

Our Church's Mission in Aotearoa New Zealand is to reflect and proclaim the transforming love of God as revealed in Jesus Christ and declared in the Scriptures. We are empowered by the Holy Spirit to serve God in the world. The Treaty of Waitangi is the covenant establishing our nation on the basis of a power-sharing relationship, and will guide how we undertake mission. In seeking to carry out our mission we will work according to these principles:

Ko te putake a to tatou Hahi Weteriana i Aotearoa nei, he whakakite atu, he kauwhau hoki i te aroha whakatahuri o te Atua, he mea whakaatu mai i roto i a Ihu Karaiti, me nga Karaipiture. Christian community

To be a worshipping, praying, and growing community, sharing and developing our faith and working through its implications in our social context.

Evangelism

To challenge people to commitment to Christ and Christ's way.

Flexibility

To be flexible, creative, and open to God's Spirit in a changing world and Church, so that the Church is relevant to people's needs. To release energy for mission rather than to absorb energy for maintenance.

Church unity

To foster networks and relationships with communities of faith having similar goals.

Inclusiveness

To operate as a Church in ways that will enable the diversity of people (e.g. all ages, all cultures, male and female) to participate fully in the whole life of the Church, especially decision-making and worship.

To encourage each person to develop his/her full potential by accepting and nurturing each other, developing skills and providing resources, challenging and enabling for service in the Church and community.

Cross-cultural awareness

To become aware of, and challenged by, each other's cultures.

To work for justice for any who are oppressed in Aotearoa New Zealand, keeping in mind the implications of the Treaty of Waitangi. To share resources with the poor and disadvantaged in Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

Peace

To be peacemakers between people and in the world.

Healing

To listen for hurt and work for healing.

To care for creation.

Procedure for election of ...

President & Vice-President

SECTION 7:5.1.7

(d) Tauiwi and Te Taha Maori will each select its preferred candidates for the offices of both President and Vice-President according to their own procedures.

Process

- 1. Hui Poari and Tauiwi Strategy Committee each nominate five members for the Conference panel from the membership of their respective Council of Conference members.
- 2. The Panel is <u>not</u> the Council of Conference (Council membership is a convenient way of selecting Connexionally experienced people).
- 3. The first task of the panel is to choose two Convenors, one from each of the groups of five.
- 4. The five members of Taha Maori and the five from Tauiwi bring to the panel the names agreed by their caucus groups as being appropriate people to lead Te Haahi for the following Connexional year.
- 5. In conversation as a group, the panel's task is to come to a consensus as to the names of the President and Vice President Elect. Only those names which are common to both caucus groups are to be considered. The panel does this as a Conference panel, having listened into the discussions in their respective caucus groups as to both the task of the Presidency and the qualities required in this coming year.
- 6. The Panel should, from the names acceptable to both caucus groups for Presidency, select the President, having regard to the qualities and skills necessary for that office. The panel should then, from the names acceptable to both caucus groups for the Vice Presidency, select the Vice President, having regard to the qualities and skills necessary for that office and the person whom the Panel believes would be able to work in a complementary manner with the President as a Presidential team.
- 7. If there are no names in common for either President or Vice President, the two caucus groups shall reconvene to enquire whether any names not previously forwarded to the 5+5 from the list of nominations in the Conference agenda, would then be acceptable. If additional names are agreed upon, the panel meets again and follows the process from paragraph 4 above.
- 8. (a) In the event that it is still not possible to have any names in common for the presidency, then the current President and Vice President remain in office for a further year.
 - (b) In the event that there is a commonality which enables the selection for President but not the Vice President the existing Vice President will remain in office with the newly elected President for a further year.
- 9. If the panel members at any point in their conversations require any assistance that may help them reach a consensus they may call on the General Secretary and the Legal Advisor.
- 10. The request for assistance is conveyed to both parties by one or other of the Convenors.
- 11. The request for assistance, noting the specific reasons for the assistance, is to be put in writing by the panel.
- 12. The assistance given by General Secretary and Legal Adviser is also noted in writing by the two Convenors and checked for accuracy prior to the General Secretary and Legal Adviser leaving the panel.
- 13. Having come to a consensus, the Convenors report to the General Secretary that the appropriate process has been followed, and name the President and Vice President for the next year.
- 14. At an appropriate time the General Secretary reports to President that this is the decision of the panel.
- 15. The names of the duly appointed President and Vice-President Elect are then announced by the President.



Conference Decision Making

The primary goal of the decision-making process is to enable Te Taha Maori (Tangata Whenua, the people who are of the land) and Tauiwi (the people who came later and settled here) – partners of Te Hahi Weteriana o Aotearoa, the Methodist Church of New Zealand – to make decisions which demonstrate partnership.

The first step in decision-making is for Te Taha Maori to reach general agreement and Tauiwi to reach general agreement on the decision before them. Then the two groups meet together to see if they can agree with a suggested decision.

Facilitation of the partnership decision-making process requires particular skills, which not all elected leaders will have developed, so an experienced facilitator may be asked by the President or Vice-President to lead the Conference at such times.

PRINCIPLES

The following are principles for making decisions in a manner which demonstrate our Treaty Partnership: i.e. between Taha Maori and Tauiwi.

- The aim of Conference decision-making is to discern what is best for the Church.
- A decision is made only when it is clear that both partners i.e. Taha Maori and Tauiwi can state that they can agree with the suggested decision.
- Taha Maori may caucus if this will enable their group to reach general agreement so a partnership decision can be explored.
- Partners may choose their own language for the discussion. (Tauiwi will need to decide the language(s) appropriate for them).
- When the partners do not agree, no decision can be made. Instead a process will be established which may lead to agreement in the future.
- The Council of Elders will monitor the process and may guide it.

DECISION-MAKING STRATEGIES

Consensus is a term often used when general agreement or substantial support, rather than majority rule, is a group's aim. "Consensus" as generally understood in relation to decision-making in large groups, enables:

- participation by a larger number of members
- the opportunity for minority options to be acknowledged
- a greater chance of obtaining unity of purpose in a group with a variety of values
- more stable, longer lasting decisions.

Consensus does not mean unanimity or total agreement. Rather it is the group agreeing to work together in a certain way, even though some members might prefer not to, e.g.

We are prepared to accept this decision because:

- it is for the good of the group
- we see it is so important
- we feel that our viewpoint has been adequately expressed
- we do not agree, but in the interests of the Church we will allow this to be the decision.

In consensus decision-making, if it is clear that no agreement is possible at the time of the discussion, before the topic is adjourned the President may choose to ask the Council of Conference to meet to explore whether there is any way forward. If Council reports that there is no way forward then plans

will be made for other approaches which may lead to consensus in the future. In the meantime the status quo will continue.

MEMBERS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Consensus decision-making requires a high level of member responsibility and individuals need to be aware of how they can contribute in a helpful manner. *Members should:*

- expect to contribute briefly, to the point, and only once on a topic

- prepare what they have to say and speak only if that point has not already been made
- contribute material if it assists the discussion or reconciles an apparent difference
- keep silent if they cannot contribute in a way which aids the discussion.

PROCESSES

Some processes help us to listen to each other and find a way forward for the Church. *For example:*

Discussion

Contribution which assists decision is about

- The <u>issue</u>
- <u>Theology</u> of the issue
- Suggested ways forward

Consensus

The process of seeking consensus can use a number of techniques which may assist the group to reach its general agreement.

Some of these are:

- caucusing
- brainstorming to collect ideas
- buzzing in pairs or threes to clarify a position
- dividing into small groups to respond to the same of different parts of the topic
- having a prepared presentation of the issues involved
- adjourning the topic till later in the agenda and having two or three people work at finding an alternative way forward
- a majority decision
- having members indicate non-verbally if they agree/disagree with the ideas being expressed
- identifying common ground and then working on areas of difference
- asking those with a different opinion if recording their view will enable them to allow the decision to be made.

Caucusing is a method used in large groups to assist decision making. It is a meeting of group(s) within the larger group. Caucusing enables any group to clarify its position on the business in hand. Conference does not continue when it divides into Taha Maori/Tauiwi caucus groups, so it is not appropriate for the President, Vice-President or facilitator of the Conference to continue facilitating any of the smaller groups.

In the Conference Taha Maori or Tauiwi can call for their group to caucus, but only if doing so seems likely to assist the full group to reach a decision.

There are 3 ways for this to happen:

- (a) the person presiding over the Conference may determine that caucusing is appropriate
- or (b) Tauiwi may call for a caucus
- or (c) Taha Maori may call for a caucus.

Conference then divides into Taha Maori and Tauiwi groups. The people who facilitate the full Conference do not lead the small groups, so these groups need to have their own facilitators ready.

Caucus process

Each group decides its own process for establishing its position on the topic.

- (a) They may work in one group
- or (b) They may divide into smaller groups, e.g. ethnic, gender, district or interest groups, who discuss their position regarding the topic.

The sub-group(s) come to their decision so they rejoin the larger group and report their position. Then that group seeks to reach agreement. This continues until all the sub-groups have rejoined the caucus. A sub-group may decide it cannot reach an agreed position but that it is prepared to support the one reached by the full group.

If at any time a sub-group cannot reach an agreed position and this prevents a decision being reached by the full group, then the sub-group may ask for a specified time to explore other approaches if that is expected to result in an eventual decision.

The caucus then discusses its position to see if it has been able to reach a common mind. If it has, the caucus rejoins the Conference.

What does the Conference do?

When Tauiwi and Te Taha Maori groups rejoin, Conference reconvenes, so the person presiding resumes his/her role. Normally the group which called the caucus reports first, then the other group reports its position. If the person presiding called the caucus, he/she will determine the order of reporting back. Then the whole Conference works toward a consensus decision.

When the process is complete the person presiding shall make a clear statement of the decision.

SUMMARY

- Conference decision-making is a process which demonstrates Te Taha Maori-Tauiwi partnership agreement and enables full participation from all member groups.
- Consensus agreement using caucus groups, and other methods of assisting decisionmaking is an appropriate mode for making partnership decisions.
- For such processes to be successful all group members need to participate in an informed and responsible manner.

Facilitation of these processes is a skilled task and the President and Vice-President may request experienced people to lead some sessions.

TREATY PARTNERSHIP Decision-making Procedures through a Consensus Process

Information/Clarification for Conference

CAUCUSING

a) Calling for a caucus

According to present procedures, calling for a caucus only relates to the convening of Te Taha Maori and Tauiwi caucuses. However, interest groups can meet within the Tauiwi caucus. If an individual or an interest group in the life of the Conference wishes to raise a process issue, they should approach their caucus facilitators and express their concern. The facilitators are:

- Tauiwi: Lynne Frith and Paula Taumoepeau
- Te Taha Maori: Will choose their facilitators at their pre-conference meeting

The facilitators will then take what action they feel is appropriate

b) Steps for making Treaty partnership decisions

In the process of making Treaty partnership decisions, we have discerned the following 5 steps:

Step One: Starting together

Both treaty partners are present. Caucusing does not occur in this step. The report is received. A presentation is made outlining the contents of the report and the suggested decisions. Space is made for questions seeking clarification etc.

• Step Two: Testing out how the Treaty partners feel about the issues under discussion Focus is now upon the 'suggested decisions'. The President/Vice-President seeks the mind of Conference on 'suggested decisions' where there appears to be consensus, and these are processed. Where a consensus is not obvious on specific 'suggested decisions' there is clarification as to lack of consensus. For example, is it related to differences between the Treaty partners or within a partner? At this point either partner may request caucusing, or the President/Vice-President may suggest it. An initial time limit is proposed for the caucusing. The President/Vice-President clarifies for the whole Conference, what both caucuses will be addressing when they meet separately.

Step Three: Sharing responses from the caucuses

When both caucuses are ready to report back, both sets of facilitators will meet with the President and Vice-President to share the responses. This is suggested for two reasons. Firstly, it will avoid the President/Vice-President having to react 'cold' to what is reported to the Conference. Secondly, the sharing will indicate if either or both caucuses need to give reasons as to why they have arrived at a particular point. For example, if both caucuses were in agreement, there would be no need to share reason.

If a caucus does not achieve a consensus, this will be reported to the whole Conference. It would not be appropriate for the other caucus to indicate its response at this point. If finally within a caucus there is no consensus to proceed, no decision by Conference can be made (see page 9, last paragraph).

Step Four: Making a Treaty Partnership decision

If there is agreement by both caucuses, Conference can make a decision. Conference can only make a decision if both partners agree.

If there is no agreement between caucuses, or within a caucus, the areas where there is a lack of agreement will be clearly identified. Some or all of the following questions might then be asked: Is more information required? Is it necessary to caucus again? Could an 'ad-hoc' representative group meet during Conference to address the areas of disagreement and seek a way ahead? If there is still lack of agreement between the two partners, then no

decision is made by the Conference, and the status quo remains. The President/Vice-President will define the 'status quo'.

• Step Five: Moving on to the next business

Before this happens, Conference is asked if there are any concerns/issues arising from the discussion that need to be addressed and reported back to Synods/Conference the next year. This is important where Conference members agree 'in principle' with a particular proposal, and expect that their concerns will have been addressed when the 'fleshed-out' principle returns to the next Conference for final endorsement. Consequently, a decision might read "We have agreed that ... and the following concerns/issues have been referred to ... for consideration and a report to Synods and Conference next year".

If any Conference member wishes to record their dissent from a Conference decision, they should put it in writing and hand it to the Daily Record Secretaries.

Procedures to enable the business of Conference...

to be taken "En-Bloc"

- (1) Committees/Boards will be asked to advise the Conference as to those reports/resolutions that can be presented to the Conference En Bloc. On the recommendation of the Committees or Boards they will be put to the Conference En Bloc. Reports/Resolutions to be taken En Bloc will be highlighted on the PowerPoint presentation.
- (2) In order to safeguard the rights of members of Conference to speak on any report/resolution, any member may by simple request to the Chair, have removed from the "En Bloc" procedures any report/resolution.

(Minutes of Conference 1978, Resolution 1, page 564, amended 2004)

FUNCTION – COUNCIL OF ELDERS

COUNCIL OF CONFERENCE

Wesleyan Methodist Church

A second fruitful meeting between leaders of the Wesleyn and Methodist Churches took place in April.

A commitment was made to continue meeting and to explore where progress is possible in our church to church relationship. In particular the General Secretaries have been asked to work on a series of protocols:

- Ministerial Tributes (including past)
- Conference Communications
- Ministerial Bereavement

A joint meeting was also held with World Methodist Council Leaders at the time of the Equipt Conference, to update them on our processes and progress.

There was also discussion around the preparation of a historical record to coincide with the 10th Anniversary of the founding of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. It appears that in this area the Methodist Church of New Zealand has been less intentional at recording events and stories.

Further meetings are planned for later in 2009 and 2010.

Theology

1. <u>The Theology of structure and change</u>

From New Testament times onward, church structures have been a mirror image of political power structures. If Jesus brought a message that love and priority came before adherence to the structure of the law, it only took three centuries before the church took to enforcing adherence to the law through dogma and doctrine. For 1500 years, the church was the state.

Our church should be driven by love and compassion rather than by institutional needs. People need to be given the freedom to live, think and act, rather than structures which prevent them from doing so.

The question is: how can we enable mission to take place? What structure will make this possible?

It doesn't mean that 'anything goes', because as Methodists we have values, a history, tradition and ethics. How can we best use these to deliver mission?

Remember the Wesley quadrilateral: scripture, reason, tradition and experience.

2. The leadership of Theology

The Vice President offered an observation that a more conservative theology within Methodist and Co-operating Venture congregations seems to be widespread. The impression is gained that our theology often backs us into a fortress mentality, preventing us from finding the freedom that grace brings and limiting our spiritual journey. The "good news" was meant to free us from the strictures of religious rules, regulations and practices, yet we fear the freedom that such good news will bring. One of the reasons we fear freedom of thought is that freedom brings with it the responsibility for action. It also means accepting responsibility for how and what we think theologically. We regress by allowing others to do our thinking for us and allowing even welcoming others to direct and control our spiritual journeys. Where we find congregations that welcome open-ended theological enquiry, we also find congregations transformed with new life and energy for their mission and spiritual journey. Hearts become freed when minds become freed.

Public Question Network Funding

At the time of the adoption of the Budget for 2009-2010, the PQN budget had not been finalised and work on vision statement, implementation plan and orientation process was not completed. The Council agreed that subject to the satisfactory completion of the planning and implementation work, the funds remaining after the windup of CASI (\$7,000) be made available and that the Budget Task Group be requested to hold \$16,000 for the 2009/2010 financial year, which could be released to the PQN on the approval of the Council of Conference. It was also agreed to ask the Budget Task Group to add the Public Questions Network to the Connexional Budget.

Wesley College

Council of Conference members met with the Principal of Wesley College to examine and make suggested changes to the special character statement. The Council received the group's report, affirmed it, and referred it to the Wesley College Trust Board. The Trust Board circulated the redrafted statement to Hui Poari and Synods for comment. The final statement will be brought to the November Conference by the Trust Board for approval.

Council of Elders

We had in-depth discussion on the role and function of the Council of Elders. The topic generated a lot of constructive conversation when the full Council reconvened. As a result, we reached a consensus that there should continue to be a Council of Elders. We strongly affirmed the need for on-going monitoring of the bi-cultural journey. It was agreed that:

"the Council of Elders shall enable and assist the church in its Bicultural Journey by seeking to model the equal partnership prefigured in the Treaty of Waitangi and they shall:

- a. Monitor MCNZ Conference.
- b. Reflect and comment on the style, work, behaviour and priorities of Conference.
- Report to Conference as the need arises. C.

The Council of Elders shall consist of a 2+2 to be appointed from Council of Conference members, ex-members, ex Presidents, ex Vice Presidents and General Secretaries".

Council of Conference continues to be actively involved in training and leadership in the Bicultural Journal.

It was agreed that we should continue to discuss the role of the Council of Elders.

The Council agreed that the 4+4 process had been followed.

Dunedin Methodist Mission

The Council agreed that the process had been followed.

Partnership Team

The use of the Partnership Team as a means for processing applications has been wider than first envisaged. This has added to the experience and confidence of the team to respond to applications, and also added to the teams' flexibility in assessing applicants.

Seven applications have been processed this year. Most have been stationed or moved from supply to stationed appointments. One application did not fully meet the criteria. The process is now being used for applicants from within New Zealand. As a result it is appropriate to change the name from 'Overseas Ministry Process' to 'Ministry Application Process'.

Law Revision has been asked to bring the Ministry application process into the Law Book Section on Ministers from outside the Connexion.

The Council has asked the General Secretary to complete an independent review of the process and applications to date and report to the April Council meeting. Terms of the review are outlined in the original terms of reference of the process, presented to Conference 2006 and 2007.

The Review Team is producing an analysis of the costs, and a budget for consideration. The Partnership Team continue to be deeply moved by the privilege of sharing the ministry stories of applicants.

Report on Monitoring and Evaluating our life and work?

How have we operated?

- We have operated with sensitivity and listened carefully both within our caucus groups and to our partner.
- We have affirmed our strong commitment for the bicultural partnership in terms of decision making, and modelled the partnership working well.
- We are "working smart"; humour comes through, whilst we still remain focused.

What has been done well:

- We have valued the taha wairua through our devotional times together, a thread which weaves through all our discussions, we valued personal story contributions and perspectives of one another, which have sometimes differed, have been acknowledged and valued; we haven't been afraid of looking at hard questions.
- In our working together, we are doing in clarifying our processes as we go.
- Resource people have provided helpful input for our discussions and members have done their homework well prior to the meeting.

What needs improving:

- Clear start and finish times to facilitate travel arrangements; papers received 2 weeks before meeting.
- Making sure there is a complete 10+10.
- Finding effective ways to communicate about our work back into Parishes, Rohe and Synods e.g. Taha Maori send out kia neke ake (newsletter).
- To give opportunities to all members of Council of Conference to take responsibility in the life of Council of Conference e.g. facilitation, leading worship, opportunities for newer members to be part of a 4+4.
- Hearing history and stories related to our work keeping the memory.

What can be done for the future?

- Setting a discussion topic/theme from the previous meeting, enabling thinking for the next meeting, exploring "vision".
- Some focus on training/orientation for new members e.g. for facilitation skills.
- Encouraging a wider range of age groups as members of the Council.
- Increasing Council's understanding of various groups and structures within Te Háhi e.g. Pacific Synods, youth, older people.

We express our warm appreciation for the welcome and hospitality of Waikato rohe over a number of years. Next April the Council will meet at the Friary, Hillsborough in Auckland.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. Conference thanks Jim George, Derek Holland, David McGeorge and Susau Strickland who complete their term on Council of Conference. Conference also thanks Tovia Aumua and Lana Lazarus who complete their term as Co-convenors.
- 3. The Budget Task Group for 2010 shall be the President, Vice President, General Secretary, Tumuaki, Tony Dale, Evelyn Kingi, David McGeorge, Paula Taumoepeou and Pari Waaka.

- 4. The members for the PAC Distribution Group for 2010 shall be Amelia Faleatua, Tevita Finau, Greg Hughson, Gillian Laird, Rachael Masterton, Elspeth McLean, Rex Nathan and the ex President and the General Secretary.
- 5. TWO YEAR PRESIDENCY

This report is presented in three sections.

- 1. The feedback and responses from August Synods and Hui Poari.
- 2. The 4 + 4 report to August Synods.
- Suggested Resolutions.

There has been really healthy debate in the church about two year Conference and two year Presidency during 2009. As expected there were a range of responses to the reports which had been originally brought to Conference in 2008.

Responses agreed that that a longer term would give time for a President to develop skills and confidence in their role and two years would give better continuity. The full –time stipended role would also allow complete focus on the position, without the stress of trying to juggle another job.

The reservation consistently raised was the role of Lay people. The model suggested removes the role of Vice President, it does not however alter the eligibility of lay people to be President.

The claim is made that lay people would not be able to afford to be in the presidential role for two years. At present approximately one President in seven is Lay. With a fully stipended position this may in fact make it easier for lay people to be involved in the church at this level. The role of president is costly service for Lay or Ordained.

Interestingly the Uniting Church of Australia has a three year term (plus 3 elect years and 3 ex years) and they have had Lay Presidents. The Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand has a two year term for its moderator. Up to the present all have been ordained, but there is only a half stipend.

It has also been argued that removing the role of Vice President penalizes Lay people. Is this so? Increasingly Lay people offer key leadership in every part of the church, from Synod Superintendent to Board Chair. The effect of not having a Vice President may in fact be to reduce the numbers of Presbyters who serve as President as the gifts capable Lay people are recognised.

The partnership of Lay and Ordained is woven into the fabric of our church, and it is not enhanced by trying to balance every position. The proposal invites the church to consider a model with the flexibility and economy for the church the size of the Methodist Church.

It should also be noted that some responses suggested two years was not long enough and three would be better. The 4 + 4 agrees that there may be some value in this, but does not wish to vary the two year proposal.

MODEL OF PRESIDENCY Report to Synods and Hui Poari

Preamble

The Council of Conference four plus four in association with the Faith and Order Committee was charged by Conference 2007 to undertake the following:

- 1. Research the most appropriate and responsible Model of Presidency to take the Church into the future given its changing nature and size, as well as the understanding that people have of the role of President and Vice President.
- 2. Investigate the reasons behind the resistance of people to be nominated for the positions.
- 3. Prepare a discussion paper for June Synods with possible models.
- 4. Bring a report to Conference 2008.

A discussion paper reflecting on the nature of Presidency, resistance factors to being nominated for the positions of President and Vice President and possible models of Presidency was sent to June 2008 Synods and Hui Poari. Responses were received from eight Synods, one parish, one individual and Hui Poari. The Council of Conference four plus four thanks those who replied. Your questions and comments were particularly helpful.

The Council of Conference four plus four now presents this report for further consideration. We believe the model of Presidency being suggested is the most appropriate for the size and future of the Methodist Church in New Zealand/Te Háhi Weteriana o Aotearoa. We expect that a decision to implement the proposed model will be a two-year process.

Affirmations

The Council of Conference four plus four believes the President is important to the life and wellbeing of the Church. This was also reflected in the responses received.

We are strongly committed to the bicultural partnership. This partnership is reflected in our Conference, in the responsibilities of the President (one of whose tasks is to sustain the bicultural partnership) and in the selection process for the Presidency.

The Nature of Presidency

The role of the President is one of **Governance** or 'Headship'. As the representative of the Conference when it is not in session, the President is responsible for maintaining the overall policy and direction setting of the Church.

This includes the following tasks:

- Being a **Leader:** The President is expected to bring gifts of visioning, discernment and guidance to the life of the Church. He or she is a voice for the Church and may speak out to the wider community (after seeking advice) on issues of justice, peace and integrity.
- Being the **Chief Pastor**: The President cares for the life of the Church in all of its parts, and so seeks to maintain justice in the life of the Church. He or she is available to listen, to pray and to be alongside all groups within the Church. He or she may offer personal pastoral care to individuals when required. The President acts as a 'spiritual mentor' to the Church.
- Having a **Ceremonial Role**: The President expresses the life of the whole Church on significant Church and/or community occasions. The role of President carries with it respect and status which is an expression of the Church's confidence in an individual and of the mana of the Body of Christ which is greater than any individual.

Proposed Model of Presidency

The Council of Conference offers the following proposed model of Presidency after reflecting on the responses received from the Church and the future needs of Methodism in New Zealand.

(1 year – year of observation)	(2 years)
President Elect	President

- The President is a full-time position.
- The office of President is open to all lay and ordained members of the Methodist Church who

fulfil the Law Book requirements (7.5.1.6).

- Conference would be held every two years (issues like the time and place of ordinations will need to be explored).
- We believe costs would be similar to as at present.
- The current bicultural partnership selection process would remain in place.
- The first President under this model would be selected in 2011 and would begin as President in 2012. Thereafter Conferences would be held in 2014, 2016 etc.

Rationale for the Model

The Council of Conference four plus four believes the proposed model is the most sustainable given the changing size and nature of the Church.

We believe that it best overcomes some of the factors behind the resistance of people to be nominated for the Presidency.

A two-year full-time Presidency will strengthen the role of President allowing greater continuity and the chance to make a sustained contribution to the Church. The time spent as President Elect will be a valuable opportunity for people to prepare themselves for the task ahead.

The Council of Conference four plus four believes the proposed model continues to affirm the place of lay leadership in the Church, which is a significant part of our heritage.

The model will have ecumenical advantages. The President will have time to get to know and be known by other Church leaders.

The Council of Conference four plus four believes the current selection process best expresses the Methodist Church's commitment to a bicultural partnership.

Other Matters

The Council of Conference four plus four recognises that a number of issues were raised in Synod responses which remain unresolved. We have not been able to address these within this report but remind the Church of the need to continue to struggle with them in an attitude of prayer and concern for each other.

The Council of Conference four plus four notes:

- Ongoing and serious concerns among some members regarding the bicultural partnership selection process.
- The call for a more adequate resolution process in the event of disagreement over nominations.
- The desire among some parts of the Church for the President to be an ordained person.
- Concern that, while the position of President is open to all lay and ordained people who fulfil the Law Book requirements, debate continues within Tauiwi over the acceptability of gay and lesbian nominees - at the moment eligibility does not equal acceptability.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. Conference agrees to the appointment of the President for a two year term.
- 3. Conference implements the proposed model from 2011.
- 4. Conference asks the Administration Division to work on matters of funding and other structural and legal aspects and report to Conference 2010.

TWO YEARLY CONFERENCES

As noted in the two year Presidency paper August Synods provided some very helpful feedback. There was a significant degree of agreement in the responses, with the majority favouring a move to two yearly conferences.

Those that preferred to remain with an annual conference did not necessarily want to see a

business filled conference every year, but hoped that there may be space for new ways of being together to celebrate and build connexionalism.

The 4 + 4 agrees with this, but also believes that we are so "addicted" to our current style of meeting, that the only way to create space for new modes of gathering, whether they be regional, or national is to move to a conference every second year.

What is also true, that as the number of senior leaders in the Church is reducing, it becomes impossible for them to both service the existing structure and to contemplate and resource new initiatives. This proposal aims to siphon less time and energy from the parish and the local and to free national and Connexional leadership from report writing and conference preparation to engage in mission.

One key area of response related to where and when ordination would take place. The 4 + 4 wants to stay with the suggestion that ordination be at Conference in a two yearly cycle. But we also note the suggestion that all ordinations be in the regions, with a significant celebration of all new ordinands when Conference meets in its two yearly cycle. The 4 + 4 therefore invites conference to debate this.

The feedback that Conference be in alternate years to Presbyterian Assembly is endorsed by the 4 + 4. Conference would meet in the odd numbered years. Assembly meets in the even numbered years.

The proposal also invites the Church to find new ways of being together for significant events. In September the Uniting Church of Australia, Synod of Victoria and Tasmania met to induct their new moderator at a service held in Melbourne. Rather than everyone having to travel the entire event was 'live streamed' in three other centres.

The proposal is aimed not at restricting our meeting together but providing the space to allow the Church to gather in new ways, for new purposes. The greatest danger is that we allow our existing structure to use up the creative energy and creative space which we as a Church need for mission and engagement with the community.

The paper presented to Synods and Hui Poari

Following a most helpful debate at Conference 2008 it was clear that there are a number of important issues to be clarified. This paper will seek to address those issues, to allow further conversation to occur throughout the church prior to Conference 2009.

The first Methodist Conference met in 1744 under John Wesley, who gathered together his assistants (both ordained ministers and itinerant lay preachers) to confer together about 'what to teach, how to teach, and what to do, i.e. how to regulate doctrine, discipline and practice.'

In addition to acting as the ultimate decision making body for the Methodist Church a number of acts of worship: Ordinations, Inductions of President and Vice President and celebrations of service are added. For some it is these times of celebration which are the The governing body of the Methodist Church of New Zealand is the Annual Conference. Its decisions are final and binding upon both the ordained and lay members of the Church.

most significant, while for the Boards and Committees and Conference itself it is the business sessions which are the prime focus.

When Conference is not in session, it is the President who has the capacity to act as Conference following appropriate consultation with the President's Committee of Advice.

What lies behind the suggestion of a two yearly Conference?

The main reasons are:

- Human cost
- Financial cost
- Difficultly in arranging
- Unavailability of 'traditional' venues
- Creating the space for new initiatives

Human Cost

Almost every year there are reports which come to Conference which have not been fully discussed at Synods and in parishes. Often these are sent back for further work. This is frustrating for everyone and not a good use of resources.

In a church which has both fewer presbyters and greater workday demands being placed on lay people there is a significant 'human cost' to preparing reports and business for Conference. Furthermore there is only a brief window to carry out these tasks as reports are required for August Synods in early July. It is not only difficult to prepare reports and consult widely in the time frame but also the time required detracts from other responsibilities. So a cycle of annual Conferences does not give the church space to carefully consider matters of importance or develop new ways of attending to its life and relating to the wider community.

Creating the space for new initiatives

This is the most significant reason. If for one year all the energy and time which goes into planning for Conference could be used to dream and imagine and engage in mission in our communities, then what might happen? Why do human beings so readily keep on doing the same thing over and over again, yet expecting a different result?

Financial Cost

Conference is becoming increasingly expensive to run. Gone are the days when most representatives were billeted and self catering is no longer possible. The budget for 2008 Conference in Manukau was \$105,000. This doesn't include the cost of travel and accommodation. It is estimated that the total cost is equivalent to one quarter of the Connexional budget. [Approx \$200,000] Is this the best use of the resources of Parishes and Boards?

Difficulty in arranging

The decision was made 10 -15 years ago to have Conference primarily in Auckland, Wellington or Christchurch. Not only is the cost of getting to other centres much higher, but also the facilities for Conference and expertise to arrange Conference are not available.

This means that Christchurch and Wellington have to arrange a Conference every three years which is a significant burden upon those Synods. It was also suggested last time we were in Auckland city, that the city was too hard to get around to make it a good venue.

A two yearly conference would give some relief to local arrangement committees and may also make it possible on occasion to use professional facilities as parishes and boards could budget over two years. This was essentially what happened when we went to Rotorua. A good venue, but too expensive for every year.

Unavailability of 'traditional' venues

Access to Pitt St and Durham St during the week make them unsuitable venues. Few of our churches have sufficiently large enough facilities to provide both Conference and meal space. It is becoming increasingly more difficult and more expensive to find good venues.

Summary

In summary then the vision behind a two yearly Conference is to use the resources of the church better and to give space for creative thinking and action.

Implications of a two yearly Conference

Those who spoke at Conference highlighted a number of potential impacts of a two yearly Conference.

- Ordination?
- Isn't Conference the 'glue' that holds us together?
- Stationing?

What about Ordinations?

There are two possible options:

- (a) Ordinations are at Conference every second year. This would mean that some would spend an additional year on probation, but all would be ordained as part of Conference our most significant national gathering.
- (b) Ordinations at significant regional events in the year that conference doesn't meet. The President who officiates at the service, representing the whole church, could carry out that role at significant services in Synods around the country. This would enable a stronger involvement of local parishes and is similar to the practice in the UK where Ordinations occur in a number of venues.

Isn't Conference the 'glue' that holds us together?

There is no question that for those who attend regularly there is a real sense of family. We enjoy being together. We enjoy catching up with friends old and new. This is important for the 300 who gather, but of little relevance to the majority in our parishes. Few people jump at the chance to be the Conference Rep and when did a parish have to choose between potential reps. A two yearly conference would allow for significant local events in the alternate years providing new focal points and opportunity for many more people to be involved.

What about Stationing?

The approval of the stationing sheet is an important part of Conference. However in the more complex world we inhabit there are many appointments now being finalized at other times of the year. The important thing is that the process is clear, transparent and fair. Also moving the stationing process away from Conference could allow Conference to be held in the September School holidays for example. This could mean that we could use the facilities of a boarding school or university.

Summary

Yes it would be different only having Conference every two years, but rather than diminishing our life it could provide opportunity to express being in Connexion in new ways which would mitigate for any real or perceived loss.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. That Conference be held every second year from 2011.
- 3. That Ordinations continue to be held at Conference.
- 4. Conference asks the Board of Administration to work on matters of funding and other structural and legal aspects and report to Conference 2010.

CONNEXIONAL BUDGET

SECTION A

2008-2009 Connexional Budget

For the Year to 30th June 2009, contributions from parishes toward the wider work of the Church through the Connexional Budget totalled \$626,465 – an increase of \$26,152 over the previous year. As in prior years amounts requested exceeded this amount and the Budget Task Group made a request to the PAC Distribution Group for a grant of \$75,000 which was necessary to enable the Church to carry out its mission.

During the year the Budget Task Group granted \$806,547 to various Connexional groups. Despite some parishes responding positively to the call for increased contributions to the Connexional Budget, the askings still exceed the giving. Therefore, some new initiatives are not being funded.

SECTION B

2009-10 Year

The process that has been used for several years was followed again this year to establish the Connexional Budget for presentation to the Council of Conference. The Task Group realises that up to now there has been little opportunity for discussion and dialogue at parish or congregational level because of the timing of the budget setting process in early February when parishes have not really begun their work for the year and the financial year still has five months to run.

For some time then the Budget Task Group has had a dream of being able to 'pre-fund' the budget which would allow all allocations to be guaranteed and enable budget conversations in Parishes and Boards to occur in a more favourable time frame.

Conference had decided in 2007 to allow some of the PAC Funds over a three year period to be used to build up an amount to pre-fund the Connexional Budget.

This decision was overtaken, however, by a very generous contribution of One million dollars from Te Taha Maori to fully fund the 2009 -2010 budget. This means that all askings for 2009 - 2010 will be paid in full and that the contributions from parishes will be used to prefund the 2010-2011 budget.

In receiving the contribution Council of Conference expressed their thanks for the astonishing contribution, and among the responses, the following comments were made.

To honour the gift we need to steward it wisely, not waste it, or act wastefully in the way the Church spends its resources.

The budget discussion is always a struggle – this year it is different and gives an awareness of God's goodness to us.

The gift will be treated with respect, in a sacred manner – a living example of God saying something to Te Háhi.

The three great 'secrets' of the church (often not honoured!) are generosity, hospitality and a refusal to take vengeance (Bruggemann).

Te Taha Maori responded: "the gift is about us being family, about being Methodist in Aotearoa/NZ. Te Taha Maori have listened over time, and struggled together with the other members of the Budget Task Group to try and find ways to resource the work of God in parishes and rohe and communities. Te Taha Maori reported that when Hui Poari requested time to discuss the proposal from Maori members of BTG, they began by discussing our history, going right back. Hui poari was

aware of the recession, and that we do not know how long it will be mindful of the parishes and rohe that are struggling aware of people who can no longer participate or give freely aware that losses In investments meant loss of dignity

'It is not about you; it is not about us. It is about our being Methodist, and about one partner caring about our mate. The gift comes with aroha, prayers, and the goodwill of Te Taha Maori, which is in a position to be able to clear the budget for 09/10.

The Task Group continues to draw attention to the significant contribution which the Connexional banking arrangement makes to the budget,\$79,705 in 2008-09, and strongly urges any Methodist parishes or other Methodist church groups who operates an account outside of the Bank of New Zealand arrangement to transfer to the banking arrangement that the Church has negotiated with the Bank of New Zealand.

Information and Reporting Back

Ka ngaro ratou, ka ngaro ratou.

Ko Rangi Wood, Sister Evelyn Ellemor (nee Marriot), Morehu (Buddy) Te Whare, Mere Cassidy ko wai atu, ko wai atu.

Ko te hunga piripono ki a Ihu Karaiti. Haere koutou. Te hunga ora e hui nei, tena koutou katoa.

Theology in Aotearoa/Education and Training

A Christian cannot decide to be or not to be a theologian. The only question is: "Will I be a good theologian or a bad one? – Robert McAffee Brown.

For Te Taha Maori, Aotearoa is the context for doing theology. That does not mean that 'other contexts' are not important or that we do not learn from them. Being Maori is absolutely central for us so the development of Maori theology is important. Recognising that every member is a minister and that every members is a theologian should affect all of life.

Our thinking and doing theology continues to take place in a variety of settings, be it Hui Poari, Wananga, Rohe events, whanau, hapu and iwi. These provide a space which enables us to reflect on what is happening around us in our communities and society as a whole. We are encouraged to explore God and gospel questions, Christ and culture plus many more issues alongside Tupuna teachings and the traditions and understandings of the Methodist Church.

Education and Training opportunities continue to feature as a priority within Te Taha Maori. We have held a number of Wananga throughout the year to assist our people which have included:

- Liaison Persons Hui;
- Te Taha Maori Council of Conference Training;
- Tamaki Wananga (held first quarter of the year);
- Taranaki Minita-a-Iwi Development Hui;
- Taranaki Rangatahi Development Hui; and
- The National Minita-a-Iwi Wananga.

By sharing experiences we allow discussions which can point the way forward for different ways of being Maori and Christian today, to evolve.

We have been encouraged by the ongoing developments in theological education and training at Trinity Methodist Theological College which has led some of our members to engage and participate in some of the courses. Bella Ngaha represents Te Taha Maori on Trinity College Council and the Candidates Assessment Team and the Tumuaki serves on the Student Review Panel.

In February of this year, the Tumuaki along with Lana Lazarus and Bella Ngaha led the orientation series related to Waitangi and bicultural perspectives at Waitangi with the Principal, Staff and Students of Trinity Methodist Theological College. Following the Waitangi event, Diana and Lana travelled with the group to various significant Methodist historical sites culminating at Mangungu. Members were not only able to view the sites but also listen to the stories and learn something of the history.

We are working closely with Trinity Methodist Theological College to framing a similar event for Ratana, Koroneihana, Waikato and Taranaki.

Te Taha Maori continues to benefit from the extensive knowledge base of many of our members particularly in relation to the Maori world and the wisdom of people such as the late Reverend Morehu Te Whare and Reverend Napi Waaka who continues to give support where necessary.

Rangatahi

A **Rangatahi Planning Group** was established by Hui Poari in December 2008. The purpose was to allow Rangatahi national activities to continue until such time a decision was made as to the most suitable model for a Rangatahi Worker(s) position. Current membership of this group comes from Tai Tokerau, Tamaki and Taranaki Rohe. The Rangatahi Planning Group have also welcomed on board Joseph Heather and Kris Wichman as Rangatahi Co-ordinators for Poneke Rohe. Both are keen and energetic and bring a new 'flavour' to Rangatahi ministry.

Rangatahi activities and/or involvement since last Conference include:

- 7 young people travelling to Melbourne, Australia in January to participate at the National Christian Youth Convention hosted by the Uniting Church in Australia. This was a great experience for those who attended. They shared in workshops, bible studies, community activities, formed a number of friendships, networked and were able to see firsthand how youth work is done in the Uniting Church in Australia.
- National Rangatahi Hui held at Oturei Marae, Dargaville from 18-22 April. The theme was "Whanaungatanga" and based on the Easter story. Four community groups were formed namely, Te Aroha (Compassion), Rangimarie (Grace), Tumanako (Hope), Manaakitia (Justice) with older Rangatahi being appointed as team leaders. Tumanako (Hope) won the community events during nationals – CONGRADZ and big upz to Chuck Kruse and Layke Tito for their leadership! Sites visited included James Buller Centre, Kai Iwi Lakes, Maungawhare Farm (a palm tree in the middle of the house), the Museum and focus on James Buller. The Rangatahi enjoyed learning about their Methodist history around the Kaipara region. A huge thanks to Rex and Ihapera Nathan along with the whanau in Dargaville for hosting an enjoyable event.

Plans for the future include:

- National Rangatahi Hui to be hosted by Taranaki Rohe Rangatahi in October 2010;
- Training workshops for team leaders to assist and enhance their skills. Suggested workshop topics involve:
 - performing icebreakers;
 - developing karakia resources from Te Taha Māori Rangatahi perspective;
 - learning about the history of Te Taha Māori and the Methodist Church as a whole;
 - health and safety issues e.g. learning first aid, understanding the importance of food and hygiene.

Finance and Properties

<u>Finances</u>: Te Taha Maori continues to look at ways of using our current resources with care and consideration. We are also mindful that many sections of our church continue to struggle in the midst of the economic recession.

The Budget Working group which also includes at least two staff members of the Connexional Accounting Team met at Whakatuora Centre at the beginning of the year. The primary purpose of this group is three-fold:

- Check and reflect on our past year's financial performance;
- Set the budget for the ensuring year;
- Note any changes, adjustments of income investment strategies and the educational, social and political needs of the people ensuring these aspects comply with our Financial Policies and Procedures Manual recently updated and approved by Hui Poari.

Te Taha Maori continues to benefit from the income of Connexional Trusts. In particular, Grey Institute Trust, Wellington Methodist Charitable Educational and Endowments Trust which have a common focus and original purpose. The Hamilton Methodist Trust, Margaret and Bruce Gordon Fund, Smethurst, Kurahuna Committee and Blackwell Trust – we thank you and are grateful for the shared legacies received.

<u>Properties</u>: Te Taha Maori continues to oversee the administration and management of a number of properties. *Tai Tokerau Rohe* also continues to look for an appropriate property for their needs as well as the wider Connexion. Upgrading of the *Whanau Units* at the Whakatuora complex has taken place. Considerable discussion has taken place with the Maniapoto Maori Trust Board over the future of *Te Huinga Centre* in Te Kuiti and it has been agreed that they have first option to purchase the property.

We are grateful for the expertise and wisdom given to us by Alan Bettany for his oversight toward Te Huinga Centre and also Reverend Bob Short for his work on our behalf towards the redevelopment of the Kawhia complex. A service of "New Beginnings" is scheduled to take place at the church site in Kawhia late November of this year.

Ecumenical Concerns

<u>Te Runanga Whakawhanaunga I Nga Haahi O Aotearoa</u>: Rev Rua Rakena continues in the role of Administrator for this organisation. This year has seen a resurgence of Te Aka Puaho attending Advisors meetings. A hui is planned in Rotorua for the time of Conference to discuss future possibilities for Te Runanga.

<u>Methodist Mission & Ecumenical Committee</u>: Te Taha Maori continues to have membership on this Committee. Te Taha Maori was also present to support the Tumuaki and other Connexional Leaders during the signing of the Anglican-Methodist covenant in May.

Connexional Matters/Partnership

Te Taha Maori remains committed to our Church's Bicultural Journey and the various issues that arise. We believe that it is necessary to present a Maori response and perspective and expend the necessary time and energy required. Significant involvements this year have included:

- 4+4 Connexional Appointments for Christchurch Central Parish and Mission and the Dunedin Methodist Mission;
- Representation on the Board of Administration, Connexional Budget Task Group, Council of Conference, Grey Institute Trust, Kurahuna Committee, Methodist Mission and Ecumenical Committee, PAC Distribution Group, PAC Media and Communication Committee, Pastoral Committee, Te Runanga Whakawhanaunga I Nga Haahi O Aotearoa, Wellington Methodist Charitable Educational and Endowments Trust and the Wesley College Trust Board;
- The Tumuaki and Lana Lazarus have also represented Te Taha Maori on the Task Group on Governance and Partnership Team to process ministry applications;
- We appreciate the ongoing dialogue with the Mission Superintendents/Directors especially Auckland, Wellington and Dunedin.

Te Taha Maori takes its Connexional responsibilities and partnership obligations seriously.

Looking Forward

The areas of Te Taha Māori work, which we continue to develop, are:

- 1. Hui Poari matters on governance, structure, strategy, vision.
- 2. Building our membership and knowledge base.
- 3. Maintaining our bicultural and partnership relationships.
- 4. Rangatahi ministry.
- 5. Focus on social and political developments that may be appropriate for our people.
- 6. Continuing theological education and training for our people.
- 7. Maintaining our Connexional commitments and responsibilities.

GREY INSTITUTE TRUST

SECTION A - INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK

Trustees

During the course of the year the Trustees were pleased to welcome the appointment of Rex Nathan, Norman Johnston and Chris Gregory to the Trust. All three new Trustees brought considerable commercial, accounting and investment experience to the Trust which was considered to be extremely important attributes as the Trust was in a much changed position following the freeholding of approximately 80% of the leasehold sections.

Trust Operations

In last year's report it was noted that the year to June 2008 had been a period of significant change for the Grey Institute Trust. The year to June 2009 was a time of consolidation and reflection as the Trust started to come to terms with the significant changes to its investment base and the ramifications that this had for the future direction of the Trust and indeed its relationship with Taranaki.

One of the most significant consolidations was in the Trust's relationship with Ngati Te Whiti hapu. The gifting of land in Bayly Road and the arrangements to gift the Rangiatea Property were both reported to Conference last year.

It had been anticipated that the gift of Rangiatea would be completed in the first half of the 2009 calendar year but this has proved not to be possible as Ngati Te Whiti, quite properly, were looking to fully understand the nature of the property being offered to them and the Trust was continuing to expand the tenant base on the property based on those providing educational (Kohanga Reo) and health services (oral health unit) predominantly to local Maori.

It is anticipated that a transfer of the Rangiatea property will be completed during the 2009 calendar year but the timing of the transfer is largely in the hands of the recipients.

The Trust enjoyed good returns on its investments during the year, including the proceeds of freeholding which are held in the Methodist Trust Association Income Funds. The Trust, along with all other Methodist Trust Association depositors, had the June quarter's income distribution reduced. The Trust's very small exposure to the world's capital markets meant that there was a modest decrease in value over the year. Given the major impact on world markets, the Trust has been very fortunate.

Retained Land

While the portfolio of leasehold sections has diminished significantly through the freeholding, the Trust still has 46 leasehold sections which it has to administer together with quite extensive land holdings where the Trust is the outright owner of the properties concerned. The Trust is considering the redevelopment potential of its property or whether it may be better to sell the property and purchase other land either in New Plymouth or elsewhere.

In addition the Trust owns what could be considered historic property being the site of the Mission House at St Aubyn Street. The Trust is raising with Hui Poari how the resource of the building could more usefully serve the rohe and Taha Maori. A further prime hilltop property at 5 Mission Place has also become available for development or sale.

SECTION B – LOOKING FORWARD

The Trust is mindful that its financial base has changed significantly since the freeholding exercise was undertaken in 2007. Whether the Grey Trust continues to be the appropriate vehicle to manage the investment of the freed up capital is a matter that the Trustees have referred to Hui Poari.

The Trustees have considered the model followed by Prince Albert College Trust on the leasing of the Queen Street Auckland land in 1986 whereby the majority of the proceeds were transferred to a separate Connexional Trust and the Prince Albert College trustees (reconstituted as PACT 2086 Trust) remained to manage the lessors' residual interest in the lease and a small proportion of the lease proceeds against the eventual return of the property in 2008.

The Trustees are mindful that the Grey Institute Trust has been considered a Connexional Trust for over 100 years with the proceeds of the Trust being directed towards firstly the Home Missions Department and now Te Taha Maori.

Hui Poari have been invited to consider the formation of a separate Connexional trust responsible to Conference through Te Taha Maori which would hold the greater proportion of the freeholding proceeds leaving the Grey Trust to manage the remaining assets including the land holdings in New Plymouth.

If the concept of a separate trust is supported by Te Taha Maori, it is envisaged that this would be incorporated and registered as a charitable trust with the Charities Commission and would have a Board of four trustees to come initially from within the Grey Institute Trust Trustees appointed by Conference plus the Tumuaki which would be responsible to oversee the investment and stewardship of the capital of the fund and to provide the surplus income, earned each year, to Te Taha Maori. The Trust deed for the new Trust will be prepared in consultation with the President's legal advisor and normally the Constitution would then be forwarded to the President for approval on behalf of Conference. As the President of Conference 2010 is Rev Alan Upson who is also the Chair of the Grey Institute Trust it is suggested that the Constitution be referred to the ex-President for approval on behalf of Conference.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. That the members of the Grey Institute Trust for 2010 are Rev Alan Upson (Chairman) and Trustees Julie-Anne Barney-Katene, Juanita Bishop, Doreen Erueti, Chris Gregory, John Honeyfield, Aroha Houston, Norman Johnston, Rex Nathan, Rev Diana Tana and Greg Wright.
- 3. That Conference endorses the concept of a separate investment Trust to manage 80% of the proceeds of the freeholding of the residential sections by Grey Institute Trust with
 - a. the surplus income each year being provided to Te Taha Maori; and
 - b. terms and constitution of the Trust be as generally set out in the attached report and the comments from Hui Poari, and the Constitution be prepared in consultation with the President's legal advisor and approved by the Ex-President on behalf of Conference.

The Trust thanks secretary Pauline Lockett and the PWC team for their professional assistance through a time of high workload and exacting work standards. Our thanks extend also to John Konijn for legal advice and Mike Myers of Tellfer and Young for valuation services.

In September, Raewyn Greening, Personal Assistant to the Trust secretary Pauline Lockett, was diagnosed with cancer and died just weeks later. Raewyn's personal commitment to the Grey Institute work exceeded her job description. She was often the 'human face' of the Trust, and well skilled in both gentleness of nature and a sharp awareness of human nature. She knew her work and was meticulous in following it through. Many of the Trust members worked with Raewyn and appreciated her humour and professional manner. Although Raewyn will be missed by Board members she will be remembered warmly, and her contribution to the work of the Trust will remain evident in the trust's archives.

THE BOARD OF THE WELLINGTON METHODIST CHARITABLE AND EDUCATIONAL ENDOWMENTS

On the 27th October 1852 the Crown gave a parcel of land comprising approx 73 acres to Rev James Watkin, the Superintendent of Wesleyan Missions "in trust for the use of and towards the maintenance of a school therein mentioned so long as religious education, industrial training, and instruction in the English language shall be given to the youth educated therein"; on 10 July 1869, approx 261 acres in the Foxton area; and on 23 November 1868 approx 2 acres in the township of Foxton. With the adoption of The Wellington Methodist Charitable and Educational Trusts Act 1916, these properties were transferred from individuals to the new Board. Today, only the farm (at Moutoa, near Foxton) is owned by the Board.

The purpose of the Board is to provide "benefit, maintenance, or education" of children and youth. The purpose is defined more fully in the Act of Parliament (found as Appendix E-2 in the Methodist Law Book) where it specifically refers to Maori children and youth, and to those of any other race being British subjects.

The Board applies its grants to: Te Taha Maori, the Masterton Christian Child Care Programme (being the successor to the Masterton Methodist Orphanage, once owned and run by the Board), Community Groups in the Greater Wellington Region, and Schools in the area covered by the Wellington Regional office of the Ministry of Education.

TAUIWI STRATEGY & STATIONING

Tauiwi Strategy meetings this year continued within the stated purpose of the committee, 'To give expression to the partnership between the cultural groups within Tauiwi and other expressions of diversity and to pursue visioning, strategy, planning and decision making on behalf of Tauiwi'.

The worship sessions in the August meeting around the theme of, 'Passion & Compassion in Ministry and Mission' took the 2009 Presidential Challenge to a level of applying this theme in various ministry and mission settings.

Fresh Expressions

In the March meeting of this year we were visited by Rev Pete Pillinger who was in New Zealand to catch up what is happening world-wide in terms of Fresh Expressions of church. "Fresh Expressions" comes out of partnering with the Church of England, the Methodist Church of Great Britain, the United Reformed Church, the Congregational Federation, the Ground Level Network, the Church Army, the CMS and the Anglican Church Planting Initiative under the leadership of a board of Trustees, funded by partner organisations, grant funding from trusts and funds including the Lambeth Fund and donations from individuals (<u>www.freshexpressions.org.uk</u>).

Pete visited throughout New Zealand, talking to various practitioners in different denominations including Methodists about initiatives that address the questions about the future of church in different and interesting ways. Fresh Expressions describe themselves as "a form of church for our changing culture, established primarily for the benefit of people who are not yet members of any church." Examples that Pete gave included teashop meetings on a weekday evening based on Alpha courses (Fellowship@Grannies), a church meeting in a coffee house centred around students and young professionals in Bristol (Crossnet church) and a central Birmingham network church meeting in bars and cafes ("B1"). Log on to the website and go to "News and Stories" for some exciting and radical initiatives and watch this space for some of the plants which will grow from the seeds Pete has planted.

Future of Local Ministry

Strategy Committee discussed the suggestion that we no longer use the term 'local ministry'. As a category of ministry, this term is vaguely defined (it is not even in the Law Book) in terms of candidating, covenant, and review. The expectation of training for local ministry does not fit in the College's future direction of fully training of all the students. Local presbyters have been perceived in some parts of the Church as second class, and are expected to be in the local congregation/parish until retired. Local ministry by its nature has sometimes proven more problematic rather than being helpful in ministry. (See Mission Resourcing Report for further details and recommendations).

Leadership and Human Sexuality

Conference 2007 (in response to a notice of motion) had agreed to a conversation and consultation on "Leadership and Human Sexuality" during 2008 and we were reminded of this commitment by Te Taha Maori at Conference 2008. Aware of a broad spectrum of deeply held beliefs on these issues, Tauiwi recognised that we did not need more information, but a tool to enable us to enter this conversation. The intention was not to sway opinion, but to engage in meaningful dialogue. So a short paper entitled *Human sexuality Towards Dialogue* has been prepared as a first step in this process. It will be circulated as widely as possible as an insert of *Touchstone*. Tauiwi affirmed the work done on this by Susan Thompson and Alex Webster and encourages individuals and groups to begin this conversation and consultation across parishes and Synods.

Wasewase ko Viti Kei Rotuma e Niu Siladi

2008 Conference Notice of Motion B: Wasewase ko Viti kei Rotuma e Niu Siladi noted with approval the case made at Conference 2007 by Sinoti Samoa for a wider distribution of Connexional funds for assistance in areas of significant church growth. In the same spirit, the Auckland Methodist Fijian Circuit is requesting that Conference support the project at Mays Road, Onehunga by giving directions to the Administrative Division and its Committees to give all possible financial support including grants, and necessary lower interest manageable loan monies to the project. Decision: Conference refers the Notice of Motion to Tauiwi Strategy and Hui Poari for consideration alongside conversations about Connexional Mission priorities.

Tauiwi Strategy Committee noted that the proposals for development of the property at 84-86 Mays Road, Onehunga provide for both a place of worship and a community centre. This will be the first Fijian church and community centre in New Zealand.

While the initiative has come from the Tabacakacaka ko Viti e Okaladi, this is a strategic development for the Wasewase ko Viti kei Rotuma e Niu Siladi as a whole. It will give visibility to and a place of belonging for Fijians within Te Háhi Weteriana o Aotearoa, and also for the wider Fijian community.

"Tauiwi Strategy affirms the vision of the new Fijian church buildings in Mays Road, it as a Connexional Mission Priority."

It was proposed that a 'catching the vision' package be prepared for parishes, and that a national appeal Sunday be held.

Connexional Mission Priority

Background

Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing at its August 2007 meeting engaged in a process of seeking to determine mission priorities. As a result of this exercise Tauiwi agreed on a Mission priority, and this was taken into account in both stationing and subsequent decisions to seek to fund a full time position at Glen Innes.

At Conference in 2007 Sinoti Samoa made a presentation seeking Connexional support for the development of a women's centre. In 2008 the Auckland Fijian circuit made a similar approach to Conference seeking Connexional support. This was referred to Tauiwi Strategy. The Fijian Circuit then made a presentation to the August Strategy meeting.

Following these presentations, the following process has been formulated for discussion throughout the church in 2010.

Defining a Mission Priority

Tauiwi Strategy recognise that Conference declaring its 'support' can be meaningless without practical means of enabling an important project to proceed. There are not pots of unallocated funds, waiting to be used as all monies held by the church belong to a Parish or Board and are either designated or used for their ongoing work.

It is also recognised that there will likely be many potentially worthy projects, but not every good idea or pressing need will be able to be declared to be a Connexional Mission Project. Criteria for determining the value of each project to the connexion will need to be formulated and agreed by the church as part of this process.

Tauiwi Strategy suggests that in any year only one or two projects could be designated by Conference as a Connexional Mission Priority.

Type of Support

The support could be:

- 1. The Connexion would seek to raise funds and other appropriate support to facilitate the Mission Project as part of an ongoing Mission Development Strategy. This could be from funds held by parishes, Synods and Boards.
- 2. By direct appeal to members of the church.

It is suggested that normally there would only be two Connexional Mission priorities at a time and normally each project would have this status for at least two to a maximum of six years. However only one Connexional mission priority may be initiated in any two year period, so that support would overlap between projects.

Mutual Recognition of Ministry Guidelines

The original Mutual Recognition of Ministry covenant was established in 1990. The principle was laid down by both Assembly and Conference that there will be mutuality of ministry between our two churches, which enabled ministers from both churches to engage in ministry with each other without an extended application processes. However the original guide became out of date as the Presbyterian Church made significant changes to its stipend and allowances.

The renegotiated paper and guidelines (2009) have re-established the concept of mutuality in terms that aren't affected by either church's changes/movements in stipends and or allowances. Within the principles originally agreed by Conference and Assembly the following was negotiated and agreed between both churches.

"The Stipend and Allowances of the Denomination of origin will apply. That is, a Presbyterian serving in the Methodist Church will serve under Presbyterian terms and conditions, and a Methodist serving in the Presbyterian Church will serve under Methodist terms and conditions." This means that a Presbyterian minister serving under Methodist oversight will be paid what they would get as if in a Presbyterian parish, without Long Service Leave, and a Methodist Presbyter under Presbyterian oversight will get paid as if in a Methodist parish, without a Seniority Allowance. For those already in a Mutuality of Ministry position, "Existing appointments will continue under existing conditions unless there is agreement by all parties to apply these new regulations."

Tauiwi Strategy committee formally adopted the new agreement at its meeting in August. This will take effect for any new appointments from 1 September 2009. The full details and final process are laid out in the revised Information Leaflet 35.

Associate Member of Synod

In 2007 Conference established a new category of Synod Membership called Associate of Synod. This was a means to welcome the participation of ordained ministers of another Church employed by the Methodist Church in other than Parish ministry.

Since then, it has also been used to allow an ordained Methodist from an overseas Conference, engaged by another Church within New Zealand, to associate with the relevant Synod.

Tauiwi Strategy is now proposing the following further application:

"A Presbyter/Deacon may only be a full member of one Synod. This must be the Synod to which the Presbyter is stationed. A presbyter who is a full member of a Synod may in certain circumstances become an associate member of another synod. This would normally mean one geographic and one ethnic synod".

This allows participation in more than one Synod, but prevents the conflict of interest when a person is being asked to significantly contribute time to a Synod where they are not stationed. It also means that a presbyter has only one 'vote' on key decisions at Synod level, in the life of the Church.

Where a person is stationed, in an exceptional circumstance, to two Synods, then they would be full members of both Synods.

A Connexional appointee may in consultation with their Board, nominate the Synod to which they will belong.

Travel and Study

Tauiwi Strategy heard Rev Don Biggs give a comprehensive overview of the Travel and Study Committee work during the last 12 months. They had \$20,000 for distribution to a variety of study projects involving lay and ordained church people. The Travel and Study Committee also received \$150,000 of endowment PAC funding. They will use the interest from this to look at new study initiatives. It is essential that all application forms are filled out correctly and supportive data is accurately tabled. Late applications and incorrect applications are not processed so please ensure all is done well. We rely on your data to support an application fitting parish, district and Connexional strategies.

Face to Face & Stationing

Stationing 2009 was a busy time for all involved. Twelve full time, four part time and two nonstipendiary positions were looked at, with twelve presbyters available across this range, including 3 with Vahefonua Tonga, two through the overseas ministry processes and seven students. The new profile forms were affirmed, with some changes being noted. The Face to Face procedures were strengthened and some confusing matters clarified. Forms and procedures for 2010 will be available on the Mission Resourcing website from mid-December.

Over the past few years, Sinoti Samoa has been culturally experimenting appropriate ways in processing its stationing. For this year, despite having no Sinoti stationing, discussion has taken place, and Sinoti has agreed to follow the Tauiwi procedures and process in terms of the profiles, face to face and the time frame that is put in place for its stationing in the future.

In an endeavour to slowly adapt to the Connexional Stationing process, Vahefonua Tonga is embarking on a transitional period through which engagement in both old and new systems are explored as the appropriate way forward. With the Secondment ministry from the Tongan Methodist Conference ending January 2010 it was believed that the most appropriate way of appointing a new superintendent for the 17 congregation Auckland-Manukau Tongan parish would be through the normal process of matching profiles. Vahefonua Tonga, while in transition continues to find the most effective mix of the old and new to station 3 probationers into Tongan ministry for 2010.

Synod Reports

Northland Synod

This year there has been a major event in Northland – the Church Possible conference at Paihia in March. A group of Connexional, Local Shared Ministry and local resource people got together with about 35 people from throughout Northland, to look at church into the future. It was an inspiring event – and we want to thank the Connexion for its support. It has made a real difference to a number of churches in Northland on a continuing basis – with some continuing to hold 'church possible' meetings, St John's (Whangarei) and Dargaville Methodist in particular. The Bay of Islands Parish held a new Calling service and workshop in September – looking for team members for the team that has been running there for 17 years. There were able to call 4 new people to positions, who will be soon commissioned in their new tasks.

Churches Together in Northland, the governing regional body for Northland, acts as combined Synod, Presbytery and JRC and is working well. It has time to be a place for inspiration because much of Synod and Presbytery work is delegated to workgroups to act on its behalf. Workgroups include Ministry and Mission, responsible for Parish oversight (and effectively sharing some Superintendency tasks), as well as separate Methodist and Presbyterian workgroups, responsible for their denominational tasks. The Methodist group deals with the Methodist work including August Synod – this year being an encouraging time, and included a number of Trinity students. It is unfortunate that CTN is now under threat.

Presbyterians nationwide are organising themselves into super-Presbyteries, and Northland Presbyterians are likely to be brought into a large Northern Presbytery. This will effectively remove the governance powers of CTN for Presbyterian Parishes, and will effectively conclude the work of CTN. It is much to be regretted – but is still to be debated by CTN. We see this as one of the challenges of the next year. One of the things to look forward to is another 'Church Possible' event, again with a number of skilled leaders who look to make some different ways of being church in this mainly rural, small-congregation district.

Auckland Synod

An excellent School of Theology, on the topic of Providence, was held in April. Rev Dr Keith Rowe was the principal speaker together with Rev Tony Stroobant, Rev Sylvia 'Akau'ola Tongotongo, Rev Bill Wallace and Rev Lindsay Cumberpatch. The Anglican venue at Long Bay has been booked for the 2010 School of Theology.

The August Synod was held at Grafton Halls of Residence renewing a longstanding relationship between the Hall and the Synod. Members were treated to morning tea and lunch.

A Strategy planning day held on 21st February was facilitated by Frances Hancock and Associates. It was pleasing to have all Parishes, the Theological College and Lifewise represented. Further work is continuing with the intention of changing the Synod to a participatory style of management and delegating tasks to appropriate Lay or Ordained persons with the necessary skill base.

On September 2nd three members of the Manukau Executive and four members from the Auckland Executive met to discuss ways in which both Synods may work together. It was agreed that three Manukau persons come onto the Auckland Synod Property Advisory Committee which already includes members from Vahefonua Tonga, Sinoti Samoa and the Fiji Circuit. The skill base on this committee is outstanding. It was also agreed to have a joint committee for the Assessment of Probationers and for Candidate Assessment. The Executive raised the possibility of combined Ministerial Synods for 2010 and the possibility of a combined Synod meeting between the March and August Synods. It maybe possible that eventually a new Synod will emerge from the two existing ones.

A new Auckland Synod Superintendent will be appointed for 2010. Name/s will be brought to the October Synod.

Manukau Synod

Manukau Synod commenced the connexional year 2009 with the induction of Rev Prince Devanandan as the Synod Superintendent. The Synod continues to work according to its strategy. The primary aim has been to equip parishes to fulfil their mission.

Stationing requests for Waiuku and Districts Combined Churches, Mangere-Otahuhu and Wesley Papatoetoe parishes were submitted to the Tauiwi Stationing Committee in March 09. Stationing Committee has named two probationers and a supply minister from overseas to these parishes. Face to face meetings are being organized while this report is written. Tuakau Union parish has opted out of having a full time presbyter due to financial constraints. The parish will function with lay leadership from February 2010. Meadowlands Methodist Community Church has been through a difficult time due declining numbers and lack of financial resources to provide presbyteral ministry. Synod is working with the Mission Resourcing and the Connexion to organize ministry at Meadowlands.

Except one, all the first year reviews and fifth year reviews within the Synod was completed during year. The remaining one is in the process of setting a date.

Youth ministry in the Synod is flourishing with two of the presbyters encouraging the youth and drawing them together regularly for combined programmes.

Synod fulfils all the connexional and parish requirements while going through difficulties in finding people resources to some of the specific roles. Conversations have taken place to explore the possibilities of sharing the available resources with the Auckland Synod. The two Synod Executive Committees have agreed to work together on some specific areas. A strategy is being worked out to strengthen this further.

Waikato-Waiariki Synod

2009 began with seven induction services in the Waikato-Waiariki District, including that of Rev. Dr Susan Thompson as part-time dedicated Superintendent. The induction of the Rev. Apakuki Ratucoka to the Fijian congregations at Hamilton East, Rotorua and more recently Tauranga, was a significant occasion for the District and Synod has been pleased to support this new venture in ministry. These changes have brought new challenges and opportunities for parishes and presbyters alike.

The provision of good quality training and professional development to those engaged in lay and ordained ministry has been a priority in 2009. Events have been coordinated by the new Synod

Education Committee and have included lay preachers' workshops (with visits to the District by Colin Gibson and Frank Hanson), a ministry discernment day, our annual Synod retreat and a training day for board and committee members. Professor Elaine Wainwright has agreed to be our key speaker at Synod Refresh 2010. We have encouraged ministry with children through a trip to Hamilton Zoo in October, and youth ministry through Easter camp and a follow-up event in September.

We support ministry in a variety of parishes from solely Methodist to a range of co-operating and union ventures. The Waikato and Bay of Plenty JRCs are important ecumenical meeting places but we also share with our partner churches in combined workshops and hui and in a commitment to faith-based social services. We aim to make Synod gatherings interesting and welcoming and we continue to be enriched by a warm relationship with the local Rohe.

Lower North Island Synod

The new Synod was inaugurated in December 2008 following the decision by Conference 2008 agreeing to the amalgamation.

Our LNIS strategy is one of encouraging and resourcing where possible all our parishes for mission and this took a significant step forward with our School of Theology held in July. The theme was: Healthy Parish-Missional Parish – Rediscovering our Diaconal Heart. This was ably resourced by Nigel Hanscamp along with others.

We are looking to have the vacancies for presbyters at Napier and Wellington filled this stationing round to enable both parishes and the District to function fully.

The Rev Margaret Hall is superannuating this Conference and Rev Stuart Slinn is retiring (again) from the Supply that he has been providing at Napier for the past 3 years.

Local Shared Ministry (LSM) continues to develop in the rural areas, and now in Wanganui. Our need continues to be for presbyters and deacons in our District who can be mentors/resource people/enablers.

We are also in the early stages of looking at the possibility of having a Parish Development/Resource person employed to work with specific parishes as they seek to engage more intentionally in mission and growth. This will require discussions with Mission Resourcing and the appropriate ethnic Synods. This person will be in addition to the parish presbyters or equivalent. Possible sources of funding have been identified and we envisage the appointment would be for a minimum of 2 years.

Nelson, Marlborough, West Coast Synod

This year our focus has been on mission:

At our March Synod Nigel Hanscamp led a day's workshop on mission and ministry. We looked at new ways of being church and being hospitable congregations. Each parish set itself a goal to develop the mission and ministry of the parish.

We asked the Connexional Office to provide Synod and each of the parishes a list of the amounts of money each parish holds from the sale of property. Each parish was then asked to discuss how they are using the money for mission at present and what their needs and hopes were for five years from now. These responses were collated and will go to the writing of our synod mission strategy.

Many of our parishes and ministers have been reviewed this year, all with positive outcomes. Our future strategy includes finding a way and a person to resource the four West Coast parishes as they engage in succession planning.

Central South Island Synod

During the past year, regular Synod youth services have built relationships between youth from a variety of parishes. The Synod's Youth Coordinator position was made a ministry appointment

and a stationed appointment was sought. In October the Synod's Strategic Review Group reported, and a Ministerial Synod in February looked at their report. Members of the Strategic Review Group have worked with several parishes on strategic directions and goals. In February the Waimakariri Shared Ministry Agreement was inaugurated (one Methodist and one Presbyterian ministry appointments have been made), a ministry began at Crossway Community Church (covenant between Shirley Methodist and St Columba Presbyterian), and Rev Barbara Peddie was inducted to ministry within the Synod. The Sumner-Redcliffs/Lyttleton Harbour Union Parish is currently in the 1st year of a 2 year Transitional Ministry.

A combined Synod and Presbytery meeting was held in June at which Rev Jonathon Inkpin, from the Uniting Church in Australia spoke. This year the Synod has made a decision to be more intentional in supporting training opportunities for presbyters, lay people and youth. In March travel to a combined School of Theology with the Otago-Southland Synod in Queenstown was subsidised by the Synod. The Synod is also partly funding study through E.I.D.T.S. for a lay preacher. Rev Pete Pillinger, a *Fresh Expressions* missioner from the UK, spoke about Fresh Expressions at two events in February and Rev Dr Winston Worrell, from the United States, spoke at two events in May. The Synod lent its support to the 'Walk for the Planet' held during Lent.

The Synod's two main priorities for the coming year are to continue to focus on ministry with youth and to continue to develop a strategic framework for the whole Synod. The Youth Coordinator position is central to the Synod's youth ministry and work and the Synod is working to ensure this position is filled. The Synod will continue to encourage and support conversations between parishes exploring ways to work more closely together in whatever form that might be beneficial to them, and the Strategic Review Group will continue to work with parishes to encourage healthy, sustainable church communities within the Synod and to assist them and the Synod to develop cohesive strategies.

Otago – Southland Synod

The two major Methodist parishes in the Otago – Southland Synod are Dunedin and Invercargill. Lawrence is also a Methodist Parish, but faces closure in the foreseeable future. There are 3 full time and one 2/3 time Methodist presbyters in the District. The Synod has oversight of the following co-operative ventures: Riverton (Local Shared Ministry), Otatara Community Church (2/3 Lay Ministry), Teviot (1/3 lay ministry), Alexandra – Clyde - Lauder (full – time appointment). There are six other co-operative ventures, 5 of which are under Presbyterian oversight. One of these, Grants – Braes, wishes to revert to being a Presbyterian Parish. Most of the parishes under Presbyterian oversight are only rarely represented at Synod.

The tradition continues of holding a School of Theology at Queenstown in March following the Synod meeting. This year for the first time this event was organised jointly with Central South Island. Plans are in hand for the next School in March 2010.

Property matters: The Rev. Donald Phillips concludes his long service as District Property Secretary this year, and the Synod is at present seeking a replacement.

The Balclutha parsonage has recently been sold, and the question of how the proceeds will be used will be discussed at the November Synod.

Otago – Southland is a small synod in terms of numbers, and far-flung geographically. A major item for the Synod, and for Stationing 2010, will be the staffing of the Dunedin Parish and the provision of Synod Superintendency following the retirement of the present Superintendent.

Vahefonua

(Supplementary report – see page B(ii)15)

Sinoti Samoa

There are twenty two Parishes/Congregations under the oversight of Sinoti Samoa. Out of the twenty two, five are being looked after by Lay leaders and the rest by either full time itinerant, part time or non itinerant/stipendiary presbyters.

Preaching and worship leadership is shared by presbyters with the assistance of more than 100 Lay Preachers. Ongoing training for up-skilling and the sharing of contemporary resources among Lay Preachers and Presbyters is taking place in various parts of the country where the local leaders have organised their activities.

Children and Youth Ministries are continuing to be the major ministry emphasis for Sinoti Samoa: the Sunday school, with approximately 700 children involved in this year's Exam that took place throughout the country in the second week of August, 2009. Sinoti Samoa have appointed two new Youth Liaison Persons at its recent Annual meeting to work closely with local Youth leaders to coordinate and to provide support for the Youth Ministry. Youth Leadership trainings are being planned for not only local level but also Sinoti Youth as a whole. Various Youth groups have been involved in outreach mission in terms of fundraising, pastoral visitation, Ecumenical rallies, hospitality and so on.

Sinoti appointed and established a Social Issues sub committee to work in consultation with the Social Issues Committee of the Church, in matters that are affecting the lives of our members and those of the community in general.

Strategic Planning - Sinoti Samoa continues its emphasis:

- On Ministries to Children and Youth.
- On Lay Ministry Education.
- With creation and translation of Christian educational and liturgical materials.
- Supporting and building up the work of the Women's Fellowship.
- On Leadership training and ministry recruitment strategy.

Forward Looking - The areas of Sinoti Samoa work, which we continue to develop, are:

- Continue to Visioning, strategy, structures, governance and management.
- Working on the awareness and participation in social and political issues of this country.
- Translation of Laws and Regulations.
- Planting new congregations in South Island.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. Conference acknowledges the valuable contributions made by
 - a) President Jill van de Geer and Vice President Ron Gibson to the work of Tauiwi Strategy & Stationing, and Council of Conference.
 - b) Kenneth Smith to the work of Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing.
 - c) Tovia Aumua who has served the Council of Conference well since 2001, and as Coconvenor for seven years.
 - d) David McGeorge for the work of the Council of Conference since 2001, and Derek Holland and Susau Strickland who have served as substitutes.
- 3. Conference
 - a) commends Alex Webster and Susan Thompson's for their work on Human Sexuality Towards Dialogue Paper.
 - b) encourages Trinity College to translate this resource into Tongan, Samoan and Fijian languages and to make it available on the Church website and as a PDF file through e-messenger for all Parishes to use.
 - c) encourages Tauiwi presbyters and lay leaders to promote discussion of the Human Sexuality Towards Dialogue Paper in their parishes / congregation.

 - d) Tauiwi Strategy prepares a report for the September Council of Conference meeting and subsequent reporting to Conference 2010 including a 'Catching The Vision' Package for parishes and to promote a possible national appeal date for Vision Projects.

- 5. Associate Member of Synod:
 - a) That Conference agrees that except where a Presbyter of Deacon is stationed to two Synods, a Presbyter or Deacon may only be a full member of one Synod.
 - b) That the category of Associate of Synod be expanded to include those in Full Connexion who may also wish to associate with a geographic or ethnic synod other than that to which they are stationed.
 - c) That section 4.4.1 of the Law Book be amended by the addition of the following: "A Presbyter/Deacon may only be a full member of one Synod. This must be the Synod to which the Presbyter is stationed. A presbyter who is a full member of a Synod may in certain circumstances become an associate member of another synod. This would normally mean one geographic and one ethnic synod".

EVANGELICAL NETWORK REPORT FOR 2009

The main focus of the Evangelical Network this year has been the international conference, Equipt 09, held at Ngaruawahia April 28th to May 1st. Some duplication will occur in the reports given that Mission and Ecumenical also has some relationship and responsibility with the World Methodist context: both reports read together will give us all a better idea of what went on!

The Equipt 09 International Conference was held in Ngaruawahia from the 28th of April to the 1st of May 2009, as a cooperative venture between the World Methodist Council, the World Methodist Evangelism Institute, and the New Zealand churches in the Wesley family: the Methodist Church of New Zealand te Háhi Weteriana o Aoteoroa, the Wesleyan Methodist Churches of New

Zealand, the Nazarene Churches of New Zealand and the Korean Methodists represented by Rev David Ahn of Zion Hill Korean Methodist Church. The vision for the Conference arose out of the visit by Rev Alan K Webster and Rev David Bush to the 25th World Methodist Evangelism Conference in Georgia USA in 2007 and a subsequent visit by Dr Winston Worrell to New Zealand en route to the Sydney meeting of the WMEI in August 2008. The Conference Committee appointed a conference secretary, Rev Andrew Gamman (a Baptist colleague of Alan's who was completing a term in his church and was able to help) and set up a steering committee that at various stages included representatives of Tongan, Samoan and Fijian Methodists from both the Methodist and the Wesleyan branches of the family. The mailing list of minutes included Mission and Ecumenical and Te Taha Maori, as well as Mission Resourcing Directors and the Presidential team.

Financing this conference was made possible from a generous grant of \$20,000 from the Caughey Smith Preston Evangelisation fund, \$8,000 from PAC, \$1,000 from the Waikato Waiariki synod and \$1000 from the Central South Island Synod. The Wesleyan Methodist Churches of New Zealand also contributed \$1,000, and the WMEI \$20,000 as well. Final accounting of how this money was disbursed is in the audited accounts: it appears at the time of writing as if we made a slight loss. We budgeted on an attendance of 300, booking the campsite for 300 beds, and preparing workshops, folders and the scale of the worship space according to that prediction: in the end, 147 people registered and probably another 20 attendees who did not register (!) meant that we rattled a bit in a big campsite, and that we were oversupplied with workshop opportunities.

Participants were offered eight plenary speakers: four overseas guests from the World Methodist Council chairman Dr George Freeman, WMEI's executive director Dr H Eddie Fox, Bishop Robert Fannin of the WMEI evangelism committee and Dr JC Park from the Korean Methodist Theological seminary in Seoul. Four Kiwi speakers complemented the array: Glynn Carpenter, of VisionNZ, Rev Siosifa Lokotui from Laidlaw College and the Wesleyans, Rev Nigel Hanscamp Mission resourcing from the Methodist Church of New Zealand, and Rev Neville Bartle from the Nazarene Churches of New Zealand. Attendees were also offered a choice from some 50 different workshops on a wide range of topics offered by practitioners and theologians from a variety of sources: alternative worship workshops, community interface initiatives, para-church organisations, and special interest groups. Thus it was possible over the week to catch insights into artwork as worship, what makes a Methodist, the use of film in community ministry, second generation issues for new migrants, multi-sensory prayer, making a good first impression, ministry to the elderly, models of church planting and communicating to post-moderns...to take a random sample from the programme!

Feedback has been uniformly positive, albeit with some things that we could do better next time...

The Evangelical Network has been proud to be able to offer this as a resource to the wider church, and we trust that the benefits of such a broad and interesting array of inputs will continue to foster an outward focussed vision for the future.

NEW ZEALAND METHODIST WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Greetings to all participants of this Conference, especially the distinguished guests from other denominations and overseas. Special greetings to the President, the Reverend Alan Upson and the Vice President, Miss Lana Lazarus. Ou te faapea atu ai, "O oulua mama na. Ia tafe toto o oulua ala".

It was a great honour and privilege for me to have been inducted in this role as National President of the NZMWF at Convention in October last year. I am also thankful to God for the team of courageous and committed Samoan women, who are willing to be involved in the NZMWF National Executive to explore, discover and reveal the unknown in this new experience. Unlike some of the past NZMWF National Executives where some of the members had previously experienced leadership in the national level, this team is unique in that none of us has travelled this road before. However, being all new to this task is both plus and minus. With the job description for each individual's responsibility, so far it is going well. We are motivated to dig deeper into the storehouse of God for guidance in each individual's responsibility and for us all to share ideas and thoughts as a team.

Structure

The NZMWF consists of 19 Districts including the Tongan and the Samoan Women's Fellowships. The official name of the Samoan District is 'Mafutaga Tamaitai Sinoti Samoa Ekalesia Metotisi Niu Sila' (MTSSEMNS). There is also a combined Association of Presbyterian Women (APW) and Methodist Women's Fellowship (MWF) District within these 19 Districts and may be more of this type in the future. Other ethnic women's groups like the Fijian and Rotuman are exploring possible structures appropriate for themselves.

Sympathy

We remember with deep regret the loss of our past National Executive members who have dedicated their lives, their God-given gifts, and their precious time to serve God through the ministry of the Women's Fellowship. We pay our tribute and honour the memory of those who have died during the year: Jean Waugh, Ruth Overand Dolejs (Nelson/Marlborough), Irene Girven (Wellington), Audrey Leadley (South Canterbury). We also extend our heartfelt sympathy to their families, relatives and friends.

Vision

While preparing for Convention 2008, we had a brainstorming session for a theme to guide us during our term in office. The ongoing question for the MCNZ is, 'What is the Spirit saying to the Church?' As the focus for our brainstorming, we ask this same question and substitute the 'Church' with 'NZMWF', 'What is the Spirit saying to the NZMWF?' After reflections and further discussions, we have chosen the theme:

"Re-Kindle the Spiritual Fire within the NZMWF to make a Difference"

- To rekindle the faith, love, joy, passion of women to serve;
- To motivate women to be involved in whatever it takes to do justice for women and children who are usually voiceless in our communities;
- To fulfill the Millenium Development Goals (MDGs) allocated to the South Pacific Area;
- To attract young women to the mission of the MWF (this is the hope of the The National Executive);
- To promote equality among gender, race, nationality, socio-economic status, and to live in harmony with creation.

Communication

Though we are in a learning curve, the advanced use of technology has helped speed up our local, national and international communication via email, telephone, mobile, text, fax - and post is still in use. In every three months the President's Letter is sent out to all Districts informing them of any upcoming events and of the Executive's work. The News Bulletin is sent out in-between to update Districts and maintain the connection.

"The Tree of Life", which is the International Newsletter of the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women comes in four issues per year. Each Unit must order the number of issues they need. So far, it has been good that the issue No.2 April – June 2009 arrived on time as expected. "The Tree of Life "brings information from the World Officers and whatever happenings in other Areas of the world including theological and pastoral matters."

Special Events

It was a very exciting experience at the World Methodist Evangelism Conference held at the Christian Youth Camp at Ngaruahia in April 28th to May 1^{st.} The Conference was also called the Equipt 09. The Guest speakers had inspiring messages and very challenging. Many informative workshops have been done. The theme was "That the World May Know Jesus Christ". It aimed at

making the Methodist Movement alive, vibrant, growing and yearning to spread the Good News of Christ Jesus through out the world by Word, Deed and Sign.

There have been many Non Government Organisations (NGOs) who sent invitations for the president or representative to attend their annual gatherings. Unfortunately, we have not been able to accept all of them due to various reasons, including unavailability and cost. Two Executive Members attended the Association of Presbyterian Women's Conference in May and heard a Guest Speaker from the UK, Linda Bale, who is an advocate against child abuse and violence against women. I have arranged for a Wellington member of our MWF to represent the NZMWF at the National Council of Women NZ's Council Meeting in Wellington in September. Some of the Executive members attended workshops run by the NCWNZ Manukau Branch, Pacific Women Watch seminars and an annual meeting. Those attended found these opportunities very enriching and had enjoyed fellowship with other ethnic groups.

I have visited a few Districts with other members of the Executive. What an experience! These visits have a great impact on us. It was such a great feeling of inner joy and humility to receive the warmth of sisterly love and hospitality. It was amazing to meet some of our older women who have taught us a lesson of perseverance with Women's Fellowship. The best part was the time of sharing of our faith journey stories, meeting people we never knew and learning from each other.

The NZMWF National Council will be held on the 02- 04 October 2009 at Willowpark Christian Centre, Howick, Auckland. The Presidents of Districts, immediate past President, Convenors of Trusts and Committees, the Helen Kim Scholar (if prefer to attend) and the current NZMWF National Executive members will be in attendance.

Finance

We congratulate every member for their effort to fundraise and donate to our NZMWF, and especially towards our Special Project. In spite of the economic recession, people have been giving generously.

The Special Project 2008–2009 has two parts. The larger portion of the Special project goes to the Hearing Association of New Zealand's Communication Project, and the lesser portion goes to the Overseas Project – Lauru - Our –Land – Solomon Islands Women Face the Future. As our system of alternation, the bigger portion will go to the overseas project next year.

The Goldie College in the Solomon Islands has been selected as the Recipient for the Medical and Educational Fund, while the Sassamunga Hospital on Choisul Island, also in the Solomon Islands, has been selected as the recipient of the Stamps and Coupons. These will be confirmed at National Council.

Words cannot fully express how much we appreciate and are thankful to all the hard working women young and old. Only God can fulfill your needs and bless you all in your endeavours.

Grants and Scholarships

Friendship Scholarship Trust: This Trust was set up to help Pacific Island females age 16 years and over at Secondary Schools. The grant is sent directly to the school for the successful applicant's use only. There were nine Friendship Scholarship Grants paid directly to the colleges at the end of January 2009, the total grants of \$5,800.00.

Kurahuna Trust: This has been set up to help Maori Girls Education. There were eleven grants paid out to schools with the total of \$7,810.00.

The Smethurst Trust: This Trust is open to applications from women at Tertiary Education. There were hundred and thirty six recipients of grants, totaling to \$19,274.68.

Special Project 2009-2010

The Association of Presbyterian Women (APW) and Methodist Women's Fellowship (MWF) work together in helping those who are in need overseas and in New Zealand through a Special Project. These two organisations form a Mission Group to select a Special Project every year with two parts: one overseas and one in New Zealand. The Christian World Service (CWS) was consulted to help APW & MWF in the selection of a Special Project overseas for 2009 -2010.

The Overseas part of the Special Project is: "Supporting Youth through the CEPAD in Making a better tomorrow for Young People in Nicaragua". The CEPAD (the Council of Protestant Churches in Nicaragua) was established in 1972 to provide relief to survivors of the devastating Managua earthquake. The CEPAD provides programmes to help build a better future for children and young people of Nicaragua, to increase family incomes and access to nutritious food gives healthier life and schooling.

The NZ part of the Special Project is "SupportingYouth – They're Worth It". The Presbyterian focus is 'Youth Connect' while the Methodist focus is 'Servanthood'.

In conclusion, the NZMWF National Executive would like to thank every member of the MWF for their payers and support for us since we took up this role.

 - ii) The Sunday was dedicated to the Wasewase and all 'Soli/Koha/ Donation will help support its mission work.
- 2. Tabacakacaka o Viti e Okoladi (Mt Roskill) has secured a Church property at 86 Mays Road, Onehunga.
- 3. Fijian Presbyters: Ilaitia S. Tuwere, Apakuki Ratucoka and Peni Tikoinaka.
- 4. The Wasewase Strategy Committee was established to be responsible for the formulation of Policies and Strategies in order to prepare us for a SYNOD in 2012.
- 5. After a lapse of about five years, the Kyber Pass congregation was represented by two lay leaders at the Christchurch Executive meeting.
- 6. The first Wasewase Youth camp was held from Friday 17 to Sunday 19 April, 2009 in Christchurch, where they also elected their office bearers.
- 7. Rotorua and Tauranga are two more Fijian congregations established since our last meeting in Wellington. So Wasewase ko Viti kei Rotuma is now made up of ten(10) local congregations all over New Zealand.
- 8. Rev Peni Tikoinaka has just paid a visit and met with Fijians in Dunedin and Invercargill. It is indeed fascinating to witness the vibrant growth and developments within each Fijian congregation, irrespective of numbers, size or location.
- 9 Finance: The Wasewase has also made affirmative actions in managing our finance since it was handed back to us in July 2008. Further, it is to be noted with great appreciation to the level of financial support (in terms of Levy) given by the respective Tabacakacaka/Circuit are injecting to our Account.

Vision for the future

Short term [1 – 5years]:

- 1. Ministry Training: All young dedicated Fijian members all over New Zealand are encouraged to take up Ministry Training.
- 2. Local congregations are reminded constantly that they should be well resourced to look after presbyters.
- 3. To become a SYNOD by 2012.

Long term [five years or more]:

- 1. To establish at least one Fijian church in every region and or a combined one between the neighbouring towns.
- 2. To acquire at least two other church properties and grow sustainably.
- 3. Vinaka vakalevu.

Vahefonua Tonga is a *National Synod* which oversees 37 congregations throughout Aotearoa New Zealand who worship in the Tongan language. As it seeks to reflect the Mission Statement of Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa, Vahefonua aims to equip all these congregations with appropriate resources to nurture and transform them into effective Christians relevant to their respective communities and context.

With that ultimate goal, Vahefonua began the year 2009 with a simple vision of "uniting" all it's 37 congregations, according to the Law Book, so that they may walk forward and grow together with a common understanding of what it is like to be an effective Tongan Methodist Christian in Aotearoa. Visitations by the Vahefonua Superintendent and executives to all congregations were then begun with the aim of (a) gaining a more in depth understanding of each congregation in their respective context and (b) to clarify to all congregations the structure and expectations of Te Haahi. These visitations will be completed by mid-December 2009 and it is hoped that the process of setting up a more effective structure and of appropriately providing resources for Vahefonua will begin in the coming year.

In the meantime, close working relationship has been established with Trinity College to provide resources and training in Tongan language for the lay leaders, lay preachers, and the ongoing development of clergy in their respective skills and strengths. As it looks to the future, Vahefonua has developed a national curriculum for the Sunday School and is working to institute a national program for the Youth. Youth rallies and leadership training are ongoing active means of enhancing Christian living and outreach for our young people and beyond.

The successful outcome of the annual Vahefonua Tonga Education and Employment Training Expo since 2007 in Mangere has inspired VTOA to branch out in its outreach and mission in 2009, staging effective roadshows in 5 other major cities throughout New Zealand as well as mentoring a scholarship project in Wellington. Working closely with LifeWise Vahefonua Tonga Mission aims to establish health and social services in 2010 starting in Auckland and Manukau, anticipating branching out to other parts of New Zealand in due course in partnership with the established Methodist Missions. Details are referred to in the Vahefonua Tonga Mission Report 2009.

Vahefonua Tonga wishes to express it's heartfelt appreciation and thanks to the President, Rev Jill van de Geer, The Vice President, Mr Ron Gibson, The Tumuaki, Rev Diana Tana, The General Secretary, Rev David Bush, The Tauiwi Executive Officer, Rev Aso Samoa Saleupolu, The Director of the English Speaking Ministries, Rev Nigel Hanscamp, The Principal of Trinity College, Rev Dr David Bell and to the leaders of Te Haahi for all your unwavering tireless help and support given to Vahefonua during the past year. The National Council of the New Zealand Methodist Women's Fellowship met on Friday the 2nd - 4th October 2009 at the Willow Park Christian Centre, Howick, Manukau City. The Meeting was attended by thirty five women, including Presidents or representatives from most of the Methodist Women's Fellowship Districts. At its opening, the National Council was also privileged by the presence of the Manukau Synod Superintendent, the Rev. Prince Devanandan and his wife, the Sinoti Samoa Superintendent, the Rev. Tovia Aumua and his wife Leotele, Sister Jacqui Ryan from Christian World Service, Mr. Graham Wilson and Richard from the Hearing Association of NZ, Pauline Murdoch President of the Association of Anglican Women, Mary North representing the Association of Presbyterian Women, Mataiva Robertson (Helen Kim Scholar of the WFMUCW), Dr. Natalie Anesi Fa'amatuainu Tu'i (Guest speaker), and the Tauiwi Executive Officer -Director of Pacific Ministries, Rev. Aso Samoa Saleupolu.

The opening worship led by the Vice President and Chaplain, Rev. Suiva'aia Te'o was focused on the theme, "Rekindle the spiritual fire within NZMWF to make a difference." Sui challenged the women to reflect on what this might mean for them in their own walk of life. There was a brief moment of silence to pray for the victims of the tsunami in the Pacific. The worship time concluded with an upward beat of an item by the Youth Group from the Waitakere Samoan Parish.

The Meeting took time to pay tributes and to acknowledge the gifts and services of its members who passed away since the Convention last year: Ruth Overland Dolejs of Nelson-Marlborough District, Dawn Wright of Manawatu-Wanganui District (name missing in the tribute section of the Report), Jean Mary Waugh of Nelson-Marlborough District, Irene Girven of the Wellington District, and Audrey Leadley of South Canterbury District.

Our Guest Speaker, Dr. Natalie Anesi Fa'amatuainu Tu'i shared with the Meeting the story of her faith journey. Natalie is a New Zealand born Samoan of the Mangere East Methodist Congregation. She has been practicing as a Medical Doctor for six years; in five of those years she worked in various hospitals including Middlemore, Auckland, Waitakere, Waikato and Palmerston North. In August this year, she decided to do General Practice in order to move closer to the grassroots and at her own community where she is currently working as a General Practioner at the Bader Drive Medical Health Centre in Mangere. Natalie told of how her faith in God has helped her study as a woman and as a Samoa, and how the Scriptures and Church life have strengthened her life. She acknowledged her parents for their strong faith, support and role modeling that led to her success. Natalie gave a strong challenge for parents and young people to have a strong faith in God, be focused, and having a clear purpose in life.

For our Special Projects this year, the Hearing Association received \$23,163.39, and the Lauru Land Conference Women's Programme, Choiseul in the Solomon Islands received \$9,927.17.

The National Executive members, being all Samoans, have expressed their heartfelt thanks and appreciation to MWF districts, individuals and friends who sent greetings, well wishes and blessings for leading National Council 2009, and as well as messages of condolences regarding the Earthquake and Tsunami tragedy in our homeland of Samoa. The Meeting decided to collect a koha for the Tsunami Samoan victims.

There was much appreciation of the involvement of the Youth; both in the opening night and especially the Youth Entertainment on Saturday night. The purpose of the Youth Night was to introduce the young women to the work of New Zealand Methodist Women's Fellowship with hope that they would develop interest to becoming members of the MWF. The four youth groups provided wonderful and lively performances that the National Council participants have enjoyed. Our guest speakers for that night were the Three Wise Women who shared their faith journeys and involvements in the work of the Methodist Women's Fellowship - Mala Manufalealili and Mataiva Robertson were our young New Zealand born Samoans who spoke of their faith stories and appreciations of being involved in the NZMWF. The third speaker was our very own, well-known and life long member, Margaret Gordon who provided an excellent history of the NZMVF and its

connection to the South Pacific Area and to the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women.


This year is the first year the National Executive Committee has claimed the Goods and Services Tax (GST) refunds in the history of New Zealand Methodist Women's Fellowship. The National Council 2009 agreed that GST refunds be made available for the National Executive expenses. Since the MWF organization relies heavily on the interest from its investments to fund our objectives, the National Council agreed to review its MTA investments.

Decisions of the National Council Meeting we wish to share with Conference

- A koha is collected for the tsunami victims in Samoa.
- The Programme Committee ceases to exist and its tasks allocated to different districts; and appropriate acknowledgements be made at the 2010 Convention.
- The President Elect 2010 -2012 is Mataiva Robertson of New Plymouth –Samoan District (MTSS).
- The 2010 New Zealand Methodist Women's Fellowship Convention will be held at Willow Park Christian Convention Centre from Thursday the 30th September to Sunday 03rd October, and will be hosted by the Samoan District /Mafutaga Tamaitai Sinoti Samoa (MTSS).
- The Guest Speaker for the 2010 Convention is the President of the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women, Chita Rebollido-Millan of the Philippines.

LAW REVISION

The decision of Conference in 2008 to reconstitute the Trinity College Council and the Mission Resourcing Board, means that all references to 'Board of Ministry' needed to be changed to reflect the new structure.

Rather than just being a change of name in the law, both the Trinity College Council and the Mission Resourcing Board have taken this opportunity to revise some parts of the Law relating to their operations. They are bringing draft changes to Conference for consideration. The Law Revision Committee has found the task of finalising the drafting of this new law more time consuming than anticipated and asks that it may continue to work with the Trinity College Council and the Mission Resourcing Board, with a view to the President approving the completed work, with Conference to ratify the Presidents decision in 2010.

The revised Trinity College Council constitution is printed as part of the report of Trinity College on page E4.

The Mission Resourcing Law Book changes are printed as part of the Mission Resourcing report on page E11.

2. Items needing more significant changes

Section 2. 3.7

Each candidate shall complete an application as prescribed by Mission Resourcing.

The application shall include:

- (a) Information regarding prior learning experience including academic transcripts from all tertiary institutions in which the candidate has been enrolled.
- (b) Commitment to the Methodist Church of new Zealand and its Laws and Regulations including full and candid disclosure of all facts that may have a bearing upon ministry training and /or ordination.
- (c) A police report of an approved form.
- (d) A medical report.
- (e) Proof of New Zealand residency qualification.
- (f) Competency in English, in the language in which they will minister and, if necessary in Te Reo.
- (g) Any other information or report that the Board from time to time may require.

Section 2: 3.14.2

The General Secretary in consultation with the President shall establish an Appeals Committee of three people who shall hear the appeal before convening of the Conference in that year. The only basis for an appeal is abuse and or /incorrect use of the candidating process. The Appeals Committee shall provide its decision to Mission Resourcing Board and such decision shall be final and binding.

Section 2.4.12

Students may be dismissed from Trinity College and their studies discontinued under section 11 (D) 7.2.2.

- (a) Grounds for immediate dismissal of the student are:
 - (i) Falsification of an application.
 - (ii) Acts of violence towards students or staff.
 - (iii) Dishonesty.
- (b) Grounds for dismissal and discontinuation of academic studies will include:
 - (i) Failure to achieve satisfactory academic progress and/or ministry progress in relation to the criteria for ordination.
- (c) Any dismissal and/or discontinuation of studies shall be carried out by the President on the recommendation of the Student Review Panel.
- (d) The rules of natural justice will apply.

Section 2. 5.7

Any probationer who desires to pursue University work during probation shall obtain the consent of the principal and the Parish Superintendent so that such studies may interfere as little as possible with Parish work. (see 2.4.10)

Other matters considered by the Committee during the year.

A. Parsonages

A review of the information leaflet relating to parsonages resulted in the following suggested law changes.

2.24.3

Existing

Where a Minister dies, the spouse shall be entitled to continue occupancy of the house applicable to the appointment until the end of that Connexional year or for three months after the death of the minister, which ever is the longer.

<u>New</u>

Where a Minister dies, the spouse/partner shall be entitled to continue rent free occupancy of the house applicable to the appointment for three months after the death of the minister. Any other arrangements applying prior to the death shall continue during the three month period.

3.11.4

Section 19.d

Existing

The first priority for the use of rentals received in respect of any parsonage, including rentals from Ministers, shall be for maintenance of the Parsonage.

New

The first priority for the use of rentals received in respect of any parsonage shall be maintenance of the Parsonage.

B. Disciplinary Procedures

There continues to be some revisions of the Disciplinary Procedures. The Committee agrees with the Chair of the Complaints Review Panel that after seven years of use it would be appropriate to review the procedures during 2010.

Section 6(c) The first contact with a party to a complaint shall notify the party of this obligation of confidentiality.

<u>Revision</u>

The Complaints Officer shall notify all parties to a complaint of this obligation of confidentiality.

- Part I <u>Contact Persons</u> Section to be removed entirely.
 - (ii) the complaint is considered to have substance, but is of a minor nature or consequence, then the matter may be referred to the appropriate District Superintendent or some other appropriate person for resolution;

the complaint is considered to have substance, but is of a minor nature or consequence, then the matter may be referred to the appropriate Synod Superintendent or the Pastoral Committee for resolution, which shall be final.

Facilitation of Tauiwi Strategy

Clause 4.3.3 The President and Vice President, who shall facilitate the meetings.

<u>Revised</u>

Tauiwi will appoint its own facilitators who shall facilitate both Tauiwi Strategy meeting and the Tauiwi Meeting at Conference.

Associate Members of Synod

The report on this matter is found under Tauiwi Strategy.

To add the words in bold to section 4.4.1

Membership of the Synod is based on the principle of automatic membership for all ministers under the authority of Conference, and on parity of numbers between lay and ordained members. A presbyter may be a full member of one Synod only, which is the synod of the parish to which the presbyter is stationed. A presbyter who is a full member of a synod may in certain circumstances become an associate member of another synod. This would normally mean one geographical synod and one ethnic synod.

Local Shared Ministry:

The LSM work group has asked about place of Enablers in relation to Synod and Ministerial Synods.

Add: Membership of Synod

Section 4: 4.1(s) Enablers contracted to the Synod.

Membership of Ministerial of Synod Section 4: 5.1(g) Enablers contracted to the Synod.

A new section for the Law Book **Local Shared Ministry** is required, which among other matters will define 'Enablers', Ministry Teams etc. The Committee will work on this in 2010.

Police Check – Vetting

A question has been asked what Law do we need if a Police check reveals less than desirable results and the implications if someone refuses to take a Police Check.

These matters are being discussed with Mission Resourcing and a resolution will be in the Mission Resourcing Report.

The Committee

It has been good to retain the knowledge and experience of Rev Jill van de Geer on the Committee. The new members also make a very valuable contribution.

BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION

INTRODUCTION

The Board of Administration during 2009 achieved the following:

- Continued the provision of accounting and payroll services.
- Provided HR services to Boards and Parishes.
- Implemented an Employment Advocacy Service.
- Continued work on the future of the Supernumerary Fund and clarified benefits for those who will not be members of the Fund.
- Finalised details of parsonage rentals (Information Leaflet No. 26).
- Continued work to expand the secure archive storage area in Morley House.

The Supernumerary Fund has continued as a major area of focus. The Conference agreed in 2008 that the Supernumerary Fund would be closed to new members from 1 February 2010. The Board brings to Conference this year proposals which include KiwiSaver and Death in Service insurance for those who will not be able to join the fund.

The Board instituted on Employee Advocacy Service in September. The full details are in the reports. Conference might be interested to note that an undesignated legacy was received in early 2009. The interest earned is expected to cover the costs. This really is an enduring gift which will support Presbyters, Deacons and Lay Workers in times of stress. It is a reminder of the benefit of a bequest.

STAFF

Rev David Bush was inducted as General Secretary at Conference 2008, moving into this role, so that Rev Jill van de Geer could take up her responsibilities as President, although Jill did not formally conclude her appointment until the end of the Connexional year.

It has been a happy transition, with Jill working from another office in Morley House. It has proved highly beneficial for the President and the General Secretary to be in the same building.

Two new staff have joined the team. Jude Anderson was appointed as PA to Greg Wright. Jody Sutherland was appointed to the accounts team, and Stacey Cochrane has returned from Maternity leave on a part-time basis. All make a very valuable contribution to the competent and hard working staff team.

BOARD

The Board continues to work well with plenty of lively and incisive debate. The EAP Programme is an example of how Board members bring knowledge and skill from their work place and apply it to issues facing the Church.

Risk Management

The Auditors for the Board have raised the question of the Churches risk management. More than auditing annual accounts, such risk management ensures the Church has policies and procedures to reduce the Churches exposure to risk.

The Board are signalling they will place this on their agenda to bring a report to Conference 2010.

Accommodation Expenses

When a person is travelling on official Church business and stays with a friend or relative, the Board has approved an optional payment for accommodation expenses. It only applies for official Church business, where the Church would have otherwise paid for accommodation elsewhere, to recognise the cost of having guests. It would not apply if staying with a Presbyter or Deacon who already receives an expense allowance.

The allowance is based on the IRD approved payments for hospitality. [Bed \$7.85, Breakfast \$6.13, Lunch \$9.18, Dinner \$12.27, Morning Tea/Supper \$2 each]. If rounded to whole numbers a full day comes to approximately \$40, with Dinner/Bed/Breakfast \$30. Payment would be made to

the friend/relative on behalf of the authorised individual once the appropriate claim form had been completed.

In adopting the allowance, the Board agreed to make this known to the wider Church, so that the Boards/Synods could adopt the policy or if the Conference so wished to adopt it as Conference policy.

Wellness & Care of Presbyters, Deacons Lay Workers and their families (EAP)

A teenager is causing concern, for his/her parents who are at their wits end, not knowing what to do, and not sleeping well. One of the parents is a Presbyter, feeling a sense of isolation, wanting to keep the family situation separate from the church. Furthermore it is extra hard when the concentration required to write a good sermon is not there when you can hardly stay awake and the emotional and spiritual reserves for work are running on empty.

For some time, the Board of Administration has been concerned about how personal issues may be impacting on the health and wellbeing of Ministers and their families. Issues of finance, family and relationships, or personal matters that don't fit in supervision (which focuses on work). Issues where there might be a hesitation to take them up with Synod Superintendents, Parish Stewards or the President. In the fictitious example above the solution maybe in appropriate counselling for the teenager.

Some of the Board Members are part of organisations which make an Employment Assistance Programme ("EAP") available to their staff. The Board resolved to investigate such a programme for the Methodist Church. This programme would not replace supervision. The purpose would be to provide a safe, confidential, professional place where any Minister or their family could go to discuss personal issues.

Access to the service is via an 0800 free phone, and the services provided would be free of charge to the Minister. Up to three sessions would be available. A Synod Superintendent or General Secretary or President may also refer a person.

The service would be totally confidential, no names or content of conversations would ever be disclosed. The service is available in most towns and cities in New Zealand.

Funding from a bequest is available to cover the projected use of such a service.

Feed back from August Synods was very positive and has helped the Board to fine tune the proposal.

The Board has now implemented this service and all Ministers will be informed of how to engage with the service if they ever require it.

The Board will review the service provided on an annual basis to ensure that it is adequately meeting the needs of the Ministry and the objectives of the Board in providing on-going support.

STIPENDS REVIEW TASK GROUP

Conference 2008 referred the remaining matters from the Task Group to the Board of Administration for consideration. The major item concerned the payment of a responsibility margin for Connexional Appointees and Synod Superintendents. The Board in discussing this matter was aware that no decision had been possible at two successive Conferences and decided not to pursue the matter in 2009 due to this lack of clear consensus.

Tauiwi Strategy however, have asked the Board of Administration to find a way forward. They noted that the job dimensions were quite different, that when carrying out an "additional task" it created an expectation of 100% plus. That those in Connexional positions cannot, or do not, take the funerals which supplement the income of many Parish Presbyters and that the Uniting Church of Australia, British Methodist Church and the Presbyterian Church all recognise responsibility with an additional margin.

The Board will place this matter on its agenda to report to Conference 2010.

STIPENDS

Stipends and Allowances from 1 July 2009

The Stipends Committee accepted that it was appropriate to increase the standard stipend by 3.0% and the standard allowances and book allowance reimbursement by the annual movement in the Consumer Price Index to 31 March 2009 of 3.0%. The amounts payable from 1 July 2009 were:

Reimbursement for Connexional travel is 44 cents per kilometre.

Reimbursement of travel has not changed from 2008. The rates are:

Less than 14,000 kms Between 14,001 and 20,000 kms	65 cents per kilometre 53 cents per kilometre
Between 20,001 and 26,000 kms	46 cents per kilometre

Alternatively, the flat rate of 36 cents (32 cents) per km can be paid for unlimited running (i.e. without the need to record annual mileage and be concerned about exceeding a chosen band).

Information Leaflet No. 25 (Presbyters Stipend and Allowances) has been changed to reflect the necessary changes. In addition to these changes it also includes a summary of the rental or lease of the presbyters own home payments which came into affect from 1 July 2009. This information leaflet is available on the website of the church (<u>www.methodist.org.nz</u>) or a printed copy can be posted.

A new Information Leaflet has been prepared which deals with the presbyters rental arrangements. This is Information Leaflet No. 26 and is entitled "Presbyter Housing Allowance Options".

GST RETURNS – NEW WEB BASED SYSTEM

From August 2008 the Connexional Office introduced a new way for entities within the Church to file their GST returns with the Connexional Office.

The system seems to be working well. Monthly reminders are being sent to those entities within the Church who have not sent in a return by the due date.

During the next 12 months we will be concentrating on entities who have not supplied us with a GST return on a monthly basis to ensure they know their legal requirements and the risks they face if they do not comply.

BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION - SPECIAL ACCOUNT

The Board of Administration Special Account or as it is more commonly referred to the Connexional Banking Arrangement, is one of the main avenues of contribution to the Connexional Budget.

The Connexional Banking Arrangement calls for <u>all</u> Methodist Church bank accounts to be held with the Bank of New Zealand and the Church is then entitled to draw down part of those credit balances which can be used either for investment or for loans to Church parishes.

The only constraint on the operation of Church accounts is that they be maintained in credit.

For the year to June 2009 the Special Account contributed \$79,705 (2008 - \$78,971) to the Connexional Budget or just under 10% (2008 - 9%) of the total income for the Connexional Budget.

Connexional loans through the Special account are noted in the annual accounts of Special Account which is administered by the Board of Administration.

As District contributions come under increasing strain the contribution of Connexional activities such as the banking arrangement will have increasing importance.

It is therefore essential that all Church banking is undertaken through the Connexional Banking Arrangment. Please contact Greg Wright if you require further information (gregw@methodist.org.nz).

FINANCIAL REVIEW

CHARITIES ACT

Other than for new entities being established, the application for registration process has come to an end and the centralised contact management system (known as Pivotal) has been updated so that Charities registration, user login ids and password details are stored within it for ease of access by those people who have access to the system.

What do we need to complete from here?

Moving forward, any change of "Officer" of a registered charity (Parish or Synod for example) will need to complete Form 3 and return it to the Commission. This form is able to be completed online. Parishes, Synods and other entities are remaindered that if changes are made to Board members, then the Charities Commission should be informed.

Most Methodist Church based entities that are registered with the Charities Commission are required to have Form 4 completed (and attaching a set of annual accounts) and sending these to the Board of Administration in November so that they can be checked and then lodged through the Charities Commission website. Form 4 **MUST** be in the hands of the Charities Commission by 31 December.

The Connexional Office ran a number of online training sessions on how to complete the Annual Return (Form 4) earlier in the year. These training sessions were web based with audio conferencing. These were not well attended. Board staff will activity communicate to the wider Church through e-mail, Touchstone and e-messenger the need to return a completed Form 4 along with annual accounts.

CENTRALISED PAYROLL SYSTEM

The centralised payroll system which began in April 2005 continues to be one of the Division's key services delivered to the wider Connexion. There are now over 261 people (2008 – 273) on the payroll of which 103 are Presbyters (2008 – 102) and 158 Parish employees (2008 – 135).

Stipends and salaries are paid monthly to Presbyters and lay workers on the 10th of the month.

There is a fortnightly service for lay workers who are not paid on the monthly cycle.

In the last quarter of 2008 a survey was conducted by Board staff to gather user views on the service provided by Connexional Payroll. Most users (both employees being paid and the employers) views were that the service provided was very good and a vast majority were happy with the level of service and reporting. Where surveys asked for change and if the change could be accommodated, it was done.

During 2010 the payroll software being used by the Board will change to allow the Board to expand its free payroll service. This will be a major undertaking during 2010 but will place the Board in a position to offer a more efficient service to a wider range of church based entities.

The Board will be asking Conference 2009 to resolve the following:

"That all Methodist stipendiary presbyters who are engaged within a parish or synod setting and whose name appears on the stationing sheet are to be paid through the Connexional Payroll system from 1 February 2010."

The Board is also able to provide standard forms of employment agreements and help on the process to recruitment and other human resource issues that may arise.

REMOVAL FUND

The Board of Administration was able to hold the removal levy at \$14 per member for the 2009 financial year. The levy is based on the membership numbers provided in the annual statistical returns. During the year ended 30 June 2009, the fund was responsible for 24 moves at a total cost of \$83,839. There were four extra moves and an increase of \$32,162 in the total cost of the moves when compared to the previous financial year.

METHODIST CONNEXIONAL PROPERTY COMMITTEE

The Methodist Connexional Property Committee oversees the property and insurance functions of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

The members of the Methodist Connexional Property Committee are appointed by the Board of Administration of the Methodist Church of New Zealand. Appointees for the 2009 year (and continuing) were: Duncan Mangels (Chair), David Ayers, David Bush, Don Eade, Janet Chambers, Jill van de Geer, Michael Greer and Peter Moss.

AllChurches Bureau

The Methodist Connexional Property Committee is the Methodist Church of New Zealand's representative on the Interdenominational AllChurches Bureau. This year the Bureau has been involved with its normal review of the insurance market together with research and investigation into a number of commercial compliance issues that impact on the Churches.

In addition the Bureau has developed and published an information leaflet on earthquake strengthening and the obligation on property owners to bring properties up to earthquake code compliance. A copy of the information leaflet can be found on the Methodist Church of New Zealand website (<u>www.methodist.org.nz</u>). The bureau is also working on a position paper with regard to Historic Places Trust and Local Authority listings of Church property and the practical and financial impacts on the Churches.

Insurance Fund

The year to 30 April 2009 continued with a very satisfactory run of results for the Fund stretching back over the past several years.

The Fund has kept insurance premiums unchanged for the past six years and over the nine years to April 2009 premiums charged to the Church have only increased by 16% although insurance rates internationally have moved significantly during that period and the Cost of Living index has increased by 30%.

The Insurance Fund has been able to maintain premium rates at a consistent and competitive level through refining the way in which the Church's insurances are arranged so that the Insurance Fund is able to take a judicious and acceptable level of self insurance which leaves the Insurance Company to deal with only quite major losses.

Happily the Church has not faced an insurance loss involving its insurer since 2003/2004.

The excellent claims record experienced by the Church, both in its relationship with its insurers and within its own self insurance programme, has largely been occasioned by the quality of the stewardship of the Church's property within the Parishes.

The Insurance Fund has also been able to provide for the annual premiums to be paid quarterly without any additional Funding costs and the Fund also meets the cost of the Methodist Church of New Zealand liability covers as part of the overhead cost of the Insurance Fund.

Premium Rebate

Each year the Fund makes provision for an expected level of claims and overhead costs, and over the past few years this amount has not been fully spent.

The Insurance Fund has looked to return the surplus in two ways:

- 1. By the 75% subsidy towards the cost of building replacement insurance valuations.
- 2. By the payment to Parishes and other insured groups of an amount equivalent to two months premium which was forwarded in April 2009.

2009/2010 Renewal

The Insurance Fund can report that the premium rate charged to the Church for the 2009/2010 insurance year continues unchanged apart from a slight increase in the Fire Service Levy following a change in the rates announced by Government.

The rates charged to the Insurance Fund by the Church's insurers did increase slightly but the Fund believes that so long as the operating and claims experience of the Insurance Fund does not alter significantly, the Fund should be able to absorb that increase for the foreseeable future.

Sums Insured

The Insurance Fund reminds the Church of the importance of ensuring that the sums insured for all properties are kept up to date. The Fund can't pay out more than the nominated sum insured in the event of a full loss, and in the event of significant under-insurance it is possible that the insurance rule of "average" could apply. This means that parishes could be considered to be carrying their own insurance for the percentage of under-insurance which means that even partial losses may not be fully settled.

It is also extremely important that up to date valuations of buildings are completed, as the arrangement with the insurers concerning meeting the costs of upgrading undamaged portions of a building to bring the entire building up to code compliance standards only applies where the building has a valuation not more than two insurance renewals old i.e. a maximum of three years.

With the Insurance Fund continuing to subsidise valuation costs to 75% of the valuer's fee there is little reason for Church buildings not to be properly insured.

For stand-alone residential properties (parsonages), the Insurance Fund prefers to record the total area (m²) of the building and this reduces the need for regular valuation reviews. In the event of a total loss the Parish will be entitled to build a similar dwelling to the same total square meterage.

Contents Values

The Insurance Fund is also concerned to see that contents schedules are maintained regularly and with appropriate replacement values. For insurance purposes, drapes and carpets are classed as contents not part of the building cover.

Contract Works Insurance

During the past two years, the Insurance Fund has been highlighting the need for any Parish undertaking building work to take out adequate contract works insurance. This insurance cover is for the value of the building work completed at any time during the building project including materials that have been brought on site ready for use in the building project. In the case of alterations or extensions, cover also includes damage to the existing building caused by the new construction work.

While some builders will be able to provide contract works insurance, the Insurance Fund strongly recommends that the contract works cover should be taken through the Insurance Fund so that the existing building and the new building are covered through the same insurer. This removes the demarcation arguments sometimes experienced when one insurance company is trying to pass the responsibility off onto another.

Contract works insurance is available through the Insurance Fund at very reasonable costs.

Liability Covers

In addition to the material damage covers, the Insurance Fund provides a full range of liability covers to protect the Methodist Church of New Zealand, and its officers and members engaged in carrying out the work of the Church.

To enable the covers to be fully effective, the Connexional Office must be advised when any Church group or official becomes aware of any matter which is possibly going to lead to a claim involving the Church. There is no cost or penalty for notification and all matters are treated in absolute confidence.

Resources

The Insurance handbook is updated annually and a copy can be obtained from the website together with copies of other insurance publications, claim forms etc. - <u>www.methodist.org.nz</u>.

As well as providing resources, the Insurance Fund is very keen to receive information from Parishes, particularly updated photographs of Church buildings, exterior and interior, memorial tablets and stones, stained glass windows etc.

These should be forwarded as .jpg files to the Insurance Fund (<u>ins@methodist.org.nz</u>) including the Insurance Risk ID number to assist in filing the photographs against the correct property.

Church Building and Loan Fund

The Church Building and Loan Fund has had quite a busy year dealing with a number of property related applications placed before it for approval, including decisions on the innovative partnership development of the Mt Eden Church Property between the Church, the Community Trust and the Auckland City Council.

The Committee has also been keen to develop policies, practices and information leaflets for the Church following the very significant changes in Church property law agreed at the 2008 Conference.

A new information leaflet (No 40) "The Church and Property" has been published and is available on the Church's website.

The new law will mean that Synods are much more involved in determining the strategy for the use of both Church property and the proceeds of sale of Church property than was previously the case, including the need for five yearly property inspections and reviews.

The Committee is encouraged to hear that several Synods are progressing well with their mission and property strategies.

The Methodist Connexional Property Committee is in discussions with the national firm used for insurance assessments to determine the possibility of the physical building inspection report being provided separately from the strategy review of the property and a report on this will be taken to Synod Property Advisory committees for consideration in due course.

The Retirement Village Act

The Church Building and Loan Fund has been actively involved in supporting the Methodist Charitable Care Facilities Trust as the Church moves to register a number of small Parish-based retirement villages and develop national industry standard Occupation Right Agreements and disclosure statements.

There is a considerable amount of work that needs to be done to convert what were perfectly well run and user friendly complexes under the old Securities Act legislation in to the new criteria required under the Retirement Villages Act. The Committee does not perceive any added value to the residents in those retirement villages but the Church has no option but to comply with the requirements of the Act.

Union Parish and Cooperating Ventures

The Committee has commissioned a Wesley Historical Society publication looking at Methodist Church of New Zealand involvement in Union Cooperating ventures from a property perspective.

Rev Norman Brookes has kindly agreed to undertake the research and write the book which should be available for publication by the end of 2009.

The Methodist Church of New Zealand commitment to Union and Cooperating parishes as a proportion of its total membership and assets was the greatest of any of the negotiating congregations and the committee looks forward to the publication of the book, the working title of which is "Methodist Properties in Uniting Churches".

Annual Accounts

The Annual Accounts of the Church Building and Loan Fund for the year to 30 June 2009 which are provided in summary form include two major differences from the previous 12 months accounts.

The first is the recognition of the capital decretion from the Growth and Income Fund investments in the Methodist Trust Association and the second is a recognition of a value for the "donation of land" representing the property upon which the Meadowlands Methodist Church is built.

The history of the Meadowlands development is long and convoluted but arose from a decision by the then Development Division to "plant" a new Church in the developing East Tamaki/Flatbush/Meadowlands area. Loan and grant Funds were provided towards the purchase of a section with the arrangement being that when the Church was finally built, ownership of the land would vest in the Church Building and Loan Fund on behalf of the Church. This was to recognise that should the property ever be sold, the Church Building and Loan Fund would have a capital sum that could be re-used for further similar new church planting opportunities. Excluding these two 'unusual' items, the cash position of the Church Building and Loan Fund was very similar to the previous year.

ARCHIVES

Period covered: 1 July 2008-30 June 2009

Highlights and achievements Christchurch - by Jo Smith

The Methodist Archives participated in an exhibition at Our City O-Tahutahi about the Barbadoes Street Cemetery in Christchurch, including lending the old metal deed box used by the Cemetery Board, which is held in the Archives along with the surviving records.

Volunteer Esther Trim completed listing of all district, parish and church records held, and a new volunteer was recruited to type these lists onto the computer.

All North Island architectural plans, were sorted, stored in plan cabinets and listed, and record of this information entered on the computer by volunteer Nadia Gush. Nadia left in July 2008 for a teaching position at the University of Waikato.

We welcomed two new volunteers to the Archives Volunteer Group; both are studying for their BA Honours in history at the University of Canterbury. Samantha Quigley started on 13 January, and Lisa van Vuuren started on 2 March.

We said farewell to Olive Thompson, who retired from Archives after 26 years on 21 April 2009. Olive began her time with us transcribing fragile marriage and baptism registers by hand, and over the years created one of our most-used indexes, that of births, deaths and marriages in the Methodist newspapers. Because of her long years of service to the Methodist Church, Olive was the person we asked when we wanted information on the geography of different parts of New Zealand, and she had an encyclopaedic knowledge of ministers throughout the Church.

On 15 January, the plot plan for the Dissenters' section of the Barbadoes Street Cemetery returned from being conserved. This fragile plan, over 140 years old, has been backed onto acid-free paper, flattened, and repaired by a conservator. It is the only surviving plan of that part of this historic cemetery.

In March, the Reading Room was rearranged to accommodate the continuation of Board meetings, and to bring out more resources for researchers, including the transcripts of registers made by Olive Thompson. We also have brought out the People and Places Information files and all New Zealand books, which have now been catalogued.

On 11 March, I spent 2 days with the volunteer archivist for the Hamilton Parish, Mrs Virginia Graham, helping her appraise some of the parish records, particularly ministers' files.

The Chairperson, in discussion with the General Secretary, suggests that the Disciplinary Code, now in use for the past 7 years, needs to be reviewed and makes the following suggestion: That the Law Revision Committee initiate a review of the Disciplinary Procedures and after consultation with Synods and Hui Poari bring a report to Conference 2010.

CONNEXIONAL TRUSTS

GENERAL PURPOSES TRUST BOARD

The Bill is currently at the Select Committee stage with public consultation completed. It now needs to be referred back to the House for its final reading. It is anticipated that the Bill will be passed into law by the time Conference commences in November. Copies of the proposed Bill can be viewed on the Church website.

SUPERNUMERARY FUND

Fund Performance

Following the difficult performance of the fund in 2008, the year ended 31 January 2009 was a more difficult one for the Fund's investments, largely as a result of the market correction that took place in response to the continued fall out of the sub-prime mortgage crisis in the United States and its flow on effects throughout the world. As a result, the value of the Fund decreased by \$1,682,895. The Fund's net investment revenue for the year was -\$658,473 compared to - \$78,350 the previous year. During the year contributions received by the Fund amounted to \$526,699 (2008: \$568,100). Non investment expenses totalled \$87,889 for the year (2008: \$91,591), and the Fund paid \$1,463,232 in benefits (2008: \$1,252,291).

The Summary Financial statements for the Year ended 31 January 2009 are provided and copies of the Financial Statements can be requested from Peter van Hout in the Connexional Office.

As a result of the investment performance to the year ended 31 January 2009 and the guarantee having been put in place, the Trustee did not grant any increases in the discretionary benefit and pension effective from 1 February 2009. The annual rate of pension remains at \$411.54, per each complete year of contribution. The Trustee will monitor the financial position of the Fund closely and continue to grant increases if and when the Fund is in a sufficiently sound financial position.

PAC DISTRIBUTION GROUP

"BUILDING PARTNERSHIPS OF HOPE"

To work with existing groups in church and community to find innovative ways of helping people through and beyond the recession

In setting the theme for 2009 Rex Nathan, Rachael Masterton, Margaret Giles, Gillian Laird, Arthur Davis, Elspeth McLean, Tevita Finau, the ex President and the General Secretary, as members of the PAC Distribution Group met in April to consider what theme it would adopt for this year's distributions. The group spent time considering what the Spirit is saying to the church in these challenging times. We talked about how to engage creatively with those who are also committed to social well being.

Out of this conversation emerged the theme "Building partnerships of Hope".

Ecclesiastes 5 critiques our modern consumer society inviting us to consider the deeper values of relationship and care.

Those who love money will never have enough. How meaningless to think that wealth brings true happiness! ¹¹ The more you have, the more people come to help you spend it. So what good is wealth—except perhaps to watch it slip through your fingers!

¹³ There is another serious problem I have seen under the sun. Hoarding riches harms the saver. ¹⁴ Money is put into risky investments that turn sour, and everything is lost. In the end, there is nothing left to pass on to one's children.

In Luke 14 Jesus speaks of open hearted generosity.

¹²⁻¹⁴Then he turned to the host. "The next time you put on a dinner, don't just invite your friends and family and rich neighbours, the kind of people who will return the favour. Invite some people who never get invited out, the misfits from the wrong side of the tracks. You'll be—and experience—a blessing. They won't be able to return the favour, but the favour will be returned—oh, how it will be returned!—at the resurrection of God's people."

Methodists have always looked beyond themselves and worked in partnership with others. The present recession will not be solved by our working in isolation. Instead we are invited to work together, to create partnerships of hopeful action. It is as we live out our faith alongside others, that we most authentically share what we believe and who we are. It is from this perspective that for 2009 the PAC gifts were distributed, and the committee looked towards assisting ventures that supported partnerships which reach across and beyond our faith communities.

We were also aware of pressures on the Methodist Church itself and recognised that many of these pressures are financial. The Church will not be able to maintain effective mission without being strong in itself so the committee was concerned to support sectors of the church and programmes in the Church that have energy, i.e. they are about keeping the Church lively, hopeful and spirit-filled.

The Committee also noted that Conference in 2008 made the following decision:

- 3. (a) A moratorium be placed on the PAC Funds from the PAC Distribution Group to outside groups other than MCNZ.
 - (b) The moratorium be placed on the PAC funds for a period of up to 3 years commencing 1/7/09.
 - (c) A priority for the PAC Funds will be the Connexional Budget for those 3 years.

In the light of the deepening recession Council of Conference had recommended that 5% be set aside for Community Groups (i.e. groups outside the church). The President approved this and referred this to the PAC Distribution Group for consideration.

Therefore 70% of the total available for distribution from the main fund was set aside for endowments to be made to a group or groups within the church or which currently make a call on the Connexional Budget, to fund important aspects of the Connexion's activities. (with a view to reducing their asking of the budget in future years) The remainder was split between groups outside the Methodist Church (5%) and groups within the church (25%).

Applications for assistance were asked to explain how the applicant intended to broadly meet the theme for this year's distribution. In particular, the group expected proposals and stories to demonstrate innovative ways of partnering with kindred groups in the community which may involve or include:

- Building capacity
- Enhancing self-esteem and skills
- Sustainability
- Refreshment
- Re-vitalising groups
- Co-operation

Such proposals may focus on social justice and express ideals of 'co-mission' with existing community partners.

The Distribution Group also reminded groups that grants will not be made to finance existing projects (except for the evolutionary development of a project already begun), salaries, or the purchase or ongoing maintenance of property. (These are seen as requiring ongoing funding and one year's PAC Distribution Group cannot commit any future group to any future grants.)

Groups on The Connexional Budget applying for Endowment Funding were asked to demonstrate how the funding would reduce the Group's asking on the Connexional Budget as well as how the work of the group meets the 2009 theme.

Funding Meeting Six applications for Endowment Funding and 54 applications for the General Fund were received. Applications for funds were in excess of \$5 million. A total of \$912,000 was available.

Each application, and this includes applications which could not be funded, tells a story of 'Good News'. The Distribution Group wanted to highlight some of these.

Boys' Brigade and Girls' Brigade ICONZ

Boy's Brigade have 're-invented themselves' with a new style programme designed in New Zealand for New Zealand young people. There are now 41 Boys groups, with as many participants as the traditional Boy's Brigade. Girl's Brigade seeing the impact is launching ICONZ for girls. The grant will be used by Boy's Brigade to train new leaders and by Girl's Brigade to implement the new programme.

Trinity College – New Directions

This will be more fully reported in the Trinity College Report. The proposal to make theological education available to a greater number of people with students operating from their home base, attending intensives, some field trips and on-line resourcing. It is intended to help with programmes for Lay Preachers, including Samoan and Tongan language.

An amount was added to the Endowment to assist with funding these changes.

The Jolly – Little Church

Named in recognition of the original benefactors, the Kerikeri Union Parish have given this church to the Patunga Marae near Kaeo to replace the original church which has literally collapsed into a pile of timber and iron. The project will enhance the relationship between the parish and the marae and is a practical expression of partnership between Pakeha and Maori. The grant will be used to fund the removal and reinstatement on the marae.

Project Refresh

"... the refreshment of leaders and the discovery of fresh expressions of church life feed each "It is my belief that the refreshment of leaders and the discovery of fresh expressions of church life feed each other. Many times we are refreshed by a possibility or a dream; our energy is rekindled by a sense of what can be. Similarly, times of refreshment often unlock our creativity; our inspiration for new things emerges from times of retreat or moments of Sabbath rest.

Therefore this strategy for ministry development involves two parallel emphases: Providing opportunities and resources that refresh presbyters and leaders, and helping local churches find fresh expressions of life and ministry.

The grant will partially fund Rev Andre le Roux to enact this vision.

Wesley Village

"South Dunedin and its associated neighbourhoods of Brockville and North Dunedin are one of the most "socially deprived" communities in the South island. It is almost impossible to describe exactly what this means for those living in these communities, but we believe it is a level of social and personal despair intolerable in New Zealand /Aotearoa.

Wesley Village will further develop the Mission's engagement with the Community.

It is hoped that the Grant will show something of the commitment of the Methodist Church to this community and city and act as a seed for further grants and funding.

Final Note

The Distribution Group also noted the growth and development of Pacifica Ministries and is aware that this is an area where the Church will need to place resources in the future to sustain and support this growth.

PACT 2086 TRUST

PACT 2086 Trust manages the lessors residual interest in the 100 year terminating lease of the property previously owned by the Prince Albert Collége Trust Board bordered by Queen, Liverpool and Turner Streets and City Road just below the Karangahape Road ridge in Auckland.

The Trust received the full 100 years rental in one lump sum in 1986 and transferred approximately \$16M to the PAC Endowment Trusts retaining the balance of \$4M in PACT 2086 Trust working towards the return of the property to the Church in 2086.

Over the 22 years since the lease was signed and the rental paid in December 1986, the capital sum retained by PACT 2086 Trust has grown to total \$17,136,611.00 as at 30 June 2009.

This in fact is a reduction in value from the 30 June 2008 total of some 9.6% and it represents the decrease in value of the Trust's long term capital assets following the very difficult investment market in 2008/2009.

The Trust has developed a diverse portfolio of long term investments with the aim of providing solid capital growth over time, and up until the current year this had been the consistent result.

As the Trust has no obligation to make any income distributions it has been able to look at investments with long time horizons and reduced liquidity. One of those investments was the development of a 300 hectare pine plantation in the Kaweka Range behind Hawkes Bay. As signalled to Conference last year the Trust has been involved in discussions with Wesley College Trust Board over the purchase of the 50% share in the Trust's dairy farm property adjoining the Wesley College campus at Paerata.

The purchase was settled in May 2009 with PACT 2086 Trust and Wesley College Trust Board being equal partners in a new joint venture charitable company known as Grafton Downs Limited.

Whilst the property is an operating dairy unit, the long term potential of the property lies in the growth of the greater Auckland conurbation and in particular the northward spread of Pukekohe to and past the existing village of Paerata.

The PACT 2086 Trust Board welcomes the opportunity of working in partnership with another Board of the Church where their community of interest will provide benefits in the longer term to the Connexion.

Board Membership

The Board of PACT 2086 Trust is made up of those people appointed each year to the Board of the New Zealand Methodist Trust Association.

During the year the Board noted the death of Mr Ron Barfoote who had served as secretary of the Prince Albert College Trust from 16 October 1962 until 23 February 1982.

INVESTMENT ADVISORY BOARD

The Investment Advisory Board is charged with providing the Methodist Church of New Zealand with a soundly based overview of the current investment market and to provide advice to the Church as to appropriate investment policies and procedures.

One of the principal activities for the Board for the year was the development of a discussion paper reviewing the Church's Guidelines for Socially Responsible Investment which were adopted in 1983 and last reviewed in 1994. The discussion document was forwarded to all Synods and other interested parties through notification on eMessenger in March 2009. As at the end of August 2009, the Investment Advisory Board had only received four responses.

The Investment Advisory Board believes there is not a sufficient response to enable it to being any formal report or recommendation to this Conference and accordingly does not propose any change to the current Guidelines at present.

Responsible Investment Association of Australasia

The Investment Advisory Board/Methodist Trust Association was the first New Zealand Church group to be admitted to membership of the Responsible Investment Association of Australasia (RIAA). The Board may seek to move to full accreditation over time. The Board has yet to establish a timeframe for accreditation.

Property Management Services

The Investment Advisory Board provides property management services to the Church mostly through the Board of Administration's Auckland office.

With the sale of Methodist Mission Northern's Queen Street property last year, the Investment Advisory Board and Methodist Mission Northern looked at whether there was a sufficient community of interest to establish a joint property group to provide commercial property services to the Church through the continuation of the services provided by the Investment Advisory Board, the Methodist Trust Association and the Mission's own requirements.

The combined property group was seen as being able to employ a larger team with wider property experience than either the Mission or the Investment Advisory Board would warrant individually, and job descriptions were developed for a Senior Property Manager and a Property Officer or Facilities Manager and these positions were advertised in May 2009.

This meant that the existing positions maintained by the Investment Advisory Board and the Mission were each disestablished.

After a wide ranging and extensive recruitment search, new staff were employed from August 2009 and Messrs Pim Rademakers and Gary Bottema are establishing themselves in their roles as Group Property Manager and Group Property Officer respectively, based out of the Mission's offices in Central Auckland.

Property services provided by the Investment Advisory Board to its clients will not change in scope or nature although it is anticipated that having a wider pool of expertise to call on will mean that some of the limitations of a sole charge position will be overcome.

One of the outcomes of the new property group and the recruitment of new staff was the redundancy of the existing Mission and Investment Advisory Board staff members and the Investment Advisory Board acknowledges the many years of service of its Auckland Property August 2009.

Board Membership

During the year, the Board has received resignations from Mr John Chittenden and Mrs Kay Kendall. The Board acknowledges the wise counsel and contribution to debate that both John and Kay brought to Board discussions, and particularly the way they brought well researched arguments in support of their positions.

The Board does not bring any new recommendations for membership to Conference.

At the beginning of 2009 the Board was saddened to record the death of former member Vince Duffy. Vince was a member of the Board up until his retirement in 2007.

Staff

December 2008 brought the retirement of Mrs Noelene Allen who had been Personal Assistant to the Executive Officer since 1985. Noelene was hosted at the December 2008 Board Meeting of the Methodist Trust Association where the Board made a presentation to her and noted the very significant contribution that Noelene had made to the success of the Association and its regular contact with depositors through distribution letters and the Annual Reports during her many years in the role. The Association wishes Noelene a long and happy retirement.

The Association notes that Mrs Jude Anderson has taken over the role of PA to the Executive Officer and appreciates the way that she has quickly come to grips with the demands of the position.

NEW ZEALAND METHODIST TRUST ASSOCIATION

The New Zealand Methodist Trust Association has published a full annual report to Depositors which has been distributed to all Parishes and Church organisations and copies are available from the Connexional Office or on line www.methodist.org.nz.

This report to Conference is taken from that Annual Report but excludes the detailed listing of individual share and property holdings which is included in the Annual Report to Depositors.

Last year's report commented on the end of the "golden weather" and the turbulence that was affecting world financial markets.

That turbulence developed to an even greater extent marked in New Zealand by the freezing of repayments for a number of "quality" investment funds and repayment moratoriums or collapses for a further number of New Zealand finance houses. Overseas, the turbulence claimed the nearly 130 year old finance house of Lehman Brothers and the effective nationalisation of many of the main trading banks in Great Britain and the United States of America as government intervention through sovereign guarantees and the introduction of taxpayer funded capital has meant a significant re-writing of the ownership and control structures of many long established financial and insurance institutions.

The Association signalled to depositors during last year, and in particular in discussions at Conference 2008, that the Growth and Income Fund, after many years of positive returns, would be unlikely to escape the 2009 year without a capital decretion and this was confirmed with the 2009 results.

The Association also suffered the failure of two debentures with the collapse of the Credit Sails issue, an AA rated, managed investment product and Babcock and Brown Infrastructure Ltd and this impacted on the June 2009 income distributions as the loss of the capital was absorbed in the income returns for the quarter.


The impact of that loss is not considered to have any ramifications for the future distribution returns of the Association and, to the best of the Association's knowledge, the capital for its remaining investments continues to be securely invested. The Credit Sails and Babcock investments represented less than 1.00% of the Association's fixed interest investments.

During the year, funds entrusted to the Association for investment rose to total \$178,587,461, an increase of 15% on the June 2008 total.

The Association is mindful of the significant responsibility entrusted to it by the Church and accordingly maintains a varied and diverse spread of investments over the spectrum of asset classes and across a wide range of individual issuers to ensure that the Association benefits from

strength in a particular sector but also any downturn or loss is limited in its application.

The world financial markets for the year to 30 June 2009 showed significant decreases in absolute value with market lows in the current cycle being reached in February/March 2009 but also huge swings in value on a day by day basis which is a sign of significant market instability and uncertainty.



While equity markets are expected to move and gains and losses in value occur from time to time as differing events lead to advances and reversals in market value, the past two years have shown that fixed interest markets or debt markets at times of extremis can also deliver nasty shocks to investors who believed that they were investing in straight-forward fixed interest type investments with a regular and consistent income stream and protection of capital.

New Zealand Market


The New Zealand Market endured a difficult year to June 2009 marked in particular by the very significant drop in the dairy commodity market which was exacerbated by the movement in the exchange rates referred to previously, and resulted in a closing payment for 2009/2010 predicted to be down by nearly one quarter over the 2007/2008 year.

As the New Zealand economy has matched the world in showing signs of nascent recovery, unemployment levels have started to stabilise although it is still anticipated that unemployment itself will not peak for another six to nine months and to the concern of the Reserve Bank, the residential property market appears to be re-gathering strength.

The Reserve Bank has maintained a record low Official Cash Rate of 2.5% since April 2009 and the latest pronouncement in September 2009 suggests that the Reserve Bank sees no likelihood of any increase in the Official Cash Rate until well into 2010 at the earliest.

New Zealand Methodist Trust Association Investment Funds


Leaving aside for the moment the loss of the Credit Sails and Babcock and Brown investments referred to previously, the Association's funds had a satisfactory year. Income distributions for the year were at a consistent and satisfactory rate while the June distributions were significantly reduced to account for the capital loss. This was a one quarter event only and the underlying distribution continued the very satisfactory levels of returns available.



Income Funds

Income distribution over all three funds continues to be at a satisfactory level. As mentioned previously the reduced distribution in the June 2009 quarter was a single event that should not have any ongoing impact or repercussions for future distribution rates.

The distribution returns are benchmarked against the 90 bill rate and the ten year government stock rate and because of the anomaly impacting on 30 June 2009 return, the return for the Funds for the year to 30 June 2099 rather than returns for the quarter have been used for the purposes of long term comparison.




The Association expects distributions from the Income Funds to continue in line with 2009 average for the foreseeable future with a slight trend down as existing investments mature and are reinvested at prevailing rates.

The decision 18 months ago to significantly change the mix of investments held by the Income Funds away from cash/short dated securities to longer term debentures has locked in the benefit of higher returns for Income Fund depositors for the next several quarters at least.

Growth and Income Fund

Income distributions have continued to be reasonable overall for the Growth and Income Fund although company dividend payments have been under some pressure as companies have reacted to the decline in business activity that has been almost universal over the past two years.


As signalled to Church Conference 2008 and reported to depositors in the Distribution newsletters, the Association did not expect to withstand the marked deterioration in world capital markets with the revaluation of assets for the Growth and Income Fund as at 30 June 2009 and this proved to be the case with a reduction in capital values of 11.6% and a net return overall (income and capital) of -7.55%.




This is the first negative return for the Growth and Income Fund since 1992.

Over the past three years the Growth and Income Fund has returned an average of 3.2% per annum, 10.8% per annum over the past five years and 11.2% over the past ten years.

Cumulatively the return over the past ten years has been 112% with a \$1,000 invested in 1999 including the reinvestment of all income distributions standing at \$2,119.26 on 30 June 2009.



The Association continues to benchmark its performance against a survey of investment funds carried out by Melville Jessup Weaver, Actuaries, and the results of the review are set out in the accompanying graph.



Equity Fund

The movement in the Equity Fund has largely mirrored the movement in the NZSX50 for the year.

Whilst the New Zealand market has suffered in line with international markets, it has also shown increasing resilience since the end of the March quarter and in fact the three months to 30 June 2009 did show a positive return in respect of both the NZSX50 (+13%) and the Equity Fund (+11%). The return for the Fund over the year to June 2009 was -16.13% while the Index was down 12.49%.

Socially Responsible Investment

During the financial year to 30 June 2009, the Methodist Trust Association worked with the Investment Advisory Board to produce a discussion document for the Church looking again at the Church's position on Socially Responsible Investment. The Church last reviewed its guidelines on Socially Responsible Investment in 1994 and the Investment Advisory Board considered that a review was appropriate.

It would appear that the Church as a whole is quite satisfied with the existing guidelines for Socially Responsible Investment as the discussion document has evoked only four responses and the Association understands the Investment Advisory Board will be reporting to Conference 2009 that it sees no mandate to change or update the existing guidelines.

The Association reported in the 2008 reports that, through the Investment Advisory Board, it was a member of the Responsible Investment Association of Australasia. The Board may move to full accreditation over time although a definitive time table has yet to be agreed.

Annual Accounts

Total funds invested through the Association by the Methodist Church of New Zealand totalled \$178,587,461 as at 30 June 2009 (plus 15%). Income Fund investments totalled \$113,137, 173 (+35%) and Growth and Income Equity Funds (\$65,450,288) (-9%). The decrease in Growth and Income Fund and Equity Fund deposits was almost entirely the result of the capital decretion allocated at 30 June 2009.

Income distribution increased by \$546, 871 to \$9,046,726 (+ 6.5%).

Board Membership

THE ROBERT GIBSON METHODIST TRUST

Section A

Twelve months ago Fonterra set the payout at \$7-00 per Kg of milk solids. As the season progressed the payout figure was lowered until Fonterra settled at a level of \$5-20 per kg milk solids. The R.G.M.T. was looking at a significant drop in income. This was off-set however by an increase in production of 30,000 kg of MS over the previous season.

The Rimu and Marie Farms both had record production figures and even accounting for the record production of 243,306 Kg/MS for the Trust, the income was \$250,000 below the budget figure.

Fonterra has announced a payout of \$4-55 per Kg/MS for the 2009-2010 season. Caution and careful management will be required to preserve the strength of R.G.M.T. until the global economy improves.

The Taranaki Regional Council has set a date of 2015 for all farms to be compliant with Riparian Planting and the fencing of all streams and waterways.

WESLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY (NZ) Te Roopu Hitori o Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa

SECTION A – Information and Reporting Back

Acknowledging that history not only throws light upon the past, but also upon the present and the future, the Wesley Historical Society (NZ), has continued to address the task of researching, recording, interpreting, and sharing the history of Methodism in Aotearoa/New Zealand and the South Pacific through 2008-09.

With sadness we recorded the deaths of members Sister Rona Collins, Gordon Dey, Lester Holdaway, the Rev. Bob Widdup and Dave Roberts, the latter a long-term member who was secretary of the Society from 1982 – 1993. Dave wrote a very useful history of the WHS in *The First Sixty Years*, published in 1992 as Proceeding no. 59. He generously contributed his abilities and his time to the Society and to the work of Methodist Archives in Auckland. In 1999, together with Rev. Doug Burt, he travelled New Zealand photographing and recording the church buildings that had featured in William Morley's *The History of Methodism in New Zealand* a century earlier.

In November, during Methodist Conference 2008, the Society held its Annual General Meeting at Bader Drive Church, Mangere. Highlights of the meeting included the recognition of the inaugural Gilmore Smith Scholar, Lynne McDonald and her introduction to member Margaret Ziegler, the eldest daughter of the Rev. Les Gilmore. We were also honoured to have a presentation to the Society of a pre-launch, signed copy of the Rev. Dr Jim Stuart's new book *The John Wesley Code: Finding a Faith that Matters.* As Barry Neal had made known his intention to retire as secretary in the coming year, opportunity was taken to thank him for his decade of stalwart and dedicated work in that role.

Following the AGM and a dinner graciously hosted by members of the Bader Drive Church, we were privileged to have a panel discussion on the role and history of Friendship House, Manukau City. Rev. Barry Jones, who was part of the original planning group, Innes Clarke long-time Methodist member of the management team and the Rev. Vicki Sykes who is the current Administrator, each shared their involvement in the project in a discussion. This was chaired by Eric Laurenson who had acted as the Methodist architectural representative when the building was being planned. It was clear that Friendship House is still fulfilling the vision of the ecumenical team who believed, at the time, that this was the only realistic way in which the churches could be represented in this rapidly expanding area of Auckland. It also offers a model for the future.

During the year the Society has:

- Appointed a new secretary, Margaret Ziegler, whose father, the Rev. Les. Gilmore, held the
 office of secretary from 1947 until his untimely death in 1982.
- Awarded the Gilmore Smith Scholarship to Lynne McDonald for a second year.
- Published the 2008 WHS Journal under the editorship of the Rev. Dr Terry Wall. This
 publication paid tribute to the Rev. Jack Penman, member, contributor of articles, and latterly,

proof-reader. The Journal also included a variety of articles submitted by members.

- At the request of the Methodist Connexional Property Committee and the WHS, the Rev. Norman Brookes has carried out research into Methodist properties that have become part of Union and Co-operative Ventures throughout New Zealand. It is hoped that this will eventually lead to a publication that will be a useful historical resource for the Methodist Church and its ecumenical partners.
- Contributed advice and support to researchers studying Methodist related topics.
- Engaged in ongoing discussions with various groups desirous of forwarding projects that are linked with the history of the Methodist Church in New Zealand.
- Re-negotiated with the Auckland Art Gallery the curating of two 1823 water-colour paintings of 'George (Te Ara)' by Samuel Leigh, and 'The New Zealand King Tabooha (Te Puhi)' by 'unknown artist'. They have already been on loan to the Gallery for a quarter-century. Their current value for insurance purposes is \$8000.
- Engaged editor Jade Reidy to prepare Susan Thompson's thesis for publication.

My warmest appreciation is expressed to the members of the Executive, both former and present Secretaries, the Publications Committee under Convenor Susan Thompson, Editor Terry Wall, Treasurer Ruth Blundell, Membership Secretary Graeme White, and Minute Secretary Shona Michie. Honoured Members have continued to make invaluable contributions to the work of the Society and I would personally want to thank them as well as all those who have supported the WHS during this year. We are also grateful to regional contact members, Ron Malpass, Gary Clover and Alec Utting for their efforts to publicise the work of the WHS.

The Society would also wish to pay a special tribute to Honoured Member Allan Davidson on the occasion of his retirement from 27 years of ministry at St John's College, Auckland. The Society deeply appreciates the knowledge, insights and wisdom that Allan has brought to the work of the WHS, both as a longstanding and faithful member of the executive, and more recently as an Honoured Member. We thank him for all that he has contributed so generously in an extraordinarily full and busy life, and offer him best wishes for his retirement.

As 2009 is the 50th anniversary of the ordination of Dame Phyllis Guthardt, the Society joins with the Methodist Church in honouring this loved and respected presbyter who has filled such a significant role within both church and community. In 1959 she became the first woman to be ordained as a minister in any denomination in New Zealand; in 1985 she was the first woman President of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

SECTION B – Strategic Planning

- The Gilmore Smith Memorial Scholarship will be offered annually for postgraduate work undertaken in historical research related to Methodist history in New Zealand and the South Pacific, which may result in publication by the Society.
- Rev. Dr Susan Thompson's award-winning thesis, *Knowledge and Vital Piety* will be published in 2010, the Society's 80th anniversary.
- The Society's 2009 Journal and a Proceeding featuring the contribution Jim Stuart has made to Methodism in New Zealand will be published.
- The Society will continue discussion with individuals and groups in ongoing research projects that relate to the Society's objectives.
- The Society engages in continuing dialogue with Methodist Archives.
- The Society's web-page is regularly updated.

TRAVEL AND STUDY COMMITTEE

The Travel and Study Committee has continued to fund opportunities for continuing education in the Life of The Methodist Church of New Zealand Te Háhi Weteriana o Aotearoa.

The Committee has received this year a further generous capital funding for its work from the PAC Distribution Group; this is invested in an Endowment account. The committee continued to receive from the Connexional budget a grant of \$20,000 in 2009.

We have again received a number of applications during the year; many have been approved but some have had to be declined. Some applications are fully funded and others are partially funded. We are occasionally asked why an application is declined, and while the Committees decision is final, and no correspondence is entered into; here are some general observations.

- The Travel and Study application form has not been completed fully or the required accompanying documentation has not been received. Late applications are not considered or may be referred to the next meeting. All documentation must be received by the secretary on the advertised dates.
- The committee does not have available funds to support an application, or, given the limited budget of Travel and Study the application is unrealistic.
- The application is outside the terms of reference for the committee, that is: continuing education that will directly benefit the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

What is the Committee?

- A Standing Committee of Conference who provide funding for people to further their education which will benefit MCNZ.
- Resources are shared with Te Taha Maori the committee works closely with our bi cultural partner.
- The committee funds prescribed types of continuing education for Lay people of the Methodist Church of New Zealand; and Co- operating ventures of which MCNZ is a partner, and for ordained ministry of MCNZ.
- The committee expects a high standard both in applications and reporting back to the committee.
- The committee ensures that all applications are fairly considered at the regular meetings i.e. 4 a year.
- The committee appreciates indication from people in advance of completed applications as this greatly assists with budgeting for the upcoming year.

What is the Committee not?

- The committee is not a general tertiary education fund.
- There are specific objectives established by Conference and therefore to which the committee must abide.
- The committee is not able to receive and consider applications between the designated 4 meetings.

The committee appreciate applications especially those that are creative and innovative.

As you explore study opportunities for your Ministry whether ordained or lay, the committee invites you to consider an application to this committee. This could encourage you your local congregation and Synod and the Church as a whole.

Grants were distributed in the year July 2008 - July 2009 were \$25,000.00.

This is a departure from applicable Financial Reporting Standard No. 3 (FRS-3), which requires an independent valuation at fair value on a basis appropriate for financial reporting. A rating valuation may not have been undertaken on a basis appropriate for financial reporting. The Fund has not had the rating valuation reviewed to ascertain the appropriateness of the basis utilized and therefore the Fund has not calculated the financial effect of this departure from the applicable financial reporting standard.

Non depreciation of buildings

The Fund has not provided for depreciation on buildings which are not investment properties. This is a departure from applicable Financial Reporting Standard No. 3 (FRS-3), which requires that depreciation be charged as an expense in the statement of financial performance so as to allocate the cost of buildings over their economic lives. The Fund has not calculated the financial effect of this departure from the applicable financial reporting standard.

We have not been able to assess the appropriateness of the carrying amounts of the buildings and therefore we have not been able to reliably estimate the effect of these departures.

In our opinion, except for the effect of the departures from applicable Financial Reporting Standard No. 3 noted above, the financial report on pages 1 to 7 fairly presents the financial position of the Methodist Church Building and Loan Fund as at 30 June 2009 and its financial performance for the year ended on that date in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand.



FINANCIAL REVIEW Continuation from page D4

The Connexional Financial Review Committee met on 24 September 2009 to review the financial statements of the different entities within the Church.

The Committee changed its reporting style this year so that the reviews of parishes and synods were done on an exception reporting basis looking at key indicators. This process helped reduce the time taken to do its work and allowed the Committee to focus on those entities that may require further help in the following 12 months. This exception reporting will be refined for next year.

The Committee has made some recommendations for the staff of the Board of Administration to follow up in future years. Any concerns the Committee has in relation to individual entities will be followed up by the staff of the Board of Administration and the entity concerned.

The Committee recommends that the Board of Administration, in consultation with the wider Church, tender the provision of valuation services to one organisation so that property valuations are undertaken on a consistent basis throughout the Church.

The Committee would recommend that a more formal system is put in place to provide on-going training for existing and new parish treasurers.

Enabling Powers for the Committee

The Committee has been aware that many external entities have established, as part of good business practice, an audit committee. Both the Institute of Directors and the New Zealand Institute of Chartered Accountants recommend that an audit committee be established for large entities. The principal function of an audit committee is to *"assist the board in producing accurate financial statements in compliance with all applicable legal requirements and accounting standards."* It is also not uncommon to extend the role of the audit committee to include risk management. In a commercial entity an audit committee reports directly to the Board of the company rather than the Chief Executive Officer.

Board of Administration staff have reviewed a number of terms of reference for audit committees as well as taken into account the "Principles of Best Practice for New Zealand Directors" from the Institute of Directors and drafted Terms of Reference for the Connexional Financial Review Committee. The Terms of Reference are attached and we recommend to Conference that they are adopted.

Connexional Financial Review Committee

This proposal strengthens the role of the review committee and makes it directly responsible to Conference. This picks up the concern of the auditor of the Board of Administration that the Church needs a more robust risk management policy and it creates a review group, which is responsible to the Church as a whole.

In bringing this proposal, the Board would like to think that Conference might be willing to adopt the report and the committee be instituted in the suggested form in 2010. The Board is aware however that the proposal has not been to Synods and Hui Poari and therefore recognises that final approval may not be possible until Conference 2010.

CONNEXIONAL FINANCIAL REVIEW COMMITTEE – TERMS OF REFERENCE

Purpose of Committee

The primary purpose of the Connexional Financial Review Committee ("the Committee") is to assist the Conference:

- a) in fulfilling its responsibilities relating to the management systems, accounting and reporting practices of each entity that reports to the Conference;
- b) to report to the Conference on the continued financially viability or otherwise of entities that report to the Conference.

The principal roles of the Committee are:

 a) to assist the Conference in fulfilling its responsibilities relating to financial reporting within the Laws and Regulations of the Church, any Act of Parliament or Constitution of any Methodist entity;

- b) financial reporting practices, and the internal controls, compliance;
- c) financial risk management practices of the Church;
- d) to serve as an independent and objective party to review the financial information presented by Methodist entities reporting to the Conference;
- e) to oversee and appraise the audits conducted by both internal audit and external auditors;
- f) to maintain, by scheduling regular meetings open lines of communication between the Conference, internal audit, external auditors and the management teams of Methodist entities, to exchange views and information, as well as confirm their respective authorities and responsibilities.

Constitution

The Committee is a committee of the Conference.

The Committee has the authority to seek any information it requires from any officer or employee of the Methodist Church and from any adviser or consultant to the Church, and is authorised to take such independent professional advice as it considers necessary.

Notwithstanding the existence of the Committee, any internal audit and any external auditor have direct access to the Committee Chair if required.

Unless otherwise directed by the Conference, or identified in these Terms of Reference, the Committee will have no executive powers in regard to its findings and recommendations.

The Committee will make recommendations to the Conference for its approval.

Membership of the Committee

The Committee will be appointed by the Conference from amongst the membership of the Church or as nominated by the President and will consist of not more than five persons.

A quorum will be three members of the Committee.

The Committee's Chair (the Chair) will be appointed by the Conference from the membership of the Committee that have been appointed.

The membership of the Committee will be a representation of the different sections of the Church.

At least three members will have an accounting or financial background.

The President and General Secretary are ex officio members of the Committee.

The composition of the Committee will be considered annually by the Conference.

Meetings

The Committee will meet not less than two times a year. The Committee will hold such additional meetings as the Chair will decide in order to fulfil its duties. Any member of the Committee, the President, the General Secretary, an internal or an external auditor may request a meeting at any time if they consider it necessary.

The General Secretary will give reasonable notice of the meetings to all members of the Committee as is necessary to conduct the business of the meeting.

Any internal or external auditor may be asked to attend a meeting if in the opinion of the Chairperson the presence of the auditor would make a contribution to the business being conducted at the meeting. A meeting will be held at least annually with external auditors selected by the Committee without management being present.

The Chairperson, Senior Management of any Methodist entity that reports to the Conference will attend meetings as required by invitation of the Committee.

The General Secretary will be the Secretary of the Committee.

Minutes of all meetings shall be sent to Committee members and any other board chairperson or other person as the Committee so decides.

An annual work plan for external audit (and where appropriate internal audit) will be agreed by each Methodist entity that reports to the Conference and which is required by the Laws and Regulations of the Church to have an audit and a copy of that annual work plan will be forwarded to the Committee as soon as practicable.

Reporting

The Chair will report to the Conference on the outcomes of Committee meetings.

The General Secretary will circulate all Committee papers and minutes of the meetings to all members of the Committee.

The General Secretary will be responsible for drawing to the Committee's immediate attention:

- any material matters which relate to the financial condition of any Methodist entity that reports to the Conference;
- any material breakdowns in internal controls that are reported to the General Secretary;
- any material events of fraud or malpractice that come to the attention of the General Secretary;
- any significant legislative non-compliance.

Responsibilities

The Committee is responsible for:

- Ensuring that processes are in place and the monitoring of those processes so that the Committee is properly and regularly informed and updated on Church financial matters;
- Reviewing the financial reports, audit report and business issues reports (or other reports supplied by an external auditor in their capacity as an auditor) and advising the Conference whether they comply with the appropriate laws and regulations and where is non compliance detailing the name of the entity that does not comply and for what reason;
- Recommending (in conjunction with the President and General Secretary) the appointment and removal of any external auditor;
- Meeting regularly to monitor and review the external and internal auditing practices;
- Having direct communication with and unrestricted access to any external auditor and any internal auditors or accountants;
- Unless extended by the Committee, ensuring that the external auditor or lead audit partner within a firm is changed at least every five years;
- Surveillance of the broader aspects of responsible corporate governance including the Church's general ethical and legal conduct;
- Any other responsibilities as requested by the Conference.

The Committee would use the existing Budget Allocation for the Financial Review Committee.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. That Conference approves the establishment of the Connexional Financial Review Committee.
- 3. The members of the Connexional Financial Review Committee for 2010 be:

JAMES AND MARTHA TROUNSON BENEVOLENT FUND

The James and Martha Trounson Benevolent Fund was created in 1928 following the receipt of a gift of £14,000 from James Trounson. It is incorporated under the Charitable Trust Act 1957.

The Deed establishing the fund proscribes that the Trustees shall reside in Auckland City, and that the maximum grant is £100 (\$200).

The proposal is to vary these conditions under clause 11 of the Deed which allows: "the Trustees may make such regulations from time to time as to the administration of the Fund for the purposes there of as they shall deem necessary or expedient. Such regulations shall not take effect until approved by Conference.

It is proposed that:

- 1. That the clauses restricting the residency of Trustees to the city of Auckland be removed to enable any member of the Methodist Church to be appointed by Conference to be a Trustee.
- 2. That the maximum grant allowable be increased to \$500 in any one year.

This will allow for the fund to be administered in locations other than Auckland, and in revising the maximum grant, acknowledge the effect of inflation on the value of the available grants. These changes will not affect the original purposes of the Benevolent Fund.

The trust deed also needs to be varied to allow for a 30 June balance date and a wind-up clause needs to be added to allow for Charities Act Registration.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. That the Trust Deed be revised to enable Trustees to be members of the Methodist Church resident anywhere in New Zealand by removing the words "resident in the City of Auckland" from clause 5, and removing the words "shall remove to a distance from the City of Auckland" and "removing from aforesaid" from clause 7 and "removal from Auckland" from clause 17.
- 3. That no grant or financial assistance exceeding \$500 shall be made by the Trustees in any one period of twelve months to any one person eligible for a grant of financial assistance.
- 4. That clause 12 be changed "A duly audited statement of the receipts and payments for the year ending on the 30th day of June.....".
- 5. New clause 18. If the James and Martha Trounson Benevolent Fund is wound up, its assets will be transferred to the General Purposes Trust for the general charitable purpose of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.
- 6. That the Trustees for 2010 be: Mary West (Convenor), Catherine Dickie, Marcia Hardy and Gwen Kentish.

FLEET PURCHASE OF VEHICLES

Conference 2008 asked the Board of Administration to investigate the fleet purchase of vehicles and the associated costs and benefits.

It was quickly realised that the number of vehicle purchases by the church in any one year is too small to gain the advantage of a major fleet purchase.

Three possibilities were explored.

- 1. Discount negotiated on a case by case basis.
- 2. The Government Stores Board.
- 3. Diocesan Car Fund Trust.

1. Discount on case by case

The Board of Administration has a long time relationship with a car dealer in Christchurch and recently negotiated a 12.5% discount on a new car purchase. This may well be possible in other centres reflecting both the relationship with a vehicle dealer and recognition of the work of the church.

2. Government Stores Board

This is the group which issues the Caltex Cards, which are available to members of the church. A one off payable, to Government Stores Board and competitive pricing on new cars is available.

3. Diocesan Car Fund Trust

This has been operated by the Wellington Catholic Diocese for 25 years. It is available to long-term church employees, claiming savings of up to 18% on a new car. There is also a scheme where new or near-new vehicles can be leased. The Lower North Island Synod is currently using this scheme. See detail on <u>www.carfund.org.nz</u>.

Summary

While the Methodist Church is too small to have its own scheme, there are good options available for those seeking to purchase a vehicle for church use. The Diocesan Car Fund Trust in particular provides a good service for church workers.

Suggested Decision:

1. The report be received.

MEDICAL INSURANCE

Conference 2008 asked "that a reimbursing subsidy for Medical/Health Insurance be made available to all Presbyters at a level to be set annually by the Board of Administration.

In seeking advice from medical insurers, it has become apparent that a more effective option than a reimbursing allowance, would be for the Church to make medical insurance available as part of the stipend package. Such a proposal would enable pre-existing conditions to be covered, remove any need for medical questions and provide premiums at an age weighted average. Anyone who did not want medical insurance could opt out, but would not receive the cash value in lieu.

There are also tax advantages available to charities, which make this a more cost effective option.

The Board is not yet ready to send the final proposal to Presbyters, Deacons and Lay Workers, but intends to do so in conjunction with the Stipends Committee with a potential start date of 1 July 2010.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. That Conference encourages the Board of Administration to continue its work on Medical/Health Insurance.

FUTURE PROVISION FOR RETIREMENT SAVINGS

Based upon independent advice Conference 2008 decided that the Supernumerary Fund would be closed to new members from 1 February 2010. The Board of Administration has spent some time discussing what should be put into place for presbyters from 1 February 2010.

The basic assumptions underpinning the decisions of the Board were as follows:

- The cost of a new 'bundle' of benefits for retirement should not exceed what parishes are currently paying into the Supernumerary Fund (10% of stipend).
- The 'bundle' of benefits to be provided should include, if possible, all those things that the current trust deed of the Supernumerary Fund provides (i.e. contributions into a savings scheme, death in service benefit and hardship payments).
- Should only apply to people who have not attained the age of eligibility to National Superannuation.

These basic assumptions were used to ensure, as far as possible, that the total financial 'package' of benefits were kept the same as or similar to existing presbyters (stipend plus allowances plus any applicable housing allowances plus contributions to retirement savings). It may mean that the 'mix' of benefits available to existing and new presbyters will be different but the value will be similar.

Three benefits were followed up and research done:

- KiwiSaver schemes.
- Insurance for Death in Service.
- Medical Insurance (as a new benefit but subject to funding within the 10% parish contribution).

In obtaining initial pricing for both the death in service and medical schemes, there was an assumption that the whole group of members (both existing presbyters and new presbyters) would be placed into each of these schemes. The pricing received reflected that situation. While the Board has looked at re-insuring the death benefit risk of the Supernumerary Fund, at this time the Death in Service policies will only apply to those who are not members of the Superannuation Fund.

Current members of the Supernumerary Fund, will still be required to make contributions into the fund and therefore the current church contributions for those members would also go into the fund.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. That Conference agrees that for Presbyters/Deacons who commence a first stationed appointment after 31 January 2010, the 10% of stipend currently paid to the Supernumerary Fund will be apportioned between KiwiSaver and death in service/disability insurance, on the understanding that no part of these funds may be paid to the Presbyter/Deacon as a cash benefit, and any unspent funds will be paid into the Supernumerary Fund.

The Board of Administration decided that medical insurance cover is a separate issue and should be arranged as a separate benefit for presbyters. Further, the Board of Administration decided that there would be no hardship allowances available in the future, for Presbyters who are not part of the Supernumerary Fund.

Current Payments into Methodist Supernumerary Fund

The presbyter contribution is currently 7.5% of basic stipend while the Church makes a 10% contribution. As at the date of this report the basic stipend is \$41,744 per annum.

A full member of the fund makes an annual contribution of \$3,131, while a fifty percent member makes an annual contribution is \$1,566. A nominal member makes no personal contributions.

The gross church contribution (including Employer Supernumerary Contribution Tax (ESCT)) for a full member is \$4,174.40, while a fifty percent member church contribution is \$2,087.20. Nominal member church contributions are \$834.88 (2%).

KiwiSaver

All new presbyters would be asked to join KiwiSaver and would need to select a fund manager. The Board of Administration recognises that people coming into Ministry may already be a KiwiSaver member or may choose not to become a member.

The Board of Administration is recommending and has decided that "contributions from the presbyters stipend would be a personal choice and not a compulsory deduction." That is to say, presbyters entering ministry from 1 February 2010 will not be required to join any KiwiSaver scheme. It should be noted that:

If a presbyter chooses to join KiwiSaver, the Church would be required to pay a 2% minimum contribution on behalf of each presbyter into the fund.

Based upon the current stipend, the presbyter contributions and employer contributions would be as follows:

Any church contributions over 2% would attract ESCT at the appropriate rates of 21% or 33%.

Death in Service Benefit

Two types of cover were looked into. One being death cover by any cause while the other was death and total and permanent disablement insurance. Assumptions made when discussing the options included:

- The amounts to be insured are calculated at 2 ½ times stipend which is the same level of cover as set out in the Supernumerary Trust Deed.
- No cover can be provided to any person over the age of 70 for death cover and no income protection insurance over the age of 65 (condition imposed by insurers).
- There is automatic acceptance for the group with no medicals.
- There will be continuation options if the presbyter leaves the service of the church.

Summary

Given that a parish, with a full time presbyter currently pays \$4,174.40 into the Supernumerary Fund, this could fund the following:

Notes

- (1) KiwiSaver contributions are maximised from the balance of the death in service benefit cost and the 10% stipend payment made into the balance by the parish. This amount would be credited for the benefit of the new presbyter no matter if the presbyter was paying into their KiwiSaver account or not. This is the gross payment, inclusive of ESCT. The net amount to go into the KiwiSaver account will be the gross amount less ESCT.
- (2) The \$900 includes GST.

For a ½ time presbyter the parish would pay \$2,087.20, which would fund the Death in Service Benefit and the balance would be used to make a contribution into the KiwiSaver account of the presbyter.

If a Presbyter opts not to belong to KiwiSaver or have death in service insurance, or there is monies from the 10% Church contribution not required for KiwiSaver or death cover, then this will be paid to the Supernumerary Fund and will not be added to the stipend of the presbyter or be available as personal remuneration.

SUPERNUMERARY FUND

Trust Deed Amendments

The Board of Administration has received a redraft of clause 5.2.3, which deals with commutation of Superannuation Benefits for those who were members of the fund prior to 5 April 1982.

The clauses (i) to (iii) are a restatement of the existing provisions of the deed. Clause (iv) is a new provision arising from the Conference 2007 decision to allow single members or single Supernumeraries to nominate a beneficiary, the effect of this is to require the Church to make a payment into the fund, so that the fund is not adversely affected by any such payment.

Conference needs to note that a two thirds majority is required to approve the change of the Deed.

The amended Trust Deed is attached to this report (Appendix 1).

Closure of the Supernumerary Fund

A large amount of the Trustees time has been taken up on the impact of KiwiSaver on the Supernumerary Fund and its future in a KiwiSaver environment.

Based upon independent advice Conference 2008 decided that the Fund would be closed to new members from 1 February 2010.

The Trustee would refer readers to the section in the Board of Administration report entitled "Future Provisions for Retirement Savings".

Law Book Changes

The laws and regulations state that to be in Full Connexion a Presbyter must be a member of the Supernumerary Fund. There is a provision however for the Conference (President) under special circumstances to exempt a Presbyter from this requirement. At this point no charge to the Laws and Regulations are being suggested rather Presbyters commencing a first appointment with the Methodist Church of New Zealand after 1 February 2010 would be exempted from membership in the Superannuation Fund.

Suggested Decisions:

- The report be received. 1.
- That Conference approves the charges to the Trust Deed of the Supernumerary Fund, 3. clauses 5.2.3 as detailed in the report. (Note: a two thirds majority is required).

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Deed of amendment

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Parties

- 1. The Conference of the Methodist Church of New Zealand ('the Church')
- 2. The Board of Administration of the Methodist Church of New Zealand ('Trustee')

Background

- A. The Supernumerary Fund of the Methodist Church of New Zealand ('the Fund') was established by the Church and came into operation on 1 July 1913. The Fund is currently governed by a consolidated trust deed dated 1 February 1990 ('the Trust Deed'). It was subsequently amended on 17 May 1996, 8 May 1997, 14 December 1998, 31 May 2001 and 7 December 2007 (the Trust Deed and all amendments together called 'the Deed').
- B. Clause 15.1 of the Deed provides that the Trustee on instruction from the Church may at any time amend all or any of the provisions of the Deed subject to the requirements contained therein.
- C. The Church has instructed the Trustee to amend the Deed as provided in this amending deed.
- D. The Trustee is of the opinion that amendments in this amending deed do not contravene the provisions of clause 15.1 of the Deed and that the Deed as amended in accordance with this amending deed will comply with section 7 of the Superannuation Schemes Act 1989 ('the Act') and will not contain any provision that is contrary to those implied by sections 8 to 10 of the Act as evidenced by the attached certificate.

This deed witnesses

Interpretation and definitions

- 1. Words and phrases not otherwise defined in this amending deed have the same meaning as in the Deed.
- 2. Clause 5.2.3 of the Deed is deleted and replaced as follows:

When the application of a Member to become a Supernumerary has been approved by the Conference the Member may elect either to receive the pension calculated as stated in Clause 5.2.1 or 5.2.2. or to commute for a lump sum no more than twenty-five percentum (25%) of the pension and receive a reduced pension PROVIDED THAT:

(i) if the pension does not exceed five hundred and twenty dollars (\$520) per annum then the whole of the pension may be commuted

(ii) Members who were contributing prior to the 5 August 1982 may in addition commute for a lump sum up to fifty percentum (50%) of a pension based on the annual rate of pension as at 31 January 1983 of one hundred and twenty dollars and fifty-one cents (\$120.51) for each Year of Contribution and reduced in accordance with Clause 5. 2. 2. if appropriate and receive a further reduced pension

(iii) for Members who were contributing prior to 5 August 1982 if the difference between the pension before any commutation and 75% of the pension based on the annual rate of pension as at 31 January 1983 of one hundred and twenty dollars and fifty-one cents (\$120.51) for each Year of Contribution and reduced in accordance with Clause 5.2.2 if appropriate is less than five hundred and twenty dollars (\$520) per annum as hereinabove provided then the whole of the pension may be commuted; and

(iv) for any commutation for a Member who was not a New Member the Church shall pay to the Fund, on a basis agreed with the Trustee on the advice of the Actuary, the amount of the commutation amount that represents the contingent cost of an amount the Church may have to pay on the death of a Member under clause 5.4.4.

3. In all other respects, the provisions of the Deed are confirmed.

GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT TASK GROUP

Preamble

Conference 2008 established the group which had a mandate contained in Question 29(b) – pg E72 - recommendation 3(b) i, ii, iii, iv, v,

- I. Agrees that the 2008 Commissioner's report on governance and management be accepted as a document for further consultation and development;
- II. Notes that Recommendation 25a of the Stipends Review Group Report to Conference 2007, received by Conference 2007, recommended that a Task Force be appointed to review the regional and national structure of Conference and Synods to reflect the diminishing resources of the church;
- III. Conference appoints a Task Group charged with further consideration and consultation on the Commissioners report to Conference 2008, and any other reports submitted by groups or individuals on the Governance and Management Structures of the church;
- IV. The Task Group to report to Synods and Hui Poari on a regular basis with a view to reporting to Conference 2009 and finally in 2010;
- V. In preparing to report to Conference the Task Group will note the need to manage communications to employees of the Church, Trusts, Boards, Synods and any agency with which a board or committee has a contractual relationship.

The membership appointed (Q 29: (g) was:

Ron Gibson (chairperson), John Murray, Dr Savae Latu, Lindsay Cumberpatch, David Bush, Lana Lazarus, Diana Tana, Fika Fucago and Laura Black.

The group has met on several occasions, sought responses from Synods, Hui Poari, Parishes, Boards and committees, and any group or individual who wished to make a response. The contribution of those who worked with John Roberts in preparing a paper to facilitate those conversations is acknowledged. Those who provided feedback are also noted; thanks to everyone who contributed. Such feedback enables a 'flax root' feel for the Methodist Church and its structures to inform the Task Group as it prepared this report for Conference.

Purpose

The Task Group did not see itself as being charged to bring a radical restructuring proposal simply for the sake of it, but rather a new way of viewing the way we do things *that enables local mission creativity to grow and a national church which empowers that local endeavour*. This is an interim report. Our purpose is:

- To affirm the theological imperatives in how we act as a Church;
- to offer the Conference a model with which to engage;
- to seek a mandate to proceed with the development of the model;
- to request support to engage Boards and committees in dialogue as to what any changes arising from implementing the model might mean for them

so that at Conference 2010 we may present a full and final report.

Executive Summary

- 1. The Task Group seeks the support of Conference so that they can discuss with various groups, Boards and committees the model and bring proposals on how they intend implementing the intentions of the Report over the next twelve months.
- 2. The model highlights the importance of the Conference and the place of the Presidency in the Conference.
- 3. Conference will have a number of key responsibilities and these are highlighted celebration, affirmation, information, education, inspiration, and the appointment of Boards and approval of changes to the Laws and Regulations of the Church.
- 4. Council of Conference will be replaced with a smaller, skill based group with responsibility to set in place the Annual Mission Plan, approve the annual connexional budget and receive reports from various Boards and committees.
- 5. Regions are a significant new element, with a focus on partnership, equity, mission, and responsibility for stationing and resourcing.
- 6. Hui Poari will be maintained as a significant place for Maori and is the group which is responsible for the identification of Board and committee members who can represent the needs of Maori.
- 7. Networks will enable the theological and cultural diversity of the Church to continue development and provide specific resources for their respective groupings.

- 8. Parishes will no longer be the only place of ministry deployment or engagement. This means that stationing might be to the region and not to a specific parish.
- 9. The Board of Administration will have three clear functions:
 - Connexional finances
 - Human Resources
 - Communication.
- 10. Property and Investment will have its own Board. It will manage the whole of the Church's investments and oversee property development.
- 11. Methodist Missions Aotearoa (WesleyCom) will develop a stronger national identity, and will umbrella all social service endeavours and encourage active parish engagement in mission.
- 12. New and existing regions will develop partnerships with the social service centres for the delivery and resourcing of outreach activities.
- 13. Mission and Ecumenical will assume responsibility for all national as well as international ecumenical relationships.
- 14. Faith and Order will have a key role in resourcing, advising and supporting the Governance Council.
- 15. Some groups will experience little major change, while the functions of others may be redistributed.

Theological Underpinnings

The following principles underpin our thinking and proposals. They are in the form of statements.

Incarnational: To promote a sense of mission that is incarnational, that is, being immersed in the world of our communities; not mission to or for others, but mission with and alongside others that is empowering for people.

Context: To take the context of Aotearoa New Zealand seriously, reflecting our church's Tiriti understandings, bicultural and multicultural commitments.

Justice: To advance the cause of social justice in and beyond the church.

Evangelism: To embrace gospel good news, and promote evangelism that is good news.

Liberation: To be liberating for the church and its members, and those beyond the church.

Ecologically responsible: To respect the need to care for God's creation and act in ecologically responsible ways.

People who are different to us: To respect the Imago Dei or divine image reflected in those of different genders, ethnicities, abilities, sexual orientations, and enhance their place in the life of the church and wider society.

Partnerships: To embrace partnerships in mission within Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond.

Reviewing proposals in light of the Wesley theological quadrilateral:

"There were four sources of authority which Wesley believed underpinned his whole theology. ... By allowing these four pillars to complement each other, Wesley was showing a way forward to a lively, balanced approach to faith that would help his contemporaries and provide his heirs with useful tools in their search for truth and meaning." Barrie Tabraham

Scripture: To reflect the best scriptural understandings about what it means to be church.

Tradition: To value the tradition of the church built up over the years, especially the Methodist tradition.

Reason: Ensure our thinking makes real sense and is workable.

Experience: To build on a wide experience of what it is to be church, learning from both positive and negative experiences of being church.

Strategic Imperatives Connexional

From its earliest beginnings the Methodist movement was connexional in that representatives of the lay preachers and later Methodist societies shared in an annual conference aimed at regulating the doctrines and disciplines of the movement. Ever since, Methodism has strenuously sought to avoid congregationalism and maintain a sense of belonging to the wider collective.

Every Member a Minister

In recent years Te Taha Maori have sought to remind Te Haahi Weteriana o Aotearoa of the New Testament understanding of Christian ministry belonging to the whole 'laos'/people of God, rather than just a chosen and ordained few. Our baptism and incorporation into the Body of Christ makes each of us ministers of God's grace and truth. The challenge is to discover our unique ministry gifts and then develop and deploy them wherever God has put us – at home, at work, at play.

Social Justice

Te Haahi Weteriana today is no less committed to working for personal and social transformation a both and, rather than an either or. For example, becoming an increasingly inclusive church has been both controversial and painful but is clearly seen as a gospel imperative.

The Warmed Heart

The love that moves people to respond not just with worship but with passion and compassion, is the spirit that motivates us to revitalise our church for its mission in contemporary society.

Catholic Spirit

John Wesley encouraged people to *"think and let think"*. The Methodist movement has always been at the forefront of the ecumenical movement and attempts at church union and cooperation.

Practical and Expedient

Over the years the Methodist Church has been willing and able to diverge from established protocols in response to the changing needs of church or community. For example, the stationing needs of the church are presently forcing some changes in theological education. As a smaller church we pride ourselves on 'travelling light'.

Te Tiriti o Waitangi

The context for our ministry and mission is Aotearoa New Zealand where our founding document is a unique covenant between the British Crown and the Tangata whenua, the people of the land. Wesleyan missionaries were, along with their Anglican counterparts, instrumental in ensuring Maori accepted Crown assurances of safeguarding Maori tino rangitiratanga and thus signed the Treaty. In 1983 Te Haahi Weteriana embraced a bicultural partnership that sought to ensure that Maori and Tauiwi live within the spirit of Te Tiriti.

Introduction

The Task Group believes that the Church of the future must be one which travels light. It must be a Church able to respond to local and international issues with a freshness and vigour not burdened with institutional risk aversion. It must be a Church focused on *"WORD and DEED"* that recognises there is good news to be shared with the world and community within which we live and breathe. It must be a Church that looks outward, not ever inward. Yet this must be balanced by a careful and considered use of resources. At the same time there are many things that can be done if as a Church there is acceptance that things might be done differently.

The Methodist Church, as a movement, needs to see itself as the 'People called Methodists' – sometimes gathered in the traditional model of Parish, Synod, Conference, but increasingly as Network, Congregation, Group, Region, Connexion. Greater fluidity and a more diverse model of 'ministry' is called for. This was confirmed in many of the responses received from individuals and Synods.

Accepting such a broad contemporary view requires a willingness to consider how the church enables this to happen in a safe, well resourced, and enthusiastic environment. It means a willingness to work with a more organic model – one that changes with the ebbs and flows of the Church as movement – yet holds onto the theologically central tenets of being Methodist.

With the Council of Conference also reporting this year to Conference on the annual, versus biennial Conference, as well as an alternative model of Presidency, the Task Group has felt it important to synthesise any direction their work might lead.

Assumptions

Broadly speaking they are:

- A more empowering model of governance for the whole church which enables the Church to act as a Church;
- A model that is more aligned to the size and needs of the present and future membership;
- A greater freedom to engage in alternative models of ministry and gathering of the community of faith;
- A more robust and connexional use of resources and their management in the interest of evangelism, social justice, population movements and trends, social services, education and property, focussed around local and regional imperatives.

The Model

The Methodist Church, with its connexional culture and theology, needs to ensure that the overarching 'decisions' of Conference do not dis-empower the local, and conversely that the local does not lose sight of being part of the connexional Methodist Church. At the same time we see that there is much in the coming together in annual gatherings that the Church could take advantage of to nourish and encourage us all in our faith and our connexion but which it currently does not do.

Therefore each part of the Church should see itself as having a key role in some aspect of the Church's life, but at the same time, the freedom to engage in mission. To do this the church needs to see that some roles must change. The changes are not significant but would look like this:

Conference -VisionCelebrationConference is the visioning body, it is not about governance, but is a place of celebration,





Note: Under the Heading of "Regions", the above concept diagram is indicative of missiondriven regions, possibly 4-6 in number, which could include groupings of synods, parishes, national bodies, or geographic areas. Through the concentration of resources, administration and management in this manner, parishes in particular, could be enabled to engage more proactively in mission outreach.

TRINITY METHODIST THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE

Overview from the Chairperson

This year's annual report reflects the opportunities of another phase in the life of Trinity College, building on the foundations and learnings of the past and the considerable thinking that occurred during the 2007/8 financial year. Our small but enthusiastic and skilled Council has focussed clearly on its strategic, policy and monitoring roles and as a very first step established clear expectations of the respective roles of governance by the Council and management by the Principal. A formal agreement as to these expectations was developed and signed, with the understanding that open communication would allow resolution of any grey areas of responsibility.

This principle of open communication is one we are endeavouring to apply to all aspects of our responsibilities, given the College cannot operate in isolation to the Connexion as a whole if it is to serve the Methodist Church of New Zealand (MCNZ) to the fullest extent possible. For this reason we have been pleased to receive contributions to our strategic plan and its implementation, to make known through E Messenger and the College Web site the key decisions of each Council meeting, to report regularly to Synods, to share College developments in "Touchstone" and to welcome and employ suggestions and expertise from the various corners of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

Much has been accomplished in 2008/9 to set the scene "to keep the Spirit aflame" and for their contributions to this, I must acknowledge, in particular, the commitment of Council Members, the College Principal and the College Staff as well as Dr Mary Caygill whose stationed appointed to Trinity College concludes in January 2010. It is with regret that Melanaite Taumoefolau is unable to continue as a Council member in 2010. We wish both her and Mary well.

Strategic Direction

Trinity College's report to August Synods noted that information technology has irrevocably changed the learning and teaching environment. Internationally, tertiary educational institutions have experienced large scale shifts in both the curriculum and the regulatory landscapes. That applies to all disciplines, including theology and ministry formation.

Students across denominations and throughout New Zealand can now access a number of viable options for theological education and ministry training that did not exist even a decade ago. There is considerable debate in churches about the nature of ministry formation, especially with elearning and online communities. Research suggests that a blend of facilitated web-based learning and face-to-face tutorials produces a rounded educational experience. What is certain is that, all around the world, new students entering into tertiary education begin with a radically different system and educational methodology compared to all previous generations.

Success Indicators

Trinity Methodist Theological College has considered how it might meet the challenge of these changes. We recognise we cannot do the same things that we have always done. The world has moved on. What is needed now is ministry formation for the 21st century. In the development of the Trinity College's strategic plan, a number of key success indicators were considered. These indicators are listed below and progress to date noted:

 Qualifications that are credible and accessible, and structured so that students can complete, with certification, at various levels of achievement.

Trinity College has been fortunate that it has consistently met the standards required of it by NZQA and TEC over a long period of time. The Diploma in Practical Theology is an asset of the college than has been recognised and developed further over the past year. Recognition of its high quality lies with the expertise and work of previous staff of the College. The development of Trinity College programmes during 2009 will see face-to-face blended learning through a combination of block course tutorial modules, intensives, field trips and one-on one tutorial assistance, along with online resourcing in 2010. The programmes have been rebuilt for a contemporary learning and teaching environment. At the same time, there is scope for some students to access the theology degrees offered at the University of Auckland and beyond.

Most importantly, in the development of the 2010 programme, a much greater emphasis has been placed on creating a Methodist learning community by coming together for seventy days per annum. Alongside this, students for ordination will participate in a parish placement during the year and participate in a variety of worship settings during the course of their programme. It is a unique form of training for 21st century Connexional Methodist ministry, built upon a course that is academically rigorous and demanding high levels of creativity and energetic student input.

Most candidates for ministry will be full-time yet remain in their own homes, gathering into community for intentional formation development. Papers will mostly be delivered at the St John's/Trinity site, with some being held at Wesley College or on field trips. The 2010 College year will begin with an extensive orientation to the bicultural church, with tutor guides from Te Taha Maori and Trinity College. At regular intervals during the year six papers towards the Diploma in Practical Theology will be taught, along with other Trinity College Certificates and Intensives. During the time when students in full-time programmes are 'at home' they will be in supervised parish placements and under directed spiritual supervision.

The flexible nature of Trinity College programmes means that some candidates for ministry may be able to hold part-time positions, while working towards the Diploma in Practical Theology. All students in Trinity College, lay and ordained, are expected to engage in dialogue with tutors about their future ministry plans and dreams.

 Programmes that recognize the diverse nature of New Zealand communities and the growing needs of Pasifika people.

The single biggest uptake of all programme resources is in Lead Worship. During 2009, there have been Year One and/or Year Two sessions being offered through:

- Mahurangi Methodist Parish
- Auckland Central Methodist Parish
- Mangere-Otahuhu Methodist Parish
- Hamilton Methodist Parish
- Hastings Methodist Parish
- Palmerston North Methodist Parish
- Wellington Methodist Parish
- Blenheim Methodist Parish
- Greymouth Uniting Parish

The Tongan Hermeneutics group in Auckland has gone from strength to strength, with numbers of about 45. In 2010 a Tongan Lay Preachers course will be offered in Wellington and in Auckland. Work is currently underway towards offering similar programmes in the Samoan language.

• A range of distance and e-learning programmes that provide credit towards a Diploma in Practical Theology, or equivalent.

Trinity College intensives have been held during the second semester of 2009, and proven to be very popular. The intensives enable a mix of Trinity College students and lay people to learn and discuss together theology and issues on a number of differing subjects. Three intensives have been held in Auckland in the second part of 2009, with a total of 74 Auckland people having attended one or more of these. Trinity College intensives have also been held in Hamilton and at the Whanganui School of Theology. Participation in some intensives can be credited towards a Trinity College Certificate.

Trinity College intensives are not limited to Auckland. They can be delivered anywhere in New Zealand where there is sufficient demand. They can be run as special parish occasions, synod events or in Schools of Theology.

During 2010 intensives will include:

Creativity, imagination and ministry;

- Being and leading in a x-cultural parish;
- Gender issues in ministry;
- Living our faith: an ethical approach;
- Music and worship;
- Prayer and spirituality in a scientific world;
- Preaching: the essentials;
- Working with refugees, homeless and stateless people.

Cooperative links strengthened or developed with a range of theological educational institutions specifically for cross crediting and sharing of expertise.

During the year, the Council explored the advantages and issues around the Memorandum of Understanding with the University of Auckland, School of Theology. Council engaged in a comprehensive discussion regarding the renewal of the Memorandum of Understanding against the following aspects:

- Credibility for students
- o Professional development for lecturers
- o Funding
- Ecumenical credibility
- Expectations of the connexion

Consultation was undertaken with key connexional leaders, whose responses, in the main, supported the Council's stance in respect of an annual review of commitment of Trinity College tutors to the School of Theology programmes.

Alongside this partnership, our Trinity Methodist community currently resides within the larger partnership of the Memorandum of Understanding with the College of St John the Evangelist of the Anglican Church. We also value being with the three tikanga of Anglican Colleges onsite at Meadowbank and enjoy a unique ecumenical partnership with them. This Memorandum is currently being revised in the light of emerging educational priorities for all the partners, and the Anglican-Methodist Covenant. The resources of Kinder Library and its archival collections is one of the primary expressions of this partnership.

The Methodist Church continues to be represented in the work of the Ecumenical Board of Theological Studies through staff and tutors of Trinity College. The Principal is one of the Trustees of the Board as well as having continued in a tutor role during 2009.

 Tutor positions in place (within budget limits) that ensure a multi-disciplinary approach to Trinity College staffing and student placements to the benefit of Trinity College programmes, parish and synod strategies.

Integral to the maintenance of standards are the tutors of Trinity College, the presbyterscholars. These tutors have been made available to the College through 'ready parishes'. This is the Connexional Church at work through and in Trinity College. Trinity College could not begin to do its work without the goodwill of those ready parishes from which the tutors are able to teach in papers, intensives and other courses.

Alongside the stationed staff of David Bell, Nasili Vaka'uta and Mary Caygill, Trinity College has been grateful to the nineteen other tutors and their parishes for their contribution alongside Anglican colleagues from the College of St John the Evangelist at Meadowbank, Auckland. Active partnerships are continuing to be developed with parishes and synods for ministry training engagement.

Professional Development Programmes for Presbyters, Deacons and Lay Leaders.

The DipPTh followed by two years as a probationer-presbyter qualifies students to enter the University of Otago's Master of Ministry degree (MMin). This professional degree programme is ideally suited to Methodist deacons and presbyters who are interested in gaining a further qualification based upon applying practical theological skills in ministry situations. In some cases this may lead on to further development within the Doctor of Ministry degree (DMin).

When viewed alongside of the Trinity College Certificates and Intensives in professional development, open to lay and ordained, the framework for life-long learning through Trinity College programmes is now in place, and some are starting to access it. Trinity College tutors can advise further on the nature of this kind of professional development.

 Establishment of documentation that supports Council and Management Performance In February Trinity College Council reported to the connexion through E-messenger the trial it was undertaking of a review of the operation of the Board of Studies. This facility supports the College and the Council in reviewing student progress and also in monitoring the curriculum offered.

Upon reflection and in line with NZQA requirements, the Council agreed to allow a clear focus on both these responsibilities, and during 2009 the Board of Studies has operated as two panels – one on the student review aspect and one on the curriculum aspect. The panels have included a mix of staff and external interested parties, and the student review panel has been representative of the bicultural partnership of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.

In reviewing the trial over the last year, the Council now brings to Conference recommendations for the formalisation of the two functions, along with other suggested changes to the Law Book section 11(d) to be consistent with the decision of Conference 2008 to reconstitute Trinity College Council. The proposed changes are noted as appendix 1.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- That Conference notes the development of the Diploma in Practical Theology (DipPTh) to a face-to-face blended learning programme through a combination of block course tutorial modules, intensives, field trips and one-on one tutorials.
- That Conference notes the development of a professional studies and continuing education portfolio for presbyters through Trinity College's DipPTh, the University of Otago Master of Ministry degree (MMin) and the EIDTS Scholar of Theology (STh).
- Conference approves the establishment, as set out in the revised constitution, of the Student Review Panel and the Curriculum Review Panel to replace the Board of Studies.
 Conference authorizes the Tripity College Council and the Level December 2014.
- Conference authorizes the Trinity College Council and the Law Revision Committee to finalise the drafting of the revised Trinity College Constitution (Law Book Section 11(D)), for approval by the President and subsequent ratification by Conference 2010.
- That Conference thanks and acknowledges with gratitude the contribution of Dr Meleanite Taumoefolau to Trinity College Council during 2009.
- 7. That Conference thanks and acknowledges with gratitude the contribution of Rev Dr Mary Caygill on full-time secondment as Acting Head of the School of Theology during 2009, and wish her the very best as she moves to her new position at Durham Street. Dr Caygill will be available as an EIDTS tutor in pastoral theology.
- The 2010 Trinity College Council membership be: Catherine Gibson (Chairperson), David McGeorge, Bella Ngaha, Martin Sutherland, Susan Thompson, and further members to be appointed by the President.

Appendix 1

SECTION 11(D) - TRINITY METHODIST THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE

1. Constitution

- 1.1 Within the Methodist Church of New Zealand there shall be a Theological College whose name shall be Trinity Methodist Theological College and its motto "Spiritus ubi est ardet" which may be expressed in English, Maori, Fijian, Samoan and Tongan.
- 1.2 The College shall be under the control and superintendence of the Conference, through Trinity College Council.

2. Aims and Objectives

2. 1 The aims and objectives of the College shall be:

- To create and maintain a responsive, flexible and sustainable learning environment that:
- (a) prepares a range of people for Methodist leadership;
- (b) prepares participants and graduates for different types and levels of practical

ministry, including ordained, lay, community, mission;

- (c) resources a variety of continuing education opportunities including conferences, publishing, and educational intensives;
- (d) develops a strong capital asset base through the implementation of a capital management plan;
- (e) has effective, efficient and cost effective accommodation, bursary and other business processes.
- (f) In our context this will include:
 - i. To provide quality adult education in theology and ministry relevant to the Treatybased context in Aotearoa New Zealand and in Oceania.
 - ii. To provide educational opportunities relevant to the needs, backgrounds, and goals of individual students, whatever their cultural or theological background.
 - iii. To maintain educational programmes which are relevant for Maori and Pacific Island students in particular and are on the other hand relevant to the needs of Maori and Pacific communities in Aotearoa-New Zealand.
 - iv To provide educational opportunities relevant to the needs of the Methodist Church of New Zealand and other interested church or related bodies.

3. Lay Ministry Education

3.1 Trinity College shall establish programmes for education for lay ministry. They shall be controlled by the Trinity College Council and be under the oversight of the Principal.

4. Students for Ministry

- 4.1 The Trinity College Council shall from time to time adopt rules and regulations relating to allowances and the curriculum.
- 4.2 Each accepted candidate is responsible for their studies and ministry to the Trinity College Council through the Principal until ordination.
- 4.3 Each accepted candidate for the presbyterate shall normally undergo a course of training, and serve a term of probation in a Parish prior to ordination. The normal term of training, including probation, shall be five years.
- 4.4 Each accepted candidate for the diaconate will normally be trained under the oversight of the Principal.
- 4.5 The Trinity College Council, on the acceptance of a candidate by Conference shall, on the recommendation of the Principal and the Student Review Panel, determine the nature and setting of the candidate's preparation for ordination.

5. Ecumenical and Educational Partnerships with other Institutions

- 5.1 The College may, subject to decision of the Conference, share facilities with, or otherwise enter into, an educational relationship with other theological colleges or educational institutions.
- 5.2 Where the Methodist Church has entered into co-operative work with any other Church or Churches in ministerial education, Methodist staff members remain ultimately responsible to the Conference.
- 5.3 Where the Methodist Church has entered into co-operative work with any other Church or Churches, Methodist involvement in the making of staff appointments shall be a prerequisite.

6. Governance

- 6.1 The College shall be under the governance of the Trinity College Council.
- 6.2 The Trinity College Council shall, as the Trustees of the Methodist Theological College Council in terms of its incorporation under the Religious, Charitable and Educational Trusts Act 1908, hold all its lands and funds upon the Trusts declared by the Deed of Trust. (see Appendix D-6)
- 6.3 Trinity College Council will consist of five members, of whom up to two may be non-Methodist, plus a chairperson, and appointed annually by the Conference.
- 6.4 Trinity College Council shall meet at least quarterly.
- 6.6 All meetings of Trinity College Council shall be convened by notice in writing, addressed to each member at the member's last know place of abode or business.
- 6.7 Not less than seven clear days notice shall be given of any meeting called for the purpose

of considering any proposal to sell, mortgage, lease, or otherwise dispose of any land vested in the Council or to acquire by lease of purchase any land for the benefit of the College,

7. Sub-Committees of Trinity College

- 7.1 Trinity College Council may set up appropriate sub-committees and shall determine their several functions.
- 7.2 STUDENT REVIEW PANEL AND CURRICULUM REVIEW PANEL
 - 7.2.1 Trinity College Council delegates to the Principal the authority to convene and manage all functions and decisions of the Student Review Panel and Curriculum Review Panel, whose functions shall be as follows.
 - 7.2.2 Terms of Reference: Student Review Panel
 - 7.2.2.1 Membership of the Student Review Panel: Tauiwi Executive Officer (chair), Principal, two lay members appointed by Trinity College Council, and College Manager for records.
 - 7.2.2.2 Meeting purposes: To determine the nature and setting of the candidate's preparation for ordination during College training and the probationers programme. Against the background of the Church's commitment to its bi-cultural journey, each student preparing for ordination shall pursue a programme of study under the direction of and to the satisfaction of the Principal and the Student Review Panel. The course of study for those preparing for:
 - (a) the presbyterate will normally include study in each of biblical studies, Christian thought and history, the history, theology and praxis of Methodism, pastoral care, the practice of ministry, homiletics, and liturgics;
 - (b) the diaconate will include biblical and theological studies, and such other studies as will prepare them for their particular serving ministry;
 - (c) Special courses may be devised to meet the needs of individual students, and prior learning shall be taken into account;
 - (d) no student shall enter upon any course without the consent of and approval by the Principal and the Student Review Panel of all the subjects proposed;
 - (e) if the marital status of an accepted candidate is to change, the Principal shall be advised at the earliest possible date in order that any housing or financial or other implications of such a change as they may affect the Church may be considered;
 - (f) arrange housing, bursary and tuition expense assistance, and such other allowances as are determined by Trinity College Council;
 - (g) receive regular reports on candidates progress from parish placements, academic progress, and other such reports as are required by the Principal;
 - (h) receive regularly each year the Portfolios of candidates in College and on probation;
 - (i) ensure that Trinity College expectations are met as laid out in the Ministry Education Handbook, Diploma in Practical Theology Handbook, and Probationers Programme Handbook. The criteria for ministry suitability are the criteria for ordination approved by Conference, 1991;
 - (j) the Student Review Panel may, in consultation with the Principal, require an oral or written examination of any student to determine academic progress and/or ministry suitability;
 - (k) the Student Review Panel may, in consultation with the Principal, discontinue students from Trinity College and its programmes under 6.1.2 (j).

- 7.2.3 Terms of Reference: Curriculum Review Panel
 - 7.2.3.1 Membership: Principal, lecturer in Biblical Studies (chair) the academic staff (tutors) of Trinity College, and the key church stakeholders Tumuaki, Tauiwi Executive Officer, General Secretary, and College Manager for records.
 - 7.2.3.2 Meeting purposes:
 - (a) To review annually the overall shape of the curriculum of the Diploma of Practical Theology and all other courses offered by Trinity College.
 - (b) To arrange tutor training on an annual basis, including evaluation of performance.
 - (c) To appoint a Moderation Panel of three members, including the Chairperson of the Curriculum Review Panel and the Principal, functioning as a sub-committee for moderation of recognition of prior learning and cross-crediting and student academic achievement.
 - (d) To review each semester:
 - (i) individual course components;
 - (ii) arrange for pre-moderation of component changes;
 - (iii) ensure correct assessment and moderation procedures are in place for both NZQA courses and other programmes of Trinity College;
 - (iv) ensure that Trinity College expectations are met as laid out in the Ministry Education Handbook, Diploma in Practical Theology Handbook, and Probationers Programme Handbook;
 - (v) the Moderation Panel may, in consultation with the Principal and the Student Review Panel, require an oral or written examination of any student in relation to academic progress and if sufficient progress has not been sustained, discontinue the student from Trinity College and its programmes (see 6.1.2(j);
 - (vi) to fulfil such other functions as are required by church law.

8. Staff

- 8. 1 The Principal shall be a Presbyter in Full Connexion (see 5.3.5.3 for role and responsibilities) who:
 - (a) is the leader of a team of educators, and is qualified to teach at tertiary level;
 - (b) supervises the overall work of Trinity College and the facilitation of Ministry Education for professional development;
 - (c) fosters sense of community in the life of the College and ensures adequate pastoral care of students and staff;
 - (d) promotes and fosters ministry preparation appropriate to the needs of the Methodist Church of New Zealand;
 - (e) ensures the Church's requirements are met by students and those seeking reception into Full Connexion and ordination, including the keeping of records relating to the studies of each student (see 2.4.1ff);
 - (f) assists the Council and faculty to work at educational and ministry preparation strategies which fit these needs;
 - (g) advocates and promotes the work of the College and Ministry Education within the tertiary educational context to the benefit of the Church;
 - (h) is available to the life of the Church as a resource person in education and ministry;
 - (i) is a member of the Tauiwi Strategy and Tauiwi Stationing;
 - (j) is a resource person to the Council of Conference.
- 8.2 Staff members may be appointed by the Conference to the Ranston or Wesley Lectureships according to the procedures for making Connexional Resource appointments. (see 6.7.1ff)
- 8.3 The appointment of a stationed presbyteral Methodist staff member made during the academic year, or in partnership with another Church, shall require the concurrence of the President and shall be confirmed by the following Conference.
- 8.4 In the event of any vacancy in the College presbyteral Staff arising during the year the Council, shall after consulting the President, arrange for the carrying on of the work till the following Conference.

- 8.5 Where Trinity College has entered into co-operative work with any other Church or Churches in ministerial education, Methodist presbyteral members remain ultimately responsible to the Conference.
- 8.6 Where the Trinity College has entered into co-operative work with any other Church or Churches, Methodist involvement in the making of joint staff appointments shall be a prerequisite.

9. Trinity College Fellowship

- 9.1 There shall be Trinity College Fellowships, the recipients of which shall be elected by the Trinity College Council, in recognition of their having rendered significant service to the College, either academically or in some other capacity.
- 9.2 The roll of living holders of Trinity College Fellowships shall not exceed ten.
- 9.3 Election shall be made by the Trinity College Council on at least a two-thirds vote of those present at a Board meeting, following any procedures of consultation which the Council shall decide from time to time. The name of any person proposed as a holder of a Trinity College Fellowship shall; be brought forward at any meeting after two months notice has been given.
- 9.4 Each person elected shall receive a suitable scroll signed by the Chairperson of the Trinity College Council.
- 9.5 All elections of Fellowship holders shall be reported to the following Conference, and, if appropriate, their title shall be shown following their name in the List of Stations.
- 9.6 The Council may, if it so decides, remove any name from the list, upon four months notice, by a majority of not less than four-fifths of those present at a meeting, at which not less than two-thirds of the members of the Council are present.
- 9.7 Persons who are holders of Trinity College Fellowships may be consulted on matters affecting the life and work of the College in whatever way seems appropriate to the Council.

MISSION RESOURCING

The Vision for Mission Resourcing is To inspire and resource our communities for a journey with Christ that enriches lives and relationships.

This is accomplished through fulfilling our mission,

Resourcing parishes, synods and leaders for contemporary mission and ministry in order that the church continues to develop in healthy and mission-focused ways.

2009 has been a time of new learnings and growth for Mission Resourcing and the new Board. New ministry opportunities have emerged and partnerships have developed that have assisted Mission Resourcing in its tasks of resourcing the church. A strategic plan and business plan have been prepared and used, and the Board and Staff look forward with excitement to the opportunities for 2010.

Governance

Conference 2008 disestablished the Board of Ministry and separated Mission Resourcing and Trinity College. At the same time, a new board was appointed to oversee the governance aspects of Mission Resourcing. Michael Greer was appointed chair of the new board, but unfortunately had to step down in January due to ill health. The Board and staff want to thank Michael for the energy, passion and skilful guidance he provided in the 4 months he was engaged with the work of Mission Resourcing. President Jill appointed Norman Johnston as interim chair, until a replacement could be found. Again, the Board and staff wish to thank Norman for the way in which he stepped up to take on leadership under difficult circumstances.

In April the Board welcomed Hamish Ott to the role of Board chair. Hamish brings a wealth of experience in Human Resources and organisational development, as well as huge amounts of passion and energy for the task. Hamish's leadership has challenged the Board and staff to look to the future with excitement, and a focus on the core tasks of Mission Resourcing. Part of this has been the beginning of a refocussing for Youth Ministries.

Through these changes, staff have continued to complete the work asked of Mission Resourcing by Conference, resourcing the church in a variety of ways (see below). Mission Resourcing staff look forward to a more settled period after two years of 'interim' governance.

In 2009 the Board has formulated and ratified its strategic directions through to 2013. These have been circulated through the Connexion and have been posted on the Mission Resourcing website (<u>http://missionresourcing.methodist.org.nz</u>). These directions focus the work of Mission Resourcing on Leadership Development, Parish Development and Parish-based Mission. A strong theme of leadership and youth involvement also emerging through the work of the Board.

From the strategic plan, the Board has developed a business plan. This will also be posted to the website in late October. This business plan provides an overview of the work which the Board expects will be achieved in the next two years, some of which is outlined in this report.

On top of this, the Board has also identified the need to streamline board policies that will enable more efficient execution of the strategic and business plan. While many of these policies have existed under the previous governance bodies, the Board are now seeking to redefine them in line with the new directions set by the Board.

Good quality relationships with other organisations and groups are a vital tool in growing the life of the church. Strong partnerships have developed with the new Trinity College staff and Council chairperson, as well as some of the synods. We anticipate fostering further strategic and relational partnerships with the Diaconate Task Group and other synods.

The Board has also worked with the Law Revision committee on the changes required to move relevant parts of the law from the Board of Ministry to Mission Resourcing. This work is being presented to Conference by the Law Revision committee.

Funding continues to be an issue for Mission Resourcing. A report to the Board identifies that the connexion funds Mission Resourcing not to fail, but does not fund it to succeed. Other funding streams are being investigated by the Board, but this is difficult for an organisation that cannot levy members or charge for services. The Mission Resourcing Board asks Conference to consider carefully how it may fund the vital work of Mission Resourcing in a sustainable manner into the future.

Parishes and Synods

Staff have run workshops this year in a number of parishes and synods. The Healthy Church, Missional Church workshops have developed considerably, and we believe offer a more helpful way forward for parishes looking at this area. Workshops have also been run on Stewardship, Connexional understanding, as well as Personal Faith development for young people. We have appreciated the partnership begun with Trinity College in developing workshops that enable participants to use the workshops as prior learning or credit for Trinity College study. For more information, or to ask for a workshop to be run in your area, contact Mission Resourcing.

Core Business

The Mission Resourcing Board and staff have identified that much of what we do is 'core business', which continues to function well with regular reviews.

Mission Resourcing administers several *funds* on behalf of the church, particularly in relation to parish mission and ministry. Stipends Assistance grant funds, Development funds, and several other assistance grants are provided for approved applications.

Candidates Assessment 2009 was completed well in September, with all four candidates being passed by the team led by Chris Elphick. We sincerely thank the eight members of the assessment team who gave their time, skill and energy to the task.

The Candidates processes were extensively reviewed in 2008 and the beginning of 2009. Mission Resourcing is working with Trinity College to incorporate the new possibilities offered through the Diploma and block courses into the candidates processes. Conversations will also be continuing with Te Taha Maori in relation to the candidates process as it relates to their future ministry strategy.

Ordinands assessment was led by Norman Brookes with a team of 3 others, and facilitated the approval of four Ordinands. Again, the work done by Trinity College to prepare these Ordinands and the team who assessed the four candidates is appreciated.

Stationing profiles were completely revamped last year, and a significant review of these will be completed in time for stationing 2010. The changes have been welcomed as giving better information and a clearer picture for both Presbyter and Parish. Profiles are more than an 'advertisement' for a parish or presbyter; they are also tools to facilitate deeper thinking and discussion around clear mission, ministry, purpose and skills. Mission Resourcing will continue to work with Vahefonua Tonga and Sinoti Samoa as they move towards using profiles in their stationing processes.

The Overseas Ministry Process was used extensively this year. This has been reviewed by the team, with recommendations coming through Council of Conference. The process can now be used for anyone coming in from outside our church – both from overseas and from within New Zealand. This year the process resulted in two overseas ministers being available for ministry in Te Háhi Weteriana o Aotearoa.

The Mutuality of Ministry covenant with the Presbyterians (Information Leaflet 35) has been revised by Mission Resourcing, Tauiwi Strategy and the Administration Division. This has enabled more equality in discussions with Presbyterian ministers wanting to work in our church.

Orientation material was developed in early 2009 for parishes welcoming new presbyters. The material provides a framework for assisting presbyters to obtain basic information about the parish, office, home and local services and contacts. This was welcomed and comments have been incorporated into the material. It has been sent to all parishes, following the face to faces, and is also available on the Mission Resourcing forms website (http://missionresourcing.methodist.org.nz and click on the 'forms' link).

Local Ministry and Non-Stipendiary ministry

In 2009, Mission Resourcing raised questions surrounding the category of 'Local Ministry' (as it related to their work), with Trinity College, Sinoti Samoa, Vahefonua Tonga and Wasewase ko Viti ke Rotuma, and later with the Tauiwi Strategy Committee. All have agreed that the term, which does not appear in the Law Book, should no longer be used in the future.

It was noted that this category of ministry has become unhelpful in terms of the future ministry of these groups. In many ways, Local Ministry by its nature has proven more problematic rather than being helpful. It has had an impact on candidating, covenants, stationing and reviews. Local presbyters have been perceived in some parts of the Church as second class, and are expected to be in the local congregation/parish until retired.

Removing the category of Local Ministry in the future would mean that all candidates would candidate for ministry in a particular language group/s, but would only indicate whether they are intending to be itinerant or partially itinerant, stipended or non-stipended. Mission Resourcing asks Conference to approve that the category of 'Local Ministry' no longer be used in reference to candidating, training or future stationing procedures, and that (where relevant) the terms 'non-stipended', or 'partially-itinerant' be used instead.

Expected work for 2010

Reviews

This year Mission Resourcing undertook to overhaul the reviews procedures. Unfortunately due to circumstances beyond our control these were not able to be completed by July as promised. It is our intention to provide a draft set of procedures to the March 2010 Tauiwi Strategy meeting to be used for 2010.

Police Vetting

In 2009 Mission Resourcing processed 93 Police Vetting reports. The use of these has been well received by parishes and those in paid ministry in the church. The only glitch in the process appears to be the waiting time once the reports are sent to the Police Vetting centre.

The second stage of the police vetting process agreed by Conference 2008 will kick off in 2010, with all Presbyters and Deacons on the stationing sheet being asked to complete the Police Vetting procedures. Questions have been raised with Law Revision about how the church might deal with any unfavourable report in a police vetting check, or with a minister who refuses to undertake the process. In consultation with Law Revision, we believe that any such matters should be taken to the Pastoral Committee for their consideration, and are asking Conference to agree to add this to the Police Vetting procedures.

Leadership Development

One of the major areas of development for 2010 will be in the area of leadership development. In August, Mission Resourcing began a consultation with Synods looking at how they chose and identify leadership. This has given the Board a good understanding of current practice, and we wish to sincerely thank those who took the time and energy to respond to the update and questions.

Children's Ministries

Mission Resourcing is looking to create a database of children's workers and those interested in children's ministries in all forms through our church. This will provide a greater resource base to the church. If anyone has not responded to this request through Emessenger and the Mission Resourcing blog, please contact the Mission Resourcing office. This database will be used to distribute ideas for Children's ministry, to inform those directly involved in Children's ministry about training events, and to coordinate developments for resourcing Children's ministry.

Evaluation of the 'ChildSafe' material continues, and further investigation has shown that this offers good training possibilities for quality children's and youth ministries beyond issues of 'safety'. A full review of the material should be completed by July 2010.

Unfortunately the expected review of Children's and Youth Ministries did not eventuate this year, as the new Board and staff needed time to grapple with the complexities of Mission Resourcing and the Methodist Church's varied ministries in this area. This review is on hold as further information is gathered about what is required for the future.

Refresh

One of the most exciting resourcing partnerships developed in 2009 was with the Manukau Synod and Administration Division in respect to a three year leadership development program called 'Refresh'. The purposes of this project are

- 1. Providing practical and inspirational ideas to motivate local church leaders into new ways of thinking about church and their role as leaders within the church. Part of this will involve finding ways to refresh those involved in leadership and presbyteral ministry.
- 2. Helping smaller churches, or groups within larger churches, to develop new ways of expressing their faith, ministry and life through various small group models.
- 3. Offering creative ideas for meaningful worship that enable local church congregations and small groups to express their faith and find motivation for ministry and mission.

This will be headed by Andre Le Roux, and has been generously funded by PAC, Manukau Synod, Development funds and various other funding groups, parishes and synods. Andre will be accountable for the project through the Mission Resourcing Board, and will be based at the church offices at 409 Great South Road, Penrose. More details can be obtained through Andre or the Mission Resourcing offices.

Law Changes

1.1 There shall be a Mission Resourcing Board under the control and direction of Conference. **Objects**

1.2 The purpose of Mission Resourcing is to resource parishes, synods and leaders for contemporary mission and ministry.

Functions

- 1.3 The functions of the Mission Resourcing Board shall be
 - 1.3.1 to provide governance to Mission Resourcing and;

- approve and regularly review the strategic direction and vision for Mission 1.3.1.a Resourcina:
- 1.3.1.b report to the Conference and make recommendations pertaining to Mission Resourcing:
- provide financial oversight for Mission Resourcing, including the 1.3.1.c administration of designated Connexional Funds;
- 1.3.1.d monitor performance against plans and budgets;
- oversee the appointment, review and professional development of the 1.3.1.e Director Tauiwi Pakeha Ministries and Director Tauiwi Pasifika Ministries;
- Foster key relationships with ministry groups in the Methodist Church of 1.3.1.f New Zealand including Trinity Methodist Theological College, Deacons task group, Local Shared Ministry workgroup and Synods;
- Uphold the bi-cultural, multi-ethnic and ecumenical vision of the church in 1.3.1.g the ministries undertaken through Mission Resourcing;
- undertake other duties necessary to fulfilling the objects of the Board. 1.3.1.h 1.3.2
 - to provide oversight of the work of Mission Resourcing and;
 - oversee the candidating and ordination processes, and the recruitment & 1.3.2.a assessment for people offering ministry and leadership skills appropriate for the future of the Church, recommending approved names to Conference:
 - facilitate processes for ministers from other churches to engage in 1.3.2.b ministry with the Methodist Church of New Zealand, and recommend to conference those ordained ministers from other churches to be received into Full Connexion;
 - guide the church in the deployment of all those who are ordained or in 1.3.2.c covenanted ministries, including supply ministries;
 - 1.3.2.d co-ordinate orientation programmes on Bicultural commitment and the ethos of the Methodist Church of New Zealand in consultation with Te Taha Maori, for new Connexional leaders, presbyters from other countries and ministers appointed to UCANZ congregations with a Methodist component:
 - encourage leadership development within Tauiwi English Speaking and 1.3.2.e Pasifika ministries:
 - facilitate professional development for Tauiwi English Speaking and 1.3.2.f Pasifika Ministries, including provision of review material for presbyters, ministers and those in covenanted ministries;
 - encourage, enable and oversee Tauiwi Youth Ministries and matters 1.3.2.g related to the Order of St Stephen;
 - develop and identify resources for the Church, nationally, regionally & 1.3.2.h locally, in order to:
 - strengthen churches, parishes, and faith communities, and
 - encourage the development of new ventures;
 - build and maintain co-operative and functional relationships with the 1.3.2.i synod Superintendents;
 - assist synods in relation to matters relating to parish and district 1.3.2.j boundaries:
 - 1.3.2.k provide review and development material for parishes;
 - encourage, support and facilitate development and provision of ministries 1.3.2.1 for ethnic groups:
 - administer grants-in-aid, other development grants to parishes and 1.3.2.m Districts, the James and Martha Trounson Benevolent Fund, the Winstone Memorial Trust Fund, the Stipend Subsidy Fund, and other funds designated for ministry or mission which Conference may ask Mission Resourcing to administer;
 - facilitate research that will help shape future mission and ministry policy 1.3.2.n and strategy and enhance the mission of the church;
 - encourage and enable evangelism, stewardship and other programs as 1.3.2.0 from time to time may assist the church to fulfil its mission;
 - provide general oversight of Co-operative Ventures, relating to the Uniting 1.3.2.p

Congregations of Aotearoa New Zealand;

- 1.3.2.q provide direction and support in chaplaincy matters on behalf of the Methodist Church of New Zealand;
- 1.3.2.r any other tasks which Conference may request Mission Resourcing to undertake within the stated purposes of Mission Resourcing.

1.4 Membership and meetings

- 1.4.1 The membership of the Mission Resourcing Board shall be determined annually by Conference and shall comprise up to nine (9) members (including the Director Tauiwi Pakeha Ministries and Director Tauiwi Pasifika Ministries). At least two thirds of the members of the Mission Resourcing Board shall be members of the Methodist Church of New Zealand.
- 1.4.2 The Board shall recommend a Chairperson from its own members for Conference approval, and appoint such other persons as required.
- 1.4.3 The Board shall meet at least four times a year.
- 1.4.4 The Board shall appoint or oversee such sub-committees as are necessary to fulfil its functions.

1.5 Officers

- 1.5.1 There shall be a Director Tauiwi Pakeha Ministries and a Director Tauiwi Pasifika Ministries (who act also as Directors, Mission Resourcing) who shall be officers of the Board, each appointment being a Connexional Appointment (see 6.7.1), and who shall be responsible to the Mission Resourcing Board.
- 1.5.2 Each Director of Mission Resourcing shall be a Presbyter in Full Connexion who will:
 - (a) carry out the leadership of Mission Resourcing as directed by the Mission Resourcing Board.
 - (b) be members of the Presidents Committee of Advice and the Pastoral Committee
 - (c) be resource persons for the Council of Conference.
- 1.5.3 The Director Pasifika ministries shall have primary responsibility within Mission Resourcing for matters relating to Fijian, Samoan and Tongan ministries, synods and leadership.
- 1.5.4 The Director Pakeha ministries shall have primary responsibility within Mission Resourcing for matters relating to English speaking ministries, synods and leadership including Cooperative Ventures.
- 1.5.5 One Director of Mission Resourcing shall be designated Executive Officer Tauiwi Strategy and Stationing by the Mission Resourcing Board and Tauiwi Strategy.

TAUIWI YOUTH MINISTRY

With the momentum that was ignited in 2008 continuing and increasing throughout 2009, the past twelve months have been jam-packed with an array of opportunities that have encouraged, challenged, developed, celebrated and enhanced Tauiwi Youth Ministry, as it had the privilege of working alongside varieties of ministries, practitioners and young people from in and around the wider church and community.

NCYC09: Converge

Following last year's Conference, as many began to wind down for the year, the delegation of twenty-five young people selected to represent the MCNZ (and inevitably the country) at the Uniting Church in Australia's biennial National Christian Youth Convention for 2009 (NCYC09) were only just getting started! Coming from Nelson, Motueka, Wellington, Hastings, Palmerston North, Patea, Normanby, Manaia, New Plymouth, Hamilton and various parts of Auckland, this delegation included members from a wide range of regional and cultural perspectives and backgrounds within our church family. Yet even amidst what could have been seen as a frightful mishmash clash, right from the outset at the first (of two) preparatory hui held, this team naturally gelled and set off for their adventures at the convention in Melbourne, all supported and encouraged by one another.

The delegation's NCYC09 experience was twelve days long, where all youth participants (around 1500 in total) were offered an opportunity to converge over a plethora of workshops, forums, worship experiences, bible studies, and opportunities for fellowship, all focused on celebrating, informing, challenging, raising the levels of social conscience and responsibility, as well as spiritually nurturing the young people in attendance. In addition to sponging in the information and perspectives shared by others, participants were also able to actively engage in a range of learning opportunities which included: taking part in protest demonstrations on human trafficking and fair-trade issues; mulling over social issues on 'walks of discernment' around the inter-city parts of Melbourne's red-light and heavy drug dealing districts; helping to care for the environment by partaking in various community cleaning and tree planting projects; exploring and assisting staff at local indigenous community education and heritage centres; and being merry mischief-makers of the gospel, performing random acts of kindness and artistically sharing messages of peace, love, hope, joy and grace with sidewalk chalk, to name a few.

Since returning back, the delegates have reported to their Synods, Rohe, Parishes as well as Hui Poari about their experiences. From the debrief which was held over a weekend in March at the Whakatuora Centre, there were also a range of ways noted in which each (both personally and collectively) have developed and continue to be touched by their experiences in Melbourne. It is hoped that the new ideas and thoughts on both the issues explored as well as the styles and methods used to communicate them, together with the many songs, photos and stories brought back by each of the delegates will continue to be shared with the friends, family, churches and wider communities around them.

At this point, the delegation would like to convey their sympathy and condolences to the families and communities affected by the bushfires that ravaged parts of Melbourne only a few days after this convention at the beginning of the year. The delegation would also like to acknowledge the work of the Uniting Church in Australia, the Uniting Church Synod of Victoria and Tasmania, as well as all the organisers of NCYC09 for the invitation to be a part of such an awe-inspiring experience! Special acknowledgments for their help, work, love and support go especially to Talaheu Makoni, and Bronwyn and Robin Pryor as our overseas delegates liaison team; (Uncle) Bruce Davis and his angels from the Mornington and Frankston Parishes; the Clayton Cook Island Congregation and the Cambridge Tongan Congregation; as well as all the speakers, bible study leaders, bands, composers, community leaders, chaplains, "Marks", volunteers, drivers, cooks, friends and family that made our adventure in Melbourne a very memorable one. Back at home the delegation would also like to acknowledge their Parishes, Synods, Rohe and Hui Poari, home congregations and families, as well as the staff in the Connexional and Auckland "409" Offices, all of whom so kindly gave their support and encouragement before, during and after this experience.

SeRVNT-HOOD 2009

This year also saw Tauiwi Youth Ministry work together with Wanganui Christian Social Services on two occasions to offer a programme for young people called "SeRVNT-HOOD" (i.e. "servanthood" in text language). The main aim of this programme was to provide eight day intensives which gave young people an opportunity to learn about, work in and engage with examples of ministry from both parish-based and social services/city mission-based parts of the church. At these intensives the participants were invited to step out of their comfort zones and step into the shoes of the social services clients, local parishioners, congregation and worship leaders, and city missioners to begin to have a taste of some of the perspectives that come together in these ministry situations. From this experience, participants were able to explore and reflect on the relevance of 'servant leadership' and 'servant ministries' within the current contexts of the programme and even their own local situations.

Of the many highlights in this programme, one of the main ones for all the participants was in being able to connect with and hear the stories of challenge, testimony and hope shared by many members of the local parish, mission, synod and wider community, whom they had the privilege of befriending during their time in Wanganui. Given its success this year, the SeRVNT-HOOD programme endeavours to evaluate, further develop, and continue as an effective opportunity for young people to challenge their own comfort zones and prejudices, explore what it means to be in servant leadership and ministries, and *'learn by doing and engaging'* with people and places within a current New Zealand context.

Working with Parishes, Synods and Groups within the Church

This year, with continued pleasure Tauiwi Youth Ministry has also accepted invitations to visit, facilitate, assist in or support a range of initiatives by Synods and groups within the church to engage in issues pertaining to youth ministry and young people. This has included: visiting and reporting back to some synods, schools of theology and church services on a range of relevant events and causes; resourcing parish youth ministry reviews, youth rallies and information events; working alongside both newly formed and continued youth ministry work-groups and/or youth committees to plan and scope out future directions; and also includes celebrating with parishes, circuits and groups as they plan, initiate and evaluate inaugural youth camps and conferences, or as they observe special induction, confirmation and anniversary services.

Future Foci

This year Tauiwi Youth Ministry has joined and witnessed the fruition of a host of successful events, initiatives and collaborations relating to both youth ministry as well as the wider church. In addition to supporting the continued development of these initiatives and collaborations, next year Tauiwi Youth Ministry aims to focus further on looking into developing pathways for offering tertiary level training in youth ministry that are practical, complementary and relevant to our current church contexts and ethos. In 2010 Tauiwi Youth Ministry also looks forward to exploring further the issues of understanding pluralism in our current contexts for young people, particularly with relation to culture, belonging and faith communities.

Acknowledgements

It has been a privilege and pleasure for Tauiwi Youth Ministry to have been able collaborate on significant projects and work with the varied groups and individuals from around the Connexion and wider communities, and at this point would like to acknowledge all those who have worked in partnership throughout the year.

Tauiwi Youth Ministry also acknowledges the very much appreciated moral, professional, administrative, pastoral and financial support and assistance which it has received throughout the accomplishment of both its ongoing day to day duties, as well its main events and foci throughout the past year as well.

DIACONATE TASK GROUP

We are the people who heal each other, who grow strong together, who name the truth, who know what it means to live in community, moving towards a common dream for a new heaven and a new earth in the power of the love of God, the company of Jesus Christ and the leading of the Holy Spirit. **Dorothy McRae-McMahon**

The Diaconate Task Group has met one time this year with people from around the church. We continue to uphold the functions as agreed to at Conference 2003:

"The Functions of the Diaconate Task Group shall be:

- a. Discern what God is calling the Diaconate to, and offer leadership and policy for the future;
- Approve and regularly review the strategic direction and vision for Diaconal ministry;
- c. Report to Conference and make recommendations pertaining to Diaconal Ministry;
- d. Provide oversight and administration of finances and designated Connexional funds;
- e. Oversee selection, training, reception into Full Connexion, and ordination of candidates for Diaconal Ministry;
- f. Oversee the appointment and review of a National Diaconal Co-ordinator and Diaconal Advocates;
- g. Undertake other duties as required by Conference.

The Diaconate finds difficulty in being a part of the church that does not provide a place for a diaconal voice in its church community and discussions. However Deacon Advocates have been available and involved at Synod level. Deacon Margaret Birtles reports that the Ministry Enquirers Day was a good opportunity to let people know about the Diaconate as one option for a call to Ministry. That we still need the Church as a whole to be able to identify that it wants to support Deacons in training, and have some clear guidelines as to what they will do. As a church we need to continually challenged about the needs of the Community. We must not wait for them to come to us, but go out and about and get alongside our neighbours, befriend them and offer support. A SeRVNT HOOD Training week has taken place at Wanganui, a combined venture with Tauiwi Youth and the Wanganui City Mission, focused on Servant Ministry.

METHODIST LAY PREACHER'S NETWORK

Background

The Methodist Lay Preachers' Network was initiated by the Methodist Conference in 2003. Its purpose is to process Lay Preacher business pertaining to Methodist, Uniting and Co-operating Parishes.

The Network aims to:

- 1. Keep Methodist Lay Preachers in connection with each other.
- 2. Encourage emerging worship leaders to become certificated.
- 3. Maintain preaching standards by promoting on-going education and accountability.
- 4. Support Lay Preachers by aiding them to be resourced, mentored and valued.

Present

The Network maintains the official data-base of Lay Preachers. At present approximately 280 are listed. Over the past 12 months information has been received and included from Auckland Samoan Parish, Mangere Samoan, Mangere East and HCUC Lay (Pacific) Wellington.

Belonging to the network is a voluntary decision. It requires that we receive information relating to accreditation or on-going training and support and an email address to allow communication. These details assist us to watch for when long service recognition is due and prompt someone in the area to arrange appropriate acknowledgement.

During the year we send out email newsletters with a variety of information, suggested resources that others are happy to share, websites, books etc – in fact anything we can readily get our hands on that Lay Preachers may find useful.

We promote the idea that it is good from time to time have an evaluation completed on the worship led and have available guidelines to assist in this process.

Our information is all the more valuable and accurate if we have some way of obtaining it. At the end of each calendar year we have been sending out an 'annual return' form to all Churches listed with the Connexion. This is emailed to Presbyter/Administration/Secretary and asks that they let us know who their Lay Preachers are and how active in leading worship they have been during the year. Sadly many of these forms do not find their way back to us and some Lay Preachers who are active and accredited are not listed in the Methodist Yearbook.

It is our wish to continue to look after the administration side of Lay Preachers and work closely providing onging support and resources that will assist in maintaining a high standard of worship leading and preaching.

Our mail-outs can also be accessed via the Lay Preachers part on the Church Website.

In areas where individuals and groups have used the Lead Worship study material the feed back has been very positive. Thanks Rev David Bell for tremendous input into this.

Future

We plan to liaise with Wasewase ko Viti and Vahefonua Tonga to encourage the inclusion of Fijian and Tongan Lay Preachers as part of our network and thereby included in the 2010 Methodist Yearbook.

We would like to urge Parishes and Synods to actively acknowledge, value and support their Lay Preachers.

THE CHURCHES EDUCATION COMMISSION *Helping students make good life choices* 'He Tautoko i nga Tauira ki a whaiake i nga huarahi tika mo tou ratou Oranga'

The Churches Education Commission and its team of volunteers have worked hard throughout 2008 and 2009 toward our Strategic Plan's dream statement "Christians serving in every school". We desire to deliver valued and effective services to the state schools of New Zealand through Chaplaincy and Christian Religious Education (CRE).

At our Annual conference in June, Paul Young CEO (also a volunteer), announced the intention to move to the second phase of our strategic plan. The emphasis over the last two years was about strengthening the National office which had been poorly resourced over many years. Paul spoke of the Board's desire to support and strengthen the regional committees in their local implementation of the strategic plan. The aim is to build capability across a range of areas so that we are confident that our services continue to be valued and effective. An integral part of this is to monitor and receive feedback from key stakeholders and in particular from school personnel. An annual online survey is now available to schools enabling them to indicate their level of satisfaction with our programmes. In the main these have been incredibly encouraging however when areas of concern have been indicated, the regional personnel have undertaken to follow up with school and personnel, and provide training or guidance as is necessary to the CRE team. Chaplains have a school review annually and again these have proven to be very encouraging of the service offered by the volunteer Chaplains.

The curriculum used by the majority of our volunteer teachers is called CRE (previously Religion in Life), continues to be well received in schools. This year CEC personnel have produced a supplement for teachers which ties the curriculum in with the NZ school curriculum more closely and assists teachers to highlight learning competencies and values contained within the lessons and to provide day to day application for all students regardless of their personal belief system. This has been well received by all schools.

More than ever before it is vital that CEC provides well trained volunteers to schools. To make training more accessible to our CRE volunteers we have recently produced all ten Basic training modules on DVD with distance learning resources to accompany the filmed module. This will allow volunteers to catch up on modules they have missed in person from the comfort of their own homes. We believe this intervention will help us raise our levels of accredited teachers and thereby the quality of our service. A further initiative to host four regional conferences throughout NZ to provide professional development to CRE Team Leaders and to Chaplains is sure to aid us in achieving our goal and we look forward to these beginning late July through to September.

CEC desires to support local churches in their desire to serve their local schools and a document outlining suggestions for volunteers from local congregations on how to serve their local schools is currently being produced. Entitled "Adopt a school", the booklet contains a range of simple to more complex ideas that will be a means to serve schools and shares a few stories of churches that already do this. These will be available to churches very soon. Please contact your local CEC representative or go to our redeveloped website <u>www.cec.org.nz</u> for further information.

Without the support of a number of denominations and recently a few more private donors, the work of CEC could not continue. In this time of financial uncertainty we along with other charitable organisations are struggling to keep core services resourced. We continue to be extremely grateful for the practical support of volunteer members of the Methodist church as well as for the financial support given over many years. We wish you well in your conference and synod gatherings.

THE INTERCHURCH TERTIARY CHAPLAINCY COUNCIL (ITCC) & AOTEAROA-NEW ZEALAND CHAPLAINCY ASSOCIATION (ANZTCA)

The Interchurch Tertiary Chaplaincy Council (ITCC) meets annually to provide a forum for Tertiary Chaplaincy Boards to come together along with representatives of the wider church, to exercise mutual accountability, to support the boards in their various settings, and to provide a forum for the boards to develop appropriate governance structures.

At the last meeting the Very Rev Bruce Hansen, chairperson for the previous four years, stepped down. He had helped the Council move from its previous task of distributing funds provided from the churches to the chaplaincy boards, to a body which now acts as a point of reference for the Chaplaincy Boards where they can reflect on best practice for supporting the chaplains, assess the various models of tertiary chaplaincy in operation around the country, be a point of accountability between the boards and the churches. We are very grateful for Bruce's contribution to the ITCC.

We received reports from most of the ecumenical chaplaincy boards around the country, and from International Student Ministries. One of the important points which comes out of this gathering is the wide diversity of models that are operating around the country. Not every major tertiary campus has chaplaincy being provided. There is a need to support regional chaplaincy boards as they seek to develop forms of chaplaincy in all institutions and we see the Council as well placed to do that.

Funding of chaplaincies is partly based these days on support from the tertiary institutions themselves, which see the need to take responsibility for the pastoral care of students. This makes it important that we as a Council provide a balancing factor in terms of ministry, and that we ensure that strong links are maintained with the churches.

One of the issues that the Council has begun to grapple with, along with the ANZ Tertiary Chaplains Association, is that of accreditation and training. The first of the two is gaining importance as the Boards are increasingly being called to be accountable to the institutions they are serving for the quality of the chaplains they are engaging on the various campuses.

In terms of training, there are some theological training colleges that are starting to offer "chaplaincy" modules to students. In conjunction with ANZTCA, the ITCC has begun conversations with a view to determining what is appropriate training for someone working on a tertiary campus under the aegis of an ecumenical chaplaincy board.

Since the pulling back of the churches from the full funding of chaplaincy, the Council has had to redefine its focus. There had been limited funds which have been used in past years for seeding small projects. At the AGM it was agreed that this was no longer practical, and that for 2009 the available monies be directed to matters of governance and regional coordination. We are grateful for the funding that the Methodist Church has provided which has assisted the Council to carry out its work and for the support provided by the Connexional Office.

There is always a need for good representation from the churches at the local level to serve on the various chaplaincy boards. We give thanks for those Presbyters and lay people who have committed themselves to serving the church and chaplaincy in this way giving their time and talents to the boards and committees. There are never enough of such offerings and those who have done so are greatly appreciated.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- 2. That Conference affirm the work of tertiary chaplaincy and those who serve in this sphere and commends this work to the ongoing support of the Church.

THE INTERCHURCH COUNCIL FOR HOSPITAL CHAPLAINCY (ICHC)

Introduction

As reported to Conference last year, negotiations were completed with the Ministry of Health for the provision of a new national funding contract. This provides around 50% of the cost of the national Hospital Chaplaincy service. The 5 year contract was back dated to 1 July 2008 and goes through to 30 June 2013. It is worth a total of over 12 million dollars over this period.

The Past Year

The increased funding has enabled the Trust Board to bring to completion a number of projects and move forward for the first time in many years. The payment of "Government subsidies" which ICHC passes on from the contract money for each approved full-time chaplaincy position was increased to **\$25,000p.a.** from 1 October 2008. A loan was also repaid and aided by a cautious approach, and some key strategic planning which led to a return to a more stable financial position for the Board, the subsidies have been able to be increased again to **\$30,000 p.a. from 1 July 2009.** It is hoped this will go some way to redress the fact that there was no increase in the government subsidy from 1997 to 2002 and a significant reduction in the subsidy for many chaplaincy positions during the years of government imposed "population based subsidies" from 2003 to 2008, which placed strains on most the local chaplaincy support committees, who had to raise extra funds to meet the shortfall.

The Common Stipend for Hospital Chaplains introduced on 1 July 2007 has increased by 3.3% from 1 July 2009, the new rate is **\$43,506.28 p.a.** Those chaplains who have achieved Accreditation as a "New Zealand Healthcare Chaplain" receive an additional allowance of **\$2,064 p.a.** (which is unchanged) making a stipend rate for accredited chaplains of **\$45,570.28 p.a.** The maximum rate for locum chaplains increases to \$20.90 per hour. In response to submissions on the inequity of some of the **housing allowance rates**, by Chaplaincy Committee chairpersons at last year's annual meeting with the board, the ecumenical Stipend Review Group has introduced a new formula which includes the urban areas where the chaplains live and work, rather than just a regional approach. Changes have also been made to the Sick Leave entitlement to remove ambiguity in the wording and clarify interpretation. There is also a small increase in entitlement to 15 working days (3 weeks) sick leave a year which may accrue up to 45 working days. Part-time staff have a pro rata entitlement to stipends and entitlements.

Chaplains have not had a Long Service Leave or Sabbatical entitlement. This has been rectified with the introduction from 1 January 2010 of a Refreshment Leave provision. It will provide for an extra month's paid leave after each 5 years of service, subject to the chaplain meeting certain criteria. The criteria include having taken all their annual leave as it becomes available. Refreshment leave will be able to be used for study, retreat, holiday or travel.

A new Code of Ethics for Hospital Chaplains was introduced from 1 July 2009.

The third annual Hospital Chaplaincy funding Appeal in September 2008, had by 30 June 2009, raised over \$120,000 with more donations being received each week. This is a major source of financial assistance to the local chaplaincy support committees, helping them to maintain chaplaincy positions around the country.

The Future

The ICHC Trust Board and each of the 25 Local Hospital Chaplaincy Support Committees are required to prepare strategic plans as part of the new contract. The contract includes the expectation that the ICHC partner Churches will continue to provide significant funding for the chaplaincy positions, and that efforts will continue to be made by the partner Churches and ICHC to obtain additional funding from congregations and local communities to maintain the existing Hospital Chaplaincy Services in each DHB.

ICHC thanks the Methodist Church partner for its past support financially and for its members who serve as Chaplains, Chaplaincy Assistants, locums, and on Chaplaincy Committees and in other ways, and hopes it will be possible for it to continue to provide people and encouragement as we work together to maintain the present number of Hospital Chaplains' positions and the number of volunteer Chaplaincy Assistants.

WESLEY COLLEGE

Introduction

Two significant factors have dominated the thinking of the trustees since last Conference: a followup visit to the hostels by the Education Review Office and the impact of the financial decline on the income of the board.

Property and Investment Council and Hostel Council

In response to the 2008 ERO report an external consultant was commissioned to conduct intensive and extensive reviews of both the management and staffing structure of the hostels and the governance structure of the Trust Board. As a result of the Consultant's recommendations the Board established two Councils – one with oversight of the hostels (the Hostel Council) and the other with responsibility for the property and investment portfolio (the Property and Investment Council). This will allow for the appointment of people with the appropriate skills related to the specific areas of oversight minimising the tension created under the existing structure between the 'cash generating' arm of the board and the 'cash beneficiary'. A means is now in place where future income generating capacity can be built by the Property and Investment Council, and within the Hostel Council a more representative group established to oversee the support and maintenance of the College's residential accommodation and the interests and safety of both students and staff.

At the management level a number of factors had been identified which were affecting not only the effective running of the hostels but also affecting the health of a number of staff who were having to micro-manage areas of the hostel operation. As a result the Trust Board appointed a Deputy Principal (Boarding), realigned some other positions and began a significant professional development and training program for the hostel staff.

As a result of this the hostels and school had a very good start to the year. Management and Board were placed under considerable pressure by a further ERO Supplementary Review. However, the Review visit resulted in an extremely good report, prepared by what could only be described as a very capable team of reviewers.

Another factor impacting on the Board was the decline in the number of enrolments. The boarding roll on 1 March 2009 was 242, thirty less than at 1 March 2008. As a result income was down considerably, compounding the Board's financial difficulties.

Over the next twelve months the Board will be reviewing the methods used to recruit students to the college. Recruitment for 2010 has already begun.

The Hostel Council will be considering the ongoing professional development of staff and the way in which they are deployed.

The Property and Investment Council will be focussing on improving the financial position of the board with the aim of improving cash flow to fund at least the same level of activities AND to explore investment opportunities for the future.

The Trust Board looks forward to receiving the response of the Church, through the Council of Conference, to the information paper on the Special Character circulated to the Annual Synods and Hui Poari. The Special Character document is important to the Trust Board as it is the basis of the uniqueness that is Wesley College. It places obligations on the Board and guides policy and practice development. However, the Board would also want to remind the Church that to hold to such high ideals carries with it a cost: a cost that the Board cannot carry without the support of the church.

The Board, particularly through the Chair, the General Secretary and the Principal, are seeking to attract new Trustees to recommend to the Conference for appointment to the Trust. The task is not easy, but it is probably one of the most rewarding in the church. Members with skills in commercial and management accounting, property development and investment are sought. Whilst backgrounds in law, accounting or education are desirable they are not the only skills required. The Board would appreciate the names of people who could be approached for the role. The

criteria for Trust Board membership is set out in the Wesley College Charitable Purposes and Education Act 1911. The Chairperson, General Secretary or Principal would be able to advise prospective members of these conditions.

Chaplaincy

The Chaplaincy team, Rev Sylvia Akauola-Tongotongo (Superintending Chaplain), Whaea Paewhenua Nathan (Chaplain Maori), Rev Ali'itasi Salesa (Head of Life and Faith), Rev Stephen Tema (Deputy Principal [Boarding] and the Principal, continues to support the emotional and spiritual stability of all members of the Wesley College family. The term-by-term and week-by-week themes for this year have focussed on "Our Special Character". To help students know our Special Character, the 'long form' has been adapted to say: We are Christian; We are Methodist; We are Accepted; We are Called to Be and Do; We Belong – a simplified form that students are able to recall and repeat. It means: We are Christian by tradition, Methodist in ethos, each person matters, everyone is called into action, and we all belong to the family of Wesley College and most importantly to the family of God.

Religious observances are an important part of our Special Character. We continue to encourage, support and witness it throughout the whole community. The Chaplaincy team is assisted by an increasing number of students, staff and whole hostels in worship leadership.

We are grateful that the Zondervan Publishing Company has printed copies of the Wesley College Bible that bears the College Crest and Motto [Fide, Litteris, Labore] on its cover. This identifies student bibles as a Wesley College item: a stationery item for all. A common bible has allowed for the development of regular responsive reading as part of Chapel reading. The texts for the day / for the week are able to be referred to during evening Hostel prayers and students have the opportunity to devote time to personal bible reading. The Chaplaincy team has prepared a Devotional Resources Book 1 to assist with Hostel prayers and personal devotions. Book 2 is being prepared.

We are grateful for the support of the Methodist Church – Te Háhi Weteriana o Aotearoa, sourced by Trustee Rev Diana Tana, for the opportunity to have a two-day Chaplaincy Team Retreat earlier this year. This retreat allowed the team to have a focussed and uninterrupted time for strategising and forward planning.

Property

The Wesley College Trust Board was some what insulated against the global recession due to 91% of the trusts investment portfolio being invested in property.

The leasehold commercial properties have experienced considerable value increases over the past 5 years. This is being realised in the current round of rent renewals. The returns on the leasehold property are limited to 5% due to the nature of the Glasgow Leases. This return is relatively high in the current economic climate.

The freehold commercial property investments though giving a higher return have highlighted the risk of this investment. The Wesley College Trust board has lost 3 key tenants over the last 24 months. Fortunately 2 of the buildings are now tenanted again. The costs of periods of no occupancy and still having one building untenanted have affected the cash flow yield needed to support the College operations.

The Wesley College Trust Board has slowly been divesting its leasehold residential properties. The remaining 7 properties are undergoing their 21 year rent reviews. As the properties have appreciated over the last 21 years the impending rent renewals are coming as quite a shock to the tenants. The Board is working with the tenants, to assist those who are keen to purchase the boards interest, to do so.

The College Farm is a major strategic asset especially considering the moves of the Franklin District Council to rezone Paerata and the surrounding area. The projected growth for this region of greater Auckland over the next thirty years is substantial with the primary redevelopment moving along State Highway 22 which borders Wesley College. The Board's goal to rezone the farm and realise the extraordinary gains seems to be in the 15 - 20 years time horizon. As the net yield from farming this land was returning less than 1.5% yield the Board sought a joint venture partner with the PAC2086 Trust to provide a Connexional partner to assist with the redevelopment costs as they arise and also to generate a lump sum which can be reinvested to provide better cash returns to assist in funding the ongoing College deficit. This enables the Board to continue with the redevelopment goal but also to diversify its investments and increase the net income yield of the total investment portfolio. A new company has been formed between the WCTB and PAC called Grafton Downs Limited. This company now owns the farm. The Wesley College Trust Board has invested the proceeds of the sale of farm with the Methodist Trust Association.

Investments

The Wesley College Trust Boards share portfolio had a write down of \$975,762 in the 2008 financial accounts. The 6 monthly share portfolio comparison for the 2009 year showed a 13% increase in share values of \$255,000, which is promising, though the markets still remain relatively volatile.

Down Turn

Maintaining the College cash flow has been somewhat of a balancing act due to the limitations of the Trust's investment assets and the need to protect the investment asset base in a volatile climate and recognising the increasing demand from College hostel operations. The demands are to fund the requirements of Educational Review Office, Ministry of Education and the Hostel Licensing Regulations (2005) to ensure that there is a standard of care for boarders that meets the requirements of the Regulations.

The Trust is experiencing a period of significant deficit and has been forced to use proceeds from the sale of investment assets to fund operations.

The Trust Board's Councils are examining relevant investments and operations with a view to achieving a balanced budget in 2010.

Outlook

The short to medium outlook for the Wesley College Trust Board's Investment property is promising, cash flow yields will remain relatively constant over the next five years the potential of the leasehold commercial property in Panmure/Mt Wellington under the Auckland City Councils proposed Amity Project is very promising with a likely council initiated zoning change in the near future.

The yield return from the MTA investment and Share portfolio should assist the increasing financial pressure on the College.

Hostel

The review of the hostel governance and management structure has resulted in clear accountability lines. The Hostel Council has had two meetings and is beginning to develop the procedures that will allow the Council to monitor health and safety within the hostels and to pursue the goal that the Board has to demonstrates best practice in all areas of hostel operations.

The Council is comprised of members of the Trust Board, a member appointed by the Trust Board, representation from the Board of Trustees, a male and female student representative, with Mr Colin Telford as Chairperson. The appointment of three parents / guardians representatives will be in place prior to the end of this year. The Council will continue to review its terms of reference.

The ERO report has recognised the above changes and has noted the initiatives taken by the newly appointed Deputy Principal (Boarding), Rev Stephen Tema. The report notes that 'Students spoken to by ERO indicate that they generally feel safe within the hostel. They are confident that if they have concerns they have someone they can talk to for support and that where behaviour incidents occur they are addressed satisfactorily. They enjoy and value the sense of friendship with their fellow boarding students that their hostel life affords.' This is the base from which the future of the College may be built.

Rev Tema has been supported by the Hostel staff while initiating these changes. The Board would wish to acknowledge the hostel boarding and support staff who contribute extensively to the life of the College and the Wesley College Board of Trustees and those who are employed by the Board of Trustees for their commitment.

The Board acknowledges that students at Wesley College achieve well when ranked against other like schools in NCEA qualifications.

The impact of fewer enrolments has been noted earlier in the report. This is particularly noticeable in 2009 Year 9 enrolments. This year the enrolment process has begun earlier and to date the response has been heartening. We aim to reach capacity in 2010 and maintain this level.

The College continues to participate in a wide range of extra-curricular activities. These are some of the notable achievements highlighting this variety. In 2009 Wesley College was the host school for the ASB Maori and Pacific Islands Festival (Polyfest). College Maori, Tongan and Samoan groups were prominent on their stages. Of note, the combined Waiuku College and Wesley College Kapahaka group was placed first in the second section of the competition on the Maori Stage and next year will compete in the first section. The Tongan group were placed first in the Kailao - a hallmark of Tongan male cultural performance. The Year 13 Drama group again won the South Auckland region of the Sheilah Wynn Shakespeare in Schools programme and represented the region in the National Championship. The College Bring It On group, participating in this hip hop dance event, were placed second in the South zone competition and will participate in the coming Auckland finals. This competition is promoted by the Breakthrough Church and aspects of the character of Wesley College are always a feature of the College routine. This year the finale move was stunningly performed to the Halleluiah Chorus. Rugby continues to be the focus sport. This year all College teams are placed in the semi-finals of their grade. Many individual players are selected for Provincial representative teams and vie for franchise and national honours.

This year the Wesley College Grants Committee has distributed some \$311,550 in additional beneficiary assistance to 127 students. This is in addition to the \$1,586,000.00 made available in subsidy funding. A \$6500.00 subsidy is made available for each boarder. The Board notes the significant funding that may be accessed from the Ministry of Education through the Boarding Bursary and Mapihi Pounamu funding schemes for those who meet the criteria. The \$400,000.00 that families access through these schemes assists many to meet the boarding fees.

The Board is very grateful for the continued support received from the Robert Gibson Trust. More latterly a number of Synods and Parishes have made funds available to the Board to assist with beneficiary funding. Some of these donations have been made for immediate and particular disbursement. Other funds have been invested with the Wesley Foundation and will provide the source of funding over a longer period. The Board wishes to acknowledge this contribution to the beneficiary work of the Board.

The Board wishes to recognise the contribution of Rev Andre Le Roux to the life of the Board, especially in regard to his role on the Discipline Committee. Andre's passion for youth and their well-being and his guidance to the Committee in creating a positive way to relate to young people and their families has been a hallmark of his contribution to the work of this Committee.

"SPECIAL CHARACTER CLAUSE" WESLEY COLLEGE INTEGRATION AGREEMENT

THE parties hereto accept and agree that Wesley College was originally established to provide education with a special character and that at the date hereof it provides education with a special character described in this clause.

Wesley College is a multi-ethnic school that has a direct affiliation with the Methodist Church of New Zealand — Te Háhi Weteriana o Aotearoa. The Methodist Church of New Zealand — Te Háhi Weteriana o Aotearoa is a Treaty-based Church that expresses its governance in a bicultural, power-sharing partnership between Te Taha Maori and Tauiwi.

This has historical and contemporary relevance that is expressed within the College as:

- Treasuring our Christian and Methodist heritage and learning to express it relevantly. This includes religious observances.
- Openness to the future and to new insights, experiences and people.
- Support for values which respect the integrity of persons and communities
- Consideration of the needs of others, especially the economically marginalized.
- Use of language and images that are inclusive and which express equality.
- Provision of safe environments in which students can learn to live and work together in harmony.
- Opposition to cultures of violence and to systems of domination and exclusion.
- Processes for dealing with conflict, harassment, abuse and violation.

Wesley College seeks to provide a broad-based education with special attentions to numeracy, literacy and other key competencies. This emphasis on a broad-based education is expressed in the College motto: Fide, Litteris, Labore-Faith, Letters (Learning) and Labour (hard work).

Wesley College has a special obligation to provide education for students of Maori and Pacific Islands descent and students whose family and personal circumstances require special care.

Wesley College caters primarily for students boarding at the Proprietor's hostel with which it has a close association. It is acknowledged by the parties hereto that the Proprietor's hostel provides for residential accommodation with a special character that is an essential component of the special character of the school as defined in this clause.

5. Conference encourages Wesley College to continue develop best practice in all aspects of boarding education.

UNITING CONGREGATIONS OF AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND

Many writers on religion would agree that we, the church, are in a process of transition. The nature of that transition and a sense of what we will become is not clear - but we are certainly facing change. UCANZ is a legacy of another time of change: from the 1960's and 70's when there was an ecumenical dream of church union. Back then we understood what denominations and ecumenical meant. Today it seems that denominationalism and ecumenism are less relevant than they were - and UCANZ, as an expression of both, sometimes finds it difficult to find its place in the churches and in society. As we encounter the turmoil of change in today's world, there is an even greater sense of turmoil for the Cooperative Ventures that make up UCANZ.

Standing Committee has adopted a vision statement: "The Uniting Congregations of Aotearoa New Zealand is a continuing journey of God's people seeking to reflect the essential unity of Christ's Church. This community of Partner Churches and Co-operative ventures is discovering and living out what it means to be a missional church of Jesus Christ in today's world (2008)."

One of the major tasks undertaken in 2008-09 was the survey of all UCANZ congregations. Over 1000 responses were received from just under 70% of our associated parishes. A report has been posted on the UCANZ website and is available for all to read. The age profile reflected that of our parishes, indicating (like many other churches) ageing congregations. Yet there was a latent optimism in most responses and a commitment to the ecumenical dream that founded many of the parishes.

Through the last year rumours and fears of the national dissolution of UCANZ and Cooperating Ventures were circulating and meetings were called with church leaders to help allay these fears and give some perspective to the situation. A very positive meeting of church leaders from all five denominations was held in June 2009 which will lead to a further exploration of what parish oversight means for each partner and for UCANZ parishes.

Standing Committee have met to discuss the issues that Cooperative Ventures are facing and have continued to look at ways to help parishes deal with the demands of having more than one denomination to respond to. For some this is a burden to carry, but for many it is an opportunity to glean the best from each of the partners.

There is good representation on Standing Committee from the partners. The Presbyterian General Assembly (2008) requested their Council to bring a proposal next year to involve UCANZ and we await a conversation on how this might happen. It was good that the Executive Officer was invited and attended the signing of the Anglican Methodist Covenant in Auckland in May 2009. This was a sign that our ecumenical journey is ongoing. As our politicians have found, it is sometimes easier to have bilateral discussions than multilateral ones.

At parish level there have been challenges, opportunities and celebrations for people in Cooperating Ventures. A good number of parishes are coming near to celebrating 40 years of union - it was in 1969 that many Congregational Union parishes merged with the Presbyterian Church in anticipation of total church union.

With supportive funding from Cooperative Ventures themselves, the Executive Officer's role has been expanded to include time and travel around the country. Peter has been able to make connections with many parts of New Zealand and has a good feel for the mood and state of parishes. A new office has also been moved into this year, at 16 Cambridge Terrace, Wellington.

UCANZ has a mandate from our partners to look after Cooperative Ventures - this includes union or uniting parishes, cooperating parishes, local ecumenical projects and shared use agreements. While not wanting to build an empire, it is important that new ways of being ecumenical are aware of the pitfalls learnt from experience. Avoiding working through UCANZ in establishing an interdenominational agreement runs the risk of not learning from our past. One of the key learning points has been the necessity of carefully documenting all the capital assets brought into a partnership. We know that it is far easier to do this when there is less pressure on. We would encourage our partners to keep open discussions with UCANZ and with each other.

FAITH & ORDER COMMITTEE

Presidential Visit

The President, the Reverend Jill van de Geer, paid a pastoral visit to the committee at its August meeting. She shared her impressions of the work of the committee and listened to concerns of members of the committee. She expressed appreciation for the committee's work and encouraged the committee to take some initiatives. It may well be time for the committee to consider offering the church a revision of eucharistic liturgies. It was noted that the last revision of the service of Holy Communion was 1990, and the 2010 would mark its twentieth anniversary.

Common Baptismal Certificate

The President early in the year referred a letter from the Catholic Bishops' Conference proposing the development of a common baptismal certificate. Bishop Barry Jones wrote, "The foundation of our unity is in the Baptism we share, and in order to highlight this, we would like to propose the use of a common baptism certificate, indicating the traditional Christian formula that predates the devision of our churches." This was warmly endorsed by the committee, accepting that it would not involve any change in the wording of our current certificate. It is hoped that the names of all the churches which agree to this would be printed on the back of the certificate.

Lectionary

The Lectionary for the year 2009 - 2010 featuring the Year of Luke was available and distributed at the end of July. The Season of Creation has won a continuing place and it would be interesting for the committee to know how many parishes have taken it up, or at least used it in part. The Lectionary with all the associated resources that relate to it is making a major impact upon the life of the church, helping worshippers to appreciate the rhythm of the seasons of the church year. We record our thanks to the Reverend Dr. Tony Stroobant who takes responsibility for this service of the church's worship.

Joint Liturgical Consultation

This is an annual meeting during which one representative from the Anglican, Methodist, Presbyterian and Roman Catholic Churches report on developments in worship in their respective churches. Held in Auckland in July it also stays in touch with the English Language Liturgical Consultation, an international group which provides revisions of such liturgical elements as the Lord's Prayer. Unfortunately the Roman Catholic Church has withdrawn from this body in the last two years.

Beyond Contempt

The committee is delighted to be the publisher of Dr Stroobant's book entitled *Beyond Contempt*. We are grateful for a generous grant from the Methodist Communications Fund and for support through the office of the General Secretary. The book will be launched on the evening of the 28th October in the Wesley Hall, on the Trinity/St. John's College site. It is a focussed enquiry into the persistence of elements of anti-Jewish attitudes in Christian worship. The work locates the roots of these attitudes, demonstrates how they have become attached to the church's theology and proposes ways in which the church can let go of these attitudes without compromising its gospel. The book will be available for purchase at Conference.

Superintendency of Districts

This matter has been raised in various places in the last two years. It has received attention from Faith & Order in the committee's report to the 2008 conference. It is the view of the Faith & Order Committee that Superintendency of Districts is a ministry of episkope (oversight). In our tradition this is exercised by presbyters. Being in Full Connexion enables them to be accountable to their peers on the floor of conference. We see this as an essential component in our Connexional polity.

Concern has been expressed that the situation may arise in a District where there are no presbyters available to be appointed to the ministry of District Superintendent. Faith & Order considers that such eventuality may be avoided by the Tauiwi Stationing and Strategy Committee planning ahead, and conducting stationing with a view to ensuring that such appointments can be made. Alternatively Faith & Order proposes that Districts can be amalgamated so that a presbyter can be available.

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We accept that a case can be made for lay people participating in the exercise of the ministry of District Superintendency. Here we have a valued development of our tradition. This is already happening in a number of places and what is happening in the Waikato-Waiariki District commends itself to us. There a presbyter and lay steward share the ministry. This model gives expression to a pattern of leadership that has emerged in our church over the last few decades that has received wide acceptance.

This model is that of partnership between lay and ordained. We have it operating at the level of the President and Vice-President where our church law requires the partnership of lay and ordained. We have it at parish level where presbyters work in partnership with parish stewards. The committee considers that this is a healthy model and sees no reason why this should not happen at the District level. The committee believes that in the exercise of episkope that it is desirable to ordained and lay to be seen to be working together.

Stand alone lay District Superintendency is not an approach preferred by the committee. However, should the situation arise where there is no presbyter available to exercise District Superintendency, then Faith & Order could see a lay person exercising that ministry. In consultation with Law Revision, in such a case Faith & Order would see an appointment being made by Conference and the line of responsibility would be to Conference. The two committees would see such accountability being secured by a ministry covenant for such an appointment.

Methodist Roman Catholic Dialogue

The fourth phase of our dialogue in Aotearoa New Zealand began with a meeting in May in Hamilton. The Catholic Church offered warm hospitality and plans were made for the beginning of this new phase. Papers will be prepared by representatives of the two churches on the respective understandings of the nature of sacrament. Catholic members of the dialogue congratulated the Reverend Alan Upson on his forthcoming induction as President of the Methodist Church. Alan has been a member of the dialogue and Catholic members expressed the hope that some of their number might be able to attend the Induction in Christchurch.

Among other things we decided to consider the most recent document from the international dialogue published in 2006. Entitled The Grace Given You in Christ, it offers further reflections on the nature of the church and outlines broad areas of agreement. The report identifies some aspects of doctrine that continue to need further consideration. The preface draws attention to Pope John Paul II's encyclical letter of 1995, *Ut Unum Sint*, in which he wrote, "Dialogue is not simply an exchange of ideas. In some way it is always an 'exchange of gifts." The Grace Given You in Christ engages in the 'exchange of ideas' and moves toward 'doctrinal consensus'; though practical proposals for 'exchange of gifts' it seeks to prepare for 'acts of reconciliation.'

Anglican Methodist Conversations

Faith & Order has valued the collaboration of Mission and Ecumenical in the six years of conversations with the Anglican Church. It has been a stimulating journey and at every step we have encountered good will from our Anglican dialogue partners. The signing by the church leaders of the Covenant at Mangere on Wesley Day represented a milestone in relationships between the two churches. The nature of the covenant and the commitments that the two churches entered into officially on that day may be found in the committee's report to the 2008 Conference.

The goal is visible unity, but the shape that this vision might take is not as yet discerned. What the covenant affirms is that the future of our two churches will be in relationship. The covenant provides the safe and secure environment in which the few remaining theological issues can be resolved. In his book *Strangers No Longer* (London: Hodder & Stoughton, 1990) Derek Palmer offers a model, the "C-Scale" to understand relationships. The C Scale plots competition, co-existence, co-operation, commitment, communion. We have moved from co-operation to commitment but still have a distance to go on the journey toward full communion.

The Methodist dialogue team has been delighted to learn of celebrations of the covenant held in many parts of the country. This is an indication of the covenant becoming widely known and embraced. In the meantime the momentum of the Covenant will be taken forward by an

Implementation Group that will be set up jointly by the two churches. There are two priorities that need to be addressed. The first is the theological work that remains to be done. This involved further work on the nature of ministry and an exploration of how we might arrive at the interchangeability of ministries.

The second priority is to work on how the two churches might work together in various ways in the spirit of the covenant. This will involve taking opportunities to worship together, to pray together, to engage in evangelism, to discover avenues of service that can be undertaken jointly in the fields of justice, peace and the integrity of creation. This will entail a commitment to find ways of collaborating at the local level as well as the regional and national. "What we will yet be has not as yet been revealed." (1 John 3:2)

Sacraments in Local Shared Ministry

The committee has spent a good deal of time given consideration to how the sacraments might be administered in parishes or congregation that opt for Local Shared Ministry. It is acknowledged that there is a variety of viewpoints present within the church on this issue. In bringing the proposal that we have come to, we have been conscious of our tradition in regard to the sacraments, and also the ecumenical sensitivities that exist around these issues. We ask that the church give sympathetic consideration to the proposal. The committee believes that what is being advocated could serve the mission of the church in Local Shared Ministry teams.

The committee offers two papers. The first by the Reverend Norman Brookes, surveys John Wesley's understanding of the sacrament, and how his theology in this regard has influenced Methodist history and heritage. The second paper form the Reverend Val. Nicholls outlines the specific proposal that is being brought, the creation of a third order of ministry, the ordination of sacramental ministers specifically for Local Shared Ministry. The committee expresses thanks to Val for her commitment, enthusiasm and vision of what Local Shared Ministry can offer the church.

The Sacrament of Holy Communion and Ordination - A Wesleyan Perspective

It would not be unfair to call John Wesley an evangelical high churchman, for Wesley that would not be a contradiction in terms. He was of course not high church in the sense of putting any faith in bells and smells but rather in terms of his valuing of the sacraments, and in particular, Holy Communion. Wesley was one who placed great significance on Holy Communion as a means of grace. This is made abundantly clear by his own personal practice of receiving the sacrament as frequently as possible.

New Zealand Methodists on the whole have no doubt that John Wesley was an evangelical in the best sense of that word. But, due to our inheritance of a Methodism influenced by elements of Victorian Protestantism, many tend to overlook Wesley's focus on the sacrament. To understand this aspect of our origins it is helpful to remind ourselves of Wesley's upbringing. It was the spiritual direction John Wesley received from his mother Susannah that helped implant the evangelical spirit. At the same time it was his upbringing within the fold of the Church of England that underlined for him the place and importance of the sacrament. While it is true that after the 24 May 1738 evangelism became Wesley's prime focus he never lost his appreciation of the significance of the sacrament in the Christian life.

It is well known that from 1738 on Wesley moved out of his comfort zone and preached in fields and market squares. This did not mean however that he lost sight of his commitment to the established Church, the Church of England. As far as possible he tried to incorporate those who responded to his message into the life of the established Church. There it was his hope that they would receive the sacrament, preferably on a regular basis, at the parish church. True not all Church of England parishes were willing to co-operate and receive Methodists at the Lord's table. That however in no way diminishes the significance of Wesley's intention. As Colin Williams puts it "the Lord's Supper was in Wesley's view and practice, central to the life of the great congregation". (p.158 John Wesley's Theology Today) This means that not only was the sacrament of Holy Communion very important for Wesley in a personal sense, he also expected the sacrament to have a significant place in the lives of the early Methodists. How could they grow in grace if they did not receive one of the key means of grace? Theodore Runyon, in The New Creation, comments that it was because of this emphasis on Holy Communion that "some of Wesley's lay preachers were eager to offer the sacrament to their own societies, especially in those areas where the local priests refused to serve known Methodists". One can understand their rationale, but says Runyon, "Wesley steadfastly resisted. He argued that there was a fundamental distinction between the prophetic and the priestly offices ... (and that) the latter required authorization by the church and ordination". (p.138 *The New Creation*) Methodist preachers were called to the prophetic role, not to the sacramental office. While God calls men and women to preach, it is the Church acting on God's behalf that authorizes people to administer the sacrament.

We know that Wesley out of his deep concern that the sacrament should be available to nurture the faithful, and his frustration with the ecclesiastical authorities, ultimately ordained some of his preachers to carry out the sacramental role. But this rather than undermining his stance with regard to the sacramental office and ordination in fact strengthens it. What it tells us is this: Wesley was so convinced that Methodists needed to be ordained in order to exercise a sacramental ministry that in the event that no Bishop of the Church of England was willing to ordain any of his preachers he as an ordained presbyter took it upon himself to ordain. In other words the connection between ordination and sacramental ministry was so important for Wesley that he was prepared to risk his own standing in the Church of England to ensure that some at least were ordained. Only then, in Wesley's understanding, were they authorised to carry out this essential ministry of the sacrament in those areas where the services of the established Church were either non-existent (as on the American frontier) or denied to Methodists.

It is true that after Wesley's death in the 1790's the Conference gave Methodist Societies freedom to decide whether they would like their Travelling Preacher to administer Holy Communion. Our understanding is that most did. The Conference set these Travelling Preachers aside by receiving them into Full Connexion and by prayer. This constituted a 'virtual ordination' but the Wesleyan Conference, hoping for the possibility of reconciliation with the Church of England, resisted ordaining. Even so, those destined for the mission fields were ordained. It was at the 1836 Wesleyan Conference that the decision was made to ordain with prayer and the laying on of hands all those who were set aside for the ministry of Word, Sacrament and Pastoral Care. This means that for thirty or forty years it could be claimed that there was technically lay administration. Although lay administration was not uncommon in Primitive Methodism, in the Wesleyan Connexion those who administered the sacraments were ordained after 1836. With Methodist Union bringing together these traditions in New Zealand in 1913 a compromise was reached on this issue. It was accepted that the ordained presbyter would be the minister of the sacraments. However, when an ordained minister was not available, Conference might issue a dispensation for a period of one year.

Local Shared Ministry and the Sacraments

This proposal comes with the support of the General Secretary, Mission Resourcing Directors, Faith and Order Committee and the LSM Workgroup.

Local Shared Ministry is now a reality in a number of parishes. It is important that there is clarity in regard to the presiding at the sacraments. The accepted practice of the Methodist Church is to ordain presbyters to preside at the sacraments. This forms part of their ministry of watching over the church in love. Only where there is no ordained presbyter available, the Conference may give a dispensation to a lay person to administer the sacraments. This is an exception to the rule.

In establishing Local Shared Ministry (as a ministry to stand alongside diaconal and presbyteral ministry), the model is not to be seen as an exception to the rule, but a form of ministry in its own right, operating within the ethos of the Methodist Church, and recognised by the Conference.

The proposal we bring is based on the following:

- Conference 2008 acceptance of Local Shared Ministry as a form of ministry to stand alongside presbyteral ministry; and Conference support for a widely held discussion on the issue of lay or ordained presiding at the sacraments in Local Shared Ministry units.
- 2. As a new model of ministry, Local Shared Ministry holds in balance both the tradition and the opportunity for new expressions of ministry.

- 3. Local Shared Ministry is a partnership of lay and ordained ministry.
- Currently the Methodist Church practices two ordinations ordination of presbyters to word, sacrament and pastoral care; and ordination of Deacons to costly service. Ordination is not about status but about ordering ministry and celebration of vocation.

Proposal for Discussion

- In Local Shared Ministry teams (called Ministry Support Teams) the persons called to the task of sacramental ministry will be ordained. The ordination will be solely to sacramental ministry – presiding at Communion and officiating at baptisms. Sacramental ministers will not automatically be on the list as marriage celebrants. There may be two or three sacramental ministers in each Local Shared Ministry unit.
- 2. Discernment and call is by the congregation, tested by the District Superintendent and facilitation team at the time of the Calling in the Parish setting.
- 3. This is followed by twelve months training in the local setting, facilitated by the Enabler, and resourced from the Synod, Trinity Theological College or possibly other providers.
- 4. At the end of twelve months the Enabler and District Superintendent assess the person's readiness for ordination as sacramental minister.
- 5. The ordination is in the local parish with the President officiating. (the Ordained Sacramental Minister would wear an alb and stole if they wished to).
- 6. At the time of ordination, the Ministry Support Team is commissioned.
- 7. The Enabler continues training and resourcing the team.

Details to Note

- 1. The Ministry Support Team is under a covenant with the Parish and with the District Superintendent. Discipline and accountability are through the Parish and Enabler to the District Superintendent, and hence ultimately to Conference.
- 2. Each member of the team has a job description which defines the parameters of their task.
- 3. If the ordained sacramental minister is no longer part of the Ministry Support Team in the parish, their authority to preside at the sacraments ends. There will be a service to mark the end of that ministry. They no longer have authority to celebrate communion in the parish or in such places as Resthomes etc because that ministry lies within the Ministry Support Team of the Local Shared Ministry Unit.
- 4. If at a later date that person is called onto a new team in the parish or another parish, they will be under the team covenant once more and will again receive authority to exercise their sacramental ministry. They will not be re-ordained. Ordination is for life.
- 5. Whether or not the sacramental minister should be in Full Connexion is a detail still to be resolved. On the one hand, to be in Full Connexion would be consistent with the other two orders of ordained ministry (diaconal and presbyteral); on the other the sacramental minister already has a formal relationship with Conference via the Ministry Support Team's covenant with the District Superintendent.
- 6. The Enabler would attend Ministerial Synod.
- 7. Payments: to members of the Ministry Support Team (including the Sacramental Minister). This is a matter of local policy set by the Parish Council. They decide whether payments are accepted for the Parish or for the member of the team concerned. They must keep in mind the unity of the team.
- 8. It is not envisaged that the ordination of sacramental ministers would be restricted to Local Shared Ministry units only. With the steady decline in the number of ordained presbyters in general ministry, this model may well be viable for parishes where there is no presbyter.

The current position of the Anglican and Presbyterian churches for LSM:

(i) Anglicans:

Ordained sacramental ministers. Called through a discernment process locally. Trained – deaconed – priested locally. Training continues locally provided by the LSM Enablers and workgroup. Can only operate with license from the Bishop to the Unit that called them. When not on the team can not preside. Can be called to another team and their ordination recognised and given a license again. Ordination is considered same as for priest who has come through the ordination system of the Diocese.

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(ii) Presbyterians:

2002 Assembly decision for a third order of ordination. (pre 2002 two orders: ordained Minister, ordained Elder).

Ordained for sacramental ministry in an LSM in a CV that has an Anglican component. (not intended for other applications).

Methodism has seen its life as being flexible. This proposal represents a creative response to the challenge that Local Shared Ministry offers, developing our tradition to meet current demands of nurturing the life of the church and providing for its mission. It has the advantage of being ecumenically acceptable.

Suggested Decisions:

- 1. The report be received.
- That Conference supports the work of the Methodist Catholic Dialogue.
 That Conference commends the Signing of the Commendation of the Commen
- 3. That Conference commends the Signing of the Covenant between the Anglican and Methodist Churches and encourages initiatives at local, regional and national levels in the spirit of the covenant.
- 4. That Conference endorses the committee's suggestion in regard to Superintendency in Districts.
- 5. That Conference welcomes the proposal of establishing a third order of ministry, ordaining sacramental ministers for service in Local Shared Ministry.

WESLEYCOM

Introduction

WesleyCom is charged by Conference to promote justice and social responsibility as a key mission of the Church and to give expression, through social services policy and service initiatives, to the Church's commitment to social justice.

Although the Church has always seen that even in times of apparent plenty there are many without, and there is much underlying in our society that is manifestly unjust, in these times of scarcity, fear, retreat, and resentment, it is clear that our objectives remain of critical importance.

In the last year we have been collectively engaged in:

- The provision of services to many thousands of families, individuals, and communities throughout the connexion and the country.
- Affirming and developing the Methodist theology of social services, in particular what is now becoming known as "strengths-based" delivery, but which has been known to the connexion for some time as "Creating Cycles of Hope"™.
- Welcoming VaheFonua Tonga to our group.
- The violence against children referendum.
- Reaching out to the new Government, providing advice and insight where possible into policymaking.
- Administering the Methodist Women's Fellowship Family Support Fund.
- Administering the Tindall Foundation grant to WesleyCom.
- Supporting the emergence of the Public Questions Network.
- Facilitating a multi-day on evaluation hui for those involved in Methodist social services.
- Supporting Palmerston North Methodist Social Services during a time of organisational stress.

As we move into the new connexional year, WesleyCom will be seeking to:

- Embrace the opportunities presented by the Task Group on Governance and Structure to shift its focus from the four "Regional" Missions toward acting as more of an embracing network in support of all Methodist against and the
- support of all Methodist social service delivery.
- Continue work on the creation of a national identity and some national delivery to strengthen our services and encourage greater public support for our work.
- Continue our support for VaheFonua Tonga's social services and their desire to become a Mission.
- Continue to build, in conjunction with the Public Questions Network and others, a voice of advocacy for respect and love toward those seldom valued in society.
- Continue work at the margins of life, amongst the most challenging circumstances.
- Continue to work collaboratively with all who embrace our policy of Creating Cycles of Hope™.

WesleyCom has continued to recognise the limitations of our own collective name – WesleyCom – in the pursuit of these objectives; and is seeking a decision of Conference to revert to the name Methodist Mission Aotearoa, as signalled to Conference 2008. We believe this name more appropriately reflects our work; provides an easily understood and familiar national "brand" and is welcomed by all current WesleyCom members.

No change to the constitution or Laws and Regulations regarding WesleyCom is implied in this request; WesleyCom believes that structural changes may be made as a result of the work by the Governance and Management Work Group, and seeks to have that group address the issue.

METHODIST SOCIAL SERVICES IN THE UPPER NORTH ISLAND

On 1 July 2009, the structure of Methodist Mission Northern was changed to include two new Trust Boards, the members to be appointed by MMN. Each Trust Board has a specific area of responsibility (and therefore a corresponding skill set requirement within the Board membership)

The financial structure enables funding bodies to better see the actual financial position of the Mission's work, and the assets of the Mission (and therefore church) are better protected. This does not reduce the accountability of the Mission, but creates greater transparency.

METHODIST MISSION NORTHERN

Seini Filiai completes her term on the Board. Seini has been a valuable member to the Mission, bringing both a cultural awareness and an understanding of government bureaucracy and statistical analysis. The Board wishes both her and Taufa well as they return to Tonga.

Integral to the life of the Mission, and enshrined in the Methodist understanding of word and deed, is the work of the Chapel and chaplains. Considerable effort has been made to expand the understanding of the work of Chapel (and the Chapel Presbyter) and the chaplains within the various services and to ensure they are not isolated from other parts of the Mission's work. To that end the Presbyter has been engaged in a project of developing the service which is seen as a key service offered to the community by the Mission. At the same time, the function of the chapel to engage, challenge and nurture the spirituality of the inner city has been an intentional focus. The question of what it means to be "a presence in the heart of the city" has engaged the Board, presbyter and congregation – the task continues.

During the year the Auckland Deaf Christian Fellowship was reviewed by the Auckland Synod and after heart searching consultation, consideration of their Constitution, its life as an ecumenical Fellowship within the Methodist Church of New Zealand, coupled with a desire within the Fellowship to find alternative worship facilities, some significant decisions were made. The ADCF has a new 'home' at the Rosebank Rd Church of the Avondale Union Parish. At this stage a formal agreement (or Memorandum of Understanding) is yet to be completed, however the Presbyter has been placed under Question 16 where the Conference has traditionally recorded the appointment of any Methodist Presbyter who is exercising either a chaplaincy or ministry in a part of the church which is not under the direct responsibility of the Church.

Maintaining a mission profile in the community is important, not only for LIFEWISE but for the groups we either are in partnership with or we have supported. Of note have been:

- A service held in the Aotea Chapel involving the Central Parish and the Chapel in support of the Victorian community during the bush fires, the service was attended by members of the Australian High Commission supported by members of the Auckland city community.
- Parishes were involved in the LIFEWISE's annual Hot Water Bottle Appeal, and good relationships are being fostered with them through this creative and fun activity.
- Television, radio and print media feature highly for us. In this case it is often to ensure that there is a strong community, justice, and theological voice heard on issues of importance.
- LIFEWISE sponsored, along with other organisations, the Auckland Human Rights Film Festival. This proved a worth while activity as one of the films featured 'Kicking It', was on the Homeless Soccer World Cup.
- Politicians continue to feature in the network, time with Paula Bennett, Phil Twyford, Nikki Turner, has been of value and importance.
- With the advent of the Auckland Super City proposal, the CEO of the Auckland City Council met with representatives of the Mission – a meeting of far greater value than a 10 minute presentation to a Council sub-committee.

THE LIFEWISE TRUST

Regardless of the politics, philosophy or size of the organisation there are a number of organisations that LIFEWISE has chosen to have a close relationship with. In some cases this is a relationship of mutual minds, at other times it is to ensure we can have some influence, and with some it is to be there as a 'social conscience'.

Auckland University of Technology provides us with useful contacts in the area of social and community policy trends. There is also a useful link into the student pool for research projects, placements, and career path identification – not everyone knows how wide and stimulating some of the opportunities are until they have spent time in LIFEWISE!

The Community Investment Group is another we engage with, it is a useful interface with the large organisations that are looking at ways of being involved in the community and Non Governmental sector.

Recently through the work that The LIFEWISE Centre does in the homeless sector, the Board Chair was invited be a member of the Committee for Auckland. A group that LIFEWISE would not normally see itself involved with, but this is an opportunity to shape some of the thinking of large corporations which want to do the 'best' for Auckland – Auckland University, Carter Holt, Air New Zealand, Auckland District Hospital Board, Waitemata, Auckland and Manukau City Councils.

As part of its new Corporate Social Responsibility approach, Metro Water has recently established a specialist group to oversee the introduction of a different way of ensuring customers in 'hardship' can continue to have access to essential services such as water supply.

LIFEWISE has also developed significant partnerships with the Waitakere Methodist and the Papatoetoe Methodist Parishes through food banks, the Avondale Union Parish through their community development project on the Rosebank peninsula, and then there is our ongoing relationship with the Takapuna Methodist Parish in their Community Development initiative – 'Know your Neighbours'. There has also been the opportunity to contribute to the work of Trinity Methodist Theological College in presenting information to students regarding the work of LIFEWISE and Methodist Mission Northern.

Projects, still being developed are to continue building the good relationship with the VaheFonua Tonga Mission Committee, and another is the Early Child Education Centres, of which there are at least eight in the region providing significant services to hundreds of children.

At the time of writing of this report two new initiatives are being developed and by next Conference more information will be available. The first is Neighbours Day which is a one day event designed to strengthen neighbourhoods. It is not the same as the Know Your Neighbours Project, but it is developed from that initiative. LIFEWISE would hope that from the small beginnings of this one day event, a national event might eventually grow – watch this space. The other is a significant Homeless Youth Project which had its beginnings in the Homeless World Cup Soccer Tournament. The Homeless World Cup was sponsored internationally by Vodafone, and after some careful research here in Auckland, the Vodafone Foundation have provided substantial funding over a two year period for LIFEWISE to work with homeless youth.

The LIFEWISE Centre

An Evaluation Report of the first 12 months operating under the new model of service delivery at The LIFEWISE Centre has been completed by an independent research firm "Positive Thinking". It highlights the considerable success the Centre has achieved in housing long-term homeless people and the value of multi-agency collaboration between LIFEWISE and key Government agencies. This information confirms the importance of our continued future development of the Centre into a Service Hub. In support of a more constructive approach to addressing the needs of Auckland City's homeless population, LIFEWISE is working with the Police and the Chief District Court Judge on a proposal to establish a Special Circumstances (or 'homeless') Court in Auckland.

LIFEWISE Homecare Services

LIFEWISE was one of only four providers to be successful in securing a new 5 – year contract for the delivery of home support services to older people. The contract requires the development of a restorative approach to home support services for older people which enhances their ability to manage at home independently.

LIFEWISE Family Services

This Service has seen some significant staff changes over the past 12 months and a new sense of direction. The focus will be on adopting a community development approach to the delivery of services through consultation with the community. The addition of some new programmes focussed on child and youth development will complement the existing foster care, social work and parent education services well. Our partnership with Parents Inc. in the delivery of "Toolbox" parenting programmes is working well with the number of parents who have been through the programme at LIFEWISE over the past three years passing 750 this year. The Service has also been approached to umbrella a Youth Justice Programme in West Auckland.

AIREDALE PROPERTY TRUST

Residential Care Sites

Consultants have been engaged to research and advise the Trust on the future of Everil Orr, Wesley (Mt Eden) and Franklin Villages. The Trust Board is confident that this work will allow it to make informed decisions in 2009/10.

Investments

During the year MMN agreed that funds available for investment from the proceeds of the sale of the CBD properties would be placed with MTA.

Property Group

From August 2009, the Methodist Church of New Zealand Investment Advisory Board and Airedale Property Trust have formed a joint property management service. This Property Group will be available to provide property management and advice to the wider Church in Auckland.

ONE DOUBLE FIVE

One Double Five Whare Roopu Community House continues to offer inspiring cups of tea to people in Whangarei. Projects that have developed from this interchange over the years continue to flourish. We continue to offer whanau support, counselling and community development support to Marae and community groups in our area.

The community house home team of Margaret Poananga, Carol Peters, Maraea Wharehinga and Debbe Kiriona has been strengthened during this year. Takurangi Yorke is our host, whanau support worker and information technology teacher. Alina Mancini is now working for us as a researcher.

The <u>Whanau Support team</u> has been lead by Maraea Wharehinga and Takurangi Yorke. They supported many families and individuals during this year, supporting people in the personal lives, in getting food and furniture, in counselling, with their children and at WINZ, Housing New Zealand, and with other difficulties. During this difficult time our front line workers have been under strain with the increased volume and complexity of the cases that they are seeing.

Our <u>School, Te Kakano o Taniwharau</u>, this year has had 15 young people learning and growing with us. They have inspired the adults with their enthusiasm and commitment to one another. Our youth team of John Pelasio and Crete Phillips has provided a strong secure base for the group despite difficulties with a place for the project to be. Ruarangi has continued to have problems with the power – the generator is unreliable; with the security, and with general access.

The <u>Community Law Service</u> has moved into its own building beside One Double Five. Katene Eruera, our main lawyer, has an interest in Maori land and incorporation legal issues. Karen Tipa, advocate and manager, has expertise in mediation, in employment law and in ACC issues. Aro and Margaret Poananga and Debbe Kiriona have been developing legal secretariat abilities. This is a strong team who can carry this project forward into the New Year.

<u>The Cyber Project</u> has trialled video conferencing lawyers' services into other areas in the midnorth with unmet legal needs. One of these sites is Moerewa, and we are exploring Kaitaia and Kaikohe as other potential sites.

Takurangi Yorke is teaching information technology in the form of a course 'Keeping up with the grandkids', a course for mature people. Takurangi is now accredited as a NZQA assessor and has been learning how to teach people who are blind with the use of special IT programs. She has also taught on the 'Computers in Homes' project together with Otangarei Primary School.

<u>Television and film production</u>: Channel North has been on air on the 1st August 2008. Most of the people are working voluntarily at present, but we expect the project to be able to employ people eventually. During the year the project, in combination with North Tec, has trained over 100 filmmakers in the Flaxroots courses in film making. North Tec also has diploma and degree courses in multi-media underway. Nineteen schools have joined the Pukeko Echo PET project and will use their school media departments as production houses so that they can be involved with Channel North – Alex Mason and Marilyn Small are coordinating school's involvement.

One Double Five continues to let out quality film making equipment to community producers in Whangarei. There have been some feature length films and a number of documentaries produced during the year. Four teams entered the 48 hour film festival. The quality of films being entered into the NAFF (Northland Amateur Film Festival) festival has improved again this year. We look forward to continued development of this industry during the next year.

The <u>Emergency Housing</u> project is separately incorporated and is supported by One Double Five in an advisory capacity. Facilities are maintained – one house in Kaitaia and two houses are maintained in Whangarei. The project continues to be supported jointly by six local churches. Government support for salaries has still not been forthcoming.

<u>Te Puawaitanga Healthcare Centre</u> has had a good year with stability being provided by an inspired Manager, Lissette Hayes, who has drawn together a tight and effective team. The group appears to be making improvement in the health outcomes for the area of Otangarei. Health promotion activities include working with health and fitness groups, a community gym and a community garden. The Community Renewal project headed by Housing New Zealand and the health project has brought some new projects.

Our core business continues to be hosting people. We are thankful for the strength of long serving members of our group who continue to offer good food, good company and a time to reflect for those who come to call.

<u>The Waka Ama</u> project continues to provide recreational opportunities for young and old in the summer and now also in the winter. Since 2006 - Gail Ambler has been coaching people how to paddle using the two OC6 (six man) waka, and the two OC2 (double) waka owned by 155 based at Kissing Point, Terenga Paraoa (Whangarei Harbour). Over that time, huge numbers (estimated to be over 200) people have experienced the sport of wakaama. Gail Ambler has had assistance from other experienced paddlers during this time but she has consistently turned up from Monday – Thursday at 5pm to take people paddling. Most nights all through the year, both waka are used and sometimes, particularly in summer, people wait to take turns in the two waka available for use.

Wakaama is generally known as a highly competitive sport, for this reason it can be difficult for new, inexperienced people to start paddling. Many paddlers tell stories of literally having to 'sit on the bank/beach and watch' whilst waiting for a seat in a waka to be vacant. What happens at Kissing Point is the opposite approach to this, with the philosophy of openly encouraging new people to take up the sport of paddling.

Currently Monday and Wednesday are the dedicated 'social' paddler nights – this is where a few experienced paddlers in the club go down and take new, beginning paddlers. At these sessions we focus on teaching technique, safety, etiquette and mostly enjoyment. As people progress, and

get more serious, they can paddle on Tuesdays and Thursdays. On these days the paddles are longer and more intense (e.g. Onerahi wharf 10kms, LollyPop 13kms, Pools 7kms, Frigate ships 6kms). There are two teams training at present for Tauranga waka fest 2009. They use the waka out of the peak times so as not to interfere with other paddlers.

Conclusion

Thank you to our sponsors and volunteers that have worked this year to make our project a place that supports people with the vision to improve their own situation and the community in which we live.

BAINBRIDGE

This past year has been one of consolidation for the Manager, Alice Whare, and staff of the houses which for the past fifteen odd years have provided support for people experiencing mental illness. The Board has fully supported the work of Alice and her staff with the providing of outstanding service in our community and which has been held in high regard by the DHB and clients of our services.

The audit in mid 2008, which was welcomed, highlighted many idiosyncrasies in our service delivery and these were set upon and rectified by the staff who then reported implementation of change to the DHB.

It would appear that we are in calmer waters but the tide of change is upon us as we now align ourselves with the National Mental Health and Addiction Action Plan and therefore we are reconfiguring our services to meet this changing service delivery model.

In line with this change the Staff has been steadily training up in the AOD area, and the service to AOD clients has been well received and appreciated by the Rotorua community. Furthermore our contract into the future for presentation to the DHB has focused on this change and we are hopeful that this will be accepted by the Funding Manager at the DHB. Certainly much time, thought and attention has been given to following the DHB's request for innovative and broader services within the four houses that we have at our disposal.

Whilst the Bainbridge Trust houses have developed a very effective, recovery-focused supported housing model the service may now be implemented to a slightly different user group – the AOD client. They too usually have mental health issues in conjunction with their drug and alcohol addictions.

This will mean that 9 of our 12 bed facility will be dedicated to providing a continuum of support for clients engaging in a recovery journey from problematic AOD use and we are well positioned to support with accommodation during pre and post treatment. The 3 other beds will focus on independent living support for our mental health whatora as a crisis mental health respite component.

We continue the vision of the late Noel Pachoud in the dedication to those marginalised in the community by mental health issues and now add those with alcohol and drug dependence.

EMPLOYMENT GENERATION FUND

The fund was created in 1992 to create employment by assisting small businesses through funding advances. Key points achieved during the past were:

- In the last year: two advances and one grant totally \$13,500 were made.
- Jobs created since the fund started now total 338 FTE (full time equivalents).
- The level of loan activity was less than last year, a disappointing result given the expectation that in the present economic climate demand would have increased. Following the change in policy last year several investment opportunities have been, or are being, evaluated.

The net operating and asset results reflect the level of grants received each year; this year the fund has not received any grants. Like most organisations, the investment income of the fund has been adversely affected by turmoil in the financial markets. The balance sheet reflects a lower level of provision for bad debts, anticipated following the major review conducted last year when a large rump of debts was written off.

Looking ahead:

- The Trustees and Management Committee will continue their efforts to improve the financial sustainability of the fund by seeking new investment ventures, and prospective partners will be approached to partner the fund in its next stage of development.
- The management committee will actively promote the objectives of the fund and continue to seek out ventures needing financial support.

The Trustees and Management Committee acknowledges and is extremely grateful for the ongoing support it receives from Methodist Mission Northern.

TAMAHERE EVENTIDE HOME AND RETIREMENT VILLAGE

We have had an excellent year with continued high occupancy levels and the opportunity to increase our bed capacity with 2 beds in the dementia unit and 3 in the rest home. This will have a positive impact on the next financial year.

We had full occupancy for the year with an ever expanding waiting list. Tenants made good use of our catering service, transport and nursing services. The real value of this project can be measured in the social benefits to the residents with increased social integration and participation, ability to attend Church services on site, nursing services and catering services suited to their needs.

The high occupancy level of the previous year was maintained and improved on. A waiting list for rest home and dementia beds continued to increase and demand remain very high. The occupancy levels were as follows:

- Rest Home 100% (2008 100%)
- Dementia Unit 100% (2008 100%)
- Villas 100% (2008 100%)
- Apartments 100% (2008 100%)

The demand for respite care beds remained very high with 768 (2008 - 864) bed days occupied for this service at a value of \$74,245 (2008 - \$58,038). The availability of beds for respite care restricted this service as respite beds were at times used by long term rest home residents.

The nurses and caregivers under the leadership of Cushla Wolland, Clinical Services Manager provided excellent services to the residents and their families.

The Day Care programme had an average monthly attendance of 281 (2008 – 246) client visits and showed continued growth. Changes in the programmes that we offer had a very pleasing

impact on the residents using this service. Referrals received from DSL had a strong dementia/memory loss basis indicating that families keeping residents with dementia in the community are experiencing problems with providing care.

The therapy staff, lead by Chris Brocket continued to provide a diverse and entertaining programme of activities and outings for the residents. The contribution of the volunteers which includes Rev Len and Hilda Schroeder, Bill Gibson, and Dr. Jenny Mau is very much appreciated. This is further enhanced by the relationship with Hillcrest High's Independent living centre and Insight Learning providing opportunities for the special needs students to interact with the residents.

Special events included Daffodil Day, Volunteers Christmas Party, Melbourne Cup, Easter, Residents' Christmas function, Queens Birthday, Mid-Winter Christmas, Mothers Day, Fathers Day, Halloween, Guy Fawkes, Trip to Cambridge Town Hall Christmas display, Waitangi Day, Valentines Day, Bus Trip to Raglan, Anzac Day and on site shopping with Rose Lynn Fashions.

A total of 6,648 (2008 - 7,125) meals were provided to tenants and village residents as well as catering for funerals and other out catering opportunities. Special attention is given to the presentation and serving of meals, morning & afternoon tea and birthday cakes. We appreciate the fantastic service and positive attitude from the manager Jody Pijnenburg and chefs David McIsaac, Donna Christian and Ellen Erb.

Five villas became available for sale during the year and sold at the valuation, with a net income of \$148,082. The valuation of a two bed room unit remained at \$250,000 (2008 - \$250,000). We have a substantial waiting list for the Villas.

Social activities included Happy Hour, Putting competitions, Petanque, Crafts, Trips to Raglan, Pirongia, The Ole Creamery Cafe, Lily Pad Café, Willow Glen Café, Lake Karapiro, Christmas Lunch, Mid-Winter Christmas Lunch and Shopping at Chartwell and Hillcrest. The purchase and delivery of groceries through a fax order system from New World is well used by a number of residents.

We maintained our ISO 9001/2000 accreditation. The Ministry of Health Certification was a special achievement this year as we achieved a four year certification, one of six organisations in New Zealand to achieve this. Special mentioning of our excellent diversional therapy programme and staff training was made in the audit.

Ian Rowe made an excellent contribution to the improvement of the buildings with a very practical approach and top knowledge on achieving the very best results. Examples of this are the upgrade of the State Highway 1 foyer area and the change in windows at the medical room creating a very interesting and enjoyable area for residents.

The presentation of the gardens continues to be a source of pride and enjoyment for all. Greg Yates changed the SH 1 entrance gardens and provided many smaller areas of colour and interest for the residents and staff to enjoy.

Staffing was very stable over the past year. The contribution of nurses, caregivers, therapists, chefs and other staff is appreciated and it is one of the most important factors in the success we achieved during this year. Housekeeping manager Gwenyth Dunford retires after 12 years of service and our best wishes goes with her on a well earned retirement.

The spiritual worship runs very well under the leadership of our Chaplain, Reverend Alice Hill. The Chaplain leads communion services in the Rest Home & Dementia Care Unit and takes a Sunday Service on a regular basis. The Chaplain also provided for the spiritual needs of our staff.

The Catholic Ministry has a monthly service which includes mass, reconciliation and anointing the sick on the 1st Friday of the month led by Father Joseph Akkara. Bishop Brown paid a special visit to the residents in June 2009.

We appreciate the contribution the abovementioned Individuals and Churches made to the spiritual life of our residents, families and staff.

A major contributing factor to the success of the Trust is the vision of our Board of Trustees, and the supportive and creative environment in which the Board allows management to operate in.

Providing services to the elderly in a Christian environment, focussed on quality of care, differentiates our services to that of our competitors and staff commitment thereto is reflected in the excellent audit results of the past year.

The death of our beloved kaumatua the Rev. Morehu (Buddy) Te Whare back in March was a significant event for our agency. Being away in Nepal I unfortunately missed his tangi, but I'm grateful to the staff and board members who attended the funeral service and honoured our matua. We will look to establish a suitable memorial in the near future.

Governance Highlight

The June meeting of the MCA Board adopted a new Business Plan to guide operations for the next two years. The Business Plan focuses on developing and building key partnerships, principally with the twelve Methodist-related congregations in Hamilton. To this end we have advertised for a *Community Liaison and Development Worker* and are hopeful of making an appointment in the not too distant future.

We want to be realistic about what a small agency like ours can achieve. We are seeing a key role for MCA is to liaise with local parishes and encourage and resource them in their social service /social justice and community development work, rather than doing it all ourselves.

Research Opportunity

We were glad to host Kylie Fisher, a third year social science student on a three month research placement investigating homelessness.

Programme & Services

Despite our numbers being down by 3% overall (largely due to a 20% decrease in numbers attending the Enderley Park Community Centre's OSCAR programme), five of our principal programmes have shown increases over the previous twelve months, namely 'Move to Music' (34%); Team Sports (32%); Computer Education (29%); 'Choices', healthy lifestyle programme (19%) and Foodbank referrals (8%).

Ecumenical Dimensions to our Social Justice Work

MCA has been at the forefront of *coordinating opposition to the Hamilton City Council's proposed Variation 13 to the Proposed District Plan.* Variation 13 seeks to restrict the future development of managed-care facilities in residential areas, particularly youth justice facilities. Community agencies and central government departments are united in their opposition to what we see as "discriminatory legislation, contrary to human rights, contrary to government disability and health policies and not based on any evidence of harm".

Last month the Hamilton Council of Christian Social Services hosted a very successful 'Alternative Economics Hui'. One of the practical suggestions to come out of the hui was to establish a 'time bank' within the Foodbank. This would hopefully help move clients from being recipients of charity to making an active contribution to the community.

VAHEFONUA TONGA MISSION

Kia Ora and Greetings in Christ. King Tu Heitia and Tangatawhenua is acknowledged and leaders of the Methodist Church of New Zealand. The Vahefonua Tonga established its Mission arm in 2006 as a response to the call of Christ from within the community or the gospel in society. A group of interested volunteers got together prayed and started working and journeying together with all who responded to the challenges and invitations from the Vahefonua Tonga Mission.

An initial feasibility workshop proved that Tongans and Pacific people in New Zealand were in real difficulty. It was found out that government departments, existing professional and voluntary social services and missions were and are only able to help the tip of the iceberg.

The Pacific Peoples Are A Youthful Population Group

The median age of Pacific peoples in 2006 was 21.1 years, which is considerably lower than the median age of the New Zealand population overall (35.9 years).

Thirty-eight percent of Pacific peoples (100,344 people) were aged under 15 years in 2006, down slightly from 39 percent in 2001. This was much higher than for the New Zealand population overall (22 percent).

Pacific Peoples with a Post-School Qualification

In 2006, 22 percent of Pacific peoples aged 15 years and over had a post-school qualification, up from 17 percent in 2001. There has been a corresponding decrease in those whose highest qualification was a school qualification – from 47 percent in 2001 to 43 percent in 2006. The proportion of Pacific peoples aged 15 and over who did not have a formal qualification has remained stable, at 36 percent in 2001 and 35 percent in 2006.

Pacific elderly

In 2006, those aged 65 and over made up 4 percent of Pacific peoples, up from 3 percent in 1996. This is much lower than for the overall New Zealand population, of whom 12 percent were aged 65 and over in 2006.

Lower Income

The median annual income for adults (people aged 15 years and over) of Pacific ethnicity was \$20,500 in 2006. This was lower than the median annual income for New Zealand overall (\$24,400).

Pacific Peoples in the Labour Force

Sixty-five percent of adults (people aged 15 years and over) of Pacific ethnicity were in the labour force in 2006 (107,613 people). Men were more likely to be in the labour force than women: 71 percent of Pacific men were in the labour force compared with 59 percent of Pacific women. The percentage of those in the labour force who were unemployed 11 percent were unemployed in 2006.

Labour Market

Pacific people are under-represented in the labour market and over-represented in unemployment statistics:

- The Pacific unemployment rate now increased from 9% to 11% compared with Maori (11 to 13%) and New Zealand's general population (5%) (*Statistics New Zealand at February 2009*);
- Pacific peoples projected to comprise 13% of New Zealand's workforce by 2051. (Source Governments approach to Sustainable Development, DPMC 2007);
- Manufacturing is the most common industry group for Pacific workers, employing 33% of men and 17% of women (*Pacific Progress Report 2007*); and
- Pacific peoples are less likely to be self-employed.

Alcohol Harm

- 1 4 Billion Dollars a year
- \$655 million Health Sector
- \$240 million in Crime
- \$200 million in Welfare
- \$330 million in other expenditure
- 25% of death in 2006 are Pacific

Tuberculosis

The rate of tuberculosis (TB) in New Zealand overall is comparable to that of other developed nations, however the rates in Auckland city are consistently recorded as the highest in New Zealand, often 2-3 times those of areas outside Auckland.

Although the major contributing factor to TB in Auckland is migration from countries with a higher TB rate than in New Zealand, 'home-grown' TB, leading to outbreaks primarily affecting young children, has been a recurring theme in recent years, particularly among Pacific and Maori populations. These occurrences are often precipitated by socioeconomic deprivation and household crowding, and have been present in Tamaki.

The Vahefonua Tonga Mission (VTM)

The VTM have successfully established good working relationships with Government departments such as the Ministry of Pacific Island Affairs which have joined with Best Training Ltd in sponsoring the annual Vahefonua Tonga Education and Training Expo in Mangere since 2007. The support of the Methodist Church (Prince Albert College Trust) is acknowledged. Roadshows in other centres such as Wellington, Gisborne, Hamilton and Christchurch have started with emphasis on Literacy, Modern Apprenticeships and assistance with National Certificate in Educational Achievement (NZQA).

The leadership and support of Lifewise and WesleyCom ensures quality, safe and confident journey into the future. The next phase (2010) VTM is working on is the establishment of its Social Service initiatives to implement primary services to address Domestic, Street and Gang Violence; Safety at Schools, Churches, Parks and at all events; Poverty; Unemployment; all types and forms of abuse, drugs and alcohol; rehabilitation, health and other welfare programmes; education, cultural; Treaty of Waitangi and resettlement and so on.

Vahefonua Tonga looks forward to working together with WesleyCom; Lifewise and all other Methodist Missions and sectors of the Methodist Church of New Zealand in delivering quality services in the near future and also the formal launching of its mission whenever appropriate and also its name and logo once they are finalised. To God be the glory, Shalom from the Vahefonua Tonga Mission Team.

METHODIST SOCIAL SERVICES IN LOWER NORTH ISLAND

A range of Methodist connected agencies provide social services for people in the lower North Island. This report provides a summary of the work of three agencies; Christian Social Services Wanganui, Palmerston North Methodist Social Services and Wesley Community Action.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICES WANGANUI

The past 18 months have been incredibly busy for the City Mission in Wanganui run by Christian Social Services Wanganui, which is an ecumenical mission of Methodist, Catholic, Presbyterian and Anglican Churches in Wanganui. Being ecumenical has its blessings and its challenges. But the most challenging part of this non government funded City Mission is keeping up with costs against donations. For a small city with all its 'well publicised problems', it is a most generous city and continues to amaze me with its generosity. I cannot deny that God performs miracles daily in and around the City Mission, in His care of our mostly non church going staff of 7, and our 105 volunteers, but mostly in the changes in people's lives in and around the City Mission. Seldom does a day go by, without some amazing declaration of a life being different. Mission is where we all should be focussed if we are to carry out our baptismal vows, mission is the outward expression of our experience of God in our lives.

These months have seen a new group of people seeking the Missions help, those people who may not have faced hardship before have faced it now, with unemployment, rising costs and mortgages that were set when things were manageable. Those considering suicide as a way out and a provision for their family through high insurances struggle in a world they had not experienced before and have difficulty adjusting to. Beneficiaries have faced this before and continue to hang in there adjusting their life as they always have and waiting for times to change.

An exciting venture for the City Mission was to host two SeRVNT HOOD Training events for Youth, a joint venture with the City Mission and Tauiwi Youth. This as you may have read in the Touchstone offered young people a time living and working within the Mission and reflecting on their experience both during the week and also in a church service at the end of the week. It is our commitment to host these twice every year as long as we are able. We thank the Robert Gibson Trust for funding to make these possible.

It is our anticipation that for the next two years the work of the City Mission here in Wanganui will continue to be busy, will continue to struggle for funding and will continue to touch people's lives. Although we would rather never need to have such places as the City Mission, the reality is that we do. As long as there are people who need hope, then as a Church we need to be focussed on Mission, we need to be 'contributing churches' and not just 'consumer churches'.

WESLEY COMMUNITY ACTION

Wesley Community Action continues to work hard helping bring forth just and caring communities. This is done in a low-key manner across a wide range of communities in the lower North Island and all in the name of the Methodist Church. The organisation has achieved solid recognition as a robust, innovative and hard working team of people that does not shire away from challenges. There have been numerous challenges and new initiatives on the boil - these include; redeveloping Wesleyhaven facilities, working with 'hard to reach communities' undertaking a research on the health impacts of having a family member in prison, and managing increased

demand for services. The Methodist Church can be proud of the work of this agency. Copies of our annual report and details of our work are available on the web site <u>www.wesleyca.org.nz</u>.

PALMERSTON NORTH METHODIST SOCIAL SERVICES

PNMSS has under-gone significant organisational change in the past year. This was sparked by the President and Vice President initiating a process to help the organisation get back onto a more stable footing. Most significantly operations have now been divided between Social Services and Goodwill, each with separate management and governance arrangements. The restructuring involved rationalising staffing within the social services operation resulting in a reduction in both counselling and social work capacity and the disestablishment of the Practice Manager position. The Board of PNMSS is pleased to inform the Connexion of the appointments of Frankie Maney, Manager Goodwill, and Dr Michael Dale manager social services.

The agency is now well positioned to consolidate delivery of core counselling, social work and educational services and to pursue new opportunities. A strong professional culture is evident amongst staff who have demonstrated commitment during what has been a difficult period.

The assistance provided by the review team (Laura Black and Peter van Hout) and the leadership demonstrated by Carol Searle (Board Chair) has been valued and appreciated.

A farewell was held for Michelle Grey, former Director. Michelle's passion, dedication and effort was acknowledged by staff and the community who have worked with her.

2008/09 Key Results

Counselling Service

- 164 new clients participated in a total of 940 counselling sessions this year (cf. 207 in 07/08)).
- 45 of these were children and 36 were parents of these children.
- The reduction in numbers was due to three factors: (1) a decision was made to reduce the caseload of the counsellors (2) clients have presenting with more complex issues requiring longer periods of counselling (3) a reduction in counselling intern hours.

Education Service

- 262 programme participants.
- Family Programmes 71 families have participated in (80 parents and 99 children).
- Personal Development Programmes 68 participants.
- Professional Development Workshop 15 participants.

Social Work & Foodbank Service

- 60 families and 31 individuals have been assisted.
- Partnership with the Learning and Growing Together Trust has been effective work with 33 families the focus of practice has been in the Teen Parenting Unit.
- 1337 emergency food parcels have been issued (1024 in 2007/08).

METHODIST SOCIAL SERVICES IN THE SOUTH ISLAND

CHRISTCHURCH METHODIST MISSION

On review of the last Connexional year 2008/2009, the following have been key themes for the Christchurch Methodist Mission. We will expand on these themes in the body of the report:

- Times of change meeting major challenges in leadership and direction.
- Review of Services.
- Cycles of hope for the Mission and its clients.
- Board Membership.

Times of Change – meeting major challenges in leadership and direction:

The Christchurch Methodist Mission (CMM), together with the other Methodist Mission Aotearoa entities, is a large business and service unit with an operating budget of \$7,472,805 in the last year. We employ 160 people, offer a wide range of social services tailored to individual and whanau need and carry a large compliance cost for administering government contracts, complying with the Charities Act and reporting to the connexion.

With this background, the loss in February 2009 of a highly regarded leader in Reverend Michael Greer has been a huge challenge for our organisation. Unfortunately, the Connexion is not well placed to support the Missions with succession planning and organisational assistance at times such as this. The responsibility placed on the CMM Board and management staff is very high. We believe they have acquitted themselves very well on your behalf and on behalf of the Mission's clients. At the time of writing the 4+4 process is not completed, but by conference we will be able to commend to you two people for leadership of the Parish and Mission beginning in 2010. We look forward to getting back to full strength and being able to continue offering prophetic and responsible social justice leadership, through WesleyCom and the Connexion. We also hope to improve parish social service resourcing in the upper South Island.

Review of Services

Services for the Elderly

There continues to be demand for our residential services, with occupancy averaging between 90% and 95%. Although the facilities themselves require major upgrading, the continuing high level of occupancy in both the Rest Home and the Hospital is a reflection of the high standard of care and the adherence to the values of the Mission. As advised in last year's annual report, aged care services are being reviewed to reflect the changing environment for older person's health services.

Community Services:

ChildWise

There continues to be a high demand for child and parenting services with all programmes being fully utilised. Waiting lists have been established to cope with the increase in demand. Whilst this is not our preferred demand management option, clients are choosing to wait for our services rather than be transferred to another agency.

Te Kete Oranga

There has been a steady increase in the number of people accessing this service all year. Referrals for budgeting and advocacy support are continuing at a steady pace.

A strong partnership with other providers is well established. Informal agreements with members of the Food bank Forum are effective and food supplies are shared amongst the Agencies when possible.

Education and Community Services

The Parent Wise programmes at Aldersgate and Papanui are well attended as is the Parenting through separation programme.

The Child and Youth Advocate, has developed a Family Violence Toolbox for use in Canterbury Schools. This toolbox has been chosen as a National resource and will be distributed by Child and Youth Advocates around New Zealand.

Aratupu

Aratupu Early Childhood Education Centre is regarded by educationalists as a national model for provision of ECE to children and whanau who are at-risk. Ideally we would like to replicate this model in other parts of the South Island. Our Tumuaki already provides leadership and education to other ECE teachers.

Cycles of hope – for the Mission and Clients

Our vision is of a socially just and inclusive society

Like all other organisations providing social services, the Christchurch Mission is experiencing a significant increase in demand for services. All services are at capacity with contracted annual volumes being realized within a shorter time frame.

Whist the Canterbury Employers Association maintains that Canterbury has fared better than other regions during this recessionary period, there is still significant hardship particularly in the manufacturing sector as numbers of employees are laid off.

The Canterbury Community Trust has posted a 15% reduction in funding for community and welfare organisations, and the Christchurch City Council is reducing community funding by \$750,000 per year over the next two years. With this permanent allocation reduction comes a real concern in the region that grants to the NFP sector will be significantly cut.

The challenge, during the current year and into the foreseeable future, is in our ability to respond positively to the forces surrounding us, to work hopefully and to harness the goodwill of the community to work for social justice.

Board Membership

We accept, with regret, the resignation of Rev. M. Greer as Superintendent and Ms Sue Spindler. We thank them both very much for their very valuable contribution to the Christchurch Methodist Mission.

In Summary

2008/09 has been a challenging year and we are meeting the challenge. We feel privileged to be at the cutting edge of 'Word and Deed' on behalf of the Methodist Church of New Zealand – Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa in the South Island - Te Wai Pounamu. We seek your ongoing support to continue this journey, conscious of the rapidly changing needs in society.

DUNEDIN METHODIST MISSION

During the last Connexional year the Dunedin Methodist Mission has continued to deliver outstanding social service, particularly focused on South Dunedin (a Ministry of Health Deprivation Index decile 10 community).

However, in the last year demand for our service has grown by between 25% and 50%, just as funding support from Government has been frozen or cut, and as the value of our investments shrank by over 14% (a reduction of nearly \$670,000).

This is by any measure a "rainy day" – the time when all our resources, spiritual, emotional, skillsbased, creative, or financial are called upon in the service of our communities. Although the Mission has largely been able to meet the increased demand we see the potential for strain on staff as a future risk.

We watch cautiously as the new Government seeks to establish itself and deal as best it can with the crisis, knowing that as some policies are dropped and others created there is often a period of 18-24 months where no real or effective provision is made to deal with the gap. The Mission is concerned that we are not left facing yet another lost cluster of young people exiting schools with no work, no training, and no meaningful social engagement ready for them.

In the 2008-09 year, the Mission has extended its interests into social change issues: particularly better coordination and collaboration between service providers; pushing our local bodies to advocate for "their" people with central government; social housing; economic development for those with the least; and the violence against children referendum.

Internally, we completed our restructure of the management team, so that we are now focused on meeting the goals of our strategic plan (Distinctiveness, Client Alignment, Community Alignment, Balance). We now have the very great benefits of a strong practice base, a good name, outstanding staff, and realistic expression of Methodist theology (an Open Mind, a Warm Heart, a Catholic Spirit, and a Whole Gospel) on our way to regenerating our sense of being a movement.

In our Adult and Community Education service, we

- Added a Family Literacy Project for Pasifika in conjunction with the Pacific Island Peoples' Health Centre.
- Continued the delivery of our StoryBook Dads programme at the Otago Corrections Facility.
- Filled our Youth Training and Adult Learning programmes.
- Finalised a Memorandum of Understanding with Otago Polytechnic on shared resources and pathways for students.
- Opened discussions with the Malcam Trust on future collaboration.

With Children & Families, we

- Expanded Wise Up Walk Tall to eight primary schools (from 5).
- Gained "equity funding" for our nursery in recognition of the particular disadvantage of many of the families enrolled there.
- Added a new support and advocacy worker to our Early Learning Centre staff.
- Extended our waiting list into 2012.
- Dealt with a particularly nasty outbreak of head lice.
- Managed a couple of repeat biters and assisted with the interventions of the Special Education Service.

In Community & Social Services, we

- Saw growth of nearly 50% demand in our support and advocacy services for older people.
- Supported the establishment of a Blokes Shed in Mosgiel. .
- Brought Arahina Family Support Centre (previously an independent organisation) into our family of services.

As well, in partnership with the Parish we finalised plans for our WesleyVillage community centre, succeeded in gaining RMA consent, and successfully began fundraising for the \$4.6m cash cost.

We celebrated Puaka/Matariki as a Mission with many activities across all groups we work with; supported Polyfest; and continued to develop our relationship in Invercargill with Lindisfarne's Outreach Committee.

Financial Performance

At the time of writing, figures for the last financial year had not yet been audited. However, preliminary figures indicate a loss of around \$630,000. Of this, \$250,000 was lost on the value of investments (which we would normally have expected to increase in value). However, investments overall performed almost \$1m better than our mid-year forecast, and we have been able to budget far more positively for the coming financial year. Operational costs came in under budget.

The Mission has readied itself for future growth and significant tightening of its business model, however, we must recognise that this has been a truly difficult year for any organisation dependent on income from investments.

METHODIST MISSION AND ECUMENICAL

Methodist Mission and Ecumenical (MM&E) is the official agency of the Methodist Church of New Zealand (MCNZ) that promotes the church's overseas mission church relationships, its ecumenical relationships both local and international, as well as its confessional (Methodist) relationships.

INFORMATION AND REPORTING BACK

Partner Mission Church Relationships

United Church in the Solomon Islands (UCSI)

Secretary Visit

The secretary will visit the UCSI in December, the timing to coincide with the opening of the Children's and Youth Centre at Munda. He will also visit the Assembly Office, Helena Goldie Hospital, Sasamunga Hospital and the Copra project at Vonunu on Vella Lavella Island.

Children's and Youth Centre

Construction of the Children's and Youth Centre at Munda, funded from donations for the 2006 Mission and Ecumenical special appeal, and a bequest from the late Gladys Larkin, is well advanced. Progress reports have been received. The building is expected to be officially opened in December.

Copra project



This project at Vonunu on Vella Lavella Island has been supported by Mission and Ecumenical since it began in November 2004. Regular detailed reports have been received from the project manager Vincent Ghanny. Its greatest benefit is the impact it is having on local communities, through providing producers with an income. The current world economic recession has impacted on this project. Copra is sold on the world market. The recession has resulted in copra purchasing going into decline, which has brought a lowering of the price for copra with a flow-on effect back to a local project such as that at Vonunu. As a consequence some debt has been incurred. Mission and Ecumenical has agreed to provide some additional financial assistance to help the project cope with the recession and the

downturn in the world copra market.

Helena Goldie Hospital

Helena Goldie Hospital has taken several cost cutting measures in 2009, due to a reduction in government funding, in turn a result of the world economic recession. A staffing review has seen those over the retirement age ceasing to be employed and not replaced .However the community visiting program, which was interrupted by the earthquake and tsunami of 2007, has resumed with the holding of outpatient clinics, an immunisation programme, and other health awareness activities in outlying villages. Building of a medical students' and overseas visitors' and volunteers' house is underway. Mission and Ecumenical continues to pay salaries for the Director of Nursing and for relieving nurses at Helena Goldie Hospital.

Helena Goldie College of Nursing

The Helena Goldie College of Nursing will replace the former Nurse Aide Training School at the beginning of 2010. The Davinia Taylor memorial building will provide the teaching base for the new college of nursing. This building has been funded by Mission and Ecumenical. The opening of the, building which provides teaching rooms, a library and seminar facilities, was attended by Rev Phil Taylor and family in November 2008.



Sasamugga Hospital

In 2008 Mission and Ecumenical began providing assistance for UCSI's Sasamugga Hospital on remote Choiseul Island. Initial funding was for the cost of new staff houses to replace those destroyed in the 2007 tsunami, and for computer equipment. Construction of the houses was

delayed by a shortage of building materials, however work on building them began in 2009. This year a cance and outboard motor to enable the hospital to provide basic health care to villages in its catchment area, has been provided. Funding for two refrigerators, one for the laboratory and the other for pharmacy, has also been provided.

United Church in Papua New Guinea (UCPNG)

50th anniversary of mission in Southern Highlands



In December 1959, New Zealand Methodist ordained missionary Cliff Keightly journeyed into the Nipa Valley in the Papua New Guinea Highlands to begin a new mission. When negotiations over a suitable site were completed, and a lease finalised, a church was built at Puril. The first baptisms took place in 1963. Many more followed in succeeding years. Cliff became chairman of the Highlands District and in 1965 moved to the district headquarters in Mendi, leaving behind a

growing church. Daughters Jenny and Susan will be attending anniversary celebrations. We give thanks for the outstanding service given by Cliff, Noreen and their family.

Secretary's Visit

The secretary visited the UCPNG from 26 April to 3 May 2009. He spent time at the Assembly Office, Metago Training Institute, Bougainville Region, and Rarongo Theological College.

Metago Training Institute

In November 2008 it was agreed to support a proposal from the West Central Papua Region of the UCPNG to establish a Talapia (fish) Farm project at Metago Training Institute near Port Moresby. The purpose is to generate income for Metago and provide fish to nearby village communities. Metago is a pastor training centre for the region. It also offers training in agriculture. In May 2009 the Mission and Ecumenical secretary visited Metago for discussion about the project with the regional bishop, secretary and Metago staff. The next stage is the preparation of a site plan and an implementation schedule. Consideration is also to be given to the appointment of a project manager. The implementation schedule has been received and indicates a completion date of October 2010.

Rarongo Theological College



Ongoing funding has been provided for the purchase of books for the college library. Mission and Ecumenical is grateful for the practical assistance of Dr Keith Carley in this regard. Sixteen cartons of donated books were shipped to the college in May. Book purchases were made in June. Scholarships which cover payment of course fees continue to be provided for four students in training for ministry at Rarongo. Students have been selected by Rarongo faculty staff on the basis of financial need and study potential. Remaining funds from Mission and

Ecumenical's 2007 special appeal, to enable the college to access internet and e-mail, are still held pending PNG Telekom installing cable to the college.

Bougainville Region

The secretary visited this region in May. He met with the President of the Autonomous Bougainville Government, Hon James Tanis, who spoke of the significant role churches of the churches in bringing about repentance and reconciliation in the overcoming of the violence of Bougainville's recent past. In discussion with regional staff it was clear that this church is working hard on many fronts including arms disposal and reconciliation, home brew and marijuana abuse by young people, conflict resolution, affirming human rights, engaging with the HIV and AIDS issue, family enrichment, and providing training in financial management. The region will establish a Leadership and Ministry Training College this year and will submit a proposal for Mission and Ecumenical's financial support.

Disaster Responses

In the past year Mission and Ecumenical has contributed to three emergency appeals launched by Christian World Service: Congo, Gaza, and Sri Lanka. It has also assisted Auckland Fiji Methodist Circuit by paying the freight charge for two containers of supplies to Fiji following floods in January.

Appreciation

Mission and Ecumenical appreciates the considerable support it receives from Methodist Women's Fellowship groups, parishes, and individual church members, for mission activity in the life of the United Church in the Solomon Islands, Helena Goldie Hospital, Sasamunga Hospital, Goldie College, and in the life of the United Church in Papua New Guinea, including Rarongo Theological College. This second mile giving enables us to do so much more in assisting our partner mission churches.

Edinburgh 2010

A global study process involving churches, theological institutions and mission bodies around the world is being developed ahead of an event celebrating the World Mission Conference that took place in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1910. The 1910 event is widely considered to be the starting point of the contemporary ecumenical movement. The theme of the 2010 event is *Witnessing to Christ Today*. A key activity marking the centennial is a study process on nine themes that are at the centre of contemporary missiology. The themes range from the foundations of Christian mission to current forms of missionary engagement, including aspects like inter-religious, postmodern and other contemporary contexts in which the missionary endeavour of the churches takes place. The inter-relations between mission and power, unity and spirituality are also among the themes. Mission and Ecumenical will be taking an interest in the study process.



The outcomes of the study process will be the main input for a 2-6 June 2010 conference hosted by the School of Divinity at the University of Edinburgh. Some 150 delegates from the stakeholder organisations will engage with about 70 delegates from the study process.

Consideration is being given to holding an ecumenical seminar or conference on Edinburgh 2010, in Auckland next year.

Ecumenical Relationships

Methodist Ecumenical Consultation

This consultation continues to meet twice a year and includes representatives of the Mission and Ecumenical Committee, the Faith and Order Committee, and Mission Resourcing. It is a forum for sharing ecumenical endeavours which are spread across these three Methodist agencies. It is not a decision making body.

Anglican Methodist Covenant

The Mission and Ecumenical secretary, and committee members Sheila Thorne and Uesifili Unasa have participated in this dialogue with Faith and Order Committee convenor Terry Wall and Gwenda White. The outcome of six years of dialogue has been the signing of a covenant between the two churches. This took place at Lotofale'ia Tongan Methodist Church and Te Karaiti Te Pou Herenga Waka Anglican Church, opposite each other on Orly Avenue, Mangere Town Centre, Manukau City, on Sunday 24 May 2009. For the Methodists the planning for this event was a joint Faith and Order and Mission and Ecumenical effort.



New Ecumenical Initiative

There have now been four meetings of church leaders to discuss a possible new ecumenical initiative. The dialogue group has formally adopted the name National Dialogue for Christian Unity. It has agreed that the representatives of the churches in the national dialogue are accountable to their own national church structures, while the dialogue group itself is accountable to the national courts of the participating churches. The churches represented in the dialogue include: Anglican, Assemblies of God, Baptist, Catholic, Christian Churches NZ, Methodist, Presbyterian, Quakers, and Salvation Army. The dialogue group is open to other church leaders or their representatives joining the dialogue. A statement *Towards a Theology of Christian Unity* has reached a fourth draft stage. It requires further attention in the light of comments from two local Catholic theologians. Draft guidelines and terms of reference for a Churches Commission for Christian Unity have been produced and will be further discussed at the next meeting of the National Dialogue for Christian Unity in February 2010. John Roberts and Brian Turner represent the Methodist Church in this dialogue.

World Council of Churches (WCC)

Ecclesiology Document

Methodist Conference 2008 affirmed a response to the Faith and Order Commission's document *The Nature and Mission of the Church*. In acknowledging receipt of the Methodist church's response the commission stated; "Many thanks to you and the Methodist Church of New Zealand for your response. It is constructively critical yet positively encouraging of Faith and Order's work on ecclesiology. That your response comes as a resolution of your annual conference gives it considerable weight. Your timing is much appreciated."

Christian Conference of Asia (CCA)

Roundtable Meeting

In March General Secretary David Bush and Vice President Ron Gibson attended a CCA roundtable meeting in Bangkok, Thailand. 18 participants from 8 countries representing 13 Churches and agencies gathered along with 12 CCA staff members and one member of the executive committee were present. Although CCA was created by leaders of Asian Churches and has a 52-year history, it has depended on western donors to meet 80% of its budget. A central focus of discussion was how to break out of this degree of dependency and move towards self sufficiency. Human resource capacity building in CCA and some of its member churches was also an issue. Discussion is under way on how the Methodist Church of New Zealand can do more to support the work of CCA. Theology was also discussed, in particular the ongoing development of a contemporary Asian theology that will move the expression of the Christian faith in Asia from its context and more inclusive of the great Asian spiritual heritages such as Buddhism, Confucianism, and Hinduism.

General Assembly 2010

The next Christian Conference of Asia (CCA) Assembly will be held 14-21 April 2010, in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. An established process of calling for nominations for a Methodist Church of New Zealand delegate was followed. A two plus two meeting (Mission and Ecumenical and Te Taha Maori) considered nominations. The name that was supported was Tumuaki Rev Diana Tana. This nomination was forwarded to the President, Vice-President, and General Secretary who each indicated their support for the nomination. Diana Tana's name has since been reported to Council of Conference.

Rev Uesifili Unasa, a member of the Mission and Ecumenical committee, will also be attending the CCA Assembly as its representative, and at its own expense.

WCC & CCA Asia Region Ecumenical Officers Meeting

A meeting of ecumenical officers of WCC and CCA member churches in the Asia region was held from 30 June to 2 July at the conference centre of the Communion of Churches in Indonesia, Cipayung, outside Jakarta, Indonesia. The Mission and Ecumenical secretary attended. The meeting was jointly sponsored by the WCC, CCA, and the Communion of Churches in Indonesia. In the opening worship which incorporated elements of local Sundanese culture, Dr Soritu Nababan preached on the theme of unity. The keynote address given by Prof Dr



James Haire focused on the theme of the meeting, 'Unity, Dialogue and Peace: Ecumenical Challenges in Asia Today'. A session on peace-building and human rights had case studies on the Philippines, Korea, Sri Lanka, and Myanmar. A session on interreligious dialogue was presented by Ahmed Sawadi, Director of the Wahid Institute in Indonesia. Bible studies, presentations on ecumenism in relation to participant's churches, and information on programmes of the WCC and the CCA rounded out the agenda, which also provided for plenty of participant networking.

WCC and CCA visit to Member Churches

Discussion is underway for a WCC and a CCA staff person to visit member churches in Aotearoa New Zealand. Mr Doug Chial (WCC Church and Ecumenical Relations) will visit WCC member churches in November, and Dr Prawate Khid-arn (CCA General Secretary) will visit in the new year. Doug Chial and other WCC representatives will be present at the Methodist Conference in Christchurch.

Interreligious Relationships

Open letter from Muslim Leaders

Conference 2008 Conference welcomed the *Common Word* document and open letter addressed to Christian leaders by Muslim leaders who met in Jordan in October 2007, and approved the suggested decisions arising from consideration of the document. The MCNZ response was posted to Prince Ghazi bin Talal at the Royal Ail al-Bait Institute for Islamic Thought in Amman, Jordan in November 2008. The prince was the initiator of the process that produced the Muslim document. The reply from Prince Ghazi: follows:

"We were very happy and grateful to receive your thoughtful response to *A Common Word*, and humbly commend its positive spirit. Whilst, indeed, neither of our sides has any intention of merging our two great religions into a kind of false theological union, or of glossing over the very real differences between them in other spheres, nevertheless, we do share the Two 'Golden' Commandments, on which hang all the law and the Prophets. That, we hope and believe, is a sufficient *Common Word* for us to pursue peace, harmony and justice as religions – quite apart from the common humanity that we share as people with each other and indeed with all people of the world – and dialogue and exchanges are a key component of this."

World Methodist Relationships

World Methodist Council (WMC)

President Jill van de Geer, who is a member of the presidium of the World Methodist Council, was unable to attend a meeting of the Executive Committee in September. The New Zealand Methodist Church was represented by the Rev Dr Mary Caygill at the WMC executive meeting, also held in Chile 20-25 September. *Continued on page 11a...*

Methodist Consultative Council of the Pacific

The Methodist Consultative Council of the Pacific (MCCP) normally meets annually, bringing together leaders of the Methodist Churches in Fiji, Papua New Guinea, Samoa, Solomon Islands, Tonga, as well as Australia and New Zealand. Methodist Church of New Zealand President Jill van de Geer and Vice-President Ron Gibson attended this year's meeting hosted by the Fijian Methodist Church, in Suva 14-16 April.

The regime of the military leader and Prime Minister, Commodore Frank Banimarama, did not want the meeting to proceed, only relenting when the Fijian church made representations pointing out that all those attending the meeting were already present in Suva. It then became a requirement of meeting that a government observer be present throughout the discussions.

The Fijian church had decided on two themes for the meeting: church and state, and relations with other faiths. The relationship between church and state differs throughout the region. In some countries such as Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands and Tonga, the churches have close links to the state and play an important role in the delivery of education and health services. While in other countries, such as Australia and New Zealand the separation of church and state is fundamental. In the area of relationships with other faiths there is some difference along theological lines. Those with more traditional perspectives emphasise the importance of evangelism, with salvation only available through Jesus Christ. Those with more accepting perspectives see the importance of dialogue between today's faith communities.

At the meeting representatives also reported on significant issues affecting their churches such as HIV and AIDS, economic difficulties, conflicts, disasters, and free trade concerns. A major outcome of the meeting was to convey a sense of solidarity and support to the Methodist Church of Fiji and the Fijian people at this time of political turmoil.

Education and Communication

The secretary has been involved in a range of communication and education activities. These have included: monthly newsletters; occasional papers; articles in 'Touchstone'; preaching engagements; presentations to parish and MWF groups; tutoring at Trinity College; and displays to promote Mission and Ecumenical relationships and activity. PowerPoint presentations have been used where appropriate and possible. The secretary has engaged in professional development, study and reading in the areas of mission and ecumenism.

Socially Responsible Investment

In March Greg Wright, Executive Officer of the church's Investment Advisory Board, circulated A *Discussion Document to Review the Methodist Church of New Zealand's Guidelines for Socially Responsible Investment.* On the basis that it has considerable investments with the Methodist Trust Association, Mission and Ecumenical prepared a response to the document which has been sent to the Greg Wright.

Restructuring

Conference 2008 set up a task group to consult further and consider Commissioner John Hinchcliffe's report on the restructuring of the Methodist Church. In February the Governance Task Group convenor asked the Mission and Ecumenical secretary to prepare a brief statement of theological principles to guide the deliberations of the task group. In consultation with Lynne Frith, Terry Wall, Uesifili Unasa and Vai Ngahe a set of questions based on theological principles was prepared and sent to the task group. It was subsequently circulated by the task group and published in Touchstone. The Mission and Ecumenical Committee made a response to the task group's report issued in July.

Strategic Plan

Our Vision

Our vision continues to be to see mission and ecumenical endeavour as the very core of our church's being. Mission to be given expression at the global as well as the local level. Existing partner church relationships being renewed and rebuilt, with new relationships able to be developed. Ecumenical thinking and action to be seen as essential to our church's life. Supporting and encouraging existing ecumenical relationships while looking for new expressions of ecumenism.

Key Goals

Our key goals are to:

- Use the "Transforming Mission" and the "To be Methodist is to be Ecumenical" papers as working documents that provide a theological base for the work of the committee and secretary.
- Support and strengthen the world-wide mission of the Methodist Church of New Zealand, in particular the partnership relationships with the United Church of Papua New Guinea and the United Church of the Solomon Islands, through personal visits, regular correspondence and sharing of resources. A visit to the United church in the Solomon islands to be made in December 2009.
- Promote and strengthen relationships with ecumenical agencies of which the Methodist Church of New Zealand is a member: Christian World Service, Churches Agency on International issues, Christian Conference of Asia, and the World Council of Churches.
- Further facilitate the National Dialogue for Christian Unity and the proposal for a Churches Commission for Christian Unity.
- Promote an awareness of religious diversity within Aotearoa New Zealand and the fostering of good relationships between religions.
- Promote the relationships of the Methodist Church of New Zealand with world Methodism.
- Produce resources on ecumenism and mission, suitable for use in parishes and rohe.
- Facilitate the holding of an Auckland event to mark the centennial of the landmark world mission conference held in Edinburgh 1910 which also gave rise to the modern ecumenical movement.
- Further develop effective communication with parishes, rohe and uniting congregations, through monthly newsletters, occasional papers, information leaflets, articles in "Touchstone", visits and speaking engagements, and increased use of MCNZ website.
- Begin succession planning for the Mission and Ecumenical secretary who will retire from the position in January 2012.

Suggested Decisions:

1. The report is received.

United Churches in the Solomon Islands and in Papua New Guinea

- 2. Conference affirms the continuing significant relationships with the United Church in the Solomon Islands, and the United Church in Papua New Guinea, and the assistance being provided to them through Methodist Mission and Ecumenical.
- 3. On the eve of the 50th anniversary celebrations of the beginning of the Nipa Mission in the Highlands of Papua New Guinea conference affirms the pioneer ministry of Rev Cliff Keightly and gives thanks for outstanding service on the mission field given by Cliff, Noreen and their children.

New Ecumenical Initiative

4. Conference affirms the work of the National Dialogue for Christian Unity as it seeks to implement a Churches Commission for Christian Unity in Aotearoa New Zealand.

World Council of Churches and Christian Conference of Asia

- 5. Conference welcomes the visit of WCC and CCA staff persons to member churches in Aotearoa New Zealand and looks forward to a revitalisation of the relationship between the WCC and member churches in this country.
- 6. Conference affirms Tumuaki Rev Diana Tana and Rev Uesifili Unasa as Methodist Church of New Zealand representatives at the Christian Conference of Asia Assembly being held 14-21 April 2010, in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Edinburgh 2010

7. Conference commends the proposal for an ecumenical event in Auckland to mark the centennial of the landmark 1910 world mission conference in Edinburgh, and invites other regions to consider holding a similar event in 2010.

CHRISTIAN WORLD SERVICE

Introduction

Christian World Service takes action to end poverty and injustice throughout the world. It is a proudly New Zealand organisation, governed by a New Zealand Board and responsible to a Council appointed by the national bodies of its supporting churches. The Methodist appointee on that Council is the Rev John Roberts, and I would like to thank him for his hard work and support for CWS.

Methodists are strong supporters of the ecumenical work of CWS with around three quarters of Methodist and Uniting Congregation parishes giving to CWS's annual Christmas Appeal. This year you will notice some changes to the Christmas Appeal as it has undergone a revamping to make it more appealing and user friendly. All the materials are available on a CD rom, whereas in the past these were available only on request. Many also

support the work of CWS either by being regular donors or by contributing to our emergency and @world appeals. Thank you for this loyal support, we rely on it for our work.

New Director

I took up the position of National Director of Christian World Service in February 2009. Prior to that I had worked and lived in Geneva for 15 years, firstly with the World YWCA, then the World Council of Churches and lately with the World Health Organization. As the daughter of a Methodist minister, I have always known about CWS. It is a honour to work for the organization which has such a strong analytical base and a 64 year history of standing by and working with the poor.

One of my priorities as National Director is to build up CW'S relationship with its member churches. The relationship with the Methodist Church is very strong but we should not take it for granted. When CWS was part of the National Council of Churches and the Christian Conference of Churches in Aotearoa New Zealand (CCANZ) its parent body had the relationship with the member churches. CWS now has to have the relationship and CWS Council has asked the Board to prepare a governance review with the aim of clarifying and strengthening the governance of CWS. It was felt that it was important given there is a new generation of church leaders who may not have the same allegiance to CWS.

Methodist Women's Fellowship

Christian World Service greatly appreciates the close working relationship it has with the Methodist Women's Fellowship (MWF). The money raised for the annual joint MWF/APW Special Project qualifies for subsidy under the NZAID KOHA scheme and has enabled CWS, in the last 10 years, to contribute over \$1,200,000 towards the work of our development partners. The project chosen by the MWF/APW for 2008/09 is the work of the Women's programme of the Lauru Land Conference of Tribal Communities in Lauru (Choiseul) in the Solomon Islands. In 2009/2010 the MWF/APW will be Consejo de Igelesias Evangélicas Pro-Alianza Denominacional/Council of Protestant Churches of Nicaragua (CEPAD). CEPAD's work includes development programmes (food production, income opportunities, environmental protection, advocacy training, emergency relief and community conflict resolution).

The Aid Grant

The 2% aid grant from the Methodist Church (\$9,931) was used for programmes building rain water tanks in Uganda, micro-credit and agriculture programmes in Cambodia, the work of CEPAD outlined above and for the development programme of the Middle East Council of Churches in Gaza. CWS is most appreciative of this support by the Methodist Church; it is an important demonstration of commitment to international development work.

William Waters Trust

The income received from the William Waters Trust for the benefit of children worldwide was used to support the work of partners in: Timor Leste, India and Haiti.

Action by Churches Together – Alliance

The ACT Alliance will come into being in January 2010. It is a merger between ACT Development and ACT International. CWS sends funds for emergency relief through ACT International and has worked with ACT Development, the current Director is Jill Hawkey, a former National Director of Christian World Service. The ACT Alliance will represent 150 organizations, predominantly aid, development and justice agencies of Protestant Churches and will have a collective revenue of \$2 billion. The ACT Alliance will become a major player and voice for promoting good development practice and the adoption of international policies which will eradicate poverty.

Emergency Appeals

CWS launched an appeal in January when a Health Care Centre in Gaza was destroyed by Israeli missile fire. The Centre is run by the Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees, Middle East Council of Churches, a long time CWS partner. The clinic was completely destroyed with all its equipment and medical supplies.

An appeal was launched for Tamils in North west Sri Lanka who were made homeless by the sustained military fighting in the northern region of Sri Lanka. It was an response to an appeal for assistance from ACT International (Action by Churches Together) for internally displaced people (IDPs) currently housed and detained in four camps in the Vavuniya and Mannar districts. Also of concern is the detention of the secretary of the justice and peace commission of the National Christian Council of Sri Lanka (NCCSL) Santha Fernando by the Sri Lanka Police. He was arrested in March and is still in detention (August 2009).

In May CWS launched an appeal for persons displaced by fighting between the Pakistani army and Taleban forces. The UN expected it to exceed 3 million, making it the world's largest displacement in 15 years. The crisis unfolded as Church World Service Pakistan/Afghanistan staff were meeting with CWS in New Zealand.

While in New Zealand, Church World Service's manager for disaster response in Pakistan and Afghanistan met with MFAT, NZAID and MPs in Wellington. They raised concerns about the militarization of aid and that what was required in Afghanistan was a humanitarian response rather than a military one.

These examples show how CWS works closely with its future alliance partners the creation of the ACT Alliance will facilitate and encourage greater cooperation between its member agencies.

Political Change

Christian World Service opposed the re-integration of NZAID back into the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade. In melding the two bodies it shifted the emphasis of overseas development aid from poverty elimination to economic development and tied it to foreign policy interests. There was no public discussion and the decision ignored the recommendations of Treasury and a 2005 OECD review that said NZAID was the world's best focussed overseas aid programme.


CWS, along with many other agencies, argued that NZAID should retain its semi-autonomous focus and its mission to 'eliminate poverty' which is in line with UN Millennium Development Goals.

At the time of writing this report CWS along with other agencies who receive a block grant through the KOHA scheme will only get 50% of the funding for this financial year. To get the remaining 50% we will have to show that our partners are engaged in economic development and that they are making a difference in line with the Government's changed priorities for Overseas Development Assistance. The agencies affected are working on a memo to the Minister of Foreign Affairs (Murray McCully) regarding this and the 4:1 subsidy has enabled CWS to make the contributions from the Methodist Church and our other donors go far further. The political landscape has changed and we are now beginning to see how much and the dramatic effect it may have on our work. The positive aspects is that it has galvanised the aid and development sector and highlighted the importance of working together on these issues, although it effects some more than others.

Education, Campaigning and Advocacy Climate Change

This is a crucial year for the world's climate. The UN Climate Change Conference in Copenhagen,

7-18 December, will negotiate the successor to the Kyoto Protocol, which expires in 2012. This will set the framework for global action on climate change for the next decade and beyond. CWS has produced a post card for supporters to sign which will be presented to the Prime Minister, John Key, later this year. The card urges the government to aim for emission reduction target of 40% by 2020 and to provide substantive new funding to assist developing countries to adapt to the changing climate. The Government has just announced that they will only reduce emissions by 10 to 20% by 2020. CWS believes that this is inadequate and short-sighted.



CWS is also promoting the petition from the Pacific Conference of Churches (PCC) the Moana Declaration which demands the legal recognition and resettlement rights for climate refugees. This is a unique voice from a region where seven million people could lose their homelands.

CWS has produced a backgrounder and posted information on the website and this will be regularly updated with current developments on the issue.

Food Campaign

CWS is joining the Ecumenical Advocacy Alliance's new food campaign. Over the next three years, the international movement of churches and church-related agencies will be working together to promote understanding of the causes of hunger and food justice. Fourteen percent of the world is hungry. "Supermarketisation" in the developing world has meant that farmers are forced to grow cash crops they cannot afford to buy. There will be a week of action in October, and CWS will produce resources for churches to use during this week.

Ecumenical Advocacy Alliance

Like ACT, the Ecumenical Advocacy Alliance is a broad international network of churches and Christian organizations committed to campaigning on common concerns. Its current campaign focus is on food and on HIV and AIDS. It is based in Geneva at the Ecumenical centre and for smaller agencies, like CWS, it produces useful resources which we can adapt for local use because they come from the same theological and justice perspective.

Churches' Agency on International Issues

CWS acts as the Secretariat for the Churches Agency on International Issues. In 2009 it produced one more Hot Topic on Exceptionally Inhumane Weapons which explored three exceptionally inhumane weapons still in use – Landmines, Cluster bombs, Depleted Uranium (DU) weapons, the movements to ban them and questions the ethics of arms investment.

In preparation is a Hot Topic on Tourism and its Impacts. CAll believes that this is an important issue because: many New Zealanders are international tourists; for many developing countries, particularly in our neighbourhood, tourism is a major source of overseas currency and tourism is therefore very important to their economies. However, tourism's impacts – social cultural and environmental – can be negative.

Thank You

Since taking up this position in February of this year I am very humbled by the loyalty and trust of CWS supporters. CWS is your agency. Some years ago CWS profiled its typical supporter as a 65 year old Methodist Woman. Today she may be 75. CWS support base is ageing and it is working in a time when a new generation does not have the same loyalty to the ecumenical vision as before. CWS needs to adapt to changing times. The revamped Christmas Appeal and a continuing proactive relationship with member churches are signs that we are meeting this challenge to ensure that CWS will be here for another 60+ years, if needed. CWS has an important role in keeping the New Zealand Churches linked with the international ecumenical movement which with other agencies works to overcome poverty and injustice.

I know that we can rely on the ongoing strong support of the Methodist Church and Methodists and will strive to continue to earn your continue support of our work. Although the way we do things may change the vision never does:

"The spirit of God is upon me who has anointed me to bring good news to the poor, God has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of God's favour". (Luke 4: 18-19)

That the Conference encourages all parishes to support the CWS campaign on climate change and asks the Prime Minister to reconsider his government's decision to reduce carbon emissions by only 10 to 20% by 2020 but adopt the recommendations of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) for a reduction of 40% by 2020.
- 5. That the Conference urges the government to support substantive new funding to assist developing countries adapt to the changing climate, at the UN Climate Change Conference in Copenhagen in December 2009.
- 6. That the Conference supports the Pacific Conference of Churches Moana Declaration and petition which calls on the world community to take significant action to reduce greenhouse gases and plan for large-scale resettlement of Pacific islanders.
- 7. That Conference writes to Minister of Foreign Affairs expressing disappointment about the integration of NZAID into MFAT and affirming the priority of poverty elimination as a core component of New Zealand's foreign policy.

World Methodist Council Executive Meeting

Rev Dr Mary Caygill as NZ Methodist Church representative on the World Methodist Council, attended the Executive Meeting of the World Methodist Council which met in Santiago, Chile, September 20-24, 2009. Over 250 members of this very diverse working committee met to continue the work of the Methodist World Council, receive reports of issues and work arising from the Working Committees and actively plan for the next World Methodist Conference meeting in Durban, South Africa in 2011.

The major issues before the meeting concerned a draft restructuring report of the WMC submitted by a small representative working group representing their work over the past 2 years. A genuine attempt is being made to establish a more efficient working structure of the Council which will prove more cost effective and more effectively hold together in a more rigorous manner the rich diversity of perspectives that make up this World Methodist body.

The Social and International Affairs Committee of which this church is a part met and worked on resolutions relating to the following; the ongoing crisis between Church and State in Fiji, nuclear weapons and small arm disarmament in connection with the ongoing work of the Un Millennium Goals, global climate change and the lead up to the UN Climate Change Conference Meeting in Copenhagen, Denmark, December 7-18, 2009, mining in Chile, truth and reconciliation trials in Rwanda with associated implications for the Free Methodist Church in Rwanda.

The work of these working committees continues in an ongoing manner in between the official meetings of the Council.

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

The current Communications Committee of the Methodist Church of New Zealand was established in 2000 following the withdrawal of the Presbyterian Church from Crosslink. The President at the time, appointed a committee and the key task of the committee was to ensure the Methodist Church had a communication strategy to consider what came after Crosslink and to look towards the establishment of a connexional website.

Over the last nine years, the work of the committee has been:

- To ensure the Methodist Church has a replacement from Crosslink. Touchstone is now a well respected Church publication, with its own Board and management, independent of the Communications Committee.
- To work with the Board of Administration to establish a connexional website. The Church website is in place, the webmaster is based in Christchurch and the connexional office works with the webmaster and contract provider for the website. Informal feedback regarding the effectiveness of the current website and issues of access have been raised with the committee, however the responsibility for the connexional website lies appropriately with the Board of Administration.
- During 2001, the committee was asked to consider how matters relating to Methodist Lay
 Preachers such as education and study material, maintenance of standards, central body for
 communication and liaison with the New Zealand Lay Preachers Association could be
 addressed. The Methodist Lay Preachers Network has been established and issues of
 education and study material have been work on with Trinity College. This area of work now
 rightly belongs to these two groups.
- To provide guidance for parishes on the provision of data projectors. Data projectors are perhaps common place today with many parishes using this technology. Projectors can be purchased locally and easily and this is no longer new technology.
- To establish a communication strategy for the church. Conference approved a communication strategy in 2004 for the Methodist Church. However, many Boards and committees have their own communication strategy and parishes and synods also devise the best way to communicate at the local level. The Communications Committee strongly feels that it is important for each Board, Committee, Synod and Parish to further develop their aims and objectives towards achieving their communication strategy.
- Ensuring funding is available for President and Vice President elect and General Secretary for media training during the year of preparation.

It is now time to consider whether the role of the Communications Committee has changed and is no longer needed in its current form. Much of the work that has been assigned to the committee has been picked up by other Boards of the Church as follows. Issues of communication are able to be looked at through:

- The intensive programmes run by Trinity College.
- The Board of Administration overseeing the operation of the connexional website.
- The General Secretary and President being the point of contact for national news media.
- Local issues dealt within the local areas. Many districts have within them people working in media and with competence in the area of communication.

The Communications Committee therefore recommend to Conference that the committee be put into recess.

- 2. Conference notes that the work of the Communications Committee over the last nine years has been completed.
- 3. Conference records its deep appreciation to the members of the Communications Committee for their time and work.

METHODIST PUBLISHING BOARD

Touchstone

It has been another steady year for Touchstone. Thanks to the dedicated efforts of Paul Titus and his editorial team ten lively issues have been produced and distributed around the connexion and beyond. One regular issue was dropped as a cost-saving measure and to give Paul a much-deserved sabbatical. This allowed him to visit Fiji and Tonga and develop a greater understanding of the Pacific Island context that we have such close ties with as a church. Our sincere thanks are extended to the Study and Travel Committee for generously assisting Paul in gaining this wider experience. We hope that it might have a beneficial flow on effect for the paper and the church as we seek to strengthen our connections with the Pacific region.

I appreciate the commitment of the Board to the task of producing a quality paper at an affordable cost to the church. During the year we made a decision to increase our printing costs by a very modest amount in order to have colour throughout the paper. Prior to this colour was only used on a few select pages. We believe this upgrade has substantially improved the overall appearance of the paper for readers, and has made it more attractive for potential advertisers.

Apart from this modest intentional increase in costs there has been a constant vigilance kept over production and distribution costs to avoid a budget blow out. Despite our best attempts some costs have risen, and along with a decrease in our investment-based income – as a direct result of the international economic downturn – we have continued to depend on the generous support of the connexion.

We ran 'close to the wind' in the last couple of months of the financial year but an unexpected cash injection in the form of a grant of \$20,000 from the Board of Administration gave a little breathing space. During the year we received nearly \$18,000 in grants and donations from individuals, congregations and Trusts. This source of income will continue to be vital in helping us to achieve our objectives.

Early in the current financial year were delighted to receive from the Prince Albert College Trust a \$250,000 top-up of the endowment that helps to fund our work. Such guaranteed income helps to improve the long-term stability of our position. We also greatly appreciate the \$45,000 that has been allocated to Touchstone from the connexional budget for this year and then 2010-11. We receive this support I believe because there is a widespread recognition that Touchstone is one of the true connecting points in the church and is integral to our identity.

The Board is currently exploring with the connexional archivist, Jo Smith, the costs and practicalities of digitalizing our back issues for storage purposes. During the year there has been an increase in the number of stories we have posted on the connexional website.

We are also looking at how we might conduct a comprehensive review of Touchstone during the next twelve months. At this stage we are thinking about the possibility of setting up two focus groups to help us with this task. One group would be church-based, and the other made up of media professionals.

Editor's Comments

It is both a privilege and a challenge to edit Touchstone, and, as in past years, telling the stories of the Church in 2009 has brought many rewards.

The year began with two tragedies that became the lead stories for the first two issues of the year: the Israeli incursion into Gaza and the bushfires in Victoria. Our links with other church bodies (Christian World Service in the first case, and the Uniting Church in Australia in the second) meant we could bring perspectives to our readers that were missing in the mainstream media.

Other stories that were personal highlights for me during the year included my interview with the British Methodist Church's Fresh Expressions missioner Pete Pillinger; our stories marking the bicentennial of Charles Darwin's birth; our series of articles on the Walk for the Planet; and the

exchange of opinions between David Richmond and several respondents regarding euthanasia. Also notable were the good news stories on the dynamic congregations of two young Methodist presbyters: Clarks Beach under 'Alipate Uhila and Avondale Union Parish under Vaituulala Ngahe. One of the most rewarding things about editing Touchstone is the opportunity it provides to create a forum where other writers and artists can present their work. A host of journalists, columnists, cartoonists and reviewers provide the material that makes up Touchstone. Of particular note are two young writers, Cory Miller and Mataiva Robertson. I believe they have both grown in ability and confidence over the past year.

Sadly this year sees the departure of Touchstone's longest serving contributor. Diana Roberts has provided us with her Kitchen Theology reflections since the newspaper began in May 2001. Her column in the December issue will be her last. We wish to express our sincere gratitude to Diana for sharing her observations and insights with us.

The most exciting opportunity the editor of Touchstone enjoys is the chance to travel and visit people in the Church community. This year I undertook two trips. One was to attend the Equipt Conference in Ngaruawahia, which was both stimulating and challenging. The other was my sabbatical visit to Fiji, where I met with leaders of the Methodist Church and ecumenical bodies, and to Tonga, where I attended the opening sessions of the Free Wesleyan Church of Tonga. As MPB chair Mark Gibson, says in his report, the visits provided me both better understandings and contacts with people in the Pacific Churches that I intend to draw upon in future. I am highly appreciative of the Travel and Study grant that supported my trip.

Additional Project

Beyond Touchstone the Board has been engaged in supporting one other small project during the year. We have agreed to facilitate the posting of a selection of new hymns written by Bill Wallace on the Methodist website. These will be freely available to the whole church for use in worship and other settings.

Farewell

We would like to say thank you to Chris Ambrose who has been a valuable member of the Board for several years, but is now moving back to Australia to take up a new ministry appointment in Adelaide. His background in church publishing and ministry experience in a Union Parish has enabled him to be a strong contributor in Board discussions. He has been willing to serve our work in a variety of ways. We pray God's blessings on Chris and his family in the next stage of their journey.

CHURCHES BRAODCASTING COMMISSION

During the past year the Churches Broadcasting Commission considered its purpose of existing in its current form. We also considered the possibility of going into recess as members felt we had completed all that was possible under the current Constitution.

While each Commission member consulted with the church they represented stating the various view points of why we existed and what if we went into recess, whatever decision was to be made would not be decided lightly. After further consultation at other meetings of the Commission and the understanding of our reasons for concern of existence by the member churches the Commission finally decided we would go into recess during 2009.

One major area of concern was 'what would happen to the Broadcasting/Media scholarships for young Christians'. Trish Moseley and Errol Pike approached Christian Broadcasting Association (CBA) to pick up the scholarship responsibilities, as they had provided money for one scholarship a year for the past two years. This they agreed to do and Trish Moseley was asked to assist with the 'handover' and to be part of their 2009 scholarship selection panel.

In line with the Constitution's financial responsibilities of 'winding up' any money that had been granted to the Commission for a specific purpose and had not be used was returned to the appropriate organization. A motion was passed stating 'any remaining money was to be granted to the Christian Broadcasting Association (CBA) for the purposed of scholarships'.

The Commission is proud of its initiative of scholarships to young Christians studying at tertiary level in the media area as over 90% of our scholarship winners have positions within radio or community newspapers on completing their Tertiary education. That is a very high level of success.

'Praise Be' has been reinstated to 47 programs through 2009 and 'My God' is being rescheduled

to a different time slot. The funding for Praise Be has not been increased so they have to used material stockpiled over the last few years.

At the stage of CBC finalizing its going into recess, we were made aware of TVNZ changing the timing of 'Praise Be' from 9am on a Sunday to 7am. Its times slot for many, many years was being taken up by a new TVNZ programme called "Q & A". We were concerned that TVNZ had made a wrong judgment on the time change and aware "Praise Be' would clash with Radio NZ 'Hymns for Sunday Morning'. Our members used their network of contacts to ask for assistance in pressuring TVNZ to look at their timing change of "Praise Be'. Within 48 hours of their decision for 7am, the timing of 'Praise Be' was changed to 8am by TVNZ. CBC were thrilled we had achieved another positive action.

While CBC members regret our decision of 'going into recess' we are certain it is the correct one at this stage and all members of the Commission would like to thank all the Churches involved for their support of our work over 25 plus years. Maybe sometime in the future there will be a place for CBC to exist again.

INTERCHURCH BIOETHICS COUNCIL

The InterChurch Bioethics Council (ICBC) is an ecumenical body supported by the Anglican, Presbyterian and Methodist Churches of Aotearoa New Zealand. It is charged with responding to ethical, spiritual and cultural issues raised by new biotechnology that are seen as important both to the church membership and to the community in general. ICBC members have between them, considerable expertise and knowledge in science, ethics, theology, medicine and education. The ICBC also relates to the tangatawhenua through one of the members. We also provide member churches with study material, and Council members are always available to talk to church groups, and to produce liturgical material. Members are also invited to take part in regional meetings on ethical issues that are hosted by other bodies.

From 2008-2009 the ICBC has met four times, but there has also been a considerable amount of internet consultation. This was particularly important when we needed to respond to the Government's decision to disestablish Toi Te Taiao, The Bioethics Council of New Zealand. The ICBC strongly opposed this move, and wrote to a number of MPs, in all parties. We pointed out that in an era of rapid advances in knowledge and technology it is important to have a dedicated independent monitoring group that can develop bioethical policies in advance, and can raise concerns with Government. (It has to be said that our protest, along with many others, was not taken seriously.) In view of the loss of Toi Te Taiao, we feel that the role of the ICBC may shift to become a little more proactive. We will therefore make sure that some of the ICBC members will attend both the biennial NZ Bioethics Conference, and the Australasian Bioethics and Health Law Conference.

This year, the ICBC made two submissions to the Advisory Committee on Assisted Reproductive Technology (ACART). These were on the draft guidelines on the use of donated eggs with donated sperm, and the use of in vitro maturation in fertility work. We are aware that there is a report on the use of nanotechnology about to be released, and we anticipate that ICBC will respond to this. We also note that the issue of euthanasia is likely to remain in the public arena.

Following a discussion with CWS on Pacific issues, we are planning an update on our climate change study. In addition, we are aware that our study guides are designed for the pakeha/palangi parts of our churches, and are currently exploring the option of developing bicultural dialogues on a number of specific issues.

Our study guides are on the Anglican justice website (<u>www.justice.anglican.org.nz/icbc</u>, but we are about to launch an ICBC website that will then be linked to the three participating churches (and any others that would be interested). We intend that, in addition to the study guides, other material, such as papers, reports and information about current issues that the ICBC is responding to, will be posted on this site, and that there will also be an opportunity for people to engage in online discussions.

SOCIAL ISSUES REPORT

Conference 2008 approved the establishment of a Public Questions Network as an entity in the life of the Church, and authorized the implementation of the proposals contained in the report to Conference. (*Refer to Conference decisions 2007 B(ii) 9, Question 26 (ii) 10 and 2008 Question 34(a) Decisions 1-11).*

Subsequently, a discussion paper was considered by Synods and Hui Poari. The comments that were sent to the work group have been both affirmative and helpful.

As a result, there have been some refinements to the position description for a paid person, and terms of reference for the Coordinating group for the Network have been developed.

The proposed budget has been refined to reflect the available funding. Shared office space is currently being negotiated with an ecumenical agency in Wellington.

Conference is reminded that the initial proposal agreed to in 2008 requested synods to fund the travel for someone to be a member of the core group. It is now recommended that those groups nominating members to the Coordinating group (e.g. WesleyCom, Synod, Hui Poari) will meet the travel costs for that person to attend a maximum of two meetings per year in Wellington.

We note that the Public Questions Network is a Standing Committee of the Conference, and is therefore not a solely Tauiwi committee. The proposals for both membership changes to the Laws and Regulations reflect that the work of Public Questions is for and by the whole church.

PUBLIC QUESTIONS NETWORK

7.10.1 There shall be a *Public Questions Network*

The Network will have

(a) A co-ordinating group of no more that 2 nominated from Tauiwi, 2 nominated from Te Taha Maori and 1 from Methodist Mission Actearoa. The coordinating group will coordinate and over see the functioning of the Public Questions Network.

Functions

7.10.2 On social, economic, ecological and political matters within Aotearoa New Zealand, and recognising the centrality of Te Tiriti o Waitangi in its work, the *Network* seeks to:

- (a) resource and encourage the Church at national, regional, local and individual levels to discuss, act, and speak on public issues of interest and concern.
- (b) advocate on such issues from its Christian perspective as promptly, clearly, publicly, and effectively as possible.
- (c) be agents in all that it does for peace, justice, and the integrity of creation, reflecting the transforming love of God and the compassionate life of Jesus.

Membership

7.10.3.1 The Co-ordinating Group of the Public Questions Network shall be appointed annually by Conference.

7.10.3.2 The Public Questions Network may from time to time appoint an officer. The process for making such an appointment shall be in accordance with those in place in the Church at the time.

I was born in 1955 into a Methodist parsonage family, the second of 3 children. The church has always been home to me. We moved every 4 or 5 years and with each move there was a new church family where we instantly belonged. The love, support and acceptance that I experienced growing up within the church, along with my parents' example of living their faith and demonstrating God's unconditional love, helped to shape the person that I am today, and the faith that means so much to me. The Methodist Youth Conferences of the early 1980's were particularly important and formative times for me in my faith journey, and the teachings and legacy of John Wesley are an ongoing inspiration, as they were for my parents, who named me after John's mother, Susanna.

Growing up and struggling with life's challenges, the knowledge of God's inclusive, healing love and forgiveness was the constant hope and support that sustained me in difficult times, and gave my life meaning in the good times. It also inspired many years of involvement in promoting justice and peace, which I see as integral to the gospel message. Faith is not simply personal belief and relationship with God, it is whole-of-life action and integrity, and connectedness in community and in the world. When I was in my mid 20's, along with Mark Gibson, I candidated and was accepted for the diaconate, believing that God was calling me to a community-based ministry. This did not work out for me at the time, and those plans were abandoned. However I have a strong sense of being called to serve, and I regard my contribution as a lay person within the church as very much being a ministry that I offer. Ronald Adrian Barfoote

1931 - 2009

Ron Barfoote was a member of the Methodist Church of New Zealand in Putaruru, Eltham, Pitt Street and Pakuranga and his employment with Wright Stephenson, New Zealand Rennet Company, Neuchatel, Formica New Zealand and finally as company secretary for UEB mirrors his Parish attachments.

Ron's greatest service to the Church was through two of its major property model deed trusts - Pitt Street from 1966 to 1982 and the Prince Albert College Trust from 1962 until 1982.

He was secretary of the Prince Albert College Trust, and he and his wife Noleen were deeply involved in the work of the Prince Albert College Trust and the management of Queen Street buildings for many years.

Ron was instrumental in the negotiations surrounding a proposed development on Queen Street for IBM New Zealand Ltd but when conditions in the late 1970s changed he also had the clarity of judgement and courage to assist the Trust at the eleventh hour to withdraw from the development contract when the risks of proceeding outweighed the costs and embarrassment of withdrawing.

Ron brought his accountancy and business skills together with his practical commercial knowledge to bear for the long term benefit of the Church. The work he undertook continues to assist and resource the Church today through the PAC Endowment Fund.

Gordon T. Dey 1930 - 2009

As a young boy my woodworking skills were honed using blunt old saws and chisels on used Totara foundation piles in my father's workshop, when I was shown a magnificent canoe paddle inlaid with different timber types.

It was Gordon's trophy for winning a canoeing event. I remember thinking it must have been a very prestigious race to carry such a prize. He built his own canoe and cart to wheel it to the river.

He canoed up the Waikato as far as the newly-gifted Epworth Camp site on the banks of Lake Karapiro (must have portaged around the dam) measured the topographical details of the 10 acre site, even counting the trees around the boundary, then constructed a large scale model complete with cánoès drawn up on the riverbank.

Educated in Hamilton at Hillcrest Primary and Hamilton High School, Gordon by now a carpenter with WB Young Ltd seemed to be impervious to the cold as he biked all over the township of Hamilton in pre city days - in winter - in shorts.

My Dad, his Bible Class leader, was impressed with Gordon when he volunteered for missionary service under the Methodist Order of St Stephen and after a year of building for the Methodist Overseas Mission in the Solomon Islands was admitted as member No 5, later transferring to the Southern Highlands of Papua New Guinea.

He had learnt his trade well while apprenticed to one of the country's most respected construction companies.

This became obvious to me when years later and some 90 members later, I followed Gordon into the Order working for the Methodist Overseas Mission, in the Southern Highlands of T.P.N.G. under Gordon and being fed by his wife Joyce.

During 1965 I put on a stone in weight so I'm glad Gordon was the builder and Joyce the cook! However, Gordon was very organized - the only person I know who could garden from a book.

Joyce would ask for a couple of lettuces - Gordon would reach for his exercise book and announce - the third and fourth in the second row will be ready today!

The cut worms didn't stand a chance.

Every morning, Gordon the Vigilante would behead half a dozen and for sport he would clear the local bushy spectators lined up along the garden fence by throwing a huge earthworm up in the air, as the locals considered anything the shape of a snake to be the sign of the Timp or evil spirits.

Gordon's management skills gave new meaning to the term 'Turn Key Contract'. He would choose the trees to fell, organize the pit sawing teams, run the sawn timber through diesel powered machines (6 times in the case of T & G flooring) then build the house by the original method of roof first then the floor to protect the flooring from the heavy afternoon rains. The result was a very nice large house anyone would be proud to live in, especially as the first occupants of one new house was a New Zealand minister and his family new to the mission field, who expected to be handed a hammer at the airstrip and told to build his own.

He was the only man I know who could glaze windows in stereo that is two panes simultaneously, and in his spare time he taught tank making, constructed a weir across a river to measure the water flow to order a German turbine to generate electricity to power the station, and still found time to train apprentices and conduct church services.

One of the most effective sermons I have heard was delivered by Gordon in Pidjin, to a congregation of Highlanders, on the life of an axe.

After many years of service in New Guinea, Gordon took to the teaching profession as a technical instructor at the Waikato Polytech with another spell in the tropics with the Presbyterian Church in Vanuatu eventually retiring to a home he built himself at Waihi Beach.

After suffering from cancer for many years, Gordon's life was celebrated at a packed Waihi Beach United Church service on the 4th April 2009.

Gordon spent his life in the service of others. His legacy lives on in numerous buildings in four countries.

Mai pren, you namba wan.

Ella Nancy (Nan) Farrant 1929 - 2009

Nan was a tireless worker for the Methodist Church.

Nan lived and taught Home Economics at Pahiatua and Dunedin before teaching in Fiji for several years. She was deeply involved in the Church life in these places. On returning to New Zealand, the Farrant Family lived in Upper Riccarton There Nan was a Sunday School Teacher, a Bible Class Leader, a Member of the Leaders' Meeting, involved in the Women's Fellowship taking a term as leader of the evening group, was part of the Catering Group and was a foundation Member of I.4.C, a joint effort by four local denominations to provide social assistance in the district. She was a willing participant in any skits, concerts and other entertainment being held at the time.

This local involvement was just the tip of the iceberg.

Nan was deeply involved in the "Fellowship of the Least Coin", an initiative of the Council of Churches of Aotearoa NZ, later, Church Women United. She served in many executive positions and was National President in the mid 1990's. This involved at least one trip overseas.

Nan was co opted onto the North Canterbury District Property Advisory Committee for her expertise in housing, spending considerable time inspecting ministers' housing and reporting and advising to the local property committee on the upgrading and maintenance that needed doing before the next minister moved in. She had definite views.

Nan was appointed to the Church Building and Loan Fund Committee, now the Methodist Church Property Committee (MCPC). She served as Chair of this Committee for some of her several years service retiring only due to health.

The Methodist Church are most grateful for the dedicated service given by Nan and also recognise the support that her family gave her when so much time was used in serving her Church in addition to being a full time teacher.

We are all a little richer for having known Nan.

Irene Girven nee Iddeson

1927 - 2009

Irene Girven grew up with her parents and brother in New Lynn Auckland. At the age of nine she learnt to play the piano and her love of music continued right through her life. In 1950 she married Wally. They were very proud of their family of 5 which eventually grew to 9 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren. In the middle 1950's they shifted to Upper Hutt where they joined the Methodist Church. This was the beginning of many life long friendships. In the early 1960's Irene was invited to represent the Women's Fellowship on the Methodist Trust. This was a huge step for women as the trust was a man's world then. The Fellowship was so proud of what she achieved, they honoured her commitment to the Upper Hutt Women's Fellowship by making her a Life Member.

Irene had a great number of talents - and she used them in the life of the Women's Fellowship, the Methodist Church, the Upper Hutt Uniting Parish and the community of Upper Hutt. She was President of the MWF in 1963, 1964 and in 1981. She was Secretary and Group Leader and represented Upper Hutt on the MWF District Council. She was also president of the Upper Hutt Plunket Mothers Club in the early 1960's and was Captain of the Girls Brigade Company in 1965 - 67.

Irene served on many Church committees, and was a tireless and very practical worker, who could be seen at working bees, family camps, and as a musician. She was Moderator of the Upper Hutt Co-operating Parish Council from 1985 to 1987. She was very supportive of the co-operating ventures movement, representing the parish on the Joint Regional committee and attending the 2 yearly national Cooperative Venture meetings, today called the biennial Forum. The first of which was held in the Wesley Centre, Upper Hutt in 1987 when Irene was Moderator of the Parish council.

In 1988 Irene was invited to become a member of the National Executive of the New Zealand Methodist Women's Fellowship, which was situated in the Wellington District for two years. She was a Vice President and she was responsible as the link to the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women, and also the Co-operative Ventures link. This turned out to be a big task, taking her to Fiji, Snells Beach in the north, and visiting Districts in the Auckland area, and included writing a paper for the World Federation on the history of the NZ MWF and its involvement in the World Federation since its beginnings. She also attended Joint Committee of Women's organisations meetings.

Irene had a strong faith, she was very well organised, firm and gentle, an encourager, efficient and fun to work with. She seemed always to be available to do anything, she was a leader and a lovely caring women. In February 1995 Irene suffered a massive stroke, which left her unable to speak and with paralysis. She developed a way of communicating and eventually could say "I can do it" and usually she could! She remained deeply interested in, and active in the life of the Women's Fellowship and the parish up until her sudden death on 16th June. Her funeral service was taken by the Rev Nio Daniela and Mr Ron Malpass who gave the address. The Church is deeply grateful for and proud of the wonderful work and achievements of its servant, Irene Girven.

John Roland Hall

1920 - 2009

John died at 88 years of age, on 24th May 2009 at Metlifecare in Palmerston North where he was resident for his last 18 months. A fine tribute and celebration of his life and work was voiced by his family, Jennifer, Alistair, Peter and Catherine, together with grandchildren & great grandchildren.

Thelma & John together enjoyed their choice to settle at Waihi Beach, until Thelma's death in May 2001. During his 26 years of good retirement John contributed greatly within the community at Waihi Beach. He made a considerable contribution to the establishment and building of the Community Centre during the 1980's & 90's. In fact throughout all of his working life he focused his efforts towards the wider community, as much as toward the institutional church.

John read widely in areas of science and philosophy as well as theology, and this was reflected in the quality of what he offered throughout his ministry. Intellectual integrity in communication and in living of the gospel was a priority. This quest to keep abreast of modern thought was evident in the books he was still reading during his last year. Matters of social justice, equality, and particularly peacemaking, occupied a prominent place throughout John's ministry.

John acknowledged having experienced a call to ministry at an early age, while growing up within a Christian family, and in the Methodist church in Birkenhead. He was however faced with a critical decision when World war II began. Strong pacifist convictions led to being placed in detention in 1941 for 4 years. A period of service in the YMCA followed and he was then accepted for ministry and appointed to Bluff, as a Home Missionary in 1948.

His study and preparation for ordination in November of 1954, was fulfilled while continuing in a Circuit appointment. He then went on to serve at Gore, Geraldine, Motueka, Sanson-Rongotea, Waihi and Waiuku.

In addition to sound and reliable work in each Circuit/Parish, he was 3 times Secretary to a District Synod, and for 11 years a member of the Secretarial staff at the Conference of Methodist Church of NZ.

John Hall will be remembered for the strong principles he embraced and lived by, and by many people for the sensitive and supportive ways he cared for and stood by them.

Lester Frances Holdaway

1929 - 2009

Lester was born into a loyal Methodist family which made it quite natural for him to become a vital member of the old Wesley Sunday School and Bible Class during his youth that was lived in Blenheim.

His early life revolved around his home, schooling at Dillon's Point, then Marlborough College, his family farm, his Church and the many aspects of sport and community life. In May 1945 he was one of the foundation members when the 1st Blenheim Boys' Brigade Company was formed. He

soon became an N.C.O. rising through the ranks to serve for a number of years as a Lieutenant in the Company.

In September last year some 30 friends and family gathered in the Redwood Retirement Village where he was a resident to present to him the 'Long Service Diploma' recognising 50 years of service given to the Methodist Church of New Zealand as a Fully Accredited Lay Preacher.

He will be remembered as one who preached the 'God of Love' who had compassion for all believers no matter what their colour, culture or background as he was convinced that his message was true Wesley theology.

While he was comfortable with those who researched a liberal faith, his message was always one of the Gospel that brought family, community and church closer together for that was his yardstick of life.

There were many times when he took his faith out into the community as witness to his Lord and Saviour.

Many times he represented the Blenheim Wesley Parish at the Annual Church Conference as well as taking a very active role in the Nelson, Marlborough and West Coast Synod.

He was Treasurer of the Parish for 14 years, and a Parish Steward for many years as well as many other offices within the Church.

He was Chairman of the Wesley House Committee, Picton from 1980 to the point that it was handed over to the Christchurch Mission.

We are most grateful that his late wife, Mary (nee Spark) was willing to share Lester with his skills and faith with his Church and Community.

Thank you Lester for being a friend to all and you were able to show us the Lord that you found through his son Jesus Christ.

The funeral was held at Wesley Centre led by Rev. Norman West. 260 family and friends were here to celebrate his life.

Alan Hughson 1931 – 2009

Alan wanted to be remembered for the service he gave to others. He spent his life in devoted service to his family, his community, the church, the work place and to his many friends. The list is long and impressive.

Alan was born into an Opunake Taranaki family that was deeply involved with the Methodist Church so it is understandable that in his younger days he became involved also. Alan married Janet Taylor in 1956. Together they raised five children; Greg, Grant, Ross, Bruce and Diana. Alan was a loving husband, father and grandfather.

Alan served our Church as Circuit Steward when in Opunake and as Treasurer for the Napier Circuit in the early 1960's. But it was in Hawera from 1967 onwards that Alan and his family were fully part and parcel of the churches life, socials, concerts, markets days. Alan became a Trustee, Treasurer and Circuit Steward in Hawera and treasurer in Taranaki.

Alan's service was not confined to church. He was a Rotarian for over 30 years. The tasks he undertook were many and varied. He led the 3H programme (Hunger, Health and Humanity) for the Rotary District providing monetary assistance to alleviate poliomyelitis around the world. He organised the South Taranaki District to fundraise \$1 million for a CT scanner at Base Hospital,

New lymouth. He served on the Calvary Hospital Board in Hawera for many years under the umbrella of Rotary. He served as Assisting District Governor, representing 9 Rotary Clubs in the region. He was also made a Paul Harris Fellow and organised Youth Exchange visitors from around the world. In the midst of all of this activity Alan was also a Justice of the Peace for many years.

But it is his service to the Robert Gibson Trust in later years for which Alan will be remembered best by his Church family. Alan served diligently, bringing his professional, business and managerial skills into the service of the Trust. Not an easy assignment. He served the Trust faithfully for twenty years, being part of the bursary committee, Deputy Chair and latterly Chairman for 9 years.

Alan gained great satisfaction from chairing meetings, skilfully overseeing the work of the Trust. He enthusiastically presented the Trust report to our Methodist Conference each year, complete with power-point in recent years. As Chair he was very thorough in what he did, having great empathy for those applying for bursaries while trying to be fair and generous. During his time some hugely significant decisions were made, decisions which have enabled the Trust to grow and progress. Alan led the Robert Gibson Trust in making these moves wisely and carefully.

We will be forever grateful for Alan's sincere love and service, so consistently expressed throughout his life towards his family and the world in which he lived. He leaves a great legacy behind.

Gordon Mayo Lawry 1924 – 2009

"Hello! I'm Gordon Lawry and this is my wife Nancy." Many people have heard this both in New Zealand and overseas, over a period of nearly 60 years. It was a simple statement, but it encapsulated much of Gordon's personality, displaying his friendly ability to speak to friend and stranger alike. Not infrequently the people so addressed became life-long friends.

Gordon was born in Grafton and brought up in Howick where his father was a respected general practitioner. Despite being born two months premature and surviving both pneumonia and poliomyelitis in childhood, Gordon grew to be an outstanding competitor in cross-country athletics, hockey and tennis. Less than a day before his death he played two sets of tennis, and he was reported to be in very good form.

In 1950 he and Nancy Webb began a wonderful marriage which lasted for nearly 59 years. They moved into a home in Leone Terrace just over the railway line from the Mt Albert Methodist Church. Three children were born; and son Howard now carries on the Lawry tradition as a parish steward. Gordon and Nancy's long worshipping association survived two significant house shifts, each a little further away geographically, first to Glendene in Henderson and then to Botany near Howick.

Over this time Gordon undertook many responsibilities. Early in their attendance at Mt Albert he was a trustee and a member of the Men's Fellowship. He helped with young peoples' activities and was always willing to assist with painting, landscaping and other maintenance work. In retirement, with Nancy, he cared for the church gardens. Gordon loved the music of the church and he sang in the choir for more than 20 years.

Gordon was proud of his Methodist heritage and he referred to it frequently. Back four generations was Reverend Walter Lawry who came out from Cornwall as a missionary to Australia, Tonga and New Zealand in the early 1800s. Walter's son Henry Hassall Lawry was an outstanding missionary in the Hokianga in the 1850s and 60s, and he served in the NZ Methodist ministry right up to the end of that century.

Probably because of this lineage, Gordon had a broad view of the connexional needs of the church he loved. Over the years he represented Mt Albert at Synod and Conference. He joined the board of the Auckland Central Mission and for a lengthy period served religiously (he would have liked the pun) on that committee.

Gordon Lawry will be remembered as a wonderful family man and as a fun-loving, cheerful friend, church visitor and travelling companion. His death on the 4th of September 2009 was unexpected, seemingly unfair to those who are left, but wonderful for him, a passing from this life to the next with so little pain.

Audrey Leadley 1939 - 2009

Audrey Mabel West was born in Eiffelton, Mid Canterbury on 18th March 1939, the eldest child in a family of five children – two brothers, Revs. Norman and Stan West, and sisters Beverley and Daphne. The family attended the Willowby Methodist Church before moving farms and attending Baring Square Methodist Church, Ashburton where Audrey was a Sunday School scholar attaining the highest possible marks in a Scripture Examination, Bible Class member, Sunday School Teacher, 1st Ashburton Girl's Brigade progressing through the ranks to become a Lieutenant and later the Captain.

Audrey married Colin Leadley the farmer in 1960 in their home Church - Baring Square Methodist and over the course of time their family grew to include four children, Cynthia, David, Brian and Barbara. Audrey – the mother – was seen as "The Hub of the Family" – always keeping up-todate with her children, and her much-loved grandchildren

It is mostly in those early days in Wakanui that Audrey was recognised as a multi-talented person. She was a member of the Women's Institute until moving to Christchurch when Colin became Presbyter in the Hornby/Riccarton Parish. She was President of Wakanui WI 1983/86, and a Mid Canterbury Federation Delegate 1987/89 entering fully into the activities and programmes. Baking, sewing, spinning, knitting and later painting, Camp Mum (Colin Camp Dad) Staveley Presbyterian/Methodist Easter Youth Camps, Baring Square Youth and Family Camps and on many occasions including Methodist Women's Fellowship National Convention at Gunn's Bush, South Canterbury in the early1980's – Audrey was a Camp Cook.

MWF (Methodist Women's Fellowship) meant a great deal to Audrey, an active member wherever she lived - Ashburton, Christchurch, Invercargill - National Treasurer on the Christchurch MWF National Executive 1992-94 and Treasurer of the Smethurst Committee - tasks she administered with skill and sensitivity. Audrey attended three Area Seminars of the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Women. Papua New Guinea in 1994: Audrey was Treasurer and assistant co-ordinator of the New Zealand delegation of some 30 women – Tongan, Samoan, Fijian and Pakeha; Samoa in 1999: she was a discussion leader (en-route to Samoa there were short stays in Fiji and Tonga); and in 2003 she was a banner making workshop leader when NZ hosted the event at Lincoln.

Audrey attended the Methodist Church Conference last year (2008) as she had on a number of occasions and was for a short time a member of the Methodist Provident Society Board. Audrey has served the Church well at many levels – locally, as a member of Synod and Conference. Members in the Hornby/Riccarton and Invercargill Parishes, the two parishes in which Colin served as Presbyter, hold Audrey in high regard for her sharing of talents and herself, her hospitality and warmth of friendship.

Back in Ashburton (2003) Audrey's more recent involvements included Pastoral Care Visitor, Convener of the Hostess Group responsible for catering – especially funerals, MWF Treasurer, South Canterbury District MWF Secretary, flower arranger, church cleaner, helper with Meals on Wheels and Probus. Audrey was involved in creating the new Central South Island Synod banner ready for Conference 2009 and within days of her death saw the completed banner. Audrey died on 9th August 2009.

David George Roberts

1921 - 2009

David was born in Wellington 87 years ago and grew up in Ngatoto Street, Ngaio. He went to Ngaio School then Wellington College and then on to Teachers Training College. This was interrupted when World War 11 began and he was called to the Army. David was a Conscientious Objector and he did not want to go to war, no matter what the circumstances so he accepted an option of doing administration work for the army. He took up typing and as his father had been involved in making typewriters he knew a lot about them. In this capacity, he served the army and his country first at Trentham, then in Italy and New Caledonia. He was promoted to the rank of Lance Corporal.

He returned to N.Z after the war, finished his teacher training and his degree and commenced what was to be his life long career as a primary school teacher. He loved teaching and was particularly attached to the 9 and 10 year olds. In Wellington, he taught at Ngaio where he had gone to school and also at Newton and Miramar. He moved to Palmerston North School Central for some years returning to live with his mother following his father's death. He became involved with the Kapiti Primary School where he became first assistant Principal before moving on to Paraparumu Beach School. David never married.

After retiring, he moved to Papatoetoe in Auckland, becoming really involved in a number of ways. He assisted in the Trade Aid Store, volunteered in helping sick and disabled to get to hospital and became a very active member of the Gilbert and Sullivan Society, singing in the choir. He was a very good baritone. He played the piano and the organ and had been involved in a number of church choirs. Keen on classical music, he had a large collection of L.Ps and he had visited the Opera House in Rome.

In Auckland, and as a keen historian and a strong committed Methodist, he became a member of the Wesley Historical Society and, after the sudden death of Rev. Leslie Gilmore in 1982, the Secretary. Here his gifts of careful record keeping, and willingness to keep in touch with members were especially valued. The Church Archives first in Turner Street and now in the present address near Penrose, was the repository for the records and literary productions of the Historical Society and Dave became a helper there. He was very welcome in those days when we were dealing with a great amount of unsorted files. It was then he was engaged with the research for his history of the early days of the Society which Les Gilmore had intended to write. Dave was faced with a huge task as Les had left few notes. His orderly and thorough account, 'The First Sixty Years' has resulted in a very valuable resource for the Society and researchers.

Another of the treasures he left with the Society, was the photographic record of the journey taken with Rev Doug Burt. The object was to visit all the churches which Rev. William Morley had listed and described in his History of Methodism in New Zealand. Dave and Doug had an enjoyable and interesting time, and were able to call on many friends and members of W.H.S. There was a need to record the changes

Which he original churches had undergone. We shall treasure this album and we shall remember David for his loyalty and faithfulness.

In later years David went back to the Kapiti Coast which he loved and moved into Kapiti Village. He was a private person and did much for others quietly without fuss. He was original and intelligent- great at crosswords and games like Target and committed to his tasks. He was an unassuming person who got on and did things. He had a very strong faith and was committed to his Church on the Kapiti coast. He held various offices in the Paraparaumu Methodist Church and was also involved when the circuit became the Kapiti Uniting Parish. He was an active church member being at Sunday worship most Sundays until the last month of his life. He was one of those who worked very hard in the fund raising for that Church.

It wasn't only the foundations of church buildings he helped put in place but also the foundations of education for many, many children over the years as well as the foundations of friendship and faith.

Harry Shaw

1928 - 2009

Harry Shaw was "the product of Boys' Brigade and the Methodist Church, and gave back to both everything he had." (Peter Stead)

Born on 13th August 1928 in Christchurch, Harry was one of three children of Harry and Gladys Shaw. He attended primary school in the South Canterbury towns of Temuka, Pleasant Point and Washdyke and then went on to Timaru Boys' High School.

It was in Timaru that Harry founded his first Boys' Brigade Company at the age of fifteen. Boys' Brigade was to be a life-long passion.

After a short career in the public service, Harry offered for the Methodist ministry. He did his first year of training as a Home Missionary in Taihape and then attended Trinity Theological College, Auckland from 1949 to 1951.

A couple of years out of college, Harry married Joan, a young school teacher and the woman whom he often said was responsible for teaching a rather rough country boy some manners and graces. Being a minister's wife was a demanding and sometimes costly role. There were times of personal grief. Harry and Joan's son Phillip died in a car accident at the age of twenty-one; their daughter Joanne died at the age of seven months. Yet together Harry and Joan were a team, the loving heart of a strong and very devoted family.

For the next forty years Harry and Joan ministered in a variety of parishes including Wairoa, Upper Hutt, Petone, Pahiatua, Cambridge and Melville. Harry was a hard and faithful worker, known for his commitment to the Church and the wider community. He was a Child Welfare Officer for over thirty years, was involved in Budget Advisory Services and was active in victim support.

Throughout this time Harry continued to serve in Boys' Brigade, becoming National President in 2003-2004. His community service was recognised in 2006 when he was made an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit.

In the 1960s and early 1970s Harry moved out of parish ministry to work as an army chaplain, serving in Malaysia, Vietnam and Singapore. That was an experience that gave him a strong affinity with those who served in the military. It also made him aware of the huge human cost of war which he never forgot.

In thinking about how he would like to be remembered, Harry mentioned qualities of resilience, commitment, love and hard work. Those qualities were particularly seen over the last fifteen months of his life. These were hard times as Harry faced his grief at Joan's death, the questions her loss had raised for him about faith, the need to retire from leadership of Boys' Brigade and his own increasing pain and declining health.

Through all of these days Harry stayed committed to the things he had built his life upon: to the boys at Brigade who always knew he wouldn't give up on them; to his family for whom he was always there when they needed to come home; and to his God, whom he trusted at the last when he let go of life so peacefully.

We give thanks for the gift of Harry's life and for the service he gave to his Church and community. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Rev Morehu (Buddy) Te Whare 1937 - 2009

"A mighty Totara has fallen, and we can feel the thud deep within our hearts." So spoke Desmond Cooper at the tangi for Buddy at Kirikiriroa Marae, Hamilton 23 March 2009.

As a seedling, the young Totara grew up deep within the soil of Maniapoto. Of the Rereahu Haapu, Buddy was born October 1 1937 at Moutoa near Te Keeti Marae in Otorohanga, the seventh of nine children of Hana (nee Tahatika) & Nika Te Whare. Buddy and his family lived from 1940-1944 on the banks of the Mangapu river near the junction with the Waipa river, the family shifting to Otewa in 1944.

Ratana-Christian in background, the Te Whares experienced Methodism primarily through visiting Methodist Deaconesses, noticably Sr Mary Sealey.

Buddy's friendship with Mary blossomed, and they married in August 1963 during Buddy's year of study in Trinity College's School for Christian Workers.

A years pastoral work followed in Putaruru and Tokoroa before Buddy candidated in 1965 for the Methodist Ministry.

Student Supply work with the Maori Division in Auckland was undertaken during theological college training; then Probationery studies in association with appointments at Three Kings and Northcote, culminating in Ordination at the Christchurch Methodist Conference in November 1970.

Te Taha Maori appointments in Mangere and Te Kuiti/Rohe Potae followed, as did the arrival of children Christopher, Brett & Grant (twins), Mark and Rawinia.

Buddy was held in high regard by Maori, Pacific and Pakeha alike, leading to his appointment as District Superintendent for Waikato-Waiariki, and then in 1987-1988 as President of the NZ Methodist Church, Te Háhi Weteriana O Aotearoa. Wider recognition followed with the awarding of the NZ Order of Merit in 1999.

In the heady days of developing the Methodist Church's bi-cultural partnership, Buddy's willingness to serve Pakeha and Pacific as well as Maori wasn't well received by everyone. The pressure undoubtedly contributed to Buddy and Mary separating in 1989 and Buddy resigning from the Ministry in 1990.

Following a year with the Maniapoto Trust Board in 1989, fellow Methodist, and one time Race Relations Conciliator Hiwi Tauroa, then drew Buddy into Treaty of Waitangi work for the government in Wellington. This led on to an appointment as a Treaty Issues Manager with the Ministry of Maori Affairs and then to Kaupapa Atawhai Manager with the Department of Conservation in Hamilton. Within this advisory appointment, Buddy travelled extensively throughout Tainui-Maniapoto.

A long standing closeness to Queen Te Atairangikahu and the Kingitanga was maintained, leading to Buddy being chosen to conduct the Queen's burial on Taupiri Mountain. Prior to her death, the Queen conferred on Buddy her last annual award to a Kaumatua, the coveted Te Amorangi - Lifetime Achievement Award.

In addition to his wider community service, Buddy continued to serve the Church in a voluntary capacity, notably as a worship leader and Kai Karakia trainer. Following a protracted and at times contentious process, Buddy was reinstated to full ministerial status in 2000.

Meanwhile, Buddy and Faye Chapman had married and enjoyed a close and supportive relationship.

As Buddy's health deteriorated in later years, Faye's care of him was exemplary. Together they also made a significant contribution to Waikato health services as Buddy, with Fay's support, became Kaumatua Kaunihera of the Waikato District Health Board and very involved in the Te Wai O Rona Diabetes Screening and Prevention programme.

Simultaneously, Buddy was Kaumatua for Community Waikato Social Services and Kaumatua for Trust Waikato.

Buddy's extensive community and church responsibilities sometimes raised questions for his family.

Family was however vital to Buddy, and he greatly enjoyed the company of his children, their partners, his mokopuna and wider family and church. Underpinning all was Buddy's deep Christian faith. As he once put it: "I found my understanding of faith in Jesus Christ never left me, or very humbly, I never left it."

Buddy brought to life and ministry all the characteristics of a leading Totara: well rooted in the soil and stability of Maori identity and Christian conviction; fine grained and distinctive in his application of the Way of Jesus to everyday living, and a commanding stature and presence, leavened always with great humour and humility, warmth and wellbeing for all.

E Hoa ... Haere, Haere, Haere ra. Haere i runga i te rangi-marie.

Kenneth Toomer

1928 – 2008

Ken died in Whangarei on 12 December 2008 and will be missed by family, friends, colleagues and his church community at St John's, Whangarei.

Ken was born in Auckland, one of the two children of Jack and Hannah Toomer. As a child, he moved with his family to Lower Hutt, where his father was a carpenter. After leaving school, he joined the merchant navy in the last years of the Second World War.

After the War, Ken went on his OE to England and Europe, and when he returned to New Zealand, he married Ruth. At this time, Ken became a commissioned Salvation Army officer, and during church moves across the country, three of his children were born.

While in Wellington, Ken started his training as a Methodist minister, and was first stationed to Masterton, where two further children were born. Four years later, the family moved to Christchurch, which was seen as one of the happiest times of Ken's life. A story told at Ken's funeral reminded the family of these happier times while camping together – when the weather turned to rain. Ken was the one outside directing events, soaking in the rain, while the family was inside, grasping the poles and following Ken's directions to a higher place away from the floods. Ken was involved in the development of the shared youth ministry between the Lincoln Road Methodists and Hoon Hay Presbyterians at the end of the sixties, and helped young people form a Coffee Club ministry. In those days there could have been up to one hundred young people attending evening worship. Ken always seemed to be at home among young people, even those who had gang associations. Ken was also enthusiastic about mission which was no doubt influenced by his background in the Salvation Army. The youth group would visit a villa at Sunnyside Hospital just over the road from the Methodist Church each fortnight and Ken would join them and enjoy his contact with the patients.

Six years later, the family moved to Auckland, and during the 1970's Ken left the ministry for family reasons to pursue other career options. Ken then worked for IHC for many years, moving back to Christchurch and then to Whangarei until he retired.

As a member of St John's, Ken was persuaded to become more involved, and then applied to be reinstated into Full Connexion, He was a valued member of the team of ministers available to take services, both at church and in rest homes and had been a member of the hospital chaplaincy team until shortly before his death. His sense of humour will be missed, and his preaching ministry and love of music will be remembered.

Peseti Tukutau

1956 - 2009

Born November 11, 1956 and passed away on April 19th, 2009 in Tonga. He pursued further Theological studies and ministry training at the Methodist Trinity Theological College and the Bible College of New Zealand.

He was ordained in Tonga before seconded with Siutaisa and family to the Methodist Church of New Zealand and was inducted on July 18th, 1999 to be the Superintendent of the Auckland/Manukau Tongan Methodist Parish.

The late Peseti, wife Siutaisa and family returned to Tonga after completion of his secondment in 2004. He was stationed to the Ha'apai Group of islands before his last stationing at the Fasi-moe-Afi Parish in Nuku'alofa.

Peseti was committed to Wesley Classes and encouraged Scriptural Holiness.

Jean Waugh 1927 - 2009

"Finally brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable - if anything is excellent or praiseworthy - think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me – put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you."

These verses from Philippians 4, along with other scripture, were chosen by Jean for her thanksgiving funeral service held in Christchurch on 24 March 2009 and a memorial service at Nelson on 26 March. They speak so much of Jean's life and witness.

Jean was born in Manchester, England, and emigrated with her husband Brian and two children. Lesley and Alec, to New Zealand in 1955. Three more children were born in New Zealand; Richard, Kathryn and Michael. Jean was a life-long Christian who often referred to her childhood encounter with Jesus. In her twenties she experienced the blessing of the Holy Spirit and was always involved in Methodist Churches wherever the family lived - Oamaru, Riccarton, Hokitika, Gisborne and Nelson. She was passionate about prayer, healing, always encouraging of children and youth, and was involved in a myriad of Christian organisations and community groups. Her energy and positivism were well known.

Lay preaching from the 1970s Jean felt released to serve full-time following Brian's death in 1984. After training at St John's Theological College she was ordained at the 1987 Nelson Conference and served as Presbyter of St Johns and Aldred Churches in Christchurch and Oxford District Union Parish, finally retiring to Nelson in 1995. She joined the Wesleyan Methodist Church in 2000 and continued to serve in a local evangelical Anglican Church.

Rev Ruth Boswell conducted Jean's funeral and concluded, "I believe that Jean would say to us today; 'I have lived my 82 years on the truth of the choice I have made; may I commend my Saviour to you. May you also know the way to the Father." The Methodist Church of New Zealand, Te Haahi Weteriana O Aotearoa joins with the Wesleyan Methodist Church of New Zealand in paying tribute to Jean's life and ministry.

Robert (Bob) William Widdup

1922 – 2009

Bob Widdup's ministry within the Methodist Church was an example of compassionate and sensitive pastoral care at its very best. The number of friends who came to his large funeral service from many former parishes around New Zealand attested to that fact.

From an early age Bob had both farming and the church in his blood. Brought up in Te Kopuru, North Auckland, he spent five years in the army medical services including two years overseas before returning to seven years of farming. Married to Hilda and with a young family to support he faced the tension between his love of farming and his deep yet hesitant desire to serve in ministry. Acceptance as a candidate "on trial" led to two years fulltime ministry in Apiti, followed by three years theological study at Trinity College during which he and his family of four boys lived at New Lynn and served there part time.. Early in his ministry Bob's pastoral sensitivity was apparent and his former lecturer, Dr David Williams, had hopes that he might pursue further study in this area but the opportunity did not arise. Instead he was to spend a further two years at New Lynn/Avondale prior to ordination, followed by five years at Beachhaven/Glenfield in Auckland, where his daughter Margaret was born, before a highly significant period of twelve years in Christchurch, five at Spreydon/Addington and seven at Papanui. During this time Hilda spent twelve months in Hospital with chronic back trouble, Bob caring for the five children while carrying a strenuous parish load. Later, Bob, Hilda and Margaret experienced several months in an exchange ministry in the United States followed by three months of pastoral study in Canada. Also during his North Canterbury ministry he served devotedly for three years as District Secretary and four years as District Superintendent. His final seven years of ministry prior to retirement were as Superintendent of the large Lower Hutt-Petone Parish where he was the presbyter at the Laings Road Church. Here too his leadership capacity, wisdom and experience were used to the full locally and in District and Connexional matters. After retirement Bob undertook a part time ministry in Whangaparoa before moving to the Kapiti Coast. His Kapiti years were marred by a stroke which initially left him severely impaired, but with determination, patience and courage he surmounted most of the limitations it brought. Bob would have been the first to acknowledge the constant support given his ministry by Hilda, his lifelong companion and soul mate. A person of outstanding qualities she also gave impressive leadership in her own right in the parishes and communities in which they lived.

While tending to underplay his academic prowess Bob was very progressive in his theological thinking keeping abreast of modern cutting-edge theologians. He was first and foremost a practical theologian pragmatically applying his faith to circumstances. He had a deep social concern exemplified by his stance on issues such as the Springbok tour, the nuclear free movement and gay and lesbian rights. But above all Bob was an outstanding pastor - a careful listener, a Marriage Guidance counsellor of many years standing, sympathetic and down-to-earth, deeply caring of people's welfare, ready to give all the time that was necessary, sound in his advice, putting himself out for people's sake, a respected colleague with a congenial personality, a twinkle in his eye, a hearty laugh, a keen sense of humour, a person who was carefully listened to in the forums of the church, a wise and practical administrator, loved deeply by a wide circle of family and friends. In honouring Bob we honour a person of singular devotion, a loving husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather, and a devoted presbyter who gave himself unstintingly to his God and his church.

Rangitatau Wood 1937 – 2008

Born Rangitatau Kopa, one of 16 children of George and Moengakura Kopa. Rangi grew up in Arohena, and then attended Hamilton High School and Te Rahui Wahine Hostel. She played tennis and was a netball representative.

Whilst at Te Rahui Wahine, Rangi joined a Maori Home Missioner on his Sunday round of Services and Sunday Schools. She was a reliable helper, a leader in the home and very caring towards the younger girls. She also took a leadership role in all the activities within the Hostel and was a calming influence within the large group of young girls.

Rangi met and married Neil Wood, was a mother of six children, twelve grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

She worked for the Department of Agriculture as a weather reader and was employed as a relieving Maori Language Teacher at Hillcrest High School and Fraser High School. Rangi was later employed at the Department of Maori Affairs as a Community Services Officer.

Rangi's passion was all things **Maori,** and a major part of her life was devoted to Te Kohanga Reo, and the Maori Women's Welfare League which included:

- Responsibility for setting up and establishing the initial Kohanga Reo throughout the Waikato Region, composing many story books and songs;
- Assessing Kaiako for Whakapakari as well as being the District Whakapakari Co-ordinator and Assessor;
- District Representative and reported to the National Kohanga Reo Trust;
- Part of "Te Piringa Taiwhenua, Kirikiriroa" before it became the "Tainui Regional Kohanga Reo";
- Kohanga Reo Announcer for Radio Tainui and her alias was "Rangi Rakau";
- First Whariki Trainer alongside Rina Ngataki;
- Member of the Whatawhata Maori Women's Welfare League;
- Member of the Rauawaawa Kaumatua Charitable Trust where her interests were weaving, flower arranging, singing, korowai and computer.

Rangi was also an avid supporter of the Kingitanga and attended Poukai. She was passionate about Te Reo Maori, and would participate in the pukapuka competitions. She was very creative and loved working with all sorts of different crafts, mahi toi, was a fantastic cook (and presentation was exemplary), maintained a spirited interest in all sports, particularly tennis, netball, rugby, cricket and yachting.

A koha of a taonga named the "Rangitatau Wood Trophy" was given to the Tainui Maori Women's Welfare League Regional Council for 'Te Reo' competitions. This was in memory of Rangi's contribution to the community and rohe.

Alongside all of this, Rangi had a strong Christian faith and was committed and dedicated to the service of the Methodist Church. Rangi served as a member of:

- Waikato Rohe;
- Hui Poari;
- Waikato-Waiariki Synod Executive;
- Kurahuna Committee;
- PAC Distribution Group;
- Council of Conference;
- 5+5 Conference Panel.

She kept herself busy, loved her home in Pitt Street, and had many lovely friends. Rangi will be fondly remembered for her terrific voice, 'spinning a tale' cracking jokes, love of singing, kindness and warmth to all she came into contact with. Our love and sympathy to Neil and the whanau.

Owen Theodore Woodfield, B.A.

1925 - 2009

Owen Woodfield owes much to his family heritage and the quality of rural Methodism in Horrelville, North Canterbury. His parents were stalwart Christians of notable character. His father was the Sunday School Superintendent and a lay preacher for 50 years. It was while Owen was working on the family farm that he heard God's call to serve Him as a minister.

As a young missionary probationer, Owen began his ministry in 1945, serving in Murchison before going onto New Plymouth in 1946. He was accepted for the ministry in 1947 and spent a year as a pre-collegiate probationer at Lyall Bay, Wellington. In 1948, Owen entered Trinity



College where he took a special interest in biblical studies, Hebrew and Greek. He completed his probation in Corstorphine Union Church, in Dunedin and was ordained at the Nelson Conference in 1952 and spent a further year in Corstorphine.

After Owen marriage to Muriel Wright in January 1954 they moved to minister together at Willowby, near Ashburton, until 1957. Appointments took them to Leeston for 6 years in 1958, where Owen graduated with a B.A. from Canterbury University in 1962, and onto St John's Bryndwr, Christchurch (1964 – 72) and Mission Bay, Auckland (1973-1978). Two years were then given to lecturing in biblical studies at the Word of Life College, Whangarei, followed by 15 months supply ministry with the Uniting Church in Australia at Launceston and Melbourne. Owen and Muriel returned to New Zealand to an appointment in the Henderson and Massey churches in West Auckland for 5 years until his retirement from full-time ministry in 1988.

After retirement, Owen continued to preach in Canterbury churches, again in Australia and in England for a short time. After Owen and Muriel's move into The Oaks retirement complex in Christchurch, he continued to conduct services there at Christmas time and on other special occasions.

Blessed with a magnificent tenor voice, Owen enriched the singing of congregations, choirs, conferences and sang the tenor solos in many oratorios and cantatas.

Owen was a familiar figure among the Methodist Conference secretarial team for most of his ministry. Owen's wider connexional work included 8 years as secretary of the Children's Home Board in Christchurch and, for a number of years, as secretary of the Auckland District Property Committee. He also completed 4 years service as National Candidates Assessment Convener of the Committee on Ministry.

Owen and Muriel demonstrated true partnership in both marriage and ministry until Muriel's death in December 2005. Consistently loyal to the NZ Methodist Church, Owen's contacts and fellowship ranged widely among evangelical and charismatic Christians, and beyond. The most important aspect of Owen's Christian walk was when he came into the baptism of the Holy Spirit in 1964. This led to dramatic changes in his personal ministry and in his prayer life. He provided early leadership in the charismatic movement and was the first chairman - for 10 years - of the Methodist Revival Fellowship in New Zealand (later the Aldersgate Fellowship, then Methodist AFFIRM). Owen led many missions, camps, crusades and Life in the Spirit seminars across the country, in many churches and across many denominations.

As we give thanks for Owen's life, we reflect on a life of prayer and Spirit-filled biblical preaching, based on an in-depth biblical knowledge and committed relationship with the God he adored. Many lives were touched by his ministry, the fruits of which can be seen in the numerous missionaries, church leaders and parishioners who bear testimony to this. Owen has left a rich legacy of faith which will produce an on-going harvest.

Dawn Wright

1927 - 2008

It is with sadness that we note the death of our friend and long term loyal member of Methodist Women's Fellowship, Dawn Wright.

Dawn was born in Taumarunui and shifted to Palmerston North with her family as a 6 year old. She trained as a Dental nurse in Wellington and was then posted to Stratford (when she met her husband Jack, a shepherd) and then moved to Wanganui.

Dawn and Jack moved around from Porangahau, Tututawa, Bulls, Auckland (when Jack attended Theological College for 3 years), and onto their first Parish in Okato, then Rongotea, Te Aroha and back to retire in Palmerston North.

Dawn and Jack had two children Grant and Glenda and whilst they were very young Dawn returned to work and continued in her profession whilst Jack was at Theological College.

Dawn was a member of Methodist Womens Fellowship from the time when they entered their first parish at Okato alongside her interest in feminist theology, and she forwarded the cause of women in leadership (whilst not keen to take a leadership role herself) but always with a balanced viewpoint.

After they returned to Palmerston North, Dawn served on the National Executive of the Womens Fellowship during the term of 1994-96. She served as the Taha Maori, Tongan, Fijian and Rotuman Group Cooperative Link and Bulletin Editor. She always made a point of addressing Pakeha, then Maori and then followed with the other cultures.

She also served a term as the Treasurer of the Palmerston North Fellowship.

Dawn was influenced by a very strong social justice conscience, which she carried on throughout her life and in her role as a wife and mother.

Dawn was also a member of Conference Standing Committee, the Community or Women and Men in Church and Society for 5 years and was also a member of the Palmerston North Parish Bicultural Group for four years (she was also involved in the bicultural group from her time at Te Aroha).

During this time Dawn was also actively involved with the Methodist Social Service Centre, for several years a receptionist at the MSSC and also involved in the advocacy service that was instigated during her time there. Alongside this involvement Dawn also worked at the Highbury Shop.

Even though Dawn suffered indifferent health for many, many years, she was forever cheerful and an inspiration to those around her. She will be remembered for her encouraging and gentle words, she never complained even though she was suffering.

We miss her cheerfulness and willingness to always have a chuckle with you, so let me share a typical joke that occurred in her earlier life as the Ministers wife (as relayed by Rev Jack).

Whilst Jack and Dawn were at Okato (in the good old days), Dawn overheard the women of the fellowship talking in hushed tones, saying that they should ask 'her' the ministers wife, she would have some!

"Have some what?" asks Dawn

"those big bloomers, we want some for a play we are putting on"

"no fear", says Dawn, "I don't wear those big bloomers!" Those were the days when the minister's wife was thought to be very prudish and somewhat old fashioned, but they were soon put right by Dawn.

Dawn, we miss her, is survived by her husband Jack, son Grant, daughter Glenda and husband David, four grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Mere Cassidi

(nee Hauraki) 1932 - 2009

Ko Ninihi ko Puhangatohora: Ki Whakatere Manawa-Kaiaia, Ki te Ramaroa: whiti atu i te wahapu o Hokianga e ngunguru mai na. Nga maunga whakahii o ratou kua mene atu: tu te ao,

tu te po!

Mere Cassidy was born on 30th January 1932 in Omanaia and educated there too. In 1950 she married her lifelong partner, Tohu (Charlie) Cassidy and they set up home in the Hokianga with their ten children.

Mere was dedicated to working with her Maori people and some of her commitments were:

- Member of the South Hokianga Maori Executive Committee;
- Omanaia representative on Hauora Hokianga;
- Instigating the re-opening of the Omanaia Te Kohanga Reo;
- Tutor for Maori weaving at Northland Polytechnic;
- Tutor for waiata and tikanga Maori wananga at Te Kotahitanga Marae in Kaikohe;
- Tutor for waiata and tikanga Maori wananga at Tuhirangi and Otatara Marae in Waima;
- Chairperson (facilitator) for Omanaia Marae Committee;
- Business owner of Kaiwhare Village in Waima.

Mere came from a family steeped in Methodism. There were her sisters Te Waihoroi Tana who had special ministry to the sick and dying, Timaru Rogers who served as a Minita-a-lwi and the Reverend Hana Hauraki. Furthermore her husband served as a Minita-a-lwi too.

With these examples in her life, Mere became a Minita-a-Iwi in 1994 and served in the Tai Tokerau Rohe. She was Liaison Person for the Rohe until ill health prevented her from carrying out her duties. Mere was a strong advocate of the Methodist Church's Bicultural Journey and served on a number of Boards and Committees of the Church These included:

- Hui Poari;
- Council of Conference;
- Northland Union District Council, now known as Churches Together Northland;
- Convenor of Te Taha Maori at Conference;
- Te Roopu Waahine.

Her commitment and service to the Church was of utmost importance as was time spent with family and her many mokopuna. Mere passed away on 14th August 2009 and a song written by her grandchildren entitled "Hold our Hands" pay tribute to her as a person:

"We're all gathered here together to see you

To say all our farewells to you.

We've been there before and you've been here before and together we will be alright. When it gets dark and when it gets cold, we hold each other till we see the sunlight."

Laurie Barber

The Rev. Dr. Laurie Barber retired from the University of Waikato History Department in 2000 after 25 years as an academic. A Fellow of the Royal Historical Society and a former Fellow of the Royal Asiatic Society, he has thirteen published books (solo or shared authorship) and has over 130 articles in the University's listing.

Formerly a Parish Minister and a Chaplain to the Forces in Singapore and Vietnam, on retirement he was in Kerikeri, in turn, preaching Convenor to St James' Anglican Parish and for two years Minister of Kerikeri Union Parish.

Following a stroke he assisted his wife, the Rev. Petra Barber, in St John's Union Parish, Opotiki, during their five years ministry. He was received into Methodist Connexion in 2006. Amongst Laurie's academic distinctions are a MA. (Hons); Ph.D; Dip Theol; Dip Agr; and a Schol Theol. His Scholar in Theology thesis, "The God Children" is born of a long passion for ecumenical furtherance.

He accompanied the Rev. Petra Barber to Invercargill, where she was inducted as Presbyter of the Invercargill Methodist Parish in February 2009.

Margaret Donald

Born in Morrinsville in 1944 Margaret was well grounded in Methodism as both her mother and father were Methodist and worshipped at the Waitoa Methodist Church. The family moved north and for a time worshipped at Homai Church in Manurewa. When Margaret reached her teens she became part of the Papakura Bible Class and it was there at the age of 12 that she first felt called to Ministry.

Margaret chose to pursue nursing as a career with her training being done at Middlemore Hospital. While training at Middlemore she joined up with a Young Missionary Group which was part of the Auckland Central Parish and was based in the Aotea Chapel.

After marriage to Bruce she spent three years in the Solomon Islands. This was a somewhat frustrating period for Margaret as, because she was married, she was unable to continue with her nursing. Towards the end of the time their first son was born at Munda in 1968.

On returning to New Zealand, Bruce and Margaret took over the management of the Methodist Campsite at Omana (South east Auckland). They were there for 11 years and built their own home on the campsite. Their four other children were born while they were there and the children did their primary schooling at Maraetai and Clevedon schools. All the boys did their secondary schooling at Wesley College as did their youngest daughter. Thus started Margaret's interest in the College. She was a member of the Board of Governors for some years and when the College enrolled girls for the first time she worked at the College for some time. She tells of how hard it was, that first year, for the girls who came.

After her divorce in 1995 she returned to nursing. She spent time learning her way round the computer and during this period she did a great deal of questioning of her beliefs. She felt challenged to discover who God was for her. This led her to again hear God's call to ordained ministry. This time she felt it was the right time to accept the challenge and so started her study and candidature. She began her study with the EIDS in 1996. She candidated in 1998 and began her training with the Ministry Training Unit at Pitt Street under the guidance of the Reverend Susan Adams. Margaret was ordained in 2004. Her Ministry was non stipendiary and was specifically ministry with women. Because it was non stipendiary, Margaret continued nursing part-time over these years. Margaret is a wonderfully conscientious and orderly person. Her study assignments were thorough and insightful. Everything she did, she did to the glory of God and with all her heart. During her probationary years she helped out in the Pukekohe Church when it was without a Presbyter for a year.

In 1996 Margaret and a group of women began the Women's Group. Margaret's candidature for the Ministry allowed her to minister with this group. The group continues to offer quality friendship and hospitality, mainly due the facilitation skills which Margaret has provided. Because the women are a vibrant and caring community Margaret feels that the group dynamics will enable them to carry on. Recently Margaret took over the management role at Aparangi Retirement Village at Te Kauwhata. This is a full-time position which will require all of Margaret's energy, so she has decided that it is the right time to superannuate.

In her own quiet way, Margaret has challenged the church. Te Háhi Wetereana has much for which to thank this woman. Her gentle caring nature has mirrored the gospel message for many women who have often felt marginalised by the church. She has lived her Christian faith. Well done Margaret.

Michael Dye

Most of Mike's life and ministry has been in the UK. His early life was spent in the City of Liverpool, attending school in Southport, and Church at the Blundellsand's Methodist congregation. Lively discussion in the church's Young People's Fellowship, and youth activities throughout the Circuit stimulated Mike's interest and commitment to Christian Faith.

Mike's first career was as a valuation surveyor, training with a Liverpool company of Estate Agents and then working in the Estate Management unit of a regional brewery. It was here that he met Sue, who was to become his wife.

First thoughts of ordained ministry were planted by members of Mike's home church and explored during Circuit Youth Weekends and local preacher training, undertaken with trepidation. Mike candidated for Methodist ministry and was accepted for residential training in 1969 at Handsworth Theological College. In his second year, Handsworth amalgamated with Queen's Anglican College to establish the first fully ecumenical college for ministerial training. Mike and Sue married in this period and shared together in the social life of the college community. Mike recalls this as an exciting time during which he also attained a BA in theology at Birmingham University.

Mike was stationed as a probationer to the Huddersfield-West Circuit on the edge of the Pennine hills, where he had pastoral charge of two chapels in the close-knit industrial mill villages of West Yorkshire. Here their two sons, Elliot and Stuart, were born. The family moved further north to the Yorkshire market town of Bingley where they spent seven years, living on the edge of the Moors and serving the four Methodist communities of the town. With the arrival of daughter, Kate, the family was complete.

A yearning to live near the coast once more, took them to the Hartlepool Circuit in North East England, where Mike had a town centre church, and an informal ecumenical congregation on a modern council-house estate, and some chaplaincy work at the town's general hospital. In 1988 they welcomed an invitation to return to the Liverpool District with an appointment at a large suburban church in the Birkenhead Circuit. This was home for ten years, during which time the children completed their schooling and dispersed to universities in the southern half of the country. Re-building the small Thingwall church was a happy achievement during this period. Then for the last four years in Birkenhead Mike took on the Circuit superintendency for eight churches and a ministerial staff of five, and was tested in the chairmanship of a major community project in downtown Birkenhead.

A move to the Northwich Circuit in Cheshire looked likely to be a long term and final stationing. Mike enjoyed the challenge of a diverse community with sixteen churches serving the old salt-town and its outlying farming communities. His pastoral charge covered five churches and his superintendency involved re-aligning staff roles to enable greater outreach.

The move of their oldest son and partner to New Zealand in 2000, followed two years later by his brother and sister, revised the Dye's future plans. Mike applied to Mission Resourcing for an

appointment in New Zealand, obtained permission from the UK Conference to curtail his English work at the end of their Connexional year, and so arrived in New Zealand in July 2005. He was welcomed to a supply ministry at St. Georges Presbyterian Church in Takapuna, before commencing his appointment to Takapuna Methodist Parish in 2006.

Mike's principal interests revolve around the natural world – he enjoys walking and has a continuing interest in conservation. He recalls various bird-watching ventures in Europe, Israel, Goa and the USA and a group trek in Uzbekistan in 1998-1999 to raise funds for a special project of the Royal Society for Protection of Birds.

On a personal level, Mike is friendly, open and caring. He has endeavoured in the church to encourage a fellowship that is inclusive in its acceptance and affirmation of all, and where there is a readiness to work with the variety of personalities, views and theologies that God has given us. Mike's pastoral care, his timely one-to-one visiting, and his ability to listen with empathy and handle sensitive issues diplomatically are strengths that have been deeply appreciated in his ministry.

Mike's collaborative style of leadership encourages teamwork – he ably led both the Northcote and Takapuna congregations through a period of change as they amalgamated to become a single new Parish. He views worship as the most distinctive activity of the gathered Christian community. He enjoys seeing variety in the church's programme of worship, appreciates a mix of old and new music and other elements, and welcomes participation, both spontaneous and prepared, from all ages. He values the presence of children and young people in the life of the church and sees them as contributors to today's church.

Mike's skilfully crafted sermons are a particular strength and a delight to his congregations – they are insightful, inspiring and intellectually stimulating, reflecting his admirable depth of thought and the assiduous preparation that he puts into preaching.

Thanks you, Mike, for all the strengths and gifts you have brought to your ministry in New Zealand, and we wish to acknowledge how very much we have valued the contribution that you and Sue have made to our Parish. We hope you have a long, happy and healthy retirement.

Brenda Fawkner

Baptised and confirmed as a Methodist, Brenda trained as a Primary Teacher, and taught in several lower North Island schools. She remembers church in New Plymouth being accepting and loving before leaving in 1979 with her husband John to work for the Methodist Church in Tonga, John at the Agricultural College and Brenda in pre-school education and assisting with the sale of handcrafts through Trade Aid NZ. For Brenda this was a time of searching and spiritual discovery and experiencing how others lived out their faith. This was followed by an assignment in West Timor Indonesia where John worked as an Agricultural consultant. They were embraced by a small Christian community, it was there that she discovered importance and strength of community and it has remained a central focus:

Brenda and John returned to New Plymouth in 1983 and a lively Charismatic Movement expressed through the Aldersgate Fellowship. In her words, "God found me". It was a time of huge growth and spiritual deepening in which she gave up reading novels because there was so much to discover in the current spiritual writings. Brenda tutored children with learning difficulties, and at St Luke's Methodist Church taught Sunday School, served on Parish Council, and was Lay Pastor to the ill and shut in. Brenda joined the Hospital Chaplaincy Team in 1987, training and working as an assistant in ministry to surgical, medical, pyschiatric, elderly patients and the terminally ill. Through this time she completed a CPE course at Porirua and Keneperu hospitals and began training as a Spiritual Director.

Reading Jung and Morton Kelsey opened out her spiritual horizon to later include Celtic spirituality. When Russell Rigby returned from Conference to talk of a Dave Mullen rejuvenated Diaconate, Brenda candidated in 1988 in the Home Setting programme. Ordained in 1991 in a time of great hope, she saw the energy of the NZ Methodist Diaconate decline at the same time as the Uniting Church of Australia Diaconate grew in strength. In 1995 Brenda was appointed as part time Chaplain to Tainui Village Rest Home, always on call. Continuing training, Brenda gained a Certificate in Counselling in 1995 and completed her Spiritual Direction formation in 1996.

Brenda tells of a growing confidence through this time. Her self understanding through Jungian 'shadow person', 'collective unconscious', and dream discernment, enriched her and created a foundation for ministry as Funeral Celebrant, in Art Therapy in Mental Health, Parish Council and Worship Leader at the New Plymouth Methodist Centre. From her beginnings in ministry, Brenda has worked ecumenically and as much with the unchurched as those familiar with the Christian tradition. She tells of her strong belief of working in community and having a spiritual home group for support. Her 21 years as Deacon within the New Plymouth Methodist Parish have been of equal benefit to Brenda as to the communities in which she has served. She has earned her retirement but many look forward to her continuing ministry and community involvement.

John Murray Grant

John commenced 'ministry' in The Methodist Church of New Zealand / Te Háhi Weteriana o Aotearoa as National Youth Director, a post he held from 1978 to 1982. As such he was responsible for youth leadership training throughout NZ and organised many events and courses including leadership formation weekends and Easter camps. His formal theological training took place at Trinity-St. Johns from 1984 to 1985. His interest in continuing education earned him *B.Soc.Sci. (Psychology),* Waikato University, 1995; *Licentiate of Theology,* 1993; *Certificate in Therapeutic Supervision,* Auckland Institute of Technology, 1997; *Certificate in Family Therapy,* 1997; *Accredited Trainer,* NZ Trainer Network, from 1986; *Advanced Clinical Pastoral Educational Quarter,* 1985.

During his term as a **parish minister in Stratford** from 1986 to 1989 John utilised his gifts as a counsellor. He specialised in counselling in the role of 'community chaplain' and was drawn on by local hospital staff. He worked part-time in the Stratford residential alcohol and drug treatment unit (later known as the Miranda Centre) as a group therapist and chaplain, and became the inaugural chairperson of the Taranaki Substance Abuse Council Inc. John co-facilitated the Methodist Taranaki bicultural group throughout his ministry in Stratford.

Relocating to Nelson, John held the positions of **Community Alcohol and Drug Therapist** (1989 to 1992), **Acting Manager of the Alcohol and Drug Clinic** and then as **Health Consultant to Midland Regional Health Authority**, managing its alcohol & drug project from Nov. 1993 to Dec. 1996. Projects involved investigating issues and making recommendations concerning methadone treatment, co-existing disorders, detoxification and residential treatment. He provided training to service providers in detoxification, assessment, treatment of those with co-existing disorders, and harm reduction strategies with injecting drug users.

In these various positions, John made a remarkable contribution to individuals and their families suffering from alcohol and drug-related problems. He supervised key community clinicians from the Courts, Medical Social Workers, ITIM, Hospital Chaplains, Polytechnic Colleges and other organisations. He was called upon to share his strengths in spirituality and sensitivity to biculturalism.

From 1993 to November 2004 John served as the **Ecumenical Chaplain at the Waikato Polytechnic.** As a chaplain, he was particularly involved in pastoral counselling of staff and students and in working within the Student Services team developing policies that complied with the Human Rights Act, 1993.

As an **ordained Methodist minister** John offered his special gifts to the faith community as well as to the wider society.

Throughout John's ministry family has remained central and important. His three children Anneke,

Brett and Hannah are a constant source of pride and satisfaction to John and Rose.

We place on record the gratitude of the Church and many people within and outside Te Háhi Weteriana o Aotearoa for John's ministry over three decades.

Michael Greer

Michael Greer was born in Auckland and completed his secondary education at Mt Albert Grammar School. The untimely death of his father was one of the events which prompted his becoming involved in the YMCA and then at Pitt St Methodist Church. It was while there that he was welcomed into the family of Bill and Joan Elliott.

Bill Elliott modelled for Michael unique qualities of care, concern and leadership. Michael's growing love of the "Methodist way" of expressing Christianity was nourished and flourished under the preaching and example of Rev Eric Clement who not only helped form his early spiritual life, but also demonstrated that ministry should have an overlay of good administration, management and governance practice. The Rev Selwyn Dawson was a key influence and challenge in Michael's spiritual journey by showing a persistent and critical relevance of the gospel in contemporary social and economic issues. The imperative of contemporary theological perspectives and the need for quality, well rounded ministry practice was modelled by the Rev Jack Penman. Michael acknowledges with gratitude that these four men were a primary influences in his formation as an individual, minister and presbyter and provided for him the solid, well rounded base from which he worked until retirement.

Working initially in the Public Service in the early 1960's enabled Michael to experience a grounding in the principles of good administration and management. These skills were further developed over the next decade, when he moved from the Public Service into the private sector of management and marketing.

It was also at Pitt St that Michael met his first wife Lorraine Elliott. Lorraine was a key part of his life from the late 1950's and he expresses a particular gratefulness for her love and support during his time of ministry training. Lorraine has continued to support both Michael and his second wife Alison in their ongoing ministry and care of family.

In 1972 Michael entered Trinity College – uniquely, the last year for Methodist students on the Grafton Road site. He completed the Diploma of the School for Christian Workers (then the required pre-cursor for ministry training) and undertook supply ministry appointments at Morrinsville in 1973/ 74, followed by Opunake in 1974. He was elected Trinity College Senior Student in1975 and in that year also completed his theological training.

Michael was stationed and served in Stokes Valley, Avalon and Petone (1975-78) and Tawa Union (1979-85). During this time he accepted oversight of the redevelopment of the central church site at St Stephen and held the position of Deputy District Superintendent Wellington Methodist District 1974-75. A further parish appointment followed at Trinity Pakuranga (1976-78) during which he managed the, unprecended at that time, acquisition of a site for a new church in the newly developing suburb of Mangamangaroa, later to become Howick South. He also became Superintendent of the Manukau North Methodist Circuit.

During this period at Pakuranga a heart attack in late 1978 necessitated temporarily stepping out of the demands of parish ministry. The Church was delighted when the Auckland Methodist Mission were able to use Michael's skills as Development & Administration Manager (1979 – 80) overseeing a unique period of substantial organisational and financial change for service providers in the religious and welfare sector.

A parish minister at heart Michael accepted stationing to St Paul's, Remuera (1991-96) and Superintendent of the Orakei Parish. In 1993 the Auckland Synod elected him to the position of District Superintendent. In this role he was responsible for the initial establishment of Chinese

Methodist and Korean Methodist congregations in New Zealand and the relationship with the Methodist Church of South Korea.

In 1996 Michael accepted a call to Cashmere Hills Presbyterian Church (1996-98) which gave him a brief respite from Connexional responsibilities and also enabled he and Alison to be nearer Alison's aging parents.

In 1999 Michael was appointed by the Methodist Church of New Zealand and the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand to report on difficulties that had arisen in the Council for Mission & Ecumenical Development and make recommendations for the future of its work for both denominations. He researched, prepared and presented a major report to Assembly and Conference 1999 and managed the disestablishment of COMEC and the creation of a Mission & Ecumenical appointment for the Methodist Church. The Administration Division also made use of his skills during this time as Assistant to the General Secretary.

Yet again a call to parish ministry saw him stationed to Upper Riccarton 2000-2004, as Superintendent Hornby Riccarton Methodist Parish.

The Church asked Michael to make himself available for the position of Superintendent of the Christchurch Methodist Mission (2004-2009). This is a role that he filled with distinction. He built a strong team within the Mission, was a key member of WesleyCom, established many key relationships and made representation and was part of delegations to Christchurch City Council and Government. Ill health in early 2009 required that he take early retirement in May 2009.

Over the years Michael has represented the Methodist Church on a number of ecumenical groups such as the Churches Commission on Broadcasting (1982-87) which he chaired for a time. He was also Regional Chaplain for the Wellington Girl's Brigade (1980-85) and a member of the NZ Christian Council for Social Services (2005-09), where he was elected Chair in 2008.

Michael has given outstanding service to the Connexional Church. The long list of appointments includes:

- Chaplain to the President of Conference 1977 (Jack Penman).
- Convenor, Methodist Communications Committee (1980-85).
- Familiarisation tour Uniting Church of Australia communications work 1983.
- Board member, Development Division, 1986-88.
- Convenor, Committee on Ministry 1988.
- Chaplain to the President of Conference 1992 (Keith Rowe).
- Board member, Methodist Education Division 1976-85: Chair of Stewardship Section, Administrator Lay Preachers Examinations (1976-78).
- Trustee, Wesley College Trust Board 1991-95.
- Board member and Chair, Trinity Theological College Council 1991-95; Joint Chair St Johns/Trinity Joint Planning Committee; Chair Board of Studies.

- Acting Commissioner, Board of Ministry 2007-08.
- Chair of reconstituted Mission Resourcing Unit, 2008.
- Member of the Methodist Trust Association from 1998 to present.

Michael's ministry has been marked by a commitment to quality pastoral relationships, relevant, intellectually honest, challenging preaching, a solid commitment and professional attitude to sound administrative practice, financial oversight, management and governance and a readiness to confront social and economic inequities. To these qualities he brought the warmth of his humanness and a deep pastoral sensitivity. It has to be acknowledged that the Church has asked much of Michael and that at times an unfair stress was placed upon him. His deep sense of commitment and vocation meant that he worked himself to the point of exhaustion which in turn resulted in ill health. Throughout this time Michael has been blessed with the love and support of Alison who has, no matter what the Church has asked of him, given her support unswervingly and

uncomplainingly, even when the demands have seemed more than should have been asked. The Church also acknowledges Alison's own contribution to many conferences as catering coordinator a task to which she brought experience, skill and grace.

The Church wishes Michael and Alison a long, happy and healthy retirement as they take time to enjoy family and each other.

Margaret Hall

Margaret is, by birth, a "Mainlander", she was born in Wyndham, Southland. While Margaret was still a young child, she and her family moved north and settled in Taranaki. She started her education at Eltham Primary School, then she moved on to Stratford Technical High School. This was followed by Victoria University, Wellington from where she gained her B.A. She made a career as a Secondary School Teacher of Maths and Languages firstly at Inglewood High School and then Makora College, Masterton. Margaret later became Regional Representative for the Correspondence School and travelled all over the lower North Island visiting and advising her students and their families.

In her first year in the Wairarapa Margaret became a member of Knox Presbyterian Church (now St. Lukes Union) Masterton. After she and her husband had built in Carterton she then transferred to St. David's Union Church. Margaret was a very active member at St. Davids. Among other things in parish life, she particularly served as Parish Council Secretary for twenty years and later became assistant minister. She accepted a call for ordained ministry in the mid nineteen nineties. She trained under the Trinity Methodist Theological College Probationary Studies scheme which was basically a distance learning study programme. Margaret has since served both St. James Union, Masterton and St. Andrew's Union, Featherston concurrently, as "part time" minister to both for six years.

Over the years Margaret, both as a teacher and Presbyter, has become well known and much respected in the Wairarapa. She is an evangelist and a keen supporter of such programmes as "Alpha" and "Victorious Ministry Through Christ". Margaret has been described by those in her congregation as one "who lives in the real world. Talking to Margaret is like talking to a friend and there is no sense of her ever standing in judgement over anyone. She does not set herself apart because of her ministerial status but rolls up her sleeves and gets on with any job that requires doing - she is a woman of prayer coupled with practical action. Through Margaret we have greatly increased our congregation but, more importantly, we have grown spiritually and grown closer as a family of God."

Margaret's love of God also is expressed through her great love of animals, and her genuine care for all people. Margaret has the ability, inclination and love to walk beside those in need with a practical and down to earth manner. She is cheerful, sensible, hard working and reliable and will be greatly missed both by her congregations and the UDC of the Wairarapa, whom she has served so faithfully and so well.

Russell Rigby

At this Conference, Russell concludes 41 years of ministry, working within Te Hāhi Weteriana O Aotearoa, the British Methodist Conference, and the Community. Throughout his ministry Russell has shown a creativity, theological insight and a deep pastoral concern for people.

In 1966 Russell trained for ministry at Trinity Methodist Theological College. His first appointment was to the Dunedin South Circuit with responsibility for Mosgiel and Abbotsford, followed by six years in the Invercargill Parish. From there he was appointed to a team ministry in the New Plymouth Parish. People remember Russell for his thoughtful teaching and preaching, his natural pastoral skills and his care for people. While in New Plymouth he helped the Parish grapple with questions, about the way in which they interfaced with community.

Russell describes himself as having a foot outside of the Institutional Church and at the same time enjoying working within it. For example, in addition to normal Parish responsibilities, Russell also engaged with the community: becoming an unofficial school chaplain to a primary school, training in Gestalt therapy, involvement in human relation work with the YMCA, and convenor for the Governments Social Work Department's Volunteers Scheme.

Chaplaincy has been a significant part of Russell's ministry. He was a Hospital Chaplain in Invercargill and New Plymouth. Russell first became involved in Industrial Chaplaincy in Mosgiel and this continued in Invercargill and in New Plymouth, where he became the Co-ordinator for Taranaki.

Ministry for Russell has always been outward facing and in 1993 he moved out of Parish ministry to work half time as the first prison Chaplain to the New Plymouth Prison. During this period he became an accredited counsellor and worked half time in a private partnership called the 'Aurora Centre'.

In 1997 he was appointed to the Cambridge Union Parish. It was a satisfying ministry in which he enabled a strong Parish to develop a stronger outward looking ministry, reflecting the width of gifts in the Church. Parishioners warmly remember his ministry as one of challenge and for the way in which both Russell and Pauline participated fully in the life and activities of the Parish. Particular mention is made of his preaching and pastoral care.

Ministry within the British Methodist Conference first took shape as a one year exchange to Blackpool during 1985 to 1986. Then in 2004, Russell and Pauline moved to the United Kingdom for a three year appointment to the Hartford Methodist Circuit and subsequently to the Lancaster Circuit for two years. Russell is remembered by the people as a 'breath of fresh air', enabling people to discover their talents and to develop them within the life of the Church. People speak warmly about the challenges of his preaching and teaching and his pastoral care.

Throughout his ministry Russell was always considerate of the needs of Pauline and his family. Together they supported each other and found a balance in their various activities. Pauline's musical talents, along with her warmth and many other gifts have been greatly appreciated by parishioners and the community.

Russell has a special ability to think outside the square, and encourage people to move forward in new ways. In ministry he has given strong leadership and sensitive pastoral care. His depth of preaching and biblical insight has been greatly appreciated, along with a creativity that has enhanced the life of parishes and organisations to which he has served. People including his colleagues have found him approachable and easy to get on with and with a faith that is strongly integrated in everything that he does.

Russell through his ministry has made a significant contribution to the life of Te Hāhi Weteriana O Aotearoa and as a Church we give thanks and pay tribute to Russell for a full and rich ministry.

Kenneth Smith

Kenneth Raymond Smith was born and raised in Southland. His family were stalwarts of the rural Methodist church where he grew up.

Kenneth joined the Bank of New South Wales in Edendale, and served in Waipukarau, Petone, Lawrence and Hereford St Christchurch branches and spent some time relieving at Pukekohe, Papanui, The Terrace Wellington and Timaru.

For six years Kenneth and his wife Helen owned and operated a rural grocery business. During this time Kenneth qualified as a Lay Preacher. During the late 1970's early 1980's Kenneth held a management role in a major retail chain in Invercargill. He candidated for Ministry while in Invercargill and entered Theological College in 1982. Kenneth sincerely thanks the Church for his

Theological Education and his time at the Theological College.

Kenneth's first appointment was to Tokomairiro Co-operating Parish followed by Rangiora, Christchurch North, Wanganui, and Waitakere.

Kenneth was District Superintendent in Taranaki/Wanganui and Synod Superintendent in Auckland. In 2005 he was Vice President of the Conference. Over the years he served on a number of Church Committees and Boards. He was Secretary and then Convenor of the Making Disciples Task Group, Co-convenor of the Council of Conference and a member of the Council of Elders.

Kenneth intends to commence his "third life" in retirement in Christchurch, where Helen's and Kenneth's two sons, daughter-in-law and five grandchildren reside.

Twenty five years of ministry for Helen and Kenneth have been eventful, challenging, spiritually uplifting, down right difficult, yet rewarding and God's grace has been sufficient at all times.

Kenneth and Helen express their sincere thanks to the many people, Lay and Ordained who have encouraged them, challenged them, befriended them, and prayed for them.


Taniela Moala



In the context of accelerating climate change and the urgent need to reduce carbon emissions for the sake of the earth, the world's poor and future generations we need to take practical steps as a church to take seriously this challenge.

A significant contributor to the build up of carbon in the atmosphere are petroleum-fuelled motor vehicles. Research shows that sixty per cent of motor vehicle usage in Aotearoa New Zealand is for journeys of less than 2k.

I therefore urge that Conference:

- 1. Call on Methodist parishes and Union and Cooperating ventures to promote walking and cycling for short-distance travel in both personal and church-related business.
- 2. Ask the Board of Administration to investigate how a cycling allowance could be offered to Presbyters and church employees alongside the existing car allowance, and to report back to Conference 2010 with detailed provisions for implementation no later than January 2011.

Such provision would reward and not penalise those who choose to carry out church business by bicycle. It would also signal a commitment by the church to encourage ecologically responsible forms of transportation. At the moment church travel allowances are part of the problem rather than the solution.

Things to Consider:

Basic principles of democracy which are often overlooked include:

- That all people (or as many as possible) are able to have their views appropriately represented, to ensure as many views as possible are included in any decisions;
- That people feel apart of the political process and young people especially are able to engage in the political process.

You will recall that the present Mixed Member Proportional (MMP) system replaced the pervious First Past the Post (FPP) voting system in a referendum in 1993. New Zealand's first MMP election was held in 1996.

History shows that elected governments rarely represent a majority of voters in FPP elections. No New Zealand general election since 1951 has seen a single-party obtain more than 50 % of the vote. This means that between 1954 and 1993, the majority of people actually voted against the

government! In the 1978 and 1981 general elections, for example, the Labour Party actually received more votes than the National Party – and yet the latter won a majority of the seats.
