival he entered the ministry of the United Methodist Free Church in 1877. An an administrator and builder of churches he won distinction, and was a Chairman of District both in the United Methodist Free Church, and in the Methodist Church. Of the twelve Ministers of the United Methodist Free Church entering the larger Methodism of the partial union of 1896, Alfred Peters was the sole survivor. Like many another public man, he had a full share of criticism, but he was able, apparently unperturbed, to follow his chosen way of life. Of the forty-three years of his active ministry thirty-one were spent in Canterbury Circuits, followed by nearly twenty years of retirement in Christchurch. Great as was his age of eighty-nine years, he would probably, to all human seeming have lived considerably longer, but for two serious accidents, one a few weeks before his death. caused great suffering and much nerve shock and strain, and with the almost complete blindness of his latest days, caused him much distress. The great deliverance came on the 8th of November, 1939, when a wearied, racked spirit went to its rest in God.

NAPHTHALI FOTU.

NAPHTHALI FOTU.—The death of our Tongan brother is a great loss to the Methodist Church in the Solomon Islands. This Conference places on record its appreciation of the long and faithful services rendered to our Church, and to the cause of Missions by this devoted Minister of the Gospel, and to express the deep sympathy of the Members with the widow in her sorrow and loss. Naphthali came to the Solomons as a volunteer from Tonga about 1915, and a few years later he returned to his homeland, and laboured as a devoted and trusted Minister there for some time. When the Chairman of our Mission District, the Rev. J. F. Goldie, visited Tonga in 1921 to make an appeal for workers, Naphthali was one of the first to respond, and in 1922 returned to the Mission District. Since then he has laboured as a faithful Servant of Christ and his Church and his self-sacrificing labours have been abundantly blessed of God. His best memorial is the love and esteem of the people for whom he lived and laboured, and who will always cherish the memory of this good man.

G. KNOWLES SMITH.

The retirement of George Knowles Smith, the senior minister of our church in the active work embracing 22 years in England and 28 years in New Zealand, calls forth the sincerest tribute from the Conference and from the whole Connexion. This year Mr. Smith completes half a century of faithful, devoted and efficient service to Methodism.

On both sides, he represents the third generation of Primitive Methodist Ministers. His father occupied a very high position in that Church in England, and our brother seems to have inherited his great gifts of mind, heart, and pulpit, and his great administrative ability. He was intended for the teaching profession, but very soon felt the call to preach the gospel of the Risen Lord.

He entered the Primitive Methodist Ministry in England in

1892, and served in some of the largest and most important Circuits in England and Scotland, in each of which he rendered conspicuous In the height of his ministry he accepted a call to the New Zealand Primitive Methodist Church in 1901, and was appointed to Dunedin, which was then one Circuit. He at once took a foremost place in the life of the city, and his work is remembered until this day. In 1912, he was elevated to the Presidency of that Church, and was in great demand for all special occasions. He was selected as a member of the Committee which was appointed to consider the subject of Methodist Union. With Methodist union, our brother was appointed to the Central Mission in Wellington, and since then has served the Church in various spheres. Always he has been an effective preacher, a capable platform speaker and lecturer, and a genial and capable pastor and administrator.

On his retirement, we wish for him and Mrs. Smith a long and

happy eventide.

R. PURCELL KEALL.

On applying to enter the ranks of the Supernumeraries, R. Purcell Keall closes a ministry of 41 years. Born in 1865, a son of the Parsonage, at 12 years of age, during a Mission conducted by the Rev. J. J. Lewis in Durham Street Church, he gave his heart to God and soon found a way of service for his Master. Entering the Home Mission ranks for a short period prior to his candidature he was privileged to be the first preacher of any Church to be appointed to the then wide Ohakune area. Following a term at Prince Albert College, commencing in 1897, he was ordained in 1903. In Sandon Circuit it was his delight to be Superintendent for four years where his father had been Superintendent 20 years before. After exercising a faithful and painstaking ministry in a number of our Circuits, the Church rejoices that he retires with a degree of health and strength that gives promise of still further acceptable service, and now wishes for him a happy period of retirement, full of gracious memories and still rich in treasured friendships, and with the knowledge that he has the cordial esteem and affection of his brethren.

JONATHAN H. HASLAM.

Jonathan H. Haslam was born in 1866, and after schooling entered a solicitor's office with the intention of qualifying for the legal profession. The deepening of his spiritual life led him to recognise the call of the Spirit to the work of the ministry. The Church confirmed this call when he was nominated by the late Rev. Wm. Baumber, and received for training in 1897. For his first student year he was assistant to the late Rev. J. H. Simmonds at Wesley College, Three Kings; and for two years at Prince Albert College.

In 1900 he was received on probation, beginning a ministry of forty years which has been exercised in some of our most important circuits, and in every District of the Conference. In every Church where he has laboured he is gratefully remembered for a ministry

of culture, devotion, and faithfulness.

A student by nature, Brother Haslam has been a wide reader: and the Epworth Press published his volume of poems. His connection with the Board of Examiners began in 1910 as an Examiner in New Testament Greek. In 1918 he was appointed Secretary of the Board of Examiners, an office he filled with distinction until he became Secretary of Conference in 1930. From 1916 onwards he was successively for eight years Journal Secretary, Minute Secretary and Assistant Secretary of the Conference; for ten years he acted as Secretary of Synod and District Statistical Secretary in three important Districts. His musical ability has been frequently recognised by the Conference.

Mr. Haslam was called to the Chair of the Conference in 1935, and represented New Zealand Methodism at the Fiji Methodist Centenary which was celebrated that year. For one year he acted as Deputy-Chairman of the Wellington District, and has since served

as Financial Secretary of the District.

In placing on record its appreciation of this faithful and able service, Conference extends to him and Mrs. Haslam best wishes for many years of health and happiness.

GEORGE P. HUNT.

Percival Hunt has a long Methodist ancestry and is descended also from pioneer families whose association with New Zealand dates back to the year 1840 when this country came under British sovereignty. He is grandson of Mr. Charles Hunt, a local preacher who came to Wellington 100 years ago. His grandmother was a Luxford whose mother had been converted under the preaching of John Wesley. G. P. Hunt was born in the Rongotea district. He early yielded to Christian influences and consecrated his gifts to the service of Christ. Before attaining his majority he took up Home Mission work in Waihi in 1895 in connection with the Primitive Methodist Church. Later he spent two years at Inglewood divided by a student year at Auckland. The Primitive Methodist Conference of 1900 admitted him on probation and four years later he was ordained and was married to the lady who, through the years, has proved herself a gift of God to her home and her Church. For thirteen years Mr. Hunt held important charges in his Church. In 1913 when Methodist Union was consummated he was appointed to Invercargill (St. Peter's). He has since served the United Church in a number of important spheres. No circuit ever showed a decline under his zealous leadership. He has been a passionate evangelist, a devoted pastor, a capable administrator and a loyal friend. In domestic sorrow he has illustrated the reality of his Christian witness. In all his Circuits he has shown fidelity in meeting every demand of his vocation, and has been notable in his care for the properties of the Connexion. He enters upon the supernumerary relationship with the respect and affection of his brethren and their prayer that he may continue to find rich. reward in the joy of continued service.

FRANK E. LEADLEY.

Frank E. Leadley is the eldest son of the Rev. Francis Leadley, a minister for 41 years in the Primitive Methodist Church in England. Born in 1876, he was trained in Hartley College under Dr. Peake, and received into the ministry of the Primitive Methodist Church in 1900. For 11 years he served that Church, but, following a severe breakdown, he removed to Australia for health reasons. After nine years in Australia, he came to New Zealand, arriving in 1920 and laboured with great acceptance in various Circuits. He has filled the important position of Secretary of Synod in the Auckland and South Auckland Districts, was a member of Trinity College Council for four years, and served on the Conference platform for 13 consecutive years. In Circuit work he has proved an excellent preacher, a faithful pastor, and an efficient administrator. He is a brother beloved and trusted, a wise and sympathetic counsellor of youth. Now at the age of 63 years, and after 40 years in the ministry, he retires on medical advice as a supernumerary.

ARTHUR LIVERSEDGE.

ARTHUR LIVERSEDGE retires from the active work of the ministry rich in the regard and confidence of his brethren and in ministry rich in the regard and confidence of his brethren and in the gratitude of those to whom he has ministered. His lifelong fealty to Jesus Christ was begun in the shelter of a godly home at Barnsley, Yorkshire. Here as a boy he was enrolled in the membership of the Methodist New Connexion. His character and his gifts led to his reception as a local preacher at the age of eighteen years. Responding to the call to devote his life to the vocation of the Christian ministry he became a student at Ranmoor Theological College, Sheffield. In 1896 he began his probation at Mossley, Langashire and four years later was received into full connexion. While cashire, and four years later was received into full connexion. While stationed at Waverley Park Church, London, a severe nervous breakdown interrupted an enriching and influential ministry. medical advice he resigned his ministry in 1910 and two years later came to New Zealand. Here, in the Hamilton Circuit, his gifts and graces were at once recognised. Through definite Providential guidance and the persuasions of the Rev. James Wrigley, Mr. Liversedge, who had regained a good measure of health, responded to the call to renew the exercise of his true vocation and, in 1914, he was admitted as a fully accredited minister of the New Zealand Church. He has since exercised a singularly gracious ministry in city circuits and in provincial towns. While at Thames, in 1934, ill-health brought a temporary interruption to his work, but the following year he resumed active service at Oxford. Of strong and distinctive personality, with fine qualities of mind and spirit, he gave unstinted service in all his circuits. Through his pulpit ministrations, his pastoral fidelities, and his passion for social reform he has made a lavish gift of service to Christ and His Church. Mrs. Liversedge has been a devoted sharer in all the toils of her husband. they have spent their strength and their substance to further the Kingdom of God. For the last two years Mr. Liversedge has technically "rested," but has continued to pour out a stream of sacrificial service. He leaves the ranks of the active ministry with the affectionate regard of the whole of his brethren and their prayer that he may find rich recompense in his continued service of the Church he loves.

ADOLPHUS N. SCOTTER, B.A. N. Scotter retires from the from the active work of Adolphus the ministry with a fine record of outstanding service rendered during forty years in many departments of the life and work of the After a short period of theological training at Prince Albert College he commenced his ministry in 1900 and during forty years has served with whole-hearted devotion in several important towns and city circuits. Thoughtful as a preacher, sympathetic as a pastor, and capable as an administrator he has left an excellent record in every circuit to which he has been appointed. He has everywhere given special attention to Church properties. structed and new buildings bear testimony to his care for the material side of the work of the Church. Being of scholarly attainments, Mr. Scotter has served as tutor to the theological students, examiner of students and probationers, and as a member of the Board of Examiners. He has been an ardent supporter and advo-cate of the missionary work of the Church and for many years has been a member of the Board of Missions. He was appointed by the Conference in 1927 to convey the greetings of the Church in New Zealand to the Missionary workers and the Native Church in the Solomon Islands on the occasion of the celebration of the semi-jubilee of the Mission. He has held many Connexional Offices, among them the assistant editorship of the Connexional paper and the Chairmanship of Districts. On more than one occasion he was one of three ministers nominated for appointment to a Connexional Department. For six years he served with great ability as Secretary of the Conference, and in 1930 was elected President of the Conference. Now, on his retirement from the active work, the whole Church expresses its deep sense of the valuable service he has rendered in so many different capacities. He carries with him into a less strenuous life the warmest esteem of all who have been associated with him in circuit and administrative work. He has been splendidly assisted by Mrs. Scotter, who has in every circuit exercised a gracious influence. The hope is cherished that they may long live to serve the Church in the many avenues of Christian service still open to them.

BENJAMIN JOHN JAMES.

Benjamin John James was born in Victoria, Australia, in 1874. His people were Wesleyan Methodists, and one of his ancestors was a Class Leader under John Wesley. Before coming to New Zealand in the year 1900 he served for three years as a home missionary in Victoria. His first year in New Zealand was spent in Home Mission work, and at the Conference in 1901 he was received as a candidate for the Ministry, and sent to Prince Albert College for training. After two years in College he was sent as the first probationer to Tua Marina. Thus he commenced his ministry of 37 years. He has been a diligent and sympathetic pastor, a wise organiser and administrator, a thoughtful and acceptable preacher, and a loyal friend. His special study has been Methodist history and theology. Herein he speaks with authority. For two years he was Associate Editor of the "Methodist Times." He has been Synod Secretary and Convener of several Connexional Committees. Mrs. James has been a hard working, kindly, sympathetic help-mate through the years. In closing their active ministry they have the consciousness of faithful and fruitful service for the Master, and have won the affection and admiration of ministers and people throughout the Methodist Church of New Zealand. We wish them many happy years of quiet and useful eventide.

REGULATIONS.

- All Probationers who have completed the two-year Hebrew Course in Auckland University College shall take Hebrew Old Testament, provided that any Probationer taking a B.D. Course may substitute in lieu thereof the Hebrew prescribed in the B.D. Syllabus for that year.
- 2. Unless special exemption is granted by the Examination Committee., Greek New Testament shall be compulsory for all Probationers who have been through College, provided that any Probationer taking a B.D. Course, may substitute in lieu thereof the Greek prescribed in the B.D. Syllabus for that year.
- 3. Probationers, to whom (1) and/or (2) do not apply, shall be permitted to take the alternative English Old Testament and/or English New Testament in lieu of Hebrew and/or Greek respectively.
- 4. The Examination in Hebrew Old Testament and Greek New Testament shall be mainly on translation, grammar, and exegesis, and that in English O.T. and English N.T. shall be mainly on the exegesis of the sections specified.
- 5. (a). Theology shall be taken under Correspondence Tutors, marks being assessed as follows:—Correspondence work, 40; Examination, 60. Each Tutor appointed shall send out study papers for four consecutive months beginning with June 1. He shall mark the work sent in, return

the corrected work together with suitable guidance. (Maximum marks for each study paper, 10). Each Tutor shall keep full records of every individual case and, on or before November 1, forward a complete report to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners.

- (b). Any Probationer taking a Theological subject for a B.D. Course shall be permitted to substitute the same for that set down for his Probationary year.
- 6. Examinations, when not specifically limited to one particular text-book, shall be on the subject as a whole. Text-books are intended to provide a basis for wider and more thorough reading in the subject, and Probationers are encouraged to pursue the more extensive study, rather than limit it to one or two works.
- 7. Any Probationer pursuing a University Course shall be entitled to exemption from subjects (1) and (4) for two years of his Probation, but such exemption shall not be granted in his fourth year.
- 8. Examinations in the subjects 1, (Hebrew or English Old Testament)and 4 (General) shall be conducted in July and in the subjects 2 (Greek or English New Testament) and 3 (Theology) be conducted in December. N.B—This does not apply to the presentation of Thesis as under 4 General.

General Returns.

Returns this year are more encouraging, especially in the Membership column where we show an increase of 201. The following table gives the increases and decreases.

The decrease of 24 Preaching Places is serious. For several years we have continued to show a decrease under this heading, the loss over a period of five years being 71. The largest decrease this year is recorded in the South Auckland District, where careful enquiry was made as to the causes of the decrease. Doubtless the experience of this District is similar to that in other Districts: removals from Rural areas of Methodist families, improved transport methods with better roads enabling those not too far distant to attend the Circuit Church. These reasons are doubtless adequate; at the same time we have to face the fact that in five years we have closed 16% of our Other Preaching Places.

The loss of eight Local Preachers calls for attention. For some years we have alternated between comparatively small losses and similar gains. Since 1920 we have lost 136 Local Preachers, the greatest decrease occurring, as the following figures show, during the five years following the last war. If a similar experience occurs following this war, we can expect a serious decrease in the next few years. The following shows the figures at 5-year periods:—

If, as it is often stated, attendance at Communion is to be taken as an indication of the spiritual vitality of the Church, these figures reveal spiritual decline. Almost every year Synods report that incoming ministers find it difficult to estimate aright the numbers to be returned under this heading. If a Communicants' Roll could be kept, these figures would be of more value. As it is, it seems that in many cases they are largely guesswork and fail to indicate the true position of the Church life.

YOUTH WORK.

Once again I desire to express my indebtedness to the Youth Department for placing at my disposal their summary of Returns, including gains and losses in the respective columns.

Sunday Schools.

Returns under this heading are more encouraging this year. For several years the large decreases reported have caused grave concern; while the position is not yet remedied, the smaller reported decreases give hope that before long increases will be reported. One distinctly encouraging feature this year is an increase of 176 in Average Attendances.

The Returns last year showed a very fine increase in the Teaching Staff. This year the increase reported is very small. Last year it was:—

Men-increase of 213.

Women-decrease of 74.

This year we report:-

Men-decrease of 11.

Women—increase of 19.

The Senior Church Membership returns of our Schools deal with the Teaching Staff. Last year we reported an increase of 48 under this heading, this year a decrease of 78. With a slightly larger staff we report a loss in Church Membership. It is to be noted that 83% of our Staff are Church Members.

Infant Membership this year shows a slight increase; in Junior Membership we have a decrease of 164.

Societies connected with our School Work are flourishing so far as numbers are concerned, though in the actual number of Societies we have a decrease of 10. The most interesting feature of this side of our Youth life is the greatly increased interest in the individual Societies as shown by an increased Average Attendance of 1331. The interest in these Societies is undoubtedly growing.

Bible Classes.

These returns are likewise more encouraging, though a small decrease is reported. The following gives a comparison with last year.

Junior and Infant Members are bracketed together for purposes of comparison with last year. The position as returned is:—

The actual percentage of Senior Membership increase is 3.5%; the combined Junior and Infant Membership an increase of 17%. The increase in Other Preaching Places, though not so large as last year, is very satisfactory. In view of the decrease of 62 Local Preachers reported last year, it is encouraging to return again this year an increase. The column headed "Class Leaders and Sunday School Teachers" has been included for the first time. It is to be hoped that next year the Maori Work Returns will include an estimate of the Sunday School Scholars taught.

Conference requested last year that all Maori Work Returns be forwarded to the respective Synods. This was done this year in one Synod only with most satisfactory results. It is to be hoped that next year all Maori Returns are included with the General Returns furnished to Synod.

QUESTION XXXIII.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the Welfare of the Church?

A.—WELFARE OF THE CHURCH COMMITTEE. Report for 1939.

Membership Pamphlet (Minutes of Conference, 1939, p. 53).

The Welfare of the Church Committee has been unable to proceed with the publication of the pamphlet on Membership and the Social Creed as the latter is in process of revision by the Public Questions Committee. We have, however, considered the question of widening the scope of the proposed pamphlet, so that it may serve as an

introduction to the life and work of our Church, and may be in a form suitable to hand to candidates for membership. We therefore recommend that the contents of the pamphlet be as follows:—

1. Introduction.

- 2. The Rules of Membership and the Social Creed.
- The Implications of Membership and the Social Creed (1938 Report of the Welfare of the Church Committee).
- 4. The Statement of Faith. "We Affirm."
- Church Activities—Home and Maori Missions, Colporteur Work, Overseas Missions, Medical Unit, Youth Department, B.C. Movement and City Missions.
- Church Government—Leaders' Meeting, Circuit Quarterly Meeting, Trust Boards, Connexional Funds, Synod, Conference.

Pastoral Address (Minutes of Conference, 1939, p. 127).

We recommend that no action be taken to re-institute the Pastoral Address as the President of Conference has already sufficient avenues for sending pastoral messages to the Church.

Interdenominational Public Questions Committee.

With a view to securing a United Church front on Public Questions and to ensure that our views on these matters are strongly represented in the appropriate quarters, the Welfare of the Church Committee has considered the possibility of making a step towards Church Union in the establishment of an Inter-denominational Public Questions Committee.

Organisation.

 An Inter-denominational Public Questions Committee to be constituted representative of all Communions willing to cooperate, to be located preferably in Wellington.

2. The reports of Denominational Public Questions Committees to be forwarded to the Central Committee which will formu-

late a combined report.

- Each Church Assembly, Conference, etc., to receive the report of its own committee and also the report of the combined committee.
- 4. The combined committee to receive the findings of all Assemblies, Conferences, etc., and to construct for publication in the Press the matters upon which there is agreement. (The question of minority reports requires further consideration.)
- The resolutions representing the mind of the Churches to be officially presented to the appropriate quarters by the combined committee.

Resolutions.

- 1. That Conference affirm the principle outlined in the report.
- 2. That the President, Vice-President and Secretary of Conference sign letters inviting the co-operation of the other churches in the establishment of the Inter-denominational Public Questions Committee.
- That the replies be forwarded to the Public Questions Committe for consideration and report to next Conference.

Theological Teaching.

The Need: We believe that there is a growing need for the exposition of the theological position of the Church. We see this need evidenced:—

- In the widespread misapprehension of the Church's position not only on the part of outside critics but also among our members and adherents.
- In the basic uncertainty about our beliefs concerning the questions of Human Destiny, due to the fact that these matters are rarely expounded from our pulpits and our people are left unprotected against facile and inadequate views.
- 3. In the manifestation of a thoughtful mood of enquiry concerning theological matters on the part of a goodly section of our people. The deep interest shown by some in the recent expositions of the Statement of Faith is a clear indication of this developing thoughtfulness.

The Difficulties.

We appreciate the fact that it is difficult to teach Theology from the pulpit. Theology cannot be taught effectively in a piece-meal fashion, and series of closely reasoned sermons are not attractive to many of our people who are eager nevertheless to attend upon Public Worship.

Suggestions.

In an effort to meet the clamant need for theological teaching we suggest:—

Pulpit.

- Use a blackboard or other suitable means of placing the outline of a closely reasoned sermon before the Congregation.
- Give opportunity for discussion circles at the close of the evening service when theological positions have been expounded.
- 3. Deal with questions of ultimate destiny, giving the Scriptural evidence even if the preacher is not prepared to draw a final conclusion. If our people understand the problems involved and the scriptural positions they will not give easy credence to facile views that subvert sections of the evidence.
- Expound the modern approach to the Bible and seek to encourage our people in the practice of Bible reading and study.

Pastoral Visitation.

Pastoral visitation presents more opportunities for Theological teaching than is commonly realised, e.g. the meaning of Baptism is quite relevant to an ordinary conversation with parents seeking to arrange for the baptism of their child. A talk on the meaning of the Lord's Supper quite naturally follows an invitation to communicate, extended to the person visited. The prevalent conversations on world affairs may easily be led to questions of social sin, salvation, and the Kingdom of God. We therefore suggest that every opportunity of disseminating Christian beliefs, offered by pastoral visitation should be grasped.

Special Groups.

Gather in groups those who are ready to study theology and so seek to form a thoughtful and enlightened nucleus in each Church. Enjoin upon these the desirability of using materials so gained in

every-day conversations where possible.

A Local Preachers' Class could form the basis of such a group and Bible Class Leaders and Sunday School Teachers and any other interested persons could be invited to attend. The course would serve as a training ground for Local Preachers, a study circle for Bible Class Leaders and Sunday School Teachers preparing them for the relevant examinations, and as a source of instruction to those who have no examinations in view.

3. That the Conference set up a Special Publications Committee to co-ordinate any special publications in the various departments of the Church. The Committee to be:—The Chairman of the Auckland District, the Treasurer of the Contingent Fund, the Convener of the Spiritual Advance Committee, the General Superintendent of Home Missions, the General Secrtary of Foreign Missions, Messrs F. Penn and T. L. Hames, with the Senior Youth Director, the Convener of the Welfare of the Church Committee, and the Connexional Secretary as corresponding members.

4. That the following Resolutions of the Otago-Southland Synod be referred to the Publications Committee for consideration:—

That Conference issue pamphlets setting out in popular form the teaching of the Methodist Church on selected subjects of theology and Biblical interpretation; such pamphlets to have special bearing upon positive teaching as will strengthen our people in face of the false teaching of the various "isms" as are propounded by travelling preachers and others. That consideration be given to the publication of a pamphlet informing our people of the implications of Christian stewardship.

In presenting their report on the year's work the Dominion Executive have noted with pleasure signs of deepened interest in the ranks of local preachers.

We regret to record the death of some of our brethren. Among these was Bro. Henry Field of Gisborne—a former President of our Association and a local preacher of very high repute. Then Christchurch Methodism suffered severe loss in the death of Bro. W. L. Thomas, known throughout New Zealand as an enthusiastic Bible Class worker and acceptable local preacher. The Executive extends to the bereaved relatives their sincere condolence.

Whittomes Efficiency Course. Six copies of this Course have been presented to local preachers who have been received into the full work.

Long Service Diplomas. Seven Long Service Diplomas have been presented during the year.

Tutorial. Considerable thought was given to this matter during the early part of the year and it was eventually decided, after consultation with the Tutors, to alter the method of training. Instead of the old system of question and answer the students will, under the guidance of the tutors, be asked to analyse the text book concerned, chapter by chapter, or page or paragraph as the subject may suggest. The Executive desire to record their appreciation of the special help given by the Rev. A. H. Fowles.

Book Scheme. Acting upon the recommendation of the Annual Meeting a revised and enlarged Book List was printed and circulated early in the year. In addition to the list of books selected by the Executive all Local Preachers are given the privilege of selecting any theological book published in the Epworth Press Catalogue. This has met with general approval and has brought increased orders for books.

Mr. J. Horrell, one of our Vice-Presidents, recently visited many of the towns throughout New Zealand and was glad to have the opportunity to meet many of the brethren.

Local Preachers' Sunday. The Executive again request Superintendent Ministers to honour the Local Preachers by granting that at least one service in each Church be conducted by a local preacher on the 2nd Sunday in April.

C.—METHODIST MEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

Annual Report, 1939.

After an absence of two years the Dominion Executive is again located in Auckland, it having been transferred from Christchurch by resolution of the last Conference.

Its personnel is that of the Auckland District Committee.

The Executive has communicated with all District Committees and would stress the necessity of increased activity on their part, which would be of material assistance to the Fellowship Movement.

During the year 244 circular letters pointing out the aims and objects of the Men's Fellowship and appealing for greater cooperation and support by the men of the various Churches was forwarded to Ministers and Home Missionaries in the Connection.

Many of the replies received were of an encouraging nature, the progress from Christchurch being outstanding and indicating a forward movement in that District.

It is hoped that where no replies to the circular letter have been received this most important branch of the Church is not being overlooked. Throughout the Dominion several new branches have been established while others are being formed.

Some of the older branches are undertaking fresh activities such as visiting Mental Hospitals, Public Hospitals, Returned Soldier Shelters, organising clothes drives for poor people, Goodwill Bags for City Missions, providing Church Hymn Books, taking Sunday Church Services—Men's Sundays, Sunday morning 10 a.m.—Spiritual meetings, and also Sunday afternoon teas at 4.30, followed by discussion. Week-night Educational Gatherings, Father and Son Banquets, Children's Christmas Parties, inviting Local Body Members to their meetings, arranging motor transport service for elderly people, and various other Church activities. One Branch is making a weekly contribution towards "Maintain the Doctor Fund."

Where the movement is flourishing, amazing progress is reported with the men of the Church taking a full share of its responsibilities.

The Dominion Executive extends congratulations and good wishes to all active branches and asks for continued co-operation both in supporting the Men's Fellowship Column of the Methodist Times and in forwarding to it all information which may be of help to the cause.

There is much to be done for Christ and His Church which our men can do-if they will.

YOUTH DEPARTMENT.

Annual Report for 1939.

1. HEADQUARTERS REPORT.

The 1939 Conference appointed three Youth Directors to commence in April, 1939, on the basis of the new co-ordination policy of the Church, Bible Classes and Sunday School being linked in a Youth Council in each Church, and each Director having an area in which he gives leadership for the whole youth and child life. The new policy was inaugurated at a Directors' Conference held in Wellington, April 18th to 25th.

The main theme was "Evangelism of Children and Youth" and at the close the President of the Conference, Rev. Angus McBean, dedicated the Directors to their great task. During the rest of the year the Directors have made intensive visits to Youth Councils, conferred with Ministers and District Councils. The Senior Director, Rev. C. T. Symons, made a short visit to the Northern and Southern areas of his co-directors.

A further Conference of the Directors and Board was held in September, to review the work in the field and plan future policy. The housing of the two married Directors has given the Board and the Directors some anxiety, and the problem is not yet finally solved. The Board is appreciative of help and advice from district Commit-

tees as well as from the Directors on this matter.

The Board and the three Executive Councils-B.C. and S.S .have had a very busy period in the working out of the new policy, especially the Board Treasurer and the Literature Manager.

Notwithstanding this, the Board has given consideration to fundamental matters concerning youth life, and has made a study of someof the most important reports presented to the World Youth Conference held at Amsterdam in August, 1939. These studies included "Christian Youth and Education," "Christian Youth and the Economic Order." Summarised reports on these studies have been sent to all District Youth Councils. The response in Circuits to the new policy has been encouraging, and the requests, especially from many Sunday School Teachers, have been most gratifying. During the first year the Directors have concentrated on contacting with the Sunday School Teachers and Bible Class Leaders in each Church. Immediate help and guidance have been made available and the study of the general situation has indicated lines of development which when followed up will make possible even more effective work.

The Sunday School Executive Council has done valuable work during the year in studying and reporting to the Board on the reports and recommendations on Temperance, Church Membership and the

Junior Church.

The world catastrophe of war has released immeasurable sin, suffering and death, and in this youth bears a heavy cost. Our own young men and women are looking to our Church for light and guidance in this dark and dreadful hour, and whatever road they take, life for them will be full of suffering, frustration and conflict. To them we say—Seek by study, fellowship and prayer to know what the will of God is for yourself, be humble and penitent, seek to maintain the fellowship of the whole Christian Church in all the world, and let your life witness to the grace and power that God gives you through Jesus Christ. In this hour of turmoil and division which exists, even within the Church, seek the heights and depths beyond the conflict, where the peace of God and the fellowship of His Church bring unity and victory.

2. REPORT OF YOUTH DIRECTORS.

General Impressions.

The launching of the Church's new policy in respect to youth has in almost every place created a new interest in Youth Work. Everywhere a spirit of expectation greeted the Directors and the contacts made were most encouraging. Generally speaking it was found that Youth Workers were giving more thought to the real purpose and objective of their work, and were prepared to receive with an open mind suggestions which would enable more effective work to be done.

Comparatively few were found to be surrendering to the discouragements of the work; by far the great majority are facing up to the difficulties with genuine devotion and a readiness to experiment along new lines. This was evidenced by the successful question periods which followed practically every meeting, and by the extent to which recommended books on aspects of the work were purchased from the Directors. This trend was fully taken advantage of by the Directors, who urged the need for trained workers and for the work of teaching and leading to have priority in the thinking and planning of those engaged in Christian service.

An encouraging feature is the large number of Bible Class trained young people who are found in the ranks of our Sunday School Teachers. This is, of course, less noticeable in the Country Districts as Youth tends to gravitate to the larger centres for suitable employment. In such places older people are giving devoted service. Schools where Superintendent and Teachers have real fellowship together and tackle the work in the team spirit, are showing most progress.

More and more Circuits are conforming to the Church's organisation for Local Youth Work, and where the Local or Circuit Youth Council is seriously working, there has been appreciative reference

to its value.

The extreme importance of Young People's work needs to be more fully recognised, and the status of the teacher in the life of the Christian Church definitely raised.

The Bible Classes.

An encouraging feature of our Youth Work is the excellent Bible Class groups found in many Churches. In the membership of these Classes are found fine types of young women and young men who represent large resources of mental and spiritual energy, much of which yet remains to be awakened and directed consistently and vigorously in the service of God and the Church.

Generally speaking, the relationship between the Bible Classes and the Church is good. In some places the Senior Classes are very loyal, and some Sunday Services depend almost entirely on the attendance and active service of the Young People. Where the opportunity is presented these young people are taking more and more responsi-

bility in the life and conduct of our Church.

A very real gap often exists between Bible Classes and the Sunday School. The Bible Classes need to co-operate with the Sunday School in order to prevent loss of Senior Sunday School Scholars, and to promote a sense of unity between these departments of the Church.

A noticeable feature is the lowering of the average age of the Bible Class Membership. This makes the problem of retaining seniors a very real one in many places, and calls for the provision of some kind of Senior Fellowship. This factor must be taken into account

in the future development of the Bible Class policy.

The Leadership is on the whole sincere and devoted, although sometimes it is poorly equipped in Christian experience and training. There is a definite need for knowledge of technique, and there is a marked lack of purpose in the work. Few leaders feel adequate to approach individual members with the challenge to definite discipleship. Often it is assumed that class members have no personal difficulties which need to be solved. Expression of opinions in the course of a study is confused with vital experience of a living faith. There is need for a much more challenging call to express Christian Discipleship in everyday life and to cultivate a richer devotional life.

A noticeable weakness in many Bible Classes is the tendency to self-centredness. Little or no attempt is made to attract the outsider. A missionary spirit within the Bible Classes is essential for fulness of life. Service within the wider sphere of the Sunday School, Church and Community also needs to be encouraged as expression of the Christian life.

The camps and schools are generally of a very high order, and mean a great deal to the Movements and the Church. Sometimes, however, Class Members attend the Communion Service at Camps, but fail to do so in their own Church. This requires the attention and co-

operation of Ministers, B.C. Leaders and Camp Officials.

There is need for definite action in some places-particularly in the Auckland and South Auckland Districts, to counteract the influence of some of the more aggressive sects whose activities are undermining the loyalties of many of our young people. Some form of simple positive instruction in the Methodist approach to certain subjects requires to be undertaken.

The disaster of war has already had a very unsettling effect on the Bible Classes throughout the Dominion. Conflicting loyalties are creating real problems for our young men especially, and a sympathetic and understanding attitude is essential on the part of all, whatever

may be their personal viewpoint.

Sunday School.

There is marked loyalty, enthusiasm and responsiveness on the part of Sunday School workers generally. Eagerness to learn is apparent. Many are facing up to the question of teacher training in some form or other. But teacher training generally has not received the attention that it deserves and requires. Some are attempting to meet the challenge of the work to-day by venturing forth along new lines. In a number of places the Sunday School as Junior Church has been combined with the Morning Service of the Church in an attempt to meet more adequately the spiritual need of the children, and to integrate more effectively this work with Church work generally. Where this form of Junior Church has been tried, it has resulted in improved rolls and averages and has reacted beneficially on the attendance of adults at morning worship.

The majority of our Schools are small-many much smaller than they were a few years ago. In the country the decrease is due largely to the fact that fewer children are available in these districts. Generally speaking most country schools are touching the majority of the

children of their particular neighbourhood.

Rolls and averages are increasingly affected by the indifference of parents who are not sufficiently seized with the importance of the religious education of their children. This is a new feature of our Youth Work which gives cause for very serious concern and which greatly militates against effective work among the young. This position further emphasises our responsibility to provide in our Sunday Schoole a programme of religious education which will not religious education which will not religious. Schools a programme of religious education which will not only meet the needs of the children, but also win the confidence of the parents.

Foremost among the weaknesses of Sunday School work is worship. Some School services are characterised by reverence and reality, but in numerous instances it is apparent that there is a lack of understanding of children's worship, and of the fact that children should be educated in the spirit of worship in Sunday School, as well as instructed in the Bible. Another weakness is expression work. principle behind it is not clearly understood by some workers, and others are puzzled as to what to do, and how to find the necessary time. There is room for development of service activities within the capacity of the child, and for self government and activity within the Junior Church or Sunday School. Not every school has an appreciation of grading principles. Small Sunday Schools particularly require guidance along the lines of grading and organisation. Schools are not using as they might, resources in the community, such as willing and capable people, who may give addresses or help of other kinds.

Often there is an absence of good pictures and equipment, and rooms, through lack of beauty, orderliness and, in a few cases, cleanliness, are not conducive to worship. Much better use could be made of available equipment. Frequently, too, there is an absence of continuity and integration with the Bible Class and the Church. The Sunday School has been regarded, not as part of the Church, but as an institution attached to the Church. The new regime should help to create a new attitude to the Sunday School.

A supreme need is vision. Staffs need to cultivate the team spirit. Work would be re-vitalised if teachers met regularly for prayer, study and fellowship, and to talk over their work. We need experienced-centred fellowships at the heart of our work.

Splendid work is being done through the Correspondence Sunday School, the roll of which is steadily increasing. A similar activity

has been inaugurated by the Bible Class Movements.

Throughout the Dominion, there is a small number of Christian Endeavour Societies—some of which are doing good work. The Brigade Movement as an additional activity—is a growing one, and is proving of distinct value in many places.

REPORT ON JUNIOR CHURCH.

(See Instructions of Conference, 1939 Minutes, page 63, par. 9.)

Certain types of Junior Church organisation have been established recently which have features in them not usually associated with Sunday Schools, such as members accepting a large measure of responsibility for the government of the Junior Church, the conduct of its service and the appointment of its office bearers. This organisation is nearly always in addition to Sunday School.

These and other organisations have arisen in response to a need, that of encouraging children in church attendance, and of making Church more "real" to the child, this being one aspect of a deeper need, that of developing a "church consciousness" in the Sunday

School scholar.

Church Attendance of Children.

The present facts. From the personal experience of members of the Committee and statistics taken from a questionnaire circulated to all Superintendents of Sunday Schools, we think the following approximates to the real position.

1. Of morning Schools approximately 60% attend Church regu-

larly.

2. Of Afternoon Schools approximately 25% attend Church

regularly.

3. That the balance of the scholars and in fact many of those who attend Church have no sense of the relationship of the School to the Church. They belong to, attend, leave and remember only the Sunday School—the roots of their loyalty do not strike down to the Church.

- 4. In many places a mutual unconcern exists between School and Church. Sometimes this is a breach, not a gap.
- 5. Various means of encouraging Church attendance are in operation—Young Worshippers' League, and increasing tendency for Schools which meet in the morning to spend a portion of their time in Church or to conclude before the service and the children at their option to stay to Church. In a few cases Junior Churches are established in addition to Sunday School.
- 6. The various means are only partially successful in that at best only infrequently is the whole roll of a School affected and very generally only a small proportion (particularly is this so with afternoon Schools).
- 7. Lack of Church loyalty in many Bible Class Members is directly attributable to this early Sunday School lack.

Need Children go to Church in Addition to Sunday School?

It is usually taken for granted that we ought to do our best to encourage our scholars to attend Church. The points stated below may express the main reasons for this traditional attitude:—

- (1) It is felt that a child's spiritual development as it depends upon organised groups is only partially attended to by the Sunday School, the remainder being completed when the child attends Church.
- (2) As the Church is conceived as a family so it is thought that this is realised in practice when parent and child join in corporate worship.
- (3) Attendance at Church may become a life long habit continuing long after Sunday School. Hence association with the Church is not broken when transfer is made from Sunday School and we are more likely to hold the scholars who are Church attenders. (Experience indicates and statistics may prove that those who go to Church regularly during childhood are just as prone to fall away during adolescence as the non-attender.)
- (4) Tradition, reverence and atmosphere which belong to the Church are frequently lacking in the Sunday School. It is generally believed that if a child will come to Church this "something" which Church has will communicate itself to him to his spiritual good.
- (5) The Church is an established institution, the Body of Christ, whilst the Sunday School is still required to justify itself.

Criticism of Present Attitude.

The Committee feel that they cannot fully agree with the points in the foregoing section. They are unable to see why it should be required of a child that he attend two separate and to him unrelated organisations for his spiritual needs. A Sunday School should be able to provide for the whole of the corporate and personal religious life of the child (subject to the limitations of family influences, etc.). Education, worship, devotions, opportunity for expression cannot do other than suffer when they are separated activities conducted by two organisations.

The principle of grading is an established one in all spheres of educational activity, including Sunday Schools. It does not seem reasonable to assume that a Church Service covering ages from 8 to 80 will be capable of providing worship and teaching and fellowship which is the best possible for the two of the main groups—adults and children. This is borne out in practice by the increasing number of

places where the children retire before the sermon, and where the early portion of the service is prepared specially for the children (at a level somewhere above the average age). Most preachers at such services feel the limitations of the wide range of ages.

Services are frequently conducted by lay preachers and ministers who are unfamiliar with the conduct of childrens' worship which is now a matter for special attention.

The New Conception.

After careful consideration the Committee is forced to the conclusion that the old conception of the relationship of Church, Child and School is inadequate to meet the need of to-day and that the time has come for a very fundamental change in the conception of the nature and function of the Sunday School.

Stating it briefly we believe that the new attitude must be that

"The Church and the Sunday School form an organic whole separated into two sections, adult and junior, FOR GREATER FREEDOM in ministering to the different spiritual needs of adults and children."

Further, scholars would not be transferred from the Sunday School to Bible Class, but from the Junior Church would be trans-ferred to, and received by, the Adult Church at a service of recep-tion. This promotion to the adult Church should in general result in attendance at Bible Class as a related and essential activity of the

Church.

The Sunday School should be the Children's Church and Church for the Child, not just a School held on Sunday in addition to Church. To embody this new conception of the nature and function of the Sunday School in a name, we would recommend the use of the words "Junior Church" in lieu of "Sunday School." This would immediately link both sections of the Church in the child's mind and assist the growth of "Church consciousness."

The Junior Church.

It is obvious that a change of name alone will not be sufficient to engender more than a superficial Church consciousness. The whole of the operations of the Junior Church will need to be positively related to its purpose.

Again, it will not be possible, even if it were desirable that all Junior Churches should be cast in the same mould but the following features would require to be inherent in any particular form of Junior Church.

It is essential that the scholar should see the Junior Church as a Junior Section of the Adult Church and instruction given to this effect will need to be demonstrated by the practical interest of the adult Church.

The unity of the two sections should be made visible in combined services held regularly (say quarterly) on such occasions as Harvest. Church Anniversary, etc.; accommodation and local conditions will present difficulties in many cases. These will require to be solved on the spot.

There should be definite and regular instruction in the mean-(b) ing, forms and practice of prayer and worship so that the children may appreciate these elements. Moreover graded worship will need to be carefully arranged in accordance with the nature and needs and interests of the children.

- (c) Talks on the history, faith and missionary enterprise of the Church should be given regularly by the Superintendent and the Minister.
- (d) The most vital link between the two sections of the Church will be the minister who will require to give much time to his Junior Church congregation: He must be "our Minister" to the children and not a visitor to the Junior Church to be welcomed by the Superintendent.
- (e) We would urge the appointment of lay pastors in the School, preferably the Superintendent and Superintendents of Departments.
- A measure of self-government and responsibility should be allowed the children.

It may appear that there is no essential difference between the above and the best type of Sunday School and this is in fact what the Committee believes to be the case.

All the reforms at present being advocated for Sunday Schools become increasingly important as the full import of the changed con-

ception of the Sunday School is realised.

The ideal would be an organisation which incorporates all the features referred to above and which meets at the same time as the Adult Church so that parent and child may go to worship together.

RESOLUTION.

That the report be referred to Quarterly and/or Leaders' Meetings in order that they may confer with Local Youth Councils or Teachers with a view to its study and if desirable experimentation along the lines suggested and report back to the Board.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE EDUCATION.

(See Instructions of Conference, 1939, Minutes, page 67, clause (d)).

- (1) We recognise the definite need for Temperance Education.
- (2) Such Temperance Education (so far as Youth Work is concerned) involves three spheres:-
 - Instruction to those who have to deal with Temperance (a) Education.
 - (b) Instruction to children of the Sunday School age.
 - Instruction to youth of Bible Class age.
- Many Teachers and Leaders experience difficulty in regard to Temperance Lessons.

This is due to several causes:-

- Some are uncertain as to where they stand themselves on the matter of Temperance.
- Some feel their inadequacy to give instruction in the subject. (b)
- Much Temperance Education material is more or less irrele-(c) vant to or unsuitable for the children whom they have to teach. In this regard great progress has been made in the lessons provided by the Australian and New Zealand Graded Lessons.
- Many feel the discrepancy between such teaching and the (d) home environment of many of the children and young people.

Consequently we recommend:-

- That a leaflet setting out the need for and aim of Temperance Education be prepared and distributed to Teachers, Leaders, and Parents.
- That efforts be made in meetings of Teachers and B.C. (b) Leaders to help them:

i. to define their position in the matter;

- ii. to study how they may more effectively deal with the subject.
- That Local and District Youth Councils review the question (c) of Temperance Education in their various spheres.
- In regard to Temperance Education for Children and Youth (4) we recommend:-
 - (a) That such education be graded in accordance with the age and interests of young people.
 - In the Kindergarten and Primary Grades instruction in elementary hygiene and respect for the body and the cultivation of healthy habits should provide the basis for definite Temperance teaching later.
 - A course of Temperance Education should be given in the Junior and Intermediate Grades.
 - Such instruction should be in accord with the children's capacities and interests and integrated with their education in general, both religious and secular.
 - That to children we emphasise the great care necessary in the presenting of details of drunkards and the effects of drunkenness.
 - That the appeal of Temperance Education in these years should be along the lines of Christian morality, physiology, and hygiene, coupled with example and hero-worship.
 - We feel that Temperance Education in isolated fragments, such as quarterly lessons, is inadequate, and therefore recommend that a booklet on Temperance Education be prepared (or obtained) specially written with the child's needs and interests in mind, and that this form the basis for a series of supplementary talks in the Sunday School programme, or on some other suitable occasion. The possibility of obtaining the services of Christian Doctors or school teachers to assist in this matter should be investigated.
 - A course of Temperance Education for Bible Classes. iii. We recommend that
 - A definite Temperance Study should be included in the B.C. Syllabus each year.
 - A small booklet on Temperance in relation to Christian Citizenship and life generally should be pre-pared (or obtained if in print) and distributed amongst class members prior to the Temperance Study. The aim of this would be to educate the class members in the matter of Temperance.

- c. A pamphlet summarising Temperance Education should be distributed at the close of the Study period. This should be in the nature of a definite challenge, in the light of the booklet and the class study, to the members to define their attitude in regard to the question of Temperance and the Alcohol problem in general. It should include a total abstinence pledge for members to sign. The Leader should take opportunity to discuss the matter with individuals as occasions warrant.
- d. That experts in various branches of social science should be asked to co-operate in the production of the required booklets and pamphlets if printing is necessary.
- (b) That Temperance Education should comprise an integral part of education in general and of moral and religious education in particular. This would avoid the abstract and artificial nature of much Temperance Education, We believe that the fundamental approach to Temperance is through Christian Experience. There should be constant endeavour to meet the larger issue, which is the acceptance of Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord of life. Where this is accomplished we believe that the matter of Temperance will receive its due place within the general conception and conduct of the Christian life.

Such integration involves treatment of Temperance

under such headings as (for example):

Physiology, Health and Alcohol.

Sport and Alcohol.

Economics and Alcohol.

Industrial Efficiency and Alcohol.

Christian Social Responsibility and Alcohol.

It also involves Temperance teaching as application of truths discovered in other lessons.

(5) We believe that more decisiveness is needed in regard to Temperance Education, which should issue in total abstinence.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That the Report be received and adopted.
- That Conference authorise the Board to deal with matters arising from the above report, and direct it to co-operate with the New Zealand Temperance Society in the implementing of its Temperance Education Policy.

GENERAL RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That the Report of the Youth Board be received and adopted.
- 2. That the Financial Statements of the Youth Board and Bible Class Movements be received and adopted.
- 3. That the Statistical Report be received and adopted.
- That Youth Sunday in future be held on the third Sunday in June.
- 5. That the Board, having reviewed the matter of Church Membership, recommends that it be given another year in which to report on this question in view of the importance of the report submitted in connection with the Junior Church and allied subjects. (1939 Minutes, page 62, resolution 1.)

- That the Rev. C. T. Symons be appointed as Senior Director for the balance of his present term, i.e. five years.
- 7. That the Law revision of the Youth Department regulations be deferred for one year, pending further developments in co-ordination in district and national organisation.
- 8. That Conference prepare a small pamphlet or leaflet to give to parents on the occasion of the baptism of a child explaining the significance of baptism and urging fulfilment of their responsibility.

That this matter be referred to the Literature Sub-Committee of

the Spiritual Advance Committee.

- 9. Diplomas.—That Conference issue to Sunday School Teachers in recognition of long and valuable service in Sunday School Work a "Diploma of Honour" for not less than 25 years of continuous service, and that the Youth Board be requested to frame conditions under which the Diploma is to be granted.
- That the Youth Board issue a less complicated form for Sunday School Returns.
- 11. That while recognising the value of certain O.T. passages for Sunday School Scholars, we recommend a much greater place be given to the life and teaching of Jesus.
- 12. That the Conference directs that at all Synods the Question be asked of all Ministers present: Have Membership Preparation Classes been held? And when the answer is in the negative a reason shall be given.
- 13. That Conference expresses its appreciation of the successful launching of the Youth Director Policy and to the Youth Directors for the advance that is already apparent after their inaugural year's work. Conference assures the Department and the Directors of the continual sympathetic co-operation of the Church in its effort to inspire and train youth in the service of Christ.
- 14. That Conference extends its hearty congratulations to the Youth Council of the Otago-Southland District for the highly successful historical pageant produced and to the writer, Mr. A. R. Dreaver, M.A.

QUESTION XXXV.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference in regard to Public Questions?

A.—REPORT OF PUBLIC QUESTIONS COMMITTEE.

- 1. Prisons.—The Committee has done a considerable amount of work with regard to this subject. Preliminary investigation speedily showed the vast amount of material that had to be considered and concerning which information had to be obtained: the value or otherwise of retributive and deterrent punishments, psychological examination and treatment, extension of the probation system, abolition or otherwise of flogging, habitual criminals, classification of prisoners, vocational training of prisoners, half-way houses, employment of women as humanising influences, after-care, etc. The Committee is continuing steadily with its work, and it is hoped to present a comprehensive report to the 1941 Conference.
- 2. Refugees.—This problem was under consideration, and much information regarding refugees had been obtained. Resolutions would have been brought forward, but the war has so changed the whole situation that the Committee felt that it was quite impracticable to bring forward any decision to Conference, as there can, of course, be no movement during the war.
- 3. Social Creed.—A suggested draft has been brought down to the Committee and is still under consideration.
- 4. During the year protest was made to the Government against any suggestion for the establishment of State lotteries, and the Conference Report on Marriage, Divorce, Abortion, and Birth Control was printed and circulated.
- 5. Bible in Schools.—The work of giving religious instruction in public schools and of arranging for opening observances each school day has been well maintained during the past year. The Annual Report of the Bible-in-Schools League states:—

"The observances are permitted subject to consent of School Committees, by seven out of the nine Education Boards. In about 900 schools under all Boards the half-hour of religious instruction is given once a week, and in between 350 and 400 schools under seven Boards there is a daily use of the Bible in observance of worship at the beginning of the school day."

Figures can be but close approximations when dealing with schools with varying numbers on the roll from week to week, but over 90,000 children receive instruction, and approximately 100 children on an average per school may be counted as joining in school worship in the 350 to 400 schools concerned.

The number of schools is affected by the consolidation process of the Education Department. In Otago, for example, the following table indicates that more teachers and pupils are joining in school worship though there is actually a reduction of three schools where worship is observed:—

Changes of staff also affect the returns, particularly in small sole-teacher schools, where changes are more frequent and the teacher is often young and comparatively inexperienced. A kindly concern may result in co-operative effort between ministers and young teachers appointed to such schools and help in maintaining Observances begun

under a previous teacher.

Comparatively few of the larger schools are completely staffed for religious instruction. Most ministers of all the Churches now view this work as among their most important duties, but there are insufficient to cope with the needs, and only part of the school is reached. The valued co-operation of lay helpers, many with teaching experience, is aiding in meeting this difficulty, and while emphasising the need for efficiency, appeal is made for lay helpers to come to the help of the ministers. At the same time, it is not sufficiently understood by staff-teachers themselves that their services may be used equally with those of ministers and others. Herein lies a very practical field of voluntary service for Christian teachers. That so many are happily conducting opening Observances is cause for satisfaction, but many most capable staff-teachers, who, as S.S. teachers, B.C. members, etc., are familiar with the Bible, could assist in the work of giving Bible instruction. The Report of the Commission dealing with secondary schools in England (1939) in the section on Scripture in Schools views as the ideal arrangement the teaching of the Bible by one who is fully within the School Society and therefore best able to relate the Bible lesson to all other parts of school life. Education Boards' Reports do not furnish complete statistical information in all cases, but it is known that over fifty staff-teachers under the Auckland Board are themselves conducting the half-hour lesson. In one school in Otago five of the staff similarly assist, but this is at present somewhat exceptional. Only by wider activity by both ministers and teachers can the field of present opportunity be covered.

Note is taken of the intention of the Student Christian Movement to organise series of lectures and studies in the four centres with a view to giving trainees in the Training Colleges and others help in preparing Bible lessons for public schools. This action is very warmly

commended.

Attention is again drawn to the question dealing with Bible in Schools which Conference has directed to be asked at each quarterly

meeting.

At the last meeting of the Dominion Council of the League, at which all the non-Roman Catholic Churches were represented, a letter was received from the Church of Christ Conference indicating the intention to arrange during the year for an offering in support of the League from all the Churches represented in the Conference. Unanimously the Council decided to recommend similar action in a request to the governing bodies of all the Churches. The value and importance to the Churches of the organising and educational work of the League is recognised in this request. The initiative of the Associated

Churches of Christ, which was unsought by the League, has already

borne fruit in offerings made.

No further action has been taken by the Minister of Education with respect to a proposed Conference; the League is ready to respond when called on; meanwhile the status quo is retained with respect both to instruction and observances.

Services in the month of May in the interests of religious education were widely held, and exceedingly fine Press reports were fur-

nished in many of the main centres.

6. Church Union.

A BASIS FOR THE UNION OF THE METHODIST CHURCH AND THE CHURCHES OF THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF NEW ZEALAND.

The following basis was worked out by a joint committee of Congregationalists and Methodists. The joint committee approved the basis, which was then adopted by the Public Questions Committee. The Churches of the Congregational Union will be considering the basis simultaneously with the Methodist Church.

I.—The Methodist Church and the Churches of the Congregational Union agree that the following Brief Statement of Faith is a suffi-cient basis of doctrine and that they do assent to the same, taking due account of the reservations expressed in the Preamble.

"Brief Statement of Faith."

Preamble:

(a) From the Methodist Point of View:

Whilst recognising that no Statement can declare all the truth of God, we seek briefly to express, for the instruction and guidance of our people, the doctrines of the Evangelical Faith held by the Methodist Church of New Zealand. Though Methodism has its own characteristic features of doctrinal emphasis (see section 8 below), based on Wesley's Notes on the New Testament, and the forty-four Standard Sermons, it cherishes its place in the Church Universal, within which it shares loyal acceptance of the fundamental truths of the historic Creeds. It is realised that, although the truth of God is eternal and unchanging, no human interpretation of it can be final. This Statement of Faith is sent forth with the prayer that the Holy Spirit may continue to enlighten the Church more fully concerning the mind and will of God and the meaning of His Gospel of Redemption.

(b) From the Congregational Viewpoint:

Congregationalists, whilst loyal to the faith "once for all delivered unto the saints," have always claimed the liberty to re-state the Gospel in the light of modern knowledge, and to present it in such terms as shall commend itself to the modern mind.

Believing that "the Lord has yet more light and truth to break forth from His Holy Word," Declarations of Faith have

been made from time to time for the guidance of believers, and as a current expression of the teachings of Holy Writ.

The following Statement of Faith, whilst not to be looked upon as having the binding force of a Creed, is nevertheless an acceptable Declaration, and grateful acknowledgment of the services rendered by the Methodist Church, in this expression of the Christian Faith, is hereby made.

1. God.

There is one living and true God, Eternal and Almighty; Maker, Preserver and Sustainer of the Universe, and its Sovereign Lord. He is present everywhere, and is perfectly holy, loving, wise and good. He is our Heavenly Father Who in His Grace seeks the good of all men and desires to bring them into holy and blessed communion with Himself. He is supremely made known to us in Jesus Christ our Lord.

2. The Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus Christ is the Eternal and Only-begotten Son of God. He showed Himself to be Divine by His perfect knowledge of God and man, by His sinless and perfectly holy life, by the wisdom and authority of His words, by His wonderful works, and by His resurrec-

tion from the dead.

He became man to reveal the Father, to teach men the Divine Will, to give Himself for us, and to die for our sins, in order that having risen from the dead He might destroy sin and its power, and give us life eternal. In His resurrection He triumphed over death and reigns for ever as our Forerunner, Redeemer and Lord, ever making intercession for us.

3. The Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit is personal and He is God immanent in the lives of men, seeking them for Himself, and inspiring every right desire and every effort after goodness, truth and beauty. In and through the Holy Spirit the Risen Christ continues His work for and within men. The Holy Spirit enables us to repent and to exercise faith in Christ as Saviour. He bears witness within our own human spirit that we are the children of God. He enables us to know and to do the will of God. He helps us in prayer, cleanses us from sin, and fills our hearts with love to God and to our fellow-men.

4. The Holy Trinity.

We worship and adore One Triune God, Who is revealed in the New Testament as Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

5. Man and Sin.

God created man a spiritual being in the likeness of Himself. He bestowed upon him freedom and responsibility, that, regarding his life as a trust from Him, he might know, love and serve Him and thus enter into eternal fellowship with Him. The life of Jesus reveals man's true nature and God's will and purpose for him.

Sin is disobedience, in thought, word or deed, to the will of God, and alienates man from Him. All men need the saving grace of God. They are able neither to save themselves nor to fulfil the Divine purpose for which they were created, unless they repent and receive the forgiveness and all-sufficient aid of God.

6. Salvation in Christ.

All men being alienated from God by sin, He seeks in His grace to bring them into reconciliation with Him. In Jesus Christ He offers the gift of salvation, which is deliverance from the guilt and power of sin and admission into the free and full life of the family of God. This gift is appropriated by man through repentance and faith. To repent is to be truly sorry for sin and to seek forgiveness from God with steadfast purpose to sin no more. Saving faith is trusting in Jesus Christ alone as our Saviour, and the full acceptance

of Him as Lord and Master of life. Regeneration, or the New Birth, whereby we become new creatures in Christ Jesus, Assurance, whereby we are conscious of being the children of God, and Sanctification, whereby we grow in the likeness of Christ, are the work of His quickening and indwelling Spirit.

7. Revelation and the Holy Scriptures.

In nature, in conscience, and in history, God has ever been revealing Himself to the children of men. In the sacred Scriptures of the Old and the New Testaments is found the inspired record of God's unfolding revelation of Himself given to mankind, and perfected in Jesus Christ, in Whom His purpose of redemption is fulfilled. The Divine Revelation found therein is the supreme rule of faith and practice. The authority of the Scriptures rests on the fact of their inspiration by the Holy Spirit, and their consequent witness to the truth of God, verified to faith in every generation by the same spirit as the authentic Word of God.

8. The Church.

The Church is the Body of Christ; and He is the only Head to whom it owes obedience. It consists of the whole company of those who accept Him as their Lord and Saviour. From infancy all children belong to Christ, and it is their right and privilege to be received into and nurtured within His visible Church, that in due course they may accept Christian discipleship and profess the same.

The duty of the Church is to worship God in Christ's Name; to set forth in its own fellowship the Christian way of living; to give loving service to mankind for Christ's sake; to proclaim the Gospel of the Kingdom to all people; and to bring every part of the life of

all men under the dominion of Christ.

In the providence of God the Methodist Church, which cherishes its place in the One Church Universal, was raised up to emphasise the truth of universal redemption by Christ; the personal experience of salvation by faith assured to the believer by the witness of the Holy Spirit; and the possibility and privilege of a Christian life made perfect in love. Its historic usages include the practice of Christian fellowship and the co-operation of the laity with the ministry in the

preaching and pastoral offices of the Church.

And also in the providence of God a Congregational Church, which cherishes its place in the Universal Church, is an organised Christian community, modelled on the order of the Primitive Church. It represents the Priesthood of all believers, and recognises within the Priesthood a variety of gifts and callings. It claims the right, under the guidance of the Spirit, to govern its own affairs, and exercises the privilege of co-operation with Sister Churches in the wider affairs of the Kingdom. It also looks forward to the time when the High Priestly Prayer of our Lord "That they all may be one" shall become an accomplished fact in Christendom.

9. The Sacraments.

The Sacraments are sacred ordinances appointed by Christ to be outward signs of inward grace and spiritual blessing, and a means of receiving the same; and are of perpetual obligation upon the Church.

There are two such Sacraments-namely, Baptism and the Lord's

Supper.

Baptism is the Sacrament of normal entrance into the visible Church of Christ. Adult Baptism involves a personal and open confession of faith in Christ as Lord and Saviour. When administered to infants, Baptism is a declaration that the child belongs to Christ, and is included in the household of faith. It is also a symbol of the goodness of God already at work as well as of the promises of His Grace to be fully realised later, through the exercise of personal faith. On the part of the parents it is a dedication of the child to God, and a promise to share with the Church in its Christian nurture. On the part of the Church it is a pledge to instruct and train the child in the doctrines, duties and privileges of the Christian religion.

The Lord's Supper is a Sacrament of thankful remembrance of Christ's death upon the Cross for the redemption of the World. The bread and the wine symbolise the body and the blood of Christ, which are spiritually received by the faithful to the strengthening and refreshing of their souls. Believers have fellowship with the living and present Christ, renew their pledges of loyalty to Him, and in Him have fellowship one with another. Normally the minister would celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, but under special circumstances authority may be given to a layman to officiate.

10. The Ministry.

The Church holds the doctrine of the Priesthood of all believers, yet also believes that in the exercise of its corporate life and worship there should be a ministry of those who are called of God to the sole occupation of proclaiming the Word, of administering the Sacraments, and of the care of souls; and who have a principal and directing part in these duties.

Those whom the Church regards as called of God, and who have given evidence, during a period of training and probation, of possessing the essential gifts, graces and fruits, then are ordained to the ministry. This ordination expresses the Church's recognition of the minister's personal call, authorises him to discharge the special duties of his office, and symbolises the bestowal of the Divine grace necessary for his life's work.

11. Public Worship.

It is the duty and privilege of God's people to meet together for public worship in the Name of Christ, especially on the Lord's Day to hear God's Word, to observe His Sacraments and to receive the bounties of His grace; to offer their gifts and consecrated service and to strengthen each other in the faith and in the practice of Christian virtue.

12. Christian Life and Conduct.

Those who are disciples of Christ prove their fellowship with Him by following the guidance of His Spirit; and thus they are enabled to fulfil their duties in every sphere of life.

Their duty to God is to worship Him gratefully and reverently; to love Him perfectly; to trust Him at all times; and continually to learn and to obey His will.

Their duty to their fellow-men is to live as those who belong to the family of God; to serve them in the spirit of Jesus Christ; to further His righteousness in every department of life, individual, social, national and international, that God's will may prevail to the uttermost parts of the earth.

A Christian's duty to himself, since life is given by God as a definite trust, is to preserve, improve and use his powers of body, mind and spirit so as best to serve God and his fellow-men and provide for his own needs, and those of his dependents.

13. The Last Things.

At a time, known only to God, Jesus will be manifest in glory, for which manifestation we should always be prepared.

The New Testament revelation assures us that God, Who alone can read the heart, judges all men by Jesus Christ, the Son of Man. In accordance with this Divine Judgment those who reject the mercy of God are separated from His favour, and those who accept His mercy enter into eternal blessedness with Him. The Christian at death departs to be with Christ, Who will change the earthly body and fashion it like unto the body of His glory. Complete and final victory over death is assured to the believer by the resurrection of Christ Himself.

At the last, when the Kingdom of Christ, through the work of His Church, is complete, we look forward to the fulfilment of the Apostolic Word that every tongue shall confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father, and that God Himself shall be all in all.

N.B.—The above Statement of Faith is based on the New Catechism of the Methodist Church, together with the doctrinal clauses in the Standing Orders of the British Methodist Conference. It is also indebted to the Short Statement of Faith issued by the Church of Scotland.

II.—The Methodist Church and the Churches of the Congregational Union agree to the following as a basis of Church Order.

1. Membership.

While believing that baptism is the symbol of admission into the Christian Church we affirm that confession of faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord is the essential qualification for full membership in the organised Church, and that it is the will of Christ that all who believe in Him should join the fellowship of the Christian Church.

2. The Meetings and Courts of the Church.

(a) The basic meeting of the Church shall be the Church Meeting of the Congregation which shall be held quarterly or monthly as thought desirable. All in full membership with the congregation shall have the right to attend, but only those who are eighteen years of age and over shall have the right to vote or to be elected to office.

The function of the Church Meeting shall be:-

- (1) To consider and if thought advisable to receive into membership such candidates as have been approved by the Elders' Meeting.
- (2) To invite through the Circuit Quarterly Meeting a minister to take charge of the work of the congregation and to initiate a change when thought desirable.
- (3) To elect from among their number the elders of the Congregation, of whom a stipulated number shall retire annually and be eligible for re-election. (There shall be three elders for the first twenty-five members of the congregation, with one additional elder for each subsequent twenty-five or part thereof up to a total of one hundred members. Thereafter there shall be one additional elder for each fifty or part thereof.)

- (4) To elect from among their number the managers of the Congregation, of whom a stipulated number shall retire annually and be eligible for re-election. (There shall be three managers for the first twenty-five members of the congregation, with one additional manager for each subsequent twenty-five or part thereof up to a total of one hundred members. Thereafter there shall be one additional manager for each fifty or part thereof.)
- (b) Elders' and Managers' Meetings:
- (1) The elders with the local preachers and such other officers as may from time to time be appointed by the Conference shall meet under the chairmanship of the minister and administer the spiritual affairs of the congregation in conjunction with the Church Meeting and the Circuit Quarterly Meeting.
- (2) The managers shall meet under the chairmanship of the minister, and administer the property and finances of the congregation in conjunction with the Church Meeting and the Circuit Quarterly Meeting.
- (c) The Circuit Quarterly Meeting shall consist of the Ministers, Local Preachers, Elders and Managers of the Congregation, and such other officers from the congregations of the Circuit as Conference may appoint from time to time. It shall have general control of the affairs of the Circuit.
- (d) The Annual District Synod shall be composed of the ministerial and lay representatives of the Circuits which comprise the district, with, in addition, representatives of certain Departments. Its business shall be the consideration of those matters which will be dealt with at the ensuing Conference, and the administration of such business as Conference shall from time to time determine.
- (e) The District Ministerial Committee shall give particular attention to the examination of Ministerial character and the examination of Candidates and Probationers.
- (f) Conference shall consist of all ministers in full connexion and of an equal number of laymen including the representatives of Departments. It shall have the power to elect its President, Vice-President, Secretary and other officers—and also the Chairmen of Districts. It shall examine and receive Candidates for the Ministry, pass Probationers, and admit into full connexion those who have fulfilled the prescribed tests. It shall appoint ministers to Circuits, have authority over its ministerial members, divide or alter Circuit boundaries, direct and control connexional funds, and in general adopt any legislation required in the interests of the Church. It shall appoint also the various committees charged with the control of the administrative work of the Church.
 - (1) The Secretary of Conference under the direction of the President of Conference shall prepare and lead the business of Conference.
 - (2) The President of Conference may be either a minister or a layman. He is appointed for one year only, but is eligible for re-election. He shall exercise a general oversight over the work of the Church.

3. The Sacraments.

The Church, believing in the principle of the Priesthood of all believers, holds that:-

- (a) Adult members are in general qualified to administer Sacraments.
- (b) For the sake of order, the Sacraments should generally be administered by an ordained minister.
- (c) Permission may be given by the Chairman of the District acting on behalf of a congregation to any member of the Church to administer the Sacraments. The Chairman of the District may also grant permission for a member of the Church to administer Communion at other gatherings.

4. The Ministry.

- (a) The Church, believing that there should be a ministry of those called of God to the sole occupation of proclaiming the Word, of administering the Sacraments, and of the care of souls, shall make the following provisions for the selection and the commissioning of ministers:—
 - (1) A Candidate for the Ministry must ordinarily be a fully accredited Local Preacher.
 - (2) The Candidate shall give general approval to the Brief Statement of Faith and to the Book of Laws.
 - (3) The Candidate shall give an account of his faith and experience and of the steps which have led him into the Christian Faith, and moved him to seek entrance into the ministry.
 - (4) That after training as shall be specified he must pass the prescribed examinations.
 - (5) The Candidate must promise that if it should come to pass that he is no longer in general agreement with the Brief Statement of Faith and the Book of Laws, he will quietly retire from the ministry.
 - (6) When a Candidate shall have fulfilled all these requirements he shall be admitted into full connexion and shall be ordained preferably with the imposition of hands. The President, Principal of the Theological College, and Secretary of the Conference, with two others selected by the President, not necessarily ministers, shall thus set him apart for his sacred office, according to the form authorised by Conference.
- (b) The following provisions shall be made for the good ordering of the work of the ministry, and of the Church:—
 - (1) A Minister or Probationer may be appointed by the Conference to any Church for any number of periods successively (the period being one of two years), providing that for a second period he is invited by a majority of those voting at the Circuit Quarterly Meeting, and for any further periods by a 2/3 majority, voting to be by ballot.
 - (2) The Superintendent of a Circuit shall be a minister in charge of a Circuit. Those of his colleagues who are in full connexion are his co-ministers, but the Superintendent shall have the ultimate responsibility for the life and work of the Circuit. He shall consider the Probationers appointed to the Circuit as under his care and guidance.

(3) The Chairman of the District shall be a minister elected by the Conference. He shall preside at Synod, and exercise a general oversight over the Circuits in his District.

5. Local Officers.

In addition to the ministers of the Church there shall also be the following local officers:—

Local Preachers

Elders and

Managers.

III.—The Methodist Church and the Churches of the Congregational Union agree to the following as a basis of Church Worship and Work:—

- (a) There shall be a wide freedom with regard to the time and manner of the conducting of the regular services of the Church. The Minister in consultation with his officials shall be responsible for the ordering of services, due consideration being paid to Conference recommendations.
- (b) Any person, man or woman, or group of persons duly approved, may conduct a service or lead a meeting of the Church.

IV.—The Methodist Church and the Churches of the Congregational Union agree that with regard to the Funds and Properties of the Churches, the following shall be the basis of Union:—

- (a) Funds and Properties:
- (1) The Congregational Church Sites Fund shall be merged with the Methodist Church Building and Loan Fund.
- (2) The Congregational Church College Fund shall be merged with the Trinity Methodist Theological College Fund.
- (3) The Congregational Jubilee Extension Fund, St. Clair Fund, and the Rout Trust shall be merged with the Methodist Home Mission and Church Extension Fund, with the proviso that the St. Clair Fund should continue to be limited for use within the Otago District and the Rout Trust within the Auckland District.
- (4) The Congregational Special Subsidy Fund shall be merged with the Methodist Contingent Fund.
- (5) The Congregational Church Superannuation Fund, Capital Account, shall be merged with the Methodist Church Superannuation Fund, Capital Account, but so that contributors to either Fund shall be entitled to benefits at a rate not less than the contributor would have received from the original fund of which he was a member and with a further recommendation that the basis of superannuation be investigated carefully with a view to fixing a new scale of benefits approved on an actuarial basis.
- (6) Church and Manse Properties: That all properties held by Trustees on behalf of either the Congregational Union or the Methodist Church of New Zealand shall in any legislation passed to give effect to union be deemed to be held as the property of the united Church, to be administered as Conference shall decide.

- (b) The Property of the Church:
- (1) All properties of all sorts shall be the possession of the Church and shall within each Synodal District be under the general control of a Board set up by the Synod.
- (2) Subject to the general rules of the Church, Synods shall, through their Boards, administer the property of the Church, and the finances of revenue-producing Church properties within their boundaries, the proceeds to be used in the first instance for the work of the Church in the Synodal Districts, subject to the approval of Conference.
- (3) Circuits shall through the managers of their respective congregations be responsible for their own finances and for the care and upkeep of the Church buildings of the Circuit other than revenue-producing properties.

V.—Overseas Missions.

The Methodist-Congregational Church of New Zealand shall support the work, both:

In the Solomon Islands now being sustained by the Methodist

Church of New Zealand

And the London Missionary Society's activities at present being assisted by the Congregational Churches in New Zealand.

The income of the Methodist-Congregational Church for Overseas

Missions shall be apportioned in the following manner:-

The average income for Overseas Missions received by the Methodist Church and the Congregational Churches respectively for the immediate past ten years shall be ascertained. The ratio of respective average income shall then be worked

out.

The total annual income shall then be divided in this ratio between the work in the Solomon Islands and the London Missionary Society accordingly.

VI.—The Methodist Church and the Churches of the Congregational Union agree with regard to the following:—

- (a) Hesitant Members within the Congregational Union: That the basis of union and any legislative provisions to give effect thereto should be such as would enable any Congregational Church, which at the time of union is unwilling to come into the united church, to join the united church later by some simple notification of its assent and by bringing in to the united church its assets and properties and so that such a Church shall then be deemed to have been a member of the united church from the date of union.
- (b) Name: That for a time at any rate both the names "Methodist" and "Congregational" shall be preserved in the united church, which should therefore be known as the Methodist-Congregational Church.

RESOLUTIONS.

That the Report be received.

That Section A (1) Prisons be adopted and the matter referred back to the Committee for further consideration.

Bible in Schools.—Conference requests the Bible in Schools League to explore the possibility of having passages of Scripture printed in the School Journal.

Representatives to the Dominion Council of the Bible in Schools League to be:—The President of the Conference (ex officio), Revs. Percy Paris, R. B. Gosnell, W. Grigg, and M. A. Rugby Pratt.

Sunday Observance.

We record our profound concern at the growing secularisation of the Lord's Day. Believing that the testimony of science and human experience demonstrates the need and economic necessity of a weekly day of rest, we urge upon people everywhere to safeguard this privilege which historically has proved of such tremendous value to the nation and to the individual. Remembering also that man is essentially a spiritual being, we declare it to be a national and personal duty to preserve and to encourage the sacred use of Sunday as a day of worship, and to dis-countenance all activities that tend to destroy its sanctities and profane its priceless privileges.

Gambling.

This Conference views with grave concern the widespread increase and encouragement among young and old of all forms of gambling. Believing it to be essentially unethical, anti-social and uneconomic, it calls upon Christian people to

(a) Discourage all attempts to maintain and extend facilities

for gambling of whatever kind.

(b) Refrain from participation in betting, Art-Unions, Lotteries,

Sweeps, Raffles, and the like.

(c) Demonstrate by precept and personal example those ideals of Christian Stewardship revealed to us in the New Testament.

Church Union.

- 1. The Conference declares its conviction that it is the will of God for His Church in this age that she should seek to express her inner unity in Christ Jesus in terms unmistakeable to the world, and also that she should use her resources in a manner that will transcend all denominational rivalry and best promote the interests of the Kingdom of God. We rejoice in the growing unity and mutual understanding manifest among Christian people, and declare our readiness to co-operate heartily in any effort initiated with a view to bringing about a measure of Church Union with the Presbyterian or other Churches.
- Should the response of the Presbyterian and/or the Congregetional Church, through their Chief Courts, be favourable to the approach of the Conference, the initiation of a movement towards union should at an early date have the approval of the Local Church Courts.
- Church Courts.

 3. The following be the Committee on Church Union:—The Chairman of North Canterbury District, the Connexional Secretary, Revs. R. Dudley, J. H. Allen, F. B. Lawrence, A. O. Harris, H. E. Bellhouse, G. R. Harris, Wesley Parker, Messrs H. de R. Flesher, C. H. Perkins, W. C. Francis, P. A. Le Brun, J. E. Purchase, H. Chapman, M. Kershaw, L. G. K. Stevens, F. Thompson, and H. Holland. Corresponding Members: The President of Conference, Dr. Laws, Revs. E. D. Patchett, W. G. Slade, P. R. Paris, O. E. Burton; and the Vice-President, Messrs. J H. Blackwell, J. C. Tietjens, F. H. Forge, H. E. Pacey, G. H. B. Lill, H. J. Savage, G. S. Gapper, and J. Stanton. Convener: Rev. W. A. Burley.

MANIFESTO ON PEACE AND WAR

The following statement is the outcome of the consideration of the subject in the spirit of Christian love, goodwill and conciliation between those of differing convictions and in that spirit it should be read and understood throughout the Church.

Statement on Peace and War.

The Conference of the Methodist Church of New Zealand, now in annual session, realises and accepts the responsibility of expressing its mind about ethical aspects of the present international crisis. The constraint to do so arises, in part, from the fact that the Conference is the only body entitled to speak with authority to and for the membership of the Christian denomination it legally represents, but still more from its solemn sense of accountability to God for its every

corporate utterance, especially at so critical a time.

Inwardly moved thus, the Conference hereby records its distress at the outbreak of war, its abhorrence of deeds betokening a pagan and brutal disregard of human rights, and its longing for a just and lasting peace. It attests also its eagerness that the Church it represents should serve to the utmost the worthy purpose of bringing about this peace. This it affirms in full assurance that the whole British Commonwealth, including this Dominion, is in grave peril; but it is equally convinced that the welfare of all peoples, without exception, is at stake. Foremost in the apprehension of the Conference is the possible loss of something greater than any separate national existence. Acts of violence and aggression of the Nazi Government, hostile to principles and tenets dear to Christian men and women, threaten the very existence of the social structure that gives opportunity for the development of democratic institutions, promotes freedom of thought, permits spiritual culture, and encourages international fraternity. Domination by menacing forces would mean a grave setback to Christian civilization and to the Kingdom of God.

That this civilization is yet immature, this Kingdom only partially established in human habits of life, adds to the terrible risk of widespread and prolonged injury to be suffered by all peoples.

The Conference is approvingly aware that greatly patient and self-sacrificing efforts were made to avert war. Their thoroughness, coupled with their sad and tragic failure, provides to-day an irremovable reason for turning aside from that resultless road. To tread one far more rough and rugged has become inevitable, if a real peace

is to be attained.

Unfeignedly deploring the necessity for ordeal by arms, with all the ills that this involves, the Conference re-asserts its love of peace, its faith in eventual good, and its readiness to welcome a return to worthier means of overcoming occasions of international clashes of policy. It endorses the declaration of the President of the British Methodist Conference: "In resisting force by force it does not mean that we have lost faith in the ultimate triumph of justice and righteousness, or that we have renounced our readiness to take counsel with other nations; but no headway can be made unless there is readiness on both sides, with the assurance that truth will be respected and treaties remain inviolate.'

In explicit extension of that statement, the Conference registers its belief that the British Empire, while far from perfect, has preeminently served the growth of free institutions in the world, and that it remains an indispensable unit in the defences of these essentially Christian elements in any adequately good social fabric. For our Empire to falter in its fidelity to them in this crisis would be inexpressibly shameful as well as decisively damaging to the cause of human freedom.

Therefore the Conference declares its loyalty to the British Crown and Commonwealth, gives thanks for the Christian life and example of Their Majesties our King and Queen and is grateful that British statesmanship in all political parties, after arduous endeayours to maintain international peace, is united in taking the only

honourable course left.

As to our own country, the Conference agrees with the Prime Minister in his summary of the position. "New Zealand is at war," he has lately said, "because there was no honourable alternative. God knows we did not want it, any more than our partners of the British Commonwealth, or France, or Poland wanted it. But it came, and we had to face up to it or be utterly shamed, and later, as we should

have deserved, destroyed."

In view of certain pacifist propaganda with which the name of the Methodist Church has been unwarrantably associated, the Conference deems it necessary to say that this propaganda contravened the resolutions of previous Conferences, which, so far from adopting pacifist views, counselled dispassionate study of the question but pursued the practice of appointing chaplains under military authority and has consistently approved the League of Nations. In this present war Conference asks that members of the Methodist Church, who, for conscientious reasons are unwilling to bear arms, should have their religious convictions respected and safeguarded, but recognises that all men should be willing to render some form of alternative service to the country in whose privileges of citizenship they share.

Conference sets a high value upon the right of freedom of speech, but repudiates any interpretation of the phrase that would cover unbridled speech. It recognises the right of the State to ban subversive utterance, and dissociates itself from any instances of this that may seem to implicate the Church. While jealously guarding freedom of speech, Conference directs that our pulpits and Church organisations shall not be used as recruiting agencies nor for propaganda encouraging young men to refuse war service.

While recognising that in our Church, differences of opinion on even major issues will exist, Conference urges all preachers, teachers and Bible Class leaders to use moderation and restraint in the exposition of their particular views in the pulpit, and in Church organisations, faithfully exercising their privilege of ministering to the spritual needs of individuals and families who may be divided on

such issues.

Conference draws attention to the ordination vows of ministers under which they pledge themselves to set forth as much as lieth in them quietness, peace and love among those committed to their charge, and counsels them and all our people to observe the duty of Christian love and fellowship so as to hold the Church in unity in order that it may most effectively promote the cause of the Kingdom of God.

These resolutions are based on the following principles:-

- (1) The Application of Christian teaching to particular situations is subject to human errancy in that
 - (a) the teaching may be wrongly interpreted;
 - (b) the particular situation may be wrongly analysed;
 - (c) the teaching may be erroneously applied;

(d) the whole mental process involved may be twisted by subtle personal factors.

In view of this human liability to err, Conference enjoins upon all Christians the necessity of recognising that, however conscientious a particular personal application of the teaching of Christ may be, it nevertheless may not represent "the mind of Christ." Furthermore the Church should be slow to declare as its "mind" any such particular application.

(2) Conference maintains that the central task of the Church is to make Christians rather than social programmes; and it is the genius of the Church to create—upon the basis of the Fatherhood of God, the brotherhood of man and man's common need of salvation—a fellowship of men and women who though holding divergent views on social questions are yet one in worship. It is in this wide-based fellowship, nurtured by the Church alone, that the hope of peace and world brotherhood lies.

In harmony with these principles Conference enjoins upon those

conducting public worship:-

- (a) The duty of creating a fellowship of human souls in the presence of the Father, God, who loves all, judges all, and to whom all men must come in penitence.
- (b) The need of expounding personal applications of the teaching of our Lord to issues, still controversial among Christians, in such a way as to preserve this unity of worship.
- (c) The great undesirability of the pulpit being identified with the partisan advocacy of any particular social plan.
- (d) The unfairness of urging personal views on controversial questions when no discussion is possible and where the majority of those in the congregations desire to be led in worship.

That copies of this resolution be printed and distributed to Ministers, Home Missionaries, Bible Class Leaders, Sunday School Teachers, and the members of the March Quarterly Meetings.

B.—IMMIGRATION.

During the year we received notification of several Methodist families coming to the Dominion. These have been welcomed at the ports, and visited by ministers in the circuits where they have settled.

The war will interrupt immigration, and also make impossible the arrival of Jewish and other refugees.

QUESTION XXXVI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Church and other Properties?

A .- GENERAL REPORT ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Interim Report of General Secretary.

Schedule forms for property and trust returns were issued to all circuits and home mission stations throughout the Dominion on 1st September. The forms were, in every case, accompanied by very clear instructions for both treasurers and auditors so as to facilitate the work of the District Secretaries for Church Property.

To assist local trust treasurers particulars were filled in showing:

- 1. The balance brought forward last year.
- 2. Money reported last year as being held for special purposes.
- Details of the amounts of insurance cover held in the Connexional Fire Insurance Department.
- Mortgage debts to the Loan Fund and other lenders as shown in last year's returns.

In some cases last year trust treasurers reported a wrong amount as owing to the Loan Fund. In these cases a slip was attached to the schedule form showing what the correct amount should have been. No doubt the various District Secretaries will follow up this action by making a careful comparison of the amounts returned this year with the amounts that appear on the district summary of current loans which has been supplied to the various Synods. These summaries show the exact relation of trusts to the Loan Fund as at 30th September.

Considerable trouble has been taken to assist all trust treasurers to send in correct and consistent returns. This simplifies the work alike of local treasurers and auditors and should reduce the labours of the District Secretaries.

 - (c) In the bonds, debentures, or other securities of any Municipal Corporation or County Council, or Water Supply Board, or River Board or Road Board or Town Board or Electric Power Board in New Zealand having authority to borrow money.
 - (d) On deposit in any bank carrying on business in New Zealand under authority of any Act of General Assembly, or in the Post Office Savings Bank established under "The Post and Telegraph Act, 1908," or in any savings bank constituted under "The Savings Bank Act, 1908."

For further particulars consult the "Trustee Act, 1908."

B.—CHURCH BUILDING AND LOAN FUND.

Report for 1939.

During the financial year ended 30th September, 1939, the amounts received in repayment of loans totalled £2856/7/6. The loans current at the date of the annual balance aggregated £21,433/2/8.

Loans Repaid.

The following loans have been fully repaid:—Helensville Church, Rototuna No. 2 loan, Te Awamutu parsonage, Dannevirke school, Templeton Church, Kaiapoi Church, Hawarden parsonage, Invercargill Central Church, and Otautau parsonage. Rototuna, Kaiapoi and Invercargill Central are to be congratulated on repaying their loans some years before maturity dates.

Re-arrangements and New Loans.

Loans have been re-arranged with the trusts at Hastings, Somerfield Street (Christchurch), Timaru (Banks Street), and Dundas Street (Dunedin). New loans have been advanced as follow:—Beach Haven Hall £150, Kaitaia Church £400, Rotorua £500, Gonville £600, Marton £225, Taihape £50.

Loans Now Current.

The following table shows the loans current in each District and the liabilities to the Fund in respect of loans and working expenses as at the date of the annual balance. In some cases payments have been made after the close of the books for audit.

Sites Fund.

During the year the following grants have been made from the Sites Fund:—Kerikeri £25, Youth Department £75, Otakou £50.

Auckland District.

Devonport is reducing its liability and a further loan will be advanced when funds are available. The Vauxhall liability is also being reduced from time to time. Mangere East is the only other loan calling for special comment.

South Auckland District.

Generous offers were made to Opotiki trust in respect of their loan. The scheme was supported by the Home Mission Board but has not yet been accepted by the trustees, who are making small reductions of liability.

Taranaki-Wanganui District.

All trusts in this District are reducing their liabilities excepting Marton, which has defaulted in its undertaking since the loan was advanced at the beginning of the year. Correspondence with the circuit has failed to elicit any reply.

Hawke's Bay-Manawatu District.

Gisborne has made no payment in reduction of loan since 1936. A new scheme has been inaugurated in which provision is being made to discharge the loan liability. Wairoa has been offered generous terms for an increased guaranteed loan to pay off interest-bearing debt. The trust has made no recent attempt to take advantage of its opportunity nor has it replied to relative correspondence. Other loans are satisfactory.

Wellington District.

Hataitai trust has made a recent payment in reduction of arrears.

Nelson District.

All loan obligations are being met. The Flaxbourne Church site should be taken over by Blenheim trust.

North Canterbury District.

In this District all loans are being regularly paid.

South Canterbury District.

Only one loan is current in this District and instalments are being paid regularly.

Otago-Southland District.

Dundas Street loan has been satisfactorily re-arranged. A similar arrangement has been approved for Caversham whereby the unpaid balance of current loans will be consolidated with a further new loan. A generous offer to assist St. Clair to pay off its interest-bearing debt has been made in co-operation with the Home Mission Board. The solution of this long-standing problem is now dependent upon acceptance by the trust and by the circuit quarterly meeting of the easy conditions laid down by the Committee and by the Home Mission Board.

Natural Calamities Fund.

The Committee has given its approval to the following grants from the Natural Calamities Fund:—Port Chalmers £60, Woodville £30, Manaia £20, Caversham £15.

Church Architecture.

The Committee has continued its efforts to encourage improved standards for Church buildings and has made suggestions to various trusts in regard to exterior appearance and internal arrangements. Requests have been made to trustees and others to lodge with the Committee plans and photographs of attractive buildings, but the response has been very disappointing.

Committee for 1940.

The following are nominated as the Committee for next connexional year:—The Connexional Secretary, the Chairman of North Canterbury District, the Rev. Edward Drake, the Superintendents of the Durham Street, Christchurch East, Cambridge Terrace, Riccarton and St. Albans circuits, together with Messrs. H. de R. Flesher (Lay Treasurer), W. Simpson, R. W. Brighting, J. H. Kidd, H. J. S. Harrington, R. Laine, S. Sayers, E. H. Down, and H. Blackwood.

The Synods are asked to nominate the District Property Advisory

Committees for the next connexional year.

Returns for Land Tax Department.

The Commissioner of Taxes has written asking that all boards of trustees be notified that in all cases where the unimproved value of land held by each church exceeds £500, returns of land must be furnished every year even though they may be exempt from the payment of land tax.

Sales, Leases and Mortgages Sanctioned.

N.B.—The sanction given by the Committee for the sale or extended lease of properties will lapse if not acted upon by 31st March, 1941. The Committee has given its sanction to the following:-

I.—Sales.

- Newmarket.—11 perches for £1,000. Net proceeds to be held in trust by the General Purposes Trust Board. Allocation to be determined later by Committee in consultation with the trustees.
- Arch Hill.—22 perches for not less than £325. Proceeds to be held in trust by General Purposes Trust Board and applied as Committee may hereafter approve. Trustees requested to submit proposals preferably for capital expenditure for extension work.
- Mount Albert.—Front section £250, back section for not less than £300.

 Proceeds for parsonage reconstruction.
- Onehunga.—Further section for £135 but only on condition that the whole proceeds together with £100 from the proceeds of sale of Lot 4 shall be sent as directed by last Conference (Minutes, 1939, page 76) to Connexional Office to be held in trust by General Purposes Trust Board for future developmental work in Onehunga circuit as may hereafter be approved by the Committee. The trustees are also desired to outline a definite programme for future years as requested by the Committee in July, 1938.

- Waitara Beach.—Two sections for not less than £20. Proceeds to be held by General Purposes Trust Board for parsonage building fund.

 - (b) Parsonage property for not less than £1,000. Proceeds first to liquidate Loan Fund debt, balance towards cost of new or renovated parsonage, school and church at Ormond Road and Fox Street.
 - (c) Bright Street property for later proposals.

- Dannevirke.—10 feet of parsonage land for not less than £30, such sum to reduce debt to Loan Fund.
- Ashhurst.—1 rood 13.61 perches and cottage for not less than £300.

 Proceeds for new parsonage.
- Karori.—20.3 perches for not less than £750. Proceeds to liquidate debt on remaining property.
- Whiteman's Valley.-Section for £5.
- Plimmerton.—5.2 perches to Public Works Department for £20.

 Application of proceeds to be decided later by Committee in consultation with trustees.
- Otaki.—2 roods 2 perches for not less than £75 net. £50 must be lodged in trust with General Purposes Trust Board for erection of building at Otaki Beach or elsewhere in Otaki circuit as the Committee may hereafter approve. Balance may be applied to re-imburse circuit for rates paid in recent years.
- Blenheim.—(a) Dedication of two corners to Borough Council.

C.—REPORT OF CUSTODIAN OF DEEDS AND AUTHORISED REPRESENTATIVE.

During the year the Custodian has received deeds for property at the following places:—Mission Bay, Kaitaia, Kawhia, Kerikeri, Te-Kohanga, Whakatane, Morrinsville, Gonville, Waitara, Waitara Beach, Island Bay, Greymouth, Addington and Otakou.

The Kaikohe deeds are not yet to hand, although a condition of the grant from the Sites Fund was that this deed must be lodged with the Custodian. Many deeds are held by solicitors and by church officers where no mortgage requirements need to be fulfilled. Such documents should be secured by the trust officials and forwarded to the Custodian for safe keeping.

Changes in the trusteeship affecting 103 trusts have involved the registration of 281 new trustees and the removal of 277 from the Register of Trustees. Some trustees recently registered were elected several years ago. It should be known that no person may legally act as a trustee until the Authorised Representative has issued a certificate of registration. The following summary gives details of changed personnel of the trusts affected.

1.—THE PROBERT TRUST BOARD OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF NEW ZEALAND.

Report for the Year Ending 31st October, 1939.

The Board have to report that the result for the year has been satisfactory.

Owing to the reduction in rates of interest referred to in last Report and a surplus of Income from Properties, the Board has been enabled to expend close upon £1,000 on necessary renovations. The work has been confined to the exterior of the buildings, principally the roofs of the large blocks.

The Board regret to report the death of Mr. John Veale, who passed away on the 20th March last.

2.—PRINCE ALBERT COLLEGE.

Report for Year Ending September, 1939.

In presenting our Report it is satisfying to state, that at the end of the year, the Balance Sheet will show that the whole of our indebtedness by Mortgage will be paid off.

We feel again we must express our indebtedness to the early Ministers and Missionaries, who, in order to meet the urgent need of education for their children as well as those of the early Colonists, in the year 1848 purchased land in Upper Queen Street for the sum of £430 and built a substantial College, and in the following year bought a larger area for £532. The College was carried on by the Ministers with the aid of a number of laymen, and in 1855 the property was transferred to Trustees for the sum of £3,720.

The work was carried on under financial difficulties, and in 1864 the debts amounted to £5,689. In the year 1865, they sold by auction portions of land for £9,830. The total area not only included the land now held, facing Turner and Queen Streets, but extended past Lawry Street and along City Road to Symonds Street. The minutes show that land was sold to a Mr. Pardington and was presumably that on which the present windmill was erected.

However, as the number of pupils had dwindled to 44 in the year 1868 the College was closed, and was used until 1894 by various tenants, including the Board of Education for Higher Education

Purposes.

The Trustees made generous grants to several Church Trusts, including both High Street and Pitt Street Churches, also to the Three Kings College, which had been closed by the difficulties of the Maori War and was re-opened thanks to the grants and also a subsidy of £150 for several years. Here students were trained both for

Maori and European work.

In 1893 Conference appointed a Higher Education Committee to consult with the Trustees, and on February 12th, 1895, the College was opened with 5 boarders and 33 day pupils, Mr Thomas Jackson, M.A., from Romford, England, being appointed master. Among the first students we note Rev. J. W. Burton, General Secretary for Foreign Missions in Australia; Rev. M. K. Gilmour, private student, and Rev. A. B. Chappell, transferred from Three Kings. The Trustees not only gave the land and buildings, but made a grant of £1,000.

A gymnasium was built, and in January, 1896, the Girls' College was erected and an enlargement of the Boys' College decided on. This was carried out and an extra storey added to the girls'

department in 1897.

By 1898 no less a sum than £8,100 had been expended and the indebtedness was £7,180. In 1904 the financial position caused considerable anxiety and it was suggested the property be sold. In 1906, the Board of Governors stated they were not able to continue the College, and the college was closed at the end of that year, the loss for the year being £500. They pleaded the heavy debt, the position of the College being unsuitable, and the indifference of Methodists as a whole to realising the importance of supporting the

only Methodist College in New Zealand.

The Trustees refused the only offer of £12,500, and in 1907 the two buildings were leased to a Mrs. Bolt for £546 per annum. In the same year a lease was given to the late Mr. Neville Newcombe for the whole property at £696 per annum for 50 years from January 1st, 1908. The lease provides that in November, 1957, a valuation shall be made of the buildings and improvements, and the Lessee shall be paid the amount of the value, less the sum of £5,000 to be allowed for the College buildings. At the end of 1907 liabilities on Mortgage and overdraft amounted to £8,743 6s. 0d. In the year 1937 with 20 years to run to terminate the lease, Mr. Newcombe's son submitted a proposal to the Trustees for them to purchase his interest in the property for the sum of £33,000. After careful consideration the Trustees declined, giving as a reason, with others, "That the sum asked was altogether too high, taking into consideration the value of the buildings and depreciation in past as well as future years."

In presenting our balance sheet this year, we show that all indebtedness will end with this year, that we have met all charges as well as giving considerable assistance to the Dunholme, Wesley, and

Trinity Colleges amounting to £4,390. The Trustees are compelled now to conserve their funds in view of claims to be met on termina-

tion of the lease.

The Annual Meeting of Trustees was held on October 25th, and after careful consideration of the financial position it was realised that the funds would need careful administration in view of payments to be made to the Lessee at end of lease, and a Financial Committee consisting of Rev. E. T. Olds, Messrs. J. Stanton, G. A. White, and J. W. Shackelford was appointed.

3.—THE JAMES AND MARTHA TROUNSON BENEVOLENT FUND TRUST BOARD.

Report for the year ending December 31st, 1939.

The Board has met as business has required during the year. and given careful consideration to the various applications for assistance. It has also given a careful review to every grant made so as to assure itself of continued need in each case.

The Statement of Receipts and Expenditure shows that the sum of £307 13s. 8d. was disbursed in grants, and at the end of the year there was a balance in hand of £226 8s. 4d.

4.—THE BOARD OF THE WELLINGTON METHODIST CHARIT-ABLE AND EDUCATIONAL ENDOWMENTS.

Annual Report for Conference for the year ended 31st, December, 1939.

In presenting its report, the Board wishes to thank all those who have assisted in its work during the past year, and in particular would place on record its appreciation of the untiring work of Miss Allan, Matron of the Masterton Children's Home, and her assistants. and of Dr. Pryor, the Honorary Physician to the Home.

Masterton Children's Home.

We are thankful to report continued progress at the Home, full particulars of which will be found set out in the report submitted by the Local Committee. We recognise the splendid work done by the Committee and ask the Conference to re-appoint them.

Receipt of an anonymous gift of £210 to the Home, and Bequests totalling £647 2s. 10d. are gratefully acknowledged. These amounts have been transferred to the Capital Account of the Home, which

now stands at £6,394 3s. 5d.

Joint Appeal and Maori Girls' School.

The Board has spent considerable time during the year upon the projected scheme for a Maori Girls' School in Taranaki. Grateful acknowledgement is made of the services rendered to the Board by the Rev. A. J. Seamer, who spent several weeks inspecting possible sites. A list of the most suitable sites was submitted to the Board by Mr. Seamer, and representatives of the Board inspected the sites.

Unfortunately the war has intervened, and it appears that the main project must be postponed meanwhile. However, the Home Mission Department is now preparing an interim scheme, and the Board has promised to the Department its fullest co-operation.

Financial.

The Revenue Account for the year discloses an excess of ordinary Income of £1,123 2s. 10d. Expenses on account of the Masterton Home totalling £1,095 15s. Od. are detailed in the Account, and against this amount has been credited accumulated interest held

on behalf of the Home, £525 5s. 3d., plus interest collected for the current year, £212 9s. 0d., a total of £736 14s. 3d.

In addition, the usual grant of £360 was made to the Home Mission Department for the support of two Deaconesses engaged in Maori work, leaving a net excess of Income of £404 2s. 1d., which

has been transferred to Capital Account.

It is with regret that we have to record the death of Mr. C. E. Daniell, who has been a friend and supporter of the Home ever since its foundation, of Mr. C. E. J. Dowland, a former Trustee of the Board, and of our late Auditor, Mr. C. W. Charlesworth.

In conclusion, the Board unanimously recommends the Conference to re-appoint the Rev. Percy Paris as Chairman of the Board

for the ensuing year.

The tenant is protected by "The Fair Rents Act," so that it would be impossible to obtain possession even if it were so desired. Of the Trustees, one has died, and three have moved from Auckland. and it will be necessary to make new appointments at some future date.

7.—NORTH ISLAND REST HOUSE.

The Trustees last met on the 16th November, 1938. During the twelve months there have been no applications received from beneficiaries for the use of the cottage and the tenant, Mr. Ohlson, is still in possession at a weekly rental of 35/- per week. I am happy to report that the financial position of the Board shows a further improvement on last year. Rates, interest, insurance, etc., have all been paid and a further reduction of £25 has been made off the Mortgage debt to the Takapuna Church. The mortgage debt now stands at £610, and the Trustees of the Takapuna Church have very kindly allowed the mortgage, which is overdue, to run on at their pleasure.

The property is in need of certain repairs and I purpose to ask the Board to authorise the sum of £40 to be spent during the coming year for outside painting and interior work. This seems to be a large amount, but I can assure the Board that every penny of the amount will be required to put the cottage in satisfactory condition. Prices are being obtained for the painting work, one price of £28 16s 0d. having been submitted by Mr. R. Reid, of Takapuna. When the final prices are received I suggest that the Chairman and a small Committee be authorised to review them and to accept the

most favourable tender.

I am pleased to report that the President of the Conference has given his approval to the appointment of the Rev. W. A. Sinclair as

a Trustee of the Board.

There have been no enquiries received for the sale of the property. However, there is no doubt that the painting and interior work would have a considerable influence on a would-be purchaser, and I suggest that a special effort to quit the property could be made

with advantage after the work has been carried out.

The Board, I presume, are still of the opinion that we should continue letting the property to an outside tenant, for at present that is the only means by which the Trust can continue to pay its way. I purpose with the sanction of the Board to publish in the "Methodist Times" an occasional article regarding the Rest House and inviting voluntary subscriptions as I feel that some special effort should be made to allow the Trust to function should a sale of the cottage not eventuate. There is also the question of the replacing of the furniture to be considered in the future, and I know that the Board will appreciate the sentiments which prompt me to solicit subscriptions.

The management of the affairs of the Rest House has been a very pleasant task for me as Secretary and Treasurer for the past few years, and it would give me a great deal of satisfaction to have the Trust function as the late Rev. William S. Potter intended.

QUESTION XXXVIII.—What is the Report on Connexional Fire Insurance?

REPORT OF THE BOARD, 1939.

The statements of accounts for the year ended 31st October clearly show the position of the Fund. From all sources the income

was £3,361 1s. 0d. The Fire Loss Reserve Account, which was depleted the previous year by claims amounting to £575, was also drawn upon by the request of the Conference to the extent of £1,000 to assist the Wanganui Trust Rehabilitation Fund. This Reserve now stands at £3,565, but it is the intention of the Board to transfer £2,000 to the Accumulated Fund, to which no addition has been made for several years. The Board has resolutely set itself against building up needless or excessive reserves, but in view of the great growth of the Department prudence demands reasonable provision not only for the protection of insuring trusts but also to enable the Board to maintain or increase the past standard of grants. The Department was launched without capital in 1899. For the first twenty-seven years of its operations grants for Connexional purposes aggregated £4,290. In that period the annual distribution averaged about £160 and never exceeded £700 in any year. Since the Conference of 1927 grants, including the special appropriation for Wanganui and also £1,240 now recommended for distribution, have totalled £19,848, being an average of over £1,400 per annum.

Risks Carried.

The risks held by the Department are 962. The total is made up of 427 churches, 212 schools and halls, 171 parsonages, and 152 miscellaneous risks. These risks give a total cover of £728,203. Added to these are various insurances arranged by the Department aggregating £133,549 1s. 9d. The Board is thus interested in insurances totalling £861,752 1s. 9d., a large proportion of which is covered by re-insurance. To-day's figures show an increase of £409,143 over those of the year 1927.

Fire Losses.

The year just closed has been a fortunate one for the Department. Losses have amounted only to £7 2s. 3d., and this amount was covered by re-insurance.

Grants.

During the year grants have been paid out aggregating £2,107. There is now available, including an unappropriated balance of £89 9s. 11d. from last year, a divisible surplus of £1,248 9s. 4d. The Board emphasises the fact that grants cannot be made until the result of the operations of each year is known and until moneys are actually available for distribution. In the grants recommended below is a conditional sum of £50 to be made available if needed for the Natural Calamities Relief Fund, such Fund to be administered by the Home Mission Board in consultation with the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee for the exclusive purpose of assisting trustees of church properties in the repair or replacement or safeguarding of buildings damaged or destroyed by flood, tornado, earthquake, or similar natural calamity.

The Board recommends that grants be made to the following

Natural Calamities Fund.

Consideration of the basis of the Natural Calamities Relief Fund was deferred last year at the request of the Home Mission Board. The Rev. G. I. Laurenson has suggested that the Fund be established on the basis of a small contributory levy on the annual revenue of trusts desiring to share in possible benefits, their contributions to be subsidised from various Connexional Funds. The Board does not favour such a proposal as, in its judgement, the trusts able to contribute would be those least likely to need assistance in meeting contingencies.

The Lay Treasurer.

Colonel G. J. Smith, who has been a member of the Board ever since the Department was instituted 40 years ago, completes this year 21 years of office as Lay Treasurer. No member renders greater or more devoted service on any Connexional Committee. This Fund has had the remarkable experience of never having lost one penny of its invested capital or of its interest earnings. This enviable result, especially in the last decade of financial disturbance, is mainly due to the careful oversight of the financial operations of the Department by its Lay Treasurer, to whom the Conference and the Connexion are deeply indebted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE, 1939.

Throughout the year the work of the Connexional Office has proceeded as usual. Its activities are sufficiently outlined in the reports of the various departments administered in the office. The Committee again records its high appreciation of the work of the Connexional Secretary and his staff.

Finance.

The financial statement furnished herewith shows that the Committee has worked within its estimates. It asks for the same appropriations as last year, namely:—Church Building and Loan Fund, £220; Fire Insurance Fund, £380; Supernumerary and Allied Funds, £471; Contingent Fund, £185; "Methodist Times" Fund, £170. Committee.

During the year one member of the Committee passed away—Mr. W. L. Thomas, who had served the Connexion usefully in many ways. The following are nominated as the Committee for the ensuing year: The Chairman of the District, the Connexional Secretary, the Superintendent ministers of the Durham Street, Christchurch East, Cambridge Terrace and St. Albans circuits, with Mr. Frank Thompson (Lay Treasurer), the lay treasurers of the Supernumerary Fund, Fire Insurance Fund, Church Building and Loan Fund, Contingent Fund, "Methodist Times" Committee, and Messrs. H. Chapman, and J. E. Purchase.

QUESTION XL.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Trinity Theological College and Hostel?

TRINITY THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE. A.—PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

- (1) The College was reopened on Monday, March 6th, with eighteen students, and also two others training for the Congregational ministry. The health of the men has been, on the whole, good. Mr. L. Greenslade was elected Senior Divinity Student and has proved a most tactful and helpful officer.
- (2) Due to leave us this year are Students Dawson, Dixon, Gilmore, Greenslade, and Winiata. All are, with their varying gifts, very good men in whom we have every confidence. It is noticeable that in Mr. Winiata we have not only the first Maori to take our full course, but also one who has with credit taken the degree course at the University.

- (3) The Hostel has been full during the year and seems likely to continue being so. A fine service for the Kingdom of God is done by our Hostel work. Mr. and Mrs. Hames have superintended this domestic side of the College life with much carefulness and considerable understanding. The Christian spirit among the Hostel men has never been higher than during this year.
- (4) At the University College the following have attended lectures:—Dixon (Philosophy II, Education II), Gilmore (Philosophy II, Education II), Winiata (Greek I), Darvill, Thomas, and Woolford (Education I and Philosophy I).
- (5) The Tutorial Work is under constant review at the regular meetings of the Board of Studies, which considers carefully the record of each student.
 - (a) The Principal has twice each week read with the Senior men important sections of the Greek New Testament, also lectured on N.T. Theology (The Teaching of the Pauline Epistles), as well as read Classical Greek with men preparing for University work. Once a week he has taught second year N.T. Greek, O.T. Introduction (Wisdom Books), O.T. Teaching (Wisdom Literature). Twice a week classes have been held in Elementary Hebrew. Also each week there has been a class in the Psychology of Religion, a new course dealing with modern studies concerning the relationship of psychology and the origin and nature of religion and such religious ideas as God, Worship, Prayer, Conversion, etc.
 - (b) Mr. Hames has settled down splendidly to his new work, and promises well for the future. Twice each week he has taught Systematic Theology (The Holy Spirit, the Church and the Sacraments, Things to Come), Junior N.T. Greek, Religious Education (The Junior class has made an elementary study of Child Life, the others have been occupied with the groundwork of Educational Psychology). Once a week he has taught Intermediate N.T. Greek, N.T. Introduction (Life and Letters of Paul; Acts), and Pastoral Theology (the duties of the minister outside the pulpit); also a fortnightly class in English Literature, as well as coaching a few men in English Composition, etc.

Both Principal and Tutor have set each term test papers in General Bible Knowledge. Mr. Hames has taken his full share of work at the Collegiate Church; the Principal, however, has only recently found himself able to do his share of the preaching. Also, they have taught classes in Elementary Homiletics and Theology to a number of Hostel men.

- (c) Dr. Laws has heard all the students preach and held the weekly Criticism Class, and also taught Homiletics to the Junior men. As this year he ceases to be a regular member of the staff, the Principal would here pay a sincere tribute to his former chief. For many years the College has been greatly enriched by the exercise of his notable gifts. A singularly endowed mind coupled with ability to impart knowledge—these have been ungrudgingly used in the service of the College. He will be missed.
- (d) Weekly collective and individual instruction in Elocution and Voice Production has been excellently given by Mr. Dennis Johns, M.A.; also, Dr. Gillie delivered a lecture on Pastoral

Work, and the Rev. C. T. Symons, M.A., B.D., one on Youth Work. It is hoped that Mr. Symons will be able every year to deliver a course of such lectures to the men. Both he and Mr. Bates are keenly interested in the training here, and we also desire to co-operate with them. The College Church Organist, Mr. L. R. Brakenrig, is a very keen student of Church Music and Hymn Tunes, and is here thanked for a series of very helpful classes on these subjects. Several notable overseas visitors have visited the College and addressed the men.

- (6) In Practical Work there has been considerable activity. From six to ten students preach every Sunday, and indications are that they are much appreciated. Senior men supplement their theoretical training in Religious Education by observing in various Auckland Sunday Schools. A number of men give voluntary service in the Y.M.C.A., Boys' Brigade, and various Bible Classes, etc. We provide workers for the various Christian societies within the University College. The Friday evening open-air service still continues. Almost all attended various Easter camps. The Collegiate Sunday School seems now, with the help of students, on the upgrade, and Mr. Hames is keenly alive to the possibilities of this development as a practical training Sunday School for the men, as also he is to the practical side of the Pastoral Theology instruction.
- (7) Reported elsewhere is the account of many gifts to the College Library and Museum, a proof of our many sympathetic friends.
- (8) On the question of Pacifism and the relation to the War, our students, like others, are divided in their opinions. Yet sound common sense and Christian charity so prevail that the fellowship is not disturbed by divisive influences. That this may continue it is thought advisable by both the staff and the students themselves that the College itself should be free from direct outside propaganda from either side. And this in order that the men may be left perfectly free to form and discuss their own opinions among themselves without pressure from external advocates eager to enter the institution.

Difficult days are ahead; and the ministry of the Christian Church with its firm faith in God will be needed more than ever. Our present

duty is simply to go on with our work.

During the year we have sustained the loss of Mr. J. Veale, who for many years gave generously in service to our Church and College. An appreciative resolution has been recorded in the Council records and sympathy conveyed to his relatives.

Resident Tutor.

The Rev. E. W. Hames, M.A., has won his way into the hearts of the students, and both in his Tutorial and Administrative Work has proved himself able and adaptive in the duties of his position. He is well and faithfully supported by Mrs. Hames, to whom we acknowledge our thanks.

Housekeeper.

This appointment has proved to be most acceptable and is working very well.

The Hostel.

The Hostel has been filled to capacity. Possibly the war exigencies may lower the number of residents. Costs of House and Services have been above assessment, due to rise in prices, but there has been an increase in fees collected, so that this position is satisfactory.

Divinity Students.

There are two Congregational and eighteen of our own men. They are a fine type, keen and eager, and give promise of becoming faithful and efficient ministers. Circuits gladly avail themselves of their services for supply and Sunday duty; they are also active in open-air work, S.S. and B.C. services, etc. Their training thus combines the practical and the academic.

Friends of Trinity College.

This scheme has been successfully launched. It is early as yet to estimate its full value, but it is noted that a number of Circuits, especially in the North, have already responded through personal gifts and a College Sunday. A list of gifts will be published later.

Refresher Course for Ministers.

This was held in the 2nd Term, and was well attended and greatly appreciated by the Free Church Ministers of Auckland and suburbs.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

Year ended 31st October, 1939.

In presenting to Conference the Annual Accounts of the Trinity Methodist Theological College, it is disappointing to have to again report a substantial deficit which, for the year ending 31st March, 1940, is estimated to be £586 13s. 11d., and but for the fact of our receiving from College Sunday and "Friends of Trinity College" the sum of £120 4s. 9d., the deficiency would have been greater by this amount.

Our thanks are due particularly to the individual donors who have so kindly responded to this appeal. Although sixty per cent. of the amount received from "Friends of Trinity College" came from one donor, the Finance Committee have been encouraged to budget for an amount of \$200 from this source next year, and feel that their trust in the individual members of our Church in giving their support to the training of our Ministers will not be misplaced.

Our thanks and appreciation are also due to the various Trust Boards and Connexional Funds who have so kindly given financial assistance to the College.

We again record our thanks to the staff for their loyal co-operation and to Rev. and Mrs. E. W. Hames, who have carried out their duties with success and sympathetic understanding.

Site Acquirement Account.

This account has benefited by an amount of £59 11s. 10d., received during the year from the Est. G. R. George, and after the payment by the General Account of Bank Interest, shows a debit balance of £4,033 11s. 8d.

New Organ Fund.

By further dividends and Bank Interest, this Fund has increased to £385 17s. 5d.

Laws, B.A., D.D., and Mr. Denis Johns, M.A., and also to Mrs. E. W. Hames for careful and economical oversight of the domestic arrangements of the College.

fruitful both for the Church and for himself.

QUESTION XLI.-What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Wesley Training College?

REPORT TO CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEY TRAINING COLLEGE TRUST BOARD FOR THE YEAR ENDED THE 31st DECEMBER, 1939.

The Board is pleased to report that the result of the year's operations shows an improvement of £545 on last year's figures, the loss of £613 made in 1938 having been reduced to one of £68 during

the year under review.

Although this result is not as good as the Board hoped to achieve, it will be recognised that many factors beyond the Board's control have operated against it during the year, and, under all the circumstances, we think the Board has been fortunate to end the year with the present result. The spectre of mounting costs, both at the College and on the Farm, is still cause for considerable anxiety, but the Board hopes with some confidence that it will be a suited by the confidence that it will be a suited by the same confidence that it will be a suited by but the Board hopes with some confidence that it will now be able at least to balance its budget each year.

During the year the Board sold to the State Housing Department 1711 acres of the Three Kings Property and 5% acres of the Mount Albert Road Property, for the sum of £25,450. The whole of this

amount has been utilised in reducing the Board's liabilities to the Bank of New Zealand. The effect of this transaction is reflected in the interest figure in the Income and Expenditure Account, which is £500 less than the corresponding figure for 1938.

In addition, during the past year, four Mount Albert Road sections and one Landscape Road section have been disposed of for

cash, the total purchase price being £1,690.

As the result of the above transactions the Board's Capital Account has increased during the year from £83,273 to £95,634, a

net increase of £12,361.

The Trustees of the late Marianne Caughey Smith-Preston havepaid to the Board a bequest of £2,000 under her will, the income of which is to be used for the purpose of providing a scholarship or scholarships at the College. The Board has prepared regulations for the award of these scholarships, and it has advertised for applicants for the three scholarships to be awarded on the results of a competitive examination. The scholarships will be granted for a period of one year, and subject to a satisfactory school record may be renewed yearly up to a period of three years, and in exceptional cases up to four years.

The Board has pleasure in reporting that the Minister of Housing and the Minister of Internal Affairs have promised to co-operate with it in the matter of commemorating the early history of the College. A proposal submitted by the Minister of Housing involves the renovation of the original chapel at Three Kings, and its preservation as nearly as possible in its original form. The proposal also includes the setting aside of a considerable area of land surrounding

the building, which would be suitably planted.

The Board regrets to report its loss through death of a valued Trustee in Mr. J. Veale, whose record as a member dated back to the incorporation of the Board in 1911. Mr. Veale rendered untiring service in the interests of Methodism and Wesley College. He held incorporation of the Board in 1911. the office of Chairman of the Board from 1924 to 1926, and was Vice-Chairman for the eight years immediately prior to the date of his death. His loss to the Board is a very real one.

The vacancy created by the death of Mr. J. Veale has been filled

by the election, subject to the approval of Conference, of Mr. Aaron Best, a well-known farmer of Bombay, as a member. The Principal has reported on the progress of the College and Farm.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT TO CONFERENCE, 1940.

It is with pleasure that we report that the past year has seen a further increase in the School roll and ninety-eight boys were enrolled. Owing to shortage of farm labour, certain parents were compelled to withdraw their sons during the year to a greater extent, yet the average number in residence was the largest since 1931. Approximately 33% of the boys in residence have been of either Maori or Pacific Island parentage, and three of the Maori boys are hoping to prepare for the work of our Ministry. Four boys have entered for University Entrance Examination, seven for the School

Certificate, and six for the Public Service Entrance Examination.

The health throughout the year has been very good and in every branch of sport the College had a most successful year. In Inter-school Competitions we have been successful in winning several

championships. During the year, Mr. P. A. Hickling, B.A., who has been on the staff since 1929, was appointed to the position of First Assistant in place of Mr. F. E. J. Baillie, who resigned to take up

a position in Te Aroha.

Mr Slade, as College Chaplain, has given valued help in many phases of the School activities during the year and the Senior boys have conducted a Bible Class voluntarily attended by about thirty of their number. The Principal has conducted a Sunday School for about twenty-five of the smaller boys.

During the year a wood-work room has been erected which will be a definite acquisition to the teaching facilities available and a sound film projector has been purchased as a further aid to the work

of the school.

On the farm we have experienced a difficult year. An unusually dry autumn was followed by a long, wet and cold winter and reserve stocks of food were entirely consumed. As a result stock did not winter as well as usual, though the output of milk was well maintained particularly in the latter portion of the year. Over 160 cows have been milked during the winter and a minimum supply of 200 gallons of milk per day was sent to Auckland. In addition approximately 800 sheep, 80 pigs, 13 horses, and 130 head of dry cattle were carried throughout the year.

It is pleasing to note that the result of the season's operations is the best that the College has yet experienced despite the unfavourable weather conditions, while the outlook for the coming year notwithstanding the uncertainties due to war conditions, is equally

pleasing.

QUESTION XLII.-What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Connexional Funds?

1.—SUPERNUMERARY FUND. Report of the Board, 1939.

As required by the regulations the Supernumerary Fund Board presents its report for the year ended 30th November, 1939, together with the various financial statements duly audited.

Annuitants and Membership.

The last Conference added six supernumeraries to the list of beneficiaries and two to the temporary list. One temporary supernumerary returned to the regular work. One supernumerary minister, one minister in the active work, four widows of supernumeraries, and also the wives of three ministers in active work died during the year. There are 36 supernumeraries and 43 widows in receipt of annuities besides two orphaned children of deceased parents. The amount paid in annuities and furniture grants was £8,685 12s. 2d. The number of ministers at present contributing to the fund is 173.

Finance.

The financial statements fully disclose the position of the Fund. The accumulated fund now stands at £154,044 6s 11d. This shows an addition to the Fund of £1,175 16s. 2d. to meet accruing demands of future claimants. The Investment Fluctuation and Doubtful Debts Reserve is now £873 14s. 2d. The Board will build up this Reserve as circumstances allow. The return from Epworth Chambers shows improvement and the Depreciation Reserve Account is being steadily built up and is now £3,350.

The Allied Funds administered by the Board now aggregate £34,863 8s. 10d. Most of the personal deposits lodged with the Board have been repaid. Mortgage investments have been reduced by £360

and debenture investments have increased by £1,052.

Earnings.

The violent financial disturbances of the last decade continue to operate against us in common with all investing bodies. After deducting £600 from interest earnings to increase our Reserves the net earnings of the Fund are £5,951.8s. 0d, being £256 13s. 7d. above the previous year. Calculated on the actuarial formula the average interest earning rate is £3 19s. 1d. as against £3 16s. 3d. for the previous year. On the accountancy method it has been £3 12s. 8d. Omitting office expenses the interest earning rate is £3 18s. 1d. Legislation restricting the earning power of capital may possibly create a regrettable necessity to reduce the present scale of benefits.

Subscriptions in Arrears.

A sum of £1,445 6s. 1d. represents overdue liabilities of ministers to the Fund. The arrears are owing by 60 out of 173 ministers. The following table shows the District distribution of arrears of personal subscriptions only.

Social Security.

The Board has given continued careful consideration to the provisions of the Social Security Act and to the possibility of making any adjustments to relate its prospective annuity benefits to the benefits assured by our own Fund. Some circuits raise the question as to the continued necessity for circuit levies. Some ministers ask if a scheme can be devised whereby accumulated funds may be disbursed and annuities reduced to such a figure as will qualify

beneficiaries to receive the maximum State benefit. It is still impossible for anybody to say just how the State scheme will function. Our own Fund does give actual social security and it provides benefits not covered by the National scheme. The right to a full share in the State scheme may be materially reduced or entirely cancelled according to the measure of the provident habits or the good fortune of contributors. On the other hand our Fund provides no means test upon superannuation. If a contributor to the national scheme dies before reaching the age of 60 no annuity benefit accrues to his dependants apart from the small conditional pension provided for indigent widows and for orphans. If the wife of a minister should die he would receive from the State only the benefits available for a qualifying widower. With our Fund in such a case there is no reduction of the annuity. If the wife of a supernumerary has not attained the qualifying age for a State pension the minister would receive an annuity of only 30s. per week. If a minister is transferred to another country he forfeits his rights to a State pension with no refund or transfer of contributions. Our superannuation benefits are not cancelled by such a removal. No minister whose income, with that of his wife, is over £4 per week can get an annuity from the State. Our annuities supplement whatever other income ministers and widows may receive. Our Fund also provides for a uniform furniture grant of £75 and it includes a branch which operates to supplement the incomes of those in necessitous circumstances. The Board has not been able to discover how our Fund can be fitted into the framework of the National scheme or how its basis can at present be altered without disastrous effects for many and without creating a grave risk of disadvantage for all. Civil servants and others continue to contribute to superannuation funds whilst paying the Social Security tax as do our ministers. Our Board in common with administrators of other annuitant schemes is watching

Purchase of Benefits by Former Home Missionaries.

The question has again been raised as to whether status in the Supernumerary Fund may be purchased in respect of prior home missionary service. This matter was determined by the Conference of 1934 (Minutes page 119). Acting on the advice of the Actuary to the effect that any purchase proposal would inevitably result in a considerable selection against the Fund itself, the Conference disapproved of the proposal and it also refrained from expressing itself on the relative value of home missionary and of ministerial service. As the purchase of additional status must always be purchased for the remotest years of service actual cases were quoted in 1934 showing that it would cost £1,630 to buy benefits for one who had served for 21 years as a home missionary; £1,144 for one who had served 15 years; £256 for one who had served three years, and £128 for one who had served two years. The cost in each case is determined by the relative periods at which home mission and ministerial service began. The Board endorses the Conference opposition to the proposal.

Retirement at 65 Years.

The suggestion has been referred to the Board that the regulations be amended to provide that a minister who is 65 years of age may superannuate without any medical certificate. This matter was considered by the Board some years ago after consultation with the Actuary. It was considered that such a change in the whole design of our superannuation scheme would create such additional demands upon the Fund that it would be deprived of an important and necessary margin of safety. The change could only be made by imposing substantial increases in circuit levies and personal contributions; by a large addition to the Accumulated Fund from outside sources; or by reduced annuities with cancellation of the present bonus additions.

Subscriptions of Probationers.

A suggestion has been made for a modification of Regulation 14 on page 140 of the Law Book so as to provide that a minister shall pay his full personal subscription as from the date of his ordination with the right within ten years to purchase benefits in respect of his probationary years. The Board opposes this proposal which in its judgment offers no real solution of the difficulties experienced by only a certain proportion of the probationers.

Benevolent Branch of Fund.

A sum of £109 0s. 10d. has been paid out in grants to assist annuitants in needy circumstances. A small further benefit has been received from the estate of Mr. J. J. B. Veale, a donation from a Wellington layman, and a grant from the Fire Insurance Board.

Home Acquirement Fund.

The aggregate amount in the personal accounts of contributors to this Fund is now £11,758 1s. 2d. Retiring allowances have been paid amounting to £906 13s. 3d. Subscriptions are now payable within six months of the due date in order to avoid forfeiture of subsidies. A sum of £51 10s. 0d. is at present in the Suspense Account.

Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund.

The financial statements show that during the year retiring allowances amounting to £1,567 18s. 1d. have been paid out. The personal accounts of continuing contributors amount to £5,462 16s. 3d. A special donation of £40 has been added to the Accumulated Funds.

Deaconess' Retiring Fund.

Retiring allowances amounting to £116 3s. 6d. have been paid out. A sum of £6,072 0s. 1d. stands to the credit of the personal accounts of contributors.

Board for 1940.

During the year the Board lost the services of Mr. A. C. Reed through retirement and Mr. S. H. Maddren was appointed with the sanction of the President to fill the vacancy. The following are nominated as the Board for the ensuing year:—The Connexional Secretary (Rev. M. A. Rugby Pratt), Revs. E. Drake, W. Grigg, W. A. Burley, G. R. Harris, and J. Richards. Messrs. G. S. Salter (Lay Treasurer), M. Kershaw, W. Dobbs, L. G. K. Steven, R. H. Miles, and S. H. Maddren.

ACTUARIAL EXAMINATION.

Mr. Percy Muter, F.I.A., who has served as our Actuary since the transfer of the New Zealand portion of the Supernumerary Fund from Australia, notified that his services were no longer available. The Board therefore engaged Mr. S. Beckingsale, F.I.A. (London), to conduct the triennial examination of the Fund. Mr. Beckingsale was supplied with the Rules of the Fund, the annual reports and statements of accounts and the classified card index giving complete information regarding present and prospective claimants on the Fund and also regarding those whose claims have expired since the previous actuarial examination. In a letter accompanying his report the Actuary pays tribute to the precise state of the records which, he says, are so complete that no request for further information had been necessary.

The valuation of the Fund three years ago showed a deficiency of £3,436 on a calculation which assumed that the average interest earning rate free of all losses would be 4 per cent. Having regard to current investment conditions Mr. Beckingsale thinks it safer to use a valuation basis of 3½ per cent. Adopting this basis a deficiency of £15,035 is disclosed and the Actuary recommends a discontinuance of the 5½ per cent. bonus now being paid to annuitants. With very great regret the Board feels compelled to approve of the adoption of the recommendation.

It should be noted that the consistent policy of the Board has been to pay to annuitants the highest benefit possible and not to build up reserves for subsequent benefits. In the Australasian Fund a sum of £57,000 has been set aside as a Contingency Reserve to be available under actuarial advice for meeting any special contingency that may arise.

The tables following this report will show the effect of the proposed discontinuance of the 5½ per cent. bonus. All annuities will still be larger than those paid by the Australasian Fund as they have been ever since 1913 although it must be remembered that contributions to that Fund are lower than in New Zealand.

It will be illuminating to put on record the progressive benefits conferred on members of our New Zealand Fund since it was separated from the Australasian Fund on 1st January, 1912.

- 1st April, 1913—Annuities were increased by 15 per cent. Second wives were admitted without extra payment.
- 1st April, 1920—Annuities were further increased by 15 per cent. being equal to another increase of 17½ per cent. on the original scale. A sum of £8000 was paid into the capital of the Fund and subscriptions and circuit levies were increased. The Conference of 1921 resolved to grant a bonus of 10 per cent. to date from 1st April, 1920. This made a total of 43¾ per cent. increase in annuities over the scale operating in 1913. The Conference also made graded increases in furniture grants.
- 1st April, 1931—Conference resolved to make the furniture grant a uniform sum of £75.
- 1st April, 1935—A new scale of annuities was adopted to remove a number of anomalies present in the original Australasian scale and also to correct some initial arithmetical errors and to provide an even gradient in benefits for annuitants. At this time a small reduction was made in annuities.

At each successive valuation of the Fund from 1917 to 1936 Mr. Muter, our former Actuary, pointed out that if the average interest earning rate of the Fund was only 4 per cent. there would be deficiencies in the Fund varying from £21,746 in 1920 to £3436 in 1936. In 1933 he said that if the Fund were valued on a 3\(\frac{3}{4}\) per cent. basis there would be a deficiency of £17,985. Mr. Beckingsale on the 3\(\frac{3}{4}\) per cent. basis to-day places the deficiency at £15,035. For many years the Fund earned more than a 4 per cent. valuation rate. A reduced interest earning rate has now been made inevitable because of legislative interference with private contracts, statutory reduction of rents and of interest, and world economic conditions.

REPORT OF THE ACTUARY.

The Board of Management,

Supernumerary Fund of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

Sirs,—In accordance with your instructions, I have valued the Supernumerary Fund as at 30th November, 1939, and have pleasure in submitting my report as follows:—

- 1. The benefits granted from the Fund are-
- (i) Annuities to members retired from active service after completion of 44 years' service or after attainment of specified ages or earlier inability to work through ill-health.
- (ii) Annuities to widows of both active and retired members.
- (iii) Annuities to orphans of members.
- (iv) A furniture grant of £75 payable on the death of a contributor or on retirement.

Members' annuities vary in accordance with their contributory service, from £43/17/9 per annum for 5 years' contributory service to £197/12/11 per annum for 44 years' service. These annuities include a bonus of $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

Widows' annuities range in the same way from £24/4/8 per annum

to £114/9/8 per annum and include a similar bonus.

Members contribute £10 per annum plus loadings increasing with age if the age at entry is 40 years or more. Each circuit or Department contributes £15 per annum in respect of each Minister appointed thereto.

3. The receipts and expenditure for the triennium are shown in the attached consolidated revenue account. The rates of interest earned by the Funds for each year were

and the average for the triennium was £3 19 6 per cent.

Having regard to current investment conditions it is probable that the rate of interest earned in future will be lower still, and for this reason I have used 3% per cent, in the valuation.

- 4. The membership of the Fund is not great enough to provide a stable experience upon which to base the valuation, and recourse has been had, therefore, in fixing the valuation basis, to the experiences of other similarly constituted funds. The results of the valuation are shown in the attached valuation balance sheet. It will be noted that a deficiency of £15,035 is disclosed. As compared with the previous valuation at 4 per cent. this deficiency has arisen from two main causes. The deficiency disclosed at the last valuation, viz. £3,436, has accumulated at interest and £10,270 has been absorbed in passing to a 3¾ per cent. valuation basis. Other sources of loss and profit were of minor importance.
- 5. The reason for making an actuarial valuation is to discover if the existing funds together with future income from all sources will be sufficient to meet the claims on the Fund as they emerge in future years. Obviously great caution must be exercised in estimating the future course of the Fund, for a deficiency arising now will, if profits do not arise in future, accumulate at compound interest and ultimately require far more drastic action than if remedial measures were adopted immediately the deficiency appeared.

For this reason I recommend that the 5½ per cent. bonus included in the annuities granted from the Fund be discontinued. This will reduce the disclosed deficiency to £3,798.

(5) That the report of the Actuary and the report of the Board thereon be received, adopted, and printed in the Minutes.

(6) That the present bonus addition of 5½ per cent, to annuities be discontinued until Conference shall otherwise determine, and that the matter be reviewed after the next actuarial examination of the Fund.

(7) That the question of the possibility of permitting the purchase of benefits in the Supernumerary Fund by ex-Home Missionaries be referred to the Supernumerary Fund Board for consideration during the year in consultation with the Home Mission Board, a report to be presented to Conference.

Under the present circumstances we are of opinion that it would

be unwise to ask Circuits for an increase this year.

5.—REMOVAL EXPENSES FUND.

Annual Report, 1939.

Removal expenses for the year amount to about £999. Levies are expected to produce approximately £1169, leaving about £165 to transfer to the Accumulated Fund, which last year was drawn on for £415, the amount by which expenses exceeded income.

The Committee dealt with 52 removals this year at an average cost of £19/4/5 per removal.

There were 15 inter-island removals involving transport by sea; excluding the figures for three single men, the average cost of these removals was £42/9/-. Sixteen married Ministers' removals, not involving sea transport, averaged £19/15/6 each. Fourteen Ordinands and Probationers were moved at an average cost of £5/6/6.

The removals were, with one or two exceptions, carried out by the Railway Department, and many favourable comments have been received on the efficient manner in which the work was carried out. In one or two instances where breakages occurred the Department promptly made good the damage or granted compensation.

An encouraging feature is the reduction in the arrears of levies, which stood at £72 in 1937, and now amount to only £36. Two Districts only are in arrears.

In anticipation of the number, and extent, of removals for 1940 being less than during the current year, the Committee recommends a reduction in the rate of levy to $2\frac{1}{2}\%$.

Maximum Weight for Removals. (Minutes, 1939, page 104.)

The Conference of 1939 remitted to the Committee the question of establishing some maximum weight of goods to be allowed for each removal. The Committee gave this matter serious study but finally decided as follows:—"That having considered this matter in all its aspects, the Committee is of the opinion that it is impracticable to fix any maximum weight to be allowed for each removal."

FOREIGN MISSION DEPARTMENT.

Annual Report, 1939.

By some, in these days, it is counted good to hold our own in affairs of the Kingdom. But year by year we, as a Foreign Mission Department, are privileged to think and work and plan in terms of Advance. This does not mean there are no disappointments, setbacks or failures. Such are frequent and at times almost heartbreaking, but in spite of them and sometimes because of them, the Kingdom of God continues to grow in the Solomons. It is with full hearts that we humbly thank Almighty God and heartily congratulate Mr. Goldie and his colleagues on the Field for the rich harvest of 1939.

With joy we report the following increases on last year's returns:—4 Churches; 6 Other Preaching Places; 10 Local Preachers;

7 Class Leaders; 30 Senior Members; 124 Junior Members; 6 Sunday Schools and 187 Scholars; 6 Day Schools, 8 Teachers, and 356 Scholars; and 480 Adherents. After 38 years' work in the Solomons, we record 5,451 senior members; 3,309 junior members; and 16,831 adherents; while 4,401 scholars are being taught by 280 teachers in 224 Schools. What great things God hath wrought!

The most vital and important question asked in the Synod is: "What is the Spiritual State of our Circuits, and can any measures be adopted to promote the Work of God therein?"

This question was answered by encouraging and optimistic reports which have been forwarded to the Board, and an outline of work for 1940 that challenges the faith and generosity of the whole Church.

It is particularly encouraging to note that results have amply justified the extension work undertaken in recent years. At Kihili, for instance, we are already seeing a gratifying development of the work made possible by the appointment of a Teaching Sister. spite of the upset caused by some severe earthquakes, the Rev. A. H. Voyce is able to report 120 students at the station where there were only 54 last year; 57 on the Kindergarten roll that began the year with 23; and an increase on the Sunday School roll from 30 to 60. Sister Ada Lee has also 42 girls in the Home, including 7 small orphans.

Another pleasing evidence of the spiritual vitality of the Native Church is its generous contribution of service and money. In spite of the fact that copra has continued at an abnormally low price throughout the year, the contributions amount to £1,705, Government grants amount to £281, and sales of produce to £189, making

the total income from the Field £2.175.

Medical.

The year has been outstanding from the point of view of medical work. Dr. Rutter's quarterly reports which have been published in the "Open Door" and "Methodist Times" indicate something of the great service being rendered. The new Clara Matilda Gorman and Samuel Gorman Wards have greatly facilitated the work at the Helena Goldie Hospital. Each ward has accommodation for 25 patients, and there have been times when one or the other of the wards has been overcrowded.

There has been an average attendance at the out-patients department of 5,626 per month . . . 157.5 per day. In addition to these remarkable figures many thousand treatments have been given by the Doctor on patrol and by European and Native workers in other parts

of the District.

During the year Dr. Rutter has carried out some important medical patrols of various parts of the District, including Choiseul and the Marovo Lagoon.

A number of native medical assistants who have been in charge of out-stations for a number of years are being transferred to the base hospital for a refresher course, while other medical trainees

take their place.

The appointment of Sister Grace McDonald to the Roviana Hospital enabled Sister Vera Cannon to take up special Medical Patrol work on Choiseul that was long overdue. Sister Vera Cannon has proved herself specially adapted for this difficult task, and Dr. Rutter and Rev. J. R. Metcalfe report very appreciatively of her work

Leprosarium.

Dr. Rutter is deeply concerned about the lepers and better facilities for their isolation and treatment. In a special resolution appreciative of the Medical Unit, the Synod urges the desirability of a Leprosarium when finances permit. Here is a great opportunity for some one or more whom God has blessed with material resources, to establish and endow a Christ-like work of cleansing the lepers.

Sanatorium.

A Sanatorium for the numerous T.B. cases is also urgently needed.

Doctor's Boat.

During the year an urgent appeal came from both the Chairman and the Doctor for permission to purchase a launch for medical work at a cost of £500. By a beautiful gift of the total sum required, and in memory of their mother, Miss Hannah and Messrs John and William Astley enabled the Board to meet the need, and the "Cicely" now speeds on her errands of mercy, and has already greatly facilitated the Doctor's work.

The Clara Matilda and Samuel Gorman Bequest.

The above brief statement of the Medical Work and its possibilities helps to a clearer understanding of the vital importance of the Special Medical Fund which was established to maintain the continuity of the work. This Fund now stands at £15,233, and of this total the Clara Matilda and Samuel Gorman Bequest has contributed £11,433. A year ago this noble bequest stood at £8,500, and it has been augmented during 1939 by four £500 Nelson City Debentures, and a block of 933 fully paid up Auckland Gas Company shares.

Once again we express our deep gratitude to Mr. Gorman and pray that his beautiful gifts may challenge others to help build up the Special Medical Fund, and thus ensure the continuity of the Ministry of Healing.

Educational.

It is impossible to over-estimate the importance of the farreaching work of our schools and colleges. Synod recorded its gratification at the favourable reports of Village Schools. There has been an increase in schools, scholars, and teachers. Although the equipment is still meagre, the teachers are receiving more assistance every year, and a gradual improvement in the quality of the teachers and teaching is evident. Good use has been made of the text books prepared especially for village schools, and a request has come to Synod for more. In some parts of our district the village schools are not very effective, and better leaders are required. On the whole,

are not very effective, and better leaders are required. On the whole, however, we have very much to be thankful for, and praise God for the extension of the work in this Department.

Excellent work is also being done at the various Circuit Training Institutions, but more care is to be exercised in the selection of trainees. Synod expressed gratitude for another splendid year of achievement at the District Training Institution, Roviana. The training of Native Teachers is one of the most important and exacting departments of our work, and the Church is fortunate in having able and devoted leaders to guide the native youth into avenues of Christian service. It is gratifying to have the assurance of a constant band of trained workers proceeding to all corners of our District from the Training Institution, and that there is no dearth of

candidates.

Valuable technical and industrial training is also being given on a number of our Stations, but this branch of the work has been hindered a good deal by commercial depression caused by the very low price of copra.

It is of special interest that two of our Roviana students, having qualified during the year, by special examination, have been sent by the Government to Suva, Fiji, for training as wireless operators, while two others have proceeded to Tulagi for the same purpose. Three of our students continue their medical training at Suva.

Staff.

Sister Ethel McMillan . . . Semi-Jubilee.

October, 1939, marked the 25th anniversary of Sister Ethel Mc-Millan's arrival in the Solomons. We thank God for the high service and loving devotion of Sister Ethel, and affectionately congratulate her upon the attainment of her semi-jubilee in the Solomons. It is fitting that the following resolution of the Solomon Islands Synod should be embodied in this Report, and it will express the mind of the Board:—

"This Synod places on its record its sincere appreciation of the twenty-five years of splendid service rendered by Sister Ethel Mc-millan in the Solomon Islands Mission District. The value of the work done by Sister Ethel cannot be fully assessed by any but the Master Himself, but the whole of the Methodist Church in New Zealand and the Solomon Islands joins in expressing its gratitude to Almighty God for her twenty-five years of self-sacrificing labour, so gladly given to the women and children of the Solomons, and so richly owned and blessed by Him. Sister Ethel's devotion to her work, her loyalty to Christ and His teaching, and her loving unselfish care for her dark-skinned people have borne throughout the years a rich harvest of souls won for God, and she will ever live in the hearts of the many she has been the means of saving. We pray that Sister Ethel may be enabled to continue her great work for yet many years."

After 18 years able and devoted work the Rev. A. H. Cropp has returned to the home work. For the greater part of that time Mrs. Cropp has also devotedly shared in the work at Buka. We congratulate them upon the high service they have been enabled to render, and thank God for the success that has attended it.

The Rev. C. T. J. Luxton, appointed last Conference to Buka, has, with Mrs. Luxton, received a very warm welcome, and made an excellent start with his missionary career.

After completing her nursing training, Sister Grace McDonald was re-appointed by the last Annual Meeting of the Board and was warmly welcomed at Roviana. Her appointment to the Head Station made possible the transfer of Sister Vera Cannon to Choiseul.

We report with gratitude Mrs. Voyce's recovery from serious illness, and the comparatively good health of all the other mission householders.

Property.

Houses.

Exceptionally heavy capital expenditure has been involved during the past year for houses and boats. For 18 years our European workers at Bougainville and Buka have lived in native or semi-native, houses and, in consequence, are greatly appreciating the permanent. homes recently completed at Kihili and Skotolan. A two-roomed cottage has also been erected at Gizo and has already proved of great convenience to our Missionaries visiting that part. The cost of these three buildings to date is £2,182, and painting, etc., will involve additional expenditure.

Boats.

A vessel called the "Fauro Chief" has been purchased to take up the running of the old district boat "Tandanya" and the Chairman is negotiating for a suitable engine. It is hoped the total cost of the boat and engine will not exceed £2,000. In seeking a name for the new boat the Board felt that nothing could be more suitable than "John F. Goldie" as a tribute to the great missionary, who for 38 years has navigated treacherous tropical seas for the sake of the Kingdom.

The Bougainville-Buka cutter "Saga" is undergoing extensive overhaul, and installation of a new engine by our own native technical staff at Roviana. It was this same staff that erected the cottage

at Gizo mentioned above.

Earthquakes.

Considerable damage to Mission property was caused during the year at Roviana and Kihili by a severe earthquake. In addition to material losses to the extent of some £750, our workers and people were subjected to no little nervous strain.

Rice Hulling Plant.

After considerable delay, the rice hulling plant ordered from Kihili reached Kieta just prior to Synod, and Mr. Voyce hopes to have it working early in 1940. We are hopeful that this plant will help to solve the food problem associated with many of our stations.

The Home Base.

The Board is under deep obligation to the District Secretaries for effective organisation of deputation itineraries and missionary propaganda, and to the Revs. A. W. E. Silvester and D. C. Alley from the Solomons, and others who have so ably helped in placing the claims of the Solomons before our people. We are also greatly indebted to Circuit ministers, Foreign Mission Secretaries, and generous contributors.

Centennial Exhibition.

The Board has played its part at the Centennial Exhibition in the United Churches Court. Large symbolic figures, beautifully executed panels, curios, specimens of school work, etc., give an excellent impression of the outstanding part New Zealand Methodism has played during the past century in bringing in the Kingdom of God in the Solomons and other parts of the Pacific.

Publications.

The "Open Door," the "Lotu," and the Foreign Mission page of the "Methodist Times" continue their effective missionary propaganda, and the circulation of both magazines has increased during the year. The Board is particularly grateful to the Rev. V. le C. Binet for his able editorship of the "Lotu," the popular children's missionary paper which has been enlarged to include four pages dealing with Home Missions. We respectfully urge all Methodists to subscribe to our Missionary Magazines.

"Movie Projector."

The acquisition of a movie projector and missionary films for deputation work has been fully justified and further films will be screened during 1940.

M.W.M.U.

The Board acknowledges with gratitude the continued loyal, able and loving co-operation of the Women's Missionary Union. With rare devotion and real vision the women of the various auxiliaries continue and extend their work. They greatly encourage the missionaries, particularly the sisters, by their deep and prayerful interest in the work on the field. That this interest is also practical is demonstrated by the fact that in addition to numerous well-packed gift-cases, and liberal medical grants, the Union contributed last year £1,300 towards the salaries of Sisters in the Solomons and £100 to help maintain the Doctor. Assurance of continued support was forthcoming at the recent M.W.M.U. Conference.

Bible Classes.

The Young Women's Bible Class Movement has continued its generous support of Sister Ada Lee and two Native Teachers, and the Board is deeply grateful. We have referred elsewhere in this Report to the remarkable success attending Sister Ada's work in Kihili, and we are confident the Young Women's Bible Class Movement will gather joy and inspiration in its association with this advance of the Kingdom, and in the fact that the native teachers they support are doing excellent evangelistic and educational work.

The Board is also grateful to the Young Men's Movement for its partial support of the Rev. A. H. Voyce, and trusts that its financial position will soon be restored to the level that will enable it to resume the larger grants of past years. Mr. Voyce's work and opportunities in South Bougainville increase rapidly with the years and we sincerely hope this great opportunity for missionary service will challenge afresh, and inspire the Young Men's Bible Classes.

Conclusion.

While in a number of circuits, particularly in Otago, there has been increased giving, there has been a serious decline in numerous places, and in two Districts almost every circuit has returned less than last year, which is serious in view of the continual expansion of the work in the Solomons. The war, higher taxation, and trade restriction have doubtless diminished the effective income of some people, but the majority still spend freely and the Board earnestly urges upon the whole of New Zealand Methodism our sacred duty to the Solomons, where the people depend on us for all that is highest and best in life. In these days of national and international crisis we must be more loyal than ever to our work and workers in the Solomons, and heed as never before the call of the Master, to preach His gospel to every creature.

THE TREASURERS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31st, 1939.

The Treasurers have pleasure in presenting to the Board of Missions the Balance Sheet and Financial Statements for the year ended December 31st, 1939. The accounts have been duly audited and the Auditors' certificate is attached.

The income amounted to £11,805/7/-, which is £463/11/5 less than that of 1938, and £44/13/- less than the estimated income for the year. The income includes £965/1/2 for the Medical Fund, being special contributions from Church Trusts, from sympathisers with the Medical Work. It also includes interest on the Medical Fund but less amounts paid for Gift Duty. The Women's Missionary Union together with the Young Women's Bible Class Movement, contributed £1,492/10/-.

The income from the Mission District was £2,175/10/-, being £115/10/- more than the estimated income for the year. This must be regarded as very satisfactory in view of the low price of copra.

The expenditure on the Mission Field has been £11,946/13/1, being £510/19/7 more than the amount of the Allocation to the District. The increase was due to unavoidable circumstances arising during the year.

The expenditure at the Home Base including outlay at the Centennial Exhibition has been £1,644/16/6, an increase of £156/13/4 on that of 1938 and £78/0/2 above the estimated expenditure for the year. This increase is accounted for in part by increased cost of printing, stationery and postage; also partly because the expenditure in connection with the Centennial Exhibition exceeded the estimate.

Mr. Samuel Gorman has again made large gifts amounting to £2,933 to the Medical Fund. The Capital of this Fund now amounts to £15,233/3/6, and of this the sum of £11,433 stands to the credit of the "Samuel and Clara Matilda Gorman Medical Bequest."

The sum of £1,557/16/8 received from legacies and various other sources, including contributions towards the Earthquake Relief and the New Boat Fund, has been placed to the credit of the Equipment Fund. This also includes a notable and timely gift of £500 for the purchase of a launch for the use of the doctor. During the year no less than £3,777/2/3 has been disbursed from this Fund for buildings and boats. For various reasons an abnormal expenditure under this heading has been unavoidable this year, and as a further large sum has had to be paid on the new district vessel this Fund may be completely exhausted next year.

Legacies amounting to £1,829/4/4 have been added to the Working Capital Fund, including an amount of £1,800 received from the estate of the late Mrs. Preston, to be known as "The Marianne Caughey Smith-Preston Endowment," in accordance with the terms of the legacy.

The Boat Insurance Fund has again been increased by a transfer of £250 from this year's income and also by interest amounting to £24/19/2, and now stands at £1,569/9/11.

The year's working shows a reduction of the deficiency by $\pounds 4/19/4$ after the transfer of £325 from the Medical Capital Fund. The deficiency now amounts to £5,118/3/4.

A profit of £35/2/5 has been made on the publications. The circulation of "The Open Door" now stands at 5,501 copies quarterly, an increase for the year of 93, and of "The Lotu" 7,111, an increase of 545.

In reviewing the financial position of the Missionary Society we find much in it to cause us to thank God and take courage.

In these sad yet challenging days of war the Missionary Enterprize is faced with added problems and the utmost care will be needed in the husbanding of our material resources. But our spiritual resources are still unlimited and more than ever men need the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Together we face the future assured that God has

Rev. J. F. Goldie-Congratulations.

The Conference warmly congratulates the Rev. Eroni Kotosoma upon his Ordination at the recent Islands Synod and prays that his ministry in the Solomons will be long and richly blessed of God.

Leprosarium.

The Conference notes with sympathy the Solomon Island Synod's agreement "that the provision of a Leprosarium would be a highly desirable development when finances make this possible," and trusts that the urgent need of better facilities for treating the numerous lepers in the Solomons may challenge our people to make possible this Christ-like work.

That an appeal be made through the "Methodist Times" to

establish a Special Fund for the Leprosarium.

T.B. Isolation.

It is highly desirable that an isolation ward for T.B. patients be erected and maintained to help the doctor and his staff in their fight against dread tubercular disease.

The Clara Matilda and Samuel Gorman Bequest,

Conference sends its affectionate greeting to Mr. S. Gorman, of Nelson, and thanks God for the vision and continued benefactions of this wonderful friend of Missions. During the past year Mr. Gorman, in addition to his many other gifts, has contributed a further £2,933 to the generous bequest that bears his name and that of his late dear wife, and which now totals £11,433.

This rapidly growing bequest is playing a very important part in the maintenance and extension of the Ministry of Healing in the Solomons and encourages the Board to face the future with confidence. An adequate Medical Fund will enable the Doctor and the Synod to plan a long distance policy in the alleviation of suffering, prevention of disease, and the training of a native medical ministry. We are profoundly grateful that Mr. Gorman has set his hand and his heart to this great task with such noble generosity and extend to him our heartfelt thanks.

M.W.M.U-Appreciation.

The Conference extends to the M.W.M.U. its sincere thanks for another year of happy co-operation and loyal and generous help. By contributing £1,300 towards Sisters' salaries and allowances and £100 to help to maintain the doctor, by generous grants to the various mission stations for medical supplies, and the despatching of many valuable gift cases, the work in the Solomons has been greatly helped. The assurance of continued help is a source of much encouragement.

The workers on the Field and the Native Church gather much inspiration from the deep personal interest, the prayers and very

practical sympathy of our great Missionary women. Next October will see another change in the location of the Dominion Executive. The Conference expresses once again its deep appreiation of the vision, service and loyal co-operation of Miss E. M. Rishworth, of the Auckland Executive, and prays for Mrs. C. E. Taylor and all who will be associated with her in Feilding, God's guidance and grace as they take over the leadership of the Union.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION.

Abridged Annual Report, 1938-1939.

For the year that has passed we thank God for the evidence of His power in all Auxiliaries. Facts and figures tell in some measure the story of what has been achieved, but much has been done in the realm of the spirit and its value cannot be assessed. We stand at the threshold of another year of opportunity, faced with even greater responsibilities, but secure in the knowledge that while we remain faithful to our high calling, God will prosper our efforts.

Membership.

There has been a substantial increase in membership, the total numbers being 3,838, an increase for the year of 468. This includes approximately 240 Gleanings members. 31 Auxiliaries report an increase in membership and 24 a decrease.

Auxiliaries.

This year eight new Auxiliaries have been formed at Kaitaia, Port Albert, Kaeo, Russell, Hauraki Plains, Temuka, Milton, and Mataura, making a total of 79. In addition 13 new Branches have been formed as follows:—Auckland 4, Wellington 3, Te Aroha 2, New Plymouth, Hawera, Woolston and Ashburton 1 each, making a total of 75 Branches.

Extension.

Early this year visits were paid by the Dominion President, Miss Rishworth, to Auxiliaries and Ladies' Guilds in North Auckland. As a result new Auxiliaries were formed and interest aroused in several centres.

District Correspondents.

It is felt that much of the success of the year is due to the faithful work of the District Correspondents, who seek to help and inspire Auxiliaries by letters and where possible by visitation.

Finance.

The income for the year raised by Auxiliaries totals £4,228 0s. 1d., this being an increase over last year of £441 11s. 5d. Of this £185 10s. 1d. was raised toward the special object of £200 for Sisters' Salaries Reserve Fund. The Medical Fund amounted to £170 15s. 8d. and the Stamp Fund £111 4s. 10d.

Legacies and Gifts.

Two bequests were received during the year, one from Mrs. McGechie of £25 and one from Mrs. Walton, of Invercargill, of £100. Two anonymous gifts of £100 and £25 respectively came from Dunedin.

Mrs. Ramsden's Cookery Book.

The beginning of the year saw the completion of this fine effort, which resulted in the sum of £110 for the "Maintain the Doctor Fund."

Literature.

The circulating of the President's Quarterly Letters and of the letters of Sisters from both overseas and at home, continues to create and maintain interest. We are glad that so many Ladies' Guilds now receive these letters and read them at their meetings.

Conventions.

Successful Conventions have been held at Dunedin, Wellington, New Plymouth, Napier, and Feilding; each centre reports that much inspiration resulted from these gatherings. Sisters.

Yet another sister has gone forth to the Solomons, namely, Sister Grace McDonald, this making a total of eight for whose support the

M.W.M.U. is largely responsible.

The number of Deaconesses in the Home Field supported by the Union remains the same, five whose salaries we pay and part of their travelling expenses, and half the salary of Sister Marara Kawiti.

B.C. Movement.

We are glad to report our continued co-operation with the Y.W.B.C.M., who forward through us the salaries of the Sisters supported by them, namely Sister Ada Lee in the Solomons and Sister Nicholls at Hamilton.

Box Department.

The gift boxes for the Solomons reach a total value of £233 11s. 10d. Gifts have come from many Ladies' Guilds and we are grateful for their interest. £150 from the Medical Fund has been divided among the workers for the purchase of additional medical supplies.

In addition large quantities of used clothing have been forwarded to the Sisters in the Home Field, these often providing a means of

contact between the Sister and those she wishes to reach.

Evening Meetings.

This year several Auxiliaries held successful evening meetings to which men of the congregation were invited, following a suggestion made at the annual meeting of the F.M. Board.

Kurahuna.

Nearly nine years have passed since the opening of Kurahuna Maori Girls' School, and the value of this branch of the Union's work is well attested. There are now always more pupils applying for admission than can be accommodated, and the committee are very regretful that each year they have to refuse admittance to so many girls. Interest on the part of the Auxiliary members is growing and more are taking up the 1d. per week fund, the income received from Auxiliaries this year for Kurahuna showing an increase of £110. The girls are busy with work for the Centennial Exhibition, to be shown in the Church Court.

The school is economically run, as the balance sheet will show, and the girls receive an all round training, fitting them to become good home-makers in the future.

General.

We are grateful to the many Ministers who so willingly help, encourage, and advise, particularly to the Revs. A. H. Scrivin, G. I. Laurenson, and W. Silvester. The latter for his readiness to give of his time to Auxiliaries when on furlough.

We look back over the year with thankfulness; we look forward with courage to another year of high endeavour.

HOME MISSION AND CHURCH EXTENSION DEPARTMENT.

ANNUAL REPORT.

This year has had its own difficulties and encouragements, and we express our thanksgiving for Divine blessing manifested in many The Home Mission Department provides a channel whereby the individual gifts of our Church members are able to be gathered up and transformed into service in many needy areas. The measure of support sustained year by year by a growing group of friends brings encouragement to all who work in the Department.

Changes in Leadership.

At the beginning of the Connexional Year, Rev. A. J. Seamer relinquished his position as General Superintendent, a position which he has adorned by long years of unique service. At an early meeting of the Board for the New Year a suitable resolution was passed

embodying the following paragraphs:—

"Feeling the restraint of recurring ill-health, but yet having an undimmed zeal for the work, Mr. Seamer has voluntarily chosen to retire several years earlier than ordinarily would be required. He has done this to leave the leadership of the Department in other hands, but also that he might give all his strength to assisting in every way possible the advancement of Christ's Kingdom among the

Maori people.

"The Board recognises Mr. Seamer's unique capacity and status in Maori life, and looks on his experience as a form of capital which it cannot afford to lose. Therefore this meeting of the Home Mission Board reaffirms its previous resolution that Mr. Seamer be retained as Adviser to the General Superintendent in Maori matters, with an honorarium of £100 per annum for such time as his services can be available, recognising that this is the only worthy way to retain to the Church the benefit of his ripe knowledge and wonderful mana amongst the Maori folk."

At an impressive induction service in Pitt Street Church, Auckland, Revs. G. I. Laurenson and H. J. Odell took up their duties of General Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent respectively.

We welcome Rev. E. T. Olds to the position of Ministerial General

Treasurer, and Rev. J. C. Draper as Secretary of the Board.

Maori Work.

A separate report on the Maori Mission is submitted herewith.

Passing of Mr. John Veale.

During the year, Mr. John Veale, for 22 years General Treasurer of Home Missions and latterly a life member of the Board, passed to higher service. We record our thanksgiving to God for such a useful life.

Gorman Bequest.

Since the last Conference Mr. Gorman has again shown his inspiring and practical interest in our work by adding a further £500 of Government Inscribed Stock to the "Samuel and Clara Matilda Gorman Home Mission Bequest." We are greatly cheered by this generosity, which brings this bequest now to the total of £3,500, and we trust that others may be inspired to follow this lead.

Natural Calamities Fund.

As endorsed by the last Conference, a cheque for £125 was received from the Fire Insurance Fund Board. In consultation with the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee, most helpful grants were made to assist Port Chalmers, Woodville, Manaia, and Caversham Trusts in disheartening calamities which had befallen their properties.

Grants from Church Trusts.

We are glad to report the receipt during last year of special grants of £100 each from Pitt Street, Auckland, and Taranaki Street, Wellington, Trustees. We welcome this action by these Trusts in making such grants from revenue, and we hope that other Trusts blessed with revenue from properties will also commence this type of help.

Literature and Colporteur Committee.

We rejoice in that, under God, this has been both a busy and profitable year for our Society. We have seen new opportunities of service present themselves, and in a large measure we have been enabled to meet them.

Our Society is happy to report the continued and increasing worth of our Colporteur work. We now have an agent and equipment of which our Church may justly be proud. Our thanks are due to all those who responded so well to our appeal for special funds for the provision and maintenance of our Car and Caravan, which Sister Rita is putting to such valuable use.

As an indication of the increased recognition given to the place of our Bookroom in the lives of our people, we are pleased to report a considerable nett profit on our year's work. This is certainly most gratifying to all those who have watched our Bookroom win its way into the notice of our folk. The faith of those early enthusiasts has

been amply justified.

The Society has for some time felt the desirability of moving our Bookroom on to the ground floor, should suitable arrangements be possible. Towards the end of the year an opportunity presented itself, and we decided to move in. However, because of the outbreak of war, with the prospect of difficulty in obtaining supplies and general business uncertainty, we have decided to await a more favourable

moment, the matter being in the meantime deferred.

A new feature of our work has been that of our Picture Depart-We have now some valuable equipment; and from the limited use we have as yet been able to give it, we have seen the wide possibilities of such a method of evangelism. Whenever we have been able to use this method of preaching and evangelising through the religious sound film, we have heard favourable comment, both on the quality of the material and the value of this means of presentation of the Gospel. Our main difficulty, however, is the securing of a suitable person to place in charge. We are convinced of the value of this Department, and believe that we have an almost virgin field here to explore for the Kingdom.

Attention has been given during the year to the publication of the "Statement of Faith" and similar acceptable booklets, keeping

alive this valuable side of our Church witness.

We go forward to our new year full of high hopes, and more certain than ever as to the value of the printed page in Christian. propaganda; and as to the trategic place our Bookroom and all that it stands for occupies in the life of our Church and the Christian. community in general.

Spiritual Advance Committee.

During the year the attention of the Committee has been engaged with the following matters:—

1. Publications:

In conjunction with the Literature and Colporteur Committee, it has published the Statement of Faith, and has advertised the publication amongst the Circuits, and has urged all Ministers, Probationers and Home Missionaries to preach upon its themes.

The Committee has arranged for suitable literature to be obtained

for free distribution at the Centennial Exhibition.

It is engaged in the publication of pamphlets upon urgent themes

to be sold to our people.

The Committee believes that there is need for cheap but well-written and attractively produced pamphlets amongst our people, and intends to explore and develop this method of evangelism and education to the extent of its resources.

2. Visit of Professor Albiston:

The Committee has been in contact with Professor A. E. Albiston and has made the necessary arrangements for his visit.

3. World Preaching Mission:

The Committee has kept in touch with the developments concerning the proposed World Preaching Mission of 1940. Conference recommends that where united or simultaneous missions are being held in any District during the year, our Ministers and people cooperate in every way possible.

3. World Preaching Mission:

The Committee has kept in touch with the developments concerning the proposed World Preaching Mission of 1940, and concurs with the decision to postpone the New Zealand participation in the Mission until 1941. The Committee feels that the opportune time for a concerted evangelistic approach will be after the Centennial Celebrations have concluded.

1940-Recommendations.

- 1. The Committee, in making recommendations for the programme of the Church during 1940, calls upon the Methodist Church to register its thankfulness to Almighty God for the part that He has led it to take in the development of Christian Life and Character over the past 118 years of work, by renewed zeal and enthusiasm for the cause of Jesus Christ. It would suggest that churches use to the full the opportunities that may present themselves in Centennial celebrations to keep before the public the important part that the Church has played in the development of national thought and life.
- 2. In view of the general disorganisation caused by the war conditions, we recommend to our churches in every Circuit and Home Mission Station:—
 - (1) To remember that Christian Fellowship is a priceless heritage to safeguard, even more closely than ever, in the divided and unsettled state of the world. Every step should be taken to deepen the inner unity of the Church in our loyalty to Jesus Christ. We urge the greatest care to promote every opportunity for meeting in Christian Fellowship, such a centre being vital to the community and personal life.

- (2) Where it is possible to make effective local plans for such gatherings, special missions of inspiration and appeal, and conventions for the deepening of spiritual life be organised.
- (3) All preaching should be more than ever aimed at producing Christian Discipleship, and complete surrender to the will of Christ for individuals and for mankind.
- (4) Every member of the Church must play his or her part to conserve the spiritual gains of the past, must maintain the Church's witness in the community, and to this end is called upon to make contact with those outside of the Church with a view to winning them for the service of Christ.
- (5) Pastoral Visitation should be organised with a view to bringing our ministers and workers into contact with non-Church-going people, especially with parents of Sunday School children, to enlist their interest in the Church with definite intent to win them for Christ.
- (6) Finally, that the attention of our ministers be drawn to the book, "The Method and Message of the New Evangelism."
- 3. To meet the demand for a confident and certain note from the pulpit, we would reaffirm the necessity and importance of all preachers preaching upon the great themes, such as are set out in the recently published Statement of Faith. Once again we would draw the attention of our preachers to the recommendation of last Conference, that expository sermons based upon the Statement of Faith be preached.

Poster Stamps.

As a method of raising some extra revenue for the Home Mission Fund and as a means of spreading publicity about our work, a set of poster stamps was published early in the year and these are selling quietly. We commend these to our people.

Matters Referred by Conference to the Home Mission Board.

- 1. Status of Retired Home Missionaries. (Minutes of Conference, 1939, Page 122, No. 26, a & b.) This matter was considered in consultation with the Law Book Revision Committee, who will report on the matter to Conference.
- 2. Removal Expenses Fund for Home Missionaries. (Minutes of Conference, 1939, Page 122, No. 21.) The Board gave careful consideration to the following facts:—

There are 42 Home Mission appointments at present (26 married

men and 16 single).

At present there is an average of 18 moves per annum at a gross annual cost of approximately £150.

We can anticipate approximately 20 moves per annum at an aver-

age total annual cost of £200.

The Board recommends to Synods and Conference careful consideration of all the issues involved in the proposal to establish a Fund for the above purpose.

Recommendations.

- 1. That a Fund be established on the following basis:—
- A levy of £3 per annum from each Home Mission Station with a married appointment.
- (2) A levy of £2 per annum from each Home Mission Station with a single appointment.

- (3) Grant from the Home Mission Fund of £45 per annum.
- (4) Grant from the Fire Insurance Fund of £45 per annum.
- That payments to the Fund be made for three years at half rates, commencing in April, 1940.
- That full rates to the Fund and benefits from the Fund commence in 1943.
- That the Removal Expenses Fund Committee be requested to consider this as a working basis for the Fund, in consultation with the Home Mission Board, and to submit a scheme of rules for the administration of the Fund to next Synods and Conference of 1941.
- That the Fund be administered by the existing Removal Expenses Fund Committee.

That the Home Mission Board does not favour the extension of this scheme to Deaconesses.

Legacies and Capital Funds. (Minutes of Conference, 1939, Page 121, No. 9.)

Recommendations.

1. That the time has arrived for a change of the existing policy which at present reads "that all legacies except as otherwise declared shall become capital money, the interest only being used."

2. That a new policy shall apply to all legacies under wills or codicils signed after 31st March, 1941.

- That due publicity be given to the change of policy.
- That legacies may still be allocated by donors for capital or other purposes only.
- That all legacies under wills or codicils signed after 31st March, 1941, unless otherwise specified, shall be allocated on the following basis:-50% to capital funds and 50% to be at the disposal of the Home Mission Board for current or special purposes.
- 6. That the Board does not favour setting a maximum figure for capital funds of the Department.
- 4. Separated Chairmanship. (Minutes of Conference, 1939, Page 126, Para d.) In view of the international situation the matter be held in abeyance in the meantime.

Special Appeal, 1940.

In the early part of the connexional year a strong committee was nominated to the President of Conference to act as Standing Committee for the above appeal. That Committee will report direct to Synods as a Connexional Committee.

Conclusion.

We present this report in the early stages of a world conflict which will cause inevitable readjustments in various ways. In no way will it remove, rather will it increase the importance of every aspect of the work of this foundation department of the Church. We commend the future to Him of Whom we thankfully say—"Hitherto hath the Lord helped us."

QUESTION XLV.—What is the State of the Maori Work, and What can be done to Promote its Interests?

MAORI MISSION REPORT.

In presenting this annual report we desire to express our gratitude to Almighty God for His blessings through another year of service. We do not report any special items of advance, but steady and faithful service has been rendered and we feel that useful work is being done through the activities of our Mission in extending the Kingdom of our Lord among the Maori people.

Retiring General Superintendent.

This year marks the retirement of Rev. A. J. Seamer after many years of faithful and self-sacrificing work for the Maori people. On every hand we hear expressions of pleasure that Mr. Seamer is retaining his link with the work as Kaumatua or "Respected Elder" of the Mission. His advice and co-operation have been invaluable throughout this year.

Young Maori Conference.

Earlier in this year an important conference of young Maori leaders was held at the Auckland University College. Several of our workers and members were able to attend as private members of the Conference and all received considerable encouragement and information from the fellowship and the discussions. Many important matters affecting Maori welfare were dealt with.

Publications.

This year our new edition of the Maori Hymn and Service Book has been received, and is selling steadily. In addition a useful small hymn book for Maori Sunday Schools, consisting of Maori and European Hymns and suitable prayers, has been prepared by the Mission. This is meeting the need of a dual type of book in the present stage of development of the Maori young people.

The "Kotuku," our small Maori periodical, is still being published

and it fills a useful place in our work.

Visits of General Superintendent and Senior Maori Superintendent.

At suitable periods during the year, Mr. Laurenson and Mr. Te Tuhi have made visits of inspiration and consultation to several Maori Districts. Services and meetings were held in a large number of centres and personal contact was made with many of the people. Our ordained ministers are giving their usual faithful service in their big districts and maintaining a steady witness.

Honorary Home Missionaries.

Several changes were made this year in the appointment of Honorary Home Missionaries. One respected agent, Mr. Tahuna Herangi, passed away early in the new year, and he is sadly missed. The workers who have been appointed are all doing faithful work, and the changes, we believe, will result in a more effective working of our areas.

Church Building.

Our Maori people are revealing a growing sense of responsibility in the matter of their Church buildings and property. In several places funds have been raised for the renovation or improvement of buildings. Mission Boxes.

We have recently secured a supply of Mission Boxes bearing a Maori label for use in Maori homes for receiving subscriptions for the Home Mission Fund. We believe that these will materially assist in developing further the co-operation of the Maori families in the work of the Church.

Deaconesses.

Our team of experienced Deaconesses continue their Christian Ministry in their various district, and the two new workers have settled down excellently into their appointments—Sister Evelyn of Hamil-

ton, and Sister Dorothy of Te Kuiti.

We again record our deep appreciation of the financial assistance given to the Department by the Women's Missionary Union, the Y.W.B.C. Movement, many Sunday Schools, and the Wellington Methodist Charitable and Educational Endowment Trustees.

Voluntary Workers.

In some districts more than in others, much assistance is given to our regular workers by the voluntary helpers in Sunday School work, etc. To all these we express our thanks.

Students for the Ministry.

This year we mark with pleasure the completion by Student Winiata of his theological course in Trinity College as a student for the full status of the ministry. Mr. Rogers continues his studies and we watch with interest the development of these prospective leaders. We would be glad to see more young men coming forward to train for this great work.

Deaconess Students.

Our Board reaffirmed this year its desire that students for Home or Maori Mission work be given instruction in the Maori language and in the tonic-sol-fa system of music. We hope to see these subjects taught to all students for the New Zealand work for some years to come.

Schools for Maori Students.

Again we express our gratitude for the splendid work being done at "Kurahuna." The type of training being provided is especially effective in the development of the girls in Christian home making.

Wesley College, Paerata, is sending out a small but steady stream of young men into the Maori communities. We have not yet solved in New Zealand the problem of ensuring adequate openings in the professions for trained Maori lads. This proves discouraging to young fellows who have acquitted themselves well in an equal standard of training with European students.

Taranaki Maori Girls' School of Domestic Science and Hygiene.

As all Synods endorsed the recommendation of the Home Mission Board that the Wellington Methodist Charitable and Educational Endowments Trustees be urged to co-operate with the Home Mission Board in the establishment of an interim School in Taranaki until such time as the proposed larger scheme is proceeded with, steps have been taken to establish such an interim school on the Grey Institute property in New Plymouth. A Sub-Committe of the Home Mission Board has been established in New Plymouth and great hopes are held that this interim stage of the development will prove most successful, and will prove a worthy and effective preliminary step in the development of the larger scheme.

The Liquor Traffic.

This terrible scourge continues to create many tragic difficulties in our work. Only the abolition of alcoholic liquor from our com-

munity life will solve the problem.

Another strongly organised attempt was made during the year to have licenses introduced into the King Country, in violation of the sacred pact under which Europeans entered that area in the first place. It is gratifying to report that the Maori people themselves, through their chiefs and leaders in a large and representative Conference, once more strongly reaffirmed their support of the pact and their urgent desire that all intoxicating liquor be kept out of the area, and the present laws be strengthened and enforced.

Maori Mission History.

Various unavoidable delays have occurred in the preparation of the manuscript of the history of our Maori Mission work. Rev. A. B. Chappell hopes shortly to be able to complete this book, which is being awaited with keen interest by our people, and which we believe will serve to give a more worthy recognition of the work done by our Church in the early days and on into the period of growing settlement.

Conclusion.

Again we commend this work to the continued and increased interest of our Church. Our New Zealand Methodism grew out of the Maori Mission. In many centres it was founded by missionaries amongst the Maori people. We have entered into that heritage. May we be found faithful.

- 1. That the report be received and adopted.
- 2. That Conference expresses its pleasure in learning of the development of the interim School in New Plymouth for Maori Girls, and endorses the action of the Home Mission Board in making available to the New Plymouth Committee the £3,000 held for the purpose of a Taranaki School, interest to be usable and portion of the capital expended only on permanent materials suitable for the development of the larger scheme.
- 3. That Conference express to the Women's Missionary Union, the Young Women's and Young Men's Bible Class Movements, and the Wellington Methodist Charitable and Educational Endowments Trustees, special thanks for the splendid financial assistance given by them to the Maori Mission Activities of the Church during the past year.

Treaty of Waitangi.

4. The Conference congratulates the Government upon the measure of success achieved in the Waitangi Centennial Celebrations, but regrets the circumstances which prevented the Waikato, King Country and Taranaki Tribes from being officially represented, and suggest that this is a suitable subject for a full enquiry. The Conference notes with satisfaction the admisssion made by members of the Crown that the Treaty is still binding upon the conscience of the Crown and consequently upon our Parliament and Courts. As how-

ever this fact was not explicitly and clearly stated and there is much unrest amongst our Maori people on that account, the Conference endorses their request that a suitable summary of the principles and provisions of the Treaty of Waitangi be placed upon the Statute

Book.

The Conference respectfully claims the right to express itself on this question as it is an indisputable historical fact that our Missionaries, in association with those of the Church Missionary Society, advised the acceptance and signing of the Treaty and assured the Maori Chiefs that the Treaty would stand for all time and would be honourably observed. The Conference cannot forget that it was the great Methodist Chief, Tamati Te Waka Nene, who sprang from his place by the side of Rev. Samuel Ironside with whom he had been conferring and at his instigation made the historic speech that swayed the assembly of Chiefs and decided the issue.

These facts not only give this Conference the right to speak on

the question but also place upon it a responsibility that cannot be

lightly regarded.

That the President of Conference, the Chairman of the Wellington District, General Superintendent of Home Missions, and the Senior Maori Superintendent present the matter to the Government.

QUESTION XLVI.-What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting City Missions?

A.—AUCKLAND METHODIST CENTRAL MISSION. Report, 1939.

With gratitude to our Heavenly Father, we record another year of progressive work, direct evangelism, constructive social service, and educational guidance. There have been many anxious hours, as well as those crammed full with the goodness of the Almighty.

Re-Building Scheme.

The scheme in conjunction with the Amalgamated Theatre Company, which was approved by the Building and Loan Fund Committee, has been abandoned in the meantime. However, the Mission Trustees and officials realise their strategic position, and are prepared to move along with a modified scheme when the East Street Hall is sold. In the meantime, a fund is being augmented, and every avenue exploited to create a worthy Mission Home. It is hoped that the Methodist Centennial Thanksgiving Fund will help us in our re-building project to create a Mission Home for our "general and specified activities." (See Minutes of Conference 1938, page 139, par. 2.) In the meantime, theatre seats will replace old forms, and the Church will be used as a Mission Hall.

Radio Church of the Helping Hand.

Since our last report, Station 1ZJ has been sold to the Government. Many letters revealed the extent of the influence of the services. £160 subscribed by friends of the Mission for this work is now being used to build a room at the Health Camp, and will be suitably recognised.

Sunday Services.

The morning service is never large, but the evening congregation is well maintained. The evangelistic note is clearly sounded, and membership has increased. The average number at Communion is about 40.

Youth Work.

During the year, on account of new housing schemes, we have transferred more than half of our scholars to suburban Sunday Schools. There is still a wide field for work among adolescents, and this is being catered for through Scouts, Cubs, Guides, Brownies, clubs, etc. There is an urgent need for a further Youth Hostel in the city, in order that the young people may be comfortably housed, and surrounded by helpful influences.

Health Camp and Rest Home.

During the year 250 children have benefited at Campbell's Bay. This makes a total of 1,015 during the last four years. Through the generosity of individuals, organisations and firms, we were able to erect a dormitory valued at £1,000, free of debt. A further extension is now in progress, and when completed, will make an excellent block. This building will save the staff anxiety and provide better facilities for some children who otherwise would have slept in tents. During the next season, groups of mothers will also be accommodated. No money is likely to be received from the King George V. Memorial Fund. We record our very real thanks to Mr. C. V. Barham, Architect, and the large band of voluntary workers who have given so generously of their time.

Social Services and "Goodwill Industries."

"Not charity, but a chance" to work is our message to all who are physically fit. "Goodwill Industries" have come into existence offering not charity, but work to men and women in need. They relieve the poor and distressed, without destroying their self-respect. They apply the teaching of Jesus by ministering to all, regardless of creed, and offer work to men and women instead of the charity which fosters pauperism. Already nearly 2,000 Goodwill Bags have been placed in the homes of Auckland, and a Goodwill Van has been acquired. As this work develops, it will be necessary to acquire a factory, and it will be readily seen by men of vision and courage that Airedale Street could become a centre of industrial as well as educational evangelism. Though the Social Security Bill is now in operation, there is still a large number of applications for relief. The sum of £1,200 is handled annually for the Pensions Department. Young men and women are placed in positions where there is some prospect. Hundreds of interviews have been the means of changing many lives for the Master. The Superintendent still works on many civic committees for the benefit of the whole community. Our ungrudging thanks are recorded to numerous Doctors, Solicitors, the Police, and the Hospital Board for their valuable co-operation.

Prison Work.

Services are regularly held. Personal interviews reveal the best visible results.

Maori Work.

The Maori Mission Department continues its work under the same deplorable conditions as the Central Mission. Sisters Ivy Jones and Marara Kawiti are real heroines in the cause of the Kingdom. Services in the native tongue are held every Sunday morning in the Mission Hall. It is hoped that the sympathisers of the Maori cause will make provision for this work in our re-building scheme.

Deaconess Work.

Sister Mavis carries on the work among the women and children. Visitation of the sick, the hospital, and private homes makes severe demands upon the Sister's time. There is a real need for this gracious ministry.

Franklin Road Branch.

The coming of Rev. H. Thornley to our Circuit has meant encouragement to Mission enterprise. We have been reviewing the position of this old church, its membership and its resources. The Mission Board of Management believes that there is a work to be done in the district, especially along the lines of modern city Mission work. At present, we are endeavouring to renovate the Parsonage, so that our agent may be comfortably housed, and concentrate more intensely on the work in that district. The youth work continues under the direction of a faithful band of workers who come from churches near by.

Down and Out.

The average attendance at the Saturday evening meetings numbers 70. These meetings have never had a higher spiritual tone, and some of the men are now attending the Mission Church Services.

General.

Membership has increased. The work is gaining a larger public which recognises the undenominational character of our activities. Grateful thanks are due to Miss Leonie Williams in her exacting task and sacrificial service. The Ladies' Guild has worked heroically, and the large band of voluntary workers has meant the maintaining and extension of the work. For financial assistance, we thank the East Street Trustees, the Ladies' Guild, numerous individuals, firms and organisations. The willing services of Choir-master, Organist, and Choir are also gratefully acknowledged.

We are convinced that the present policy of building up in every department without running ahead of resources will commend itself to all concerned, and inspire legacies and gifts which will help to establish at the Mission modern buildings for the sake of "those who

need us most."

B.—DUNEDIN METHODIST CENTRAL MISSION.

49th Annual Report, 1939.

The Board of Trustees has pleasure in presenting the report of

the pre-Jubilee year of the Central Mission.

No report can adequately summarise the many-sided activities of the work or calculate the influence of its instructional and organisational religious ministries. Though the Mission buildings are strategically positioned for religious and social work it is regretted that they are outdated and totally inadequate for modern city mission needs. For some years the Trustees have faced two main problems—accommodation and finance. Fortunately, the buildings acquired by the Board in 1931 have enabled an extension of youth activities and limited institutional work, but these buildings are merely a temporary expedient and must ultimately be replaced.

Property Matters.

The building of the Octagon Hall involved the Trustees in a heavy mortgage which for years precluded the pursuance of a developmental policy. In addition to this, the hall for some years has shown signs of wear. During the year the Trustees were forced to face the question of renovations. After a series of prolonged discussions between representatives of Amalgamated Pictures, Ltd., and the Trustees, it was decided to request Messrs Natusch and Sons and Mr. H. McDowell Smith to print plans for extensive structural alterations amounting to £17,000 expenditure, Amalgamated Pictures to pay all costs exceeding £5,000. Complete agreement by all parties enabled the work to commence in June. The alterations have meant the abolition of the horseshoe type of gallery; the inclusion of an outside passage; the creation of another exit and new seating—all of which places the new building in the front rank of Dominion theatres. The Trustees obtained the sanction of the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee to a twenty-five years' lease to Amalgamated Pictures at an increased rental. The remodelling of the main hall initiates a policy of demolition and reconstruction of all the Mission buildings, which will be effected as finance becomes available. The mortgage on all properties amounts to £24,000—of which £3,000 is borne by the Social Service Department. The mortgage conditions £1,000 repayment annually, which up to the present has been maintained.

It is noted that the Trustees have brought commendable ability and vigilance to property matters ensuring complete supervision and safe-guarding of the whole position. The following comparison is interesting—in 1931 the properties of the Mission were valued at £23,300 and carried a mortgage of £3,600. In 1939 the value of the

properties was £83,000, with a mortgage of £24,000.

So that in eight years the Trustees have added £65,000 assets with only £16,000 increased mortgage.

During the year the Trustees decided to consolidate the position and concentrate on the reduction of the mortgage before attempting any further developmental work.

New Sunday School Building and Social Service Department.

The Sunday School building is totally inadequate for recreational and religious work and must be supplanted as soon as possible by a modern building for youth work and social service. It is estimated that a building of the required type specially designed and equipped would approximate £15,000. It is impossible to proceed with the erection of this very necessary building, but the Trustees have placed it on the list as the next big move. It was intended to erect this hall to commemorate the Jubilee of the Mission, but the state of the finances forbids the move.

Company Bay Home.

The year has registered completion in the main of this fine institution for women needing rest or a permanent home. The cost of the Home, which is comprised of two main blocks, has amounted to £33,000. Women of any creed or disability whatever are admitted. At present 40 are in residence. A capable staff of fifteen young women, including a qualified matron and nursing sister, minister to the guests. The grounds, beautifully situated, are studded with flowering shrubs and bedding plants. The Home is capable of housing 50 guests and is becoming increasingly popular. Applications for admission are reviewed by a special committee. The Trustees gratefully acknowledge a gift from Miss C. D. Gilmore, who has donated a special room designated "The Gilmore Room," and a bequest of £70 from the late Miss Lottie Wedlake.

Children's Health Camp Building.

Experience proved the inadvisability of housing children with adults during the summer vacation. The staff found it psychologically undesirable and recreationally impossible. The committee finally decided to erect a £6,000 children's building specially adapted for Health Camp purposes. At present, though £6,000 has been expended the building is not completed. A kitchen, dining-room, and recreational room and another sleeping dormitory are required, but no further additions will be made until the debt on the three Homes at Company Bay is extinguished. The Committee has applied for a grant from the King George Memorial Fund for this new building, but as yet the Government has made no definite decision.

Eventide Home.

Adjacent to the Rest Home and on the same grounds, the Trustees have established an Eventide Home as the first of the twenty-two bungalow homes it is intended to erect for aged couples at some future date on a site to be acquired nearer the city. Sister Ruth Fawcett, an ordained deaconess of the Church, is superintendent of the Home, which at present houses the maximum number of guests—six. In recognition of a gift from the late Mrs. Buie and family, the Trustees have called this eventide home "The Neil and Elizabeth Buie Home."

The Jubilee.

A specially appointed committee is now planning a series of meetings worthily to celebrate the Jubilee of the Mission in June, 1940. The meetings are to be inspirational in character and conducive to spiritual uplift and advance. Former superintendents are being invited to take part in the celebrations.

Methodist Hostel.

The erection of a Hostel for students is becoming increasingly urgent. The Methodist Church of New Zealand is losing contact with many fine young people during their years of study, and in some cases failing to provide an influence and personal contact. The Trustees are of the opinion that the erection of a Methodist Hostel in Dunedin should be sponsored by Dominion Methodists and are prepared to inaugurate a fund and proceed with the scheme if support is forthcoming.

Social Work.

During the year the staff of the Social Service Department superintended by Mrs. J. Grant distributed fuel, clothing, and food-stuffs to necessitous cases. Compared with other years the expenditure has not been so great, but in addition to the current expenditure on relief, this Department has not yet recovered from the heavy drain which the depression years imposed upon its financial resources.

Sister Hazel's Work.

For many years in succession Sister Hazel has rendered devoted service to the religious and social life of the community. Her work has been chiefly confined to the young and the aged. Hours have been spent personally contacting with those requiring counsel, sympathy, and friendship. In addition to hospital and general visitation Sister Hazel superintends the Women's Guild, Young Women's Bible Class, and L.Y.M.S. The Trustees record grateful acknowledgment of her work.

Youth Work.

The Sunday School, under the superintendency of Mr. C. E. Patey, has had a successful year. It is acknowledged that city Sunday Schools have their own peculiar problems and the Mission School is no exception. The staff has rendered wonderful service throughout the year. The Youth Council, comprised of representatives of all the youth organisations, provides a medium of leadership and review. Five Bible Classes, Brownies, Girl Guides, Busy Bees, Life Boys, Boys' Brigade, Badminton Club, Young People's Spiritual Fellowship Class, and other organisational youth movements, though controlled by separate committees, are under the guidance of the M.C.M. Youth Council.

Radio Church of the Helping Hand.

During the year the Government purchased Station 4ZM, which for five years was placed by Messrs McCracken and Walls at the service of the Superintendent of the Mission daily to broadcast a devotional community service. By means of this station a strong and popular organisation was gradually built up to assist the humanitarian and institutional work of the Mission. Immediately the station was purchased by the Government it was dismantled and for over two months the superintendent was unable to broadcast. Eventually an arrangement was effected between the Executive of 4ZD and the

Government whereby a broadcast service of the Radio Church was permitted—Sunday mornings 9.25 to 10. In these services, the Superintendent is assisted by his former colleague, Uncle Don. The Trustees desire to acknowledge their indebtedness to the Executive of 4ZD for its co-operation and sympathetic support. The membership of the Radio Church now stands at 3,500.

Staff.

In April last, the Rev. B. M. Tasker, B.A., concluded a three-year ministry as Assistant-Superintendent and proceeded to England to further his academic studies and gain experience of Methodist Mission work in London and elsewhere. His successor, the Rev. W. R. Francis, has done excellent work, especially among the young people. The extent of the Mission's work may be gauged from the fact that there are 25 of a permanent staff employed, besides many voluntary workers. The weekly wages bill of the Mission amounts to £60. Mr. H. H. Johnson, the Secretary and Treasurer of the Mission, has again rendered devoted and sacrificial service, and deserves the commendation of the whole Church.

A day spent in the Central Mission office reveals the heart of the Mission work. An endless stream of caller's often leaves one weary in mind but thankful for the opportunity of serving Mankind, and realising the quickening of the spiritual life of so many outside the influence of the average church. Words fail to express all that it has been our privilege to do in ministering to hundreds in hours of deep sorrow or mental conflict. Many harrassed souls have found new ways of life and overburdened hearts relief.

Spiritual Work.

During the alterations to the Octagon Hall the Sunday evening services were held in the Concert Chamber of the Town Hall. During the year the congregations have been well maintained, as also the week-night devotional meeting. By means of personal contacts, correspondence, and the Sunday services, conversions have taken place and the spiritual life of many enriched. Several young people have joined the membership of the Mission. The Communion services have been well attended.

The Challenge of the Church.

The work of the two Methodist City Missions necessarily becomes the responsibility of the whole Church, whereas at present the entire financial burden rests upon a meagre membership and the capability of the staff. It is a matter for regret and comment that no financial gift or bequest has come to the Auckland or Dunedin Missions from other parts of the Dominion. In the Homeland the great central Missions are supported by the membership of British Methodism. The laymen of British Methodism regard it both an honour and a responsibility to encourage and finance the work which in all cases outpaces the resources of local membership, and while in no way desiring to depreciate the work of other branches of New Zealand Methodism, both the Auckland and Dunedin Mission Boards of Trustees desire to bring before the Conference and members of the Church a strong recommendation that this aspect should seriously be considered. Here surely is a work which claims not only the prayers and interest of all our people, but deserves their practical and financial support.

Thanks.

The Trustees tender warm and sincere appreciation to all who have made any contribution whatever to the work.

REPORT FOR 1939.

The Committee has pleasure in presenting its annual report.

Students.

During the year two students have been in residence. Miss Frances Clegg, who completes her training this year, will take the maternity course at St. Helen's. Miss Violet Kruse will continue for another year and will then take the full nursing course at the Public Hospital. Both students have shown devotion and aptitude in their work and have gained practical experience in circuit work. They have also taken advantage of the assistance given to our students by the Nurse Maude Association, to whom our best thanks are due.

Tutors.

The Committee desires to express its appreciation of the services of the Tutors, both past and present. Miss V. L. Hooper, who was for several years Tutor in English, relinquished the work this year, and Rev. J. C. Draper, who conducted the class in Homiletics, was transferred to Auckland. The following have served on the Staff this year:—Rev. T. J. Wallis (Theological Subjects), Rev. E. Drake (English), Rev. H. L. Fiebig (Psychology), and Rev. G. R. Harris (Homiletics and Voice Production).

Teaching of Maori.

Enquiries have been made as to the teaching of the Maori language to the students intending to enter the Maori work and there is every prospect that this subject will be taught in 1940.

Sisters.

Owing to the death of her mother, Sister Rangimaire Ellison has had temporarily to relinquish her work as a Deaconess. Sister Constance Osborne is at present awaiting appointment.

Reports.

Reports supplied this year by Deaconesses on the field show that a splendid service is being rendered to the church by these workers, of whom far too little is heard by the church as a whole. To them all we tender our warm appreciation and for them we solicit the earnest prayers of the church.

Deaconess Uniform.

The question of a suitable uniform for our Deaconesses, has given the Special Committee appointed to deal with it, much concern. The following has now been fully approved:—Navy blue uniform, either silk or cotton in summer, with plain white collar and the Deaconess badge. A plain hat to be worn.

Hostel.

The Hostel continues to be most capably managed by Mrs. Neal, under the direction of the Ladies' House Committee. To all concerned we express our grateful thanks.

Maintenance.

During the year an electric washing machine has been installed. Minor structural alterations have been made to the building to improve the accommodation. Being an old building, the cost of maintenance has been heavy, and at no distant date the Committee will be faced with the heavy cost of outside painting.

Finance.

The financial year ends on November 30th. A complete statement will be presented to Conference.

Grants.

The Committee asks that the following grants be made from the Connexional Funds for the coming year:—Fire Insurance Fund £100, Contingent Fund £75, Home Mission Fund £75, Foreign Mission Fund £25.

QUESTION XLVIII.—What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting Connexional Orphanages?

A.—THE AUCKLAND CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE, MT. ALBERT AND EPSOM.

Report for 1939.

The life and work in our Children's Homes and Orphanages at Mt. Albert and Epsom has been carried on along the usual routine lines with, from time to time, items and incidents of varied interest and importance. The daily blessings and benefits received continue to call forth our gratitude to our Heavenly Father, Whose Divine Providence is our unfailing portion and the rejoicing of our hearts as we minister to His little ones.

Obituary.

It is with a profound sense of loss and regret that we have to report the passing of Mrs. J. Armitage at the end of August. This lady, who was for eight years (1920-1928) the Matron of Wesley Home, Mt. Albert, and, since her retirement from that position, a most valuable member of the Board, Executive and other Committees, has served the interests of our Orphanage work to an outstanding degree, and with a quality of service beyond all praise. Mrs. Armitage will be greatly missed from our councils, but her memory will long remain an inspiration and encouragement to all with whom she was associated in her work for the Master. The many boys and girls who have passed under her care and influence will have every cause to remember her with warmest affection and gratitude.

Health and Conduct.

These have been excellent throughout the year. Nothing beyond minor ailments has interfered with the physical welfare of the boys and girls—and the health of the staff members has been uniformly good. The behaviour of the children in the homes and at school has not only been well maintained, but an even further measure of improvement has been noticeable.

Admissions and Removals.

Fewer applications have been accepted than in past years, though many applications were made under circumstances the Selection Committee could not entertain. At the end of last year some more children were allowed to return to parents, but the numbers remain much as in last Report—viz., 42 in the Wesley Home and 33 in Epsom Home.

Staff.

The Homes continue under the able oversight and service of Mr. and Mrs. R. Wild, at Wesley, Mt. Albert, and Mrs. R. M. Butterworth at Buckland Road, Epsom, assisted by competent and willing helpers. The best of harmony prevails and the work in the Homes proceeds smoothly and with every attention to the best interests of all concerned. The conditions make for the happiness and contentment of all, the Ladies' Committee being entitled to their own good share of credit in this connection.

Condition of Buildings.

Further renovations and repairs have been made at Wesley Home, but the time is near when something much more extensive (and expensive) will be necessary if the premises are to remain in use for the present purpose. The Epsom Home is in a fairly good state of repair, and has still some years of serviceable life if required.

Purchase of New Site.

After numerous possible properties had been inspected and considered, the Board finally decided to purchase an area of some ten acres in the Winstone Park Estate at Mt. Roskill, Auckland, at £170 per acre—also a small section giving entrance to the larger property from Dominion Road Extension—this at a cost of £250. A survey of the boundary lines is being made, and it is hoped that a shelter belt of trees will be planted this present season along the only exposed side of the area. The Board's Architect, Mr. A. C. Marshall, has been asked to submit a lay-out of the buildings and grounds, but it is not intended to make provision beyond what at present would be required for the accommodation of the boys. This also will depend upon circumstances permitting the economical carrying-out of such a scheme.

Centennial Exhibition.

In common with the Methodist Homes at Masterton and Christchurch, steps are being taken to worthily represent our Orphanage work at the Wellington Exhibition at the end of the present year.

Street Appeal.

The Advisory Council of the Combined Auckland Orphanages having been successful in securing a day for the sole benefit of the Orphanages, the appeal this year, held on September 1st, was most successful, £1,000 being realised from this effort. This amount is being shared on a per capita basis between the various Homes.

Committees.

The thanks of the Board are accorded to the members of the various Committees who again have rendered valuable service—the Ladies' Committee being entitled to special mention for their efforts on behalf of the Homes.

Thanks.

As in past years, the special thanks of the Board are accorded to Drs. Harold Pettit and Cyril Griffin, Hon. Physicians to the Homes, for their valuable and kindly professional services, and to Mr. K. W. White, Chemist, Mt. Albert, for continued supplies of medicines and also of many other useful gifts for the children generously given.

To many friends who have contributed in cash and other gifts cordial thanks are rendered and warm appreciation is expressed for all the help so generously given.

The personnel of the Board for 1940 will be submitted to Synod and Conference in due course.

B.-MASTERTON METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME.

Report for the Year Ending 30th September, 1939.

In our last year's report we made reference to the difficult year we had experienced, and unfortunately we are in the position of having to repeat the same this year.

Early in this year our Secretary-Manager resigned on account of having been accepted by Conference as a Youth Director, and his position was filled by the appointment of Mr. W. R. Nicol.

Messrs C. Jones and H. Skuse resigned owing to removal from the district.

The Committee in July lost, through death, its oldest member in the person of Mr. C. E. Daniell—a loss felt greatly by all connected with the Home, as one who had done more for the Home than any other member, and his passing on is a severe loss to the whole community.

Later on, Miss E. Mygind, who was Assistant Matron for four years, left to go into business on her own account at Pahiatua, and her place has been taken by Miss Malcolm.

To replace retiring members of the Committee, Messrs J. H. Conly and G. F. Whitlock were appointed to fill the vacancies.

Statistics.

The year commenced with 32 children in the Home, and during the year one of the inmates left, on being adopted, while one boy left to take up work in New Plymouth, and with one admission (a boy) the position at the end of the year is that we have 22 boys and 9 girls—a total of 31.

Children.

We are pleased to report that the children are making satisfactory progress in their school life, and reports received from time to time indicate steady progress in the outside world, of those whom we have cared for in years gone by.

In this connection it is gratifying to the Staff in particular, and the Committee in general, to be able to report that at the Christmas Tea (an annual event at the Home) no less than 10 young men and young maidens, who had all gone through our hands, took part in the gathering—surely a true indication of their recognition of the Home as a True Home and accepted as an acknowledgment by the Staff and Committee of gratitude and appreciation of the Christian training and upbringing they had received at our hands.

Collections.

These from Circuits showed a slight improvement on last year, and a greater effort is hoped for in the coming year to help in this very worthwhile object of practical Christianity.

Wellington Board.

Acknowledgment is here made of the exceedingly friendly relationship existing between the parent body (the Wellington Board) and the Management Committee.

Bequests

Notification during the year was received of bequests from the Estate J. A. Sinclair £25, Hawera Church (per Rev. G. F. Stockwell) £50, Estate Mrs. Bowyer £425, and an additional gift of £200 from an anonymous donor, who last year made a gift of £250, and for all these and many smaller gifts we gratefully acknowledge same towards the carrying on of God's work in our Masterton Home.

In conclusion the Committee record with gratitude the unfailing attention to duty of Miss Allan (the Matron), and her loyal and

capable staff.

A word of thanks and appreciation is due to Dr. Prior for his watchful care of and love for the children in sickness and in health.

C .- SOUTH ISLAND ORPHANAGE AND CHILDREN'S HOME.

Report for 1939.

We have pleasure in reporting another year of rich mercies and blessings in connection with our Orphanage and Children's Home. It has been a year marked by some anxiety, with great activity, and many changes. The average number of children in the Home has been somewhat smaller than of recent years. At the present time we have 52 children in residence. The general health of the children, whilst in no way serious, has given more cause for care than usual. Our long freedom from illness has been remarkable, but unfortunately has not been so well maintained during the past year. The prevailing epidemics of measles and chicken-pox made their presence felt for a long period. Practically all the children suffered one or the other, in some cases both. Then one of our girls fell whilst playing and broke her leg. We are pleased to report that in every case there was a complete recovery. We are deeply indebted to the Staff for their untiring and unfailing care.

The Board has sought to pay special attention to the "aftercare" and oversight of those leaving the Home. The appointment of a Vocational Committee has proved most valuable. Suitable positions and occupations have been found for many senior children. Two of the older boys who had been with us for over 13 years (since they were three years of age) have both passed the Matriculation examina-

tion and have been placed in good Government positions.

Owing to many factors the applications for the admission of orphans is small, but unfortunately the applications for those who are in dire need of love and care through unworthy parents show a

marked increase.

After a period of six years as Chairman of the Board, Rev. Clarence Eaton removed from Christchurch. He had been deeply interested in the erection and management of the New Home. His leadership and service will ever be remembered, and will bear fruit in many ways. We regret to report the removal through death of two valued members of the Board. Mr. J. F. Carr had always shown practical sympathy and help and he will ever be remembered as one who loved the children. The untimely death of Mrs. F. B. Lawrence removed from us one whose intimate and devoted interest was most valuable.

Extensive property changes have been effected. With reservations of suitable land and buildings for future Orphanage use, the old Home site was sold to the Government for use in its new housing scheme. Thus a new settlement has sprung up around the Orphanage and Church. Two sections adjoining the New Home have been acquired for playing grounds and vegetable gardens. Through assistance of men from the Employment Bureau these grounds have been drained, levelled, and fenced at a very small cost to the Board. More

intensive use is being made of the vegetable grounds.

Through the gracious offices of the Christchurch City Council we were again enabled to hold the Street Day Appeal. This, in conjunction with the Radio Concert, netted the splendid response of £1096, of which our Methodist share amounted to £238/15/4. To all willing

helpers we would tender our grateful thanks.

Owing to various causes, this year is marked by many staff changes. After a brief time of service Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Butler resigned from the Home. Miss Ashcroft now leaves us after twenty years' loyal and faithful service. A new gardener has been appointed in the person of Mr. D. Hawke. The Board has been fortunate in that it has secured Miss G. S. Barclay as Matron. Miss Barclay comes to

us with a worthy record of Orphanage experience. With the new year other changes are pending. Rev. Kings retires after five years' service as Secretary, and Rev. E. Drake has been appointed as Organiser-Secretary. In reviving this office it is felt that an opportunity is provided for a much closer contact between the Home and the Circuits.

In a year that has presented its special problems we have been deeply conscious of Divine grace and guidance. We have known a Fellowship in service with Him, Who, as of old, calls the little ones

unto Him.

To Dr. A. J. Orchard and Mr. G. Sevicke Jones, we tender our sincere thanks. Their unfailing care and courtesy, their love and interest have made them more than helpers. Their service has been a labour of love for which we are especially grateful.

The Board will be nominated at the North Canterbury Synod.

"METHODIST TIMES" AND LITERATURE COMMITTEE.

Report for 1939.

The new contract providing for the printing of the "Methodist Times" in Levin has worked satisfactorily throughout the year and the printers have done faithful work. Difficulty is presented in procuring regular supplies of paper owing to import restrictions and to the unsettlement occasioned by the war.

This year has seen a further increase in the number of subscribers to the paper. The distinguished service being rendered by the Rev. H. E. Bellhouse as Editor evokes widespread expressions of appreciation. The Rev. J. Dennis has done zealous work as Associate-Editor. The Committee heartily recommends Mr. Bellhouse for reappointment and, with his approval, nominates Mr. Dennis as his Associate.

The work of the agents in the circuits is greatly valued by the Committee. In all Districts there are subscriptions still unpaid. Ministers are asked to co-operate with the circuit agents in promoting the wider circulation of the paper.

The financial statements for the year ended 31st October show the position of the funds and reveal a small surplus for the period. War conditions must result in added costs for production. The Committee therefore requests the approval of a grant of £125 from the Contingent Fund in addition to the standing grant of one half of the honoraria for the editors and their contingent expenses. It also asks for a grant of £175 from the Connexional Fire Insurance Fund.

The Committee places on record its appreciation of the work of Mr. D. E. Parton, who has served as Chairman of the Committee for some years and who will shortly leave Christchurch. Mr. Parton has taken a vital interest in all matters affecting the welfare of the paper and has been ceaseless in his efforts to promote its welfare. The Committee also thanks the retiring members, Revs. T. J. Wallis, W. Grigg, and H. L. Fiebig for services faithfully rendered.

QUESTION L.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference concerning Military and Naval Affairs?

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Chaplains of the Church have attended to the spiritual and social needs of the officers and men in the various Territorial Camps held during the year in all areas in the Northern, Central, and Southern Commands. For four years your Senior Chaplain has regularly conducted Church Parades at Trentham Military Camp, doing this work voluntarily without any remuneration, even for travelling. Under war conditions this voluntary work has now ceased.

Now that international problems have been referred to the dreadful abitrament of war, we as Christians must refrain from anything that would divide the Church or embarrass the Nation in its hour of dire peril.

The first group of seven Chaplains (one of whom is a Methodist) from the various Churches was appointed on the basis of each Church's numerical strength as revealed in the Census.

In future each Church will have the right to another Chaplain for every thousand of its members or adherents who enter Camp.

The Defence Department has stated that it will appoint as a Chaplain only the nominee of the Senior Chaplain of each Church.

The procedure followed by your Senior Chaplain is to receive nominations and suggestions from the various Methodist Chaplaincy Boards, submit these to the President of the Conference, then nominate to the Defence Department the one whom the President approves.

The Rev. V. R. Jamieson proceeds overseas with the first echelon as the representative of our Church among the soldiers. The next for duty has been approved by the President, notified by the Defence Department, and on his medical examination proving satisfactory, will be called into camp when required.

To enable our Chaplains to render effective service, Conference is requested to consider the undermentioned suggestions which were forwarded to the various Synods and approved with virtually no vital alterations.

Regarding the Air Force, at each aerodrome one of our ministers has been appointed as a Chaplain. Because of the comparatively small number of men at each aerodrome, the ministers so appointed have a different status from Army Chaplains because air force duties demand but a small portion of their time. They have, however, the full status of Air Force Chaplains.

RELATIONS OF ACTIVE SERVICE CHAPLAINS AND CIRCUITS.

- 4. (a) That where the wife and family of a Chaplain on active service do not occupy the Parsonage, an allowance of £100 per annum be made from the Chaplaincy Fund to the Chaplain from the first day of the month following his entry into camp.
 - (b) That Chaplains actually on Active Service receive no Circuit Stipend from the first day of the month following their entry into camp.
 - (c) That where a Chaplain on service is not appointed to a Circuit, any current connexional levies due shall be paid from the Chaplaincy Fund; and where a Chaplain is appointed to a Circuit only the personal subscription to the Supernumerary Fund shall be paid by the Chaplaincy Fund.
 - (d) That the Circuit pay cost of Supply and pay into the Methodist Chaplaincy Fund fifty per cent. of the difference between cost of the Supply and the usual stipend of the minister called up for Chaplain's duties.
 - (e) That Conference establish a Methodist Chaplaincy Fund of £1,000; the Connexional Secretary and Mr. H. De R. Flesher to be the two Trustees of that Fund; that the Chaplains' Advisory Board of the Central Command shall administer the Chaplaincy Fund; the Conveners of the various Chaplains' Advisory Boards to be corresponding members.
 - (f) Conference authorise an appeal for donations to the Methodist Chaplaincy Fund, such appeal to be launched during the April-June Quarter of this year, and if possible on Anzac Sunday. That the Senior Chaplain be authorised to prepare such an appeal to be sent to the Minister and Circuit Stewards to be read to the congregations on the Sunday previous to the offering being made.
 - (g) The purposes of this Fund—to provide house allowance for Chaplains on service, equipment for Chaplaincy work such as hymn books, stationery, literature, Testaments, etc.
- 5. That Conference accept with gratitude the generous offer of the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. to place at the disposal of our Chaplains the free use of Y.M.C.A. huts and equipment, including a special room for Chaplains.
- Conference commends to our people the joint appeal now being made on behalf of the National Patriotic Fund for Soldier Comforts.
- 7. That in view of the fact that our Chaplains on Active Service are to receive a grant of £52 per annum from the National Patriotic Fund for social work amongst the soldiers, Conference agrees to recommend our Circuits to take up a retiring collection for this Fund at an opportune time.
- 8. WET CANTEENS.—That while deprecating the establishment of Wet Canteens in Military Camps, we are opposed to any discrimination against men on military service; the Government is therefore urged to adopt as a measure of war-time national policy the total prohibition of the sale of intoxicants except for medicinal purposes and alcohol for industrial purposes; on economical grounds alone the importation and unrestricted use of

spirits is not justified when essential goods are urgently required.

CENTENARY THANKSGIVING FUND APPEAL.

- 1. That in view of the fact that 1940 marks not only the Dominion Centennial, but also the Centenary anniversary and founding of Christian Missions in the South Island by the Methodist Church, we as a Missionary Church with roots in pioneering activities among the Maori people, undertake to make some lasting and worthy recognition of these events.
- That to ease the acute embarrassment caused to our Church activities by the indebtedness of many of our trusts, and to release the energies of our Church for aggressive advance work, a special connexional financial appeal be made.
- 3. That for these purposes Conference inaugurate during the present session a Centennial Thanksgiving Fund, the appeal to be made during 1940, and the redeeming of promises if desired to be spread over the next three years.
- That the Appeal be for the sum of £50,000 for the following objects:—
 - (a) Otakou Memorial Church up to the figure required to qualify for the Government Subsidy.
 - (b) Deaconess Retiring Fund, £2,000.
 - (c) The Taranaki Maori Girls' School, £20,000.
 - (d) The Capital Fund of the Deaconess Institution, £2,000.
 - (e) A General Thanksgiving Fund, £25,000, to be used as under: The full expenses of the Appeal.

 Reduction of Trust Debts or assistance of objectives as approved by the Committee and the Foreign Mission Fund: the ratio to be determined by the Conference following the recommendation of the Centennial Appeal Committee.
- 5. That the following be the governing principles of the Appeal:-
 - (a) Donors to Thanksgiving Fund may allocate up to 50% of their contribution to local or other necessitous trusts (as in 4e) such trusts to be approved by the Conference Centennial Appeal Committee in consultation with the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee.

- (b) That all donors have the right to allocate their gifts to any one particular section of the Appeal if they so desire, on the understanding that in the event of the full amount of any one objective being met by allocated donations any balance shall be placed in the General Fund for allocation by the Committee.
- (c) That the first claim on all unallocated monies to be paid in full be that of the full expenses of the Appeal, and the objects as in 4 a, b, c and d in order.
- (d) After these claims have been met, all remaining monies be divided between needy trusts which have not been eased by their local efforts, and the Foreign Mission Fund, such disbursement to be determined by the Conference on the recommendation of the Centennial Appeal Committee.
- 6. That the oganisation of the Appeal be as under:-

STATEMENT OF FAITH.

Report of Committee.

The Committee has co-operated with the Spiritual Advance Committee in the publication of the Statement. We are gratified that the booklet, "We Affirm," has been well received and is in steady demand.

With the friendly co-operation of the Editor we were able to secure space in the "Methodist Times" for a series of explanatory articles. The Church is indebted to the brethren who contributed to the series, which served both to bring the Statement before our people and to unfold its teaching.

The Committee is of opinion that there is still work for it to do

in this direction, and that it should be re-appointed for another year.

CENTENNIAL EXHIBITION COMMITTEE.

Following on the resolution hereon of the Conference of 1939 (vide "Minutes," pages 167-8), a Committee of nine was appointed, nominated by the three Contributing Departments, namely, the Contingent Fund, the Home Mission Department and the Foreign Mission Department, which said Departments had contributed in equal amounts the sum of £500 necessary for the rental of our three stalls (subsequently converted into one) at the Exhibition.

Almost immediately thereafter the above Committee met and co-opted not only local (Wellington) but also corresponding members who were duly appointed to special Committees dealing with "Building," "Finance," "Stalls" and "Programmes," at the same time appoint-

ing as Convener the Rev. R. B. Gosnell.

It should be remembered that Church representation at a Dominion Exhibition by means of stalls and daily programmes in a hall is quite a new departure and the first few months were taken up mainly with correspondence between the Committee and every department of our Church life and activity, in addition to frequent attendance at meetings of the United Church's Committee, a body consisting of representatives of other denominations and of certain organizations interested in the spiritual and moral well-being of the people.

By this time it was clearly in evidence that if the preliminary and sustaining work were to be done in a satisfactory manner, arrangements would have to be made for an assistant to be placed in the Thorndon Circuit and this was done by means of the Home Mission

Department.

Doubtless it was this lack of previous experience that resulted in no funds being placed at the disposal of the Committee for the initial and running expenses of our stalls, hence the action of the Committee in making an appeal, sanctioned by the President of the Conference, to all Church Guilds for financial assistance, also a general appeal to all Methodist people, per medium of the "N.Z. Methodist Times." Therefore every Guild in the Dominion was approached and the response thus far has been fair, some of the smaller Guilds making sacrificial giving, but no donations thus far have been received from other sources in an endeavour by the Committee to present a "Daily Witness for Christ throughout the whole term of the Exhibition."

Despite delays occasioned by the failure of certain Departments to regard letters and enquiries with a measure of concern, by means of many consultations and much correspondence the final plans as approved by the Committee were in readiness and certain work had been authorized when war broke out in early September. During the whole of the month and up to the time of writing special meetings have been held and every endeavour has been made to meet the new situation. We have kept in close touch with the United Church's Committee and this Committee has determined to proceed with the general idea of the Church Court. In point of fact, the Church Court had by this time been completed and our promised financial obligations were due for payment in full. To have withdrawn at this stage would have meant a loss to the Methodist Church of at least £500 and to refrain now from further expenditure by the Committee would see our representation at the Centennial Exhibition consisting of a bare stall with nothing to indicate the ownership thereof or the fact that Methodism was existent in the Dominion and had been so for more than a century of time.

However, in response to requests and suggestions from various quarters, certain plans have been postponed until the future is more definite, and our representation at the Exhibition will, from a display standpoint, be on a much more moderate scale than was at first antici-

pated and arranged.

Thus the position stands at the present but the whole Church may rest assured that the Committee will act with great discretion, at the same time seeking more earnestly than heretofore, the hearty and sympathetic co-operation of every Department of our New Zealand Methodist Church.

CIRCUIT TRANSPORT.

Report of Special Committee.

(Minutes of Conference 1939, page 158, No. 3)

The Committee has had before it during the year the memorial of the Mahurangi Circuit on Circuit Transport. This matter is an urgent one, but owing to the many issues involved, and the new complications caused by the outbreak of war, it is felt that the time is not opportune to present any radical scheme for dealing with the problem on a Connexional footing.

The Committee would in the meantime draw the attention of officials in those circuits where the necessary policy of the Church is to utilise cars for Circuit Transport purposes, to the anomalies

which now exist.

Few Ministers receive sufficient remuneration for the use of their cars for this work, some receiving as little as 1.02 pence per mile to cover all expenses. The average payment through the Connexion is only 1.52 pence per mile.

The official Journal of the Auckland Automobile Association computes the cost of running cars (including depreciation) as fol-

lows:-

8 H.P. Car 3.477 pence per mile 10 H.P. Car 4.299 pence per mile 12 H.P. Car 5.164 pence per mile 16 H.P. Car 5.773 pence per mile 25 H.P. Car 6.292 pence per mile

Many Circuits are not recognising the sustained cost of keeping Circuit-owned cars on the road, with the result that they are periodically faced with a large capital expense for repairs and replacements, with insufficient money in hand to meet this expense. We recommend that consideration be given to ways and means of setting aside regular amounts each quarter in a car fund for meeting the replacement costs on circuit cars.

A strong Committee of the Circuit Quarterly Meeting to meet either of the above problems would be of great assistance in most

Circuits.

The Committee feels that some Connexional move must ultimately be made to ease the problem, and requests that it be reappointed to continue its investigations into a larger scheme for consideration at a later date.

WOMEN AND THE MINISTRY.

Early in the connexional year the Board communicated with the seven ladies appointed as Corresponding Members, and four replies were received. Two were enthusiastically in favour of the appointment of women as ministers. The other two were also convinced of the need for more trained women at work in the Church, but considered that the position could best be met by an improvement in the training and the status of the Deaconess Order.

The Board of Studies was not unsympathetic to the proposals, but felt that the question was too large to be handled satisfactorily by a small committee without lay representation. We therefore

resolved :-

"That we see no insuperable difficulty in training women candidates for the ministry at Trinity College if that were desired; but in view of the importance and urgency of the question we refer it back to Conference with the request that a large representative committee of ministers, laymen, and women be appointed to consider every aspect of the question and report."

MINISTERIAL TRAINING.

Report of Committee.

(1939 Minutes, pages 93f.)

The Auckland members of the Committee investigating the Training of Ministers have met regularly throughout the year, and have corresponded with the other members of the Committee, and with the Christchurch members who met as a separate Committee.

The Committee reports that it has not been able to complete its commission owing to the quantity of material presented by the Corresponding Members of the Committee, and to the necessity for a thorough examination of the whole system of training.

The Committee has exhaustively dealt with the question of the selection, training, and examination of candidates, and is at present engaged in the examination of the methods of teaching and system of training in vogue in the College.

The Committee recommends that the Committee as printed on Pages 93f., 1939 Minutes, be re-appointed, and that the Committee

report to the Examination Committee and Conference 1941.

REPORT OF THE SOUTH ISLAND CENTENARY COMMITTEE.

During the year the resolutions passed by Conference have been carried out as far as possible. (See Conference Minutes 1939, p.

153-4.)

Although our request for a Government subsidy had not been granted, a letter was received in August last from the Department of Internal Affairs, Centennial Branch, informing us that the historical events associated with the Memorial justify the project, and that they are approaching the matter from another angle. They regard the church with its Maori interior and Museum, commemorat-ing as it does the Treaty of Waitangi as a "Maori Centennial Memorial." The approximate cost being £2,500, the Government will make a grant of £625, providing we raise £1,875.

During the year we have posted circulars of appeal to some hundreds of our N.Z. Methodists, but the results have not been encouraging. Seeing that the July offerings last year did not come up to expecta-tions, Conference again requested "all" our churches to take up

retiring offerings in July, 1939.

During the past six months we have also posted many letters of appeal to private individuals, public bodies and business firms in Dunedin and district. We have also interviewed ninety business firms in the city, and so far have been encouraged and have had considerable success; but unfortunately due later to the war and increased taxation some of the firms and public bodies have cancelled their promises. Some of the firms have, however, only postponed their promises and we still hope for success. Several public bodies have definitely promised financial support.

The position at present is that we have still to raise approximately £700 to qualify for the Government subsidy. We believe that but for the unfortunate effects of the war the Memorial Church would have been built and ready for dedication at the 1940 Conference. As this is not possible we can only lay the foundation stone and trust to the generosity of our people to raise the balance required.

We have a unique opportunity. Our Church has been favoured by Providence with the honour and privilege of establishing the first Christian Mission in the South Island. Our Methodist Chiefs signed the Treaty of Waitangi, and we have the privilege of being the custodians of a National Memorial.

We trust that our people will rise to the occasion. Our thanks are due for help rendered by Mr. G. S. Gapper and the Revs. T. Skuse and W. Falkingham; also to our various Circuits for their retiring offerings, and to our Guilds, Sunday Schools, Bible Classes, and Endeavour Societies for financial help. We also express our deep appreciation to the public bodies, business firms, and individuals who have given to this worthy project.

Karitane Cairn.

The Maori people have offered to convey to our Church the remaining portion of the old Karitane Mission Section for the purpose of erecting thereon a Memorial Cairn and ultimately a church. We have applied to the Native Land Court for permission to have the section surveyed and conveyed under the Methodist Model Deed. The case will be heard on January 27, 1940.

REPORT OF CONVENER OF RADIO COMMITTEE.

This Committee was appointed by Conference (see Minutes, 1939, p. 127), and held its only meeting on Thursday, 24th August, 1939. Rev. P. R. Paris presided and explained that as Conference had not appointed a convener, he had asked the Rev. J. H. Haslam to act in that capacity.

All the members of the Committee appointed by Conference were present.

The Convener read a letter he had received from Rev. L. B. Neale, a corresponding member of the Committee. The Chairman then outlined the circumstances which led to Mr. Neale losing certain privileges he had enjoyed in connection with a private Broadcasting Station in Dunedin known as 4ZM, owing to the policy of the Government to bring all stations under its control, and further explained what was under consideration by the Director and the Central Committee of Religious Broadcasting with respect to Sunday Broadcasting in particular. After some discussion the following resolutions were passed unanimously by the Committee:—

- This Methodist Broadcast Committee respectfully requests the Central Religious Broadcasting Committee and the Director to consider the advisability of the Sunday evening broadcast services being given from the 2YA Studio, and by specially chosen men regarded as most suitable for the work.
- 2. This Committee further suggests to the Central Committee the advisability of exploring the possibility of united action by the Churches to choose and set aside a man to conduct the proposed Sunday evening religious broadcast from 2YA Studio.

These resolutions were forwarded to the Director of Broadcasting and brought before the Central Committee, but up to the present no decision has been reached, and the position remains much the same as hitherto. But the decision of the Government to take over all private stations has narrowed the scope of usefulness of the Conference Committee, and in the absence of decisions upon its only resolutions there was no call for a second meeting. If Conference considers the re-appointment of the Committee desirable, a new Convener will be needed as the present Convener will not be available for reappointment on the Committee. He suggests that Rev. R. B. Gosnell be appointed in his place.

LAW BOOK REVISION COMMITTEE'S REPORT, 1939.

The Committee has been occupied during the year with matters referred to it by the last Conference, and with the consideration of the regulations governing the Home Mission Department. In addition sundry other matters have been considered, as set out in our recommendations below.

The pamphlet for distribution to Solicitors, Trust Companies, Public Trust Offices, etc., has been prepared by the Connexional Secretary and Mr. H. de R. Flesher, and will soon be ready for distribution to the people and offices concerned. This should help those wishing to benefit the Institutions, Causes and Funds of the Church, and should meet a long-felt need.

Last Conference dealt with the question of the eligibility of Home Missionaries for election as Circuit representatives to Con-

ference (see Minutes p. 162, par. 4).

When the Committee came to the question of the status of retired Home Missionaries, they (with the Home Mission Board) discovered that the present law already states that a retired Home Missionary enjoys all the privileges of the Home Missionary in the active work. He is a member of the District Synod and (on some matters) of the District Ministerial Committee, and is eligible to be elected as one of the representatives of the Home Missionaries to the Conference. To grant them the right of representation at Conference as laymen, would need to be done at the sacrifice of other privileges which they enjoy. It is also considered that a Home Missionary is more likely to represent the point of view of a minister than of a layman. It is therefore recognised that a Home Missionary cannot entirely represent a layman. The Committee and the Home Mission Board re-

commend that the Law remain as at present.

Amongst the recommendations set out below are some defining the Constitution of the Home Mission Board. No constitution has been specifically stated hitherto, the Board consisting of a very large number, including the Ministers of the whole of the Auckland city and suburbs, numbering at present thirty-eight. The committee in consultation with the Home Mission Board now proposes that the maximum number of members of the Board be forty. This will include an equal number of ministers and laymen. The question has been raised whether this should be regarded as legislation that affects the privileges (by usage) of the ministers, and should therefore be sent down to the Synods and the succeeding Conference before it can become law. The Committee are of the opinion that the contention cannot be sustained and submit that this can become Law at the present Conference.

The Committee has sought to frame regulations for, and to define the duties of, Mission Secretaries so that they will apply to

both Home and Foreign Missions.

Our work for next year will comprise the revision and consolidation of the regulations governing the Youth Department, the Foreign

Mission, and other Departments.

We recommend the reappointment of the Committee as follows:

DUTIES OF CIRCUIT AND LOCAL SECRETARIES OF HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

A. Circuit Secretaries.

The Circuit Secretaries for Home and Foreign Missions shall in consultation with the minister or ministers of the Circuit:-

- (a) Supervise their respective campaigns for the whole circuit.
- (b) Arrange for a Chairman (layman if possible) to preside at the annual meeting in each church.
- (c) Maintain touch with the local secretaries, receive monies from them and remit the same without delay through the circuit stewards to the General Treasurer of the Fund. They shall prepare and forward to the same Treasurer a financial statement, including a complete list of subscribers.
- (d) Present an annual report to the Quarterly Meeting and keep that meeting advised of all relevant matters which affect the Circuit.
- (e) Arrange for all advertising in connection with the Mission Anniversary.
- (f) Arrange for the supply, distribution, and collection of Mission Boxes and collecting Books.

B. Local Secretaries.

The Local Secretary shall in consultation with the minister:-

- (a) Arrange for pulpit announcements for two Sundays preceding the Mission Anniversaries, and for other pulpit announcements affecting Mission interests.
- (b) Arrange for the distribution of Annual Reports and Subscription Lists prior to the Anniversary.
- (c) Arrange for the distribution of all literature and advertising matter in connection with Missionary efforts.
- (d) Arrange with the choirmaster for special musical items for Missionary celebrations.
- (e) Arrange the programme for the Annual Meeting, and present a short report and financial statement thereat.
- (f) Attend to the distribution and return of Mission Boxes.
- (g) Receive all Missionary monies, and hand the same without delay to the Circuit Secretary, together with a complete financial statement including a list of subscribers.

(6) Supervisors of Circuits and Home Mission Stations:

Law Book page 29, add to paragraph 111: Conference may appoint a minister in full connexion from the same District as supervisor of any such Circuit or Home Mission Station. Such supervisor shall act in consultation with the Chairman of the District concerned. This shall not in any way affect the rights and privileges of the Chairman of the District as superintendent of such Circuit or Home Mission Station.

(7) Provision for Married Minister:

That paragraph 208, page 58, of the Law Book be repealed and the following substituted therefor:—208. A circuit to which an additional unmarried minister or probationer is appointed at the request of such circuit shall undertake to provide for a married minister at the end of four years from the date of such appoint-When a circuit which has a married minister and a probationer is divided and a probationer is appointed to the new circuit, such circuit shall provide for a married minister at the end of four years from the time of the appointment of the probationer to the undivided circuit. In cases where Conference has previously extended the term of the appointment for a probationer beyond four years it shall determine at what period the new circuit shall fulfil its obligation to provide for a married minister. In no case shall an unmarried probationer be appointed to a circuit where there is a furnished parsonage until the financial aspect of such proposed appointment has been re-ported upon by the Home Mission Committee of Conference. When a married Home Missionary has been appointed for any term to a circuit or home mission station such appointment shall be regarded as equivalent to the appointment of a probationer and, save in exceptional cases to be determined by Conference, its status and obligation shall rank accordingly when a minister or probationer is proposed for appointment thereto.

III.—THE HOME MISSION DEPARTMENT.

Law Book, Page 97 (a):

Add N.B. The Home Mission Estimates of Income and Expenditure shall be based on the average ordinary income of the preceding three years.

Law Book, Page 120, Regulation 4, Paragraph 283: Add to 2, "The objectives of the Department shall be:-

- (5) The initiation and development of social and philanthropic work.
- (6) The establishment and maintenance of a Literature and

Colporteur Society.

Alter 3 (3) to read, "Circuit Organisations."

Alter 4. A Committee shall be formed in each Circuit to obtain funds to promote the objectives of the Department. One Sunday in each year shall be set apart as Home Mission Sunday, when special intercession shall be made on behalf of the objectives of the Department. Wherever practicable, a public meeting shall be held in each preaching place. Sunday and week-night collections shall be made on behalf of the Department.

CONSTITUTION OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD.

That regulation 7, page 121, Law Book, be repealed and the following substituted therefor:—

- 7. (a) The general management of the Department shall be under the control of the Conference, which shall annually appoint the Home Mission Board and its Officers.
 - (b) The officers shall consist of a ministerial and a lay General Treasurer, a General Superintendent, and an Assistant Superintendent.

(c) The board shall consist of the General Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent, the senior Maori Superintendent, the Chairman of the Auckland District, the Principal of the Theological College, the Ministerial Treasurer, the General Secretary of the Foreign Mission Department, nine ministers in active circuit work in the Auckland city and suburban circuits, three Supernumerary ministers, and one Home Missionary, the Lay General Treasurer, the President of the Women's Missionary Union, two representatives nominated by the Women's Missionary Union, one representative nominated by the Young Women's and the Young Men's Bible Class Movements respectively, and fourteen lay representatives (the lay representatives shall be resident in Auckland), and such life members as Conference from time to time may appoint on the nomination of the Home Mission Board, on the condition that the personnel of the Board shall be not more than 42 members.

The Connexional Secretary shall be a corresponding member of the Board.

(d) Any member who is absent from three consecutive meetings of the Board without a good reason shall be deemed to have relinquished his seat on the Board, and the Board may appoint a substitute in his place.

DUTIES OF GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT.

See Law Book, Page 123, Regulation 10:

That regulation 10 be repealed and the following substituted therefor:—

As the chief executive officer of the Department, the General Superintendent shall:—

- Be regarded as the General Adviser and Director of Church Extension for the Dominion.
- (2) Act as General Superintendent of Home and Maori Missions,
- (3) Visit personally or by deputy all home mission stations and aided circuits, and confer with the minister or home missionary and officials concerning the state of the work, circuit organisation and finance, and future prospects, and report thereon to the Home Mission Board and the District Committees.
- (4) Encourage circuits and home mission stations to increase their usefulness, strengthen their organisation and finance and improve their status and staffing.
- (5) Advise and assist in the organisation of special Inspirational and Evangelistic Missions.
- (6) Encourage employment of deaconesses in city and rural areas.
- (7) Study population trends, visit untouched areas seeking new openings for our work, and report thereon.
- (8) Have power, in consultation with the Chairmen of the Districts and the superintendents of the circuits concerned, to convene meetings of ministers and officials to consider his proposals for Church Extension and consolidation and Evangelism.

- (9) In conjunction with the Chairman of the District, take all necessary steps to place each new station on a proper basis.
- (10) Advise and co-operate with the Youth Department in establishing Sunday Schools in areas where there is no efficient circuit organisation.
 - (11) Furnish to the General Statistical Secretary statistics of
 - (12) After consultation with the Board, nominate to the President of the Conference approved Home Missionaries and Deaconesses as officiating ministers under the Marriage Act.
 - (13) In consultation with the Chairman of a District, authorise in writing approved home missionaries or other persons to administer the Sacraments within specified areas. Such authority may be revoked at any time by the Chairman of the District or the General Superintendent.
 - (14) Maintain close contact with each District Committee to ensure its effective functioning especially in relation to extension work.
 - (15) Act as secretary of the H.M.C.E. Investment Funds Board and the Methodist Mission Property Trustees.
 - (16) Supervise Bookroom and Colporteur Work.
 - (17) Have power to appear before Synods personally or be represented by his assistant to speak on matters affecting the work of the Department.

DUTIES OF ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT.

Law Book, Page 125, Regulation 11:

That regulation 11 be repealed and the following substituted therefor:—

- 11. (1) A Minister shall be appointed as Assistant to the General Superintendent.
 - (2) The term of such appointment shall be three years.
 - (3) He shall (a) Assist, in consultation with, and under the direction of the General Superintendent, in furthering the effectiveness of the Home Mission and Maori Mission work throughout the Dominion, giving special attention to the organisation within the circuits of the Annual Home Mission Appeal.
 - (b) Act when required as Deputy for the General Superintendent.
 - (c) Confer and assist in matters of organisation and development especially in aided circuits and Home Mission Stations.

Law Book, Page 126, Paragraph 17:

That 17 be repealed and the following be substituted therefor, page 27, paragraph 105, 3: To forward to the General Superintendent of Home Missions (a) a statement of receipts and expenditure on account of the Fund within the District. (b) A copy of the list of the estimates of income for the current year, and the requests for grants together with the Circuit Balance Sheets and statements of Trust position required.

- (c) A copy of all resolutions affecting:-
- (1) The boundaries of Circuits and new Stations.
- (2) The number of Ministers and Probationers or Home Missionaries required.
- (3) Applications by Ministers for permission to rest or to become Supernumeraries or to return to the active work.
- (4) The names of candidates for the ministry recommended for acceptance.
- (5) A copy of all resolutions bearing on the Annual Reports of Home and Maori Missions.

HOME MISSION DEPUTATIONS.

Law Book, Page 127. Add after 23:

- (a) That the services of Home Missionaries, Deaconesses, and Ministers with Home Mission experience be utilised in Deputation work.
- (b) That Circuit Home Mission committees make complete arrangements to ensure the success of the Home Mission appeal in every preaching place, and that care he exercised in the appointment of collectors for canvassing all members and adherents.

DEACONESSES AS OFFICIATING MINISTERS.

Add to Page 136 V After 5:

(6) That Deaconesses while holding the status of acting Home Missionaries and also senior Deaconesses engaged in Maori work may be gazetted as officiating Ministers under the Marriage Act, if nominated by the General Superintendent of Home Missions.

Law Book, Page 136, add (7):

"Permission may be granted by the General Superintendent to Deaconesses engaged in Maori work to administer the Sacrament of Baptism where a Minister is not available."

ENGAGING PERSONS AS EVANGELISTS.

Add to paragraph 101, Section 2, at top of page 26 Law Book, the following:—


No person shall be engaged as an evangelist in any circuit or Home Mission Station who has not previously received the approval of the President of the Conference, on the recommendation of the Spiritual Advance Committee.


PRESIDENTIAL RULING.

Circuit Levies.

The question asked was—as to whether the words "For the year ending September 30th (Law Book, P. 154, par. 287—Reg. 2), referred to September 30th preceding the year of levy, or the current year." The President ruled that it refers to the preceding year.

The Conference confirmed the ruling.





QUESTION LVI.—What are the Resolutions of the Conference on other Questions?

WORLD CONFERENCE ON FAITH AND ORDER.

In the absence of the Rev. E. P. Blamires from the Dominion, the Rev. Fred Greenwood undertook to act as Convener of the Conference Committee, and from the nature of the composition of the Committee it was not possible for it to meet. Mr. Greenwood has requested me as a member of the Committee to act on his behalf and present a report. In doing so I suggest that the Committee to be appointed be of a sufficient number of members in one centre to make meetings possible, additional members to be corresponding members. I recommend that five members of the Wellington Ministers' Fraternal constitute the main Committee with power to co-opt lay-members when thought desirable. The corresponding members to be the members of the 1939 Committee residing outside of Wellington, with the exception of Rev. E. P. Blamires, now absent from the Dominion.

This Committee should be confirmed in the authority given last

This Committee should be confirmed in the authority given last Conference to act in co-operation with other churches when any meetings may be called to constitute a New Zealand Council of Churches.

ings may be called to constitute a New Zealand Council of Churches. In view of the importance of the Ecumenical Movement being fostered by the World Conference of Faith and Order it is eminently desirable that the Conference should be kept in touch with all devlopments, for which purpose I recommend the annual contribution of £5 plus exchange be again made.

Ladies' Guilds.

That Conference places on record its sincere gratitude to the thousands of ladies who constitute the Women's Guilds of our Churches for their valuable yet quiet, ungrudging, and unobtrusive service by which the Parsonages of the Dominion are kept in good order and the funds of the Circuit and Trust Boards are supported.

CAPITATION FUND.

Recognising the need of a forward movement in Methodism and that the time has come when monies should be made available for aggressive work, Conference create a fund which shall be designated a "Methodist Capital Fund," the interest only of which is to be used. The Fund would assist Trustee Boards in the work of renovation, alteration, extension, and erection of Parsonages, Sunday Schools, Churches, Missions, and Institutions.

That the Fund be limited to £50,000 and be built up over a period of 30 years and that until such period has elapsed no grants be

made. That all grants be gratuitous.

RESOLUTION.

That the matter be referred to the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee for consideration.

Duplex Envelope System.

With a view to elevating the financial contributions of our Church members throughout New Zealand to the work and enterprise of the Church, this Conference endorses the principle of systematic regular weekly giving and recommends the Duplex Envelope System as the simplest and best method of attaining that object and providing a more even flow of money to the Home and Foreign Mission departments.

STIPENDS.

RESOLUTIONS.

- That the Conference believes that the adequate maintenance of Ministers, Probationers and Home Missionaries, is one of great importance.
- In view of the increase in cost of living and taxation, and in view of general increases given to workmen in Industry and Commerce, this Conference increases the standard of minimum stipends by 10%.
- 3. That stipends should be a first charge on all collections, save those ordered by the Conference for Connexional purposes.
- 4. That in cases where the stipend of Ministers is in arrears, or in cases where the minimum stipend is not being paid, the Conference directs that at least 50% of monies raised by efforts for special local church purposes be used for stipend purposes.

TAXATION OF MINISTERS. REVISED REGULATIONS.

the Minutes of Conference 1940, pages 189 and 190, will be found the instructions given by the Commis-sioner of Taxes to all ministers and to church officers and others who are responsible for the payment of stipend and other moneys.

The instructions in Sections, numbered 1 to 10, relating to the payment of the Social Security Tax and Income Tax are now confirmed subject to the following alterations and additions.

Section 3 should read "Fees received from solemnisation of marriages and fees for the conduct of funerals are deemed to be income other than salary or wages and must be declared accordingly."

Section 6. As the income tax form has been altered, delete the following words from lines 2 and 3 of the Sec-

tion:—"In item 10 Part A of the form." Section 7 (b) relating to motor cars should read:—"Depreciation on a car when owned by the taxpayer, is an-nually allowable at the rate of 20 per cent, of the diminishing value. An asset account must be kept and depreciation written off therein, and a copy of the asset account must be attached to the annual income tax return.

The following additional matters

should be noted:-

1. The annual subscription of ministers to the Supernumerary Fund is allowable as a special exemption from

income tax.

2. Where the church pays the minister an allowance for the sole purpose of meeting entertainment and hospitality expenses, a deduction may be made in calculating his liability for Social Security charge and National Security tax, but the amount of any deduction is strictly limited to the actual expenses incurred, or to the actual expenses incurred, or to the amount of the hospitality allowance, whichever is the less. This deduction applies only to any specific allowance granted by resolution of the church court expressly for hospitality purposes. It does not apply to any part of the stipend of the minister.

The foregoing matters should be carefully studied by all ministers, circuit stewards and other church officers

affected.

It would be wise to cut out this paragraph and insert it with the other tax regulations adopted by the Conference of 1940.

- 5. That in cases where the minimum is not being paid or the stipend is in arrears the Chairman of the District be directed to visit the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits concerned and urge them to endeavour to meet the wishes of Conference, and that the Chairman take with him some laymen to support him in his appeal.
- That Conference requests the Home Mission Board to give consideration to the possibility of stipends being made a connexional responsibility with the consequent readjustment of connexional levies, and report to next Conference.
 CONNEXIONAL CHARGES.

That the Ministers of Palmerston North, Feilding, Sanson-Rongotea, Ashhurst-Bunnythorpe, Woodville, Pahiatua Circuits, with one layman from each of these Circuits, appointed by their Quarterly Meetings, be a Committee to consider the basis of Connexional Charges and report to next Synod and Conference. Convener, Rev. H. L. Fiebig.

TAXATION OF MINISTERS.

SOCIAL SECURITY AND INCOME TAX.

The Commissioner of Taxes advises that the liability of ministers of religion for income tax and Social Security charge has been reviewed. He requests that the following information be supplied to our ministers and to church officers who are responsible for the payment of stipend and other monies.

- 1. Social Security charge is required to be deducted and accounted for as on salary and wages and the person making the stipend payments is responsible for the application of the correct amount and is required to satisfy himself that the expenses claimed are fair and reasonable and were actually and necessarily incurred in the production of the remuneration.
- 2. Payments made to ministers from the Children's Fund are in the nature of additional remuneration and are taxable at the time of payment.
- Fees received from solemnisation of marriages are deemed for Social Security charge purposes to be income other than salary or wages and must be declared accordingly.
- 4. Where a free house is provided by the Church the value thereof is assessed at one-sixth of the stipend for the purpose of arriving at the gross income.
- 5. To cover the use of study or library, however, one-sixth of the rental value of the house is allowable as a deduction. Where a minister pays his own rent, such "rental value" would be the actual amount paid and where he owns his own house it would be a fair rental value (not necessarily based on his stipend).
- 6. In the return of income for Income Tax purposes a minister who receives a free house would show as income in item 10 Part A of the form the full rental value assessed as stated above and claim as a deduction one sixth thereof under "Rent." A person paying his own rent or owning his own house would merely claim under "Rent" one sixth of the rental value.

- 7. The following are also deductions allowable to Ministers:-
- (a) Car expenses in excess of the allowance, if any, provided by the Church for that purpose.
- (b) Depreciation at the rate of ten per cent. per annum on the original cost of the car when owned by the taxpayer provided a car account is kept.
- (c) Petty expenses including toll charges, stationery and postages. Lighting, heating and cleaning of study.
- (d) One sixth of the wages and keep of maid or other employed help.
- (e) The cost of periodicals purchased for use in the profession. (The cost of new books for library is not allowable except where such books are purchased for replacement purposes).
- 8. Regarding car expenses where the car is provided and maintained by the Church, the minister does not incur any expenses, but when the car is provided by the Church and an allowance made to cover upkeep and running expenses, and such allowance is insufficient to cover the expenses, then the minister may claim the difference between the allowance and the actual expenses. This would also apply where the minister owned the car. It must be distinctly understood, however, that the deduction may be claimed only in respect of travelling expenses actually incurred in Church work and no private running should be included.
- No deduction is permissible for out-of-pocket expenses in providing assistance to charitable objects or to needy persons.
- 10. Honoraria to organists and wages to cleaners and other casual workers are liable for the charge at the source.
- 11. The Commissioner of Taxes is considering whether the payment of £15 per annum made to the Supernumerary Fund by circuits and departments in respect of each minister appointed thereto is additional income and consequently assessable for income tax and social security charge. It is admitted that the ministers have merely a contingent right to the benefit of such payments and in the meantime the Commissioner does not propose to assess ministers with the circuit or departmental levies paid into the Supernumerary Fund on their behalf. He proposes, however, to review the position upon receipt of the judgment of the Court in connection with a similar case now awaiting decision.

The foregoing matters should be carefully studied and acted upon by all ministers, circuit stewards and other church officers affected.

WANGANUI TRUST REHABILITATION.

Conference learns with pleasure of the successful completion of the scheme for the rehabilitation of the Wanganui (Trinity) Trust and expresses its thanks to all Trusts, members and friends of the Connexion who so generously assisted the project.

It reaffirms its endorsement of the Wanganui Connexional Trust Rehabilitation Fund scheme, and declares that such scheme, involving generous conditional Connexional graphs was accounted and must be

generous conditional Connexional grants was accepted and must be regarded as a final settlement of the problem.

The Conference further deplores the present attempt on the part of certain signatories to the original mortgage to re-open the matter and appoints the Chairman of the Taranaki-Wanganui District and the Rev. Raymond Dudley to make such representations to the Trustees concerned.

OBJECTS FOR THE BENEFIT OR ENDOWMENT OF WHICH BEQUESTS MAY BE MADE.

1.—Connexional Funds and Departments.

A. Contingent Fund:

This fund meets charges which cannot be placed upon Circuits, Departments or Institutions. Such charges which arise by reason of the Connexion as a whole must be connexionally borne. Its work is (1) administrative and (2) beneficent. On the administrative side it meets the cost of Synods and Conference, assists various connexional departments and meets all charges in safeguarding the rights and privileges of the Church. On the beneficent side it makes grants in special cases of ministerial affliction and in general meets such emergencies and contingencies as arise.

B. Supernumerary Fund:

This fund provides pensions for Ministers, their widows and orphans.

There is a Benevolent branch of this Fund which makes extra grants in necessitous cases.

C. Home Acquirement Fund:

This fund has been set up to assist in providing homes for Ministers on their permanent retirement.

D. Home Missionaries' Retiring Fund:

Deaconesses' Retiring Fund:

These funds, as their names show, provide retiring allowances for Home Missionaries and Deaconesses.

E. Children's Fund:

This fund provides annual allowances on account of all Ministers' children up to the age of 16 years for boys and 18 years for girls.

F. The Church Building and Loan Fund:

The objects of this Fund are:—(a) To render assistance in the purchase of sites and in the erection of churches and other buildings for Church purposes; (b) to aid in providing parsonages; and (c) to assist in the removal of debts on church property.

property.

There is a special branch of this Fund known as the Sites Fund, from which grants are made towards the cost of purchasing sites for churches, parsonages, and other church buildings.

G. The Home Mission and Church Extension Fund:

The objects of this Fund are to assist in the general advancement of the Methodist Church in New Zealand, particularly in the establishment of new causes in growing districts and to further the development and extension of religious and educational work amongst Maoris. A Girls' School, "Kurahuna," is established at Onehunga. It is proposed to establish a Maori Girls' School in Taranaki. Provision is made for Maori boys at Wesley College, Paerata.

H. The Foreign Mission Fund:

This Fund is used to carry on mission work in the Solomon Islands. All phases of work are carried on, including religious, medical, educational and industrial. The Mission is always in need of funds.

I. Youth Department Fund:

The Youth Department is responsible for the oversight and organisation of all Sunday Schools and the Young Men's and Young Women's Bible Class Movements. The Fund is used for the furtherance of work in Sunday Schools and Bible Classes and among young people generally.

2.—Institutions.

(1) Trinity Theological College-Auckland.

Here Students are trained for the Ministry. It also provides a residential college for men students of all faculties.

(2) Deaconess House-Christchurch.

This institution is the training centre of women for the work of Deaconesses. In connection with it is a women's hostel, principally for students.

(3) Wesley Training College-Paerata, Auckland.

This is an agricultural college up to matriculation standard. Special provision is made for Maori boys and boys from the South Sea Islands. There is a heavy debt on this College.

3.-Social Service Funds and Institutions.

A. Orphanages:

There are three Methodist Orphanages in New Zealand:-

- The Auckland Children's Home and Orphanages, Mt. Albert, and Epsom.
- (ii) Masterton Methodist Children's Home.
- (iii) South Island Orphanage and Children's Home, Christchurch.

B. Social Service Work:

The Auckland and Dunedin Central Missions render assistance in all branches of social service work amongst young and old, sick and needy. Health camps and rest homes are maintained. In Dunedin a scheme has been launched for the establishment of an Eventide Homes Settlement to provide small homes for aged couples.

4.- Individual Circuits and Churches.

Each Church has its Trustees who are responsible for the erection and maintenance of the buildings and care of the church property. The Circuit Fund provides for the ministers' salaries, connexional levies, and all other expenses incident and necessary for the efficient working of the Circuit. (N.B.—A Circuit includes one or more churches.)

5.—Sunday Schools.

Local Sunday Schools are worthy of assistance.

6.—Sundry Funds.

The following is a list of funds the names of which clearly indicate the objects:—

- (1) N.Z. Local Preachers' Association.
- (2) Natural Calamities Fund.
- (3) Women's Missionary Union (Home and Foreign).
- (4) Literature and Colporteur Society.
- (5) Methodist Times (Church Newspaper).
- (6) Wellington Methodist Charitable and Educational Trust, which assists in Maori Educational work and in Orphanage work.

7.—The Methodist General Purposes Trust Board (Inc.).

This Board holds and administers any property real or personal entrusted to its care for special purposes or trusts in connection with any Methodist Church in New Zealand or any church trust, organisation or department of the Methodist Church of New Zealand, and whether such purposes or trusts be wholly for such purposes or partially for such purposes and partially for other purposes not connected with the Methodist Chuch of New Zealand.


