

# **Mission Statement**

Our Church's Mission in Aotearoa New Zealand is to reflect and proclaim the transforming love of God as revealed in Jesus Christ and declared in the Scriptures. We are empowered by the Holy Spirit to serve God in the world. The Treaty of Waitangi is the covenant establishing our nation on the basis of a power-sharing relationship, and will guide how we undertake mission. In seeking to carry out our mission we will work according to these principles:

Ko te putake a to tatou Hahi Weteriana i Aotearoa nei, he whakakite atu, he kauwhau hoki i te aroha whakatahuri o te Atua, he mea whakaatu mai i roto i a Ihu Karaiti, me nga Karaipiture. Ko te Wairua Tapu e whakakaha ana i a tatou kia tu maia ai hei tuari ma te Atua i roto i te ao. Otira, ko Te Tiriti o Waitangi te kawenata e whaka o rite ana i ta tatou noho hei tangata whenua, hei tauiwi hoki, ki tenei whenua. Ma tenei Tiriti tatou e arahi i roto i nga whakariterite o tenei whakahau, tono hoki, ki roto ki te ao.

#### Christian community

To be a worshipping, praying, and growing community, sharing and developing our faith and working through its implications in our social context.

#### Evangelism

To challenge people to commitment to Christ and Christ's way.

#### Flexibility

To be flexible, creative, and open to God's Spirit in a changing world and Church, so that the Church is relevant to people's needs. To release energy for mission rather than to absorb energy for maintenance.

#### **Church unity**

To foster networks and relationships with communities of faith having similar goals.

#### Inclusiveness

To operate as a Church in ways that will enable the diversity of people (e.g. all ages, all cultures, male and female) to participate fully in the whole life of the Church, especially decision-making and worship.

#### Every member a minister

To encourage each person to develop his/her full potential by accepting and nurturing each other, developing skills and providing resources, challenging and enabling for service in the Church and community.

#### **Cross-cultural awareness**

To become aware of, and challenged by, each other's cultures.

#### Justice

To work for justice for any who are oppressed in Aotearoa New Zealand, keeping in mind the implications of the Treaty of Waitangi. To share resources with the poor and disadvantaged in Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

#### Peace

To be peacemakers between people and in the world.

#### Healing

To listen for hurt and work for healing.

#### Ecology

To care for creation.

# PROCEDURE FOR ELECTION OF PRESIDENT / VICE PRESIDENT

#### SECTION 7:5.1.7

- (d) Tauiwi and Te Taha Maori will each select its preferred candidates for the offices of both President and Vice-President according to their own procedures.
- (e) There shall be a Conference Panel, (the Panel), representing the Partnership, and selected from members of the Council of Conference by Hui Poari and Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing. The Panel shall, by consensus, agree on a recommendation to Conference as to who should be appointed to each of the offices of President and Vice-President.
- (f) The Panel shall then present its recommendations for both offices to the General Secretary.
- (g) The names of the recommended President and Vice-President elect are then announced by the President.
- (h) Conference shall affirm its support.

# GUIDELINES FOR CONFERENCE DECISION-MAKING

The primary goal of the decision-making process is to enable Te Taha Maori (Tangata Whenua, the people who are of the land) and Tauiwi (the people who came later and settled here) – partners of Te Hahi Weteriana o Aotearoa, the Methodist Church of New Zealand – to make decisions which demonstrate partnership.

The first step in decision-making is for Te Taha Maori to reach general agreement and Tauiwi to reach general agreement on the decision before them. Then the two groups meet together to see if they can agree with a suggested decision.

Facilitation of the partnership decision-making process requires particular skills, which not all elected leaders will have developed, so an experienced facilitator may be asked by the President or Vice-President to lead the Conference at such times.

#### PRINCIPLES

The following are principles for making decisions in a manner which demonstrate our Treaty Partnership: i.e. between Taha Maori and Tauiwi.

- The aim of Conference decision-making is to discern what is best for the Church.
- A decision is made only when it is clear that both partners i.e. Taha Maori and Tauiwi can state that they can agree with the suggested decision.
- Taha Maori may caucus if this will enable their group to reach general agreement so a partnership decision can be explored.
- Partners may choose their own language for the discussion. (Tauiwi will need to decide the language(s) appropriate for them).
- When the partners do not agree, no decision can be made. Instead a process will be established which may lead to agreement in the future.
- The Council of Elders will monitor the process and may guide it.

#### DECISION-MAKING STRATEGIES

**Consensus** is a term often used when general agreement or substantial support, rather than majority rule, is a group's aim. "Consensus" as generally understood in relation to decision-making in large groups, enables:

- participation by a larger number of members
- the opportunity for minority options to be acknowledged
- a greater chance of obtaining unity of purpose in a group with a variety of values
- more stable, longer lasting decisions.

**Consensus does not mean unanimity or total agreement**. Rather it is the group agreeing to work together in a certain way, even though some members might prefer not to, e.g.

#### We are prepared to accept this decision because:

- it is for the good of the group
- we see it is so important
- we feel that our viewpoint has been adequately expressed
- we do not agree, but in the interests of the Church we will allow this to be the decision.

In consensus decision-making, if it is clear that no agreement is possible at the time of the discussion, before the topic is adjourned the President may choose to ask the Council of Conference to meet to explore whether there is any way forward. If Council reports that there is no way forward then plans will be made for other approaches which may lead to consensus in the future. In the meantime the status quo will continue.

#### MEMBERS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Consensus decision-making requires a high level of member responsibility and individuals need to be aware of how they can contribute in a helpful manner.

# Members should:

- expect to contribute briefly, to the point, and only once on a topic
- prepare what they have to say and speak only if that point has not already been made
- contribute material if it assists the discussion or reconciles an apparent difference
- keep silent if they cannot contribute in a way which aids the discussion.

#### PROCESSES

Some processes help us to listen to each other and find a way forward for the Church. *For example:* 

#### Discussion

Contribution which assists decision is about

- The issue
- <u>Theology</u> of the issue
- Suggested ways forward

#### Consensus

The process of seeking consensus can use a number of techniques which may assist the group to reach its **general agreement**.

# Some of these are:

- caucusing
- brainstorming to collect ideas
- buzzing in pairs or threes to clarify a position
- dividing into small groups to respond to the same of different parts of the topic
- having a prepared presentation of the issues involved
- adjourning the topic till later in the agenda and having two or three people work at finding an alternative way forward
- a majority decision
- having members indicate non-verbally if they agree/disagree with the ideas being expressed
- identifying common ground and then working on areas of difference
- asking those with a different opinion if recording their view will enable them to allow the decision to be made.

**Caucusing** is a method used in large groups to assist decision making. It is a meeting of group(s) within the larger group. Caucusing enables any group to clarify its position on the business in hand. Conference does not continue when it divides into Taha Maori/Tauiwi caucus groups, so it is not appropriate for the President, Vice-President or facilitator of the Conference to continue facilitating any of the smaller groups.

# In the Conference Taha Maori or Tauiwi can call for their group to caucus, <u>but only if doing</u> so seems likely to assist the full group to reach a decision.

### There are 3 ways for this to happen:

- (a) the person presiding over the Conference may determine that caucusing is appropriate
- or (b) Tauiwi may call for a caucus
- or (c) Taha Maori may call for a caucus.

Conference then divides into Taha Maori and Tauiwi groups. The people who facilitate the full Conference do not lead the small groups, so these groups need to have their own facilitators ready.

#### Caucus process

Each group decides its own process for establishing its position on the topic.

(a) They may work in one group

<u>or</u>

(b) They may divide into smaller groups, e.g. ethnic, gender, district or interest groups, who discuss their position regarding the topic.

The sub-group(s) come to their decision so they rejoin the larger group and report their position. Then that group seeks to reach agreement. This continues until all the sub-groups have rejoined the caucus. A sub-group may decide it cannot reach an agreed position but that it is prepared to support the one reached by the full group.

If at any time a sub-group cannot reach an agreed position and this prevents a decision being reached by the full group, then the sub-group may ask for a specified time to explore other approaches if that is expected to result in an eventual decision.

The caucus then discusses its position to see if it has been able to reach a common mind. If it has, the caucus rejoins the Conference.

#### What does the Conference do?

When Tauiwi and Te Taha Maori groups rejoin, Conference reconvenes, so the person presiding resumes his/her role. Normally the group which called the caucus reports first, then the other group reports its position. If the person presiding called the caucus, he/she will determine the order of reporting back. Then the whole Conference works toward a consensus decision.

When the process is complete the person presiding shall make a clear statement of the decision.

#### SUMMARY

- Conference decision-making is a process which demonstrates Te Taha Maori-Tauiwi partnership agreement and enables full participation from all member groups.
- Consensus agreement using caucus groups, and other methods of assisting decision-making is an appropriate mode for making partnership decisions.
- For such processes to be successful all group members need to participate in an informed and responsible manner.

Facilitation of these processes is a skilled task and the President and Vice-President may request experienced people to lead some sessions.

# TREATY PARTNERSHIP DECISION-MAKING PROCEDURES THROUGH A CONSENSUS PROCESS:

### Information/Clarification for Conference

#### CAUCUSING

#### a) Calling for a caucus

According to present procedures, calling for a caucus only relates to the convening of Te Taha Maori and Tauiwi caucuses. However, interest groups can meet within the Tauiwi caucus. If an individual or an interest group in the life of the Conference wishes to raise a process issue, they should approach their caucus facilitators and express their concern. The facilitators are:

Tauiwi: Sylvia 'Akau'ota-Tongotongo and Lani Tupu

- Te Taha Maori: Will choose their facilitators at their pre-conference meeting

The facilitators will then take what action they feel is appropriate

# b) Steps for making Treaty partnership decisions

In the process of making Treaty partnership decisions, we have discerned the following 5 steps:

#### Step One: Starting together

Both treaty partners are present. Caucusing does not occur in this step. The report is received. A presentation is made outlining the contents of the report and the suggested decisions. Space is made for questions seeking clarification etc.

# • Step Two: Testing out how the Treaty partners feel about the issues under discussion

Focus is now upon the 'suggested decisions'. The President/Vice-President seeks the mind of Conference on 'suggested decisions' where there appears to be consensus, and these are processed. Where a consensus is not obvious on specific 'suggested decisions' there is clarification as to lack of consensus. For example, is it related to differences between the Treaty partners or within a partner? At this point either partner may request caucusing, or the President/Vice-President may suggest it. An initial time limit is proposed for the caucusing. The President/Vice-President clarifies for the whole Conference, what both caucuses will be addressing when they meet separately.

# Step Three: Sharing responses from the caucuses

When both caucuses are ready to report back, both sets of facilitators will meet with the President and Vice-President to share the responses. This is suggested for two reasons. Firstly, it will avoid the President/Vice-President having to react 'cold' to what is reported to the Conference. Secondly, the sharing will indicate if either or both caucuses need to give reasons as to why they have arrived at a particular point. For example, if both caucuses were in agreement, there would be no need to share reason.

If a caucus does not achieve a consensus, this will be reported to the whole Conference. It would not be appropriate for the other caucus to indicate its response at this point. If finally within a caucus there is no consensus to proceed, no decision by Conference can be made(see page 9, last paragraph).

# Step Four: Making a Treaty Partnership decision

If there is agreement by both caucuses, Conference can make a decision. Conference can only make a decision if both partners agree.

If there is no agreement between caucuses, or within a caucus, the areas where there is a lack of agreement will be clearly identified. Some or all of the following questions might then be asked: Is more information required? Is it necessary to caucus again? Could an 'ad-hoc' representative group meet during Conference to address the areas of disagreement and seek a way ahead? If there is still lack of agreement between the two partners, then no decision is made by the Conference, and the status quo remains. The President/Vice-President will define the 'status quo'.

#### Step Five: Moving on to the next business

Before this happens, Conference is asked if there are any concerns/issues arising from the discussion that need to be addressed and reported back to Synods/Conference the next year. This is important where Conference members agree 'in principle' with a particular proposal, and expect that their concerns will have been addressed when the 'fleshed-out' principle returns to the next Conference for final endorsement. Consequently, a decision might read "We have agreed that ... and the following concerns/issues have been referred to ... for consideration and a report to Synods and Conference next year".

If any Conference member wishes to record their dissent from a Conference decision, they should put it in writing and hand it to the Daily Record Secretaries.

# PROCEDURES TO ENABLE THE BUSINESS OF CONFERENCE TO BE TAKEN "EN BLOCK"

- (1) Committees/Boards will be asked to advise the Conference as to those reports/resolutions that can be presented to the Conference En Bloc. On the recommendation of the Committees or Boards they will be put to the Conference En Bloc. Reports/Resolutions to be taken En Bloc will be highlighted on the PowerPoint presentation.
- (2) In order to safeguard the rights of members of Conference to speak on any report/resolution, any member may by simple request to the Chair, have removed from the "En Bloc" procedures any report/resolution.

(Minutes of Conference 1978, Resolution 1, page 564, amended 2004)

#### FUNCTION - COUNCIL OF ELDERS

The Council of Elders shall enable and assist the Church in its Bicultural Journey by seeking to model the equal partnership prefigured in the Treaty of Waitangi, and at Conference specifically will:

- (a) monitor and recommendations of all Conference Committees and Boards of the Conference, and
- (b) reflect and comment on the style, processes, work and priorities of all Conference Committees and Boards, Conference discussion and decision making, and
- (c) refer back for further consideration any report or recommendation which the Council of Elders considers will hinder or divert the Church from its Bicultural Journey, and
- (d) report each year to the Conference

# Council of Conference Budget Task Group

#### Council of Conference Report to Conference 2006

#### Information and Reporting Back

#### In Memoriam

Council of Conference acknowledges the life and ministry of Ripia Rountree and Jayne Alexander – former members of the Council. Both brought their wisdom, understanding and honesty as part of their contribution to Council meetings. They will be sadly missed and we thank God for their lives, witness and service.

#### **Theological Reflections**

April: Fruits of the Spirit, Dealing with Differences September: Reconciliation

Each meeting of the Council of Conference included a facilitated session of theological reflection. This reflection helps Council members think about wider issues of church and society, and provides theological resources for the Council's work. Each reflection is presented in response to the questions "What is the Spirit saying to the Church?" and "What more can be done to promote the work of God?"

At the April meeting President John and Vice President Mary reflected on 'Fruits of the Spirit' and the way we show these. A specific focus was on the way we deal with groups that are different from us. Our tendency is to make people think like us, or to exclude them.

We noted how important it was to understand groups that are different from us, as a basis for showing respect towards them. This is crucial in cross cultural interactions, for example. We acknowledged respect as a core theological idea, and as a spiritual value in relating to persons and groups who are different from us.

However, it was pointed out that respect is not sufficient to deal with the different issues that divide us. Dialogue was seen as providing a way of going deeper, so we can identify the points we share (e.g. "We are all Methodist") This can give a basis for exploring our different attitudes, actions, or beliefs ("We have different views of God"). Our discussion was open-ended, but suggested some key things to think about and act on as church.

Some similar themes emerged in the September meeting, as Nigel Hanscamp, Jill van de Geer, and Mary Caygill reflected with us on the World Methodist Conference held in Korea. The Conference theme was 'God in Christ Reconciling' that had particular significance not only because of the Conference location in that divided Korean peninsula, but also because it was held during days of escalating violence in the Middle East. The Conference Logo representing the four corners of the earth was used by one keynote speaker to illustrate the harmony of God's feast of life. Other keynote speakers reflected on the Methodist tradition of peacemaking and reconciliation, the need to take courage and stand in the uncomfortable spaces between parties in conflict, and the call to hold together word and deed, personal and social holiness. There were amazing worship times and bible studies each day. Workshops included one on the humanitarian crisis of HIV/AIDS, and another on the ministry of the Korean Ecumenical and Interfaith Peace Movement – dialogue across faiths, theologies and ideologies. The whole Conference reminded participants that it is hard work being Methodist! But it also reminded delegates of the wonder and grace that abounds when word and deed are held together. Being Methodist in today's world means being part of the groans of God's creation, and sharing in the healing and splendour of being part of the diversity and interconnectedness of the whole.

#### Budget

The Budget Task Group has again faced a situation where requests from the Connexional groups exceeded givings from parishes. This resulted in the Budget Task Group having to refuse allocations to meet the money available. Council of Conference responding to this challenge has initiated discussion in the wider church that has resulted in PAC allocating endowments in both the last two years to Ministry Education and Touchstone as well as asking the Board of Ministry to explore a contemporary response to Stewardship in the Parishes. Council of Conference will keep this issue on its agenda.

#### **Overseas ministry policy:**

The Methodist Church of New Zealand has a unique ethos in its bicultural partnership. It recognises the place of Tangata Whenua (Maori) in our history and in our church. Within this ethos we also recognise the need for care in issues of immigration. The ministry of the Methodist Church of New Zealand also takes place within a multicultural and ecumenical setting.

Council of Conference and the Board of Ministry were charged with developing a new policy for dealing with applications from ordained ministers wanting to come from overseas to minister in our church.

The purpose of this policy is to reflect our context and ethos, and to establish clear guidelines for membership, accountability and applications for those coming from overseas to minister in our church.

This policy replaces previous Conference decisions about ministers coming from overseas. It also applies to ministers from to New Zealand under Conference to Conference requests (also known as 'Seconded Ministries').

#### Procedures for Transfer to the Methodist Church of New Zealand

#### Memorial B: Selection process of President and Vice President.

Council of Conference discussed the report and noted that the process outlined in Memorial B does not represent its understanding of Partnership. Council of Conference agreed that this matter be referred to the President's Review Group for inclusion in their discussion.

#### Notice of Motion A: Reinstatement of Committees of Detail.

Council of Conference noted the concerns raised but did not recommend going back to Committees of Detail. Council referred all these concerns to the Conference Business Committee to address.

#### Notice of Motion C: Re Lack of clear Connexional vision.

Council of Conference referred this matter to the Board of Administration for inclusion in their work on Connexionalism; BOA is to report back to Council of Conference.

#### 4+4's

Council of Conference notes that the 4+4 process for the position of Superintendent, Methodist Mission Northern is being followed.

Council of Conference also notes the process being undertaken regarding the Methodist Connect Dunedin making the change from Superintendent / Director to the position of General Manager. We commend the work done to bring this to the present stage and affirm Reverend Michael Greer's leadership in this process.

Council of Conference reminds all Boards to adhere to the process and timetable for appointments as set out in the Law Book.

#### Looking Forward

In 2007, Council of Conference will address the following issues:

- Work with the Board of Ministry:
  - To explore a contemporary response to Stewardship in the Parishes; and
  - Finalise the Policy and Procedures for overseas ministry with the Methodist Church of New Zealand.
- Conduct a joint training workshop to increase the number of skilled trained members and substitutes.

- 4. That the terms of reference of the review for the Overseas Ministry Policy and Procedures be approved.

#### **REPORT ON THE CONNEXIONAL BUDGET**

#### SECTION A

#### 2005-2006 Connexional Budget

For the Year to 30<sup>th</sup> June 2006, contributions from parishes toward the wider work of the Church through the Connexional Budget totalled \$612,200 – an increase of \$13,000 over the previous year. However, as in prior years amounts requested exceeded this amount and the Budget Task Group made a request to the PAC Distribution Group for a grant of \$90,000 which was necessary to enable the Church to carry out its mission.

During the year the Budget Task Group granted \$764,304 to the various Connexional groups. Despite some parishes responding positively to the call for increased contributions to the Connexional Budget, the askings still exceed the giving. Therefore, some new initiatives are not being funded. There remain a few parishes that are not contributing as much as they might and the Council of Conference challenges them to reassess their priorities.

Members of the Connexional Budget Task Group for the current year are; Frank Claridge, John Salmon, Evelyn Kingi, David McGeorge, Diana Tana, Paula Taumoepeau Jill van de Geer, Mary West, Pari Waaka, with secretarial support from Nicola Grundy and resourcing from Leah Scales of the Administration Division.

The process that has been used for several years was followed again this year to establish the Connexional Budget for presentation to the Council of Conference. The Task Group realises that there is little opportunity for discussion and dialogue at parish or congregational level. While it would be preferable to enable wider discussion on the proposed budget, the process of setting the budget cannot be started earlier as it commences soon after Conference, prior to Christmas which is more than six months prior to the commencement of the financial year, and the deadline to establish the final budget can not be moved.

The Task Group continues to draw attention to the significant contribution which the Connexional banking arrangement makes to the budget and strongly urges any Methodist parishes or other Methodist church groups who operate an account outside of the Bank of New Zealand arrangement to transfer to the banking arrangement that the Church has negotiated with the Bank of New Zealand.

#### INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK

#### Theology in Aotearoa

This continues to be an important part of the life of Te Taha Māori at all levels. The topics for discussion have been wide and varied. Particular focus has centred on the health and wellbeing of members in Te Taha Māori and the church nationally; reflections on who we are as God's people today and celebrating life.

Workshops have included the following:

- The role of Trustees;
- The Wesley College Trust Board;
- The workings of the World Council of Churches;
- Preparation of Karakia;
- Council of Conference Training for Te Taha Maori representatives;
- Theology of Properties.

#### Rangatahi

Once again, rangatahi have been faced with a wide range of issues about being Maori here today in Aotearoa. One such emphasis has been signing on the Maori Roll.

Te Taha Maori rangatahi being passionate about 'being Weteriana' and learning of this, have travelled extensively within Aotearoa to be part of significant Maori Hui-a-motu. Notable presence has been at Ratana, Waitangi, the inaugural Parihaka Celebrations and the annual Koroneihana. Some rangatahi were also involved in events such as Manu Korero (Secondary School Maori Speech competitions) held at Wesley College and the National Secondary Schools Kapa Haka event held in the Waikato at Mystery Creek.

This year the annual National Rangatahi event (known as the Hui Taumata) was held in July at Whakatuora Centre. It was successful with rangatahi and adult support coming from Tamaki, Otaua, Hastings and Taranaki areas. The theme for the hui was Matariki (the Maori New Year) and involved talking about our stories, our history, our visions. The success of such hui lies with the rohe and the rangatahi worker working collectively.

Te Taha Maori presently has a few rangatahi serving as members on various boards and committees which help expose rangatahi to wider connections in the church.

Planning has begun with a core group of four in preparation for holding another Methodist Youth Conference in Christchurch at Lincoln University in January 2008.

From the rangatahi work to date there are signs of great hope and inspiration.

#### **Education and Training**

We endeavour to utilise every available opportunity to focus on Education and Training within Te Taha Maori. Hui Poari is supporting the development of ministry in the Poneke area. This is carried out by Taranaki Rohe on behalf of the Board.

Kaikarakia / Minita-a-Iwi: This typically takes place at wananga, national and rohe levels. Regular training sessions for candidates have been held in Taranaki, Waikato and Otautahi. Last year, Hui Poari approved the appointment of Reverend Morehu Te Whare to assist with the training of candidates for Kaikarakia and Minita-a-iwi. Currently, Morehu is working with a group from Waikato / Maniapoto with the occasional attendance of a candidate from Otautahi. The wananga are open to other Kaikarakia and Minita-a-Iwi candidates from throughout Te Taha Maori and are held every month at Te Rahui Centre in Hamilton.

Topics included in the training sessions have centred on the following:

- Biblical history;
- Interpreting scripture;
- Theology in context;
- Tikanga and culture;
- The role of women in ministry.

#### Connexional Matters

*Bicultural Journey / Partnership Issues:* The Tumuaki along with other Connexional leaders participated in the Induction of the new Directors for Tauiwi Pakeha and Tauiwi Pasifika as well as the induction for the new Superintendent of Waikato / Waiariki.

Te Taha Maori has also participated in the Presidency Review process. This has not been easy for the participants and the national church.

Methodist Mission Northern has notified Te Taha Maori that the current Superintendent will be retiring. Therefore, the 4+4 process will be set in place for a new appointee.

**Connexional Boards and Committees:** Boards and Committees Te Taha Maori has representation on include the Board of Administration, Connexional Budget Task Group, Council of Conference, Grey Institute Trust, Investment Funds Board, Kurahuna Committee, Methodist Mission and Ecumenical, PAC Distribution Group, PAC Media and Communications, Pastoral Committee, Te Runanga Whakawhanaunga I Nga Haahi O Aotearoa, Wellington Methodist Charitable Educational and Endowments Trust and the Wesley College Trust Board. We have noticed over a period of time the loss of memory about significant facets of church history, structures, policy and a lack of understanding about partnership issues. We believe it is timely for the Church to revisit some of these matters so together we are better informed about who we are.

#### **Finance and Properties**

*Finances.* The *Budget Working Group* meets at least twice during the year; firstly to prepare the income and expenditure for the budget for the following year and secondly to ensure the financial targets are on track and being met. Recommendations are brought to *Hui Poari* for final approval – one such decision made was combining of both Te Taha Māori and Te Taha Māori IFB accounts to allow there to be more cost efficiency.

Our thanks and appreciation to Dina McCarthy, Finance Manager, for the monitoring of our accounts and finances on a day-to-day basis. We also acknowledge with deep appreciation the work of Leah Scales as Financial Services Manager and wish her well for the future. We welcome Peter van Hout into this new role.

Te Taha Maori once again, wishes to record their gratitude and thanks to the Grey Institute Trust, Kurahuna Committee, Margaret and Bruce Gordon Fund and the Wellington Methodist Charitable and Educational Endowments Trust for their financial support. Four male students were recipients of grants from the Margaret and Bruce Gordon Fund; four women received funding from the Women's Resource Fund to assist with tertiary education; eight female students were provided grants from the Kurahuna Committee and three were recipients of the Moutoa Scholarship Fund to help with Postgraduate Studies.

**Properties.** Since the sale of Te Rongopai Centre, Kaikohe, in 2001, discussions have taken place about the purchase of a Centre for *Tai Tokerau Rohe* to utilise for their activities. This is an ongoing matter. The property at *Pakanae* has had a new lessee for the past two years – John Klaricich. John has completed a lot of work around the property. Surveying of historical sites is still to be completed.

Three yearly building valuations for insurance purposes of our Church properties under Te Taha Māori have been completed.

Whakatuora Centre, Mangere East, Te Rahui Centre, Hamilton and Tahupotiki Centre, Hawera all continue to be used for Rohe karakia, Hui Poari gatherings, Connexional meetings as well as being used by community groups. In April and May, farewells were made to *Violet Hesse* who was matron at Te Rahui

hostels during the past 24 years. She also served on various Boards and Committees within the life of Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa. Violet left to spend quality time with her family in Australia and will be sorely missed.

Utilising the services of Kowhai Consultancy Ltd to prepare land stories for various properties has proven to be worthwhile. They have completed land stories for 11 Union Street, Hamilton; Kawhia Parsonage and Church; Te Huinga Centre, Te Kuiti and 5 Tutchen Avenue, Raglan. Kowhai Consultancy Ltd are finalising the land stories for Maungawhare Farm and James Buller Centre in Dargaville, and Te Waitere Property in Waikato.

Methodist Home Mission and Church Extension Investment Funds Board (IFB). Since 2002, Te Taha Maori has been maintaining the properties and looking after the financial assets of IFB on a daily basis. This Board met at the end of June and much discussion took place about its future. The meeting agreed that a resolution is taken to Conference 2006 to dissolve IFB and for the members to be thanked and discharged.

#### **Ecumenical Concerns**

*Methodist Mission and Ecumenical Committee (MM&E).* Two representatives from Te Taha Maori serve on this Committee. The occasional papers and newsletters on the work of MM&E are inserted in Hui Poari documentation and members appreciate the material.

Te Runanga Whakawhanaunga I Nga Haahi O Aotearoa. Membership for Te Runanga consists of Weteriana, Mihinare (Anglican), Katorika (Catholic) and Te Aka Puaho (Presbyterian). Rua Rakena was appointed Interim Administrator and has been in this position for nearly ten years. Only one or two mema Haahi attend Advisors meetings on a regular basis so in June Weteriana members organised a Hui to discuss the future of Te Runanga. Sadly only Katorika took up this opportunity which raises questions of commitment and energy towards ecumenism.

Last year it was reported that Wayne Te Kaawa was appointed as Te Aka Puaho representative on Te Runanga and he has now been replaced with Te Whare Turuwhenua.

#### LOOKING FORWARD

The areas of our work, which we wish to conclude / develop are:

- Completion of the work of the Enabling Ministry Team;
- Completion of land stories by Kowhai Consultancy Ltd;
- Candidates in training for Ministry;
- Continuation of education and training for our members throughout Te Taha Maori on a wide range of subjects pertaining to the Church.

#### GREY INSTITUTE TRUST ANNUAL REPORT TO CONFERENCE 2006

#### SECTION A - INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK

#### Moturoa Land - Bayly Road, 3.58 Hectares, Lot 1, DP 18771

It was reported last year that the Trust had received confirmation of the vesting of the land from the Maori Land Court to a new Trust to be formed for Ngati Te Whiti called the Bayly Road Trust.

The official ceremony marking the return of the land is yet to take place.

#### Rangiatea

The land and buildings known as Rangiatea continue to be fully leased.

The lease is now with Te Wananga o Aotearoa, and it is hoped that Te Kopae Tamariki Kia U Te Reo will be relocated to this site in early 2007. This site will then provide education in the future from birth through to Tertiary Education of the young Maori people in Taranaki.

#### Assets of the Trust: Land and Investments

The assets of the Trust continue to be effectively managed by the Trustees with \$13,000 per month being advanced to Te Taha Maori along with a top up payment at year end, if funds permit.

#### SECTION B - THE STRATEGIC PLAN

To effectively and efficiently manage the considerable assets of the Grey Institute Trust to maintain the capital base and to ensure an adequate return to Te Taha Maori.

#### Land

Three workshops have been held with the Trustees of the Trust to develop a strategy in relation to the renewals in 2007 of the one hundred and ninety two (192) 21 year leases over the land owned by the Trust. The Trustees are to meet for a fourth workshop in August 2006. It is anticipated that from this workshop a strategy will be determined from which the action plans can be developed. Part of this review will incorporate how the investment in the land can be maximised and work is continuing on whether some of the Grey Institute Trust land can be better utilised to enhance the financial return to the Trust. The formal renewal process with Leasees starts at the beginning of November 2006.

#### Investments

The Trust continues to monitor the performance and security of the funds invested to ensure that the adequate returns are being received on these funds.

The Trust has significant investments that are being managed by Macquarie Equities New Zealand Limited and the Methodist Trust Association.

#### AUDIT REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST HOME MISSION AND CHURCH EXTENSION INVESTMENT FUNDS BOARD TE TAHA MAORI

We have audited the summary financial statements of the Methodist Home Mission and Church Extension Investment Funds Board Te Taha Maori for the year ended 30 June 2006.

#### **Board Responsibilities**

The Board is responsible for the preparation of summary financial statements, in accordance with New Zealand law and generally accepted accounting practice.

#### Auditors' Responsibilities

It is our responsibility to express to you an independent opinion on the summary financial statements.

#### **Basis of Opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with New Zealand Auditing Standards. We planned and performed procedures to ensure the summary financial statements are consistent with the full financial statements on which the summary report is based. We also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the summary financial statements against the requirements of FRS-39: *Summary Financial Reports*.

Other than in our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with or interests in the Methodist Home Mission and Church Extension Investment Funds Board Te Taha Maori.

#### **Qualified Opinion**

#### Use of rating valuations

As stated in notes 6 to 11 to the full financial statement, the Board has utilized Rating Valuations for the purpose of revaluing the land and buildings which are not investment properties included in these financial statements. This is a departure from applicable Financial Reporting Standard No. 3 (FRS-3), which requires an independent valuation at fair value on a basis appropriate for financial reporting. A rating valuation may not have been undertaken on a basis appropriate for financial reporting. The Board has not had the rating valuation reviewed to ascertain the appropriateness of the basis utilized and therefore the Board has not calculated the financial effect of this departure from the applicable financial reporting standard.

#### Non depreciation of buildings

As stated in notes 6 to 11 to the full financial statements, the Board has not provided for depreciation on buildings which are not investment properties. This is a departure from applicable Financial Reporting Standard No. 3 (FRS-3), which requires that depreciation be charged as an expense in the statement of financial performance so as to allocate the cost of buildings over their economic lives. The Board has not calculated the financial effect of this departure from the applicable financial reporting standard.

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We have not been able to assess the appropriateness of the carrying amounts of the buildings and therefore we have not been able to reliably estimate the effect of these departures.

#### Grey Institute Trust Funds (GIT)

The financial statements of GIT disclose a \$258,000 distribution payable to the Methodist Home Mission and Church Extension Investment Funds Board Te Taha Maori (IFB) as at 30 June 2006. IFB has not recorded this as a distribution receivable and the amount provided in the IFB 2006 financial statements reflects the 2005 distribution from GIT. Consequently IFB is accounting for GIT income on a cash received basis, which is a departure from generally accepted accounting principles. Furthermore distributions payable by IFB are understated as 40% of GIT distributions are distributed to other IFB designated funds and 60% is distributed to designated funds of Te Taha Maori. The 2005 distributions are also accounted for on a cash received basis.

In our opinion, except for the effect of the departures from applicable Financial Reporting Standard No. 3 and the non accrual of GIT distributions noted above, the information reported in the summary financial statements complies with FRS-39: *Summary Financial Reports* and is consistent with the full financial statements from which it is derived and upon which we expressed an qualified audit opinion in our report to the members dated 22 September 2006.

For a better understanding of the scope of our audit of the Methodist Home Mission and Church Extension Investment Funds Board Te Taha Maori's financial statements and of the Methodist Home Mission and Church Extension Investment Funds Board Te Taha Maori's financial position and financial performance for the year ended 30 June 2006, this report should be read in conjunction with the Methodist Home Mission and Church Extension Investment Funds Board Te Taha Maori's audited financial statements for that period.

Our examination of the Summary Financial Statements was completed on 22 September 2006 and our qualified opinion is expressed as at that date.

#### **Tauiwi Strategy Committee Report to Conference 2006**

#### Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa – the Methodist Church of New Zealand is a church:

- Passionate in its commitment to living out the love and grace of God known in Jesus Christ
  - Actively concerned with all life
  - Committed to the Treaty of Waitangi and to talking and walking Justice

To achieve this vision the church will:

- Creatively focus its people, finances and resources in the life and mission of the church
- Empower the people to live out the vision by establishing cost effective
  - o Communication networks
  - Accessible education opportunities
- Constantly evaluate its work against the vision statement.

Strategic resourcing, communication and education continue to be the focus of the Committee's efforts, conducted in the light of the needs of Synods and Synod Superintendents. This year, changes in six Synod Superintendents and the Executive Officer have enhanced the need for giving focus to these aspects in the work of the Committee.

This year an orientation was provided for new Synod Superintendents prior to August Strategy and Stationing. The number of new superintendents is a significant issue for Tauiwi Strategy in seeking to maintain a 'historical' perspective on our work. On the other hand it was noted that these new appointments have brought a freshness to our work. We anticipate two or three further changes in Superintendency for 2007.

The committee also continues to resource its members. In February Ron Gibson engaged us in discussion and extended workshops on developing strategy; in August David Bell gave an overview of some of the resources he is developing; Nicola Grundy also presented some work she had been doing regarding church statistics, particularly in the areas of parish growth, ministry candidates and length of minister's service. Four Synods presented stories of parishes and synod events that work well.

#### Reflections

This year the President, Vice President, General Secretary and Principal were invited to reflect on their work (including strategic and theological issues) to assist the Committee to understand the impact of Connexional positions on the work of Tauiwi. The depth of personal, theological and ministry reflections was appreciated.

#### **Youth Ministries**

Our statistics show us that around 25% of those in our churches are under 25 years of age. However Tauiwi Strategy also recognised that our youth ministry overall is not as focussed as it has been in the past, which was partly reflected in the Synod strategies. A national strategy and outline for youth ministry for the MCNZ, especially Tauiwi youth, is important in bringing more focus to this vital area of our churches ministry.

Therefore Tauiwi Strategy is now working with the Facilitator Tauiwi Youth ministries to increase communication and to begin to clarify a national Tauiwi youth ministry strategy, and anticipate that a discussion paper will be presented to Tauiwi Strategy in February 2007. Synods are also encouraged to give further attention to their approaches and strategies for youth ministry.

Discussion was held on the issues raised at Methodist Youth Conference '05, especially the questions about the relationship between culture and gospel. Tauiwi are urging Faith and Order and the Facilitator Tauiwi Youth Ministry to continue this work as a priority.

#### Nominations

There are 6 groups that Tauiwi appoints people to: Council of Conference, Budget Task group, Council of Elders, President and Vice President Conference selection panel, Tauiwi meeting facilitators and advisor, Methodist Representatives to UCANZ. Tauiwi Strategy has worked to clarify its expectations of nominations coming to the committee. Nominations or recommendations for positions on these groups come from Synods, and appointments are made at the August Strategy Meeting to be taken to Conference. A paper with guidelines and criteria for nominations has been approved by Tauiwi Strategy and will be produced for Synods for 2007.

#### Strategies

Synods reported their strategies to the committee, and it was noted that there was a wide variety of ministry continuing in all areas. Three issues emerge consistently from these strategies:

- The need to look at 'clustering' congregations in order to maximize resources available. Some of this is brought about by the needs of ministry, finance, size or location.
- Synod regionalization continues to be a topic of discussion. Synods are working closer together on Schools of Theology, resourcing and strategy, and some are considering other ways of sharing resources.
- Local Shared Ministry continues to grow as a viable and working option for some parishes.

#### **Overseas Ministry**

The draft policy and guidelines for Overseas Ministry is a positive move for Tauiwi. However there is still some work to be done and the committee welcomes the opportunity for this paper to be brought to Synods and Tauiwi strategy for fuller discussion.

#### UCANZ

Tony Bell, Stuart Grant and Lynne Frith presented a paper on issues around Cooperative Ventures. Change of Oversight and changes of ministry were noted as especially creative, though sometimes stressful, opportunities for Synods and parishes. Strategic issues were raised around continuing Methodist involvement in parishes that have little or no Methodist commitment, and the need for all parties to refer to the Guide to Procedures in doing their work.

#### **Presidency Review Group**

The report of the President's review Group was circulated through Synods and responses were sent back to the group. Tauiwi Strategy were asked by the Group to "Facilitate discussion throughout Tauiwi regarding Te Taha Maori's core question 'Would Tauiwi accept a gay or lesbian person as President or Vice President." There is a wide variety of responses to the question, and work needs to be done to understand these in order to bring a proper reply. As part of this it is important to comprehend the theological perspectives in order that understanding can be deepened and broadened. In response to the Group's question, Synod responses and Theological perspectives are being brought to the Tauiwi meeting (English speaking) at Conference as part of the response to Te Taha Maori.

#### Tauiwi Executive Officer Job description

Suggested Decisions

- That Conference acknowledges the ministries of Rev Val Nicholls, Rev David Pratt, Rev Trevor Hoggard, Rev John Murray, Rev Beverley Osborn, John Thornley, Rev Jessie Kerr, Rev laokopo Fa'afuata, Rev 'Epeli Taungapeau as Synod Superintendents and thanks them for their faithful service.
- 3. That Conference urges the Faith and Order committee to do further work with Tauiwi Youth on its questions around the relationship between gospel and culture and what it means for us to be a multi-cultural church within a bi-cultural context.

#### Evangelical Network Report to Conference 2006

2006 has seen another change in the leadership of the Network. Rev. Nigel Hanscamp stepped down from the Superintendent position after being appointed to the Mission Resourcing position. At their February meeting the Executive asked the Rev. Marion Peterson to accept nomination to this position. She agreed to do this on an interim basis until another person has been found to fill that position. The Executive will be recommending to the general meeting during Conference that the Rev. Alan K. Webster, from Christchurch, be the next Superintendent commencing in January 2008. During 2007 he will work alongside Marion to familiarise himself with the task.

#### alt.conference@coffee.com, - Conference Event November 2006

Continuing the theme set by last year's highly successful alt.conference@coffee.com, this year we have invited singer-songwriter poet Roger White to entertain us in Rotorua. This will happen over coffee on Sunday night from 6:30pm to about 8:00. Roger's songs have been described as folk-gospel: but he has

also set some of JK Baxter's songs to music and to categorise him is difficult: he's better heard than pigeonholed! See our website for more details or watch Touchstone for an advertisement and an article coming shortly. This is a chance for some informal input and conversations with friends... don't miss it! We also plan to run an art exhibition in the café at the same time where Methodist artists are invited to reflect upon a theme, to offer their works for sale, appreciation, and as an act of worship.

#### **Evangelical Network Camp**

The camp was attended by a number of participants who were thrilled to be able to catch up with each other while exploring the theme of the camp which was "The Hope I have within me." Heartfelt moments were shared and testimonies given.

The many offerings of hope and encouragement by individuals were great. Much was shared of the hopes and dreams of a Network which is searching to find constructive ways forward on many issues within Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa. There was also time for personal reflections on some of the pain and suffering experienced over the last few years and some of the deeply felt desires for the future. Our solidarity as Methodists was strong, and we shared a desire to see a renewed Church full of vitality and hope, a place of safety and a Church that is looking outward rather than inward.

The installation of Marion as Evangelical Network Superintendent by Vice President Mary happened during the Sunday morning service. This was a typical camp service - informal and interactive.

Although the attendance was small the camp was a valuable time of reflection, worship, recreation and fellowship. However, we recognise the need to re-assess the camp concept as to whether it is the best way of bring the Network together.

#### Memorandum of understanding:

Events at Conference 2005 and during 2006 have highlighted that the intent of this document has not been well understood and there is a need for further clarification of this.

#### President's review:

During the year we spent time preparing a submission for this that we felt adequately reflected the variety of views that the evangelical represents and a member of the Network was a part of the review group. We recognise that the report sent to August synods did not find favour with everyone and we welcome the ongoing discussion and debate.

#### **Building the Network:**

During the year we have done a major review of our data base with the hope of improving our communication Network. We have also been intentional about making links with leadership in Vahefonua Tonga, Sinoti Samoa and Wasewase Ko Viti Kei Rotuma.

#### Evangelical Network in Christchurch

The Christchurch based Evangelical Network cluster group meets bi-monthly at Beckenham Methodist Church for a shared meal and informal worship. Ministers and laypeople share responsibility for input: a variety of creative and reflective experiences enrich our lives together as we pray for each other, our various congregations, our colleagues in ministry and Methodists in general. We usually meet on the third Friday on odd-numbered months, but our convenor occasionally tweaks meeting dates to enable us all to be there. If you'd like to be involved in any way, contact Alan at beckmeth@xtra.co.nz.

#### Tom Bandy Conference

Network members attended the Bandy Conferences in both Christchurch and Auckland Those who attended found him interesting and challenging to listen to as he discussed moving from a declining church to a thriving church model. One of the key reasons for decline, he believes, is that churches become inwardfocused and forget about local mission. He brought participants back to the foundations of faith with questions such as "What is it about your experience of Jesus Christ that the community cannot do without?" And he urged churches to be in touch with the community around them and to know what the concerns of the community are. Bandy's presentation gave practical examples of ways in which churches could change to become thriving churches. The conference was most worthwhile and has acted as a catalyst for examining ministry motivations and considering changes for those who participated.

#### Finances

The Network continues to rely on the financial support of the Connexion in order to pay its running costs. For the financial year ended 30 June 2006 the total income of the Network was \$5,886 with \$4,650 of this amount being contributions received from the Connexional Budget. The Network has a modest level of expenditure which totalled \$4,731 for the year with the majority of these monies used to pay for administration costs. Overall, the income of the Network exceeded the expenses by \$1,155. At the end of the financial year the funds on hand totalled \$8,652.

#### SYOND STRATEGIES

#### Northland District: Stationing and Strategy for 2006 - 7

Our strategy has changed little since the strategy plan was completed last year, though that does not mean that the issues have become of less concern! In many ways, the rural parts of the country are being required to move first – Northland, West Coast, Otago-Southland – and it seems that the urban influence fails to recognise some of the rural and regional strategic issues in the face of Methodism's dwindling influence, numbers and growth. These issues drive our strategic planning.

#### 1. Churches Together in Northland

This strategic alliance of churches in Northland exists for both theological and pragmatic reason. It is the embodiment of ecumenical action in Northland – acting as JRC, Synod, and a place where Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist, Churches of Christ (and Congregational) work together, truly together, as one meeting to deal with all the necessary regional functions, including an excellent training programme. Its constitutional progress is gathering steam, and its constitution seeks Conference approval this year.

The suggestion that the Superintendency of Northland be assumed by Auckland was greeted with dismay – and while there are always going to be issues because of the widespread nature of the Synod, and its integrated ecumenical nature, current Superintendency (and its likely changes) suit most of the District.

#### 2. Methodist Presbyters

It appeared that the Church's strategic direction concentrated on full-time stipended ministers, but it is clear that throughout the District this way of administering Parishes is likely to last for only a short time longer. The reality for us is that most Parishes are part-time, and better looked at in a different model than the one presbyter - one Parish model. Northland, along with other rural Districts, is leading the way in considering and implementing new models of lay ministry / part-time or full-time stipended ministry. This leads directly into a further strategic direction.

#### 3. Enablers for Local Shared Ministry units

The Connexion may not realise the dwindling influence of Methodism in Northland, driven historically by a number of theological concerns at Methodist direction. The area is creeping towards Presbyterianism, particularly with the new efforts at establishing Presbyterian identity and re-branding. Our task is made even more difficult in that we are currently unable to supply Methodist Enablers in partnership LSM enterprises. The task of identifying, training and encouraging enablers is a priority strategy. We have now started the training of one such enabler. However, we are concerned that the Enabler model that is currently considered seems little different to a 'part-time presbyteral' model, and the affordability and method of operation of the LSM model seems to have flaws which will hopefully be worked through in practice.

#### 4. Maintaining a Methodist presence, within an ecumenical setting

It is critical for Northland that there be a locally focussed strategy, primarily based on a pastoral presence for the Methodists that are in the area, and allowing for an increased voice in what has become a mainly Presbyterian area. It would be helpful to identify both local Methodist resources (and there is a wealth of local lay and ordained people in the area), but to also provide opportunities for their voice to be heard. This is now increasing – and one example is that the Lay Clergy dialogue model for ministry review is to be trialled for all ministry reviews in Northland (and there are four to be attended to shortly, with a further one already completed). The functions of the Superintendent are likely to be shared around a number of people, to allow for an increased coverage and depth of ministry.

#### 5. Ministry needs of other Parishes

The conservative nature of many rural ministries makes it less likely that we are able to provide matched ministry – and this is encouraging the creeping Presbyterianism mentioned above. There will be increasing effort to ask Parishes to consider changed denominational oversight, even if there may not be Methodist presbyters available to match Parishes. The flexibility of LSM teams is likely to be crucial in future.

#### Stationing requirements for 2006 - 7

No new appointments seem likely to be sought for 2007.

Auckland Synod Strategic Planning 2006
WINDING ROAD 2006
In 2003 the Auckland Synod set strategic goals for the next five years. This year we develop that strategy

- moving a step nearer to these goals which the Synod is determined to reach by 2008.
  It is important to us that strategic planning for Methodist mission and outreach encourages a Connexional imperative. We see this as being true to the Good News of Jesus and as a responsibility of being part of the Body of Christ. Eph 4:7-14. "The Synod's Connexional task is to discern the gifts that Christ has given, to build up, to resource, to share gifts, so that people are prepared for Parish leadership and the work of Christian service." (*Pathway Towards 2008.*)
- Strategy is about what you want in the future and it is about taking the right steps to get there. We are in the process of looking at what we have, of living as the Body of Christ so that we know what we want and where we are going in the future, and with the guidance of the spirit, taking the right steps to get there.

#### Our strategy for mission during the coming year is: Parishes



- During the past year Parishes have looked carefully at the proposals to form circuits within the Synod. For most Parishes these proposals have been non starters. In the West Auckland area Waitakere Parish is already in effect a circuit. In Central Auckland the transitional ministry emphasis in the Central Parish has absorbed time and energy. On the North Shore there is a willingness to proceed but it is recognised that there is much talking still to be done, and that the next two years should be given to get to know one another more closely, and to co-operate on community projects. We recognise that there is a need for wider Synod debate on this strategy so that the advantages can be more widely appreciated.
- As stationing permits, balance the number of presbyters with the available resources so that by 2008 we have more economic parish administrations. Ensure creative use of our resources to enable Presbyter appointments to increase in tandem with growth. Appoint them to work in Circuits as resource agents whose tasks include the training of competent leadership. A result of transitional Ministry in the Central Parish is that Presbyters are now appointed to the Parish rather than to an individual congregation. It is also recognised that there needs to be a strong tie between appointments and pastoral care relationships.
- We have become aware that as Parishes develop new initiatives, and as ministry appointments change, there is a growing need to train leadership to be aware of Methodist ethos and procedures. Parish Stewards need to be fully trained to carry out their responsibilities, and all leaders need to be conversant with the requirements of the Methodist Law Book. We plan to encourage training for lay leadership around these issues.

#### Synod

- In January 2006 the Synod appointed a half time Superintendent. We now ask Conference to appoint the 2007 Superintendent in the same way. A Job Description and Ministry Covenant will guide and shape the Superintendents work.
- Our goal to appoint Synod resourcing staff, youth workers, administrator, secretary, has made little progress. We are in the process of appointing a new Youth Resource Person.
- The process of planning ahead to determine which properties are required in the future is now the responsibility of the Auckland Synod Property Advisory Committee, which is in the process of shaping a Property Strategy. Parishes have made little progress with determining future property needs.

Policies required to guide Parishes where new and upgraded facilities are needed. E.g., Northcote which has a mortgage it cannot afford on the new parsonage, and in parishes where there is no parsonage, Waitakere Glen Eden, and Mahurangi Warkworth.

#### Presbyters.

• Currently every Presbyter has a supervisor and takes their study leave entitlement. A start has been made to encourage and train Presbyters to pursue and reach their career path goals. This requires forward planning that is dependent upon Connexional strategy and resourcing. We cannot encourage Presbyters in their personal development unless Connexional support and oversight are offered.

#### Future Developments.

- The Synod's financial support for half time ministry at Glen Innes terminates in January 2007 on the retirement of William Elderton. We are in the process of sharing with JRC in a reassessment of mission goals and ministry provision. It is planned that during 2007 future directions for ministry at Glen Innes will be determined which will take account of the central position which St Mary's Church has in a largely Pasifika suburb.
- The Synod supports South Kaipara Co-operating Parish as it has begun planning with The Anglican Diocese and Mission Resourcing to meet the needs of the residents who will come into the area as it develops from rural living into Auckland suburban dwelling.
- Similar planning needs to begin in the "Rodney Corridor", (Silverdale, Orewa, and Warkworth areas.) as it follows a similar transition to urban living. We will be seeking Connexional support for this initiative to set mission goals, and to resource the strategy that is followed. We are becoming increasingly aware that the Rodney Corridor is fast becoming the centre of a new Auckland satellite city with Warkworth as its centre.

#### Manukau Synod Strategy August 2006

Members of the Manukau District Synod believe the parish is the primary unit of mission and that the District and Connexional structures exist to support and guide this local mission. District and Connexional structures also offer collegiality, mutual accountability and help to reinforce our Methodist theology that no local church can fully represent the nature of the larger whole to which it belongs.

Since the parish is the primary unit of mission and the Manukau District has but slender financial resources, the Synod has resolved to fulfil only those functions laid upon it by Conference and to keep all other business and responsibilities to the minimum.

In the longer term, this means there is little support for amalgamation with other Synods which would involve greater time commitment for travelling, greater expense and more business unrelated to the parishes we serve. We have resolved, however, to meet periodically with the Auckland Synod Executive to review matters of a joint/regional nature.

In the medium term our policy is:

- To encourage all parishes to monitor their overall viability and sustainability and fulfil their potential for growth.
- To strengthen the relationship between Wesley College and the District.
- To encourage people wishing to offer for ministry, both lay and ordained, and ask parishes to support those people as they test out any such vocations.

In the short term our policy is:

- To support Rev Setaita T. Kinahoi Veikune as the new Synod Superintendent.
- To offer financial support to the Mangere-Otahuhu parish to provide jointly for secretarial help four mornings per week, from September 2006.
- To find a full time presbyter for Trinity church, Pakuranga, from 1<sup>st</sup> February 2007.
- To find a full time presbyter for Tuakau Union parish, from 1<sup>st</sup> February 2007.
- To support the use of interest from Methodist investments in the Tuakau Union parish for the payment of ministry costs, but to review this policy after three years.
- To investigate further possibilities to support Youth Work across the District.

#### Proposed Strategy for Waikato-Waiariki Synod Focus for next 3/5 Years

#### General

- Resourcing of lay people, especially those in Local Shared Ministry (LSM) Teams. Training to be offered for Enablers annually over two years.
- Within the Waikato-Waiariki Synod, teams at Thames and Trinity United Parish (Pauanui/Tirua/Whangamata) need to be maintained in terms of people and resourced in terms of equipping and oversight.
- Maintaining a Methodist presence in our more outlying areas, e.g. Taumarunui and Opotiki.
- Exploring our commitment to CV's/Union parishes as against congregations which are solely Methodist. Our partner churches seem willing to pull out of CVs when the need arises – clearly reflecting a commitment, in the first instance, to their "brand". What is our view on this? Do we give equal weighting to each CV and to straight Methodist? Should our strategy reflect a strong commitment to the Methodist "cause"?
- Maintaining strong links with CV's especially those with oversight from partner churches
- Involving presbyters new to the Synod in District work and committees.
- As a District we seek to strengthen our links with Hamilton Community Action (presently under the leadership of Kate Duggan) and to work with MMN in Rotorua, Tokoroa (South Waikato District Council) and in the BOP especially in Tauranga through Brookfield Community Centre based at St Stephens, Brookfield.

#### Geographical (and some questions we would like to talk about and take action on)

- Strategy for Hamilton Central, with Community Action, yet small congregation in old centrally located church building. City as a whole has developing housing areas and industry.
- Tauranga Parish to be prioritised for good presbyteral ministry in its fast-growing area. Tauranga
  Parish is positioned as a resourcing centre for the Bay of Plenty and the District thus any appointment
  here in the future is of critical strategic importance.
- Rotorua is a strategic parish, will be seeking a new appointment commencing 2008.
- What is our strategy for areas in both Hamilton and Tauranga with respect to areas of rapid growth and new housing developments? Clearly our partners are, in many cases, positioning themselves to have a presence in such areas. Do we "plant" churches and if so how might we fund and resource such ventures?
- Do we need to look at having specialist "church planting" ministries. We are putting resources into Enabling which is essentially keeping existing churches/congregations going. What resources do we put into new ventures? (This question has many components including of course "bricks and mortar", the place of or relevance of Epworth Campsite, what type of plant should be built in new areas, rationalisation of properties etc.

#### Our Strengths as a Synod District are considered to be:

- Proportionally high number of parishes and presbyters/deacons for our geographical size.
  - Strong links with rohe.
  - Regular educational slots and resourcing sessions at Synod meetings and training days.
  - Active lay preachers group.
  - Recognition of strong lay leadership already working within many parishes.
  - A region of fast-growing cities, coupled with a commitment to ministry in rural areas.

#### Hawkes Bay / Manawatu Strategy, August 2006

At present, we have four ordained presbyters actively working in the district. Two of these are retired – Rev Loyal Gibson in Palmerston North and Rev Robert Allan, supply presbyter at Woodville/Pahiatua. Rev Bill Clifford, currently at Rongotea Uniting, has reached the end of his term and is on the stationing list. Rev Beverley Osborn, currently at Trinity, Napier, is retiring.

The district stretches east-west across the central part of the North Island and runs north-south from Gisborne to Shannon. This is a large geographic area to be without ordained Methodist leadership in 2007. The appointment of one ordained presbyter to the district would involve the picking up of parish superintendency for about ten parishes, according to the present requirements of Methodist law. The appointment of a probationer would not fulfil that responsibility and would, in addition, require the

appointment of a study and a ministry supervisor. Outside the district, the nearest ordained presbyters would be in Opotiki, Masterton and Wanganui.

The two most obvious ways to address this situation are:-

- 1. that Tauiwi Stationing gives urgency to the appointment of two ordained presbyters with sufficient seniority to pick up the Methodist law requirements of parish superintendency for the district.
- 2. that there is a change to Methodist law in the defining of the requirements of parish superintendency and district superintendency

#### PRESENT SITUATION

Manawatu Regional Church, including Palmerston North (5100), Feilding Oroua (5120), Marton (5130) and Ashhurst/Bunnythorpe/Pohangina (5110) seeks one full-time presbyteral appointment.
Woodville/Pahiatua (5080/5090), Rev Robert Allan, 1 year supply appointment
Foxton/Shannon Co-operating (5150) Local Shared Ministry
Milson Combined (5180) Anglican oversight
Rongotea Uniting (5140) Probably Presbyterian appointment.
Trinity, Napier (5010), seeks one full-time presbyteral appointment.
Wesley, Hastings (5020) Dennis Coon and Jim Pentelow form a lay ministry team
Mangapapa Union (5050) Stewart Patrick, lay ministry.
Waipawa Co-operating (5170) Paul Forster, lay ministry.
Wairoa Co-operating (5060) Awaiting Clarification
Tamatea (5160) Anglican oversight.

There are positive discussions and actions towards the implementation of the Local Shared Ministry model in the Manawatu regional Church area, but in Napier and Hastings there is a lack of personnel available to put the model into practice. Waipawa and Mangapapa continue to develop their own effective lay leadership models.

#### THE FUTURE

The District has given serious consideration to ways ahead for the future, through district executive and Synod meetings and through a regional executive meeting. It has committed itself to continue the exploration of a lower North Island region with a separated superintendent. In 2007 it is planned to hold two local synod meetings and two synods combined with Wellington and Taranaki/Wanganui. Combined regional executive meetings will be held prior to the combined Synods and the annual School of Theology will continue to be a combined event.

There is, however, a reluctance in the Hawke's Bay/Manawatu Synod District to proceed further down the road to regionalisation and a separated superintendent, before satisfactory answers have been supplied to key points. These are -- a detailed funding proposition, research into the implications for relationships, meeting attendances, travel costs (in view of the rapidly rising fuel prices) and an approved job description. There is concern about the shrinkage in the number of people willing and able to share in local synod meetings, as church membership ages and people have less money to spend. The impact of this trend on attendance at much larger and more distant synod meetings needs to be explored, as it would be irresponsible to commit energy and resources to a programme that is actually not viable.

#### PROPOSALS

The Hawke's Bay/Manawatu District suggests that there should be an exploration of the feasibility of dividing the lower part of the North Island into 6 cluster groups/circuits which could determine for themselves how frequently they met individually and collectively each year. Such an organisational plan would allow for the leadership of those six clusters to form a combined superintendency team. In this way, we believe connexionalism could still be fostered at a level that engages and is enjoyable, particularly if there is a commitment from individual parishes to be more pro-active in dealing with Connexional papers. In the Hawke's Bay area, we are aware that in order to retain its membership, particularly its leadership, Trinity, Napier needs maintenance and development of its liberal theological stance. Waipawa, Mangapapa and, probably, Hastings exist in the evangelical spectrum, so we wondered if there was any way that the Network could assume administrative oversight for the latter three churches if no senior appointments are made to the district

The District recommends that Methodist Law should not continue to insist on requirements for which there are no longer available personnel. A list of specific areas this synod believes need to be revisited has been forwarded to Mission Resourcing and copies of those are available now

The Hawke's Bay/Manawatu Synod recognises the need for administrative change and wishes to use its reduced office-bearing potential in the way that will best bring life and vitality to the district.

When I sat down to begin this report I was feeling somewhat smug, it was going to be easy, no changes in ministry. However after a phone call and an email it became a 50% change in ministry and an opening up of a need to review long-term strategy for all of Taranaki and of South Taranaki in particular.

Rev John Farr, Supply, Eltham / Kaponga and Manaia tendered his resignation as from the end of April. Rev Jan Fogg has indicated she will be available for Stationing this year.

Also I have concern for the load that Rev Alan Upson is carrying as Parish Superintendent of five parishes. The distance between them is such that considerable time is consumed in just travel.

With just four presbyters in the District, one being the Supply, the District is on a knife edge, in danger of falling below "critical mass".

Our District sends over \$200,000 out of the district, to support youth work, from two Trusts. This use of District resources outside of the District seems to us to be connexionalism in reverse, our District is weak and in need of resources. I intend to talk with the trusts to see if some of this money can be used to benefit our District.

We are in the process of rethinking our strategy and this involves conversations with the Presbytery and Anglicans, as we are involved with them through seven CV's. An initial conversation with the Presbytery Clerk indicates they are seriously short of ministers also. This impacts on the future of Manaia, which is linked with Eltham/Kaponga. Hawera Methodist is linked with Stratford.

It may be possible to think in terms of linking Hawera Methodist and Manaia, and Stratford with Eltham / Kaponga, although Stratford has expressed an interest in talking with the Anglicans at Stratford. Kaponga has some strength in lay leadership potential. They wish to look after themselves for a "while".

Manaia are keen to keep going but feel they're worn out and old!

We have some "bright" spots, Opunake is going well with the LSM team, and Okato/Oakura is being well served by Rex Brogden (Lay Supply). Dcn Shirley-Joy Barrow is the Enabler for Opunake and Supervisor / resource person for Rex at Okato/Oakura. Patea is under Anglican oversight, with Rev Christine James (Deacon) in an oversight role, also linking in Waverley / Waitotara. That unit is now working well.

It is clear that we need four full-time presbyters in our District, and another person full-time, to act as resource/enabler person to our rural parishes to enable them to move from mere fighting for survival to growth. All but Hawera and Manaia report potential for growth, and its happening in Patea!

All parishes in our District have been challenged to take on board the need to develop a form of LSM, this includes those with presbyters/supply. We are to launch training in 2007 using Lead Worship.

If no action is taken, or indeed if the wrong actions are taken, then it is not beyond the realms of possibility that Methodism in Taranaki will be found only in New Plymouth, Whanganui and in a couple of CV's. Tony Bell

#### Wellington District Strategy.

Issues that are in front of the synod are:

- 1. An agreed commitment of the Lower North Island Synod Executives to facilitate a discussion process towards being one region. To that end a Saturday meeting of the three Synods will be held in March 2007 to explore the possibilities.
- 2. Review of the relationship of the Joint Youth Ministry Committee with the Synod.
- 3. Points of possible cooperation with the Presbytery of Wellington
- 4. Maintaining a healthy relationship with the Wairarapa UDC
- 5. Where we wish to focus energy, passion, attention.

#### Lower North Island Region

The Wellington Synod is committed to combined Schools of Theology and Annual Synods.

#### Stationing

- 1. Geraldine Coats has settled well into St.Luke's Masterton.
- 2. HCUC. The appointment sought for 2007 is a bilingual Tongan-English ministry.
- 3. Johnsonville Uniting Parish will be seeking a new appointment for 2008. The denomination of oversight is yet to be determined.
- 4. Tawa Union and Kapiti Uniting Parishes will each have ministry appointments concluding in 2-5 years, with a possibility of those coming under Methodist oversight.
- 5. There will be a change of ministry at Wesley Wellington in the next few years.

#### **Provision of Ministry**

There is ongoing concern about the provision of ministry in some of the smaller parishes. At this stage there is little support for Local Shared Ministry.

- 1. Levin. Conversations continue at a low level about cooperation with the Presbyterian Parish,
- 2. Mana. The Mana Parish has approached Wesley Wellington Parish to explore some form of partnership.
- 3. Wellington South Union Parish is considering its future.

From a District or regional point of view, there may be some merit in re-establishing a form of Methodist Circuit that enables and strengthens the remaining Methodist ventures in the Wellington region.

#### Nelson Marlborough West Coast District Report

Nelson Marlborough West Coast Synod & West Coast Uniting Church Council enjoy enthusiastic cooperation and support and share many events together. Members attend Synod & UCC meetings, Methodist Conferences & Presbyterian Assemblies. Lay Ministry Teams are active in Picton, Greymouth, Buller & Reefton. Present numbers of Ordained Minister: 6 Full Time 1 Part Time 1 Minister Emeriti.

- Theology of property: After a full discussion with Rev Dr Jim Stuart at Synod School of Theology a • small subcommittee drew up six questions for parishes to discuss & bring findings to the August Synod. Rev. John Drylie presented a summary of the six questions asked (the summary is available for your information). The six questions were 1. What buildings/land does your parish hold? 2. What is the collective value of these properties? A surprising total of \$10, 549,359 in property value was recorded. 3. Identify what property your Parish uses for a) most of the week, b) one day each week, c) 1-3 hours per week & d) never or seldom. There were some exceptions but it is clear that church hall/complexes play a significant role in accommodating not only church based activities but also community based activities. 4. What activities do you dream of doing that your current buildings are not adequate for? There was a wide variety of responses e.g. counselling rooms, drop in coffee place, emergency accommodation etc.5. What would your Parish do if it did not have the buildings/land but had available cash to the value of such properties? Again a wide variety of responses e.g erect a multi purpose building, provide funding for parish based workers, provision of mission outreach & assistance to people & 6. If one or more of your properties was sold & your Parish had the use of the sale proceeds to what use would you put such proceeds? There was comment about the relevance of this question as funds go to the Connexion to be held but buildings as they are often provide income for the parish. This was a useful exercise which was entered into with enthusiasm by most of the Parishes.
- Paid Separated Superintendent: This is seen as a helpful and urgent policy for our Synod area but it would need to be a "Regional" position with key people in leadership roles throughout the District.
- School of Theology is an important sharing time for learning, growing & being in fellowship together. With local & national issues discussed & explained & decisions made.
- Enabler Training would be very beneficial to our area of small, sparsely populated groups spread over a large geographic area.
- Visions there is an acknowledged need for Synods to be the formal voice of the people at the grass
  roots to have an official way to communicate their visions for the church. This is the very important
  role of the District Superintendent & the Lay Representative to Tauiwi Strategy Meeting.
- Committees of Detail there is a great need for these as without them there is little interest in discussions happening & therefore less input from the people of the Church.

- David Bell will run a workshop for members of WC UCC Parishes in Greymouth on Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> September
- Waimea Methodist Parish is on Stationing looking for a part-time Presbyter. The Parish, which went through a very painful break up of the congregation 11 years ago, has done remarkably well to have paid a full time Presbyter for 10 years. However with many of the older members passing on constant fund raising has taken its toll. To move to part time Presbyter will allow the Parish to put their energy into mission rather than maintenance.
- Picton Union Have a good strong leadership team. One member has a Presbyterian Authority to serve Communion. There is very good, helpful interaction between Blenheim and Picton They are under Methodist oversight with Judith Parkes as Parish Superintendent Without the income from the Parsonage Rent they would not be able to pay even a half time Stipend.
- Blenheim Methodist have a strong support group working well with Wallace Brown
- Motueka Union also has a strong support group working well with Elizabeth Clark
- Hills Community Church Moutere, Mapua is an independent Church with Methodist oversight of Presbyter, Marilyn Loken.
- St John Nelson Working well with Allison Molineux and are pleased with the progress they have made with the Historic Places Trust & the Architect as they plan to make alterations to make their building a more user friendly one.
- Stoke Methodist have had a busy year, and continue to foster strong community involvement. The continued training of lay people has paid off well this year in various ways.
- St Lukes Union after a long, painful, very thorough process are relieved that the sale of their building is underway. They will change to Presbyterian oversight & the JRC will meet with them to discuss future movements with the people.
- Murchison Methodist after the same difficult time of discussion is also very relieved that their building has now been sold. The final service will be held Saturday 14 October. With input & help from others they can now see a way forward. They expect to become a community church sharing the Anglican buildings. They have been through the Lead Worship Book & Tape & plan to attend a David Bell Workshop
- Buller Union Have a strong Leadership Team with more members interested in working through the Lead Worship process.
- Reefton Union working well with Ian Davidson. Extensions put in for safety reasons are finished and very much appreciated.
- Greymouth Uniting New Team working well together.
- St Andrews Hokitika Ross South Westland United strengthening worship Teams with John Drylie on 85% time.

The possibility of sharing presbyters/ministers between parishes is seen as a positive move for the future but we are unable to put this strategy in to place for 2007. There are many strong, capable people working in all the parishes within the Synod and we look forward to further growth in the future.

#### Central South Island District Strategy 2006.

#### Encouragement to Mission.

In March the Synod organised and hosted the visit of Tom Bandy, to both Christchurch and Auckland. It was pleasing that people from all over New Zealand and from several denominations were able to share in this event. It is particularly pleasing to see how the ideas shared by Tom, [and those shared by Kennon Callahan in July 2005] are being discussed and are influencing the way parishes approach their life and exercise mission.

The Synod has recently enrolled in Tom's online mentoring programme as a way to further our thinking through and applying these learnings.

#### Schools of Theology:

To continue the process of developing and stretching our thinking and action, the Synod promoted two-day Schools of Theology in both 2005 and 2006. This year the focus was Christian and Muslims in dialogue. It was a very timely, thought provoking and helpful two days. This strategy of intention learning events will be continued in 2007.

# Significant Conversations

During the year Wainoni Methodist [half time appointment] has been in conversation with the neighbouring Presbyterian parish [also half time] with a view to working together. The intention is to form a cluster rather than a formal CV. As an outcome of these conversations a meeting of representatives from all the Methodist, Presbyterian and Union Parish's in East Christchurch [nine parishes] was called. It is clear that there will

need to be changes in Parish structure in the very near future. The conversation was a beginning point using the focus question, what must we do now to ensure there is a vital Christian witness in our communities in

10 to 15 years. [Note: Wainoni has decided not to proceed with the sharing arrangement. However other conversations have begun]

**Beckenham and Christchurch South** parishes have also been in conversation during 2006, and also with shared congregational events. The eventual outcome may be a cluster in South Christchurch.

Rangiora Presbyterian Parish [currently vacant] has asked for conversations to take place with Rangiora Methodist, Kaiapoi Co-operating Parish and Oxford District Union, with regard to future provision of ministry. The District and Presbytery have asked that they be included in this conversation. The strategic value here is that it might make it possible to provide ministry more easily for Oxford District Union, and also provide a more significant base for meeting the challenge of Pegasus, the new town of 5,000 to be built near Woodend. Both Rangiora Parishes and Kaiapoi are financially viable, at present, but with increasingly tight budgets.

#### Stationing and significant parish matters.

#### Halswell Union

Currently half time, the Parish is actively considering the seeking of a full time appointment for a minimum of three years. Halswell is currently the part of Christchurch City with the strongest residential growth. The parish is seeking to respond strategically to this opportunity. We will also explore synergies, which may exist with Christchurch South and Beckenham in the coming year.

#### Ellesmere Co-operating:

The two year intentional interim ministry of Rev Chris Bedford will conclude in 2007 and the parish will be seeking an appointment. There has been important work conducted in the parish, and they will be seeking someone who can continue to develop their mission.

#### St Albans Uniting

Following the two year intentional interim ministry of Rev Rob Ferguson, Stationing in 2005 was unable to make an appointment to this revitalised and renewed congregation. Rev Norman West is currently appointed as a supply and has been providing excellent leadership, which is well received. The parish is looking for long term leadership. If an appointment is not able to made this year then the intention would be to extend Rev Norman West's term as supply minister. This however will be a key appointment for 2008 and beyond.

#### Oxford District Uniting

As this appointment is half time, the District is aware that a match is unlikely from Stationing and that it will be up to the District to seek a possible appointment. Since the profiles were completed a person interested in a supply ministry has been identified. You will also note the intended conversations with neighbouring parishes [see above]. These could have significant implications for Oxford.

#### Ashburton

Peter Taylor, Sharon, Aiden and Ross arrived in New Zealand at the beginning of September. This appointment was made at Conference last year; to start after Peter's appointment in the UK concluded. We rejoice that he and his family are now settling in to Ashburton after a long and testing immigration process.

#### Timaru – Temuka – Oamaru – Waimate

Rev Bruce Anderson has this year spent one day per month at Oamaru, offering oversight and specialised skills. Next year with the conclusion of the supply ministry of Rev Jim Hunter at Waimate, Bruce will have a similar oversight there also. Is this the beginning a regional cluster? Important conversations will continue in 2007.

#### OTAGO SOUTHLAND SYNOD STRATEGY

Alexandra Clyde Lauder Union Parish was left one wanted by stationing 2005. It is very pleasing to note that a provisional matching has been made by this year's stationing. The parish has strong infrastructure, and I believe will prove an ideal first New Zealand appointment for the prospective presbyter.

**Teviot Union Parish**. Lyndon Weggery began a one third time lay ministry supply appointment began in May. At this point the arrangement appears to be working satisfactorily, and will continue to be carefully

monitored.

**Riverton Union Parish** is in the second year of functioning under the Local Shared ministry model. This appears to be working well, but could be put to the test when a "second generation" leadership team is needed.

A suggestion recently been made by the Presbyterian Synod Mission Adviser that Riverton, together with Otautau – Waiono Union Parish, and two adjacent Presbyterian Parishes, might explore a "cluster" arrangement is regarded as "dead in the water." This is unfortunate, but my feeling is the main energies of the Riverton people are needed to make the Local Shared Ministry arrangement work.

**Otatara Community Church.** A review was carried out in June of the <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> time lay ministry offered by Steve Harrex, a member of the congregation. The review was positive, and both Steve and the parish see the arrangement as a long term one. We believe there are good grounds for making this a lay appointment, rather than continuing as a lay supply.

Invercargill. Motekiai Fakatou is now in the fourth year of his first appointment and will be seeking a new appointment at next year's stationing.

A suitable appointment to follow him will be of the highest priority for our next year's strategy. We will be looking for someone who will be able to provide leadership in the Synod.

Dunedin has settled ministry at present. Moves are afoot for the Parish to consider its own strategy for the next five years.

**Future of the Synod.** As stated in last year's strategy paper, it is becoming increasingly apparent that we lack the people resources to continue functioning as a separate Synodal district. Some other way of operation needs to be found.

2007 will be my third year as Synod Superintendent, so a replacement will be needed. Stuart Grant

**Programmes:** Several new programmes have been created by Alison Kane and her team. We hope they will be widely used. Our thanks to the committee for time and effort put into this work over the past 2 years.

World Assembly of WFM & UCW was held in South Korea in July. Eighteen N.Z. women attended, including Rev Judith Parkes, Retiring President of the South Pacific Area. Our sincere thanks to Judith for her leadership over the past five years. The new South Pacific Area President is Rev Meleana Puloka of Tonga (previously Vice President) and Vice President is Anne Conlan of Australia. President Nelma thanks

all MWF members for their generous response to the 'Love Gift' appeal for the President's Travel Fund enabling her to attend as NZ delegate. Sharing fellowship with 736 women from 73 different countries was an inspiring experience. The theme, based on the United Nations Millennium Development Goals, was

"Women Making a Difference" and has been carried home by all those women intent on making a difference in their own part of the world. Helen Kim Scholarships for the South Pacific Area were awarded to Mataiva Robertson from New Plymouth, N.Z. and Ilaisanne Tupou of Nuku'alofa, Tonga. All 17 H.K. Scholars from the 9 areas of the world spent three days of training at Seoul University prior to Assembly and took an active part in proceedings. Over fifty Bible Puzzle Books from N Z were sold at Assembly and the proceeds donated to the Helen Kim Scholarship Fund. NZMWF can be proud of the significant contribution made to this fund.

Finance: Thanks to our hard-working members the 2005 – 2006 Special Project raised \$37,677-00. Medical & Educational Fund \$2,458-00 Stamps \$4,384-00 Grants made: Smethurst \$22,200-00. Kurahuna Grants \$10,366-00 Friendship Scholarship \$4,350-00.

#### Section B: Our Vision.

Our emblem *The Tree of Life*, symbolises continuous life and vitality. # **Constitution 2006**

- 1.1.1 There shall be a New Zealand Methodist Women's Fellowship (herein after called 'NZMWF' or 'the Fellowship') responsible to the Conference of the Methodist Church of New Zealand Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa [hereinafter called 'Conference'].
- 1.1.2 The aim of the Fellowship, shall be:

(a) To unite members in prayer, study, fellowship and service, encouraging them to make a Christian witness in home, church and community;

- (b) To support the work of Methodist and Uniting churches;
- (c) To encourage an informed interest in worldwide mission and evangelism.
- 1.1.3 Membership shall be open to all who desire to further the aim of the Fellowship.
- 1.1.4 The Constitution of NZMWF enables each MWF [hereinafter called 'District'] of NZMWF to have the flexibility to operate its own affairs within the context of Methodist law as prescribed by the Methodist Church of New Zealand, Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa

# Local Women's Fellowship

- 1.2.1 In each Methodist and Uniting Church there shall normally be at least one Fellowship affiliated to the NZMWF.
- 1.2.2 The Officers of each Local Women's Fellowship Executive shall be the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, or two Facilitators and a committee of such other members as shall be required. The normal term of office shall not exceed three years in the same role.
- 1.2.3 An Annual Meeting shall be held no later than 15 July at which the officers and executive committee shall be elected.. It shall receive the written annual reports and financial statements, presented to the standard required by the Methodist Law Book, and shall submit the same to the District Executive and to the Parish Meeting/Council. The Presbyter of the Church shall have the right to preside thereat.
- 1.2.4 The Annual Meeting shall appoint a representative to the local Parish Meeting / Council and such other parish and local representatives as required [e g National Council of Women, Church Women United, World Day of Prayer, Parish Family Committee, Pastoral Committee etc.] The Annual Meeting shall also appoint no

fewer than two members to take responsibility for the reporting of District Events (Rally Days, combined services etc) to the local Fellowship.

- 1.2.5 In Uniting Congregations the group shall be known locally as 'The Women's Fellowship' or some other suitably inclusive name.
- 1.2.6 At the local level Fellowships shall be open to men by agreement and invitation.

# **MWF District**

- 1.3.1 In each Synod there shall be an Executive or Executives of the NZMWF that shall have the oversight of the work of the Fellowships within such Synod. Ecumenical cooperation is encouraged.
- 1.3.2 The Officers of the District Executive shall be President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, and a Committee of no fewer than three others, usually covering the roles of: Distributing Secretary, Liaison Officer, and link persons for Programmes, Missions, National Council of Women, and Uniting Congregations.
- 1.3.3 The Officers shall be elected at the annual meeting and shall normally hold office for a period of three consecutive years. An officer may be re-elected to another position within the executive for up to a further three years. The District Executive shall be responsible for District events, such as Rally Days, social events and combined services. There shall normally be no fewer than three District Meetings a year. All Fellowship members shall be welcome at these functions.
- 1.3.4 The Annual Meeting of the District shall be held not later than August. It shall receive the written annual reports and financial statements, presented to the standard required by the Methodist Law Book, from each local Fellowship, hold an election of officers, and appoint representatives to Convention and Synod, one of whom is normally the District President.

The Annual meeting shall make such other district appointments as are required e g National Council of Women, Church Women United etc. It shall submit a written annual report and financial statements, presented to the standard required by the Methodist Law Book, to the National Executive and to the District Synod.

1.3.5 Where there are no affiliated Fellowships, or if members are unable to attend, those who so desire may become 'Associate Members' by paying fees direct to the District Treasurer.

# Convention

- 1.4.1 There shall be a Convention of the NZMWF that shall determine and direct general policy. It shall consider the work of the Fellowship and its financial position. It shall normally meet biennially. In any year in which no Convention is held there shall be a meeting of the National Council.
- 1.4.2 Convention shall consider the annual reports and financial statements, remits, notices of motion, and any other matters referred to it by: District Executives, National Executive, National Council or Convention.

- 1.4.3 The Officers of Convention shall be: a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer. [The Treasurer may be from outside MWF.]
- 1.4.4 Convention shall consist of:
  - a) The Officers and Members of the National Executive Committee
  - b) Convenors of NZMWF National Committees
  - c) A South Pacific Area World Federation representative, if living in New Zealand
  - d) The President, Secretary, and Treasurer of each District Executive
  - e) One District member representative for each 100 financial members or fraction thereof [District membership representation shall circulate round the Fellowships with due consideration to urban and rural groups]
  - f) Four Executive representatives from the Samoan Women's District plus one membership representative for each 100 financial members or fraction thereof.
  - g) Four Executive representatives from the Tongan Women's District plus one membership representative for each 100 financial members or fraction thereof.
- 1.4.5 There shall be a National Executive Committee of Convention which shall consist of its Officers and such other members as may be required, not exceeding ten (10) in total, who shall be installed at Convention and shall hold office for two years. It shall implement the decisions of Convention and have general oversight of the Fellowship. It may co-opt such resource persons as are required for a limited time. The National Executive Committee shall be stationed in a District for two years. Each year it shall prepare written reports and financial statements, presented to the standard required by the Methodist Law Book, which shall be presented to either Convention or National Council.
- 1.4.6 Business shall normally be done by consensus. [Refer to NZMWF General Guidelines Leaflet no.1 2006 for procedure]
- 1.4.7 Votes by proxy are not acceptable. Any non-attending District may prepare a statement to be read during the appropriate business session. Such a statement must be in the hands of the National Executive before the start of Convention, or read on behalf of that District by another District during the session.
- 1.4.8 Each year a written report and financial statement, presented to the standard required by the Methodist Law Book, shall be submitted to Conference.

# **National Council**

- 1.5.1 There shall be a National Council of the Methodist Women's Fellowship that meets in the year when there is no Convention. It shall normally meet every other year.
- 1.5.2 The National Council shall consist of:
  - a) The Officers and Members of the National Executive Committee as appointed by the President in the preceding year.
  - b) Convenors of NZMWF National Committees.
  - c) A South Pacific Area World Federation representative, if living in New Zealand.
  - d) The President of each District Executive or her duly appointed substitute.
  - e) Four Executive representatives from the Samoan Women's District.
  - f) Four Executive representatives from the Tongan Women's District.
- 1.5.3 A District may request an observer be present at the National Council Meeting. Expenses shall be met by the District that person represents.

- 1.5.4 National Council shall consider the annual written reports and audited financial statements, recommendations, notices of motion, and any other matters referred to it by District Executives, the National Executive Committee or by Convention. Any non-attending District may prepare a statement to be read during the appropriate business session. Such a statement must be in the hands of the National Executive before the start of National Council, or read on behalf of that District by another District during the session.
- 1.5.5 Business other than changes to the Constitution or selection of the new National President shall normally be done by consensus. *[Refer to NZMWF General Guidelines Leaflet no.1 2006 for process]*
- 1.5.6 Nominations for National President shall be in the hands of the National Executive by 30 June in the year of National Council; the President to be elected at National Council. Nominations shall be submitted by District Executives with the consent of the nominee and in consultation with the District of which she is a member.
- 1.5.7 Profiles of nominees shall be circulated to all Districts prior to the National Council meeting.
- 1.5.8 In the event of no nomination being received by 30 June, National Executive shall:a) Inform Districts of the position.
  - b) Initiate approaches to suitable nominees through the nominee's District Executive.
  - c) Provide profiles of nominees to all Districts before or after National Council where applicable.
- 1.5.9 Votes by proxy are not acceptable, other than when voting for a new President.

#### Finance

[For Guidelines refer to 'NZMWF Finance Guidelines Leaflet no.2 2006]

- 1.6.1 There shall be an annual membership fee determined by Convention. Convention sets fees payable to it and to District Executives. Fees are payable to the District Treasurer on a membership basis.
- 1.6.2 The financial year for Local Fellowships shall end by June 30 each year.
- 1.6.3 The financial year for Districts shall end by July 31 each year.
- 1.6.4 The national financial year for NZMWF shall end on August 31 each year.
- 1.6.5 No District shall be entitled to representatives at Convention or National Council if annual membership fees have not been paid by August 31 of that year.
- 1.6.6 Each year the National Executive shall present financial statements, presented to the standard required by the Methodist Law Book, to the Conference after Convention or Council.

# General

- 1.7.1 Convention shall have the power to amend the Constitution of the Women's Fellowship by a three-fifths vote of financial members provided three month's written notice of its intention so to do has been given to all Districts and Local Fellowships. Before coming into force such amendments shall receive the approval of the Conference.
- 1.7.2 Should the Constitution be amended the National Executive shall date, print, and forward to all Districts, a supplementary sheet, or complete reprint, updating the Constitution and Guidelines of the NZMWF.
- 1.7.3 NZMWF shall appoint two representatives to attend Conference. In the year of the Convention these are normally the President and the Immediate Past President. In the alternate year they shall normally be the President and one other member of the National Executive.
- 1.7.4 The NZMWF is the legal successor of the New Zealand Women's Guild Fellowship and the Methodist Women's Missionary Union.
- 1.7.5 The NZMWF shall report annually to Conference.
- 1.7.6 NZMWF shall be bound by any decision of Conference.

# Dissolution

**National**: Should the NZMWF be wound up, all properties and funds held by or on behalf of the NZMWF will be transferred to the Methodist Church of New Zealand Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa and held in trust for future national endeavours of Methodist women.

**District:** Should a District amalgamate with another District, the funds and property shall be transferred to the amalgamated District. Should a District cease to exist, the funds and property shall be transferred to the National NZMWF.


**Local:** Should a Local Fellowship go into recess, it shall notify the District and National Executives. Local Fellowships may dispose of funds and property as members so wish. However, any funds raised for a specific purpose shall be used for that purpose. Minute books, annual reports, annual financial statements and any important historical documents shall be retained for archival purposes within the parish.

# WASEWASE KO VITI KEI ROTUMA Report to Conference 2006

Spread out, under resourced and struggling describes the reality of the Fijian/Rotuman Ministry. The Rev. Pene Tikoinaka now on second year supply is exercising an almost impossible task of providing ministry for the congregations in Christchurch, Wellington and Wanganui. With the (MRU) travelling grant now been exhausted in June this year would mean a huge setback for ministry in Christchurch/Wellington/Wanganui. The Rev. Dr. Tuwere generously gives whatever time he could on top of his own full time job for the tasks of superintendenting both the Auckland Fijian Parish and the Wasewase; and Susau Strickland is looking after the Rotuman community based in Auckland. The rest of the work is done by lay people.

#### Structure / Strategy

- The chart below identifies the grouping of congregations into areas to enable the facilitation of ministry. While the word "Tabacakacaka" means Circuit, the essence of this structure is not so much in its legal sense but a way of trying to stretch out limited resources.
- Mission field there have been conversations for some mission work to be done in New Plymouth and Rotorua where a number of Fijian families are residing. This is on the agenda of Wasewase.
- Building Project. The Auckland Tabacakacaka continues to work on this project a multipurpose building for worship, education and cultural activities and a parsonage
- Leadership Training Wasewase identifies the need for leadership training and now seeking help from MRU.



# Sinoti Samoa Ministry and Strategy Report to Conference 2006

#### Ten Year Anniversary

Sinoti Samoa, at its annual meeting which took place in Hastings on the 20– 23 of July this year, marked another milestone of celebrating the 10<sup>th</sup> year anniversary since it has become one of the Synods in the life of Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa. As part of the celebration, a faith motivating and a thought provoking workshop was run for the whole day focussing on the Conference's questions: *What is the Spirit saying to the Church? (Sinoti Samoa) What can be done to promote the work of God?* 

This workshop proved to be both challenging and inspiring, and has led to the adoption of the following resolution by Sinoi Samoa:-

#### the work and ministry of Sinoti Samoa; Acknowledging the contribution

of those who have moved to other churches or shifted overseas or returned to Samoa; With thanks to God for the service of presbyters and their spouses; the hard work and firm commitment of lay leaders; the wise counsel and cultural advice of the chiefs and orators; the contribution of youths and children; and In memory of those with whom we used to work, including fathers and mothers, brothers and

sisters, youths and children, now gone before us.

We, the Sinoti therefore made a commitment in accepting the challenge before us that "Sinoti Samoa to be Transformed" encoded in the following Vision:-To be a family that

- lives out the transforming love of God through Jesus Christ
- grows in strong faith
- constantly imbues with spiritual depth
- shares the love of God
- strives to share the saving grace of the Good New of Jesus Christ.

#### Mission/ Ministry Strategic Planning:

The following items summarise the short and long term strategies for Sinoti Samoa

- Recruitment strategy seminars and workshops
- Planting new congregations particularly in South Island
- Working on structural relationships with District Synods and English Parishes.
- Creation and translation of Christian educational and liturgical materials.
- Translating the law and regulations of the Church
- Giving support to and building up the work of the Women's Fellowship
- Working towards a Separated Sinoti Superintendent

#### Local Shared Ministry:

Sinoti Samoa has asked Parishes and congregations to seriously consider the appropriateness of this model and follow the process and procedures especially for the training of those who are to be involved and to take up leadership in this ministry.

#### Youth Ministry:

As part of its ongoing commitment to youth ministry, Sinoti, at its annual meeting affirmed the appointments of two Liaison Persons and they are Opeta Amani, and Jayme-Fuli Roache who will work closely with the Facilitator of Tauiwi Youth and leaders of other Youth groups in the life of our church.

#### New Congregations:

Towards the end of last year and the beginning of this year after consultation and following procedures on the appropriate level of the Church, Sinoti Samoa welcomed two new congregations: one in Porirua and one in Otahuhu who decided to join the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

Consultation has begun, and a process has already been put in place to facilitate the adoption of a congregation from Kelston in Auckland who has decided to join the Methodist Church of New Zealand under the oversight of Sinoti Samoa.

- Training sessions for laity authorised to administer the Sacraments.
- Vahefonua has met twice and the Executive Committee has met four times this year.
- Syllabus for the Sunday School was completed and distributed to all districts.

# LAW REVISION Report to Conference 2006

Earlier this year Law Revision conducted a survey to monitor how the discipline procedures were working.

Surveys were sent to all who had been involved in the process since the procedures were adopted. 29 surveys were sent out and 18 replies received giving a 62% response.

The replies were received by the Committee's chair, David Smith. Those replies have been condensed into a summary of responses in such a way as to make identification of any respondent impossible. Any remarks which could have possibly identified a person have been omitted.

Of the replies received 78% were positive, 12% were positive with some reservation and 10% negative.

The concerns expressed were:

- The inability to tell others in a Parish as to what is happening or the outcome if not published
- People do not remember the explanation of the process given at the beginning
- The length of sessions with the mediator/complaints officer
- Timeliness
- Pastoral care
- Moving into reconciliation mode before resolution.

The Law Revision Committee is pleased the responses received indicate that the procedures are largely meeting the objectives expressed when they were introduced. They also wish to take seriously those aspects which some have found unsatisfactory by considering them over the coming year with a view to making recommendations as to any amendments at Conference 2007.

Conference 2005 asked the Law Revision Committee to:

- 1. Revise Section 4.8 of the Laws and Regulations pertaining to Synod Superintendency in order to allow for new kinds of District or Regional leadership.
- 2. Clarify the use of the terms "District" and "Synod"

The Committee has begun the task but has been unable to complete it in time for Conference. A paper will be prepared early in 2007 for circulation to Hui Poari and Synods for discussion and response to Law Revision. A full report and suggested decisions will be brought to Conference November 2007.

# BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION

#### INTRODUCTION

During 2006 the Division has been consolidating in all areas whereas in the previous two years, there had been substantial development and restructuring. The Centralised Payroll System which began in April 2005 with 25 people on the payroll, has increased during the seventeen months and there are now a total of 125 presbyters/employees using the system.

The Division also extended its accounting services to Synods and Parishes who are making good use of the facility offered. A number of major projects were undertaken to ensure that our software packages were being used to 100% capability. A major realignment of the general ledger has ensured that as far as is possible codings are consistent across funds and the most significant undertaking was the integration project which enabled a number of different software packages to use common data thus reducing chances of errors occurring.

The new Connexional Property Committee is functioning well and there is much more interaction between Synod property committees and the Connexional committee. This has resulted in less difficulties and last minute decision making and more constructive relationships.

Executive Staff continue to monitor the progress of the Charities Bill and the International Financial Reporting Standards Act. Parishes are asked to be patient as the Division works with available information to provide guidance to the wider church. Those wishing to keep up to date may do so by logging on to the Commission's Website: <u>http://www.charities.govt.nz/</u>.

#### STAFF

The General Secretary and the Executive Officer both took long leave during this year. Greg Wright was away in South Africa for six weeks and Jill van de Geer visited Ireland, Scotland, England, Thailand and Korea. Jill attended the Irish and British Methodist Conferences as well as the World Methodist Council and then the World Methodist Conference in Korea. She has been elected an officer of the World Methodist Council for the next five years.

Leah Scales ended her three year contract with us in May. Leah leaves an amazing legacy for the Division. She has completely restructured the accounting services streamlining all our systems and setting us up to be able to provide excellent financial service to the Connexion for many years to come. Her enthusiasm and forthrightness will be missed and we wish her and Paul every success for their future.

The Division has again been very fortunate that we have been able to employ a highly skilled person in Peter van Hout. Peter brings extensive management experience to the task of Financial Services Manager and expertise in HR technology as well as his eighteen years as General Manager of a number of aged care facilities. The Connexion will be well served with this appointment.

#### STIPENDS

#### Stipend and Allowances from 1 July 2006

The Stipend Review Committee accepted that it was appropriate to increase the standard stipend, standard allowances and book allowance reimbursement by the annual movement in the Consumer Price Index to 31 March 2006. The amounts payable for the year commencing on 1 July 2006 as a result of 3.3% increase were:

Standard stipend	\$ 37,614
Standard allowances	\$ 2,679
Maximum book allowance reimbursement	\$889

Reimbursement for Connexional travel is 42 cents per kilometre.

#### SUPERVISION

Conference 1997 adopted a recommendation that: "the professional Supervision of all people who give pastoral care in an employment or covenant relationship with the Church is to be compulsory from 1997 ..." (page 83-84 minutes 1997).

Conference 2004 minutes, page D-44 (13) state "Conference supports the decision of the Stipends Committee that responsibility for payment for supervision fees, up to an agreed figure, belongs to the entity responsible for the payment of the stipend".

Supervision is a cost of ministry and is to be reimbursed up to \$1,000 per year on production of a receipt from an accredited supervisor. Accreditation may be a formal qualification or CPE. Where a supervisor does not have appropriate formal qualifications permission to use such a person must be obtained from the District Superintendent.

#### CENTRALISED PAYROLL SYSTEM

The centralised payroll system which began in April 2005 continues to be one of the Divisions key services and will become more so as Kiwi Saver is implemented. There are now over 125 on the payroll of which 53 are Presbyters and 58 Parish employees.

For the benefit of newcomers to Conference we have set out below how the system works.

Monthly Stipend – payable on 10<sup>th</sup> of the month:

- 1-2<sup>nd</sup> Month payroll calculated, invoices showing full breakdown sent to Parish's
- 7-8<sup>th</sup> Month gross figures direct debited from Parish's account
- 10<sup>th</sup> Month Net Stipend paid directly to Presbyters
  - Super contributions paid to Supernumerary Fund
  - Payslips emailed/posted to Presbyters
- 20<sup>th</sup> Month PAYE/SSCWT paid to Inland Revenue Department

There is a fortnightly service for lay workers who are not paid on the monthly cycle.

Gaye Hamilton of the Connexional Office is responsible for the operation of the Centralised payroll system, please contact her directly if you require any further information.

#### GENERAL PURPOSES TRUST BOARD

Christchurch lawyers, Buddle Findlay, were instructed in May, 2005 to act for the Methodist Church of New Zealand in the preparation and promotion of a Private Act of Parliament relating to orphanages and other trusts. The purpose of this Act is have the ability to vary the terms of trusts whose original purpose no longer exists e.g. money for Methodist orphanages. The Board of Administration received at its September meeting a draft of the Bill. The Board resolved to spend time at its December meeting checking that the draft has picked up all of the church's concerns.

#### **REMOVAL FUND**

The Board of Administration was able to hold the removal levy at \$16 per member for the 2006 financial year. The levy is based on the membership numbers provided in the annual statistical returns. During the year ended 30 June 2006, the fund was responsible for 15 moves at a total cost of \$68,640. This was an increase of 2 moves and \$9,903 on the previous financial year.

#### METHODIST CONNEXIONAL PROPERTY COMMITTEE

The Property Committee as part of its regular monthly meetings, has sought to gain a better understanding of the resources that are held in the Church Building and Loan Fund representing the deposits received from the sale of Church property.

One outcome of that review was the Theology of Property booklet announced at Conference 2005 and widely distributed to the Church as the end of the 2005 calendar year.

The Committee did ask for responses from the Church by the end of April so that a report could be prepared for August Synods to enable discussion and a further report with the recommendations brought to Conference 2006.

The Committee accepts that its time line was far too optimistic.

By late July 2006 five responses had been received and these were copied and forwarded to District Synods for discussion at their August meetings.

The Committee encourages parishes and groups within the Church to carefully consider the booklet and the responses received to date and to make Parish or District responses. It may be that individual church members may have responses that they would also like to share with the Committee and these will be welcomed.

The way in which the Church is shaped by and the manner in which it responds to its physical property and the value of that property, cultural, personal and economic, has been and remains a very significant factor in the development of the Church and any review of its relationship to property needs thorough and careful consideration.

As the Church continues to deliberate the Committee is not in a position to bring any recommendations to Conference and therefore it is expected that the status quo with regard to loan limits, use of capital and the availability of income earned from the sale of property, will continue unchanged.

#### **District Property Advisory Committees**

The Committee remains committed to the principle that decisions relating to local areas must reflect local strategy and are best resolved at the local level. Accordingly, the Committee is guided in its work to a very large extent by the decisions and recommendations of the District Property Advisory Committees.

The Committee acknowledges that the resources available to DPACs is unevenly spread with some such as the Auckland District Committee, having access to secretarial services courtesy Methodist Mission Northern whilst others are trying to cover wide geographic areas with only the convenor and a very small band of committee members.

In an endeavour to de-mystify the workings of the Committee in Christchurch, it has been decided to invite a representative of each Property Advisory Committee including Vahefonua Tonga and Sinoti Samoa's property group, to attend meetings of the Methodist Connexional Property Committee so that all parties can get a better understanding of the work that is entrusted to them.

The representatives of the DPACs also have the opportunity of advising the Connexional Property Committee, of the property matters of moment within their District.

#### **Union and Cooperating Parish Property Schedules**

It is now over thirty years since most of the Union and Cooperating Parish agreements were completed. Many agreements were completed in anticipation that organic union was only "a month or so away". It is now a matter of historic record that union between the Churches was not achieved and the quest for union no long appears to be an issue of significant discussion in any denominational church court.

Parish membership and leaders have evolved and changed since the union agreements were completed and the Connexional Property Committee in consultation with UCANZ, intends to write to all Union parishes in which the Methodist Church of New Zealand has involvement setting out the Connexional Office's understanding of the property schedules attached to the Union Parishes agreements and seeking confirmation that this information accords with the parish's current understandings.

# INSURANCE FUND

#### Insurance Renewal April 2006

The Material Damage policy and the Liability covers for the year from 30 April 2006 were placed with EIG Ansvar NZ Limited.

This continued and extended the association the Methodist Church of New Zealand Insurance Fund has with EIG Ansvar. EIG Ansvar are also providing insurance covers for a significant number of other New Zealand denominations and as a specialty provider EIG are both familiar with the circumstances surrounding Church life and also have a very active interest in building a long term relationship with the various churches.

The Insurance Fund has been significantly aided in its insurance arrangements through the Methodist Church of New Zealand's membership of the interdenominational group the AllChurches Insurance Bureau where it is able to share in a large information pool on matters affecting insurance, legal compliance issues and through the associated AllChurches Taxation Working Party, matters relating to TAX, GST and the Charities Commission.

AllChurches Insurance Bureau is currently looking to obtain a more "official" position with the partner Churches (being largely the partners involved in UCANZ) so that the AllChurches Insurance Bureau can be used by the denominations to research and obtain expert advice on a variety of compliance issues that each member will need to obtain for their own purposes anyway, and so benefit from economies of scale where one opinion or report is sought for the benefit of all member churches.

It is anticipated that a report dealing specifically with this matter will be brought to Conference 2006.

#### MATERIAL DAMAGE RENEWAL

The premium levels on renewal were held at the same rate as applied for the preceding two years. The Insurance Fund has now gone three years without an increase in premium during which time general commercial rates have continued to increase.

The Fund has been able to hold insurance premiums because of the excellent claims record and property stewardship evidenced throughout the Church. The Insurance Fund acknowledges with gratitude the very real assistance given to the Church's insurance programme by those responsible for the day to day care of the church's property throughout the country.

With the May renewal notices, the Insurance Fund also distributed an update of the modal building costs survey produced by Maltby and Partners on behalf of the Department of Building and Housing. The report showed that over the 4 ½ years from July 2001 to January 2006 building costs over all types of building had increased by a minimum of one third and in some case, almost up to 50% on a per square metre basis.

The Insurance Fund is concerned that the Church's insurance covers may not have kept up to date with the very real increase in replacement costs which could mean that a parish suffering a significant loss may find itself woefully short of the sum necessary to fully repair the damage.

The Insurance Fund strongly urges all parishes and those having responsibility for the insurance of property, to *review, revalue and reinsure*.

#### **Security Systems**

It is now 12 years since the Insurance Fund recommended and subsidised the installation of basic security and smoke detection systems within church properties. In that time no serious loss has been suffered by any church property covered by an operating alarm system through fire, burglary or malicious damage.

The Fund is aware that a number of the original systems will now be nearing the end of their economic life and would benefit from a significant review and assessment.

The Insurance Fund is in negotiation with a nationwide security firm endeavouring to provide both an economical monitoring arrangement and a comprehensive service and maintenance arrangement. Negotiations have been protracted but it is hoped that a final proposal can be submitted to parishes during the 2006 calendar year.

Given the very real successes enjoyed by the installation of the security systems in churches the Insurance Fund does not wish to see the impetus lost and is particularly conscious that as the systems age, the components will become less reliable and the protection afforded will diminish.

#### **Liability Cover**

As noted previously the liability covers from 30 April 2006 were placed with EIG Ansvar NZ Limited. The full cost of the liability cover continues to be met from the property insurance activities of the Insurance Fund.

The liability coverage is for the liability of the Methodist Church of New Zealand, its leaders, officers and members, whilst properly engaged in the work of the Methodist Church.

The Methodist cover protects the position of the Methodist Church of New Zealand where the church acts either on its own or in partnership with other organisations. In partnership situations each partner needs to consider there own need for insurance and to act accordingly. It is most unlikely that any partners cover would extend to the liability of the other partners.

The essential element of the various covers available under the heading of "liability" are set out in the Insurance Handbook distributed to all Church groups with their renewal notices in May. A principle element with liability covers is that the Insurance Company needs to be advised whenever the Church becomes aware of any circumstances which have the potential to lead to a claim. This is particularly important in employment dispute matters as the insurers may, if they are not given sufficiently early knowledge of the event, decline cover if matters progressed to the stage of a claim being made against the Church or its offices.

Accordingly, the Insurance Fund stresses again, the importance in any matters that a Church leader believes may have the potential of leading to a claim, of advising the General Secretary or the Executive Officer of the circumstances.

The notification does not cost the parish anything by way of increased premium or any other charge, but the

early notification and an agreed course of action may result either in the event not proceeding to a point where a claim is crystallised or if it does, then the Church being in a stronger position to fairly resist the claim.

All notifications to the Connexional Office are treated in strictest confidence.

#### DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

The Disciplinary Code continues to serve the Church well freeing the President and Vice President to act as pastors to the Church.

Eight new complaints have been dealt with this year, and one unresolved from 2004. Following are the outcomes:

- 1. Five complaints were found to have substance
- 2. One complaint from 2004 and one new complaint are still under action at the time of printing.
- 3. One complaint was found to have no substance.

# **Complaints Review Committee Chairperson Report**

The Chairperson of the Complaints Review Committee is required to report to Conference each year as to the work of the Complaints Reviewers, and to make any suggestions as to amendments to the Disciplinary Code.

This year, there have been no complaints considered by a Complaints Review Committee.

The Code appears to be working satisfactorily - and no concerns have been brought to my attention that require any change to the Code.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW COMMITTEE

The Financial Review Committee is concerned that it undertook the review process without adequate time to study the financial reports in detail.

There were a number of reasons for the tight timeframe. Notably a change of Financial Manager at the beginning of the audit process, the absence of the General Secretary on long leave for two months, as well as a change of auditors which meant that more time was needed to prepare the information required for the Committee to enable them to do a thorough job. In order to avoid the pressure on staff, the Committee will meet next year early October rather than September as happened this year.

On a positive note the Committee was pleased with the way in which Church groups have responded to comments made last year and the improved standard of presentation shown in many of the accounts.

The Committee also wishes to draw to the attention of all groups in the Connexion the fact that there will be some changes required next year in reporting (accounting) standards to meet the introduction of the International Financial Reporting Standards as well as requirements for registration under the Charities Act. This will require all groups to achieve consistency in both policy and presentation.

The Committee has asked the Connexional Office Staff to prepare guidelines and templates for Parishes and other groups so that when registration begins all the preparatory work has been done.

The Committee notes that the purpose of the Church's financial accounts is to provide reports to the Church in standards and general accounting policies and procedures that are useful to them. Sometimes a little more information would be helpful, at other times there is too much detail - probably because it has always been there.

#### CHARITIES BILL

The Board and staff of the Connexional Office have carefully monitored the progress being made toward the opening of registration in terms of the Charities Act 2004. Registration will now commence on 1 February 2007 and for existing charitable organisations will need to be completed before 1 October 2008 in order to protect any current exemptions from income tax and gift duty.

A great deal of thought has been given to the form in which the Methodist Church should register, whether as a single group, or as a number of individual organisations. The current thinking is toward a mix of the two, with incorporated entities, and most connexional bodies registering individually, and with each Synod registering separately and including all other unincorporated entities and committees. The preferred timing is during the six month period following balance date, which points to the second half of calendar year 2007.

The Charities Regulations are expected to be published shortly and that will clarify the forms to be used. The Commission is planning an extensive series of seminars throughout the country in early 2007 and Parishes are encouraged to have representatives at those gatherings. There will be public meetings in November 2006 in the five main centres for the Commission to report on its activities to date and intentions for the coming period.

At this stage it appears as though the Methodist registrations will not be able to include any joint or Union activities.

Methodist entities that are incorporated are encouraged to find and review their constitutional documents to make sure they are appropriate for the current scale and nature of activities. If changes are required, they should be made before registration is undertaken.

Further details will be circulated as and when they are available. In the meantime, Church entities should not rush to register. There will be ample time to do this in a proper and orderly fashion during 2007 and early 2008.

#### SUPERNUMERARY FUND

The year ended 31 January 2006 was a good one for the Fund's investment performance. The return on the overall assets for the year was 14.9%, after expenses, compared with the rate assumed by the actuary for the valuation of 6% per annum. As a result of the good investment return, the net assets of the Fund increased by \$1,466,805 to \$16,428,399. This compared with an increase in the previous year of \$46,775. A summary of the changes is as follows:

The triennial actuarial review of the Fund in 2004 revealed the poor performance of the Fund since the previous review. Following this review, the Trustee and the Board of Administration executed a guarantee that would enable the Trustee to access extra funding if, under certain conditions, the fund has insufficient assets to meet its obligations.

As a result of the very good investment performance to the year ended 31 January 2006 and the guarantee having been put in place, the Trustee has granted a discretionary benefit and pension increase of 5% with effect from 1 February 2006. This lifted the annual rate of pension from \$373.28 to \$391.94, per each complete year of contribution. The Trustee will monitor the financial position of the Fund closely and continue to grant increases if and when the Fund is in a sufficiently sound financial position.

The Trustee has been asked to address a question raised by members of the Fund who joined prior to 1996. A change in the Deed in 1996 gave all new members the right to name a nominated beneficiary other than a spouse. To not allow this same right to pre-1996 member appears unjust and the Trustee is taking advice as to how this might be remedied.

#### ARCHIVES

The general aim of improving accessibility to the Archives Collection in Christchurch, occupied much of the Archivist's time and attention for her first year.

The storage and work areas were reorganised and much of the unprocessed records were boxed, pending cataloguing and their final storage location. The purchase of three plan cabinets has meant that the collection of ca 3000 architectural plans can be stored flat, rather than rolled.

Indexes, church histories, general reference books and a complete set of the Minutes of Conference were relocated to the Boardroom where researchers can use them when they visit.

General information about the Archives Collection was posted on the Methodist Church website, along with a details of how to contact the Archives, research fees and copying charges, and the services we can offer when researchers are unable to visit in person. Mid year, we also included lists of ministers, home missionaries, deacons and deaconesses in memoriam which are published in the Minutes of Conference. The Archives Policy was posted as well.

The Archivist also spent 6 weeks compiling a shelf inventory and entering this information onto a spreadsheet. This information will be the basis of the Archives Catalogue. It also means that now the shelf location of most records in the storage area is known. Use of an Accession Register has been introduced in both Auckland and Christchurch, meaning new acquisitions are uniquely identified and numbered.

Recruitment of four additional volunteers, (bringing the total to 7 in Christchurch and four in Auckland), and changing to a project-based system of organising what the volunteers work on, has meant that their skills and specialist knowledge are directed to where they are most useful.

Forthcoming activities for the year ahead are still very much focused on documenting what we hold, and where it is located. Work on cataloguing and boxing the parish archives will continue, the development of information files on people and churches, and cataloguing of personal papers and publications. The continued paper-based documentation of the Collection will advance us towards the eventual transferral of this information onto a computer database.

Development of additional storage for the Collection is a priority, as there are insufficient shelves to hold the existing collection of Archives, notwithstanding what is still to be deposited.

The MTA enjoyed a very successful year both in terms of distributions to depositors and ongoing support from within the Church.


A full and detailed annual report has been distributed to all parishes and church organisations.



Distributions for the Year The Association provided \$5,892,110 in income distributions to the depositors for the year.




The Income Distributions are benchmarked against the 90 day bill rate and the 10 year bank rate.




#### **Capital Accretion**


The Growth and Income Fund Depositors received a capital accretion of 18.44% or \$10,211,363 for the year.




Over the last several years the Growth and Income Fund has shown steady growth with a \$1,000 deposit in 1999 growing with income and capital distributions to nearly \$2,000 in June 2006.




The overall returns of the Growth and Income Fund are benchmarked against the returns in the Melville Jessup Weaver NZ investment funds survey of nine Superannuation Funds.



The Growth and Income Fund depositors have received a good balance of income and capital growth although the level of income distributions has dropped in the last couple of years in favour of bigger capital accretion credits. The Association is reviewing the balance of income and capital credits to ensure they remain appropriate.




Investments in the Equity Fund have also nearly doubled over the first four years in line with solid New Zealand share market growth. The small size of the Fund means it cannot replicate the full spectrum of the NZSX50 index even if the Church's Guidelines for Socially Responsible Investment would allow it.



#### Investments

All of the Income Fund is invested in New Zealand domiciled fixed interest investments which are not subject to capital revaluation. The Income Funds endeavour to maintain a steady consistent return at least comparable with first ranking securities.

The Growth and Income Fund is invested in a range of New Zealand and offshore based investments to provide both excellent diversity across most investment clauses and across a wide range of individual investments so that no one investment can unduly influence the Fund's performance.



The Equity Fund is invested in 7 major New Zealand listed companies. The Equity Fund only invests in companies listed on the main New Zealand Exchange.

A full list of all Growth and Income Fund and Equity Fund share and property investments is set out at the end of the Annual Report.

#### Personnel

The Association is administered by staff employed by the Board of Administration. The Board's Executive Officer is Greg Wright and he is assisted in Christchurch by Noelene Allen, Personal Assistant Peter van Hout, Financial Services Manager Gaye Hamilton, Funds Administrator and in Auckland by Russell Sykes, Property Manager

Peter van Hout has replaced Leah Scales who resigned in June 2006 to travel overseas. In March Mrs Joan Werren resigned as Auckland Office Administrator after many years of friendly and helpful service.

The Board of the Association expresses its appreciation to all staff involved in the work of the Association.

The Association is directed by a Board of 16 representing a wide range of Financial, Investment and Management skills plus the church knowledge an ethos provided by three presbyter members.

This year sees the conclusion of Mr Vince Duffy's 17 years of service to the Board. Mr Duffy was thanked at Conference in Christchurch last year.

PACT 2086 TRUST

PACT 2086 Trust exists to manage the lessor's residual interest in the 100 year lease of the Queen Street site and to manage the investments resulting from the share of the 100 years "rental" paid by the lessee in 1986 retained by the Prince Albert College Trustees.

During the year the Board continued its programme of diversification of the investments of the Trust with a particular emphasis being investment in a wide range of international shares and internationally focussed investment trusts.

The Board considers that it had a very successful year with the value of the Trust's accumulated funds increasing by 23% during the year to 30 June 2006.

As part of its investment portfolio the Trust owns a 360 hectare pine plantation forest in the Kaweka ranges, Hawkes Bay. The trees are now 11 years old and the second five year revaluation of the forest has been carried out. This resulted in an increase in the value recorded in the books of the Trust to \$2,100,000 (+30%). The Trust is conscious that currently timber and forestry returns are depressed but notes that the Kaweka Forest is still some 15 to 18 years away from harvest and that forests have proved to be a highly cyclical investment. The Board is comfortable that the forest will at harvest provide the good returns expected of it when the farm property was purchased and the forestry block planted.

The other significant asset held in the accounts of the Trust is the lessor's residual interest in the Queen Street lease and the Trust Board notes that the first 20% of the lease term will have passed on 31 December 2006. What seemed like a "forever" investment when the lease was entered into is in fact passing with surprising alacrity.

All building development in terms of the "Q City" residential development, has been completed and the Board understands that the site is now fully developed in terms of the lessee's current expectations.

It is likely that the site will undergo at least one more redevelopment before the expiry of the lease term in 2086 and the transfer back to the Church of the then existing building improvements on the site.

Given the long term nature of the lease the Trust Board determined that it would revalue the lessor's reversionary interest on a 10 yearly cycle and it is noted that the next valuation of the lessor's interest is due in June 2007.

# **Investment Advisory Board**

The Investment Advisory Board exists to help and advise the Church on investment matters that are either submitted to it by parishes or other Church organisations or otherwise come to the attention of the Investment Advisory Board.

The Investment Advisory Board also provides property management services particularly with regard to the management of the commercial properties owned by the Pitt Street Trust and Papakura Parish. The Board has also been involved in assisting the Manukau Tongan Parish with a major re-roofing project and Methodist Mission Northern with their office re-design and fit out.

The Investment Advisory Board also has delegated authority from the Board of Administration to give Church approval for property transactions in respect of commercial property sales, purchases and long term leasing.

As part of this approvals process, the Investment Advisory Board was involved during the year in discussions with a number of Church groups who were in the early stages of reviewing significant land and property holdings.

The Investment Advisory Board maintains the church's relationship with the Council for Socially Responsible Investment in New Zealand and on a wider ecumenical front, was involved with the Methodist Trust Association in arranging and hosting the Uniting Church of Australia Investment Managers Conference held in Christchurch in May 2006. The second quarter's Board meeting for the year was held in Christchurch immediately before the commencement of the Investment Manager's Conference and this gave the opportunity for the Investment Advisory Board members to attend the Conference sessions, to meet the Australian representatives, and to discuss the considerable similarities between the Australian and New Zealand Churches aims and objectives, but also to note the quite surprising differences in the nature of the operations between both the various Australian Synods to the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

The Uniting Church Investment Managers Conference is held every two yeas and the Methodist Church of New Zealand has been fortunate in being included in the Conference since 2002.

The Board notes that December 2006 will be the final Board meeting to be attended by Mr Vince Duffy who retires at the end of the calendar year. As Mr Duffy lives in Christchurch and Conference 2005 was held in Christchurch, the opportunity was taken to formally thank Vince for his 16 years of service on the Investment Advisory Board, Methodist Trust Association and PACT 2086 Trust Boards, noting the high degree of professionalism and expert knowledge that Vince brought to Board discussions.

As a member of the Catholic Church in New Zealand Vince also brought a different denominational view to the Board's discussions.

The Board is endeavouring to find a replacement Board member able to bring a similar level of Share and general investment market expertise to Board deliberations.

# **Board of Administration Supplementary Report**

A great number of legislative changes have occurred since Conference 2005 and a number of others are either in progress or contemplated. All Parishes, Districts and Connexional Bodies are affected by these law changes to a greater or lesser extent. The Board of Administration endeavours to be well informed and advised about legislative matters and accepts the responsibility for assessing the impact of changes and the way in which Church Bodies should respond.

The following summarises the current position in relation to some of those changes and an update will be provided to Conference if necessary.

#### 1. KiwiSaver Act 2006.

"The purpose of this Act is to encourage a long-term savings habit and asset accumulation by individuals who are not in a position to enjoy standards of living in retirement similar to those in pre-retirement. The Act aims to increase individuals' well-being and financial independence, particularly in retirement, and to provide retirement benefits".

The attached leaflet (Appendix i D-17b) shows the outline of the KiwiSaver scheme which comes into effect on 1 July 2007. The Board of Administration is reviewing this scheme and will advise all Church organisations of any necessary action well before 1 July next. This legislation will have a considerable impact on the Methodist Supernumerary Fund and the Board is assessing that impact carefully, acknowledging that if any changes are required to the deed, a two-year process may need to be followed.

The KiwiSaver scheme will affect all Church organisations employing Lay or Ordained staff. Please read the leaflet carefully and wait for further advice from the Board.

#### 2. Charities Act 2005

The Regulations setting out the prescribed forms have now been passed. The Charities Commission is well into the preparations for registration which will commence on 1 February 2007. The Commission publishes a monthly "Update" and has prepared a series of guidelines and fact sheets. These are all available on the Commission's website www.charities.govt.nz and are accessible through the Methodist Church website www.methodist.org.nz.

After considerable discussion, it appears as though the most appropriate way to register Methodist Church bodies will be as follows:

- (a) Church organisations which are incorporated under specific legislation eg. the Incorporated Societies Act, the Charitable Trusts Act, or the Companies Act should each register with the Commission in their own right. Each will already have its own Constitution or set of rules which should be adequate for registration purposes.
- (b) Each District Synod should register individually with that registration covering all Parishes and other groups, committees or Methodist activities in the District. The Officers, for the purpose of registration will be the Synod Superintendent, Synod Secretary, Synod Treasurer and the Convenor of the District Property Committee (as outlined in the Law Book Sect. 4. The Law Book of the Methodist Church of New Zealand is the "Constitution".
- (c) Connexional Boards should each register separately using the Law Book and/or their specific constitutions for that purpose. If their constitution makes reference to the Law Book, it is probably that both documents will be required. The Officers will be the individuals holding positions named in those documents. The above arrangements will avoid any necessity to use the cumbersome "group" provisions in the Charities Act.

# Co-operative Ventures and/or Union Parishes will not be included in the above arrangement and will need to wait for further specific advice from UCANZ and the Partner Churches.

Annual returns should be filed eventually on the same basis – one return for each registration. This will require District Synods to accumulate the information from each Parish or other organisation that is part of their registration. At the present time the Charities Commission does not have any requirement for financial statements to be audited.

While registration can be done from 1 February 2007, the most appropriate time for Church entities to register appears to be between July and November 2007. The first annual returns will then need to be filed within 6 months of the following balance date (balance date 30.06.08 – filed before 31.12.08). Registration

before the suggested time will result in an annual return having to be filed 12 months earlier. There will be some exceptions for Church organisations which have balance dates other than 30 June. All Church organisations that are incorporated and/or have their own specific constitution or rules can prepare for registration by locating and reviewing that constitutional document. Points to watch for are:

- Do the objectives adequately support current and likely future activities?
- Are the activities charitable?
- Is there a clause preventing the organisation being used for "private pecuniary profit"?
- Do the winding up clauses require any surplus funds to be transferred to another charitable organisation?
- Does the rule allowing amendments to the constitution prevent any change that would allow noncharitable activities to be undertaken?

Preparatory work should also be carried out to ensure that none of the "officers" as defined in the Act are disqualified from holding office. The grounds for disqualification are in section 16 of the Charities Act.

If changes to a Constitution appear necessary, please be sure that the appropriate processes are followed to achieve them, and consult with the Connexional Office early in the process.

The Charities Commission has advised that it will be running a series of workshops (around 70 in number) throughout the country in February and March 2007. Attendance by representatives of Boards, Committees and Parishes at one of these workshops is strongly encouraged. The Board of Administration will be arranging for more detailed and specific workshops to be held in each District to supplement those run by the Commission.

The "Guide to the Charities Act" has been published in 6 languages by the Commission and is available either on their website or in print from their office PO Box 8072 Wellington). There will be further guidance material published shortly (also in 6 languages) to assist in preparing applications for registration.

#### Financial Reporting Act 1993

This has been under review for several years and further discussion documents are being prepared by the Ministry of Economic Development. There are a number of Methodist organisations that are subject to this Act (including the Missions that are "issuers of securities").

The next discussion document is likely to contain some auditing and financial reporting requirements for registered Charities. The Board will watch for this document and prepare guidance material in due course.

#### International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS)

These standards are currently being introduced to New Zealand, and replace the New Zealand standards that have been in place for a number of years. They will have a considerable impact on the financial reports of the "issuers of securities", investment property owners, and the larger (in financial terms) of our Connexional funds. The standards are very technical and any group concerned that they may be affected is encouraged to contact the Connexional Office for more detailed and specific advice.

#### Audited Financial Reports

It has generally been assumed that where "audited" financial reports are required, they must be "audited" by a Chartered Accountant. It has become increasingly difficult (and expensive) to have that done. The Board is now reviewing the necessity for audits of Church financial statements by Chartered Accountants and wishes to identify those situations where a full audit may not be essential, or where a practical alternative may be possible. Some changes are being sought to the Law Book to facilitate this process.

#### Changes to Taxation Provisions

The Inland Revenue Department recently published a discussion document entitled "Tax incentives for giving to charities and other non-profit organisations". This document seeks feedback and reactions to a number of potential changes to the taxation system, including:

- Raising the threshold for the rebate for donations
- Increasing the rate of the rebate
- Increasing the company deduction limit
- Increasing the Maori Authority deduction limit

- Introducing a rebate for volunteers
- Or alternatively, providing grants to organisations using volunteers

And a number of other measures.

Submissions on the proposals are invited (by 28 November). The Methodist Church is working with the Interchurch Committee on Taxation to prepare a submission. Individual Parishes and other organisations are encouraged to prepare their own submissions.

The discussion document can be accessed on the IRD website: <u>www.taxpolicy.ird.govt.nz</u>. Philanthropy New Zealand and the Federation of Voluntary Welfare Organisations are running a series of workshops throughout the country in November in conjunction with IRD.

#### **Recommendation**

- 1. That the Board be requested to complete its review of the KiwiSaver Scheme and advise all Church bodies employing staff of their obligations under the KiwiSaver Act 2006.
- 2. That the Trustee of the Methodist Supernumerary Fund be requested to review the KiwiSaver scheme and assess the potential impact on the Supernumerary Fund, with any recommendations for action or change to be submitted to March Synods.
- 3. That Section 10:1.3.1 and 10:1.3.2 of the Law Book be altered from:

10:1.3.1 The financial statements of all Connexional Funds shall be duly audited and shall be presented annually to the Conference

10:1.3.2 "All other Boards, Trusts, Parishes, Committees and Courts of the Church shall annually submit duly audited accounts, and these accounts shall be placed in the Conference Journal", and combined to read:

New 10.3.1"All Connexional Funds, Boards, Trusts, Parishes, Committees and Courts of the Church shall annually prepare and submit accounts which are to be duly audited or reviewed in a manner and to a standard determined by Conference from time to time and published in the Treasurer's Handbook. These accounts shall be placed in the Conference Journal."

#### Stipends

In March 2004 the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand set up a task group to review ministerial stipends, including the link between their seniority allowance, supervision and continuing ministry formation. The task group reported back in May 2006 and made a series of recommendations for consideration at the recent assembly. The full report can be accessed on the PCANZ website at www.presbyterian.org.nz/ga06. The report that eventually went to the Assembly is attached (numbered D10-1 to D10-15). The final resolutions of Assembly are also attached (Appendix ii D–17d).

These resolutions are relevant to the Methodist Church of New Zealand because of the long standing links between our two Churches and the movement of Presbyters in and out of Co-operative Ventures, Union Parishes and indeed Methodist and Presbyterian Parishes.

Conference 1997 resolved (p786 decision 9): "Conference authorises the Board of Administration to adjust the Methodist Stipend package, taking account of allowances, superannuation and leave entitlement, so as to bring it into line with the Anglican and Presbyterian Churches...". Since then, the Central Stipends Committee has carefully considered the appropriate relationships when recommending Stipend adjustments to the Church.

The current Presbyterian changes require careful consideration in view of the potential shift in relativities to the disadvantage of Methodist Presbyters and stationing. At the date of writing this report, we have little information about the likely response of the Anglican Church.

The Central Stipends Committee has been preparing for a survey of Presbyters that is somewhat similar in content and purpose to the major survey conducted by the Presbyterian Task Group. It is a reasonable hypothesis that the result will be similar. The Central Stipends Committee has only been able to review the major report superficially but believes that prompt action is now necessary. It is therefore proposing to implement its own survey. Survey papers will be mailed to Parishes and Presbyterian Task Group. A series of recommendations will be prepared and submitted to March Synods 2007 for subsequent consideration and resolution at Conference 2007. The recommendations will take into effect the potential impacts on Presbyters, Parishes and the Connexion.

Members of Conference are encouraged to access the full report of the Presbyterian Task Group and to give careful consideration to the decisions of the Presbyterian Assembly and the recommendations that will come forward from the Central Stipends Committee early next year.

#### Recommendations

- 1. That the Conference reaffirm the principle that it is desirable for the Methodist Church to maintain appropriate relativity with the stipends and allowances of the Anglican and Presbyterian Churches.
- 2. That the Central Stipends Committee be instructed to complete the planned survey urgently and prepare a set of recommendations for consideration at March Synods.

# METHODIST PROVIDENT SOCIETY LIMITED

### 1: APPRECIATION:

There are a number of groups and individuals, to whom appreciation must be extended, as I report on the successful winding up and closure of the Society.

First, I must acknowledge the wisdom and expertise of the late Dr Dennis Janus, who envisaged the worth of a Society, which would provide a savings vehicle to Church members, as well as generating a benefit to the wider church.

Second, the grateful thanks of the Church must go to those Board members, who over the years have guided the affairs of the Society, and enabled it to function so well over 28 years.

Third, the dedicated service of Executive staff in the Connexional office, must be acknowledged. Special thanks are extended to Ruth Le Couteur, who carried the Secretarial load over more years than anyone else.

**Fourth**, I extend grateful thanks to member of the Christchurch based "work group", and the review team, who laboured long and hard over the years, to process the applications for grant money, and to find ways of providing extra benefits to members, and to promote the Society, under the leadership of Patricia Teague and Warren Hudson.

Fifth, and perhaps most important of all, I express appreciation to those depositors, who have loyally supported the Society over the years with their deposits. In particular, mention must be made of those who favoured the Society with interest free deposits. It is probably fair to say that it was this group, more than any other, which enabled the Society to make grants to the wider church and the community over all the years of its existence.

#### 2: CLOSURE ACTIVITIES:

I am pleased to report that all depositors have been contacted, and all but five have had their deposits returned, or have donated their deposits to church funds. In some cases the executive stadff, went beyond the call of duty, to ensure that every depositor received their deposits in full. In tow cases I am aware of, the depositors were elderly and not able to conduct their business affairs without assistance. In one of these cases a pastoral visit was made to assist with completion of the transaction, and in the other case, a telephone call was made locally to notify the depositor of what action was required, to enable the deposit to be returned.

The nominated trust advances scheme has been wound up, and the remaining deposit held has been returned.

In the case of the development fund established from monies received under the will of Alice Johnstone, it was originally intended that this would be transferred to the General Purposes Trust, and administered by an on-going "work group" based in Christchurch. In the event, it was realized that the objectives of the fund, being for development purposes, could be more efficiently and logically handled by the Mission Resourcing unit of the Church, who also administer other funds for development purposes.

The Mobil Card scheme has continued to operate, under the authority of the Board of Administration, and no changes to that scheme were required.

The Southern Cross Medical Insurance scheme has likewise continued to operate, and the scope of it will be widened, to include any Church member, who wishes to participate.

#### 3: CONCLUSION:

The Society was set up at a time when interest rates and inflation were at historically high levels. In this environment, it was not difficult to offer an interest rate to depositors, which was marginally higher than that generally available to retail depositors in the market place.

However, with a return to a low interest rate environment, and with other deposit takers smartening up their act, it became more and more difficult for the Society to project itself as an attractive option for attracting the savings dollars of members.

This was exacerbated by the Society maintaining its stance as an organisation set up with the twin objectives of enabling members to help themselves, and of helping the church at the same time.

There is no doubt the when an attractive benefit was offered to members, such as the Mobil card and the Southern Cross Medical Insurance scheme, many more member were encouraged to join the Society. Unfortunately this did not have the desired flow on effect of increasing the deposit base of the Society.

There is a sense of gratitude, that over the years significant amounts were generated by way of surplus, and these were distributed to as wide a cross section of church groups and community groups as possible, by way of grant. The amount distributed over the whole time of the Society's existence approached \$250,000. There are some church activities, which would simply not have taken place, were it not for the timely availability of grant money from the Society. For that we give thanks to God, and rest content.

# ROBERT GIBSON METHODIST TRUST

#### Section A

Over the past year the Trust has worked hard to increase production and to control expenditure.

Both these have been achieved and our three farms are in top condition. It has not been easy to meet the interest payments on our mortgage of \$1.6 million.

Total production rose from 225197 kgms to 234610 kgms, but Fonterra's payout fell from \$4.59 to \$4.10 kgms.

Dairying is a cyclical business, and we must wait for the payout to increase again, which it will as the NZ\$ drops in value against the US\$. We will then be able to progressively reduce our debt, and our interest bill.

We are certain that our outlay on a larger farm two years ago will benefit us in the long term. The deficit of 2005 & 2006 and perhaps 2007 are a cost of our growth, as farm prices have continued to rise, confirming that we bought the larger farm "just in time".

Once again, our investment in Fonterra has grown. The share values increased from \$4.69 (2005) to \$5.44 each (2006). At 31 May 2006 our Fonterra Shares were valued at \$1,472,011.35.

#### Section B

Our Annual General Meeting recommended the continuation of a reasonable position for Bursaries and Grants. Even though maintaining these Bursaries and Grants has meant increasing our debt, our obligations to young people and to the Methodist Youth Ministry are written into our Trust Deed. The drop in Fonterra's payout affects our ability to maintain Tertiary Bursaries in the coming year.

We receive many letters of thanks for our Bursaries and Grants, confirming that our assistance changes lives for the better.

Last year we assisted 76 tertiary and school students with an average bursary of \$1256. In 2005 the average was \$1211 and in 2004 it was \$1197 each.

In 2006, 15 Wesley College students received an average of \$3000 each, enabling them to continue as boarders at Wesley College. For the Methodist Youth Ministry, our grant of \$25,000 each year is a large proportion of their income.

## Wesley Historical Society (NZ): Te Roopu Hitori o Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa

## **SECTION A – Information and Reporting Back**

Through 2005-06 the Wesley Historical Society (NZ), has addressed its task of recording, interpreting, and sharing the history of Methodism in Aotearoa/New Zealand and the South Pacific. Reflecting that interest and commitment, the Society's current individual and institutional membership has increased to 256. The deaths of valued members Iris Lankshear and Jack McKinney have, however, been recorded with sadness.

Newsletters have kept members up-to-date with the Society's work. Because of a change of editors, *Journal 2005* was published early in 2006, and included two papers that had been presented at our South Pacific Conference in January 2005. We are very appreciative of Associate Professor Peter Lineham's editing the material presented at that conference, which will be published as a *Proceeding* of the Society; the insights offered continue to have immediate relevance for the Methodist Church in Aotearoa/New Zealand, as well as for the other participating Churches.

Rev. Donald Phillipps has now completed his detailed research in compiling a database (including dates of births and deaths) of those 2,500 people mentioned in Morley's definitive work *The History of Methodism in New Zealand*, many of whom are not listed in the index. This significant reference work that will provide an invaluable research tool for Methodist scholars, historians, and genealogists, is currently being published in both hard copy and CD format. Our appreciation to Honoured Member Donald for this amazing achievement.

We are pleased to report that the papers of the late Rev Selwyn Dawson will be lodged at the Alexander Turnbull Library, Wellington, where they will be available for future researchers. Mrs Enid Dawson has generously donated this significant and comprehensive archive to be held within the National Library of New Zealand.

In November, the Society held its 2005 Annual General Meeting and dinner at the Conference Venue, Hagley Park, Christchurch. Following the business session, an excellent attendance of members enjoyed meeting over a meal, and providing the audience for a lively panel discussion; this was chaired by Eric Laurenson, with Rev. Donald Phillipps, Rev. Dr Jim Stuart, and Rev. Michael Greer discussing issues of property in the life of New Zealand Methodism.

With appreciation, and in recognition of his significant contribution to its work, Rev. Dr Allan Davidson was elected an Honoured Member of the Society.

It was with regret that the Annual Meeting accepted the resignation of Rev. Phil Taylor as Treasurer. Phil held this position for eleven years and brought his strong faith and his interest in Methodist history, particularly that of mission in the South Pacific, to the role. Rev. Dr John Salmon, incoming President of the Methodist Church, paid tribute to way Phil guided the Society's finances, meeting the challenges that were involved with good humour and reliability. The Society unanimously conveyed to Phil and Rev. Barbara Miller the warmest congratulations of members and best wishes on their forthcoming marriage.

- We congratulate our new Editor, Rev. Dr. Terry Wall on being awarded a Doctorate in Ministry Studies from the Melbourne College of Divinity.
- Mrs Ruth Blundell has been appointed as Treasurer, and the Society appreciates the experience she brings from other areas of financial management.
- We are also very pleased to welcome Mrs Shona Michie to the Executive; she has been appointed Minutes Secretary.
- The Society also acknowledges with appreciation the Rev. Stanley Barnes, whose ongoing interest in and work with the Methodist Philatelic Society has continued to contribute to the Society's funds.
- The President continues to be a member of the Anglican Historical Society, supporting the work of this society in Auckland.

Thanks are expressed to the members of the Executive, the Publications Committee under Convenor Rev. Dr Susan Thompson, Secretary Rev. Barry Neal, Treasurer Ruth Blundell, Editor Rev. Dr Terry Wall, Membership Secretary Rev. Graeme White, Minutes Secretary Shona Michie, Honoured Members, and to all those who have faithfully and enthusiastically supported the Society's work during this year.

## SECTION B – Strategic Planning

We have had applications on a variety of forms over the last couple of years! The Application Form is also on the Methodist website.

## New Address and Closing Dates for applications

The Committee is now using the Connexional Office as the clearing house for applications, and deadlines are tightly adhered to. The closing dates for applications are with the Connexional Office on: February 15<sup>th</sup>

May 15<sup>th</sup> August 15<sup>th</sup>

November 15th

The process then involves circulating the applications among the members of the Committee for consideration and further investigation as required. We have appreciated those who have given notice well ahead of time of intention to apply as this does allow for budgeting of limited resources. A note to the Committee saying that there is even a probability of an application for a course or conference a year or two out helps in establishing priorities and considered use of funds available.

Report to Conference 2006

## **Strategic Directions**

## The work of the Board

The Board welcomed five new staff at the beginning of the year, the Director Ministry Development, Director Pasifika Ministries, Director Pakeha Ministries, Student Field Project Supervisor for Trinity Methodist Theological College's Ministry Training Unit and Business Manager. The Board also appointed Reverend Nigel Hanscamp as the Tauiwi Executive Officer for 2006. With the appointment of five new staff, time has been taken to develop working relationships and gain a better understanding of the nature of the Board's work and identifying priorities for the future.

The major tasks for the year (as highlighted in the report to Conference 2005) were to look at strategic directions for both Mission Resourcing and Ministry Education. As we embarked on this work we also identified a number of financial issues which the Board continues to grapple with as highlighted below. The Board has been deliberate in not submitting to the Connexion a major report on strategic directions prior to Conference as it has needed to have as much time as possible over the year to analyse and consider the issues and implications. We present the strategic directions to conference as a work in progress and anticipate a major report coming to Conference through the Synods in 2007.

## STRATEGIC PLANNING -

The Board in November 2005 identified the need for work to be done on strategic planning. Two significant pieces of work were completed on strategic directions. Our consideration of issues has been within the framework of the vision of the Board of Ministry (as stated in the law book) to assist the Church towards hopeful futures, focusing on the question of where do we want to be in 2025? This has required thinking about our core objectives and principles, current trends and context, partnerships and other linkages and finances.

Baseline principles (previously noted by Conference) for our strategic direction are

- Acknowledging wide resourcing responsibilities
- An inclusive approach to lay and ordained training;
- A holistic model of theological education keeping together academic training, ministry formation and spiritual formation;
- Clear parish/community focus, and a clear selected individual training focus creating a holistic interface between ministry and mission;
- Resourcing for both Methodist and Co-operating Venture parishes in terms of mission and ministry
- Building accountability to the people of Te Haahi;
- A more cost effective structure.

These baseline principles need to sit alongside the response from the Hui on Theology of Ministry:

- Values and adherent possibilities to be found deep within the richness and varied Methodist diversity. Collectively we affirmed that we have both the human and financial resources to enhance our mission in multiple areas.
- The need to find creative ways to theologically and spiritually resource people in a variety of ministry situations and differing cultural and cross cultural situations.
- Clarifying urgently questions concerning leadership; providing training and resourcing of leadership that can best assist with the ongoing task of strengthening Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa as a spiritual home and place especially for future generations of New Zealand Pacific and other migrant peoples who hold dual citizenship within both contexts of the Pacific and Aotearoa New Zealand.

We have considered our current context and the effects of trends within the Methodist Church of New Zealand. Over the past 15 years Methodist membership in palagi parishes has declined by 56% and since 2000 by 19.5%.

However worship attendance has declined at a much slower rate over the same period with a small increase since 2003. Unfortunately we do not have statistics to track the change over the same period of time for Fijian, Samoan and Tongan parishes and it is essential for the larger picture of Te Haahi Weteriana o

Actearoa that access is gained to the larger statistical picture and the associated variable trends.

While the trends are not surprising they do have implications for both ministry education and mission resourcing. The numbers of Methodist ordination students have declined over the last fifteen years but with larger variances. There has also been a significant shift in the ethnic diversity of students which corresponds with what is happening in parishes, the age of students has also declined slightly.

Given these changes it would seem reasonable that the Church is able to expect on average, 20 years of presbyterial leadership from our ministry students. However it is interesting to note that of the 76 presbyterial ministry students we have trained over the last 15 years, 13% are currently still engaged at College, 5% are probationers and only 37% (28)are engaged in full time ministry, 33% (25) have either superannuated, resigned or did not finish training. Of those who resigned all did so within 5 to 10 years of ministry. This is backed up by research which notes crucial periods of 5-10 years then 15 to 20 years<sup>1</sup>.

When looking at these figures we need to look also at the cost of training and the value gained in terms of leadership per years of service. The current cost of training per student per year is \$42,963. Of all those who are no longer in ministry the cost of training per year of ministry varies between \$25,777 per year for 5 years to \$12,889 per year for 10 years of service. This clearly shows the high cost of not being able to provide adequate support and mentoring to people in their first years of ministry, as well as the need for care at the point of candidacy, for training options that not only respond to the diversity and educational needs but with a clear view to the value gained.

There has also been a significant shift over the past fifteen years in the profile of leadership required by the Church. What we are hearing from parishes is the need for students who are enablers, facilitators of leadership potential within the parish and wider regional groupings of some form or another. Leaders who have the capacity to value who they are, but at the same time expand and deepen the Parishes' understanding of growing and mentoring lay people. The desire is that presbyters will be able to discern the signs of the times at critical depth and engage with being local and connexional church in creative ways while holding together the diversity within church and society. It is therefore important that ministry education and mission resourcing programmes foster and nurture the development of these skills.

There is a direct parallel to the core questions being raised, particularly in terms of ministry education with overseas trends. The most recent research reports on theological and ministerial education highlight the complexity of seeking to hold together with integrity the need for in depth theological education and quality intentional ministry formation. It is in the holding of these two core aspects together whether that be in one overarching programme or parallel programmes from a key institution or network of institutions that the craft of ministry leadership is developed.<sup>2</sup>

Given the baseline principles and response from the Hui and the context and trends, the Board has identified four key strategic pathways to achieve its purpose of educating and resourcing the Methodist Church of New Zealand for integrated mission and ministry as being to:

- 1. Develop and provide quality education and resourcing.
  - The goals will be:
  - Relevant Ministry and Theological education programmes responsive to the current and future needs of the Connexion and New Zealand society.
  - Provision of a wide range of high quality resources to the Methodist Church for Mission and Ministry.
  - Local Shared Ministry as a relevant form of ministry responsive to the current and future needs of the Connexion and New Zealand society.
- 2. Develop quality leadership
  - The goal is:
  - Leaders in ministry who can assist communities towards hopeful futures.
- 3. Engage in constructive partnerships The goal will be:

- Authentic partnerships which enhance the goals and work of the Methodist Church
- 4. Build capacity in the Board, Parishes and Synods The goals will be:
  - Responsible stewardship of people, finances and property to resource the needs of Parishes and the Connexion in contemporary New Zealand Society
  - Strong, professional and integrated organisation, across all areas of the Board's work
  - A competent and confident workforce.

This sets some framework for the Board as we continue to grapple with questions of major strategy. We continue with this work and will be presenting a supplementary report to Conference.

## Information and Reporting Back

## **BOARD OF MINISTRY**

During the year the Board said farewell to Rev Dr Trevor Hoggard as he left New Zealand to take up his new position with the Methodist Conference in Rome. The Board acknowledges the contribution that Trevor has made to its work over the last eighteen months.

## Local Shared Ministry

The Workgroup of the Board of Ministry has continued to work during the year on the shape of Local Shared Ministry as one of the models of providing parish ministry alongside that of a presbyter and is currently processing the range of responses that have come from individuals, parishes and synod throughout the connexion. A supplementary report will be presented at Conference.


#### Finance:

One of the major strategic issues under consideration is future financial sustainability for the work of the Board. The last financial year has seen a deficit of \$39,787 for Ministry Education and \$62,017 for Mission Resourcing. While these deficits were predicted, clearly the Board cannot sustain these.

In tracking the financial picture of the Board of Ministry it is clear that the level of financial support from the Connexion has decreased dramatically over the last fifteen years. Since 1992 the Board of Ministry has been asked to increase its work and has effectively taken on the responsibility of the then Education Division, Response and continues to have the Development Division, and Trinity Theological College. Staffing has decreased even with the establishment of two new positions, as positions such as Director Education, Fieldworker in Ministry, Director Response, and Academic Registrar have all been disestablished. These functions have been incorporated into the workloads of current staff in both Mission Resourcing and Ministry Education.

In 1992 the contribution from the Connexional budget for Education Division, Response, Development Division and Trinity College was a total of \$423,940. Now in 2006 the contribution for this work has declined to \$330,000.

The pie charts below show the income sources for both Mission Resourcing and Ministry Education.



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This year the Board has, for the first time, included in its budget fundraising in order to try and live within its means. The Connexion has, over the last few years, encouraged the Board to use its investments. Having done this, we now need other sources of income. While further exploration to achieve sustainable budgets is required, some immediate action has occurred including the disestablishment of the Mission Resourcing Secretary position.

The Board has tried very hard to keep the level of its expenditure as low as possible. For example, since 1999 Ministry Education has had an increase in direct student costs relating to allowances and housing from \$107,584 to \$189,504 in 2006 (76.15% increase). However this should be put alongside an 1.32% increase in the cost of administration over the same period. The other significant increase in expenditure has been for staffing.

We appreciate the effect of the first of the PAC endowments which has been an important source of income for Mission Resourcing and enabled the appointment of the Director Pasifika Ministries. It is important that this endowment is able to be sustained and grown over the long term. We also acknowledge and thank the Tidd Foundation for their continued financial support for student book allowances and housing, along with Auckland Central Parish for their continued financial support of the Ministry Training Unit.

## MINISTRY EDUCATION

## People to Honour:

We remember with gratitude the Rev Enid Bennett, a recently appointed Fellow of Trinity College, who died in February of this year. Enid was a committed teacher, a wise mentor, a courageous theologian and a gracious pastor. She will be greatly missed in the Methodist and wider ecumenical family.

## **Educational Programmes:**

TRINITY COLLEGE -

2006 has been a year of review and looking ahead for Trinity College. There have been four students in the Probationary programme and eleven full time Methodist ordination students in training. There have also been three independent students at Trinity Ministry Training Unit. Three students complete their studies this year and are being stationed for itinerant presbyteral ministry. They are:

- Anne Griffiths
- Tevita Taufalele
- Philomeno Kinera

We also note that Sandra Gibbons will be ordained.

Three candidates for presbyterial ministry were accepted at the candidates' assessment weekend in September. They are:

- Hiueni Nuku
- Foepapa Muliaina
- Kathleen Dixon

Along with these candidates Trinity College is sponsoring a student from Davuilevu Methodist Theological College in Fiji, Rev Savenaca Vuetanavanua. This student will be engaging in post graduate study at the School of Theology as part of his preparation to return to Davuilevu College to teach in the area of Theology. This request has come in order that supervision for his studies can be given by Reverend Doctor Sevati Tuwere.

## SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY - UNIVERSITY OF AUCKLAND -

This year has seen the beginnings of the new curriculum for degree programmes. The number of younger students engaging in theology papers either as part of conjoint study programmes or as a subject of interest continues to increase. This trend highlights again the importance of Trinity College on behalf of the wider connexion being involved in the teaching of theology within the wider context of Auckland University.

The review of the Memorandum of Agreement between the University of Auckland and the constituent Church Colleges has been completed and should be signed off by the respective heads of Churches and University by the end of the year. The major change to the memorandum relates to the appointment of

staff. Under the previous memorandum all appointments were made by Church Colleges. In order to allow for a greater flexibility, continuity of staff, and to ensure there is adequate and sustained coverage of curriculum and research development for the school, there is provision now for appointments to be made by the University as well as Church Colleges.

The Board at its meeting of 15 March 2006 reaffirmed its commitment to maintain an active presence and involvement with the University of Auckland. This ensures that the wider Methodist Church is involved in some part in the formation of public thought and policy for the wellbeing of New Zealand Society.

The Board again pays tribute to the significant gifts of leadership and scholarship that Professor Elaine Wainwright offers as Head of School of Theology.

## MINISTRY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME -

Due to the establishment of this particular programme during 2006, we report in full on the variety of activities that have been undertaken by Rev Dr David Bell.

#### Lead Worship -

This has now been completed. The entire course has been produced in hard-copy and PDF format and been distributed to Synods. Brochures have been prepared and circulated, and briefs sent to Touchstone, e-messenger, e-fish and New Zealand Lay Preachers Association magazine. The PDFs are available on the Trinity College websites (www.trinitycollege.ac.nz)

Initial uptake so far seems to have been very positive. We are aware for example that in Wellington three separate semester 1 courses involving upwards of 35 people have been held. David Bell has also introduced Lead Worship to the Manawatu region and Taranaki-Wanganui Synod, Auckland Synod and Otago-Southland during the year.

#### Methodist Studies -

A number of people have contributed to this and it is taking shape. It will provide the foundation for a multiplicity of learning outcomes for the whole Church, lay and ordained. Methodist studies have been rather neglected in recent years and there has been some loss of momentum because of this. The full programme will be an EIDTS course (Ecumenical Institute for Distance Theological Studies), but the first unit will be made generally available for study in parishes. It is hoped that a companion DVD will be ready by Conference 2006.

A brief introduction to the course was given to the August meeting of Tauiwi Strategy. Most Synods have agreed to combine in various ways to launch the programme for interested laity early in 2007.

Aims and objectives - To introduce, define, analyse, record and creatively present the elements of the history, theology, and evolution of the Methodist Church as a contemporary global institution with particular reference to its origins in England and development in Aotearoa New Zealand and the South Pacific.

## Content outline

Unit 1: John and Charles Wesley.

Unit 2: John Wesley's Sermons: the heart of Methodist theology.

- Unit 3: Wesley and the Age of Enlightenment.
- Unit 4: Movement to church: Methodist structures, worship.
- Unit 5: Maori and missionaries.
- Unit 6: Overview of the Methodist settler church of the 19<sup>th</sup> century.
- Unit 7: New Zealand Methodism in the 20<sup>th</sup> century.
- Unit 8: The contemporary Methodist Church

#### Life-long learning for clergy –

On-going education is a requirement in all professions. While many clergy work at developing themselves personally and professionally, the Methodist Church hasn't yet put into place a sound framework. Some District Synods have appointed study leave supervisors who ask clergy how they are using study leave, and some clergy indicate ahead to the Travel and Study Committee about seeking funding for training events or substantial degree programmes. However, it is largely self-directed and sometimes there is not much recognition by the Church for study achieved. There's little mentoring, oversight, and accountability.

In future we believe that a fundamental requirement for presbyters to remain in Full Connexion will be to complete one Ecumenical Institute of Distance Theological Studies (EIDTS) paper (or its equivalent) every two years. John Wesley expected a lot more than this from his lay preachers. So why are we doing less, expecting less? EIDTS, which is based in Christchurch, provides the LTh. EIDTS staff include a

considerable number of Methodist tutors (currently 8 lay and clergy). This year over 120 people throughout New Zealand are doing EIDTS papers. They come from Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist, Roman Catholic, etc, backgrounds. Trinity College will work through EIDTS to help make life-long learning an achievable goal for Methodist laity and clergy.

In order to ensure the development of a sound framework for professional development of clergy, and to develop mentoring and oversight accountability, the Board asks Synods to consider appointing the Director of Ministry Development as their Study Leave Supervisor.

## Availability to the Connexion -

David Bell's prime areas of responsibility are to the South Island and lower North Island. He has moved extensively around this area during the year, and as part of his travels he has preached or led worship at: Wesley, Wellington, HCUC, Karori Uniting, Trinity Newtown, Ngaio Union, Opunake, Palmerston North, Fielding, Ashhurst-Bunnythorpe, Invercargill, Mornington, Shirley, Alexandra Union, and Greymouth Uniting Parish.

## Signs and Wonders -

The second edition was available for August Synod and no. 3 will be ready for Conference, along with *Theology Now!* a short study series looking at Biblical paradox.

## MISSION RESOURCING

## New Directors and the office

The major tasks of Mission Resourcing for 2006 has been 'settling in' the new Directors, developing the working relationships with the team including the Board's Business Manager, re-gathering the various pieces of Mission Resourcing's work which had been contracted out for the past two years, and setting priorities for the future.

We acknowledge and thank Lesley Utting for assisting the new Directors to become acquainted with the Mission Resourcing systems, and Jan Tasker for the work she put in to settling the new staff. The financial situation of Mission Resourcing has needed some attention, and this is outlined in other places in the Board's report.

#### Grants

Mission Resourcing continues to administer several grant funds for assistance to parishes. We have given several grants in 2006 for assistance to supply Ministers while Presbyters are on long Study leave or Long leave. However due to depletion of grants funding, Ministry Development Grant funds have had to be put on hold until mid 2007 while capital is rebuilt in these funds to a sufficient level to enable adequate grants to be provided.

## Candidating

One of the major tasks for the year has been to understand the Candidating processes and implement Board policies around it. The first part of this task was the formulation of a Job Description for Convenor. The Board appointed Chris Elphick as Convenor of the National Candidates Assessment Weekend for 2006. Chris has a background in business and non-profit development and systems development, and is a skilled and experienced facilitator. Conversation with the Convenor has been of value as we continue to look at the shape of future candidating processes. This work will be on-going over 2007.

Three candidates were assessed for Presbyteral ministry this year, and their names are brought to Conference in another part of this report. The Candidates team for 2007 will be: Chris Elphick (Convener), Bruce Anderson (Chaplain), Viv Whimster, Sui Te'o, Paula Taumoepeau, Janet Marsh and 2 others to be appointed.

Suggested Law Book changes regarding candidating are included as an appendix, and bring the Law Book into line with current practice with the church.

#### **Ordinands' Assessment**

The Board records its thanks to Rev Desmond Cooper who completes six years as Ordinand Assessment Convenor. This year there was only one Ordinand to be considered, and the assessment team comprised Desmond Cooper and Marion Peterson.

The Board has approved a Job Description for the Ordinands' Assessment Convener, and the Directors are currently working to find a suitable person.

#### UCANZ

This year Methodist representatives to Uniting Churches Aotearoa New Zealand (UCANZ) Standing Committee have been Tony Bell and Lynne Frith. Nigel Hanscamp replaces Lynne on this committee from 2007. Significant work continues on a number of issues arising from the life and work of Co-operating Ventures.

#### Overseas ministry

For several years Council of Conference, the Board of Ministry, the Director of Mission Resourcing and the Tumuaki Te Taha Maori have been working to identify policies and procedures regarding ordained presbyters wanting to come and work in the Methodist Church of New Zealand. This year the Directors and the Tumuaki presented a draft proposal to Council of Conference and the Board of Ministry. After discussion and several changes, it was accepted and approved by the President for interim use until Conference 2006. Since then the procedures have been implemented, and applications have begun to be processed. It is suggested that these procedures be used for 2007, while discussion continues at Council of Conference, Synods and Hui Poari to enable a final report to be brought to Conference 2007. [See appendix II]

#### Korean Ministries

In July Nigel visited Korea as part of the World Methodist Conference. Part of this was to assist in better understanding the work of developing Korean ministries in Aotearoa New Zealand. Several key conversations were held and relationships established. The Seoul South Annual Conference (SSAC), who has official oversight for Korean Methodist ministry in New Zealand, is keen to develop relationships with the Methodist Church of New Zealand. Discussions continue with Synods, Tauiwi Strategy and Te Taha Maori about the future shape of this relationship and the possible future shape of Korean Ministry in New Zealand.

#### **Resourcing Pasifika Ministries**

The appointment of the Director of Pasifika Ministries, Reverend Aso Samoa Saleupolu, has now made it possible for a particular focus on the needs of the Wasewase ko Viti kei Rotuma e niu Siladi, Vahefonua Tonga, and Sinoti Samoa. Aso has worked consistently during the year to foster effective communication and closer relationships with Pasifika Ministries.

The immediate needs as identified include resourcing of lay and ordained leadership, assisting with Synod and Parish ministry and mission strategies, fostering a sound working knowledge of the Church, and working through some the Church's ministry policies and processes. The diversity of languages, cultures, traditions and world views means that Mission Resourcing would require patient and cultural sensitivity in addressing the needs of the Pasifika Ministries.

While the work done for Vahefonua Tonga and Sinoti Samoa so far for this year centers around the consolidating, maintaining and nurturing of growth areas of ministries, careful consideration is being given to the particular need of the ministry of Wasewase ko Viti kei Rotuma niu Siladi.

#### Orientation

Mission Resourcing is charged by the church to run an annual orientation programme for those coming to work in the Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa from outside our church. This event is also for new Synod Superintendents and Connexional Appointees. This year's orientation was held at the Friary at Hillsborough (Auckland) with 15 participants and 5 contributors. Just under half of those participating at this event were from Fiji, Samoa and Tonga. Acknowledging that six Synod Superintendents have been inducted during this Connexional year, a separate Synod Superintendent orientation was run prior to August Tauiwi Strategy meeting. It is expected that next year's orientation will be held in March.

#### Leadership Development

Questions are emerging around the Connexion about the development of current and future leadership for the church. It is felt that a sustained conversation around these questions is needed to assist the church to develop a clear understanding and practice on developing leadership. Within this conversation Mission Resourcing hopes to embark on a project to develop and mentor leadership in our church. This project is still being formed and we will be looking to the wider church for input into this project.

#### Tauiwi Youth Ministry

#### WCC GENERAL ASSEMBLY -

In February of this year TeRito Peyroux attended the World Council of Churches 9<sup>th</sup> General Assembly, in Porto Alegre, Brazil as a youth steward. Her experience there was indeed an overwhelming one, which continues to influence her own personal perspectives, as well as her thoughts and work as Facilitator for Tauiwi Youth Ministry. Since her return from the General Assembly, she has had the pleasure of visiting a range of groups, congregations, classes, and committees around the Connexion to share parts of her

experience and reflections, and still continues to do so. These visits have been a good opportunity to share such a memorable ecumenical experience, and have also been a great opportunity to talk about young people, Youth Ministry and their places in the church today.

#### CHURCHES YOUTH MINISTRY ASSOCIATION (CYMA) -

This year CYMA has continued to provide practical and contextual resources for youth ministry, having launched their latest resource pack entitled *"Culture: Yeah Right"*. CYMA is currently made up of the Anglican, Presbyterian and Methodist churches of New Zealand and its Annual General Meeting in May of this year saw TeRito Peyroux elected as convenor of this association.

#### METHODIST YOUTH CONFERENCE 2008 -

Given the overwhelming success of last year's '*MYC05: What is the Spirit Saying to the church?*' planning is already underway for '*MYC08: Where is God for young people?*' This will be held from Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> through to Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> January 2008, at Lincoln University, Christchurch.

In addition to bringing together young people (as well as the 'young at heart') from all around the Connexion for an opportunity of sharing, learning and fun, 'MYC08' will be particularly focussed on nurturing and enlightening leadership in Youth Ministry through a range of creative, practical and relevant ways.

#### TAUIWI YOUTH TOGETHER IN AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND (TYTANZ) -

Regardless of a few amendments to its membership, the TYTANZ group remains positive in supporting initiatives for young people from around the Connexion, and will be supporting the planning and implementation of 'MYC08'. The TYTANZ group also aim to use 'MYC08' as an opportunity to launch the relevant resources and initiatives that they continue to work on.

#### TAUIWI YOUTH MINISTRY AND THE FUTURE

The appointments of the Directors of Pakeha and Pasifika Ministries in Mission Resourcing, as well as the appointment of the Business Manager for the Board of Ministry have all had a significant impact on Tauiwi Youth Ministry. This is particularly with regard to assisting through sustained and deliberate planning (both short and longer-term), oversight and support. Tauiwi Youth Ministry remains hopeful about continuing as a nurtured and valued part of the church.

#### Appendix I

#### Law book Changes

#### Law Book Section 2 – Candidates (3.1 – 3.14)

Note: Suggested changes are underlined

- 1. That references to "District Recruitment Convener" be replaced with the words "<u>Synod Candidates</u> <u>Convener</u>"
- 2. That the following be added to the end of 3.1: "Candidating shall be for ministry in a specified language setting."
- 3. That the word "selection" replaces "nomination" in 3.6
- 4. That 3.6 (e) read "a process of Appeal against the recommendation of the National Assessment Event, the appeal to be solely on the grounds of <u>abuse and/or</u> incorrect use of candidating procedures."
- 5. That 3.7 (f) read "competency in English, in the language in which they will minister and, if necessary, in Te Reo."
- 6. That a new 3.10 be introduced: <u>"The Synod shall appoint a Synod Candidates Convener who shall provide guidance to candidates and to the Synod about the Candidating processes, and shall make a recommendation to the Synod regarding the candidate.</u>"
- 7. That the renumbered 3.11 read "The Synod Candidates Convener shall see that the requirements of the Board of Ministry with respect to Candidates have been fulfilled. The Synod Candidates Convener

shall confirm to the Board of Ministry that the Candidate has met the requirements laid down in 2.3.5-8 above and that the Ministerial Synod has agreed to the Candidate continuing their candidature.

8. That the first sentence of 3.13 be amended to read "The Board of Ministry will receive all reports concerning Candidates, including those of the Candidates Assessment Team, and may request a personal interview."

#### Appendix II

#### Proposed Policy for Presbyters from overseas applying to serve/minister in the Methodist Church of New Zealand

#### Preamble and Context:

Our Church's mission in Aotearoa / New Zealand is to reflect and proclaim the transforming love of God as revealed in Jesus Christ and declared in the scriptures. We are empowered by the Holy Spirit to serve God in the world. The Treaty of Waitangi is the covenant establishing our nation on the basis of a power-sharing partnership and will guide how we undertake mission.

- Mission Statement of the MCNZ

The Methodist Church of New Zealand has a unique ethos in its bicultural partnership. It recognises the place of Tangata Whenua (Maori) in our history and in our church. Within this ethos we also recognise the need for care in issues of immigration. The ministry of the Methodist Church of New Zealand also takes place within a multicultural and ecumenical setting.

Council of Conference and the Board of Ministry were charged with developing a new policy for dealing with applications from ordained ministers wanting to come from overseas to minister in our church.

The purpose of this policy is to reflect our context and ethos, and to establish clear guidelines for membership, accountability and applications for those coming from overseas to minister in our church.

This policy replaces previous Conference decisions about ministers coming from overseas. It also applies to ministers coming to New Zealand under Conference to Conference requests (also known as 'Seconded Ministries').

#### Policy

# This policy covers all ordained ministers from overseas who seek to minister/serve in the Methodist Church of New Zealand:

- New Zealand trained Methodist Students and Presbyters seeking a stationing appointment will be stationed before overseas Ministers.
- The Methodist Church of New Zealand / Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa will consider applications for ministry from qualified and skilled ordained ministers from overseas who are in good standing with their home church, and looks for those who have a passion to serve in our church.
- Ministers applying to come from overseas will need to be able to demonstrate an ability to work within the Bi-cultural partnership and the ecumenical and multi-cultural nature of the Methodist Church of New Zealand They will also need to be prepared to act responsibly in terms of the laws and regulations of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.
- All current Immigration New Zealand (New Zealand Government) procedures for immigration, work permits and residency must be complied with.
- Any presbyter considering residency as part of the application should state this in the application. The Church will not allow itself to be used as a 'back door' for gaining residency in New Zealand.

- Applicants must be proficient in the use of English language, both written and verbal, and where English is not their first language must pass the current approved New Zealand English Language Test (IELTS 6.5) as required by Immigration New Zealand.<sup>3</sup>
- Successful applicants from overseas are initially received into a supply ministry, normally lasting 2 years.

#### Process

- Consultation and dialogue between the Tumuaki and the Tauiwi Executive Officer, representing the Treaty Partners, will commence at the first point of a minister expressing interest in the application process, and will continue throughout the process for that person.
- A 'Partnership Team' (comprising of 2 from Tauiwi and 2 from Te Taha Maori) will process all applications and could be involved in interviews.
- The Team will meet on a regular basis to check and monitor processes or changes concerning any applicant.
- Applicants are required to be familiar with, and understand, the Information Pack provided by Mission Resourcing prior to making application. Applicants must be able to demonstrate an awareness of what is involved in ministry in our Church, and an ability to work within the unique nature of the Methodist Church of New Zealand. The Information Pack is prepared in consultation with Te Taha Maori, and includes material about Methodist Church of New Zealand structures, polity, policies and current understandings of our Ethos.
- The applicant's Church will be asked to provide a letter concerning the 'status' of the applicant within their Church. This should include confirmation that the applicant has not had a complaint upheld against them or is currently under investigation for any behaviour that could bring the ministry or the church in disrepute.
- Within the application the applicant will give permission for a 'Police Report' to be obtained from their home country.
- Part of the application process will include a full psychological and physical health check by appropriate certified health professionals in the applicant's country of residence.
- At some stage in the process of application it may be suitable / appropriate to have a face to face or telephone interview. The purpose of this interview would be to determine a person's appropriateness to minister in the Methodist church of New Zealand. It would not cover matters regarding any particular supply appointment. The interview would be conducted by some members of the 'Partnership team'.
- Upon receiving a recommendation / report from the Partnership team, a final decision regarding the
  application will be made by the Tumuaki and Tauiwi Executive Officer.
- Supply arrangements for successful applicants will follow the usual Tauiwi processes.
- All successful applicants are expected to be received into Full Connexion. Applications will be
  processed by the Board of Ministry and Council of Conference: Council of Conference will determine
  whether processes have been accurately followed, and the Board of Ministry will make
  recommendations to Conference regarding Full Connexion. All ordained applicants are brought into
  Full Connexion if stationed in the Methodist Church of New Zealand in order to enable the
  conference to apply the Methodist Church of New Zealand accountability and discipline processes
  as outlined in the Law Book.
- Successful applicants must engage in an 'Orientation Programme' each year of their initial supply (this will normally be two years). The Orientation Programme will be organised by Mission Resourcing.
- The 'Orientation Programme' will include the learning and understanding of the following:
  - Methodist Church of New Zealand structures.
  - The Bicultural Journey of the Methodist Church of New Zealand, including our understanding of the Treaty of Waitangi, Tikanga, Tino Rangatiratanga and knowledge and understanding of Te Taha Maori.

- Requirements of the Laws and Regulations and the Ethical Standards for Ministry, disciplinary processes.
- o Matters relating to partnership, Consensus Decision Making, power sharing and inclusiveness.
- Resources available within the church.
- Near the end of the first year of supply, the 'Partnership team' may recommend that the applicant complete either of the EIDTS courses 'Christianity in Aotearoa New Zealand' or 'Methodism' instead of the second Orientation Programme.
- It is a requirement of ministry in our church that all Presbyters and supply ministers attend Parish and Synod meetings and Conference. During their supply ministry applicants shall also attend at least one Hui Poari.
- These requirements are to be included in each Covenant that is signed by the applicant, the parish, the Synod and the Tauiwi Executive Officer.
- When stationing a presbyter to a parish the Connexion looks for the best match possible and may
  chose not to station a presbyter or fill a parish appointment if no match can be found. The
  Methodist Church of New Zealand does not guarantee subsequent appointments for presbyters after
  their first / current appointment. In the New Zealand context supply ministries are for one year only,
  with an extension in exceptional circumstances to 2 years. No extension is granted beyond 2 years.

#### Monitoring the Process

- The 'Partnership Team' will monitor the steps to see the process has been followed.
- The initial term of appointment (usually two years as a supply ministry) will be a 'Covenanted Ministry' which sets out the requirements of the Methodist church of New Zealand in the 'Laws and Regulations' and in the 'Ethical standards for Ministry'.
- A ministry covenant will be completed and signed as the supply ministry begins. Completion of covenants is the responsibility of the Synod Superintendent. Covenants will be approved by the 'Partnership team', and will be signed off by the Mission Resourcing Director.
- There will be a full review of the 'supply ministry' during the second year which will be arranged by the Tauiwi Executive Officer and Synod Superintendent.

#### DIACONATE TASK GROUP REPORT TO CONFERENCE 2006

The Task Group looks forward with excitement to Conference. It will be good for a number of Deacons to be together for their reception into Full Connexion. This journey has been a long time in coming for the Deacons.

We believe that we are holding a treasure belonging to the Church, the Diaconate. As we each grow older and hopefully wiser we continue to declare to the Church that Diaconal ministry is important to the big picture of the emerging church, along with the liberation of the laity. Diaconal ministry may not be the shape that it has been in the past, and it may continue to challenge the edges of the church and maybe even the core of the church.

Internationally Deacons, Deaconesses and Diaconal Ministers challenge lay people and clergy to become community builders. # Report of the Standing Committee of the Uniting Congregations of Aotearoa New Zealand to the 2006 Methodist Conference

The Standing Committee of Partner representatives and elected Cooperating Ventures congregation's representatives has continued to meet three times a year. The 2005 Biennial Forum of Uniting Congregations was held in Dunedin. The Theme of the Forum was 'Braided Rivers' with Rev Dr Kevin Ward as the guest speaker. Partner church leaders shared their thoughts with the Forum on the future of ecumenical cooperation. The Forum elected the Cooperative Venture representatives to the Standing Committee and Rev. Dave Mullan of Bay of Islands was elected as Chairperson.

Discussion groups at the 2003 Biennial Karori Forum asked for more work to be done on the suggestions detailed, at that time, on Ministry Appointments. At the July 2005 Partner/ Committee Consultations, recommendations were made on the revision of Ministry Appointment and Settlement procedures. Following the endorsement of the new principles by the Partners Leaders Group, the Standing Committee at its July 2006 meeting agreed to incorporate the Settlement procedures into Section 421.1 of the UCANZ Guideline Papers. The significant changes in the settlement guidelines now adopted include the review of the parish ministry strategy by the parish, the parish Partners and the JRC, leading to identification of the ministry model and the kind of ministry leadership required in the coming years. The parish will then, in conjunction with the JRC and Partner representatives, choose the oversight denomination. A search committee will then be formed consisting of partner and congregation representatives. The final recommendation must be acceptable to all of the partners and to the congregation. The appointment will be made by the oversight denomination but the ministry will not be confined to a ministry from that denomination. If there is no change of ministry within ten years and there has been continual oversight by one denomination, then at the end of ten years, this oversight will normally change.

The July 2005 Work Group consultation on Local Shared Ministry provided understandings that have been incorporated into new draft Guideline Papers, section 426.

Co-operating Ventures with Presbyterian participation were invited to respond the proposals of number of work groups preparing material for the 2006 Presbyterian Assembly. A number of parishes made submissions on Stipends and Remuneration Task Group proposed recommendations. The Standing Committee is of the view that the proposals contravene the decision of the Presbyterian General Assembly of 2000 (minute reference 00.094). If the report and recommendations are adopted by the Presbyterian Assembly, it will introduce significant disparity between partner churches, and particular for multiple staff CVs. The Standing Committee would hope for further consultation, focused on issues for CVs before there are any significant changes to Presbyterian stipends.

The work ahead of the Standing Committee includes the preparation of an Ecumenical Liturgy for induction services, and the up-dating of the Guide to Procedures. In preparation for a meeting of JRC representatives scheduled for March 2007, consideration is being given to the functions of Joint Regional Committees.

The next Biennial Forum of Uniting Congregations is planned for November 2007, to be held in the Wellington area, after the Methodist Conference.

#### National Register

We now have a data base that contains information on most of our Certificated Lay Preachers. We thank the Synods that have been supportive of our endeavours. The names recorded on our data base will appear in the Church Year Book and the church website.

#### Lay Preacher Training

We encourage all who take services to achieve certification and continue with on-going training. The requirements for training are set out in leaflet 153 under *Administration* on the Church website. Certain conditions are mandatory but training requirements are flexible according to qualifications possessed. Rev David Bell has been successfully promoting the introductory Lay Preacher course *Lead Worship*.

#### PAC Grant

We are pleased to announce that PAC gave us a grant of \$7,000. This is insufficient to establish the *Lay Ministry Fund* that we were hoping would provide on-going finance for official Lay Preacher representatives to Conference plus an annual book allowance for 'accredited and active' Lay Preachers. *The Gathering* will decide how best to use this money.

#### Parish and District Responsibilities

We continue to urge Parishes and Districts to be aware of their responsibilities towards their own Lay Preachers: to use them fairly; give suitable support including training and resources; supply travel allowance; celebrate Lay Preachers Sunday (2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in August); and encourage new people into worship leading and Lay Preaching studies.

#### INTERCHURCH TERTIARY CHAPLAINCY COUNCIL (ITCC) and AOTEAROA-NZ TERTIARY CHAPLAINCY ASSOCIATION (ANZTCA)

#### **Report to Methodist Conference 2006**

The InterChurch Tertiary Chaplaincy Council held its annual meeting in Auckland on Nov 26<sup>th</sup> 2005, following a highly successful Symposium on Chaplaincy in Tertiary Education at the UniTec in Auckland. Sixty or so Chaplains, Board members, student services managers and Church leaders from around the country came together to focus on the strategic importance of tertiary chaplaincy in Aotearoa-NZ. Dr David Tacey was the keynote speaker. Dr Peter Lineham presented a helpful historical overview of tertiary chaplaincy. We were grateful to Methodist President Rev Dr John Salmon for his presence at and contribution to the symposium. We were all encouraged in our ministries, which extend to thousands of tertiary students and staff throughout our land. Tertiary Chaplaincy was affirmed by all present as a crucial priority for the mission of our Churches. Our vision is to continue to grow and enhance the quality of our chaplaincy services throughout Aotearoa-NZ. Our vision is very much in harmony with the Mission Statement of the Methodist Church of NZ.

There are currently 59 members of the Aotearoa-NZ Tertiary Chaplains' Association. We have Chaplains in most tertiary institutions, and are keen to establish new Chaplaincies in places where no such presence currently exists. Our annual conference last November was hosted by Rev. Uesifili Unasa in the Maclaurin Chapel, Auckland University. This year our ANZTCA conference will be held in New Plymouth, in late-November. Regional meetings have also been held during the year, in Auckland, Palmerston North and Dunedin.

Each Chaplaincy is different, depending on the context and the person appointed. The pastoral care and educational resourcing being offered is appreciated by our host institutions. In some places our Chaplains have developed specific skills in counselling, critical incident support, educational resourcing and interfaith liaison.

There are currently two Methodist Presbyters serving as Tertiary Chaplains; Rev Greg Hughson (Ecumenical Chaplain at Otago University) and Rev. Uesifili Unasa (Maclaurin Chaplain at Auckland University)

The ITCC exists to:

- 1. Channel the constituent Churches' commitment to resourcing and supporting tertiary chaplaincy in Aotearoa-NZ
- 2. To provide a national forum at which issues of common concern and practices can be discussed and policies developed; including accreditation, standards and conditions of service.
- 3. To initiate, develop and maintain the links with the constituent Churches, Chaplaincy Boards, Chaplains' Associations and tertiary institutions. The constituent churches at present are the Anglican, Methodist, Presbyterian, the Associated Churches of Christ and the Religious Society of Friends.

Financial support from the ITCC is now only available to Chaplaincy Boards as seeding funding for new initiatives. In 2006 grants have been made to support the development of new chaplaincies at Whangarei and Waikato Polytechnics, to introduce support for Chaplains in Auckland and Hawke's Bay, to develop international student ministry at Linclon and to support particular programmes at Otago University (Annual Peace Lecture in September) and Massey University. The ITCC AGM this year will be held in Christchurch during November.

We believe that the provision of Chaplaincy services to our tertiary institutions must continue to be supported as a vital and key mission of the whole Church. We greatly value your interest, prayers and financial support. The Methodist Church can be proud of its long-standing support of Tertiary Chaplaincy, and we ask that this support continue. The Chaplains in our NZ tertiary world have access to thousands of people who would not otherwise encounter a caring pastoral confidante and guide. Often our Chaplains are sought out by students and staff in real need of spiritual support and guidance at crucial turning points in their lives

Please do not hesitate to contact us if you require further information. Please also contact the tertiary chaplains in your local area. They need your support. Ask them what they need, and invite them to come and share with you about their ministries which are offered on your behalf and with your support.

## The Interchurch Council for Hospital Chaplaincy

#### **Hospital Chaplaincy Report to Methodist Conference 2006**

#### Methodist Involvement

The Methodist Church is one of 9 denominations which make up the ICHC Trust Board. The Rev John Murray retired from being the Methodist Trustee on the Board in December 2005. He will be replaced by the Rev Nigel Hanscamp from October 2006. There are currently four Methodist Presbyters employed as chaplains in the public hospitals. They are Rev Dr Jock Hosking at Whangarei Hospital, Rev Hausia Tufui at Middlemore Hospital, Rev Alan Leadley at Waikato Hospital and Rev Paul Tregurtha at Dunedin Hospital. Also Mrs Veronica Grant is the Methodist funded Chaplain at Auckland Hospital. Four Methodist Presbyters retired from the Hospital Chaplaincy Service in the past year. A number of Methodist people serve as voluntary chaplaincy assistants or on local chaplaincy committees. Mrs Heather Walls, Mrs Pam Garlick and Mr John Eaddy are Methodists who chair the Christchurch, Auckland and Taranaki chaplaincy support committees respectively.

#### General Overview

The Government increased its contribution to the cost of the chaplaincy service by 2% from 1 July 2005 and as a major step forward offered a 3 year funding contract which will expire on 30 June 2008. The Minister of Health was clear that government funding should be seen as representing 35% of the cost of the national chaplaincy service, leaving ICHC to seek a further 15% from District Health Boards and the other 50% from the Churches and the community.

The ICHC along with the local chaplaincy support committees have made a strenuous effort to encourage the District Health Boards to contribute to the cost of their chaplaincy services. At the end of June nearly \$500,000 was being contributed nationally by DHB's. This is nearly double the figure 3 years ago. Unfortunately this year has again been one when contributions to the funding for hospital chaplains' positions from some denominations, denominational agencies and churches has reduced and has in some instances been withdrawn. Obviously this has created some major problems. This is particularly so in Otago and Wellington where the chaplaincy services have held street appeals for the first time during the year and established fund raising Trusts or fund raising positions to try and help address their funding needs.

#### Key initiatives to note

Last year the ICHC Board made two major moves to try and lay the foundation at a national level for a greater outreach among the churches and the public to achieve a more stable financial situation. The first was to obtain the assistance of a public relations consultant to assist in improving the profile of Hospital Chaplaincy. The other was to establish a *Hospital Chaplaincy Foundation* to generate a fund which will in time, provide money to supplement the funding from the government, the churches and the community and give the chaplains more security. The Foundation has been established and it is starting to be advertised. To raise the profile a Hospital Chaplaincy Week is to be held in the last week of September 2006. This will be advertised nationally through a range of media and will be launched by the Minister of Health Hon Pete Hodgson. Sunday 1 October is Hospital Chaplaincy Sunday and a packet of information about the chaplaincy, including a new hymn by Colin Gibson, is to be sent out to the parishes of the ICHC partner Churches for use on that day.

As signalled last year with a number of chaplains reaching retirement age, an emerging issue is the difficulty in attracting younger people to this ministry when the financial viability of the service remains precarious. The ICHC and the Hospital Chaplains' Assn have worked on a common stipend package for Hospital Chaplains. This is to be voted on at the NZ Healthcare Chaplains Conference in August 2006 and if approved, will be introduced for new appointees from early 2007.

#### WESLEY COLLEGE TRUST BOARD Report to Conference 2006

#### INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK

#### PERSONNEL

At the beginning of the year the College welcomed Rev Ali'itasi Toleafoa to the Board of Trustees' staff. Ali'itasi has the primary role of Head of the Life and Faith Department. The Life and Faith Department is central to the development of understandings of the Wesley College Special Character within the day school. She comes to Wesley College from a background of Parish Ministry with the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand and working with a Youth Trust in Dunedin. We have appreciated her involvement in all aspects of College life.

John Cheeseman, Head of the Physical Education Department, retired in July after some 43 years association with Wesley College. An ex-student, John devoted his working life to Wesley College.

#### **HOSTEL MANGAGEMENT / BOARDER SUPPORT**

From 2007 all boarding hostels will be required to work within a new regulatory environment. The College welcomes these regulations and does not anticipate major difficulties in obtaining a Licence to operate as a hostel, as required. Over the past few years Wesley College has been upgrading the College hostels and levels of staff supervision. House Parents are now associated with each of the 6 dormitories: in 4 the House Parent(s) reside in the dormitory complex. Further minor improvements are planned.

The New Zealand Boarding Schools Association is promoting a qualification that recognises training and experience of hostel staff. One staff member has completed the requirements to obtain this Duty of Care Certificate. Others are being encouraged as they work towards this qualification. This qualification may be used as a prerequsite to a degree qualification in hostel management through the Australian Catholic University system.

#### CHAPEL LIFE

Under the terms of the Integration Agreement each school day begins with a religious observance held in the Smith Memorial Chapel. Two services are held on Sunday. There is a growing acceptance of student leadership in worship. Offering opportunities for student leadership has allowed some to test and nurture a call to future ordained Ministry. A feature of Chapel life is enthusiastic singing. Many former students advise that some of their strongest memories are of the sense of belonging that is stirred and developed within the Chapel. College groups and staff have participated in services in neighbouring parishes and members of staff are regularly invited to lead worship.

#### VICE-PRESIDENTIAL VISIT / SERVICE OF BEGINNINGS / INDUCTION OF CHAPLAIN

The College welcomed President John and Vice-President Mary to the annual Service of Beginnings. The presence of the President and Vice-President at this service is one sign to the Wesley College Community that the College is part of the Connexion.

#### DAIRY FARM

The Farm Committee's development work on the farm is very evident. Share Milkers, Steve and Andrea Mills, continue to give good service and their work is appreciated. The Trust Board is evaluating the future of the College Farm. As industrial and commercial development takes place in the Auckland region land values are increasing exponentially. Therefore, at some point in the future farming will not be economically viable.

#### ROLL

The school roll on 1 March 2006 was 365. Of these 331 were male and 34 female; 349 domestic students and 16 overseas students. The boarding roll was 32 female and 256 male.

#### EDUCATIONAL

Students continue to respond positively to the NCEA assessment environment. Wesley College students achieved significantly above that of schools at the same decile level [decile 2] at all levels. At Year 12 and 13 achievement levels were above the average of all schools on a national basis for completion of NCEA Level 2 and NCEA Level 3. That Year 11 students as a group achieved slightly below the national average for all schools reflects the fact that a number of students were enrolled during the year who had had little regular schooling prior to enrolment. A Herald on Sunday article entitled 'Surprises on NCEA's report card' noted that "Wesley's NCEA pass rates ranged from 51.9 to 62.7, shunting the decile 2 school ahead of five decile 10 schools." This is a positive affirmation of the development of a culture of achievement and success within College life.

#### COLLEGE CULTURE

Emphasis continues to be placed on developing a culture that reflects the ideals expressed in the College's Special Character statement, the Methodist ethos and the Methodist educational style.

Wesley College has been associated with a number of high profile events during the past year. The Tongan and Samoan Groups participated in the ASB Bank Cultural Festival. The Tongan Group was placed first in the two sections they entered, the Mako and Me'etu'upaki sections.

Wesley College hosted the Tamaki Makaurau section of the Manu Korero Competition. The College facitilites proved to be an excellent venue for event that promotes excellence in both Te Reo Maori and English. Wesley College entered a student in all four sections of the competition. Each speaker performed creditably, with one achieving third place in the Rawhiti Ihaka (Junior Maori) section.

For the third year a Wesley group has been placed first in the South Auckland section of the Sheilah Winn Shakespeare in Schools competition. Their performance of an excerpt from Romeo and Juliet (interpreted '(Pacific) Island' style) gave the group entry into the National final. One of the two Wesley students from the 2005 Wesley team selected as part of the New Zealand Young Shakespeare Company experience was chosen for the lead male role in their production of Anthony and Cleopatra at the Globe Theatre in London.

#### COLLEGE SPORT

Sport continues to have a high profile within the life of many boarders. This year the College has fielded 8 rugby teams, and entered teams in hockey, soccer, netball, softball, badminton, cricket, touch rugby and basketball competitions. Individuals have participated in regional swimming and athletic events. The achievements of the 1<sup>st</sup> XV continue to engender a sense of unity and pride. Placed 4<sup>th</sup> in last year's National Secondary Schools Rugby Championship, the fortunes of the current team, as they secured the title in the second section of the Counties-Manukau Power Cup (Senior Men's Competition), after securing the Counties-Manukau under 21 title, are eagerly followed by the College community. A significant number of players are selected for the Counties-Manukau age group teams. Others vie for national honours.

#### ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The Trust Board wishes to acknowledge the contribution made to the life of Wesley College by the employees of both the Trust Board and the Board of Trustees. Staff are often seen going the "extra mile" working with and encouraging students in their academic work, on the sporting fields, in their cultural and spiritual pursuits.

The Trust Board also wishes to acknowledge the passing of former Board members Ripia Roundtree, Brian Caughey and former Principal John McDougal. Each made a significant contribution to the development of Wesley College.

#### LOOKING FORWARD

#### STRATEGIC PLAN

The Trust Board and the Board of Trustees will be considering an increase to the school's maximum roll, including an increase in the number of female students. The implications of any increase will include the construction of additional hostel and teaching facilities and the employment and training of additional staff.

Consideration continues to be given to further ways of preparing boarders for life after Wesley College. A boarding environment, because of its regular, predictable routines can create a dependence that may not prepare boarders for the next phase in their lives.

#### THE CHURCHES EDUCATION COMMISSION REPORT TO CONFERENCE 2006

-taking God's love to children in schools -mauria te Rongopai ki a matou tamariki -matou te manana'o ia o'o le Tala lelei I Aoga

It's a pleasure to write a report for you on the work of the Commission for 2005/2006.

The role of National Coordinator for Christian Religious Education was left vacant in April when Hilary Baskerville, who had served in that position for five years, retired. Petrea Medland was appointed in July and began on the July 17 just a few weeks prior to annual conference and AGM. As you will understand, this report is heavily reliant on paper work I have found and information I hope is helpful to you as you seek to understand more of the work you contribute to.

This year the introduction of new RIL material published in Australia, with NZ writers contributing to content, for the 8-10 and 10-12 age groups, has been a real highlight. The material is attractive, simple to use and child centred and feedback from users has generally been very positive. We look forward to the next two years of the series continuing to build on the gains this has. It is intended that other age groups material will also be rewritten in the near future.

The statistical information gathered for our AGM has in the main been reasonably encouraging although there has been some reduction in opportunities in schools in some areas; there has been some growth in others. Some interesting statistics are as follows –

5111 classes taught RE

4013 volunteer teachers & helpers teach these classes

22 denominations represented by volunteer teachers

165 trained chaplains in 200 schools.

60 trained chaplains awaiting placement in schools

Training, Police vetting and accreditation of teachers continues to be a primary focus for national and regional personnel and given that we believe we are the largest volunteer organization in NZ, this requires many man hours in preparation, presentation and administration.

Personnel who are professional and competent are vital to both RE and Chaplaincy if we are to maintain credibility in public schools and we believe that our CARE courses (Basic training for chaplains) and our ongoing training for RE teachers ensure that we are continuing to "raise the bar" in this regard.

Discussions are still being held with Scripture Union in regard to forming a partnership in Chaplaincy provision to schools. Scripture Union are keen to pursue paid chaplaincy in schools and it is planned that we will work collaboratively to ensure a unified approach to schools and in provision of quality training programmes accessed by both paid and voluntary chaplains.

CEC are currently in the process of some restructuring signed off by the Commission at our recent AGM. It is hoped that we will continue to be supported and represented by all mainstream denominations on the Commission but also hope to second individuals with expertise and gifting which will allow the Commission to raise its profile and find additional funding solutions to a much "stretched" budget. We rely heavily on Denominational support and pray that this will continue as churches recognise the valuable contribution 4000 + teachers make to the spiritual development of Kiwi children week by week.

Thank you for your support – it is much needed and appreciated. May God bless you.

# BOARD OF MINISTRY

Supplementary Report to Conference 2006

#### Strategic Direction

Since the first part of the report to Conference was written the Board has continued to explore its options for the future. We have confirmed the importance of partnerships and are continuing to develop partnerships.

In line with the context and profile we need to look at the most effective stewardship of resources for both present and future, active integration and connectedness of our work and trying to give expression to being a multi-cultural Church within a bi-cultural context. We are currently in a very fluid context, therefore we need to act accordingly in allowing for new forms of ministry to emerge, along with an ability to reassess the redeployment of resources in order for them to be used to maximum advantage. It also requires a strong governance function at Board level.

Therefore we have focused on two areas:

One Site - It is clear from the financial information that effectively for 10 offices, teaching space and a common area we are currently paying \$90,551 per annum. On top of this we have; three telephone systems; three servers; inefficiencies in travelling; inefficiencies in administration and office information systems.

Student feedback to date gathered particularly over the last year highlights fragmentation of Methodist identity and a perception of competition between the two major ministry education programmes of Trinity Methodist Theological College. There is also fragmentation between Mission Resourcing and Ministry Education which has been highlighted since the Commission on Theological/Ministerial Education as a critical factor. Integration on one site would allow for a more cohesive development of identity amongst students and the Connexion, recognising also that significant cultural change will need to occur. It does not imply that one programme is fused into the other; rather flexibility of training options would still be available with students moving between the School of Theology and Trinity Ministry Training Unit.

A critical component for this project would be to work towards the creation of a Methodist centre linked around a worshiping centre. Some issues in relation to this, theological education and ministry generally were raised in discussion between the Principal and representatives of Hui Poari Te Taha Maori on the 9<sup>th</sup> October at Te Rahui Centre Hamilton. This vision would look at maximizing the utilization of both personnel and financial resources in an interconnected way, and responsibility to be good stewards of our total resources.

In exploring options for one site five possibilities have been considered and two have emerged that require further exploration.

St Johns/Trinity Meadowbank site: The history of this partnership goes back to 1965 when the possibility of joint theological studies with the Anglican Church began to emerge. At this time questions were also emerging about the changing understanding of theological training, ability to achieve a sense of community or to develop styles of life or training that could take further the student and situation centred approach. Following a joint meeting held in 1971, it was unanimously recommended that the respective governing bodies of St John's College and Trinity College move towards the establishment of a united Theological College on the St John's site. The motivation for this move was as an act of faith rather than a financial one.

Although staff had envisaged the emergence of a cluster of Colleges, the Anglican leadership urged the development of a completely united College and it was this that became the recommendation of the Negotiating Committee and subsequently endorsed by Conference. Dr Lewis notes in his papers the Anglican generosity which offered Trinity College not only the housing of its students (the normal Methodist intake at this time 8 students per year), but also the payment of allowances and even staff housing and stipends. Trinity College Council however wished to come as a full partner and to pay its way and final agreement was reached where the Anglican Church provided housing to

Methodist students and the Methodist Church would pay for everything else.

The Probert Trust undertook to supply stipends for the teaching staff and following the demise of this trust a second endowment fund was established for the general purposes of Trinity Methodist Theological College. As at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2006, the capital amount in this endowment fund stands at \$2,668,700.

The enabling Act of Parliament of 1972 had declared St John's to be a General Theological College with the power to gather in students of other denominations. Methodists were named by the General Synod. It was agreed that all appointments would be made with the concurrence of both Board and Council. In order to provide further facilities for an expanding College, the Board of Governors commissioned the erection of the Wesley Hall. Fully united work began in 1973. The Methodist library found a new home and the Librarian incorporated Methodist books, on separate title into the main catalogue, in order for the whole Library to function as one.

In 1973 there was discussion about the continued use of the Grafton site following the move to St John's College. Investigations and consideration included using the site for a hospital, Marae, urban theological education centre or continuing education programmes. However, in 1982 Conference affirmed the value of the property and the use of income from the property for ministry education. The Grafton property was later sold to the Methodist Trust Association and an endowment fund established. The capital balance in this fund as at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2006 is \$1,781,920.

The files of Rev Dr J. J. Lewis have been researched relating to the setting up of the Anglican Methodist partnership on the St Johns site. There is no evidence that the Methodist Church was requested to, or did provide any financial support to set up the partnership.

The nature of the partnership changed in 1984 with an amended partnership agreement. The significant shift at this time was: A partnership in one place between the College of St John the Evangelist and the Trinity Methodist Theological College, each with it's own governing body – and accountable to and responsive to their respective Churches.

The spirit of the partnership continued to be based on that represented by the Lund Principle of 1952 "Should not our churches ask themselves ... whether they should not act together in all matters except those in which deep differences of conscience compel them to act separately?" This change then gave rise to a supplementary agreement in 1990 which itemized a new financial arrangement, the full effect to come into force as from January 1994. This agreement noted the history of the relationship and agreed that each College would be responsible for paying direct student costs, lunches, doctors and professional fees, external course and visit fees, academic and non academic salaries and other costs relating to each individual College.

Over the last eighteen months both St John's and Trinity College have attended to a careful review of their own needs based on changes happening within their wider Church constituencies. In informal conversations between both Boards, we have now reached a point where further exploration is required of the current and future status of the partnership. The Board has decided it is best for its work to be on one site, and its preferred option is to be on the Meadowbank site. This is one of many issues raised in discussion with Te Taha Maori at a formal meeting held on the 13<sup>th</sup> October and the conversation continues.


An invitation for an urgent meeting of the Joint Policy Committee is currently being arranged and will be held by the end of the year. As we enter into discussion it will be important for the Board to have a clear understanding of what we want from partnership, what we can offer to the partnership, and what are the things we want to carry with us that are too important not to let go. • Pitt Street/Central Parish site: The partnership with the Auckland Methodist Central Parish began in 1999 with the establishment of the Trinity Ministry Training Unit. It was agreed that funding for the MTU would be a shared cost. As noted by the trends there has been an increase in the numbers of students placed in the Ministry Training Unit and in October 2003 a reviewed agreement was put in place. This agreement noted that...Financial responsibility ... will be shared by the partners as agreed from time to time. In general, financial responsibility for educational activities and management, student accommodation and expenses, and educational resources will be with the Board of Ministry. Financial responsibility for ministry within the parish, and plant and office supplies for MTU activities will be with the parish. Costs related to employment of the Director will be shared.

It was agreed that the partnership agreement would be reviewed each three years and the next review will take place on the 15<sup>th</sup> November 2006.

Both of these sites represent long established partnerships and we continue to explore options for the future in consultation with Te Taha Maori.

#### Board structure

The Board structure envisaged would mean a high level governance role with two workgroups; Ministry Education; Mission Resourcing.



The Board will require specific expertise in governance, while the work groups require specific expertise relating to Ministry Education and Mission Resourcing work. It has become clear that Board membership will need to draw on expertise wider than an Auckland base.

In drawing of expertise from a wider geographical area, the Board acknowledges there are financial implications, but we also cannot afford to limit the Board's effectiveness. The issue relates directly to that raised in our first report regarding finances. As noted the Board is endeavouring to work within financial constraints that sees it with less funding than was allocated for our work fifteen years ago. One short term answer is to seek additional connexional funding. However we believe that a better approach is to focus on a longer term strategy to build endowment funding for our work. We do believe, however, that a review of connexional funding priorities is urgent. During 2007 it is essential that work is done on looking at possibilities for endowment funding so that we can ensure that new projects such as Local Shared Ministry can be initiated or the Connexion must identify those things they no longer wish the Board to do.

It is important to note that any new Board structure will continue to be connexionally appointed and accountable to Conference. The work groups would comprise people with specific expertise and interest in the specific focus of the two work groups. Staff interaction through Principal and Directors would be at work group level, therefore harnessing their expertise and a link with staff currently missing from the present Board structure. The Board would meet every second month, and work groups the alternate second month.

The link from the Board to each of the work groups would be through the Business Manager and any Board members on the work group. The Business Manager must be in a collegial relationship with Connexional appointees. It seems logical that the Business Manager position should include over

arching management responsibility for the Board's work. The role could be expanded to ensure holding together both ministry education and mission resourcing strategy. The person holding this position would logically be in attendance at Board meetings in order to manage more appropriately staff interaction with the Board and separation of governance and management. It is clear that the current practice of four executive staff present at the Board hinders the work of the Board and places too much emphasis in terms of "who is driving governance".

The Board believes it is important that we follow these directions as they go to the core of how we design, and deliver ministry and mission. The proposed changes make sense. The model below shows the linkages and how we need to place ourselves so for the health of the Church we can be proactive and exercise prophetic leadership. It is our intention to continue conversations over the next year as we work to ensure we are better placed to grapple with the hard, exciting questions of ministry and mission for Te Hahi.



We believe it is important to trial the proposed Board structure and seek the expertise this structure will require as we continue our conversation including discussion with Hui Poari, Synods and Parishes over the 2007 connexional year.

#### People to honour

We congratulate Rev Dr Terry Wall on the awarding of his Doctor of Ministry Studies from the Melbourne College of Divinity in March 2006.

#### Principal resignation

In August, Rev Dr Mary Caygill informed the Board of her decision to resign from the position of Principal from the end of 2007 given the increasing demands on this role. While deeply respecting Mary's decision, the Board accepted it with considerable regret. In so doing we are very grateful for the amount of time that Mary has given which will enable the Board and the Connexion to give full consideration to how this role can be structured in the future.

In the light of the huge amount of compliance issues that are now required in Ministry Education, the Board acknowledges the urgent need to review the way this area of their work is overseen. The role of Principal has changed considerably over the past ten years and as a Church we need to acknowledge that the ways of the past no longer meet the needs of today. The Board, in consultation with Te Taha Maori, will be putting in place a 4+4 process to review this position.

#### Local Shared Ministry

Responses to the June report were received from:

This year the members of the Workgroup(Nigel Hanscamp, Lynne Wall, Terry Wall, Bonnie Hebenton, Val

Nicholls and Alex Webster)drafted a discussion Document for June Synods and invited responses. These responses have been incorporated into the discussion document (reprinted as "Draft Guidelines to Local Shared Ministry in the Methodist Church, Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa").

A training event has been held for Enablers at Camp Epworth sponsored by Waikato-Waiariki District, with 12 people from 4 synods completing the first stage of the Enabler training.

Below are the headings of the draft discussion document to respond to the questions that have been raised by Synods, Parishes and individuals. Further work will be completed over the next year on these with a view to presenting recommendations for approval to Conference 2007.

#### INTRODUCTION:

The Introduction talks of looking at a Methodist model first. The next step is to develop further how it would work in a Co-operating Venture parish.

Concern: How does this relate to UCANZ (Uniting Congregations Actearoa New Zealand) and partner churches in Co-operating Ventures?

Most Methodist involvement at the moment is in Cooperating Ventures, and the Methodist process has been worked out against this background. UCANZ have also been working on guidelines for all Co-operating Ventures.

#### VISION AND THEOLOGY

Concern: Some synods expressed concern with the language used in the theology.

It may not be possible to find theological language that everyone will relate to positively.

Concern. Does each congregation have the gifts and skills necessary?

Yes. It is a foundational understanding of Local Shared Ministry that within the life of a congregation there will be the skills and gifts necessary for ministry. This will change over the time as ministries and understanding grow.

#### WHAT A MINISTRY TEAM MIGHT LOOK LIKE

Concern: There is a fear that there will not always be people available for all ministries.

The experience of those working with Local Shared Ministry is that Parishes are often surprised by what happens with people who respond to God's call.

Concern: Is the model 'flexible enough.'

There are core principles: A team is called, according to their gifts, and resourced by an enabler. Flexibility is around the composition of the team and the functions they perform. The makeup of the team should reflect the life of the parish – age, culture and gender balances would mirror this. Parishes which choose lay supply or local lay appointments are working with a different model of ministry.

Concern: There is no overall leader identified in the team.

Leadership is expressed within the whole team.

#### HOW LOCAL SHARED MINISTRY FITS WITHIN METHODIST STRUCTURES

The guidelines have been amended to correct some inconsistencies identified by synods around covenants and accountabilities. Responsibilities for training have also been clarified.

Concern: Would this model bypass present parish structures (e.g. Parish Councils)?

Parish Council retains its traditional and Law Book functions. Communication and relationship building are vital in all parishes.

#### THE ENABLER

Concern: Where do enablers come from?

Lay or Ordained Enablers are called and identified by Synods and Parishes. There could also be a 'career path' for Enablers.

Concern: Can an Enabler cope with several Parishes?

Experience shows us that an Enabler can cope with up to four parishes.

Concern: How long will enablers need to train for their ministry?

Enabler training would usually be in a 2 year period which would include 'on the job' experience. Two residential training events would normally be attended. Many Enablers would come into this ministry with prior theological or ministry training. Training would be for the particular tasks of enabler ministry. Concern: Is the initial 6 month review too soon?

The guidelines have been amended to suggest that this should take place within the first 12 months after commissioning the team.

GUIDELINES FOR MOVING TOWARDS LOCAL SHARED MINISTRY

Concern: Are the guidelines flexible about the timing of this process? Yes. The guidelines indicate that there is sufficient flexibility to meet most situations. Experience tells us this process takes time to be done well and should not be rushed. Concern: Does a person have to be a Methodist to be on a Ministry Support Team?

A person would need to be a member of the parish. Concern: Who pays for training and how much is it?

The parish pays for the team training and the ongoing training of the enabler. Synods would need to fund the initial Enabler training.

Further work is to be done around funding issues.

A helpful comment we received: "An enquiry stage" is needed to help the Parish think positively. This often involves some grieving and a parish might feel a sense of "failure" for reaching this point. It may take longer than 12 months to move through these stages.

OTHER ASPECTS OF LOCAL SHARED MINISTRY

Concern: What happens if all the team leave at once or if there is no one ready to be called for the 'second generation'.

There is a sense in which we can 'over manage' the calling process. God's timing and plan do not always coincide with what we think should happen. We need to allow an element of faith at this point. Alongside this, the philosophy of Local Shared Ministry is that all the congregation are being trained and up-skilled constantly so there should always be people ready to say 'yes' to a calling. People in a small congregation can expect to be 'recycled' onto the team over an extended period. If the parish is not growing or membership changing in the very long run then that is another issue to look at in terms of mission.

It is important to note that the team does not do all the work. When they step down they are still members of the congregation expected to contribute as everyone else does. In fact they step down from the team as people who have considerably increased their "capacity" and so continue to make an effective contribution. For example a person who has been a worship co-ordinator would likely still remain on the worship leaders roster – just not as often as before. A pastoral co-ordinator will not stop caring because they are no longer on the team!

Concern: How will sacraments be provided?

This is still under discussion and can depend on the local situation, needs and mission / ministry strategy. However the Law Book currently provides for ways of providing sacraments as well as services for weddings and funerals in parishes.

Concern: Why are we introducing new terms e.g. Enabler?

There has been agreement among the churches by UCANZ to use this terminology within LSM. It is new for all churches within UCANZ.

TRAINING FOR ENABLER, MINISTRY SUPPORT TEAM AND CONGREGATIONS

Concern: Is the time requirement for members too high?

It is important not to 'over train' team members. It is also important to be clear about what time is involved for becoming a team member at the 'calling' stage.

GENERAL COMMENTS:

Helpful comment: This model puts church and local community in touch.

Concern: Is this just a Palagi model?

Local Shared Ministry is being looked at by Pasifika groups at present, though it should be noted that Lay ministry by called people is part of the current life of Pasifika groups.

Concern: Can this model work in parishes with more than one congregation. Can a congregation within a parish choose Local Shared Ministry and other congregations within the parish remain with traditional presbyter leadership?

Yes!! It is possible, and local solutions will need to be developed in each case.

Concern: More clarity is required around financial implications of Local Shared Ministry. *The costs of Local Shared Ministry for a Parish include:* 

<u>Enabler</u>. A portion of stipend (e.g. 20-25%) plus allowances, supervision, travel and some training costs. <u>Ministry Support Team</u>. Allowances, travel, ongoing training

Parish. Normal parish costs (buildings, communication etc).

Note: Further work is being done on a funding model, funding sources and forecasting for training and developing Local Shared Ministry.

Concern: Is there a danger of isolation from the wider church?

No more than in any other model. The role of the enabler and Synod / Parish Superintendent is to encourage good communication and participation. One of the Enabler's roles is to bring a wider vision of the church beyond the Parish.

Concern: Can Local Shared Ministry be brought into church law? One of the expected outcomes of the coming years work, will be to ask Law Revision Committee to look at suggested changes.

#### Wasewase ko Viti kei Rotuma Tabacakacaka Christchurch/Wellington/Wanganui

Providing qualitative ministry for the Fijian and Rotuman congregations has always been a difficult exercise with the lack of funding and the geographical spread of the congregations being the main reasons. In spite of this difficulty, Wasewase ko Viti kei Rotuma is positive about its future ministry and enthusiastic about steps taken to provide ministry for the congregations in the Central South Island and the Lower North Island. This has involved the supply appointment of the Rev. Peni Tikoinaka in the last two years to provide ministry for Fijian people in those three Districts. With Peni being received into full connexion this Conference, he will now be able to be stationed and to continue the hard work he has been doing. To facilitate this ministry will necessitate the formation of a Wasewase ko Viti kei Rotuma Tabacakacka (Circuit) of Christchurch, Wellington and Wanganui. Rather than being strictly Parish, this Tabacakacaka is more of a ministry concept to ensure that ministry is provided for these congregations. Thanks to the tremendous support from the three Synods and their continuous financial contributions which has enabled this ministry to continue.

#### Suggested Decisions:

- 1. Conference endorses the Board pursuing further conversation with the Anglican Church regarding the shape of future partnership on the St Johns/Trinity Meadowbank site.
- 2. Conference endorses the Board pursuing further conversation as to the shape of partnership between Trinity Methodist Theological College and Auckland Methodist Central Parish.
- 3. Conference supports the Board of Ministry trial of a new Board structure during 2007.
- 4. Conference asks Council of Conference to review connexional funding priorities and report to Hui Poari and Tauiwi Strategy during 2007 and bring recommendations to Conference 2007.
- 5. Conference gives a mandate to the Board of Ministry to seek endowment funding from Tauiwi Methodist Trusts throughout New Zealand during 2007.
- 6. Conference agrees further work be done in 2007 by the Working Group, in consultation with Board of Ministry Staff on issues raised by Synods and a firm proposal be brought to Conference 2007 on "The Draft Guidelines to Local Shared Ministry in the Methodist Church."
- 7. Conference approves the formation of the Tabacakacaka comprising Fijian congregations in Christchurch, Wellington, and Wanganui.
- 8. Board membership for 2007 is Jan Tasker (Chairperson), Shirley-Joy Barrow, Jennifer Moor, Kenneth Smith, Adrianne Taungapeau, 'Epeli Taungapeau, Peter van Hout, Peter West and including people named by Te Taha Maori, with the Business Manager in attendance and other people nominated for their expertise and appointed by the President during 2007.

#### **Qualified Opinion**

#### Use of rating valuations

As stated in note 4 on page 10 to the full financial statements, the Board has utilized Rating Valuations for the purpose of revaluing the land and buildings which are not investment properties included in these financial statements. This is a departure from applicable Financial Reporting Standard No. 3 (FRS-3), which requires an independent valuation at fair value on a basis appropriate for financial reporting. A rating valuation may not have been undertaken on a basis appropriate for financial reporting. The Board has not had the rating valuation reviewed to ascertain the appropriateness of the basis utilized and therefore the Board has not calculated the financial effect of this departure from the applicable financial reporting standard.

#### Non depreciation of buildings

As stated in note 4 on page 10 to the full financial statements, the Board has not provided for depreciation on buildings which are not investment properties. This is a departure from applicable Financial Reporting Standard No. 3 (FRS-3), which requires that depreciation be charged as an expense in the statement of financial performance so as to allocate the cost of buildings over their economic lives. The Board has not calculated the financial effect of this departure from the applicable financial reporting standard.

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We have not been able to assess the appropriateness of the carrying amounts of the buildings and therefore we have not been able to reliably estimate the effect of these departures.

In our opinion, except for the effect of the departures from applicable Financial Reporting Standard No. 3 noted above, the information reported in the summary financial statements complies with FRS-39: *Summary Financial Reports* and is consistent with the full financial statements from which it is derived and upon which we expressed a qualified audit opinion in our report to the members dated 15 September 2006.

For a better understanding of the scope of our audit of the Board of Ministry – Ministry Resourcing's financial statements and of the Board of Ministry – Ministry Resourcing's financial position and financial performance for the year ended 30 June 2006, this report should be read in conjunction with the Board of Ministry – Ministry Resourcing's audited financial statements for that period.

#### Faith & Order Committee Report to the 2006 Conference

The Faith & Order Committee has found that fewer matters are being referred to it in recent years. While increasingly important matters related to faith and order engage the church, such as the selection process and role of the presidency, it is apparent that the committee is being sidelined. This means that the church is not enjoying the benefit of a pool of experience and knowledge that has been built up in these areas over the years. In response to this it may be that Faith & Order will in future take initiatives to explore aspects of the life of the church without waiting to be asked to consider these.

#### **Committees of Detail**

When the Faith & Order Committee was first asked to explore the shape of Conference it never envisaged that Committees of Detail would be abolished. As this is a matter of the order of the Church, which falls into Faith & Order's brief, we feel that it is appropriate to offer a comment. The committee wants to record how valuable it has found Committees of Detail over the years. They have served the church well. It is an opportunity for people in the wider church who have taken an interest in Faith & Order matters, to meet the standing committee, and to engage in conversation. The Committee of Detail can scrutinize the work of the standing committee and participate in the reporting and decision making process. Recommended decisions can be discussed prior to presenting the report on the floor of Conference and they can be modified, strengthened or amended. The Faith & Order Committee welcomes this open process and is not afraid to defend or change its recommendations, or be asked to do further work. In this way Committees of Detail ensure that the standing committee or board of the church is accountable for their work. We could not imagine parliament without rigorous examination of proposed legislation in Select Committees. Committees of Detail provide an essential environment for transparent and democratic process within the church. The committee is of the view that recent Conference process has been impoverished by the absence of Committees of Detail. The committee looks forward to the Council of Conference response to the 2005 Conference Notice of Motion on this matter. In the meantime Faith & Order calls for the reinstatement of Committees of Detail.

#### World Methodist Conference

The Conference, held in Seoul, Korea in July, was particularly significant for the Methodist signing of the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification. The Official Common Affirmation reads: "In this statement the World Methodist Council and its member churches affirm their fundamental doctrinal agreement with the teaching expressed in the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification signed at Augsburg on 31st October 1999 on behalf of the Lutheran World Federation and the Catholic Church. The signing partners of the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification join together in welcoming the above statement of the World Methodist Council and its member churches, which declares and demonstrates Methodist agreement with the consensus in basic truths of the doctrine of justification as expressed in the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification. Building on their shared affirmation of basic truths of the doctrine of justification, the three parties commit themselves to strive together for the deepening of their common understanding of justification in theological study, teaching and preaching. The present achievement and commitment are viewed by Catholics, Lutherans and Methodists as part of their pursuit of the full communion and common witness to the world which is the will of Christ for all Christians." It is hoped that the Anglican Communion will arrive at the point where it will become associated with the Joint Declaration. The Joint Declaration was signed at an ecumenical service of worship at which Kenyan Methodist, General Secretary of the World Council of Churches the Rev. Dr. Sam Kobia, preached. Rev. Dr Geoffrey Wainwright, speaking on behalf of the World Methodist Council said, "It is time to look at one another with love and esteem, to make tangible gestures that assist in sharing gifts and graces. The international dialogue is to continue, and its aim is full communion in faith, mission and sacramental life." Cardinal Kasper, signing on behalf of the Catholic Church remarked, "We emphasise the faith which we hold in common. I want to say how much we welcome the Methodist love of life. It is hoped that this declaration will lead to further steps into visible unity. The Roman Catholic Church is committed to dialogue and walking together." The Rev. David Pratt, member of our Faith & Order standing committee was present and reported that "It was a pleasure and an inspiration to be present at the signing of the Joint Declaration. It was a moving experience and an important occasion... after the signing the conference erupted into clapping and the singing of the Doxology." Copies of the World Methodist Council theological statement, drawn up to support the signing of the Joint Declaration, are available from the Convenor. At the heart of this statement, which has been endorsed by all member churches of the World Methodist Council, is the claim: "Together we confess: By grace alone, in faith in Christ's saving work and not because of any merit on our part, we are accepted by God and receive the Holy Spirit, who renews our hearts while equipping and calling us to good works."

#### Lectionary

Again we wish to record our appreciation for the work of the Reverend Tony Stroobant who has taken responsibility for the preparation of the lectionary for a number of years. The new format has been well

received. Good reports are received from different parts of the church and we understand that it is widely used. The lectionary is available both in booklet form and on the Methodist Church website.

#### Liturgies

The Connexional Office has agreed to make the official liturgies of the church available on the website. This will take some time, but it is hoped that the work will be completed by the end of this year. The orders of service will remain available from the Connexional Office in booklet form.

#### **Diaconal ministry**

The committee welcomes the decision of the 2005 Conference to receive deacons into Full Connexion. We see this as a further step in the realization of our hope that diaconal ministry will be seen as parallel and complementary to presbyteral ministry and fully under the discipline of the church. We continue to value the contribution of Deacon Shirley-Joy Barrow to the life of the committee. It is hoped that she will be able to continue her involvement.

#### Local Shared Ministry

Some members of Faith & Order have worked with some members of the Board of Ministry over the last year to develop a Methodist approach to Local Shared Ministry. We agree that we have much to learn especially from the Anglican experience. However, if Local Shared Ministry is to be received within our church, there is a recognition that it needs to be consistent with our ethos and polity, and so far as possible conform to our practice. Attention has been given to the articulation of a theology and protocols for a parish to adopt Local Shared Ministry. Faith & Order see this model as one alongside other models, each having their own particular strengths and each offering particular opportunities. The report that is brought to confence by the Board of Ministry in association with Faith & Order is the result of sustained work involving collaboration.

#### Methodist-Catholic Dialogue

The third phase of this dialogue has been completed this year. Again it has been fruitful in continuing the process of building trust and acceptance between the two traditions. We have spent time examining the report of the international commission *Speaking the Truth in Love*, which is subtitled Teaching Authority Among Methodists and Catholics. It is possible to give an indication of the direction of this statement from a paragraph in the conclusion.

Both Catholics and Methodists recognize that it is the whole Church which abides in the truth because of the presence of the Holy Spirit in the community of believers. Both recognise that all believers have a gift for recognising, discerning and responding to the truth of the Gospel, and so play a part in the formulation and the interpretation of the Church's faith. Most fundamentally, both Methodists and Catholics believe that it is the Spirit who preserves within the Church the truth of the Gospel proclaimed by Christ and the apostles, though there is not complete agreement on what constitute the essential components of that Gospel. (para. 118)

The dialogue over the four years of phase three has considered music in worship, some social issues such as restorative justice and euthanasia, and the scope of ecumenical collaboration between the Methodist Church and the Roman Catholic Church in New Zealand. The major theological study has focused on baptism and it has been agreed in the dialogue that both churches have the same intention when we baptize. The dialogue has accepted that the grace of God is at work when baptisms are conducted in both the Methodist community and in the Roman Catholic community. For decades each church has unilaterally officially accepted the baptism of the other church. It was hoped that the end of third phase of our dialogue in our context could be marked by a joint mutual declaration of the acceptance of each other's baptism. This could still happen.

The Catholic and Methodist participants in the dialogue plan to publish a small booklet outlining their experience of sharing in the dialogue. This will be made available to the wider church. It is expected that a fourth phase will begin in 2008.

#### Anglican Methodist Conversations

These conversations have continued over the last year. Faith & Order and Mission and Ecumenical have collaborated. The Anglican team on the dialogue is representative of the three Tikanga. Although Te Taha Maori has elected not to be represented on the dialogue, they have been kept fully informed of developments, and we understand that they are generally supportive of the directions. Over the last year, given the very significant progress achieved in recent decades outlined in last year's report to conference, there has been a focus on reconciliation of ministries. Anglican and Methodist scholars have prepared background papers on the issues involved in regard to reconciliation of ministries. These are being discussed at present in the dialogue and further consideration is being given. Developments in the ecumenical understanding of episkope are recasting the issues.

There is appreciation within churches with the historic episcopate that churches of the Reformation without bishops also have episkope. Other Methodist conferences are taking up the challenge of the Lima Statement to consider taking the historic episcopate into their life and order. This has happened in Nigeria and South Africa among other places and the British Conference is currently debating not whether it will take episcopacy into its system, but what kind of bishops it will have. This is a question that New Zealand Methodism may wish to reconsider in the light of its ecumenical journey.

#### Little Essays

For many years those in parish ministry have not had easy access to resources to introduce people to the basic liturgies of our church. Nor has there been available simple material on the fundamentals of Christian faith. Responding to this need for resources to support the worship and pastoral life of our parishes, Faith & Order is taking an initiative in preparing a series of brochures. These will be available in the new year. Already the A4 two fold pamphlets on baptism, eucharist, confirmation, marriage, covenant renewal, funeral and three momentous days (worship at Easter) have been completed. A second series beginning with Wesleyan Spirituality and stewardship is in the process of preparation. It is envisaged that further Little Essays will be available on such subjects as prayer, grace, forgiveness, discipleship, shalom, agape and ministry. Consideration is being given as to how these might best be made available to the church.

#### World Council of Churches documents

Two documents have been received from the WCC Faith & Order Commission recently. The first "Called to be the One Church" was a statement that was issued by the Assembly in Brazil. The second, a substantial document "The Nature and Mission of the Church" invites member Churches to respond. After conversation Faith & Order has agreed to work with Mission and Ecumenical on formulating a response to these two documents during 2007.

#### Appreciation

The committee has received two resignations. The Rev. Dr. Trevor Hoggard left in August to take up a position as minister to the English language Methodist congregation in Rome, as well as accepting an appointment as representative of the World Methodist Council to the Vatican. We congratulate Trevor on these appointments. We believe that he is well equipped for these positions and aaure him of our prayer as he takes up these challenging ministries. Trevor quickly came to grips with the issues faced by New Zealand Methodism. Over four years he made a fine contribution to the work of the committee offering the benefit of his experience of world Methodism. We are also sad to say farewell to the Rev. Bill Elderton as he moves into retirement. We have valued Bill's participation in the life of the committee. He has challenged us with his insight and experience, always with good humour.

Suggested recommendations:

- 1. That the report be received.
- That the Council of Conference report on Committees of Detail be referred to synods, Te Taha Maori, committees and boards of the church for further discussion and report back 2007 conference.
- 3. That conference endorses a fourth phase of dialogue with the Roman Catholic Church

#### WesleyCom 2006 Conference Report

Conference 2005 received and affirmed the Cycles of Hope® policy document. This "living document" provides a contemporary theological and social framework for the continuing development of Methodist social service policy and priorities and is the application and extension of the "Breaking the Cycle" policy document adopted by the Conference in 1999. During this year WesleyCom has continued to support and encourage Regional Missions and Parish based Social Services to engage in implementing this policy in relevant and practical terms.

Late last year (2005) WesleyCom identified a number of key strategic issues and in doing so, recognised that Methodist social services are only part of a diverse offering of services throughout New Zealand. In our dealings with each other, with government, government departments and other service agencies, a question of identity has emerged – *"Are we (Regional Missions) a national provider or a network of regional providers?"* and therefore, do Methodist social services today require a more cohesive nation-wide profile?" The Regional Missions, Hamilton Social Services and Palmerston North Social Services Boards responded positively to a paper "A Common National Identity For Methodist Social Services" and have agreed in principle to move forward in creating a stronger common national identity for Methodist Social Service area agreed in a governance arrangements. Those discussions are continuing.

The Gospel continues to challenge the Church to confront the conditions that perpetuate injustice and our various social services ministries continue to be challenged by the economic and social divisions in New Zealand society. Usefully therefore, through WesleyCom the Methodist Church maintains a voice of influence in the development and management of local and central government's social service, health and welfare policies and strategies. In doing so, it provides a uniquely informed opportunity to critique New Zealand socio-economic conditions. Superintendents/Directors and senior staff occupy numerous advisory appointments and it is actively represented in the New Zealand Christian Council of Social Services. Through Superintendents and Directors WesleyCom also maintains effective working relationships with UnitingCare, the Uniting Church of Australia's social services agency network.

#### CONTINUING COMMITMENT TO NETWORKING - CONNEXIONALLY

Methodist social services ministries are not simply those of the four regional Missions. Comprehensive social service ministries are maintained by Districts, Parishes, Pasifika communities, Hapu and Iwi throughout the Connexion. Where possible, WesleyCom also wishes to encourage and support those initiatives. David Hanna, Director of Wesley Community Action, Wellington and the lower North Island region met with the Taranaki/Wanganui Synod in June and has been invited to lead a second event. Following on from the invitation from Sinoti Samoa, and Vahefonua Tonga last year (2005) the Rev Aso Saleupolu as Director, Tauiwi Pasifika Ministry was invited to the July 2006 meeting of WesleyCom. We began to explore possible strategies for working together with Pasifika Synods, Parishes and Congregations. It is still hoped to translate the Cycles of Hope document in a meaningful way for these widely ranging cultural/ethnic contexts. A similar meeting with Te Taha Maori Hui Poari to continue the conversation begun last year has also been arranged. David Hanna, Director Wesley Community Action and Michael Greer, Superintendent Christchurch Methodist Mission will take up that invitation.

#### MISSION NETWORKING

WesleyCom has developed considerably over the past few years. It now not only provides a helpful coordination of Methodist social service ministries, but an essential supportive forum with professional development opportunities for Superintendents/Directors, regional staff and parishes. Increasingly aware that Methodist social services agencies must effectively communicate to a very wide constituency well beyond the life of the Church, expert assistance with questions of identity, profiling and communication has also been obtained this year. A Managers/Team Leaders Development Forum was held last year and will be held again early 2007. A Community Development workshop was held in 2005 and a second is being planned for 23/24/25 May 2007. WesleyCom acknowledges the very considerable support it continues to receive from the Tindall Foundation which, in particular, has made these important Community Development workshops a possibility.

#### WEB SITE

The WesleyCom web site (<u>www.methodist.org.nz/index.cfm/Social Services/WesleyCom Aotearoa</u>) is offered as a resource and information base for social service issues with links to Methodist Missions. In 2007 it will be further upgraded and updated with additional resources and will retain active links to Methodist.org.nz.

WesleyCom is not in itself, a primary provider of social services. It is a coordinating committee which provides a forum for policy development and oversight of a wide range of Methodist social service ministries. Each year the four regional Methodist social services agencies (Methodist Mission Northern, Wesley Community Action Wellington, Methodist Mission Christchurch and the Dunedin Methodist Mission and on the following pages, each briefly reports to the Conference. However, each also publishes its own extensive annual report. Those reports form part of WesleyCom's accountability not only to the Conference and wider church, but to the community at large. Copies of those Annual Reports will be available at Conference.

# Methodist Mission Northern

The 2006 Connexional year is my last year at the Mission and as such it is a time to consolidate and finalise a number of projects that have been initiated including the establishment of a new organisation structure.

During the past year the Mission has been refocusing on community development as it establishes a renewed vision and strategic plan subsequent to the sale of the residential aged care businesses in August 2005.

In developing the Strategic Plan, we have challenged and reassessed Board and management views of the position and future direction of the organisation.

During this process our Mission's vision of "A socially just and inclusive society" has not changed and this is reinforced by our mission to "Challenge injustice, make visible signs of hope, empower the disempowered, celebrate change and diversity".

Our strategic objectives are to:

Provide services that effectively address social disadvantage and dislocation

- Develop services to support individual and community capacity to prevent and reduce social disadvantage
- Address issues of social and public policy
- Engage politically as advocates for change
- Present local and central government with fact and information about issues, causes, consequences and solutions
- Raise awareness of the Mission's social concerns

This renewed vision is of a Mission that is recognised as a "first class' knowledge based, capable organisation that provides services that result in socially transformative outcomes and is heard and credible and works to address the fundamental factors that contribute to social disadvantage and dislocation.

This is a two prong approach of service delivery through working with communities, and advocacy. We recognise that we can't achieve this alone and must have strong, dynamic partnerships with diverse organisations

In support of our mission we are in the process of establishing a Social Development Unit to provide leadership and organisational capacity to develop effective and sustainable community programmes. This unit will both review and develop existing service programmes. We are in the process of appointing a Community Development Leader who will complement the existing Lead Team and give added impetus to the development of existing services and identifying new opportunities to engage with both Parishes and communities. We have also recently appointed a person to engage in social research, social policy and development which will further our strategy to become a knowledge led organisation. We are also in the process of formulating terms of reference for a number of Reference Groups that will cover social policy and advocacy, service delivery and inner city services and issues.

In adopting Community Development as one of the overall thrusts of our new strategic Plan it is heartening to see initiatives arising out of the local "grass root" contexts in contrast to a "top down approach". As we have strengthened our networks in the northern region with an increasing emphasis on engaging with local Parishes and community groups we have been fortunate to work in support of the Bainbridge Trust in Rotorua, Takapuna Parish and Beneficiaries Advocacy and Information Service in Glenfield to name but three examples of giving support to the community.

The Mission, as part of this overall vision, is also working towards a revitalised focus on the inner city. Part of this is to develop services for homeless people that encompass housing, health, mental health and social support. This Mission has led the charge with a number of public and private organisations to focus New Zealand society on the issue of homeless people. The Mission has established very robust relationships with the Institute of Public Policy at Auckland University of Technology and Auckland City. In partnership we can make a difference.

Underlying this the Mission is still working on building solid foundations with financially sustainable services and a programme of developing property investments to maximise their returns.

The Mission also has a number of affiliated organisations that it supports through a strong governance presence such as:

#### Methodist City Action - Hamilton

Key strategic developments for the 2005/2006 year were: building networks in the sector, improving the quality and delivery of existing core programmes, and strengthening internal processes and systems – in particular, establishing a set of organisational standards, and developing a strategic framework that clearly identifies the links between the standards and the strategic and business plans. This framework provides a robust springboard and a set of measures that will support development over the next three years.

Methodist City Action's strategic goals for the period 2006 – 2009 are to: strengthen and sustain governance and management; promote its services as the face of inclusive hospitality; fully utilise the capacity of its IT resource; promote itself as advocates for community education and agents of change; clarify, maintain and strengthen relationships with key partners, and; develop cross cultural relationships with the community.

#### One Double Five Whare Roopu Community House Trust – Kamo

The Community House continues to offer inspiring cups of tea to people in Whangarei. Projects that have developed from this interchange over the years continue to flourish. Legal advice, whanau support, the works project are doing well. Emergency housing has become a big focus over the past 18 months with the development of one emergency house and a second about to get underway. There is still little funding to support these people in great need.

The school, Te Kakano o Taniwharau now has 26 places and is moving to a larger classroom at Ruarangi.

The cyber whare project has grown and is part of a cyber whare network in the mid-north.

They have produced a number of community films this year and will be running a NAFF festival (Northland Amateur Film Makers Festival) for the second time this October. The group has developed a community TV venture with a local school and North Tec Polytecnic. The TV station will be located in the school and will have a strong educational focus.

Underlaying these innovative developments in Whangarei there has been an urgent need to address ongoing organisational development, governance and management structures, The Mission continues to play a key role in this.

Social Service Agencies in Lower North Island

#### Wesley Community Action (Otaki, Kapiti, Porirua, Hutt Valley, Wellington)



This year has been a challenging and exciting time for Wesley Community Action. Some of the key aspects of the year have been:

- Deciding to keep and invest in Wesleyhaven retirement village in Naenae this resource has significant potential to continue to contribute to the wellbeing of older people – the challenge being for us is to realise this potential in a way that is financially sustainable.
- Continuing to achieve very positive outcomes for young people and their families. We celebrated 10
  years of running Te Whare Whakaparaki, two homes for young people in Tawa, and developed a new
  service to work with the young people's families Family Action.
- Succeeding in gaining funding support for a new programme, 'Engage' that works along side young
  people struggling with school and family in Porirua.
- Reviewing our community services via an external Te Wana process to ensure that we do what we say we do.
- Maintaining sound financial systems and achieving a small financial surplus of \$161,000.
- Promoting social justice via listening and sharing with a range of people and groups, from the Mongrel Mob Notorious Chapter to Parliamentary Select Committees.

#### Palmerston North Methodist Social Service Centre

This year has been a very challenging year for the PNMSSC. The major challenge was a downturn in our goodwill operation and a resulting deficit of \$60,000. This directly affected our ability to maintain our current level of services and programmes. The goodwill operation has been restructured, closing down three of our four shops and opening a new large store in the central business district. We have managed to secure contingency funding from The Wellington Methodist Endowment Fund and Child, Youth and Family to cover this downturn from the goodwill operation.

#### Wanganui City Mission

The Methodist Church is one partner with the Presbyterian, Catholic and Anglican churches, in this ecumenical initiative. The Wanganui City Mission a growing City Mission which is an emergency response to the needs of today. Its core businesses are:

- Food friendship meals, five days a week for a gold coin and Ezee meals frozen dinners from Mission foods delivered to those unable to make their own meals. A FoodBank - offering food to those unable to afford to buy food.
- Friendship a Drop In Centre 5 days a week for those in need of company and a Mission Travel Club - Low cost day trips and activities.
- Housing Emergency Accommodation to women, men and families with nowhere to live. And a
  Furniture Bank collecting donated furniture, clothing and wood and selling goods excess to need in
  a Bargain Hunt and Garage sales.

# **Methodist Mission - Christchurch**

The extent and diversity of essential social services provided by non-government agencies often comes as a surprise, even within the life of the Methodist Church of New Zealand. In addition to the support and assistance Methodist Mission Christchurch provides to parishes and districts throughout its large region of responsibility and the active involvement it has man



and districts throughout its large region of responsibility and the active involvement it has maintained this year in addressing social, economic (and invariably political) concerns, Methodist Mission Christchurch has

four service sectors, each embracing particular needs -

"There can be no keener revelation of a society's soul than the way in which it treats its children" (Nelson Mandela)

- Aratupu is the Methodist Mission's early childhood education services, providing not only quality care and education for children from 0 to 6 years of age, but also supportive community based services for whanau. The Mission strategically positions this service to provide maximum assistance and support to low income families, often with complex needs. Upgrade and a partial redevelopment of the premises housing Aratupu are planned for 2007 and will ensure best-practice standards can be maintained and additional community-based programmes developed.
- ChildWise is the contemporary alternative to what began 95 years ago as a Methodist orphanage and childrens' home in Christchurch. Now, having moved far beyond institutional care, ChildWise provides a wealth of community based social work support that aims to strengthen and enhance the well-being of children, families and communities. Alongside long standing services such as home based social work, children's play therapy, parenting groups (provided for both custodial and non-custodial parents) and life-skills education and activities for children, new initiatives this year have included a very successful development of a child mentor service and the professional production of a DVD as a parenting education resource. ChildWise also maintains various contracts with the Ministry of Social Development, Ministry of Justice and Department of Child Youth & Family, one of which is to provide services arising from the substantial increase in statutory notifications.

# "Our commitment is challenged by the economic and social divisions in New Zealand society..." (Cycles of Hope®)

- Te Kete Oranga is an innovative move away from the previous "hand-out" models of care. Today this service provides individuals and families with the support, knowledge and skills to maximise their own potential. It is designed to lift them beyond the distressing circumstances that many in our community continue to face. The service includes support and assistance with debt management, advocacy, life-skills and health education, work brokerage and work support. Foodbank assistance, although still an urgent necessity for many (but always at risk of being an end in itself), is now the adjunct to these services, rather than the primary service itself. Completion of the Durham Street frontage and the ground floor of the Aldersgate Centre within the next few months will considerably assist in making this strategic transition.
- WesleyCare continues to provide dignity and independence for older people who at this stage of their life, require a more comprehensive level of residential or hospital care. It includes affordable, secure, safe, independent housing. Although a variety of options for older people have emerged in the market place in recent years, we are increasingly concerned for the 40% of older persons for whom commercial retirement villages life-style choices will never be an affordable option. In the not too distant future, it is therefore not difficult to imagine the social and economic conditions of 60 and 70 years ago re-emerging for those of older years. In response to this concern, further development of WesleyCare services is already being considered and will almost certainly include a greater emphasis on social housing needs and community based services.

Such care and concern, driven by Gospel values that call the Church to confront the conditions that perpetuate injustice, will always be a ministry of costly service. Methodist Mission Christchurch maintains funding contracts with a number of government departments, and the support of the Church, wider community and commercial sector is as equally important as the prudent management of financial performance.

Concerning financial performance, although Methodist Mission Christchurch has considerably expanded its services during the past two years, it nevertheless concluded the year ending 30 June 2006 well within budget estimates and with depreciation fully invested. However, a large proportion of the end of year surplus was due to the deferred settlement of property transactions from previous years, the retrospective settlement of DHB contract negotiations and the strong performance of long term investments. It is unlikely similar conditions will prevail in future years.

But Methodist Mission Christchurch will continue to make its focus upon people, rather than profit. It remains firmly committed to providing services that address the cause, rather than simply the effect of the difficult and often distressing circumstances that too many continue to face. It is about creating cycles of hope.

# **Methodist Connect- Dunedin**



At the start of the year we crystallised some of our thinking of the past few years around our way of working, and our move away from individual services provided 'to' or 'for' people in "need" towards work with individuals, families and communities to increase connection and neighbourhood, in a change of name from 'Mission' to 'Methodist Connect". The change of our name signalled what was to become a year of change, albeit change with a continuing strong theme of developing the work of recent years moving from providing traditional charitable social services to involvement in work which creates opportunities for people, strengthens cohesion and participation in community, and contributes to social transformation.

Transformation begins at home, and we are working hard to increase connection in the way we work; to work as a more holistic organisation, working across generations, drawing together teams within the organisation, and forming partnerships to work collaboratively with other groups in our community, where we do not have capacity ourselves. This means that community development is no longer a 'division' of our work, but an integral part of everything we engage in. Our community development work is increasingly focused on work which strengthens the South Dunedin community, where our services have also been predominantly located. Our office also has a new home in the heart of the South Dunedin community, affirming a decision two years ago to locate our office near our services.

As well as moving offices, we have also relocated and revitalised our café, from an inner city coffee bar, to become what we hope will be a hub of community life, with Internet access, information, support and encouragement. Community learning opportunities and advocacy are close by, as well as the more established safe, welcoming friendship and hospitality we have offered since 1969.

Change hasn't just been physical. Nicola Grundy moved to Auckland and new responsibilities, necessitating a further change in leadership, and a review of how best to combine the needs for professional leadership of not for profit social development services, with the need for Connexional oversight, and strong relationships and commitment to the Methodist context, which incorporates building Cycles Of Hope. As this process continues, Nick Orbell has acted as General Manager.

Our services have developed well over the past year. In the unstable environment of tertiary education, Approach has continued to develop, incorporating Aspire training, a small community provider working predominantly with youth, during the year, and retaining and expanding educational services in the community and within the prison service. Lifelong learning remains a key strategy in empowering people to create opportunities to contribute to their communities and to develop their own solutions.

Lifelong learning begins in early childhood, and backed by the Centre of Innovation research project, our early childhood education centres show a strengthening culture of commitment to quality and professional delivery. Support for families, including family learning, is an important ingredient of our intergenerational approach, recognising that individuals belong in families, and families create communities.

Similarly, our work in support of older people has long attempted to work in the context of community, as distinct from institutional service provision. This process was further advanced with a decision to cease centre based activity programs in favour of developing networks of support, and opportunity for continued active participation in community life for older people.

**Moving forward**: We aim to continue to develop work which strengthens a genuine sense of community and of neighbourhood, of belonging, inclusion and interdependence, and which supports people to develop skills and opportunities to contribute to their communities, and to have those contributions valued.

# Key staff changes

Rev David Barakana Havea was inducted as Moderator of the UCSI in December 2005. Mr John Sasambule was appointed Acting General Secretary in September 2005 following the resignation of Gina Tekulu.

# Honiara unrest

Unrest and destruction of property broke out in Honiara on 18 April 2006. This followed the appointment of a new Prime Minister after the general election in the Solomon Islands. Pastoral letters of support and encouragement were sent to the Moderator of the UCSI and the Superintendent Minister of the Honiara Circuit. A similar letter was also sent to the General Secretary of the Solomon Islands Christian Association with a donation of \$1,000 to an appeal for victims of the unrest.

# Assembly office communications strategy

In June 2005 NZ\$12,000 was provided toward the first stage of the strategy which involved: reconnection; reinstallation of equipment; equipment rental costs; purchase of a computer; and setting up a communications room. The second stage in 2006 is to fund the installation of a PABX system.

# Copra project

This project was launched in November 2004 with an establishment grant, followed in December 2005 by an interest free loan for a boat purchase. A detailed report was received from the project manager in May 2006. The report outlined plans for the short term (2006), medium term (2007-8), and the long term (2009-13). The way ahead is seen to be in making the project a joint venture between the Vella Lavella Centennial Agency (of the UCSI) and the Bolopoe Corporation (a local tribally based trading entity). The Bolopoe Corporation has agreed to a grant of SBD150,000 to the project, sufficient to repay the MM&E loan of SBD120,000. MM&E has agreed to this. It means that MM&E has seeded the project with a grant of SBD130,000, facilitated a boat purchase through a bridging loan of SBD120,00. Through the new joint venture the project will have an assured future.

# Helena Goldie Hospital

MM&E continues to pay salaries for the Chief Nursing Officer, Chris Leve, and for relieving nurses. An extension to the hospital office space funded by MM&E has been completed. The next project is the Davinia Taylor Memorial Hall, to be used for staff training and social purposes, and funded from donations received by Mission and Ecumenical. Ailsa Stewart of Wanganui, a former senior tutor at the Nurse Aide Training School (NATS), has been fundraising for the school. The medical superintendent, Dr Dina Sailo, has shared with us his future vision and plans for the hospital. Besides the Davinia Taylor Memorial Hall, these include: upgrading the status of the NATS so that it can offer a Diploma in Nursing course from 2010; and renovation of the hospital buildings.

# Special appeal 2006

This appeal to fund the assist in funding the building of a youth and children's centre at Munda has generated quite a lot of interest. As of 30 June thirty eight donations have been received, amounting to \$4,149.

# Secretary's visit to UCSI in 2006

The secretary will visit the UCSI in September 2006, This will include travel to Munda for discussion with assembly office and Helena Goldie Hospital staff; as well as travel to Vonunu on Vella Lavella Island to discuss and see the copra project funded by MM&E, at work.

# United Church in Papua New Guinea

# Rarongo Theological College

Rebuilding. In 2005 MM&E provided \$14,000 towards the cost of rebuilding Rarongo. In 2007 the second stage of rebuilding will take place. There is interest from church members here in joining work parties from Australia

Vehicle purchase. MM&E has paid for a replacement diesel truck to serve the theological college which is about an hour's distance from Rabaul, the town where supplies are purchased.

Library. MM&E continues to purchase books for the Rarongo library. Funds have also been provided for the purchase of a computer, a photocopier, and an air-conditioning unit for the library.

Scholarships. Scholarships which cover payment of course fees have been provided for four students in training for ministry at Rarongo Theological College. Students have been selected by Rarongo faculty staff on the basis of financial need and study potential

**TIMALCentre-Malmaluan.** MM&E has paid for the installation of a water pump and pipes to carry water from an already drilled well to the buildings of this lay training centre in East New Britain Province.

# Bougainville

A PAC grant has funded a new church administration centre at Buka, to replace the one destroyed in the recent conflict on Bougainville Island. The cost of office furniture and equipment has also been met from this grant. The centre was officially opened on 16 July 2006.

# Special appeal 2005

This special appeal was to assist the United Church of Papua New Guinea to equip its leaders for more effective work with children and youth, with the money being used to bring leaders together for quality training that will lead to more effective work with children and young people. A total of \$5,000 has been forwarded to the UCPNG.

# Secretary's visit

The secretary will next visit the UCPNG in 2007.

# Appreciation

MM&E appreciates the considerable support it receives from Methodist Women's Fellowship groups, parishes, and from individual church members for mission activity in the life of the United Church in the Solomon Islands, Helena Goldie Hospital, and the United Church in Papua New Guinea. This second mile giving enables us to do that much more in assisting our partner mission churches.

# **Disaster assistance**

Five grants have been made from the disaster assistance fund since our last report to conference: \$1,000 for Pakistan earthquake victims; \$500 for victims of the El Salvador mudslides; \$3,000 for victims of the conflict in East Timor. These donations were channeled through Christian World Service. \$1,000 was contributed to the Solomon Islands Christian Association, appeal to assist the victims of the unrest in Honiara in April 2006. \$1,000 was sent to the Methodist Church in Fiji for the rebuilding of the Koroi Hostel of Ballantine Memorial school, Suva, after its destruction by fire on 13 June.

# Pacific labour market migration

New Zealand has a seasonal labour shortage in the horticultural sector. Fruit and vegetable producers constantly complain of a work force shortage at harvest time. Pacific Island countries are in a position to readily provide a seasonal work force, and being economically 'poor' countries they would greatly benefit from the income workers would bring home. There are growing populations and a burgeoning potential work force in the Pacific Islands. However prospects for employment in their own countries is limited. The needs of both Pacific Island nations and New Zealand could be met by introducing a carefully targeted seasonal labour migration scheme.

In the Solomon Islands unemployed youths say the government should pressure Australia and New Zealand to accept temporary workers to reduce the unemployment rate in the Solomons They say the arrangement would help young people to raise needed money to help their families and start a new life after dropping out of school.

They see the sending of temporary workers overseas as easing the problems faced by unemployed youths in the Solomons. They have heard and read about the possibility of a temporary workers scheme and are keen to be part of it. They have urged the Solomon Islands government to look into the issue and press for its implementation for the sake of disadvantaged youths. Sir Michael Somare of Papua New Guinea who will soon become chair of the Pacific Forum says a Pacific regional labour scheme is high on his agenda. Indeed the proposal is even now under consideration by forum staff. As Pacific Island nations come under increasing pressure from Australia and New Zealand to open up their economies to free trade, so they are pushing for labour reforms that would give them greater access to Australia and New Zealand. This would enable their unemployed to work overseas on a seasonal basis and so make good money to bring home, inject into the local economy, and raise living standards.

A seasonal labour migration scheme has the support of a number of groups in New Zealand, including producer bodies, the Pacific Cooperation Foundation (representing public and private sectors in New Zealand and Pacific Island countries), the New Zealand Pacific Business Council, as well as Pacific Island country leaders. In August 2006 the World Bank World Bank published a significant report on this matter, "At Home and Away: Expanding job opportunities for Pacific Islanders Through Labor Mobility". It explores in detail the implications of such a scheme for both Pacific Island nations as well as Australia and New Zealand. Foreign Minister, Winston Peters has indicated he is open to considering a temporary work schemes for Pacific Island peoples and that he will ensure that the World Bank report is discussed at the Pacific Forum meeting to be held in October 2006. The church should now lobby government to introduce a short term migrant labour scheme that will benefit the economies of both Pacific Island nations and New Zealand.

# Ecumenical relationships

# Methodist Ecumenical Consultation

Conference 2005 received a report that led to the establishing of the Methodist Ecumenical Consultation, to meet twice a year. A meeting was held in March and another is scheduled for September. The purpose of the consultation is relationship building, communication and information sharing, as well as dialogue on ecumenical matters of mutual interest to the Mission and Ecumenical Committee, Faith and Order Committee, and Mission Resourcing (Board of Ministry). It is an informal consultation and not a formal decision making body.

# Anglican Methodist dialogue

The MM&E secretary, and committee members Sheila Thorne and Uesifili Unasa participate in this dialogue with Faith and Order committee convenor Terry Wall. The dialogue met in May 2006 to consider two papers. One prepared by Janet Crawford on "Episcopacy: Ecumenical Problem or Possibility." The other by Terry Wall, "On the reconciliation of Anglican and Methodist Ministries in Aotearoa New Zealand." The dialogue meets again on 8 July.

# New ecumenical initiative

Rev Bob Scott a member of the Strategic Thinking Group (STG) working on the proposal for a new ecumenical initiative shared developments with the MM&E Committee in May. Two crucial issues have been that of authority (who speaks for the churches?) and representation (who represents the churches?) Three proposals are be now being prepared for consideration by a church leaders meeting in September 2006, then to be shared more widely with regional presentations for a more grass roots response. Proposal one is the status quo, which means leaving things as they are right now (with no national structure of any kind) but with an invitation for the churches to share together. Proposal two is networking involving a minimal structure high on trust and low on organisation, with no formal membership. It would comprise: church leaders, an advisory group, a hub with two staff people (part-time). The task of the hub is to keep things moving by facilitating reflection, intercession and projects. Proposal three is a forum. This would require: adherence to a core statement of commitment in order to belong; a council of church leaders (the key leader and three others from each member church) that would meet every two years; an executive (comprising the key leader and one other from each church) that would meet each six months. The task of the forum is to: invite churches to come together; initiate dialogues between the churches; support agreed programmes or projects. Proposals two and three envisage the employment of two part-time officers, one to administer and the other to facilitate.

# **Christian World Service**

(This report has been provided by Christian World Service.)

Christian World Service (CWS) is the development, justice and aid agency of New Zealand churches and its work depends on the support of New Zealanders, particularly its member congregations. CWS thanks Methodists and members of Cooperating Ventures (CVs) for the dedicated support they give to CWS. During the last year, the 2% aid grant from the Methodist Church (\$11,974) was used for programs in Uganda, Sri Lanka, Haiti, India, Nicaragua, Sri Lanka, Fiji, Tonga and the Philippines. Work ranged from family food

Sri Lanka, Haiti, India, Nicaragua, Sri Lanka, Fiji, Tonga and the Philippines. Work ranged from family food production and new income opportunities, to HIV and AIDS community care, environmental protection and human rights training.

The support received from the William Waters Trust for the benefit of children worldwide was used to support the work of House of Passage, Brazil and BAERDA, Bougainville. House of Passage provides hope, support and training to vulnerable girls in the violent and drug ridden slums of Recife, giving them the opportunity for a better future. In the isolated and post conflict region of Bougainville, BAERDA is providing village based education, including literacy in local languages.

CWS is grateful for the continued partnership with the Methodist Women's Fellowship (MWF) and Association of Presbyterian Women (APW), who select a CWS partner for their annual special project. This year's project focused on the HIV and AIDS program of the Church of Uganda. CWS produced a video on their work as part of its annual study series, which was used by many MWF groups. From 2000 to 2005, the APW/MWF special project has raised \$247,290 for CWS partners. To this, CWS has been able to add subsidy funding of \$834,201 from the NZ government under the VASS scheme, a total contribution of \$1,081,491 to people in severe need. In 2005, CWS received \$10,563 from the MWF towards work with impoverished Palestinians.

Methodist and CV giving to the Christmas Appeal and emergencies remains strong. The 2005 Christmas Appeal raised \$605,000. Your much appreciated assistance helps CWS meet its objectives each year. Some highlights of 2005-2006 include:

Fair Trade Fortnight: CWS promoted the annual Fair Trade Fortnight in May as part of its campaign for just trade rules. Over 90 churches held a 'fair cuppa' Fair Trade morning teas. The response was extremely positive and CWS is now working with Trade Aid to provide Fair Trade Church certificates for parishes making a permanent switch to fair trade tea, coffee, and sugar - providing producers in developing countries a fair price and benefits, like health and education services, for their communities.

Wipe Out Poverty Week: The 2005 youth fundraiser drew more support than ever before, with some new initiatives including art auctions, sponsored church sleepovers, and youth groups selling breakfast to Sunday morning congregations. Nine Methodist groups participated in 2005.

Response to emergencies: The past year has been another difficult year for vulnerable communities affected by disasters. CWS ran appeals for the Pakistan Earthquake, the Yogyakarta (Indonesia) earthquake, East African drought, the Timor crisis, Hurricane Stan (Central America) and the Zimbabwe clearances and is grateful for the generosity shown. Working through ACT International (Action by Churches Together), a global alliance of churches and church agencies providing humanitarian relief, as well as its own local partners, CWS can be confident that the funding is reaching people in need, that affected communities have a say in their own relief and reconstruction, and that everyone is treated with respect and dignity.

Educational Resources: CWS makes free resources available for individuals and groups wanting to understand more about the causes of global poverty and appropriate ways to take action against poverty. Many are designed for church audiences and over the last year have included Youth Topics (for 12-17 year olds) on sweat shop labour and education, World Watch (for 5-12 year olds) on Nicaragua and the Solomon Islands, and the Video/DVD Study on HIV and AIDS in Uganda. CWS also produced the Churches' Agency on International Issues (CAII) Hot Topic on the War on Terror. Worship materials were written on the Make Poverty History campaign, Fair Trade, Refugees and Displaced Persons, and World Food Day.

**Campaigns:** CWS has continued to lead Jubilee Aotearoa, the campaign to cancel the unjust debt of the world's poorest countries. Sustained global pressure led to the introduction of the Multilateral Debt Reduction Initiative by the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank in 2006. This will make a significant difference for poor people in the 19 countries who will immediately benefit as countries like Zambia spend more on much needed health and education programmes. CWS is grateful for the support of New Zealand churches in these efforts.

CWS has also been active with other agencies in the **Make Poverty History** campaign around a platform arguing for trade justice, to drop the debt, more and better aid, and an end to child poverty in Aotearoa New Zealand; the Point 7 campaign to increase New Zealand aid spending to internationally agreed levels and has advocated over human rights issues in countries of concern. In addition to promoting Fair Trade Fortnight, CWS has continued to advocate for fairer international trade rules.

VASS Review: In 2005/6 CWS was reviewed by NZAID under the auspices of the Voluntary Agency Support Scheme (VASS), by which the organisation receives a 1 to 4 subsidy for partner groups. CWS was found to be in full compliance with the requirements of the government and the development community. In addition, the reviewers noted they were impressed with the strong learning and participatory and cooperative structure of the organisation as a whole. They also felt CWS paid significant attention to, and had a greater understanding of, the context in which their partners work than most agencies and that this was an excellent example to others.

**CWS Partners:** For many countries in which CWS partners work it has been a difficult year of political, social and often violent upheaval (eg: Uganda, Sudan, Timor Leste, Sri Lanka, Palestine). Despite this, CWS partners have not only survived but carried out creative work to improve the lives of their communities. Some particular highlights include:

- increased funding for women's development in Tonga
- a new funding partnership in Zimbabwe (where a women's film making trust is working with communities to produce educational videos about their own problems and solutions)

HIV and AIDS, girl education, and peace building

the expansion of Fedwe's work in India following tsunami relief work, where strong and articulate groups of women Dalits have been formed to fight discrimination and improve their livelihoods and community services.

**Diamond anniversary:** 2005 marked 60 years of CWS taking action against poverty on behalf of the churches. Reflecting on CWS's work of the last six decades it was clear much has changed in the context of global poverty and injustice and in the type of response needed. What has remained a constant is the strong connection Methodists and CVs have with CWS. CWS looks forward to what this continuing relationship can achieve in the future.

# **Churches Agency on International Issues**

During the year this agency, which comes under Christian World Service, but is funded separately by the three member churches (Anglican, Methodist and Salvation Army), published a 'hot topic' on 'The War on Terror". It has proved to be a most useful resource for groups wishing to look behind the headlines at this most difficult issue that confronts us all. By conference time the first of three hot topic resources on issues facing New Zealand's Pacific Island neighbours will be available. It will focus on issues of economic viability. The second resource will focus on climate change, and the third on HIV and AIDS as well as other health issues. Copies of all CAII resources are available from CWS, or can be downloaded from the CWS web site http://www.cws.org.nz/resources/international.asp

# Ecumenical Coalition for Justice

This is an informal coalition of people from the Anglican, Catholic, Presbyterian and Methodist Churches. It has produced resources on free trade, for general elections, and on child poverty, the Treaty of Waitangi and the foreshore and seabed debate. Currently the coalition is working on an educational project which explores the relationship between affluence and poverty. Some funding has been secured to produce a web-based resource, for group and individual use, which will include: material outlining current understandings of economic growth and their contribution to the relationship between affluence and poverty; biblical and theological understandings; practical responses. The group's website is: www.socialjustice.org.nz where resources relating to the issues it is working on are posted.

# **Christian Conference of Asia**

CCA has a new general secretary: Dr Prawate Khid-Arn, who previously served as CCA executive secretary for development and service, The CCA office which has been based in Hong Kong for a number of years has relocated to Chiang Mai, Thailand. The Church of Christ in Thailand has provided land for CCA to build on. CCA has four programme areas: General Secretariat; Faith, Mission and Unity; Justice, International Affairs; Development and Service; Ecumenical Formation, Gender Justice and Youth Empowerment.

A recent CCA consultation considered a paper from Dr Mathews George Chunakara "A Survey of the Ecumenical Scenario in Asia: Prospects and Challenges" which commented on the declining factors of the ecumenical movement in Asia These include: crises of leadership, proliferation of ecumenical organisations at national and regional levels, increasing denominationalism, lack of ecumenical formation of the younger generation, lack of capacity building efforts, lack of vision and theological thinking. Ecumenical organisations at all levels were challenged to actively move to revitalise the ecumenical movement in Asia.

# World Council of Churches

Thousands of Christians from many nations attended the 9th Assembly of the World Council of Churches. For ten days they prayed, discussed and reflected on the assembly theme, "God in your grace, transform the world." The 691 voting delegates, representing 348 Protestant, orthodox, Anglican, United and other WCC member churches made decisions that will guide the work of the council in the years ahead. They adopted a consensus method of decision making, aimed at ensuring full participation by council members. Prayer shaped the life of the assembly with participants gathering daily in the worship tent and in small study groups. They sang and prayed in the traditions and languages of various churches and cultures. Latin American cultures enhanced many assembly events, especially during a day devoted to dramatic presentations of the history of the region and its churches. The Mutirao (A Brazilian word meaning 'coming together') provided space for exploring a variety of issues and concerns. Youth played a very visible role at this assembly, joining in the calls for economic justice, an end to violence, greater interreligious understanding, and above all, for the visible unity of the church of Jesus Christ.

The assembly agreed on a new document on Christian unity, "Called to be the One Church" and urged member churches to give priority to questions of unity that would enable the ecumenical movement to offer to the world the "coherent, grace-filled spiritual message of Christianity." The mid-term of the Decade to Overcome Violence was celebrated with a call to organise an ecumenical peace convocation. Statements were approved on several issues of international concern. Distinguished visitors included the Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams and Archbishop Desmond Tutu. Post-assembly programme work will focus on a limited number of core issues

and Archbishop Desmond Tutu. Post-assembly programme work will focus on a limited number of core issues with a strong public profile to the WCC's witness to the world. The New Zealand member churches representative on the Central Committee is Herarere Clark of the Anglican Church.

Mark Gibson, our church's delegate to the assembly shares the following reflection. "In an increasingly globalised and yet divided world, where the connectionalities of death are growing stronger it is vital that, in the words of Latin American Methodists, we affirm "conexionalidad a favor de la vida" (connexionality on behalf of life). In other words we need to build intentional relationships between ourselves and others that are committed to moving the earth community in the direction of a life-giving rather than deathly experience. At the 9<sup>th</sup> WCC Assembly this spiritually-inspired 'connexionality' for life was celebrated. Throughout the assembly we heard how churches praying and working together through the WCC are seriously engaging around the most difficult issues of our time, and offering life-giving witness in the places of greatest human suffering and death. The economic globalisation, and militarisation/ terrorism; is offering real hope in the face of the HIV and AIDS pandemic; and beginning to seriously address urgent ecological issues such as global warming. As a church with an ethos of connexionality and partnership it is vital that Te Hahi O Aotearoa continue to meaningfully participate in the ongoing life and work of the WCC, and celebrate being part of the global body of Christ."

# Interreligious relationships

Relationships with other faiths are now recognised to be both an important mission as well as an ecumenical issue. The MM&E secretary has served on the executive of the Auckland Interfaith Council which organised a national interfaith gathering in September 2004. The secretary also attends meetings of the Councils of Christians and Jews, and Christians and Muslims. His four weeks' study leave in 2006 is being used to study "Methodists exploring interreligious understandings".

# World Methodist relationships

# World Methodist Council and Conference

The World Methodist Council met in Seoul, Korea 18-19 July. Mary Caygill and Jill van de Geer attended as our church's representatives. The council meeting was followed by the World Methodist Conference, 20-24 July around the theme "God in Christ Reconciling". In addition to Mary Caygill and Jill van de Geer, Nigel Hanscamp, Maa'imoa Moa, Kepu Moa, David Pratt and Anne Stephenson, attended the conference. Reports on the Council meeting and the Conference will be provided later.

# Methodist Consultative Council of the Pacific

The Methodist Consultative Council of the Pacific (MCCP) met in Tonga in April. President John Salmon was our church's representative. He provided reflections on the meeting in the 10<sup>th</sup> of the month e-messenger for May and 'Touchstone' in June.

The 2007 meeting will be hosted by New Zealand and held in Auckland 16-19 April. President John Salmon is in the process of setting up a small organizing group for this meeting.

# **Education and communication**

The secretary has been involved in a range of communication and educational activities. These have included: monthly newsletters; occasional papers; articles in 'Touchstone'; preaching engagements; presentations to MWF groups on overseas mission relationships; displays to promote Mission and Ecumenical relationships and activity. PowerPoint presentations have been used where appropriate and possible. The secretary has engaged in professional development, study and reading in the areas of mission and ecumenism.

# Secretary's performance review

The committee Convenor and the Vice-President, Mary West, have completed a performance review on the work of the secretary in August. The outcome has been reported to the Mission and Ecumenical Committee.

Our vision is to see mission and ecumenical endeavour as the very core of our church's being. Mission to be given expression at the global as well as the local level. Existing partner church relationships being renewed

# Key goals

Our key goals are to:

- Use the "Transforming Mission" and the "To be Methodist is to be Ecumenical" papers as working documents that provide a theological base for the work of the committee and secretary.
- Support and strengthen the world-wide mission of the Methodist Church of New Zealand, in particular the partnership relationships with the United Church of Papua New Guinea and the United Church of the Solomon Islands, through personal visits, regular correspondence and sharing of resources
- Promote and strengthen relationships with ecumenical agencies of which the Methodist Church of New Zealand is a member: Christian World Service, Churches Agency on International Issues, Christian Conference of Asia, and the World Council of Churches.
- Promote the relationships of the Methodist Church of New Zealand with world Methodism.
- Produce resources on ecumenism and mission, suitable for use in parishes and rohe.
- Further develop effective communication with parishes, rohe and uniting congregations, through monthly newsletters, occasional papers, information leaflets and articles in "Touchstone".

# Suggested decisions

- 2. Conference notes the continuing significant relationship with the United Church in the Solomon Islands, and the United Church in Papua New Guinea, and the assistance being provided to them through Methodist Mission and Ecumenical.

# **Communications Committee Report to Conference 2006**

# Website

A contract has been signed to redesign the website to update its navigation and appearance. There will also be a number of new features.

- The ability to replace the 'www' part of the internet address with your church's name or the title of an event. Try touchstone.methodist.org.nz and go straight to the summaries of our award winning paper, or conference.methodist.org.nz for an update on Methodist Conference.
- The ability to link larger files which will mean we can provide podcasts of sermons, lectures and important events. A podcast is an audio file which can be listened to online, or saved to listen to later. Some audio files of this Conference will be available at <u>conference.methodist.org.nz</u> [do not use www.]
- The ability to replace the photographs on the front page easily, which will give a continual new look to the site. Your photographs of people and events are required to help this to happen.

In the event of an emergency such as a flu pandemic the website may be an important source of information. It is therefore vital that contact details be accurate. The synchronising of this information from the Connexional office data base to the website is being investigated.

The ongoing aim is that the website will be the place to go for essential information and resources.

# **Pandemic Planning**

The Committee was pleased to receive some discussion papers dealing with the planning for a flu pandemic. It is realised if such a pandemic arises then public gatherings, including worship are likely to be banned. How then might the church communicate with its members?

The papers supplied to us discussed local arrangements such as telephone trees. For such systems to work they would need to be simple so that if key people become unwell others can easily take over.

In addition we raise these possibilities:

**Rest Homes:** Most have some sort of intercom system. It may be possible to 'broadcast' services to residents using this facility.

**Radio:** Access radio is already being used by some parishes. Do we need to train some people to use radio? Is this something which local ministers associations can take up? Are there existing programmes and resources already available which could be used?

**Television:** Clearly the most appealing medium, however once a pandemic had started it would be difficult to make new programmes. What is already available? Should a stock of suitable services be built up?

Websites: Services could be available on line, but we recognise that many do not have the ability to access this.

In the event of an earthquake or tsunami, it might be possible to gather, but the normal means of communication, including telephones may not work. As recent snows and floods have shown, thinking through how we keep in touch before an emergency event pays dividends. Parish councils and pastoral committees might consider the plans they or their local communities currently have in place.

We also note that our congregations tend to be much more scattered geographically than they once were. This means that it may be impractical to support all members, or use church buildings as a gathering point. It is easy to take a pot of soup next door. It may be impossible to take it across a city. Instead we strongly encourage forming partnerships with local councils and Civil Defence to ensure that our members are trained and confident to take helping initiatives in the communities where they live.

# Media Workshops:

The Committee is working on how to help Parishes, Synods and Boards engage with their wider communities using the media. It is important to know how to take the initiative in telling our stories. For example if a church building is to be sold, the parish could prepare a press release outlining what is happening and why, with a contact name and number for further information. This would prevent the situation earlier this year where the media were contacting people they had identified in the church for comment. These were individuals who had little knowledge of the sale, and were not the ones to speak on behalf of the seller. Workshop topics could include: 'How to write a press release', 'Which media to target', 'How to get information to the media'.

# Media Person for Methodist Church of New Zealand

This was suggested in last year's Conference Report. The Conference resolution asked the Committee to scope the position.

A person with relationships with the media who can assist the church in its contact with the media.

To help the church move from being frightened of the media to working with the media.

Such a person would:

- Support the President and General Secretary when media are seeking comment
- Provide advice when the media is especially interested in an event in the church.
- Have knowledge of who can be a spokesperson for the church on particular issues.
- Be able to work with the media.
- Be able to contact appropriate media people.
- Have a good use of language and understanding of the church.

A job description will be brought to Conference as a supplementary Report.

# Email protocols:

Recently Auckland Synod used a moderated e-mail list to enable a free ranging discussion on issues surrounding the Presidency. There is no question that the use of an e-mail list enabled participation in a way that a one-off face to face meeting would not have achieved. Participants had time to think about their response, could reflect on a range of responses, and do so when time allowed. However, it also raised some important issues for the use of the technology in general. Reading a message on a screen gives none of the nuance, tone or body language of a face to face conversation. It is easy to misunderstand someone's contribution, with no immediate ability to seek clarification and at times people become much bolder in their opinions because it feels depersonalised.

Following the printing of a summary of the conversation in Touchstone, The Communications Committee was contacted and asked for guidelines for the use of e-mail chat rooms. The particular concern was that some may have worded their e-mail contributions differently if they had known they were to be published in another medium. Also raised with the committee was the concern that e-mail conversations have the capacity to become too personal, with little or no redress to those who feel damaged. In a face to face meeting an immediate rebuttal would be possible, or if the contribution was merely opinion or hearsay, it may not be offered with the person sitting across the room.

Most workplaces have protocols for the use of e-mail, to ensure the best is made of this new way of working, while limiting its short comings.

# Protocols for use of e-mail and e-mail groups.

- 1. The rules of group work apply, as do the laws of defamation and liability. In effect all material posted to such groups is in the public domain. [Note: Many search engines will 'find' e-mails which have been sent to groups]
- E-mail groups should be moderated. That is a person or persons who have responsibility to ensure (responsible and) appropriate participation. The moderator has the right to limit inappropriate participation.
- 3. If the findings of the group are to be published or shared outside of the forum of the group this should be made clear at the outset.
- 4. In the event of a dispute over the content of an e-mail posted to the group, the moderator would be asked to take up the issue with the person who posted the original message.
- 5. In general e-mail groups are best suited to discussions around principals, projects and ideas. They are not suitable when persons or personalities are involved. E.g. Good for discussing Public Questions issues, Worship preparation, preparing and finalising a report. Not suitable for discussing which possible applicants for a position are most suitable.
- 6. E-mail is not a substitute for face to face. A face to face meeting may be necessary to finalise any report, or paper which arises from an e-mail conversations.

E-mail and web based chat technology provide new and innovative ways for us to work together. E-mail is not suitable for every situation however, and groups need to take care of individuals' privacy and rights in any process which is used.

# Review of Guidelines for PAC Media and Communications Fund

The guidelines for the fund have not been reviewed by Conference in its nearly 20 years of operation. As the fund struggles to respond to all the requests made of it, it seems appropriate to review the guidelines and report any changes to Conference 2007.

The Committee thanks Central South Island Synod for raising a number of issues which will be part of the review.

- The size of the committee [currently 4] does not appear to have an external appointment process.
- That there be maximum allowable grants and a maximum percentage of the total cost.

- That all grants be reviewed and unspent money returned to the fund.
- Greater consideration be given to the use of loans

Parishes, Synods, Boards, Rohe will be invited to make submissions on the guidelines and operation of the fund in 2007.

The Communications Committee is recommending that in future an application form be used, giving greater consistency to information supplied. It is proposed that this would apply for the next round of applications in June 2007.

# Suggested Decisions:

- 5. Conference notes that many parts of the community are being asked to prepare for the effects of a civil emergency and strongly encourages Parishes to work in partnership with their local communities as they make their plans.

# **Churches Broadcasting Commission (CBC)**

Under the requirements of both Radio NZ and TVNZ charters, we have continued to monitor their "spiritual type' programmes that go to air. We congratulate TVNZ for its courage to support the new programme "My God'. We would have preferred its own time slot, rather than using some of the "Praise Be" time, even though the 'Praise Be' would have been repeats. It is a NZ programme about NZer's and their spiritual journeys. We will encourage TVNZ and NZ on Air to continue with this progress.

"Praise Be' celebrated its 20 years of continual programmes and CBC looks forward to another 20 years. It was a sad time for some viewers when Graeme Thompson stepped down from being the frontline presenter but we are positive Chris Nicol will be as successful with his different style. While there is funding available and the 'ratings' continue to be so high, we are certain "Praise Be" will remain on air.

Again, the excitement for this year is our Scholarship.

We gave another 4 scholarships, each to the value of \$1500 and are delighted CBA (Christian Broadcasting Association) worked alongside us in donating a scholarship, rather than doing it on their own. We hope this will be an ongoing partnership.

The recipients must have an association or affiliation with a Christian Church and it is encouraging to know all awardees, who have completed their tertiary education, have positions in the media, mainly in radio.

It was great to have one of our first awardees, Joy McArthur, now a journalist with Radio NZ, talk about her experiences in working in the media. Joy came to present the 2006 scholarships and an interesting comment she made during her talk was about how one of the selection panel at her interview said "her attitude to people and life" was a decision in her selection. Joy is positive this comes from her ongoing Christian affiliation.

The article in "Touchstone" on the 2006 scholarships and their importance has been rewarded. CBC has received a few small donations from parish members who feel the scholarship is worthy of their gift. This is very much appreciated by CBC. Each donation is followed up with a letter of thanks and a taxdeductible receipt. As you well know, obtaining donations for Christian work is not an easy task.

CBC always believes that if it can continue with these scholarships for a few more years, the 'dream' we initially had must pay dividends in many ways in the years to come. Our 'dream' of having 'Christian' minded journalists in the media is paying off about 2 years sooner than we anticipated. We will continue to monitor the work of these young people.

# PAC Media & Communications Fund

Almost \$100,000 in applications were for items such as data projectors, laptops, screens, speakers, amplifiers, mics etc. We believe this committee is now unable to meet the ever increasing demands of applications for technological advancement in today's environment. This figure is more than double our allocation grant without considering any other type of criteria for this grant.

We realise technology is an integral part of worship today, but the small amount of money we have to allocate cannot now cover this area. Therefore we have turned down many applications for this reason.

# Methodist Publishing Board Report to Conference 2006

The Board is happy to report that Touchstone has received a \$500,000 endowment grant from the PAC Distribution Group. The Board is profoundly grateful for this affirmation of the importance of Touchstone to the life of the Connexion. We will do everything in our power to insure that the Endowment is invested responsibly and wisely.

The Board also thanks the many parishes and individuals that have contributed generously to the continuation and support of Touchstone. Around \$20,000 has been received since Touchstone launched its appeal and the Board and Editorial staff are enormously grateful and encouraged by this financial support. It has deepened our commitment to provide the Connexion with a paper that is ecumenical, prophetic and inspirational. To all those who have given donations to Touchstone the Board and Staff say thank you. We will do our best as a Board and as staff to honour your support. We seek to provide a paper which not only informs but also challenges the church to address the issues which are influencing and shaping out lives.

Although we still need to raise funds to ensure Touchstone's long term viability, the Board recognises the importance of keeping the paper relevant to the life of the Connexion and of growing the endowment. The Board also invites parishes to explore a variety of ways of making Touchstone available to others. We encourage parishes to distribute Touchstone through their Pastoral Care programmes. Parishes also might consider giving copies of Touchstone to local community services such as the local doctor's surgery, the pharmacy, the hairdresser, rest homes, the dentist or even veterinary offices. The more creative churches can become in their distribution of the paper, the better.

Paul Titus and his team work hard at producing a first-class paper of interest not only to the Connexion but also to the wider ecumenical community. We have made the paper free to all parishes, increased the circulation significantly, increased our advertising revenue and actively sought other sources of income.

The Board is also exploring with the staff other options such as:

- Increasing the number of pages and the content of Touchstone while reducing the number of issues.
- Balancing advertising revenue needs with available print space.
- Reviewing the format of the paper in order to determine if there is a more cost-effective format.

While the Touchstone staff have increased advertising revenues, unfortunately this has been offset by increasing distribution charges resulting from rising petrol costs. The Church can be sure that the Board and staff will do everything they can to produce a quality paper efficiently and in the most cost-effective way.

The Board wishes to take this opportunity to express its gratitude to Paul Titus, for the excellent job he has done as editor, to Pieter Van der Berg for his work with advertisers, to Karen Isaacs, for her efficient management of distribution and correspondence and Julian Doesburg for the design and lay-out of the paper.

We are grateful to the whole church for its affirmation of the value and importance of Touchstone. The Board and the staff will continue working to produce a quality paper and to resource the Church in other ways.

# Methodist Publishing – Making use of a resource

The purpose of this report is to invite the church to consider the production of a greater range of books and resources.

Methodist Publishing is incorporated under the Charitable trusts Act 1957 and exists as an independent body, to be a specialist publisher for the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

At the time it was established it was reported to Conference. "The reason for establishing Methodist Publishing is primarily to protect the Church from legal recourse if anything published by a party of the Methodist Church was found to be libellous or an infringement of copyright. At present it is understood that the Methodist Church is completely exposed to being sued, with no limitations to our liability. That is, if any party associated with the Methodist Church at all levels would be at risk."

Methodist Publishing would also assist in obtaining ISBN numbers and ensuring the church complies with the responsibility to lodge three copies of all publications with the National Library.

The Board of Methodist Publishing draws the Churches' attention to the liability concerns and urges all who engage in any publishing activity to carefully examine legal issues in publishing their work. The purpose of this report is to invite the church to consider the production of a greater range of books and resources for the Church.

In this age when it is all too easy to download material from others places, it is vitally important to hear our own voices and grapple with our setting in Aotearoa New Zealand. We believe there are many in our churches who could make a creative contribution.

# Publications might be in the following areas:

Understanding the Christian faith Faith and faith issues [ ethical issues / social issues / current issues ] Devotional and meditations Liturgy and worship materials Materials to resource Lay Ministry teams Small Group material Creative Work

The Board believes there should be a required standard of presentation and is proposing to establish a Publications Group [of 3 –4 people] who would oversee the use of Methodist Publishing name. These people would read manuscripts, and make recommendations to the Board to publish or not.

The Publishing group would not be an editorial group, but would expect all those seeking publication to be working with an editor, who would help ensure consistency of writing style, use of language and grammar etc.

At this point in time Methodist Publishing does not have funds to undertake the actual printing of books and resources. It will still be necessary for authors to seek funding or underwriting to cover these costs.

# Suggested Recommendations:

# The Churches Agency on Social Issues Report to Methodist Church 2006

# SECTION A: INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK.

# 1. CASI

The Churches' Agency on Social Issues is an inter-church organisation. It works in the area of social justice and related issues that rise within New Zealand. The Agency consists of up to 16 members appointed by the national bodies of the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches, the Associated Churches of Christ, and the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers). The agency employs a part time research and liaison officer.

The Agency meets monthly in Wellington. The co-convenors from each of the four churches meet as an Executive in advance of those meetings, and the chair is taken by each convenor in turn for a six month term. The current Methodist representatives on the Agency are David Beeston (Convenor), Fletcher Thomas and Ken Rae.

# 2. Finance, Staffing and Membership.

- 2.1. The bulk of the Agency's financing comes from grants from the member Churches. In 2005/06, the Associated Churches of Christ contributed \$500, the Religious Society of Friends \$2,000, the Methodist Church \$11,000, and the Presbyterian Church \$35,000.
- 2.2. About two thirds of the Agency's income is used to employ its part-time Research and Liaison Officer. Julia Stuart retired at end of 2005 and the CASI has employed Paul Thomson as CASI's new Research and Liaison Officer.
- 2.3. Currently only three of the 6 positions available for Methodist members of CASI are occupied.. It is of concern that we have not been able to maintain a full complement of members on the Agency, as this limits CASI's capacity to function.

# 3. Resourcing Faith Communities

- 3.1. As research and liaison, Paul is available to network with groups around the country, and attends church meetings and seminars wherever opportunity arises. CASI maintains email contact with a large number of people and corresponds with groups around New Zealand. CASI is always happy to receive correspondence on any issues.
- 3.2. *Broadsheet* is a short magazine produced every two months and gets positive feedback. This year it has dealt with issues such as section 59 repeal, violence in society and climate change. *Broadsheet* is now available as a PDF file from the website or is posted direct to parishes and individuals.
- 3.3. In past years the Agency has developed a good working relationship with the Human Rights Commission, particularly on its community Treaty education initiative. In 2005 the Human Rights Commission, in 2005 CASI and several other groups facilitated a Capital City Forum on Race Relations. The forum was well attended and as a result CASI has recently published a proceedings booklet containing the presentations from the sessions at the Forum. Another Forum was held in September focused on Health as Liberation.
- 3.4. CASI maintains a website (<u>www.casi.org.nz</u>) to focus on topical and relevant issues. There is a steady amount of use. CASI attempts to keep the content current and usage increases significantly when topics CASI has resources for or information about become headlines in the media. The repeal of section 59 of the crimes act has been one of these this year.
- 3.5. The Agency maintains a small and carefully-selected library on social issues. This is increasingly used by people working on research, tertiary-level essays and social issues papers, as well as by church members. Members of partner churches are welcome to borrow books and other publications. A copy of the library catalogue can be emailed to inquirers.
- 3.6. CASI continues to produce resources to encourage in depth study of social issues. This year much focus has been on the race relations booklet and a section 59 discussion starter. CASI has a 12 part resource on how researching social issues and is working on a resource on violence.

# 4. Bioethical Issues

- 4.1. The Interchurch Bioethics Council (ICBC) relates to the Methodist Conference through the Churches' Agency on social Issues. Members are drawn from the Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches.
- 4.2. It has an educational role providing opportunities for consultation and dialogue with church members and the community generally, as well as making submissions and comments to the Government-appointed NZ Bioethics Council and other relevant bodies. The Chairperson continues to be Dr Audrey Jarvis of Palmerston North.

# 5. Statements and Representations

- 5.1. Making submissions and representations continues to be an important part of CASI's work. The opportunities presenting themselves and the topics of interest to the Churches are too numerous to all be addressed within the resources available, so CASI has adopted the following guidelines.
  - > Do we have anything important and distinctive to say from a Christian perspective?
  - > Do we need to speak out, or will other Christians do so in ways that we cannot?
  - What have we said in the past on the particular subject, and do we need to continue to speak out?
  - > Do we have the time and resources necessary to prepare a considered and helpful contribution to debate on the issue?

Over the last two years CASI has made submissions on a variety of subjects, including

- Benefit changes
- Pay equity
- Review of the Public Health Act
- Gambling
- The legal status of parents
- Repeal of section 59 of the crimes act
- Young offenders
- Easter trading

# SECTION B: STRATEGIC PLAN.

CASI believes there are two vital issues facing New Zealanders. One is the destructive impact of violence on society. The other is the fragile state of the ecosystem. CASI believes it is part of the mission of the church to take steps now to address these issues at local level, as well as at national level. In the next year CASI will focus on these issues.

Recognising that the agency members are not themselves experts in every area of the agency's work, CASI will continue to involve and sponsor other church groups in its activities. This allows CASI to deal with a wider range of issues than is otherwise possible.

CASI will continue to encourage and resource people in local congregations who engage with social issues. In 2007 CASI will spend more time working with local church groups on social issues.

The Agency will continue to speak in its own right. CASI's approach will be to comment when it feels it has a point or perspective on an issue that otherwise might not be heard. It does this mainly through submissions to government and issuing press statements.

CASI will work with other groups including the ICBC, the Human Rights Commission and the social justice organisations affiliated to other churches where appropriate.

CASI uses its web site to provide a balanced range of views on topical issues available. In the coming year CASI will experiment with web 'blog' technology to make the site more interactive. The broadsheet publication has been well received in the last year. Both these media will continue be a high priority.

# SUGGESTED DECISIONS

- 1. The report is received.
- 2. Conference re-affirms the aims of the Agency as set out in the report.
- 3. The Methodist members of CASI for the year 2006 will be David Beeston (convenor), Ken Rae and Fletcher Thomas.

# Sustainability:

CASI believes there is overwhelming evidence that the Earth's ecosystem is in crisis now. CASI believes there is overwhelming evidence that human activity and greed have caused this crisis. CASI believes the Bible calls Christians to care for God's creation and be responsible stewards of the ecosystem God has entrusted us with.

- 4. That this conference urges congregations to be conscientious in ordering congregational life on sound principles of sustainability, and to honour our responsibility to be God's stewards for the Earth.
- 5. That this conference urges congregations to be pro-active in their local communities in challenging and educating people about sustainable living

# THE INTERCHURCH BIOETHICS COUNCIL REPORT OF ACTIVITIES DURING 2005 -2006

The Interchurch Bioethics Council (ICBC) responds to issues in biotechnology which are seen as important to the church membership and the community generally.

There are currently nine members from the Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian churches, with expertise in science, ethics, theology, medicine, education and cultural issues. The ICBC makes considerable use of outside experts and participates actively in conferences and seminars. Paul Thompson, CASI Research and Liaison Officer, and Rev Anthony Dancer, Anglican Social Justice Commissioner, attend ICBC meetings as observers.

Four meetings of the ICBC and two teleconferences were held in 2005 to 2006. A large amount of work is carried out by e-mail communication.

# Submissions on Government Legislation and Related Activities

November-December 2005: Participation in 'Talking Biotechnology' Conference in Wellington.

**February 2006**: Attendance at 'Making People Better' Bioethics Conference in Dunedin, with two members making presentations.

**March 2006:** Submission to Ministry of Health re Guidelines on Using Established Human Embryonic Stem Cell Lines for Research.

**March 2006:** Letter to Hon David Benson-Pope, Minister for the Environment regarding Genetic Use Restriction Technologies ('Terminator Technology').

**April 2006:** Member Chris Downs contributed as a 'Scanner' to the first round of reports of the Navigator Network News, sponsored by MORST.

**April 2006:** Letter to Hon David Parker, Minister Responsible for Climate Change Issues in support and in addition to letter from Anglican bishops on Climate Change

May 2006: Oral submission to Ministry of Health on Guidelines on Using Cells from Established Human Stem Cell Lines for Research.

**Current Issue:** The Use of Human Embryos for Research is a major topic and the ICBC is studying the spiritual, ethical and cultural implications. Members have given talks, written articles and taken part in radio interviews on this topic and are available to talk to church and community groups when requested.

# Talks and Publications

Talks have been given to church annual meetings and synods, at seminars, in church services and on public radio. Articles have been published in the local and national press and in church papers.

# Conclusion

We are mindful that our brief is to consider biotechnology from the point of view of spiritual, ethical and cultural dimensions. Currently we are particularly devoting time and effort to research and consideration of spirituality and how it impinges on biotechnology. # A.N. (Tony) Bell

Although born in Lower Hutt my home town is Hawera, my family having moved there when I was 6 months old. My growing up included an active involvement in Wesley church, and I count myself lucky to have had the contact with the Deaconesses and Rev H Darvill, - the Maori Mission rooms were also our Sunday School rooms. As part of the Bible Class activities several of us formed into Mission Bands and went out in 3's to take Services in the small country churches. I began work as a telephone technician in the Exchange, and after two years moved to Wellington to work. While there I picked up the task of Business Manager for Scope, an ecumenical youth magazine that was struggling. Alas resurrection wasn't possible. This lead to me becoming disillusioned with the church, taking time out. I then moved into the manufacturing side when NZ began building telephone exchanges in 1968 at Wallaceville. Now living at Upper Hutt I was asked to assist in the leadership of an Easter camp at Solway-Masterton. I thought that would be a "safe" task! However it was at that camp that I received my "call" to ministry. It was from Wesley church at Upper Hutt, under Rev Stan Olds that I candidated into the ministry. 1972 saw the move to Trinity College which was just shifting to the St John's site. What followed were three very stimulating years in many ways! My appointments included Cambridge UP, Ashburton, Kaiapoi CP, Matamata UP, Avondale UP- extended to include Waterview for 2 years, Gisborne (transitional ministry), and now Wanganui. In all I spent 23 years in CV's, four years as a CV representative on the Standing Cte of UCANZ and am now one of the Methodist appointments on the Standing Cte.

I am married to Dcn Shirley-Joy Barrow and we have five adult children and six grandchildren. We are lucky to have one of our family living in Wanganui so we have close contact with two of our grandchildren. The others of our family are at Auckland, Kaikohe and Calgary!

At the time of my candidating I said that I see a significant role for the church and that my call was not to be a chaplain to a dying institution but to a living, growing community of the faithful. I still hold that view, in fact I'm more passionate about that now than ever, having seen lives changed and communities enriched by God's Spirit. There is a great spiritual hunger in our communities, and when people are seeking out answers to their questions, the last place they are looking is the traditional main-line churches. As a church we have been slow to recognize this, but I have seen, and still see signs of congregations being transformed into places where it is safe and rewarding to ask the deep questions of faith.

I believe it is now time for our church to attend to some healing, we've been through turbulent times for 20 years or so now. The question, thanks to Tom Bandy, that is my focus, is: "What is it about my/your (each person, faith community, our Church) experience of Christ that our community (local –national) can't live without?". It is time for unashamed gospel mission, where church growth is measured in "spiritual growth, not bodies on pews. With 80% of NZers "unchurched" the mission field is at our doors. It is time for maintenance to move to a supporting role, and sharing of the good news to be our core focus.

# Family Status

Born in Nuku'alofa, Tonga and brought up in a Methodist family. Both grandfathers were ministers of the Gree Wesleyan Church of Tonga (Methodist Church in Tonga).

He married Anne Lolofi Rounds and they have seven adult children; five sons and two daughters. Now they have four grandchildren, three Samoans and one Tongan.

# Education

He was educated in Tonga where he was Dux of St Andrew's College in 1962. In the same year he passed the Tonga Government Law Examination. He was admitted to the Bar on the following year and became a qualified lawyer in the Kingdom of Tonga.

He came with his family to New Zealand for further education at Auckland University in 1970. He two years later joined the New Zealand Police Force and served Her Majesty the Queen and her subjects for nearly seventeen years then he retired. He gained many Certificates during this long service.

# Ministry

He started preaching the Gospel as an accredited Lay Preacher at the age of sixteen. When he came to New Zealand in 1970 he attended St John's Methodist Church in Ponsonby. Rev. Clifford Keigthley was the minister.

After a few months, he formed a Tongan Choir to sing during the English Service. In the following year, he was instrumental in starting the Tongan Language Service. It grew from one to twelve fellowships in Auckland.

He was the Steward of the Tongan Methodist Fellowship, Ponsonby for four years. He was a member of the trust and the Property Committee, a youth leader who worked hard to precent the young Tongans from getting into trouble and fund raising to buy a house for the young people. The five bedroom house was bought at 16 O'Neill Street, Ponsonby. The late Rev. Dr. Amanaki Havea named the house in 1975 as "Kupuola-'o-Tonga" (Living Link with Tonga).

In 1976, he was elected as the Chief Steward for the Tongan Methodist, a position elected annually which he held for twenty one (21) years before he candidated for the ministry. He was a big helper in the 'Tent–making–ministry' for the Tongans, leading to the formation of the "Tongan Methodist Circuit" in February 1984. The Circuit has spread through Aotearoa. It led to the formation of the Vahefonua Tonga.

In 1988, he was the Vice President Elect. He was the only nomination for the position (refer to page 377 of the Reports & Resolutions of Conference 1988). He was inducted to the position at Conference in Wellington in 1989.

He was the Convenor of the Tongan Advisory Committee for 11 years. He has been a member of many Standing Committees of Conference and a Facilitator for bi-cultural journey as a first step towards a multi-cultural church. He is a member of the Mission & Ecumenical Board and the Council of Conference.

I have served in three parishes, since leaving Trinity Theological College, in 1990. Napier Parish for the first six years, the Waitakere Parish from 1997 through until 2003 and am currently part of the ministry team at Chartwell Cooperating Parish, Hamilton, as the Presbyterian appointment.

Connexional involvement has included membership on Trinity College Council, the Board of Ministry, the Travel and Study Committee, as well as Candidate Convenor, a Contact Person and Regional Trainer for the Harassment and Abuse Network, and membership of the Synod Executive of Hawkes Bay/Manawatu Synod. Interim Moderator of Knox Presbyterian Parish, Hamilton and member of Waikato Presbytery Mission Committee.

Some of the most stimulating moment of my involvement in the wider church has been involvement with candidates as they prepare to candidate for ordained ministry, and support of probationers as they begin exploring their unique gifts in parish ministry.

I have a broad theological perspective encompassing orthodox to liberal influences. I am greatly appreciating the richness that a wide range of theologies brings.

There are several emphases that have appeared in my ministry:

I was recently referred too as a conciliator and that term is appropriate in reflection my approach to change and conflict. Listening, reflection and then move forward together in unity.

There are some of the skills that I bring in leadership to parishes and would bring to a role such as the Presidency of Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa.

# Barbara A. Peddie

I was born into a Methodist family of several generations on my mother's side. My father's heritage was Scots Presbyterian, but the East Belt Methodist Church was just round the corner from his home. I went to Methodist Sunday School and Bible Class, and then moved sideways into the SCM at University – the discussions were fiercer and more free- ranging there.

During these years, I worked my way through Undergraduate and Postgraduate degrees in Microbiology. A Canadian National Post-doctoral Scholarship took me to Guelph, Ontario. Next came the 'big OE' in Europe. Teaching in a Comprehensive School in Battersea was, to put it mildly, challenging! Then came a year as Assistant Lecturer at Southampton Medical School. I came home to a research position in the Dept of Nephrology at Christchurch Hospital. Home, for me, is Christchurch. The landscape with its open spaces and stark hills, varied coastline and long rivers is my place in the world.

In Canada, I attached myself to the United Church of Canada. In England, the Anglican Evensong was both a powerful attraction and a good counterbalance to the Brethren services I attended in Dorset with my English cousins. Back home I went to the Quaker Meeting, which still has a place in my heart (and some good friends). I don't regret these varied experiences. The Anglicans gave me a heightened sense of our long traditions, and of

being part of the great cloud of witnesses. The Quakers gave me space to wait and to listen, and endorsed the Methodist passion for justice and equity. And I absorbed something of the meaning of the ministry of all believers.

I came back to my Durham St roots, first through an evening service that explored other ways of worshipping, and then into the Choir. And I was firmly resolved that that was as far as it went. I was happy being a support person. And I was never, *ever*, going to stand up in front of anyone and 'go public' about my faith.

But God has a sense of humour, and God and the congregation kept disturbing my peace. Parish Steward, at a time of change and challenge for the congregation. Lay preaching – which now takes me out of my home church (and choir) more often than I'm in it. Instead of scientific papers, I'm writing sermons, and I can tell you that that *that* puts you much more on the line. Synod Secretary – well I'm used to writing – and Synod rep on JRC. And Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing, which brings me into direct contact with the wider Connexion.

During my last years as a research microbiologist, I began a theology degree. (Otago University has a great Distance Learning programme.) I finished a Post-graduate Diploma when I retired, with a focus on bioethics that picked up both my past experience and a developing passion. I am currently one of the two Methodist members of the InterChurch Bioethics Council, and a Tutor in Ethics for the Ecumenical Institute of Distance Theological Study. This year I'm also spending 20 hours a week as a 'gofer' for the General Secretary, a job that's not at all like research microbiology!

I am a fortunate member of a close knit family, and my nieces and nephews are engaged in expanding the whanau into another generation. Family and friends are the lynchpin of my life. I play clarinet in two local orchestras, and tenor viol in an informal viol consort. Officially I am still a member of the Durham St Choir. On Tuesdays you will find me in the basement of the Arts Centre, among the academic regalia (with a lively group of volunteers).

When I reflect on all the changes, I don't think I have turned into a different sort of person. I *do* think that what was already there is being called out. I have found that at the times when my life has seemed to be coming apart around me, God gives me a safe place to stand. I believe that God will go on pulling up the tent pegs – but I also believe that God gives all of us the strength to do what God calls us to do. I recognise the call to Te Haahi to respond to the challenge and change of being God's co-creators as the world shifts around us.

# Tributes to Deceased Presbyters, Minita-a-Iwi, Deacons & Lay People

# Jayne Alexander 1936 – 2006

Jayne Alexander was born in 1936, the only child of Joy and Eric, who was a Presbyterian Home Missionary. But it was from a two teacher school in Hobsonville, through Rongotea to Napier, to Avonside Girls' High School in Christchurch where she thrived and fell in love with Shakespeare, Laurence Olivier and words.

Once Jayne had left school, limited funds dictated that she should go to Teachers' College rather than University. However, she did English I and II during her two years at Teachers' College, English III during her Probationary Year at Ilam Primary School and finally full-time study for the remainder of her Bachelor's and Master's degrees, majoring in English.

Ambivalent about primary school teaching, she accepted the challenge of secondary teaching. There Jayne found that she loved teaching and inter-acting with teenagers. She was a foundation staff member at Aranui High School, taught at Cashmere High, Papanui High, back to Aranui and finally to Linwood High School.

Jayne broke new ground in her teaching career, becoming the first woman in Christchurch to be appointed Head of English at a co-ed school, and the second to become a Deputy Principal. She was much more comfortable in the schools where the principal and staff shared her concern for all students, especially those who were less able or with complex needs. Jayne's sympathies were always with the vulnerable, at school and in the community.

Jayne had a fulfilling retirement. She delivered meals for Riccarton Inter-church Community Care and worked at Petersgate Counselling Centre as a volunteer catching the vision of a high quality, affordable counselling service. Golf and the beauty of the outdoors, Court Theatre, concerts and opera, adult education, the University of the Third Age, the Arts Centre, and her passion for reading all occupied her time. In the last three years, Jayne learned Classical Greek – a lifetime ambition.

Jayne loved to travel — the world of words and stories and the world of travel enriched each other. She revelled in Shakespeare's Stratford on Avon and the classical sites of Greece. Turkey was a life changing experience.

But it was her love for theology and preaching and liturgy that blossomed and came to fruition in her retirement. Four people especially, had nurtured her: Farquhar Gunn at St Andrews "an amazing preacher with a love for Isaiah"; Mac Wilson at Knox "with stark minimalist liturgy and a way of preaching theology that was pure common sense"; John Murray "preached and practiced social justice"; and Phyllis Guthardt's ministry at Knox: "a woman in what had been an all male world... and a role model with an amazing grasp of scripture".

Retirement brought opportunities to study theology, become a lay preacher, and participation in Otago University's theology by extension programme. The sheer joy of learning for learning's sake.

Church for Jayne, growing up in a manse, had been a mixed experience. But as a mature adult, she shared her gifts of leadership and enabling as Bible Class leader, an ordained Elder at Knox Presbyterian; and as Parish Steward at in the Hornby/Riccarton Methodist Parish. Jayne also served the wider church: President of the NZ Lay Preachers' Association, member of the North Canterbury District Synod, member of Conference, member of the Council of Conference and a convenor of Conference Arrangement Committees.

Jayne was a person of many gifts. She shared them with pupils and colleagues, with community groups and with her church. "I have nothing left undone" was her constant assurance to friends over her last few weeks. It was a life of generosity, faith and love.

Thanks be to God for the energy, faith, life and love of Jayne Alexander.

# Enid Bennett 1931 – 2006

Enid was born in Waihi in 1931, the elder daughter of Edna and Ernest Slaney and sister of Walter and Mary. Her childhood years were spent in Auckland, Coromandel and Te Aroha where she and the family shared in the life of local Methodist congregations. During those years faith was nurtured and Enid's interest in music was kindled and found expression in choral singing with her sister.

After two years as a boarder at Auckland Girls' Grammar, Enid completed her secondary education as joint dux of the school. She attended Auckland University from 1950-53 and graduated MA with first class honours in English. During this time she served on the executive of the Auckland Student Christian

Movement where a lifelong commitment to ecumenism was born. She also sang in the Pitt Street choir and was a Bible Class leader.

After graduating from Auckland Teachers' College in 1954, Enid taught for two years at Mount Roskill Grammar and then spent two years in Britain, one of them teaching at Bath. On her return to New Zealand she took up a teaching position at Tauranga Girls' College and worshipped at the Tauranga Methodist Church where she became an accredited lay preacher. In 1963 she offered as a candidate for presbyteral ministry and attended Trinity College from 1964-66, gaining the Otago BD.

In 1967 Enid married Gordon Bennett and together they offered warm and generous hospitality to those who entered their home. Circuit appointments followed in Palmerston North and Sanson-Rongotea before an opportunity came to lecture in the newly-established department of Religious Studies at Massey University. While teaching there from 1979-85, Enid's interest in feminist theology and women's role in church and society blossomed. She served on the Christian Education Council (Bible in Schools), District Education Committees and was Synod Secretary for the Hawkes Bay/Manawatu District for two years.

In 1986 Enid became the first woman to be appointed to the faculty of Trinity College. She served as Wesley Lecturer in Systematic Theology until her retirement in 1991. She gave priority to pastoral care of students and their families. She will be remembered for her contribution to the development of feminist theology, especially in her exploration of the biblical personification of Wisdom as feminine. Enid was adventurous and fearless in her thinking and writing. She encouraged students in their own theological exploration, and was a passionate advocate of women in ministry, both lay and ordained.

Enid edited and contributed to two collections of essays, *With Heads Uncovered* in 1988 and *With All Humility and Gentleness* in 1990. Her main contribution to feminist theology is found in her book *Wisdom's House* published in 2000. In December 2005 Enid was made a fellow of Trinity College, an honour she received graciously and with joy.

After retirement Enid entered enthusiastically into the planning and building of her home in Tairua on the Coromandel Peninsula. While sharing fully in the life of the local community, she provided generous hospitality to family and friends. She served the wider Methodist Church as Waikato District Assessor of Probationers for a number of years. She was part of the ecumenical Local Shared Ministry team in Tairua where she offered a practical ministry of compassion as she identified with the struggles of people to find their God-given potential. Her environmental concerns led to her successful participation in the fight to save Paku Bay from commercial development as a marina.

Enid died in February 2006 after a long struggle with cancer. She was a committed teacher, a wise mentor, a courageous theologian and a gracious pastor. Thanks be to God for the gift of Enid and her life lived so fully amongst us.

# Amos Burrough 1925 - December 2005

St Paul's Presbyterian Church, Feilding was full to remember the life of one of God's true servants. A man who knew and trusted God. Amos had a deep love for the word of God. Amos loved his God and always wanted to care more for people. His contribution wherever he was, was valued, respected and cherished. He had a deep spiritual grace that he always shared and he was always fully prepared in all that he did.

Although Amos was a man with a wicked sense of humour who played tricks on family and friends he had a deep sense of caring for anybody at the places where they were and gave them the compassion they needed at the time.

Amos was born and grew up in Picton, but he went to high school in Blenheim. He was known to have played cricket in the train on the way home. He left home at age 17, giving up a life as a grocer in Picton for the dream of being a scientist. It was while he was at varsity in Wellington that he ran in the harriers and had a love of motor bikes touring a lot on a matchless twin.

He was in his early 20's and it was through the ministry and support that he received from Bill Jenkins that Amos made his decision to enter the ministry.

After completing theological college Amos was posted to the Hutt Valley when his life took its second dramatic turn It was here that he met Bess, Amos was groomsman for the wedding of Peter Stead and Bess

was Ngaio's bridesmaid. Amos & Bess were married in January 1954.

They were first stationed in Roxburgh. This is where Margaret and Stephen were born and then they moved to Wairoa where they built many relationships with the people and the community. After four years in Wairoa the family moved to Ruawai near Dargaville in Northland. Ruawai was a time of dramatic changes. It was the time when Amos and Bess received the infilling of the Holy Spirit. It was also the time when Stephen first recalled that the family was exposed to the idea of Christian community visiting a community at Tinopai. This had a deep impact on them which they took with them and developed in Palmerston North after they retired. Ruawai was very special as it was the time of the arrival of the chosen ones, first Robyn and then John. My younger brother and sister completed the family

Okato was the next rural appointment Four years later they moved to Murchison. Murchison was a parish that also held great memories for them. But after only two years there the financial cost and the needs of his family made Amos make what may have been the single most difficult decision of his life, to resign from the ministry and move to Palmerston North.

Here he worked first for Glaxo and then for Boys High School. Amos and Bess purchased Linton Court and set up a Christian community to minister to others and took a very deep interest in the Order of St. Luke which he joined in 1969. He was an area senior chaplain and National warden from 1981 – 1983. He was always encouraging members of the chapters wherever he was.

Amos returned to the ministry and worked for St. Marks, Feilding, Milson Community Church, and for 10 years ministered in the Church of Christ in Palmerston North. Bess and Amos also provided leadership for the Church of Christ in Levin.

Two years ago Bess and Amos moved to Feilding where they were closer to family. It didn't matter where the family travelled around New Zealand they were for ever hearing stories about the impact that Bess and Amos had had on the lives of people they had been in contact with.

Bess and Amos never stinted on the hospitality they lovingly offered, and would go out to pray with people at all hours of the night if it was requested. No matter where they were stationed, or where they were involved with people the ministry of Amos and Bess was a team ministry. Always hand in hand with each other.

There are some people who cross your lives who are special. Amos was like a brother, an encourager, a person whose integrity was beyond question.

Psalm 116 sums it up. How can I repay the Lord? I will fulfil my vows to the Lord. O Lord truly I am your servant, you have freed me from my chains.

#### Brian Keith Caughey 2006

Brian Caughey died in Auckland on 30<sup>th</sup> July 2006 following a long period of illness.

He was appointed to the Wesley College Trust Board in 1966 and served for a period of 26 years and was also an inaugural member of the Board of Governors.

His father Mr H.P.R Caughey was a member of the Trust Board from 1922-1928 and was Chairperson of the Board.

For most of the period that Brian was on the Board, he served as Chairperson of the Property & Finance Committee. He and his wider family have been significant college benefactors and the college recognized their contribution by naming a college boarding hostel "Caughey Hall".

He was a man of high principle with genuine concern for the education of young people. A devoted Christian, he was a great servant of the Methodist Church, through his work at Wesley College.

He and his wider family have a special place in the history of Wesley College.

#### Meriel Jane Cropp 1934 – 2006

Meriel was born in Christchurch on the 7<sup>th</sup> of September 1934 as part of the Beaumont family. Her father was former Vice-President of Conference, and growing up her life revolved around the many activities of the Richmond Methodist Church in Christchurch. Meriel was keenly involved in Crusaders, and frequently attended camps and Christian conference. She trained at Christchurch Teacher's College, and was appointed South Island Youth Director for the Methodist Church: she organised the Cashmere Youth Conference in early January 1960.

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> of January 1960 she married Rev Jim Cropp at the Richmond Methodist Church. Jim and Meriel served in the Greendale circuit until answering the call to missionary service in the Solomons from 1962 – 1974. Jim and Meriel's appointments included Goldie College, Vella Lavella, King George VI school in Honiara, where Jim was acting principal and chaplain. Meriel and Jim also served in Ashburton, at St John's, Bryndwyr Rd and Aldred (St Alban's parish), in the Central Mission at Durham St in the House of Hope and in Aged Care chaplaincy.

While in the Benheim Parish Jim was superintendent of the West Boast, and the Nelson-Marlborough synods: they retired in 1998, and attached themselves enthusiastically to the Beckenham Parish. Jim and Meriel were called back to Ashburton for an interim ministry in 2003, a service they both gladly took on. In various ministries Meriel made good friends, and the extent to which she left a mark on people's lives was shown when at her funeral service close on 500 people packed Beckenham Methodist to pay tribute to her life and memory.

Meriel was mother to four, a grandmother to five: she played an active role in the congregation in Beckenham until the last, leading a women's prayer group and generally spreading good cheer and laughter around the parish. Meriel's banners still grace the church on special occasions, and her particular sense of humour and fun is one we sorely miss. Her faith was strong and contagious: reluctant to call herself leader, she nonetheless encouraged and led by example, and the church was deeply shocked when the full extent of a long-term illness picked up on missionary service so many years before began to take its toll. Meriel persisted in her cheerful spirit right to the very end, passing away on the 26<sup>th</sup> February 2006 in Christchurch Hospital, surrounded by those she loved and cared for. She has left us a legacy of love and laughter: we are grateful for the privilege of having known her.

#### Cathrin Joyce Gough (nee Gribble) 1925 - 2006

Born on the 8<sup>th</sup> April, 1925 at Nelson, Joyce Gribble and her family were a part of the Methodist Fellowship at Stoke.

She was 18 years old when her mother died, and her father remarried. Her brother being overseas in war service, Joyce and her younger sister were left to their own devices. They coped very creditably, each taking a turn to finance the other, one as a teacher, the other as a Deaconess.

Joyce was called to church work, but as there were no other deaconess candidates in 1951, she was sent as a supply to Pitt Street Church in Auckland. The following year she entered Deaconess House and in 1954, after training, returned to Pitt Street.

In the book – 100 years in Pitt Street,' Sister Joyce Gribble is described as, "most effective and very popular". She bonded well with the young Samoans coming into Auckland and enjoyed a good ministry amongst them, as well as with the rest of the congregation

A photo of her in some publications shows a lively and attractive young lady.

Overseas travel took up most of 1957, after which Joyce was transferred to Lower Hutt, where she met and, in August 1959, was married to the Boy's Brigade Captain, Ronald Gough. Together they raised a lively family of four sons and a daughter.

Some years later the family moved to Ongaonga, in Central Hawkes bay, where they were in charge of the local store and school bus route.

After her husband's death, 26 years ago, Joyce retired to Waipawa. Although an unfortunate operation left

her features and health somewhat impaired, it in no way harmed her outlook on life, her interest in and affection for her growing family, nor their love for her.

She died peacefully at Waipukurau, on June 4<sup>th</sup> 2006. At her funeral in St. John's Church, Waipawa, many family members paid eloquent tribute to her memory. Not only was she a great mother to her own family, but she was an honorary mother to many others, truly fulfilling her earlier call to service – a life befitting the apostle's words "Be kindly affectionate one to another in diligence, not slothful, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord."

#### Iris Lankshear 1930 – 2006

Iris Lankshear's funeral and the celebration of her life was at the Lindisfarne Methodist Centre, Invercargill on 19 June 2006. She had continued her administration of stewardship records and her involvement in the parish activities until the day of her death. For over six years Iris had sustained her determination to live life as fully as possible in spite of invasive bone cancer. Her heart finally failed her and she died suddenly and peacefully at home.

Iris Colclough was born in Upper Hutt in 1930 and completed her secondary education at Hutt Valley High School. Her church involvement began when very young as a child in a push chair; at 12 she was playing the piano in the St John's Anglican Sunday school at Trentham.

At 13 she joined the Upper Hutt Methodist Bible Class and from then on identified as "a Methodist". She became the LYC secretary, attended the District Youth Council and taught Sunday School. She was the organist at Upper Hutt from 1946 to 1952.

In that year she married Peter Lankshear and they settled in New Plymouth where their two sons and one daughter were born. She was involved with church music and later became Leaders Meeting Secretary at Vogeltown. In 1973 Peter was transferred to Invercargill and they became part of the Central Methodist Congregation. She became Leaders Meeting Secretary, 1974-1986 and then Circuit Secretary 1981 to 1986 and her musical talents were put to good use in the Central Choir.

Beyond Invercargill she was part of the District and the Connexion. She took up the District Synod Minute Secretary's position from 1976 – 1983 and became a regular member at the Methodist Conference where her secretarial experiences were put to good use in taking minutes, and then as secretary to the Welfare of the Church Committee, 1990 – 1993. Her meticulous skills set standards for others to match.

A particular interest was her involvement in the Wesley Historical Society, and her research into Southland Methodist land and parish records. She was instrumental in locating, recording and sending to archives much valuable material.

Iris and Peter were a partnership in bringing up the family, in the supporting each other in their interests be it as rockhounds or collecting vintage radios; and working together whether traveling or at home to "build each other up and gather into one". More recently, Peter cared for her and encouraged her through the years of illness.

What was special about Iris Lankshear? She was committed to what ever she did at home and in her church responsibilities. She was caring in keeping track of people and their interests. She was determined sustaining the parish stewardship records until she died. She was honest in her linking of her faith and practice, and she was brave in the ways she confronted her cancer and death.

We extend our sincere thanks to Peter, David, Vanessa and Kenneth and the eight grandchildren and thank them for generously sharing Iris with her wider Methodist family. We have all been richly blessed by who she was and what she did in faithful Christian service.

#### Olive Money 1913 – 2006

Olive Money was born in Christchurch on 8<sup>th</sup> June 1913. When she was 3 the family moved to a farm in the Waikato. The nearest school was opened at Te Puninga and Olive was enrolled as pupil No.33 on 3 June

1918. Less than a month later her parents sold the farm and moved into Morrinsville where Olive attended Morrinsville Primary School and later the District High School where she passed the Matriculation examination and gained the Higher Leaving Certificate.

In December 1930 she was offered a position in the Borough Council Office assisting the Town Clerk, who worked part-time. Over time her responsibilities grew and she was often left in charge. When the Town Clerk was called up for military service in 1943 Olive was appointed as Acting Town Clerk becoming the only Lady Town Clerk in New Zealand. She was often required to work at night but still managed to keep up her responsibilities at Church and Sunday School. When the Town Clerk returned Olive resigned from the Morrinsville Borough Council after 14 years' service and in 1945 took up a position with the Takapuna Borough Council.

In Auckland, the Takapuna Methodist Church became her church home and she became involved with activities there, making new friends and teaching Sunday School again. She was also Captain of the Girls' Life Brigade and the Cadets for the younger girls.

In 1953 Olive was asked by the Methodist Overseas Mission Board to consider going to the Solomon Islands as Secretary to the Chairman of the Mission. Her dedication as a Missionary Sister took place in the family Church in Morrinsville and she left New Zealand by flying boat for Sydney in April 1954. On arrival in the Solomons at the Barakoma Airfield on Vella Lavella several days later, she was delighted to be met by her sister Lucy.

Olive's main task was looking after the accounts for each Mission Station and Head Office. She also had to go to Gizo by launch about every 6 weeks to meet the boat from Sydney and clear Customs. As Chairman's Secretary she travelled with him when he visited the mission stations on Vella Lavella, Choiseul – where Lucy was stationed – Bouganville and Buka. She also attended the annual Synod meeting.

After 3 years Olive returned to New Zealand for a well-earned break. Like all missionaries she was given a series of medical tests to determine her fitness to return to the work. Unfortunately because of frequent attacks of malaria Olive was unable to return and with great reluctance she resigned and spent a year recuperating.

At the end of this year Olive began to look around for another job and she was asked by the Morrinsville College Board of Governors to work in their office. What was meant to be 2-3 months work became 21 years!

During this time Olive took up oil painting and proved to be very talented. She also became involved again with the Morrinsville Church teaching Sunday School and becoming Minute Secretary to the Parish business meeting.

In 1980 Olive returned to the Solomons to visit Lucy at Sasamuqa which gave her the opportunity to see at first hand the people and places Lucy had written about for years. Olive enjoyed this visit so much that she went again in 1983.

In 1998 Olive had a slight stroke which affected her eyesight and then fell and broke her shoulder. In 1999 thanks to Kim, her wonderful caregiver, she was able to fulfil a long held dream to visit cousins in Canada with Kim as her travelling companion.

Soon after this Olive decided to move to Country Lodge and she writes: "I am grateful to the staff for their kindness and care. In looking back over the years, I feel I have much to thank God for. First of all, for Christian parents and a good home where high standards were set more by example than by precept; for my sisters for all their loving care when I needed more and more assistance; for my friends; for my Church, which together with my parents, has led me to a Christian faith. God has guided me in many events of my life. He has never failed me even though I have often failed Him and even had moments of doubt. He is a God of love, who is a Father, caring for his children and His promises are true."

#### John Bruce McDougall 2006

John McDougall was Principal of Wesley College from 1974 to 1988. Before his appointment to Wesley College he was Deputy Principal of Rosehill College, Papakura and a former principal of Queen Victoria School, Fiji.

During his principalship Wesley College became the first private school to be integrated into the state system and he was instrumental in ensuring that the college's special character was clearly defined. This integration agreement became the blueprint for over 300 private schools which subsequently joined the state system.

In 1979 John received the prestigious Woolf Fisher fellowship which enabled him to travel to Britain and Europe. Following this trip and encouraged by the Methodist Church, girls were readmitted to Wesley College in 1985.

He was president of the Pukekohe Rotary Club and District Chairman for "Handi-camp" a camp for handicapped children at Camp Morley. He was also foundation chairman for the New Zealand Schools Rugby Council.

On his retirement from Wesley College the District Senior Inspector of Secondary schools wrote to John McDougall.

"the high esteem with which your students regard you and their school is a fine measure of the success of your leadership. Your unflagging devotion to the College has won you're the respect and affection of your colleagues and students."

#### Ripia Rountree (nee Walker) 1947–2006

#### The Weaver (anon)

Ripia Rountre, te kotiro a Te Aroha Ashby raua ko Joseph Walker, te mokopuna a Miriama Epere raua ko Hohaia Puna Toe, he uri no te hapu o Ngai Tuteauru, no te iwi o Nga Puhi.

Ripia Rountree was raised by her grandmother, Miriama, in Kaikohe, however they moved to Papakura when she was in her teens, where she worked as a seamstress. She was a dedicated wife, and survived the passing of two husbands – Archibald McGregor Laird and Raunatiri Rountree. Ripia's greatest passion in life was her whanau both in Auckland and at home in Otaua. She was an amazing mother and grandmother and a firm believer that fun and laughter were necessities in life and that music could heal the heart and soothe the soul.

Ripia was also highly committed to the pursuit of education both for herself and her children, whom she supported through every aspect of their lives from childhood to parenthood, as struggling students and full-time workers. She herself worked for more than ten years in South Auckland as a dedicated Community Health Worker, working largely on the Hearing and Vision Programme that services Kohanga Reo and Kura Kaupapa throughout South Auckland and parts of Waikato. Ripia was also a long serving member of the Papakura Marae and was among those instrumental in its establishment and development.

Ripia was a devoted member of the Methodist Church, Te Taha Māori. She was a representative on many committees within the organisation including: Tamaki Rohe, Hui Poari, Te Roopu Waahine, Hui Toopu and Council of Conference to name a few. However, perhaps her most treasured position was that of a Minita-a-Iwi, as it enabled her to be active in the community and in the dissemination of the Christian faith. Ripia had a strong, dynamic personality, with a vibrant passion for life. She was also a realist, who would not want us to dwell too long on her loss but to look to the future, to brighter, happier days. So it is with sadness that we farewell our wonderful mother, grandmother, aunty and devoted minister and friend. We have faith that she is in the presence of family and friends, and in the bosom of the great weaver of life.

#### Cyril Harry Smith 1911-2006

Cyril was born in Hastings in February, 1911, the older son of Robert and Roseannah Smith.

He got his education at Central, Mangateretere and Parkvale Schools and left at the age of 13. His first job was at a local sawmill and then he obtained work at Lowe and Hickman's Garage. The owners were impressed enough with his work to organise an apprenticeship for him at the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Garage. He started there in 1930, the year before the big earthquake, and, apart from the war years, spent the rest of his working life in that employment – 41 years in all. He became the trainer of apprentices and many of them have returned over the years to express their gratitude for the excellent grounding they received.

Cyril enlisted in the Air Force in 1939 and began his training at Wigram in 1940 as a ground mechanic. During his four years in Christchurch, he met Betty and they were married at Durham Street Methodist in October, 1943, by the late Rev. Raymond Dudley.

In December of 1944, Cyril left for Guadacanal where he was stationed until the end of the war. Eager to get home, he flew with others to Santos, but there, the plane broke down. After repairs they took off again but had to return to Santos. Cyril and some friends decided to make an expedition into the hills while further work was done on the plane but when they returned it was to find their transport had left without them. That plane disappeared and Cyril eventually returned to New Zealand in a flying boat.

There has been a huge cedar of Lebanon in the Church grounds of Wesley Hastings. Cyril's grandfather, a Methodist lay preacher, was there at the planting of the seed and, like the cedar, Cyril has grown and flourished in the Methodist Church. Cyril has been as staunch in friendship and commitment to his church as the great cedar has been in representing nature in a city car park. His faith has been the strong root of his living and loving.

The cedar's branches have provided shade in heat, nesting places for birds and have twinkled with lights in the dark of the nights. Cyril's work and loving wisdom have provided security for his family, his work-mates and trainees, his church family and so many more in the community through his work in drug and alcohol rehabilitation and his union membership. He has been a comfort for the stressed, a refuge for the beleaguered and a steady encourager of those ready to try new wings. His good humour, continuing kindness and gratitude for even the smallest pleasure have lit up the darkness for those around him.

The cedar of Lebanon has had a long life of making the Methodist corner of Hastings an attractive place. Cyril Smith lived for 95 years and for many of those years he and his wife, Betty, have been the caring face of Methodism in Hastings. For 75 years, right to the last Sunday before his death, he was a choir member. He was Sunday School superintendent for fourteen and a half years, circuit steward for nine years and in charge of hall bookings for nine years. Last year was the 35<sup>th</sup> in which he had attended all the funerals held in the church, preparing for the undertaker, ushering people to their seats. He gave many years of service on the property committee, Leaders' and Quarterly meetings, and was several times Synod rep, Conference rep and a member of Stationing.

Cyril's physical body reached the point of no longer being able to sustain life just a week before the great Lebanon cedar got to the same point – two landmarks of Hastings.

Cyril's life was celebrated at his funeral service on September, 12<sup>th</sup>, 2006, and the fact that the big Wesley Hastings Church was filled for a 95 year old man speaks of the respect and affection in which he was held in his community.

The Methodist Church, local, district and national, is grateful to Cyril Smith for a lifetime of faithful, wise and loving service.

We rejoice that he now sings for joy in the shadow of the wings of the God whom he loved and served

#### Frances Eileen Winiata 1913-2006

Frances Winiata (nee Clegg) was born into a family of strong Methodist tradition on 14 November 1913.

Her family was one of the leading families in the Onehunga Methodist Church for a number of generations. Frances attended Sunday School and Bible Class there and was a keen tennis and basketball player for Church's Youth Group.

At 18 years of age, Frances announced to her family that she had decided to leave home and go to Christchurch to train as a deaconess. As a result of her training she was assigned to the Waikato by Father Seamer, to serve under the guidance and direction of Sister Nichols.

It was during this period of her life, when Frances developed a close working relationship and friendship with Princess Te Puea. She often expressed how privileged she felt to be a part of the life at Turangawaewae at that time.

Stories of taking Sunday School in some of the remote communities on the Kawhia Harbour were recounted with a sense of adventure – often travelling by horseback and canoe and sleeping in raupo huts. Frances always acknowledged the manaaki and tautoko of the whanau in the Waikato – who seemingly had so little at that time, but offered so much to support the work that she was doing. She cherished the times of reconnection with people whom she came to know so well during her time there.

The Waikato was an area she was happy to return to when she married Rev. Maharaia Winiata, who had recently graduated from Trinity College in the late 1930's. Both were assigned to the Methodist Church at Kawhia in their respective roles as deaconess and minister.

Her love for the work of the Church continued on throughout her life and she provided many years of leadership and support to the life of the Mangere East Methodist Church and the Methodist Maori Division.

Many of her beautiful writings found since her passing, speak of her interpretation of bible passages and how they helped her to gain personal insight and strength.

Frances was and is, a true and gifted servant of God. She was a loving and exemplary wife, mother, grandmother and great grandmother, who never lost sight of her belief in God and the wonder of life, despite personal tragedies and hardships.

It is her love of God, amongst a myriad of other things, that is the greatest legacy she left for her whanau, and for the generations to come.

Frances passed away on 01 April 2006, and is buried on Motuapae Island In Tauranga-moana next to her son, Francis (Frank), with a view of Mauao and Huria Marae, where her husband is buried.

#### Eileen Witheford 1913 – 2006

Eileen Taylor was born in Christchurch on the 20<sup>th</sup> November 1913, and she, with her family, attended the Woolston Methodist Church, where she was confirmed, and then answered the call to train as a Deaconess. She completed her training (1933-34) but owing to the depression there were no appointments available. However, in June 1936 Eileen went to Kawhia for two years and was dedicated in 1939.

Early in that year she married Rev. Arthur Witheford. Their ministry took them to Christchurch, Invercargill, Ashburton, Rangiora and back to Christchurch.

In all these places of ministry Eileen took an active roll in the work of the Women. MWMU, Guild and Fellowship. Eileen was President of the North Canterbury District Guild Fellowship when they were requested to draft a Constitution suitable for New Zealand Fellowships. This was presented to Conference for approval by the Law Committee and so with some changes was finally passed unanimously at Conference 1950. This constituted Ladies Guilds to have a secure and effective representation in Church Courts. The first Guild Conference under the Constitution was held in Christchurch in October 1950

In 1965 Rev Arthur Witheford was elected President of Conference. With an opportunity to travel overseas, but with no funding, she was determined to support her husband, so got herself a job to earn some money; something which was frowned upon at the time for a minister's wife to go out to work.

Eileen attended the 1960 Special Conference at Marton as a Guild Fellowship rep from South Canterbury and returned to Ashburton and worked to facilitate the smooth running of amalgamation of Guilds and Missionary unions in South Canterbury.

Eileen was a member of the first MWF North Canterbury National Executive 1972 - 1974.

Everywhere the Withefords served the same comments were made: "their open home and open hearts", "people who were never too busy to care", their commitment to God, to the Church, and to people – they were all welcomed".

Several of the young people from their various Youth Groups throughout New Zealand, have also entered the ministry.

The Withefords retired to Sumner Christchurch, and Eileen died peacefully 26<sup>th</sup> May 2006.

#### Elaisa Fonmoa 1935 – 2006

Elaisa Fonmoa was the founder of the Fijian Methodist Congregation at Clarence Church, now part of the Hornby Riccarton Parish.

He first formed a Fijian language service at a school building in Aranui in 1999, then moved to Opawa Methodist Church in 2000. It was through his hard work and good relationship with Church leaders in the community, that permission was granted for him to use the Clarence St Methodist Church and also be part of its congregation.

He was a very strong and committed Methodist. Even though Elaisa faced many difficulties and conflicts within the wider Fijian community, he was steadfast and proudly moved on with his hard work in building the foundation of the Fijian Methodist congregation.

Here are some very important achievements that came to being through the able and sound leadership of the late Elaisa Fonmoa;

- a. The Fijian Methodist congregation is now officially part of the Hornby Riccarton Parish.
- b. The Fijian Methodist congregation has been granted the permission to maintain the presence of the Methodist Church at Clarence St Church.
- c. The Fijian Congregation will now have a Fijian Methodist minister to look after them. This is a history in itself.

The latter was relayed to him (Elaisa), just a day before he passed away.

He also worked very closely with Revd. Peter Williamson and Revd. Barbara Stevens for the establishment of the Fijian Methodist congregation in the Hornby Riccarton Parish.

All praise and glory be to God, for His faithful servant who had been a source of inspiration, strength and blessings to the Fijian congregation and the wider Church community.

May God's peace and blessings be with his family.

#### Walter Arnold Hadlee CBE, OBE. 1914 - 2006

With the death on 29 September of Walter Hadlee in his 92<sup>nd</sup> year New Zealand Methodism has lost one of its most loyal and honoured members. His services to the Church, to the business community and to sport earned him the respect of all who knew him.

Walter was born at Lincoln on 4 June 1915 and as a boy attended four different primary schools. (Dayle his son was later to be principal of one of these.) He attended Christchurch Boys' High School from 1928-32 and it was here that cricket began to figure significantly in his life. An old boy, who had been in the 1931 New Zealand cricket team to tour England, spoke to the school and said he saw no reason why some of the boys listening could not be part of the next team to tour. This was a **challenge** for Walter. In 1932 he became captain of the school 1<sup>st</sup> XI and he was a member of the New Zealand team to tour England in 1937. So it was as a cricketer he became known throughout New Zealand. The highlight of his career was to captain the 1949 New Zealand team on their very successful tour of England. This team was managed by his friend and fellow Methodist, Jack Phillipps. In all he played eleven tests for New Zealand, seven as captain. Retiring from first class cricket he continued as an administrator in Canterbury and New Zealand Cricket for thirty-two years, and held the positions of Selector, Team Manager, Chairman of N.Z. Cricket, President of N.Z. Cricket. In 1983 was made a Life Member of N.Z. Cricket. Sporting interests were not limited to cricket he represented Canterbury at Rugby and Canterbury and Otago at Hockey. He also played a part in the administration of Rugby and Hockey. In later years his active participation in sport centred round Bowls and Golf. His services to sport were recognised with the award of the OBE in 1950 and the CBE in 1978.

As a Chartered Accountant, Walter built up a reputation in the business world as a wise administrator. He was on the Board of Directors of eleven companies and chairman of three of these. He was always ready to share his expertise when it was requested and several charitable organisations benefited as a result. An example of this was his service on the Board of the Salvation Army for twenty years.

For 60 years Walter was a much loved member of St. John's Church, Fendalton, now part of Christchurch North Parish. He served on the St. John's Trust for many years until the property was transferred to the Board of Administration. At the time of his death he was still a member of the Parish Property Committee. He was always ready to help in any way possible. At the beginning of this year when the parsonage was being prepared for the arrival of the new minister, the question was, "Who will mow the lawns?" and it was 90 year old Walter who put up his hand. His abilities were also recognised by the wider Church and in 1948 he became a member of the Supernumerary Fund Board, a position he filled until Government legislation forced changes to the governance of this fund.

A man of faith and commitment, humble about his own achievements and quick to acknowledge those of others. In the tributes that flowed after his death the most used word was Gentleman. It is as a Christian Gentleman, who will be missed by the St. John's congregation and the Parish as a whole, that we will remember him.

To his wife Lilla and their family the Church extends its love and sympathy and to Walter we say, "Well done good and faithful servant."

#### Supplementary Tributes from Conference 2005

#### CELIA TE ATAKOHU FITZPATRICK (Sister Te Atakohu) 1929 - 2005

Celia Te Atakohu Fitzpatrick was born on 30<sup>th</sup> June 1929 at Kawhia and educated at Turakina Maori Girls College near Marton.

Prior to entering Deaconess House in 1949 she served with the Maori Mission based in Hamilton. In the early 1950's Sister Te Atakohu worked in the regions of Hokianga, Kawhia and the Maori Mission of the Auckland Circuit.

In 1955 Te Atakohu was made to resign so she could marry Edward (Ted) Seymour and they had one child known as Billy.

Married life was not easy and she spent part of it on Auckland's North Shore. During these years, she actively participated at the Beach Haven Methodist Church as a member of the Women's Fellowship; attended Thursday evening bible studies group held at Mr Pedersen's; taught Sunday School classes which her son also went to, and was involved with Maori services taken by Buddy Te Whare, Jerry Darvill, and others.

Te Atakohu did not enjoy good health. However, she went onto train as a Community Nurse working at Auckland Hospital. Te Atakohu completely registered and worked as a District Nurse around the North Shore. She left Auckland in the early 1980's for Tokoroa where contact with the Maori Division was lost.

Te Atakohu was an extremely private person with a wealth of knowledge especially in Maori. Her years as a Deaconess were special and valuable. She loved the Methodist Church and was a faithful servant. Te Atakohu passed away in the second week of June 2005. To her son Billy and whanau we extend our aroha and prayers.

E te whaea, moe mai i roto i te aroha o te Atua.

#### MATTHEW HIMI RAKENA 1930 to 2005

Matthew Rakena, a prominent figure in the Kaikohe and Hokianga districts, recently died following a long illness. He was best known in his role as Minita-a-iwi for the Maori Division of the Methodist Church of New Zealand which he joined in 1974 and covered the Kaikohe / North Hokianga district. Prior to this, he cleared land in Park Road, Kaikohe and laid the foundations for the Methodist Church building formerly known as Te Rongopai.

Born at Whangaroa on 28<sup>th</sup> June 1930, he was raised on the family farm in the Kaeo rural community of Pupuke. He then spent several years in the merchant navy travelling to the Pacific nations and around New Zealand. On his return to Whangaroa, Matthew became a forestry employee for many years, and in his capacity as bushman and tractor driver, quickly worked his way up to Bush Foreman whilst employed by Jack Bines, Basil Lloyd Contractors, Lanes Sawmills, Whangaroa, and Northland Sawmills in Kaikohe. He spent a further 18 years as a chamberhand at AFFCO Ltd in Moerewa and then took voluntary redundancy to become a Kaiarahi and chairperson for the Te Kohanga Reo o Te Rongopai.

On 15<sup>th</sup> January 1955 Matthew was married to Susan Albert in the Mangamuka Methodist Church by the Rev Matarae Tauroa. He was an extremely dedicated family man who is survived by his wife, Susan, 4 daughters, 2 sons, 25 grandchildren, 3 great grandchildren and 3 whangai children.

A keen sportsman, Matthew Rakena was a popular team player for the Whangaroa Rugby Club and progressed on to become a Hokianga representative player. He was also a team member of the Kaikohe Rugby Club playing alongside rugby great, JB Smith, and was assistant coach for the Ohaeawai, Waipapa and Motatau Senior Rugby Clubs. Whilst raising his family, he became coach for the Kaikohe Junior and Teenage U10 Rugby, Ohaeawai U16 Rugby and Bay of Islands School rugby team for the Culham Cup. In 2003, he travelled to France and Europe to support his grandson, Karena Wihongi (now resident in France), in crucial rugby matches. His interests extended to woodchopping where he excelled and became a member of the Northland Axemens' Association.

Being a dedicated promoter of the Maori language, Matthew Rakena was a founding member of Te Kura Kaupapa Maori o Kaikohe – a school which has since gone from strength to strength with his continued support. Other community groups with which he was involved included: Trustee and treasurer for the Mangamuka Marae, chairperson for both the Te Rongopai Culture Club and local church committee, treasurer for the Ririwha Trust, representative to the Board of Te Taha Maori o Te Haahi Weteriana, representative to Conference for the Methodist Church of New Zealand, member of Te Taumata Kaumatua o Ngapuhi Nui Tonu, Nga Rangatira Whakakotahi o Aotearoa (Manu Ariki, Taumarunui), Te Patunga Marae committee, Te Hau o Te Tai Tokerau, Te Pu o te Wheke, Kaumatua for Wesley College, Far North District Council and the Hone Heke / Waimirirangi Rugby and Netball challenge.

Matthew was most renowned for his honesty and integrity and with his quiet disposition; he was a firm advocate for the spiritual teaching, education and safety for all children. He will be sadly missed by his family, friends and the community.

#### TIMARU PAEWHENUA ROGERS (nee Hauraki).

#### Known lovingly to all her family as "Nanny Ma" **2005**

'E tangi ana a Hokianga Whakapau Karakia' Haere rā e te mātangi ki waho Hokianga e, kei reira rā koe e Timaru e arohatia nei e .

He kāwai heke Wēteriana tõna. Ko āna teina, tuakana heke haere ki āna irāmutu me tana tamaiti, he pononga katoa rātou o te Haahi Wēteriana. He Minita-a-iwi Wēteriana tana tāne hoki.

Timaru served the ministry loyally with her husband Mare who was a Minita-a-iwi up until his death in 1979. In the same year, Timaru was appointed to the position of Minita-a-iwi serving her people everywhere.

She was actively involved in *nurturing and supporting the church rangatahi* at whānau, rohe and national level, especially within her own extended whānau. According to her mokopuna she was "A true follower of God and believed in Him and kept His name alive in all of us".

Timaru actively encouraged and nurtured the hāhi goal of *'Every member a minister, within his or her own community'*. Her home acting as a marae, to hold wananga for groups, organisations, individuals and whanau. She was always willing to share what she knew, and has lead numerous wananga on tikanga, reo, karakia, waiata and himene. Timaru was an avid learner and had a passion for singing and revitalising himene Maori and traditional waiata, especially those from Hokianga. She was a well-respected kuia within the Hokianga.

**'Costly discipleship'**. For Timaru this went hand in hand with her commitment to serving her Lord, this meant giving 120% to every one, she never picked or chose where or to whom she ministered to, but carried out her ministry work meeting peoples needs, nurturing the wairua as well as the tinana. Rain, hail or shine, day and night, sometimes missing whānau functions to fulfil her Minita-a-iwi duties.

"Being a rebel in the church for the sake of the church that ought to be". Timaru challenged recent Minita-a-iwi training processes, herself having no formal theological instruction but a lifetime of education on the marae. In doing so, she worked ecumenically with all local haahi leaders and kaikarakia.

*Her Māori World View* some times meant going against the contemporary rules and regulations of Te Haahi Wēteriana o Aotearoa. Wherever there was a need she answered the call, ministering to all, irrespective of who they were or what their haahi was.

*Fulfilling her understanding of the scriptural reading* "Where two or three are gathered in my name I am in your midst". For Timaru, this meant she did not need a building, as such, to give thanks to te Atua. Instead, with whomever she was with and where ever she was, karakia occurred naturally.

*The Methodist Church's bi-cultural journey* drew a lot of time within her ministry and life. Sometimes this became rather draining on her, but she continued to stand up for what she believed in, even if it meant she was a lone voice. Timaru actively participated at Rohe, Hui Poari and Conference level, right till the end.

## Records of Service for Retiring Presbyters & Deacons

#### Norman Brookes

Norman Brookes was born in Dublin, Ireland in 1941 and baptised in Dolphin's Barn Methodist Church where his father was the Sunday School Superintendent. In 1951 the Brookes Family immigrated to Christchurch NZ where they joined the Sumner Methodist Church.

Norman came to a personal faith through the Easter Camps at Amberley. As a young man he became part of a Sumner based Mission Band that took Services in the Woolston Lyttelton Circuit. In 1965 he candidated for Ministry.

At the end of his second year in Theological College he married Margaret Ussher (as per the rules in those days). On leaving College Norman did a holiday supply ministry in his home Circuit and when Conference met it was decided to station him there (this according to the late Rev. Alex McDowell was virtually unheard of - i.e. to have a first appointment in one's home Circuit). However it worked out well.

Following ordination Norman was appointed to St. Albans, Rugby St. where he served for five years. During this time Norman wrote his MA thesis on NZ Methodism and Church Union, which unknown to him at the time would serve him well later in ministry.

In 1977 Norman and Margaret and family set off to serve the Church in Ireland for six months in the Inishowen Peninsula in Donegal. After that they moved to Cheltenham in England where they served for a year in a Methodist Circuit which included responsibility for ministry in an Anglican-Methodist Shared Church in the heart of the town. On return to New Zealand Norman was stationed in the Orakei Circuit at Remuera where he ministered for six years. In his sixth year Norman and Margaret did an exchange of pulpits and went to Bendigo in Victoria for six months. At the end of that year he was appointed Development Division Superintendent, initially for two years but it ended up being eleven.

This position gave Norman scope to pursue some of his passions: evangelism, Church Union, and research. At the same time he found the position challenging as he sought to work through issues of bi-culturalism and to relate to an increasingly ethnically diverse Church. In 1996 he was appointed to Papakura were he served for over eight years. The first few years were somewhat tumultuous as they included a year when Norman was President and the Church was trying to deal with the extraordinarily difficult question of homosexuality and ordained ministry. However, Norman found the last four years at Papakura both encouraging and fruitful.

For many years Norman had a longing to serve again in Ireland and so with two years to go to retirement, and encouragement from several friends in Irish Methodism, he and Margaret left in 2004 to serve in a Circuit near Enniskillen in Northern Ireland.

Norman says that, "On looking back it is clear that Methodism has shaped my life and I am grateful for that. It is to be hoped that God's grace has also been at work but that is for others to judge."

#### William Eric Elderton

Bill Elderton was ordained to ministry 22 years ago at the Methodist Conference held at Blenheim. But in fact, it was a ministry begun in much earlier years.

Born in Auckland in 1943, Bill's early years included long periods of hospitalisation. But from that enforced passive activity, came an avid interest in literature, New Zealand and general history and stamp collecting.

The family moved to Christchurch and then to Gore. Those Southland years became the formative influence for Bill's ministry. It began with a ministry among children in Gore, Mataura and later, Woodhaugh.

Graduating Master of Arts in History from Otago University in 1966, the ministries of the Rev Ian Ramage and the Rev Henry Woolford became vital role models for Bill's own later ministry. Post graduation, Bill went on to Wellington and the New Zealand Library School. There, for more than 17 years his enthusiastic Christian commitment was expressed through the Ngaio Union Parish as a Lay Preacher and in youth ministry.

Bill had spent a year in Trinity Theological College in 1970, but it was not until 1980 that a call to presbyteral ministry took him into the Home Setting training programme for self-supporting ministry. It seemed at the time, to be the way forward in Bill's commitment to ministry. He completed qualification as Licentiate of

Theology and was ordained in 1984. Self-supporting in ministry to the Ward Memorial Methodist Church in Northland, Wellington Bill continued his secular work within Distance Education in the Department of Education.

Bill relinquished ministry at Ward Memorial in 1988 and in 1995, transferred to work in tertiary education in the College of Education in Palmerston North. But by 1995, the call to a fulltime presbyteral ministry took Bill to Invercargill. Between 1995 and 1998, Bill gave vital leadership to that parish during a period of significant strategic change.

In 1999 he was appointed to the St Albans Uniting Parish in Christchurch, where again considerable strategic change was about to be required. His partnership in ministry with multiple congregations and Presbyterian colleagues was appreciated and valued. In 2004 he took up ministry at St Mary's Cooperating Parish, Glen Innes and the Aotea Chapel in Auckland City. Yet again, the Church demanded a great deal from Bill as his ministry stretched across not only multiple, but very diverse requirements.

Bill's ministry has not been confined just to congregational and parish life. It has stretched beyond the confines of the institutional Church into the Community of Men and Women in Church and Society; his careful preparation of annotated booklists of teenage novels addressing gay and lesbian concerns and issues of sexual abuse; his capacity to honestly and openly address with others his own sexuality and what it means to be gay; and his ability to develop meaningful, living theology in a gay and lesbian context.

To his years of ministry, Bill has brought a cheerful, genuine and compassionate concern for everyone. Retirement from active ministry will not detract from his care and concern. It will simply be a ministry that will continue to be gifted to the Church and community in new and creative ways, as it has always been. And, knowing Bill, it will undoubtedly resonate with the cry "We must have lunch sometime" and "I know a great place for coffee".

#### Jessie Kerr

Jessie was born in Scotland, and is very proud of her Celtic roots. As a child and young person Jess was richly blessed by the people who touched her life. She was brought up in a loving, safe home with parents who encouraged her to question and search for answers. Jessie's father's minister was the Rev George McLeod, the founder of the Iona Community and their parish minister was the Rev William Barclay. Her God -mother was a Methodist Deaconess. The church was at the centre of her family's daily lives, integral in their building and growing in faith as well as the enjoyment of a very social life.

In 1956 Jess began training and gained her certificate as a State Registered Nurse. She worked as a District Nurse and then Hospital Social Worker in the Gorbals in Glasgow, a very poor social-economic area. In 1969 Jess moved with her husband Bill and two, sons, Peter and Alasdair to Australia. During the next five years Bill and Jess were very involved in Youth Ministry. They came to New Zealand in 1975 where Jess trained as a Counsellor, then as a Child and Family Therapist. Jess feels a great passion for working with young people and families.

In 1984 Jess was appointed Deputy Director of the Glenburn Centre in West Auckland. This was run jointly by Presbyterian Support and the Ministry of Education. It was a dream come true, a two million dollar project that enabled them to work residentially with children who had emotional and behavioral problems, their parents, extended families and home school teachers. A very special time in her life as she watched children and families learn to grow and support and respect each other.

Following the sudden death of her husband in 1985 Jess moved back to the South Island. Five years later she became the Warden at Ta Waiora Healing Centre, a place for quiet retreat and a place where hurting people could find love and care and listening.

Jess was the non-stipendary Lay Minister at St Andrews Glentunnel Church for ten years. The congregational members of St Andrews encouraged her to train in the Methodist Home Setting Ministry with Distance Teaching from Otago University. She completed her two years as a Probationer there.

Jess then moved to Waimea Methodist Parish in Nelson where she has been for the last ten years with a special ministry to the elderly of the community, especially the privilege of being of service to them on the death of a family member. Jess has also been privileged to have been asked by the wider community to

conduct funerals in the case of traumatic deaths, such as suicides and accidents.

Jess has served four years as the Nelson Marlborough West Coast District Synod Superintendent. Jess says it has been challenging and rewarding to work in ministry with many gifted people in congregations and regional church committees. She loves working with people and thanks God for the gifts and skills she was given that have enabled her to reach out in love to meet the needs of the marginalized, the oppressed, abused, young and old.

Jess looks forward to retirement and spending more time with her family.

Members of the Nelson, Marlborough West Coast area and especially members of the Waimea and St Andrews Glentunnel Parish express sincere thanks to Jess and her family. Go in God's love and peace Jess.

#### John Meredith

John grew up in Invercargill where, after leaving school, he was employed as a clerk-in-courts (Justice Department). The North Invercargill Methodist Church (later St Mark's) was a formative influence during the ministries of Marcia and Fred Baker, Wilf Cable and Ron Wood.

Accepted as a candidate for ministry, John studied at Trinity College, Auckland 1965-67 and then served in Upper Hutt, Ashburton and Balclutha. While in Ashburton he and Jill McGeorge of Rakaia were married, and Jill has made her continuing contribution to worship as a musician. In 1973 John was released from pastoral duties to take up a position as social worker with the Department of Social Welfare (DSW) in Invercargill. The granting of a study award to complete a social work qualification at Victoria University saw a move to Plimmerton and subsequent service in Wellington, Porirua and Greymouth.

In 1982 John was appointed Manager of Social Work Services in Timaru. Jill taught English at Craighead Diocesan School, eventually being appointed Head of Department. They were members of the Woodlands Road congregation in Timaru. In South Canterbury, and earlier in Otago-Southland, John served as Secretary of Synod, for a total of seventeen years. In Timaru, with encouragement from Ian Harris, he took the initiative for the formation of an Ephesus Group. Jill and John's two daughters, Lucy and Penny, spent most of their growing years in Timaru. Lucy now lives in Albany WA, and Penny, who has been in London, is returning to Wellington.

In 1992, following restructuring of statutory social services, John became Presbyter at St David's Union Church in Timaru. At St David's he encouraged cooperation with the Samoan Community. As this was a part time position he also served as Family Care Manager for Presbyterian Support (South Canterbury), undertook some teaching at Aoraki Polytechnic, supervised social work students for the University of Otago, marked university papers, and was widely used as a funeral celebrant. He also engaged in personal study which has been a continuing interest.

In January 2000 Jill and John moved to Western Australia to work with the congregations of Scarborough and Waterman of the Uniting Church in Australia. While there John completed the degree of Master of Theology from the University of Wales with tuition provided by Spurgeon's College in London. His dissertation was on the theology of songs of worship. He was also presented with a Lund Award by the Council of Churches of Western Australia in recognition of sustained support for ecumenical activities in the City of Stirling.

#### Beverley Laurene Osborn

Beverley was born into the Southland Methodist family in October, 1939, a first child for Emma (nee Mitchell) and Laurie Allott. She has a photo of her 8 year old self, labelled "4<sup>th</sup> Generation", standing outside St Peter's Methodist Church, Invercargill, on the occasion of its Diamond Jubilee. She took a full part in the Sunday School, Bible Class, Girls' Choir and all the concerts and pageants of that busy church

She completed her primary and secondary education in Invercargill and, during those years, worked her way through the Girl Guide movement from Brownies to Rangers. Reading, writing and crafts were her other interests and she was very involved as a school librarian right through her years at Southland Girls' High School. It was during this time that her life-long love affair with Stewart Island began, a generational inheritance developed through annual holidays.

Beverley graduated from Otago University in 1961, with an MA in English and then began a 4 year term of teaching at Queen's Girls' High School in Dunedin. She was a member of and a Bible Class leader at Dundas Street Methodist during her time in Dunedin and was an assistant Guide leader for a Mornington Company.

There followed a year of teaching at Central Southland College before her marriage to Jim Osborn at the end of 1966. Jim was a Londoner, once a stage carpenter at the Old Vic, who came to NZ via the airforce and settled on Stewart Island. Together there, they raised their four children, Jane, Richard, David and Alice. As no Methodist Church existed on the Island, the Osborn family became an integral part of Oban Presbyterian Church. Beverley was a founding member of the Halfmoon Bay Playcentre and took on the local Guide company, while Jim became the chairman of the Halfmoon Bay School Committee and a member of the Church Board of Managers. Life as part of a close-knit community on a very beautiful Island was busy, happy and fulfilling, especially when the children were old enough to enjoy the wilderness experiences of camping in isolated places.

The family moved to Otatara, just out of Invercargill, in 1981, when Jane reached High School age. Beverley worked for several years for NZ Statistics as a member of the Household Survey team and then became the first Southland Field Officer for the NZ Arthritis Foundation – a joyful opportunity to get into the "peoplecaring" field which felt like her true metier. She completed her Social Work Certificate as a post-graduate student of Otago University and it was while she was fulfilling the practical requirements of that course that she began a series of relieving appointments in the Southland Hospital's Social Work Dept. This led to permanent employment there. In Otatara, too, she led a Girl Guide Company for a number of years.

During the 1980s, the Osborn family were part of the Otatara Community Church, a joint use Methodist/Presbyterian congregation, led in alternate weeks by Rev Margaret Burnett from St Peter's Methodist and Rev Neil Cowie from St Paul's Presbyterian. Theologically, this proved to be excellent growing ground for Beverley, as she explored her own beliefs in relation to the very different theological perspectives of the two presbyters. Her calling to candidate for Methodist ministry in mid 1989 set the path for her immediate future, a clarity that was very helpful when Jim died suddenly in September that year.

Because of her family commitments, the Church made it possible for Beverley to train through the Homesetting Programme, though she was always destined for full-time itinerant ministry. She therefore became a student of Otago University for the third time, working through the Distance Learning Unit towards her Diploma of Theology and in the Invercargill Parish on the practical aspects of ministry training. This included the bonus of a year as President's Supply during Rev Margaret Burnett's presidential term. She believes that being thrown in the deep end has always provided her best learning opportunities.

In 1994 Beverley and a cousin spent 7 months on a world tour, which included seminars at Findhorn. During the rest of the year she finished her Diploma of Theology and lived on campus at Trinity College.

She was inducted into the Buller Union Parish in 1995 and felt very much at home there over the next eight years. There were increasing wider church responsibilities, particularly within the West Coast Union Church Council, which had a quadruple identity. Besides being the local UCC, it was also the West Coast JRC, the West Coast Presbytery and a third of the Nelson/Marlborough/West Coast Methodist District. Beverley's election to the chair of the UCC, made her an interim moderator for the Presbyterian Church, rather to her surprise. She served for 6 years on the West Coast Ethics Committee and for 3 years on the Westport Victim Support committee.

In 2003 she became Presbyter for Trinity Methodist, Napier and the following year was elected as Co-Superintendent – with John Thornley – for the Hawke's Bay/Manawatu Methodist District. During this time, she spent two and a half years as a member of the Consumer Advisory Group to the Health and Disability Commissioner and she enjoyed the ecumenical aspects of being part of the Napier Inner City Church Covenant.

Beverley's passion has been to provide opportunities for people to explore their faith for themselves and discover its vitality. She has wanted to open doors, share modern biblical scholarship and, above all, to prevent her congregations from being bored. She has enjoyed the challenge of being innovative, of using stories to connect with children – and adults --, of putting together creative liturgies, of involving congregations in active participation and of finding a variety of ways to present a faith that is relevant to the time and situation of the people. She is very grateful for the privilege of being welcomed into the lives of individuals and communities, for the opportunities to grow her facilitation and administrative skills and, above all, for the love so generously offered to her by so many people.

She retires to live busily and blissfully in paradise - a "going home" to Stewart Island.

#### Loraine Reid

A ministry of word, sacrament and pastoral care has always been at the forefront of the Christchurch Methodist Mission's services for older people. It gives expression to the Christian Church's holistic, values based understanding of unconditional care and concern and, at a time when services for older people are becoming an attraction to the commercial sector, remain a distinctive point of difference. For the past fourteen years such a ministry has been gifted to the Church by Loraine Reid.

First drawn into ministry in 1983 as a candidate for diaconal ministry, Loraine commenced ministry training as a home-setting student within the St John's Uniting Parish in Whangarei. There (and in contrast to later years), Loraine's focus in ministry was among younger women and their families.

However in the years immediately following, and while in Devon and Cornwall, Loraine was actively involved in ministry education programmes within the Church of England. Partly out of this experience, Loraine returned to New Zealand with fresh perspectives on the ministry she could offer and re-candidated for presbyteral ministry.

Loraine was ordained in 1988 at the Methodist Conference in Palmerston North and continued her selfsupporting ministry from the St John's Uniting Parish and to the wider community of Whangarei. It included chaplaincies to Ministry of Social Welfare within the Inter-Church Trade & Industry Mission (ITIM) and her work with Women's Refuge.

In 1991 Loraine and Terry moved from Whangarei to Christchurch, where Loraine continued valued ITIM chaplaincies to Canterbury Trust Bank and the Wool Research Organisation of New Zealand (Inc.).

In 1992 Loraine was appointed chaplain to the Christchurch Methodist Mission's WesleyCare services for older people. The first woman to be appointed to this ministry, Loraine has served WesleyCare and the Church with considerable distinction. Over these fourteen years, Loraine has gifted a gracious and care-filled ministry, moving among residents and families, listening and celebrating their life's journey, and counselling them in their grief. She has acted as advocate for those without family support and has extended her ministry to hospitals and homes throughout the city.

Loraine has taken imaginative initiatives in her ministry among residents. She has initiated animated discussions and has provided opportunities for worship. She has been the encourager and enabler of the lay and ordained ministries that share with her, responsibility for mid-week and Sunday services at WesleyCare. Loraine is an encourager of all who give time, energy and enthusiasm in so many ways to support WesleyCare's various programmes.

It is inevitable that in such a ministry, much time will be spent in the ending moments of life. The high regard families of residents have for Loraine bears its own testimony to the quality of relationships Loraine builds in ministry. Her sensitive awareness of life's journey; the care and comfort Loraine is able to offer families; her careful gathering of people's stories as their taonga. All this contributes to Loraine's outstanding leadership in services which memorably celebrate a life ended.

Nor should Loraine's artistic talent and interest be overlooked. In the midst of this demanding ministry, Loraine also found time and energy to complete a Batchelor of Arts (with Honours) in Art History.

In 2002 Loraine gathered together a small group of residents, staff and musicians and a collection of favourite hymns was compiled and published in an easy to read and manage book. The book is named "On Eagle's Wings" after one of Loraine's own paintings which illustrates the front cover of the book. Together with fourteen years of valued relationships and gracious pastoral care, the Hymn Book will be a lasting tribute to Loraine as she retires from active ministry.

#### Barbara Stephens

From Nelson to Riccarton (Christchurch) via Dunedin, The Hutt, Wellington, Christchurch, Singapore, Christchurch and Wellington yet again, Barbara has had a fascinating life and faith journey.

From a legal secretary in Nelson and a Bible Society Field Worker in Otago and Southland, Barbara undertook theological study and ministerial formation at Glen Leith Bible College and Knox Theological Hall, Dunedin. Barbara was then appointed a Deaconess with The Associated Churches of Christ in the Hutt

Valley after which she completed a B.A. in Sociology at Victoria University, Wellington. Then Barbara became Minister of St Albans Church of Christ and a Christchurch Based Field Worker in Christian Education.

Following time on the National Committee of Christian World Service, Barbara was appointed Executive Secretary for Education with the Christian Conference of Asia in Singapore before returning to Christchurch as the National Co-ordinator of Christian World Service. These appointments took Barbara to all points of the world in pursuit of justice and development with partner churches, agencies and community groups.

Further Parish work followed in Wellington South Union Parish before Barbara returned again to Christchurch as Superintendent Minister of the Hornby Riccarton Methodist Parish.

From this rich kaleidoscope of experience, Barbara emerges as both visionary and practical, a theologian with the larger justice and peace perspective as well as the compassionate pastor relating to local people and their particular priorities.

Always more ecumenical then denominational, Barbara moves easily within and across the boundaries of faith and culture, enjoying the challenge of different positions and perspectives.

Having recently embarked on a major post graduate study, one can imagine Barbara never ever really retiring for there is a never ending life and faith commitment to learn more and apply more. As Barbara herself has written, there is for her "a delight in experiencing the wonder of the wide diversity of human interaction in which the potential for growth, for respect of each other, and for mutual discovery and learning is always possible."

#### Keith James Taylor

It could be claimed that the seeds of Keith Taylor's long community orientated ministry were sown in Templeton. It had a population of 700 and a demanding social environment of Paparoa prison, the Templeton Farm School (I.H.C.), and racing industry in which his father was heavily involved. In each appointment there has been evidenced a compassion for the disadvantaged and a determination to map out an ecumenical strategy to enable effective social service.

Keith was born in Ashburton in 1940 and spent many earlier years with a spinster aunt attending Baring Square Methodist Church. Primary schooling in Templeton and secondary at Christchurch Boys High School. Without School Certificate, Lincoln College recommended two years practical faming experience prior to making application to train as a Farm Advisory Officer. At 17 he moved to South Canterbury living in a shepherd's hut. With the support of Owen Woodfield (who visited him on the farm) and Arthur Witheford he joined up with Baring Square Bible Class and studied for the Local Preachers' examination. He candidated and following a year in the School for Christian Workers, trained at Trinity and commenced a B.A. degree later majoring in Social Anthropology and Archaeology.

Keith was first stationed at Taihape where he focussed on Youth Work, leading the Youth programme for the Community. He was appointed an Hon. Child Welfare Officer for the Ventral Region. In addition, he became a Chaplain at Waiouru Military Camp where he was involved with 18 year olds undergoing their compulsory military training.

In his next appointment at Riccarton he initiated an ecumenical project with the Church and Society Commission of the National Council of Churches coordinating a sociological survey of the inner city suburb. He continued his chaplaincy and was also elected Chair of the Christchurch National Council of Churches.


A radical deepening of his social concern took place en route to the World Council of Churches Graduate School in Bossey, Switzerland. The N.C.C. arranged for him to visit Hong Kong, Manila and Calcutta where he was "plunged in at the deep end" and underwent life changing experiences. Bossey was followed by a three month placement at the International Centre in Coventry Cathedral which reinforced the focus of his ministry on contextual theology and praxis.

Returning to New Zealand, he joined the team at Wesley, Taranaki Street in Wellington within the Inner City Ministry. He was able to get the Roman Catholic Bishops; Conference, the United Synagogues of N.Z. and the N.C.C. to form a Commission whose focus was to be Immigration Policy and Refugees. It was a unique venture at that time in the United Nations because of its inter faith membership. Becoming a very influential

body, it worked closely with Government departments and International agencies. The Commission's independence enabled it to address issues of immigration policy. Keith became a specialist in this area and was a consultant on migration to the World Council of Churches, a representative to the U.N. summit on Refugees and a guest lecturer at Oxford.

Radical restructuring of Social Service took place in both Wellington and Auckland. Methodist Mission Northern has undergone huge changes in Management and Governance structures. The staff of over 700 has been reduced by more than half and management of the rest homes has been sold while instituting partnership for pastoral social support. Assets have been freed to focus on Research and Development. New partnerships have been formed and the issue of Homelessness in Auckland has been and will continue to be a major commitment. Such massive changes come at great cost to all involved and the strain of the years has been very heavy.

Keith Taylor is a visionary thinker who has engaged in strategic planning and with strong networking skills, has been able to forge partnerships ensuring the Church is oriented towards the city. It has been an ecumenical ministry acknowledging "the little ones of the world". His ministry has been immensely costly, often misunderstood, not without its critics, but which remains focussed and is planned to continue in new ways in new days. The Church is grateful and wishes Keith well in the future.

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#### PRESIDENCY REVIEW GROUP **Report to Conference 2006**

The Presidency Review Group, was set up in accordance with the decision of the 2005 Conference (Decision 5.1, Page A-12):

The President is to convene a group based on the representation of Superintendents (or their representative(s)) of Vahefonua, Wasewase, Sinoti Samoa, the Evangelical Network and Te Taha Maori together with the Directors Mission Resourcing and including Past President Lynne Frith, Past Vice President David McGeorge, and other interest groups to enable all views to be heard. Their task is to critique the process for the appointment of President and Vice President and work with

Law Revision to bring a preliminary report to Synods and Hui Poari and a full report to Conference next vear as to process for the future.

Tauiwi has identified there is a need for them for clarity around the Memorandum of Understanding on the issue of Presidency.

The membership of the group varied at times, due to availability. The following were at some stage members of the group: Andrea Williamson, Paula Taumoepeau, Aso Samoa Saleupolu, Nigel Hanscamp, Diana Tana, John Salmon, Mary West, Joji Tokodei, Susan Thompson, Lynne Frith, David McGeorge, Lana Lazarus, Keita Hotere, Pari Waaka, Greg Morgan, Faleatua Faleatua, Brian Peterson, Rex Nathan, Bella Ngaha, Gillian Laird, Alipati Livani.

#### **Reports and Responses**

In February the Group sent an Initial Report around the Church, setting out what the Group saw as its core focus and identifying the central question for Te Taha Maori, as expressed through Hui Poari. The core focus points were identified in this way:

- The primary focus of the Group's work will be the selection processes for President and Vice President: the processes for nomination, discussion, and appointment.
- Associated with this will be consideration of pastoral care for those involved in the processes.
- Alonaside the process questions, the Group recognises the need to consider what it means for a member of the Presidency team to be "pastor to the whole church". This will involve looking at such things as theological understandings of leadership and of sexuality.

The central question from Hui Poari was:

Would Tauiwi accept a gay or lesbian person as President or Vice President?

This report called for responses from groups and individuals within the Church, and a considerable number of responses were received. Following is a summary of the responses received by the Presidency Review Group. Because these responses were received in confidence, the Group has determined that it would not be appropriate to reveal the identity of the responders in relation to their responses.

#### April 2006 responses:

Otago / Southland Synod, Hamilton / Hamilton East Parishes, Waikato / Waiariki Synod, J Thornley, Auckland Synod, Vahefonua Tonga, Sinoti Samoa, Wellington Synod, Central South Island Synod (northern region). Stoke parish, Manukau Synod, D Baird, Taranaki / Wanganui Synod, Waipawa Co-operating Parish, M Donald, members of the Gay & Lesbian Network, R Sugrue, L Wall, Evangelical Network. An earlier response had been received from Faith and Order committee.

The group looked at the responses overall, and summarized them under 3 questions, adding other pertinent comments. The group was careful to look only at the responses, and not to 'guess' what might be said from what we know of people. We also note that some responses (esp on Q 2) are contradictory.

These responses were considered carefully, and the Presidency Review Group appreciated the effort made to give feedback at that stage in the process. In looking at the responses, it was clear that at some points there was general consensus, while at others there was a wide diversity of perspective and opinion. Responses made a variety of comments on the key question raised by Te Taha Maori through Hui Poari, while others made no direct comment. The responses overall suggested the processes for selection were working as they were intended to – a response which did not necessarily indicate agreement with the processes.

This perspective was included in the Group's report to August Synods, Hui Poari, and other groups.

#### August 2006 Responses:

The Group asked for responses from Hui Poari, Tauiwi Strategy, Synods, Gay & Lesbian network, Faith and Order Committee, Elders, Wasewase ko Viti kei Rotuma, Evangelical Network.

Some of the responses received were presented as a group response, others as collections of comments or responses from synod subgroups. Responses were received from: Manukau Synod, Sinoti Samoa, Waikato / Waiariki Synod, Nelson / Marlborough / West Coast synod, Central South Island Synod, Otago/Southland Synod, Hui Poari, Tauiwi Strategy. The group also received a draft of the response from Auckland Synod and 2 individual responses. The individual responses are not included in the summary below.

The following summarises the responses under the 4 suggested recommendations and 2 other issues asked by the Group:

- 1. Conference to arrange the preparation of guidelines for Presidential nominees to use in formatting their profiles for the Conference Agenda.
- 2. Conference asks the Law Revision Committee to revise the wording of Sections 7.5.1.7 (e)-(h) in the Laws and Regulations (the process of the 5+5 Panel and its reporting back to Conference) to make clear that the 5+5 Panel reports a decision to the General Secretary, not a recommendation. It is suggested that the report be in the form, "The 5+5 Panel processes have been followed, and the decisions are..."
- Conference asks the Directors of Mission Resourcing in consultation with the Tumuaki to prepare discussion starters on the following topics to assist reflection in the Church during 2007: Theological understandings of leadership The role and understanding of the President as 'Chief Pastor'
- Questions around the structure and term and related aspects of the Presidency.
  4. Tauiwi Strategy Meeting is asked to initiate and facilitate discussion throughout Tauiwi regarding Te Taha Maori's core question, "Would Tauiwi accept a gay or lesbian person as President or Vice President?"

The August report noted also some other steps already being taken: As decided by Conference 2005 (Decision 5.2, Page A-12), the General Secretary will provide clear guidelines and processes for the 5+5 panel (including what happens if there is there is no agreement between the two parties represented on the panel), and it is recommended that these processes are made available in the Conference Handbook. The General Secretary is also asked to clarify the role of members of the 5+5 panel as part of this process.

The Pastoral Committee is being asked to take responsibility for ensuring that adequate and appropriate pastoral care is in place for each nominee (as noted in the Report, above).

In analysing the responses to both Reports, the Review Group identified that some of the comments on the selection processes for President and Vice President expressed views on the structure of the processes (nominations, 5+5, etc), while others discussed aspects of the way the processes worked in practice.

Inevitably, some individuals or groups expressed unease about various components of the processes or about the way they have operated. There are differing expectations about the way any process of selection should take place in order to be 'fair', and some of these differences are cultural. The group recognises also a question of trust, when any small group is entrusted with a task. This is not easy to address, but has been raised a number of times.

Many of the responses seemed to show a lack of understanding of the current processes, and the Group hopes that work can be done to ensure people understand the processes and how they function. The Group regards the decision of Conference 2005 to have written process details for the 5+5 Panel as an essential step.

### Memorandum of Understanding

The 2005 Conference decision recognised that clarity about the Memorandum of Understanding in relation to the Presidency is important for Tauiwi. Some of the responses to the Group suggest that clarity remains an issue (even though a statement explaining the origin of the Memorandum of Understanding was attached to the Initial Report), and this has been underlined by questions and comments around the Church. Having undertaken consultation with people involved in the original preparation, the Review Group makes the following statement on the Memorandum:

Questions continue to be raised about the Memorandum of Understanding. In order to ensure the status and application were accurately stated, clarification has been sought from those involved in developing the Memorandum of Understanding.

At the 2003 Conference, there was not agreement between Te Taha Maori and Tauiwi about the ordination of gay and lesbian people. It was suggested and agreed that Council of Conference would meet during that Conference to find a way forward.

The Council of Conference statement, received by Conference as the way forward, reads: Recognising that Te Taha Maori reaffirms its position as agreeing to the ordination of gay and

lesbian persons, and that Tauiwi accepts there would be no opposition to the ordination of gay and lesbian persons provided that a memorandum of agreement was accepted, Council of Conference suggests to Conference that a memorandum of understanding in relation to this issue alone be prepared.

As this is a partnership issue Te Taha Maori expect to be a part of the negotiations for the compilation of the memorandum of understanding. Te Taha Maori reiterates such an understanding would only be considered for the issue of the ordination of gay and lesbian persons. (Question 30, Decisions 4 and 5. F-10, Conference 2003)

The completed and signed Memorandum of Understanding based on this statement (and thus relating solely to ordination) was presented to the 2004 Conference for affirmation.

### Wider Questions

Many issues related to the Presidency were raised in the responses to the Group's Initial Report, in discussion around the Church, and in responses to the Group's report to August Synods and Hui Poari. Some issues did not seem directly relevant to the task that was asked of the Review Group. However, many of the issues raised are significant, and the Group believes it is appropriate for these to be considered by the Church. The Group suggests that the Directors of Mission Resourcing prepare "discussion starters" for that purpose. The Group is suggesting three main topic areas at present: our various theological understandings of leadership, the role and understanding of the President as 'Chief Pastor', and the structure and term and related aspects of the Presidency. The Review Group's hope is that reflection and discussion on these topics can take place widely during 2007.

The Group acknowledges that there are different views in the Church on where the current priorities lie. For Te Taha Maori, the question of acceptance or otherwise of a gay or lesbian in a Presidency role is the prior question to resolve, before wider matters of Presidency are considered. Some in Tauiwi would agree with this, while others consider it is important to grapple now with the wider issues of Presidency. From the responses, it appears there is no current consensus within Tauiwi on Te Taha Maori's core question. One view within Tauiwi is that more time is needed to consider this question. The Review Group believes it is important for the Church to acknowledge the significance of Te Taha Maori's question, and encourages Tauiwi Strategy Meeting and groups within Tauiwi to grapple with the question of accepting gay or lesbian persons as President or Vice President. This was the crucial sticking point at Conference 2005, and the purpose of exploring it further is to help find a way ahead regarding this aspect of the Presidency of Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa. The Review recognises this is an area of biblical and theological perspective, and also that it affects the lives of persons very deeply. However, the Group believes we owe it to each other and to the Church to keep examining the issues and the possibilities for moving ahead, and hopes that some Tauiwi response can be made soon.

Following initial consultation with the Law Revision Committee, it is clear that some issues (such as having more than one nomination to Conference) cannot easily or fairly be legislated for, though the restriction of nominations to one for each Synod might be altered. The Review Group does consider that the various parts of the Church need to undertake the process of nomination carefully, thoughtfully, and prayerfully.

Pastoral concern for those involved in any process of nomination and selection is important, and the Group suggests that the Pastoral Committee appropriately has an oversight role to ensure that adequate and appropriate pastoral care is in place for all nominees. This is especially important at the times when the process is particularly stressful: such as during discussion by the Caucus groups, at the announcement of the 5+5 decisions, and in follow-up afterwards.

As decided by Conference 2005 (*Decision 5.2, Page A-12*), the General Secretary will provide clear guidelines and processes for the 5+5 panel (including what happens if there is there is no agreement between the two parties represented on the panel), and it is recommended that these processes are made available in the Conference Handbook. The General Secretary is also asked to clarify the role of members of the 5+5 panel as part of this process.

In summary, the Presidency Review Group focused primarily on the processes of nomination and selection of the President and Vice President, in accordance with the decision of last Conference. While acknowledging difficulties caused through the decisions of last Conference, the Group is not suggesting any major changes to the processes as they stand However it acknowledges there are wider and potentially more significant issues regarding the Presidency that the Church will helpfully consider during and following Conference 2006. Key among these is the question raised as the core question by Te Taha Maori.

### Suggested Decisions:

1. The Report is received.

- Conference notes the significance, for Te Taha Maori and for the Church as a whole, of Te Taha Maori's core question, "Would Tauiwi accept a gay or lesbian person as President or Vice President?".
- 3. Conference asks Tauiwi Strategy Meeting to report to Hui Poari by August 2007 its response to Te Taha Maori's core question.
- 4. Conference asks the Directors of Mission Resourcing in consultation with the Tumuaki to prepare discussion starters for the whole church on the following topics:
  - i. Theological understandings of leadership
  - ii. The role and understanding of the President as 'Chief Pastor'
  - iii. Questions around the structure and term and related aspects of the Presidency.
- 5. Conference asks the Law Revision Committee to revise the wording of Sections 7.5.1.7 (e)-(h) in the Laws and Regulations (the process of the 5+5 Panel and its reporting back to Conference) to make clear that the 5+5 Panel reports a decision to the General Secretary, not a recommendation. It is suggested that the report be in the form, "The 5+5 Panel processes have been followed, and the decisions are..."
- 6. Conference asks the Law Revision Committee to revise the current regulation (*Law Book* clause 7.5.1.7) to enable Synods to nominate up to two persons each for the positions of President and Vice President.
- 7. Conference asks Council of Conference to prepare guidelines for Presidential nominees to use in formatting their profiles for the Conference Agenda.
- 8. Conference asks the Pastoral Committee to include in its annual business the pastoral support of nominees for President and Vice president in all aspects of the nomination and selection processes.

Our reflection now might be on what relationships exist between Te Taha Maori and the various cultural groups that make up Tauiwi. Perhaps Tauiwi could consider how within the life of the Conference relationships between Pakeha, Tongan, Samoan, Fijian, Korean and other groups are being developed

within the primary Bicultural Te Taha Maori – Tauiwi relationship. Through these discussions it might be seen that the resolution of Conference that the Bicultural journey is the essential first step towards a multicultural church is progressing towards a fulfilment.

Our question now is: whose responsibility is it to continue the development of bicultural understandings and to extend the partnerships between the various groups that will lead to a truly multi-cultural church?

  - a) That the 6,100 Parish members were not consulted on the issue of seconded ministries.
  - b) That the information conveyed by the then Secretary of the Vahefonua, to the Tauiwi Caucus and the Conference, namely, that some consultation had been carried out, was misleading. There was no consultation at least at the Parish meetings and at the Congregations' meetings.
  - c) That the Conference be culturally sensitive to and considerate of the wishes of the Tongan members of the Auckland Manukau Parish in allowing them to discuss and decide on issues of seconded ministry and what is best for them.
  - d) That the majority of the adult population of the Auckland Manukau Tongan Parish are migrants from Tonga and are favourable towards seconded ministry.
  - e) It has been argued that a case against secondment is the immigration issue of seconded Tongan Presbyters taking advantage of their time in New Zealand to seek Permanent Residence status. This is a racist argument and does not align with the move toward the multi-cultural journey.
